Feed Supplies Could Provide "Plenty" of Meat

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—If livestock feed supplies now available were put to the production of meat, dairy and poultry products, American really could have a lot on the table next year.

This possibility—which, incidentally, is not a probability—stood out in the October Agriculture department forecasts that crop production this year would be the second largest of record.

Making up a very important part of that large volume are record supplies of feed grains, including a big corn crop of 4,477,000,000 bushels.

Largest Feed Supply

Taking into account feed supplies carried over from last year and this year's production of corn, oats, sorghum grains and barley, food supplies on farms for the feeding season ahead will be the largest ever available.

Augmenting the food grains are a bumper supply of hay and good fall pastures in most parts of the country except the east where a summer drought hurt grass.

But only a part of these feed supplies is likely to be used. In the first place, there are not enough animals to consume it all. In the second place, farmers are not too anxious to expand livestock production much beyond present levels.

Prices Decline

Influencing farmers is the fact that prices of livestock and live stock products have declined considerably this year. Furthermore,

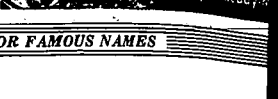

Report Slated For Palestine Scene Friday

A firsthand report on what is happening in Palestine will be presented at 8 p. m. Friday at the First Church of the Brethren by Zimmert W. Quilly, director of relief for Arab refugees in the Holy land.

Quilly, executive secretary of the Portland regional office of the American Friends Service committee, undertook direction of Arab relief on invitation by the United Nations. He is in charge of care for 200,000 homeless Arabs in the Gaza strip.

His organization, a Quaker group, cooperated with the League of Red Cross societies and the International Red Cross committee. He arranged for a medical program including anti-epidemic and anti-malarial measures and provided schooling and recreation for adults.

Quilly, who returned to the United States in mid-August, is now on a lecture tour in an attempt to inform church people of the situation and their help in the resettlement of the Arabs.

The relief organizations operating in Palestine were furnished with funds and relief in the form of food, milk, medical care, clothing, shoes and recreation equipment by the United Nations.

Quilly formerly was president of Pacific college, Newberg, Ore.; served as director of relief during the Spanish civil war and worked among European refugees in Cuba prior to World War II.

Farmers Advised To Study Wheat Crop Substitutes

MOOREHEAD, Oct. 11—Idaho farmers' best hope for a reduction of wheat acreage for 1935 are advised by the University of Idaho extension service to take a long look at substitute crops and make a careful selection before planting.

Cereals and legume seed crops are good bets in many localities, according to Eugene Whitman, extension agronomist. Cereals which have a reliable history in many dryland sections, such as rye and barley, are recommended for other localities.

Each district has its particular features and conditions that may make one substitute crop better than another. Farmers should by all means consult their county agent about a new crop to learn how it has come through under tests and if it is recommended for the area.

Experiments with a wide variety of plants are conducted continuously at a University of Idaho experimental station. Results are available to farmers. Recommendations on substitute crops will be made by the university in time for spring planting.

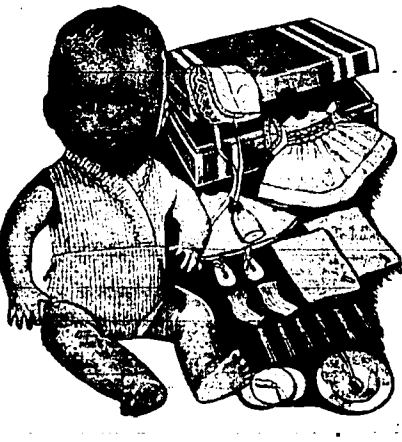

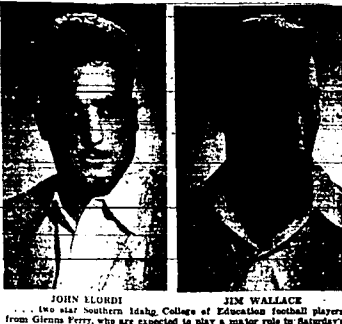

1949's Nobel Peace Award Given Briton

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 10 (AP)—Lord Boyd Orr, president of a movement for world federal government and former dean of the United Nations food and agricultural organization, is the Nobel peace prize winner of 1949.

The Norwegian parliament's Nobel committee announced its award to the patient, craggy-faced 69-year-old Scotsman who has long campaigned for "a world food policy based on the needs of the people rather than on trade interests."

The recipient, the former Sir John Boyd Orr, announced in Edinburgh, Scotland, that he would use the money to promote peace and world government.

"The important thing in the world today is to get the nations to cooperate," the famed nutritionist told a reporter.

Reason Not Given
The Nobel committee does not give reasons for its awards, but the winner said he believed the prize was given him for his proposals for a world food plan.

Several Americans had been named as those considered for the prize, including Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

No peace prize was awarded last year. The 1947 prize went to the American Friends of Quakers service committee and the Friends Service committee, London.

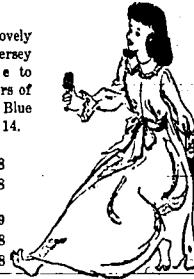

U. S. Refunds \$3,757,019 to Rail Company

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—The federal government today has refunded the Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad a total of \$3,757,019 in excess taxes paid over a four-year period.

Representatives of the D&RGW and the U. S. Bureau of Internal Revenue formally concluded the settlement which had been in litigation for more than two years, in the court of Federal Judge Oris L. Phillips.

Phillips approved two petitions which proposed the refund in full. The government today also a refund of more than \$72,000 to the railroad by the reconstruction finance corporation.

Check to Olives
As soon as Phillips had signed the petition an internal revenue bureau official handed railroad attorneys a check for the government's settlement.

The refunds covered a part of the income and excise taxes levied by the railroad for the years 1943 to 1946. The D&RGW, during the refund period, today paid a total of \$13,880,293 during the four years.

The tax case went into the courts after the company was reorganized on April 11, 1947, when the D&RGW was merged with the Salt Lake Western railroad.

Major part of the refunds resulted, attorneys said, from the operating loss sustained by the railroad for the year 1946.

There was no argument in the hearing, since both sides already had reached an agreement on the settlement.

Health Department's Director Explains Congenital Syphilis

Children with congenital syphilis are probably the worst tragedy seen in the world today, according to L. J. Peterson, administrative director of the state department of public health. The department is conducting a campaign against venereal diseases.

The crippling effects of pottolomyelitis and other diseases are ordinarily mild compared with the harm that can be done by congenital syphilis, he noted.

Congenital syphilis means syphilis acquired from the mother before the baby is born. Formerly the mother infects the child during the fifth month of pregnancy. A baby born with syphilis has always acquired the infection from the mother. It is not possible for the child to be infected by the father, the mother and the mother pass the infection on to the child. This puts the total responsibility for preventing congenital syphilis completely on the mother, Peterson said.

In Idaho there is a law which requires all pregnant women to have a blood test during pregnancy. However, the law is ignored sometimes and many women deliver children without having had a blood test, and this state has more than its share of congenital syphilis children, the director claims.

In a previous article it was stated that syphilis is the cause of 80 per cent of blindness in babies and for the largest percentage of all stillbirths. It is comparatively easy to see the signs of syphilis in the blood stream of the mother to enter the blood stream of the child. In all cases of congenital syphilis the mother is infected with syphilis, but not necessarily the father, he said.

There are many possibilities in the infection of an unborn child with syphilis. The infection may cause reversion of growth of the unborn child and abortion occur. The child may develop fully but be delivered dead. The child may grow but be blind, before normal time has elapsed. The child may be born alive but with syphilis and die shortly. The child may be born with no signs of syphilis but develop them soon after birth. The result in this instance depends upon the treatment given the child, Peterson explained.

A child may be born alive but remain a puffy, undeveloped person throughout life. During the ages of 8 to 14 a child who appeared normal at birth and is infected with congenital syphilis may lose the mind or go blind. If continued, syphilis is the cause of death in 80 per cent of those children infected from their mothers. If a mother's infection is discovered during her pregnancy and she receives treatment her chances are about 100 per cent delivering a healthy, normal baby. She can go a long way toward making this wish come true if she will insist that the doctor accomplish a blood test during pregnancy, Peterson added.
