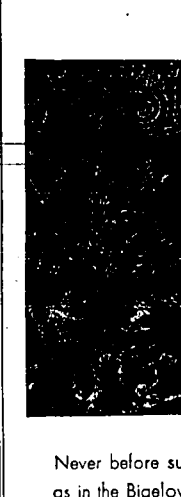

Old Types of Rural School Disappearing

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The "old" type of rural school is being torn down at the rate of several thousand a year.

The U. S. office of education says there were 200,000 one-teacher schools in 1916 and less than 80,000 today.

Even so, says Dr. Walter H. Gaumnitz, education office specialist in small and rural high schools, fully 45 per cent of all the schools in the United States are still of the one-teacher type.

Schools Consolidate
Generally speaking, the Gaumnitz rural school districts are consolidating to establish larger schools with more highly trained teachers.

This involves bus transportation to outlying districts. In 1916 schools transported about 200,000 children. Now more than 2,000,000 children are being transported annually.

Almost 1,500,000 children still attend the one-teacher schools. "It would not be fair to say that the dwindling of the one-teacher school is entailing an unlimited blessing," says Gaumnitz.

Entire Nation Well
"In its day it served the nation very well indeed. It brought the three Rs to every rural community, however isolated. It formed a neighborhood center, it was near to the farmer's home, it was organized on the basis of family life.

The larger schools are often inordinately long distances from the children's homes. Special efforts are required to bring parents into these more distant schools often enough to aid the teachers in understanding and motivating the education of their children."

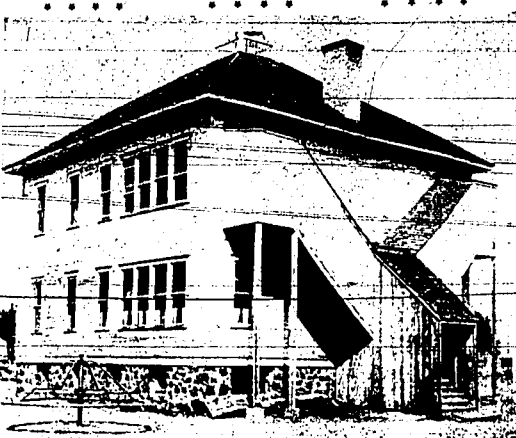
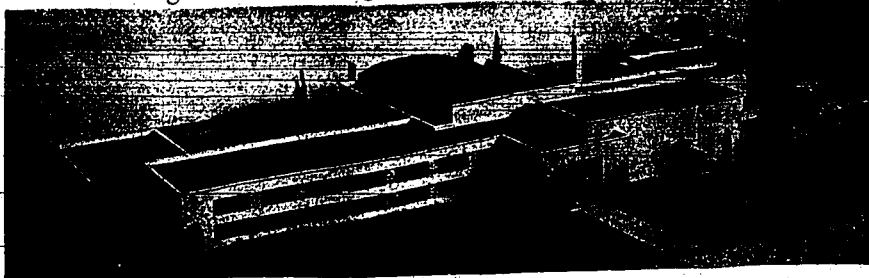

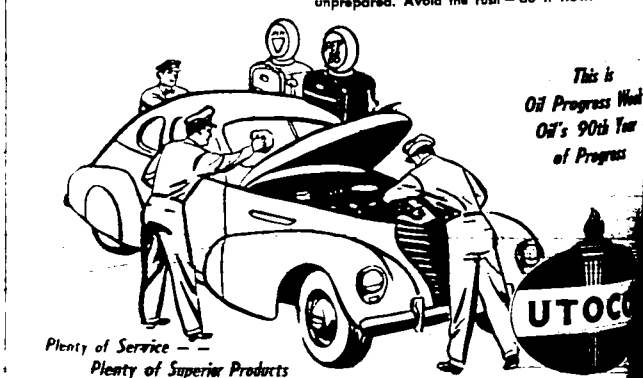

Dream Highway Begins to Grow

In the nine years since it was built, the famed Pennsylvania turnpike, stretching 168 miles from Harrisburg to New York, Pa., has been the marvel of millions of motorists. Russ Built Rocket Launching Sites 1,400 Miles Off Alaska

BY LEON DENNEN

NEW YORK (NEA)—Launching bases for trans-ocean rockets capable of crossing the Bering Sea and paralyzing U. S. communications with Japan have recently been completed by the Soviet MVD on the Kamchatka peninsula and the adjacent Kolyva peninsula of Kolyva, according to reliable information.

This confirms and extends what I first learned of Soviet activity on Kamchatka two years ago from a satellite diplomat following a reception given in the Russian embassy in Paris to inaugurate a group of the satellite diplomats of Russia's front, the Soviet Ambassador to France, Bogomolov, was reported to have remarked.

"I know for a fact that we are now engaged in the mass production of rockets formerly produced by the German Wehrmacht at the Peenemuende armament plant in the Baltic, which was taken over by Soviet experts, has been reassembled on a gigantic scale in Siberia," Bogomolov, according to my informant, who is still in the employ of the satellite country, added with a smile.

"In case of need, we could subject both Alaska and the Canadian Pacific coast to mass bombardment."

In addition to the construction of rocket launching sites more than a million prisoners are being employed by the MVD secret police to build a new system of highways which begin at the port city of Magadan and will eventually reach the Bering Straits.

All of Kamchatka is also dotted with air fields and repair plants. The population of the area is being constantly increased. Walter's notes: Lord Boyd Orr, winner of the Nobel peace prize for 1936, said in the following speech his views on war and peace and especially the possible use of atomic bombs and biological weapons would cause widespread death and destruction followed by political convulsions from which few of them would remain in power or even alive.

No government will willingly declare war. The danger is that in the present cold war, the armament race and propaganda stirring up fear those in power know that a war and hatred will create an inflamed

mandatory political atmosphere in which some elaborate drifting incidents will flare into a world war.

The road to peace lies through cooperation of governments and concrete measures of benefits to all. Political conflict, either national or international, is largely an appeal to emotion.

In business, people get down-to-concrete realities and reach agreement on the basis of the facts instead of interminable debates on ill-defined political abstractions.

Let the great powers begin to consider how they can cooperate to fulfill the promise of the Atlantic

chapter—freedom of work for all men of all lands.

If the forces of modern science were applied to this end we would be well on the road to peace: social unrest among the hungry and poverty-stricken people of the world would be averted. Economic difficulties would be solved. There would be a world market for all that agriculture and industry could produce. This would bring about a world of plenty for agriculture, industry and trade with full employment and rapid rise in the standard of living of the people of all countries.

The food and agricultural organization and economic council, the

world bank and other agencies of the United Nations were set up for this purpose. Let the government begin to make these do the work for which they were created.

Let governments begin to discuss business instead of politics. Let them consider joint action in plans like the world food plan which nearly succeeded.

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Death-Dealing Smog-Reasons Are Disclosed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10 (AP)—The five-day smog that sickened almost 6,000 persons at Donora, Pa., was the result of an unusual combination of warm, stagnant and heavily polluted fog, according to a public health service report today.

The report said 43 per cent of the population of Donora and nearby Westport was made up of persons who had been in the town as early as 1910. Released by Surgeon-General Clegg, the report was prepared by Surgeon-General Leonard A. Scheel.

He said Donora probably had another serious smog period in April 1935—the year statistics show there were almost twice as many deaths in the town as in any ordinary April of any ordinary month.

And he warned that the circumstances could occur again there or in other highly-industrialized areas.

Recommendations Given
To prevent such recurrence, Surgeon-General Clegg recommended that:

- 1. Unsanitary industrial centers be closed.
- 2. Industrial plants be curtailed or closed.
- 3. Development in order to reduce sharply the contamination of air.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 10.—Only clean cows produce milk!

Owing boys an occasional haircut will not only keep them clean but will also help them to produce more milk.

Grant Hall, dairy herdman at the University of Idaho, says clipping cows before winter stabling will improve the quality of the milk. In clipping the dairy animals and get their ready for milking.

"There is a lot of mud and dirt around the farm in fall and winter that gets on the cow when she lays down," he said.

"Millions of bacteria collect on the foreign matter and cling to the long hairs of the cow. Unless this hair is cut short the sediment drops into the milk and spoils it."

Mr. Hall explains that a systematic clipping program around the flanks, under and tail, will prevent a lot of dirt and bacteria from getting on the cow's body in the first place.

As a result of the semi-regular haircuts, the milk is cleaner, the cows are healthier and a substantial increase in the milk yield is reported.

So, for health's sake, the herdman says every farmer who keeps a cow should have his cows clipped before the winter and see with a distinct solution before milking.

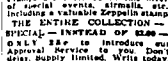
