Hunter Death Score Is 78, Survey Finds

By United Press
At least 78 persons have been killed in hunting accidents since Sept. 1 with the nation's total score for the year. A United Press survey showed that 41 hunters died in gunshot accidents and 36 others due to heart failure brought on by exertion or excitement.

Conservation experts said that, as a result of the hunting season, there have been prevented had the victims or their accidental assailants displayed due caution.

State authorities throughout the country report that the number of deaths is more than ever in the woods and fields this year. They said that this season's ammunition and arms more plentiful than ever since the war, America's open areas are more numerous and the number of humans could be terrific.

The Hunting Bureau reported that the total number of live hunting squirrels, 18,000 were shot during the turkey-tailed ruffed bird and the same number while after duck. The Dakota and Minnesota pheasant seasons claimed 1,000 birds. The remainder were killed while hunting miscellaneous types of game, many of which were shot out of season.

Hunters reserved their sympathy, however, for an Idaho victim who begged his first deer, then got back fever and badly then died on the spot of a heart attack.

Jerome Oct. 21—The Union Pacific railroad gained the support of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce Wednesday noon when the chamber committee endorsed it in its battle to stop the Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad from opening the Ogden gateway to direct traffic haul.

Chamber members had heard both sides of the question presented by representatives of the companies and the dispute had been further studied by the chamber committee, who decidedly favored the Union Pacific, which pays approximately \$800,000 in taxes each year in Jerome county.

It was pointed out that the railroad which is now located with extensive lines in the state had pioneered the development of Idaho from the earliest days and that development of new industries had always been encouraged by the Union Pacific.

The fact there would be no new rail lines brought into the state by the Rio Grande was also pointed out.

The chamber committee will confer with farmers on this proposed route.

War Mothers Plan Concerts For Singing Resort Employee

His return to England was made by way of the United States by a stopover in Salt Lake City to meet members of the LDS church. While in Salt Lake the story of his prison life was dramatized on KSL, and he was offered a year's scholarship in Brigham Young university.

It was to take advantage of this offer that he returned to the United States after his discharge from the British army.

For the summer seasons of 1941 and 1942 he has been head houseman in Sun Valley, where his singing in amateur shows has interested many people in his ability. He considers it particularly fortunate, however, that he has secured the sponsorship of an organization of the faith of the American War Mothers in his present try for success in his chosen field.

An abstract of the bids will be awarded before the contract is awarded. Government estimate for the work was \$1,222,011.00.

The work involved includes excavation of an inlet channel, intake structure, tunnel and outlet structure and installation of concrete and steel trestle bridge for 1,200 lineal feet of a 23-foot diameter tunnel.

The proposed dam 10 miles east of Boise will create a reservoir of capacity of 80,000 acre feet. The dam will be of the rolled earth fill type with a crest length of 1,700 feet. It will be 26 1/2 feet high.

The entire project is estimated to cost \$11,000,000.

Contractor on the project for which bids were opened yesterday will have 90 calendar days to complete the job.

Navy Unveils Plans of New Radio Station



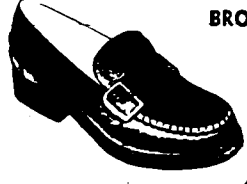

Royal Speech Over Divorce Stirs England

LONDON, Oct. 17.—Specialists on British marriage problems split up today over Princess Elizabeth's attack against divorce.

Another problem involving British morals was aired publicly when the labor government promised to hold outlaws slot machines dispensing contraceptives.

Britain's Marriage Reform committee deplored a warning by Princess Elizabeth to Ministers Union Tuesday that divorce threatens the stability of British family life.

"We have received the statement with regret," said Sir G. Pollard, said in the committee of labor, objects and lawyers seeking to liberalize British divorce laws.

Defends Elizabeth. But the Marriage Guidance Council, whose aim is to help troubled couples, said it has no objection to a limited attempt to build happy marriages, ordered the royal speaker.

"Very welcome," said A. J. Brazas, his general secretary. He said Princess Elizabeth told the Mothers' Union was "very much to be commended for its efforts to hear more speakers like her."

Buckingham Palace declined to comment on the royal speech. The subject of the Princess' attack was the divorce of Prince George, the British throne who is married and a mother herself.

Was Married Talk. Her statement recalled what she called Britain's falling moral standards and one of the strongest remedies by British royals, which usually avoids discussing social or political problems in public.

The Marriage Reform committee's statement was equally unusual. Officially the only British royal critic members of the royal family are in the relatively few anti-royalist or communist.

Pollard, himself a happily married lawyer, said the royal speech was responsible for the evils she discussed, he insisted.

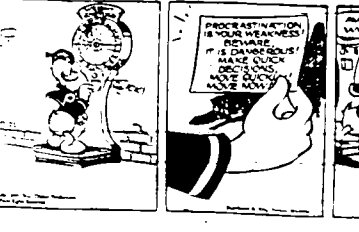

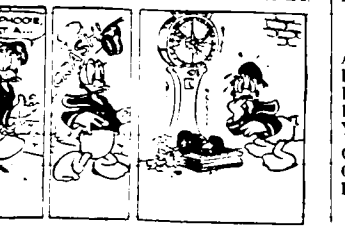

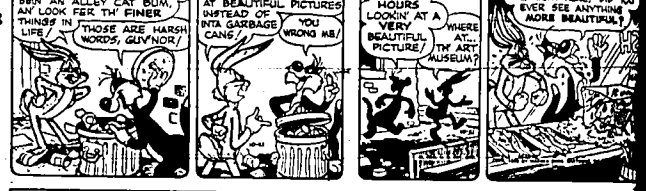
