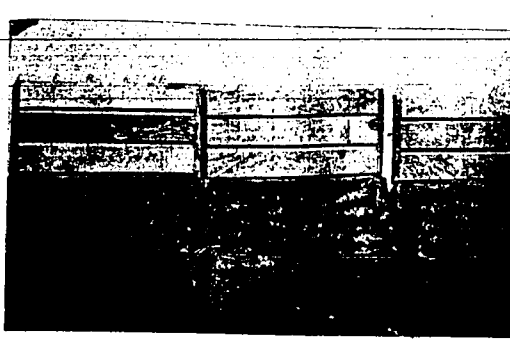

Voting Details Are Told for Bond Election

REPORT, Oct. 24—A school bond election for \$700,000 will be held between 8 A. M. and 5 P. M. Nov. 1. Voting places will be: District one, Heyburn high school; District two, Paul high school; District three, county courthouse; District four, Rupert high school; and District five, Acquia high school.

To be eligible to vote at a school bond election a person must be a citizen of the United States, a resident of the state for six months, a bona fide resident of the district for more than 30 days, and a taxpayer on Oct. 1 or husband of a taxpayer.

A taxpayer, according to school law, is a person whose name appears on the last rolls of the county, and is assessed there with unexpunged real property, owned and subject to taxation.

Absentee ballots will be available for those who cannot be absent from the school district on the day of election, or who are unable to go to the polls because of physical disability or blindness.

Applications must be in writing and must be received at the school district office by 5 P. M. on Oct. 15. They will be furnished with necessary card, and must be returned at least one day before the date of election.

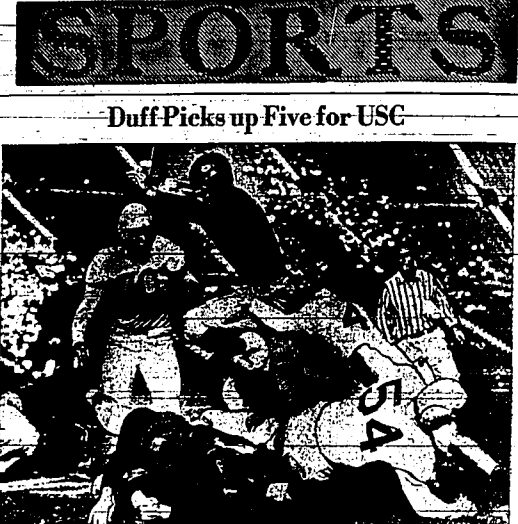

U.S. Explains Why Egg Cost Remains High

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The department of agriculture has been printing letters from cities protesting the high price of eggs. It blames the government price support program.

Under the program, the government bought more than 2,000,000 eggs during the first eight months of the year. The eggs were in storage from drying plants in 12 states.

To protect against high egg prices, the department has this year issued the following order: If the government stopped the egg buying now, egg prices in cities would be any cheaper.

The department says only accounting what the law requires—farming families of eggs on a national average at a level of 100 cents per dozen.

Since May, 1941, the government has had a standing offer to buy at fixed prices all the egg powder processors want to use.

The government still is picking up the order which has this year summed up to pay 75 to 90 cents a dozen.

A department spokesman said the consumer price wouldn't be any lower if purchases were stopped because all the 35-cent eggs being bought are of low quality.

The spokesman said the gap between 30 cents on the market farm and 35 cents in cities is big enough to guarantee that any increase in good enough to tempt consumers to buy eggs of low quality.
