### Monday Blues Ended by New Type of 'Soap'

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 10 (AP)—A new kind of laundry-detergent agent has made its debut here, and its manufacturing process is well on its way to being duplicated in other parts of the country.

The new detergent will save housewives the trouble of rinsing their clothes and will enable them to do their weekly wash in one half the time and with one half the labor required under present wash-and-rinse method, the firm said.

The product was demonstrated publicly for the first time. It goes on sale immediately in the Philadelphia area and will be available in Chicago and Los Angeles later this year. Thereafter distribution will be made as fast as the detergent can be produced.

Clothes washed in the new detergent are free from the ordinary washing water through the wringer to the clothes lines or to the board, the demonstration showed. The firm termed the product "the greatest advance in home washing since the invention of the washing machine."

According to Charles Black, director of the company's Washability Laboratories, the new detergent also increases wearing qualities of clothes by eliminating the extra handling during the rinsing process, and conserves water. He said that the clothes come out as white, and remain so longer, as they are washed by the rinsing method.

But eliminates the need for rinsing, he explained, because it holds the dirt removed from clothes in emulsified suspension in the wash water. All the dirt flows out with the clothes as they are wrung—the garments without any deposit on them which would result in stains. It is in the form of white granules which produce thick suds.

### Hank Extolls Bravery of Man Devising GI Dividend Forms

I don't know the man's name, but he should have a monument. I first heard that we GIs were going to get a bonus for not being plugged for keeps. I pictured the application we would receive. A batch of papers heavy enough to break a burro's back, with 44,323 questions to be answered. Color of hair, shape of ears, name of great grandmother's first serious suitor, favorite cigarette, gasoline and toothpaste remedy, height, weight and chest (apparently) size, middle initial of doctor who delivered you, doctor's favorite hobby, exact height of Mt. Everest, and exact length of time you can stay under water without coming up for air.

But the application was as simple as ABC. Just a small card with the minimum of questions. So few questions that a man could answer them with one clipping of his pen. Name, serial number, number of insurance policy, permanent address and branch of service.

That's all, and the lines provided for the information were of such a decent length that you didn't have to be named Tom Up and live on Elm street, to have room to write the information sought.

The blank was a pleasure to fill out, which is more than can be said of any form or application to come out of Washington for eight onto 20 years.

Since the early 1930's Washington, D. C.'s emblem has not been the eagle but the carbon paper. To give your right name has always required at least half a dozen sheets of paper, and enough writing to give Bernard MacFadden a cramp.

I would be willing to bet that the man who devised the GI insurance dividend application has been fitted, denied his civil rights, and ridden out of Washington to the woods and ferns of 200,000 filing clerks. I can picture what his superiors said when he walked into their office and submitted this simple, sense-making, non-extra-work-making blank. They undoubtedly threw up their hands in horror at the very thought of doing something the easy way and ordered him to go back and, if necessary,

### Houston Ousts Texts on High School Civics

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 10 (AP)—High school civics texts were temporarily without civics books today following school board action that banned the regular text because it allegedly planted "invidious seeds" in the minds of students.

The book, "American Government" by Oregon State college Prof. Frank Abbott Maguire, was adopted by the state textbook commission for a long time, ending this year.

Houston Board of Schools Dr. W. E. Morrison threw the book out of class on orders of the school board, and immediately started a hurried search for a substitute book.

Maguire was suggested by Edwin Weidman, a member of the board, because of a paragraph on page 37 that dealt with a round-boat description of "capitalism." The offensive portion:

"The United States is a capitalistic country, but it does not have pure capitalism. It has capitalism subject to increasing governmental control as our manner of living becomes more complex. The country and even communities through the postal system, power projects and progressive taxes are bits of socialism, and public free education and old age assistance are examples of communism... to each according to his need."

Weidman charged that the questionable wording would "have a bad effect on a child's mind, planting invidious seeds." It made a motion for immediate action, and it was almost unanimously approved.

### Army Officer Tells Split of Service Cash

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.**—An army procurement officer testified that about 71 per cent of the army's services' purchases are from small business and 73 per cent from other firms.

Chairman Celler, D. N. Y., of a subcommittee investigating monopolistic practices commented: "It would be a far healthier state of affairs to give 73 per cent to small business."

No Subcommittee Director, Brig.-Gen. E. M. Stratton, who said of the current division of purchases between small and complex, tiny large firms, pointed out that the percentage has listed applies only to prime contractors and did not reflect additional sums which went to small business through sub-contract.

In a round table discussion, purchasing officers of the army, air force and navy assured the subcommittee that small firms will get a fair share of the government business, as required by a new procurement law which took effect last July 1.

Must Tell Employees  
 That law provides that bidders for government contracts must state specifically whether they employ 500 persons, or less than that number.

The subcommittee reopened its monopoly hearings today after a recess from last July. Celler said the central purpose of the inquiry is to decide whether additional anti-monopoly controls should be placed on big business.

### Adding Drug To Water Is Aid to Teeth

**NEW YORK, Oct. 25.**—Tooth trouble in children have been cut 30 per cent by adding fluoride to a town's drinking water.

This benefit, from only tiny amounts of the chemical added to the water supply, was reported at the American Public Health Association's 77th annual meeting.

The fluoride was put in the drinking water of the town of Newburgh, N. Y., starting three years ago. The effect on children's teeth was measured by comparing them with the teeth of children in Kingston, N. Y., 30 miles away, where no fluoride was used.

The number of permanent teeth found to be decayed, missing or filled among Newburgh children dropped from 21 in 100 permanent teeth to 14, said Dr. Davis B. Ast, director of the state bureau of dental health. The Kingston children still showed 21.3 decayed, missing or filled teeth per 100 permanent teeth.

Adults are not benefited much, if at all, by drinking the water with fluoride. The fluoride is used in the proportion of one part per million parts of water.

### Crommelin May Gain Crown As War II's "Billy Mitchell"

By DOUGLAS LABNEY  
**WASHINGTON (INRA)**—When the deep aircraft carrier *Laconia* may be torpedoed off Tarawa in the Pacific, Capt. John G. Crommelin was taking a shower.

A few minutes later, naked as a jaybird, Crommelin was hurled hundreds of feet into the air when the ship exploded as he helped the medical officer remove the wounded. Severely burned, Crommelin was rescued; so was the doctor, who later observed:

"For clinical reasons, I'd like to see the inmates of that man. He must be all courage. I didn't think it was possible for a human being to keep so cool in such a spot. He didn't even seem to notice that he was on fire."

Today Captain Crommelin is on fire again. This time there is little chance for it to escape his notice. He has put a career full of promise on the block—and possibly faces jail in defense of what he firmly believes to be the future of the U. S. navy.

Yellow officers describe him as a combination hero, scholar and seaman. Many doubt the wisdom of his tactics in getting the navy-unionization scrap before congress—tactics which included releasing secret letters of top navy brass to the press. Most of them doubt the sincerity of his motives.

Aggressiveness—and impetuosity have highlighted Crommelin's career. After surviving the *Laconia* fiasco, on which he was chief of staff to the fleet officer, he was stationed

at a west coast training school. The first of the navy's brand new and hot Corsair fighters were being delivered there—but without the pilots who had been checked out in them.

Crommelin didn't wait. He spent an hour reading the Corsair flight manual, then took off in one of the Corsairs. While amazed students watched, he put the hot ship through its paces, barely missing a crackup in landing. One of the awe-struck students is quoted as saying:

"My gosh, I didn't think four-striper did things like that."

Chambers says he was the same way at Pensacola where he went to learn to fly in 1925 after the minimum sea duty. They recall that as a student he was the best and most care-free pilot of all.

"Flying is the greatest thing that ever happened to the navy," he declared on frequent occasions at Pensacola.

He has never wavered from that conviction: Keeping up his proficiency as a pilot and promoting the cause of naval aviation have been twin obsessions. At 40, he works singly hard to keep in the same physical shape that made him a three-time star in boxing at Annapolis.

Climax of his war career came when he was made first command officer of the carrier *Saipan*, which he skippered, record show, with distinction through the last stages of the Pacific war. The last year after peace came, he cut himself his first chunk of trouble with the navy. He made open charges that his organization called the "green bow" existed in the navy; composed of "a clique of jealousy gratified" and "selfishly dedicated to build up the prestige and service gratifications of its members." These charges inspired a congressional investigation which proved practically nothing.

After that incident was forgotten, Crommelin was sent to the national war college in Washington, the school for future admirals and generals. He made a good record—and some enemies, too; his views on naval air power and strategic bombing provoked more than one heated debate.

Fellow naval officers said his speeches were "deliberately and force fully presented"—an instructor observed that Crommelin "was not a student of moderate viewpoints."

The Crommelin family's great navy tradition weighs heavily on Capt. John Crommelin's shoulders. His father, John Crommelin, was a captain and a lieutenant commander; his uncle, John Crommelin, was a rear admiral.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 20 (AP)—What should you do if an atomic bomb hits your town?

The safest thing is to stay indoors where you are, unless there is a specific reason for evacuation of the area.

To begin with, Bauer says your chance where the atomic bomb is better than you might think.

### Finns Have "Pre-Fab" House Which Could Help Out U.S.

By MARGARET CHILDS  
HEINZ WOPERS, Finland—The economic power that America exercises in the world for good or ill comes hardly less distinctly more clearly than in this small country struggling to maintain its independence.

Under the leadership of the Finns is a power that can assist the United States in its struggle for freedom if it is used wisely.

More than 90 per cent of Finland's economy, with the support market of the world, is dependent on wood and wood products.

For 100 years the Finns have pushed an intelligent conservation program and the Finnish forests still yield one of the greatest timber harvests remaining on this denuded planet.

A year ago, with the beginning of the American recession and the onset of the dollar crisis, wood pulp prices began to decline.

The net result is that in 1940 the Finns will have available about half the amount of dollars they had in 1938.

At the price of wood pulp dropped and dollar purchases declined, a wage crisis in the wood industry developed.

Thanks to the solid character of the great majority of the Finnish people and to the long-sighted capability of such younger men as 33-year-old Unto Varjonen, minister without portfolio, the communists were defeated and the strike was ended.

But that is far from meaning that the crisis in the wood industry is ended.

The answer is not necessarily in loans or handouts from the American government.

What is essential is to achieve some kind of meaningful economic exchange.

Finland there is a good example of what might be possible. Our other abundant timber resources the Finns manufacture pre-fabricated houses.

These pre-fabricated houses made by the Finns are probably not up to American specifications.
