Community Chest Drive Starts With 'Paint Campaign,' Parade

The well known "red feather" drive is under way in Twin Falls today. A parade was scheduled for 2 p.m. O. J. Botkin, general chairman of the Community Chest drive, said the red feather was chosen to represent the Chest because traditional legends have accumulated around wearing of red feathers. He said they had been worn as a sign of courage, a symbol of service or achievement, or purely for decoration.

"Everybody gives—everybody benefits," is one of the slogans of the drive. The drive has a budget this year based upon minimum requirements. Botkin said 1944 Grand Western business reflected the highest cost of \$100,000, reflecting the ever rising cost of supplies, rent and other items required to complete the mission of the chest.

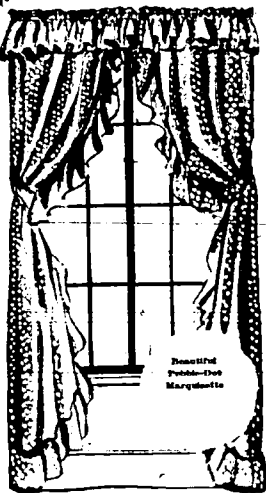

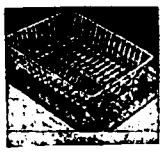

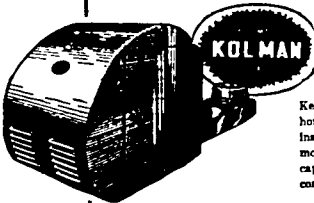

West's Solons See-Hope for Mine Bill OK

By WILLIAM E. LOWELL... WESTERN CONGRESSMEN say there is still hope for enactment of the presently stalled mine aid bill. The house rules committee last week refused to clear it for debate and Chairman Sabath, D., II, told reporters there were administration objections to certain of its provisions. Senator O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., said he is satisfied the measure will be accepted by the administration if it is passed with no additional changes. "And changes there will be," he predicted. He predicted the rules committee will reject it in its stand and that the bill will be passed before congress quits. O'Mahoney, chairman of the senate interior affairs committee, drew the bill after conferences with bureau of mines officials. The sponsors are Senators Maloney, both D. Ark. and Malone, N. Nev., joined as sponsors. The Senate passed it without a second vote. Titled "Weak Effort" the house public lands committee approved the measure after brief public hearings although Chairman Emory D. Gulf, of the mine-mining committee characterized it as a "pretty weak effort." He said, however, it represented the best that the mining industry could get and he, with other representatives from mining states, argued vigorously for a rule to permit a house consideration. Sabath criticized particularly a provision which would allow mine operators to include depreciation and depletion as part of their costs. "I think the bureau of mines can live with that," O'Mahoney said. Past cleared. He indicated part of the measure had been cleared with the bureau before it passed the senate. He also said he doesn't believe the house amendment making benefits under the measure available to manganese, chrome and mica mines would be objectionable. "If the measure isn't acted on at this session of congress, Representative Boone, D., Utah, says she will demand action in the next session. Study Reveals Cost of Bonus For Veterans

Sixteen states have approved cash bonuses totaling \$2,071,400,000 for veterans of World War II. The total cost of \$2,071,400,000 will be added by the end of 1942 if voters act favorably on a referendum in their state and other states, according to a study published today by The Foundation, a non-profit research organization.

Of Aug. 15 bonuses had been authorized in Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Vermont and Washington.

Eleven states are being authorized in an advisory referendum on July 14, 1942, and was selected for final action by a special session of the legislature this September.

Total Cost of Bonus

The total cost of administering these programs, as well as the cost of interest charges incurred by issuing bonds to finance them, are unknown and impossible to estimate at this time, but a reasonable degree of accuracy, said the study.

"But such expenses do represent a considerable expansion beyond the projected cost requirements of almost \$1,000,000,000. For example, World War I cash bonuses of \$250,000,000, still being paid in many states, will have cost a total of more than \$200,000,000, exclusive of administrative costs in 44 states."

Iowa Has Act

Bonuses in 11 states are being financed entirely by bonds and notes, the study disclosed. Iowa is using its general fund surplus, as well as its bond issues. It has the greatest income tax to pay for its bonus. Vermont, which authorized the first state cash bonus for World War II veterans back on April 7, 1941, paid for it out of its surplus and current funds.

To retire the bonds within periods of 10 to 20 years, the study states various states are employing a variety of plans, principally on common property, and alcohol.

Refugees Listed

Since the bonus proposals have been defeated by legislature in 21 states, the Tax Foundation, 11, 1941, bonuses were defeated in Alaska, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Texas.

In California, Kentucky, Mississippi, South Carolina and Utah.

During the past legislative sessions, bonus proposals were beaten either by legislative action or by reason of legislative adjournment without session, in California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, Montana, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin.

Opposition Falls

"That 15 states failed to approve proposed legislation in 1942, emphasizes the Government of strong opposition, including that initiated by veterans and veterans organizations. The main reason," said the Tax Foundation.

"Nevertheless, the precedent established by some states assures that legislators in non-bonus states will continue to present bills in future sessions to adopt similar programs."

Of 18 states where cash bonuses have put up to the electorate only five have been rejected. The study showed. Four of these rejections occurred in states where bonus programs included specific tax measures for financing.

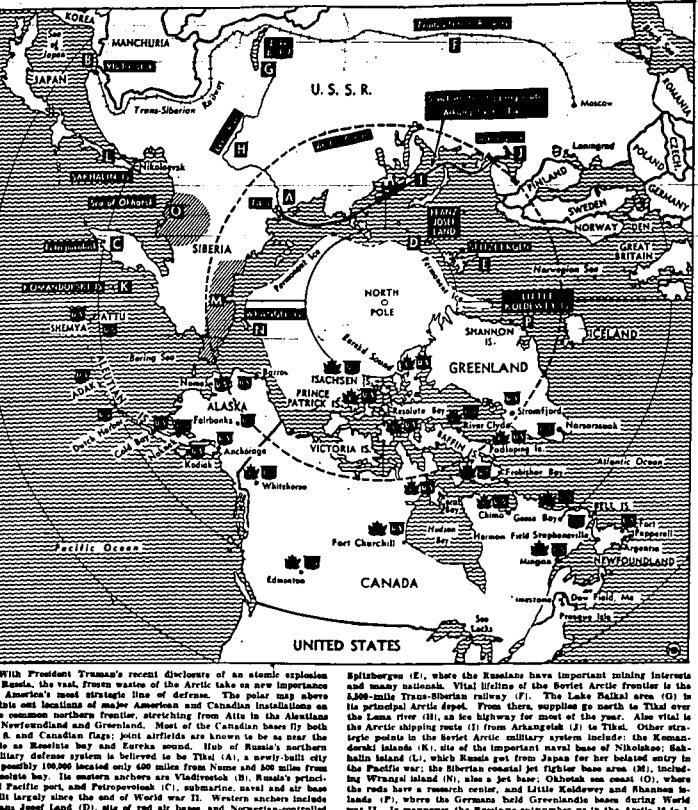
