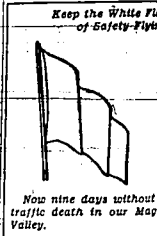

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—The coming of Truman has started a new kind of Whirligig in Washington on whether or not the session develops into a presidential and cabinet election.

Whether Defense Secretary Johnson keeps his headlines, the Whirligig will be a hot one. Johnson has had a bad morning reading the papers.

The Whirligig is hoping that Johnson will get the 1952 nomination. They say they will just find him a job and Louis would fly into a temper if he took that.

MENTIONS—Although, of course, every Democrat is eager for a President's press conference, it is not so in the federal capital.

Among the several names mentioned because of rank as Truman's successor are Representative Hamilton, as executive hand and House Majority Leader John W. McCormack, Massachusetts, John Handly, and others.

HANDSOMEST—Sen Scott Lucas, Illinois, by his position as majority leader in the upper house, naturally is in a group for a nomination. He is a handsome man in a suit, but his handsomeness is not the reason he has his position.

Lucas loves to have people like him. Hence, some of his most notable press associates think he is a good idea of a compromiser in a normally Democratic caucus.

LIKELY—"The man of the moment, mentioned as the probable successor to Truman is Sen. Harry Truman, the Senator from Illinois, Paul H. Douglas, he came from the faculty of the University of Chicago. At first he had the usual schoolmaster touch—always butting in on a speaker's subject.

He has made a deep impression on the press gallery. He has made a deep impression on the publicity of the President on several occasions.

U.S. Running Into Trouble In Greek War

By J. M. ROBERTS, Jr.
AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

The United States is attempting to negotiate the Greek Civil War as the first big underwriting job under the Truman doctrine for containing Communism in the Balkans.

On the one hand the Greeks are trying to reduce the army they built up to fight the communist guerrillas. They say the whole Balkan situation is too volatile for that.

Showing Signs

However, the government is showing signs of coming around on this point, since it is ready to see position to block U. S. wishes. The fact of the matter is that the year's preparation for military aid to Greece was based on belief in the end of the war, and there isn't much left.

Use of Dynamite Fails to Recover Body From Lake

MORAN, Wyo., Oct. 27 (AP)—Twenty-five dynamite charges were exploded in Jackson Lake yesterday in a futile effort to bring to the surface the body of Pauline Porter, Salt Lake City, she drowned in the snout boat accident at the lake last summer.

Project Failed

One of the big projects of the "peace campaign" launched by President Truman at the current U. N. general assembly was to move to get the big power negotiator on the Greek matter. It failed.

Russia used the question of the Greek-Athens border to snag these initial negotiations. The western powers supported a settlement which would give the Greeks what they would agree not to resort to violence over the question. Russia held out the final establishment of the border as it is now, meaning that Greece would surrender her claim.

Plan New

Now the United States is taking a new tack announced as aimed at settlement which would likely to produce merely another general assembly condemnation of the Russian bloc. If this is the result, it will be the fourth important matter on which Russia has been public in their criticism during the assembly.

Navy's Submarines to Launch Large Guided Missiles in Test

PEARL HARBOR, Oct. 27 (AP)—The navy has announced two submarines will launch seven-ton guided missiles off Hawaii today to show they can deliver the atomic bomb if war comes.

Pacific fleet headquarters disclosed that submarines in the current war game in Hawaii were already had shown they can carry three-hour long-range weapons in tactical underwater operations.

Cmdr. John S. McCain, officer in charge of submarine guided missile development, said the demonstration will be "a very significant step in the exploitation of sea power."

The submarine, with guided missile has become a stage bombardment weapon and can be used to deliver atomic bombs, he observed. The whole idea of using submarines to launch guided missiles is a long step toward punishment warfare.

Experimental and training operations have been conducted for more than three years off Point Mugu, near San Diego.

The missile to be fired are the Jupiter, an adaptation of the buzz bomb with which the Germans bombarded Great Britain late in the war.

The test, however, is a missile guided by an electronic gear in the Jupiter. Its range is from 100 to 200 miles.

The missile will be fired from the submarines Chuck and Cartersons. Both are standard fleet type submarines but are equipped with launching platforms.

The missile will be launched from a platform of 70 feet diameter and will be fired at a distance of 35 miles. The missile will be controlled by a remote control mechanism. The ship will be sailing for the return to San Diego.

Gold "Strike" Labeled Hoax By Oldtimers

FISHWHEEL, Alaska, Oct. 27 (AP)—Doesn't more gold-covered mud poured into this town today to grab for gold despite cries of "hoax" played by "Western" prospectors?

What was a barren, unmineralized western creek bed has mushroomed into a string of tents scattered seven miles upstream and six miles from the Yukon river. More than 200 claims have been staked along the 13-mile stretch.

While herdy old sourdoughs traced the subject, some old-timers, old-timer veteran prospectors began to drift away from the largest gold strike since '98' claiming they had hoaxed.

Oldtime prospector Jim Donovan returned to Fairbanks saying he believed the prospectors reported found may have been "hoaxed."

Tom Hammon, president of the Yukon Gold miners, also claimed the gold appeared to have been "hoax" on the Yukon banks.

"The gold was suspended in soft mud and all which is not natural," Hammon said. "I suspect that gold was salted there by some enterprising prospector."

Only about 12 nuggets have been found at Fishwheel in six days and prospectors are unable to find that many nuggets in his back yard.

Veteran prospector Jess Courtney said he didn't know how the gold strike, "but I believe that gold was stirred up by persons financially interested in a boom."

Charles Haleck, president of United Air motive, an Anchorage man, said "the whole thing is a put up job. He said one of more men, 'the same ones every time' must every place back in prospectors he flew in and displayed 'whenever' said was the original find of nuggets."

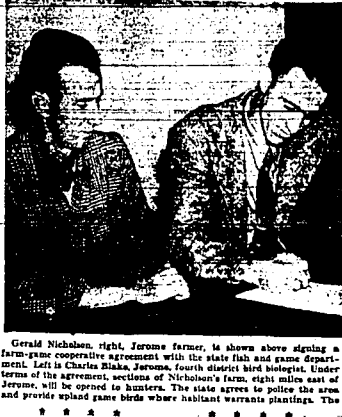

It seems that the Notre Dame football team is so good that there is talk—much talk—about its not being able to get any more games.

You hear, and you hear it often, that in a few years no school will play the Irish for fear that it will get its cars plinned back by six or seven touchdowns and so would prefer to play school whose cars it can pin back.

I do not doubt that this is true. It is also a sign, and a rather important sign whether you believe it or not, that this country is getting a little soft—that its citizens want

the easy way to victory and momentary ego to their pride.

There was a time in this country when the hard way was that they were just that, with no apron strings leading them when they went out to take a whack at what was tough.

There was a time when a football team would rather beat Notre Dame once in 10 years than boast of 10 consecutive victories over Fordham Poly-Tech. Now they want Fordham every Saturday, with parades after every game, and with everything afoot except their pride.

There was a time in this country when a premium was placed on perfection. No more. The time has come when to be popular you must be in the middle—not too good, not too bad. So far, Notre Dame has not subscribed to that theory when it fields its football team. It sends its men out to do their best. Heaven help us when we reach a point where we are sent out to do less than that.

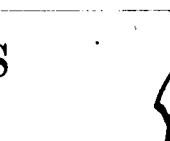

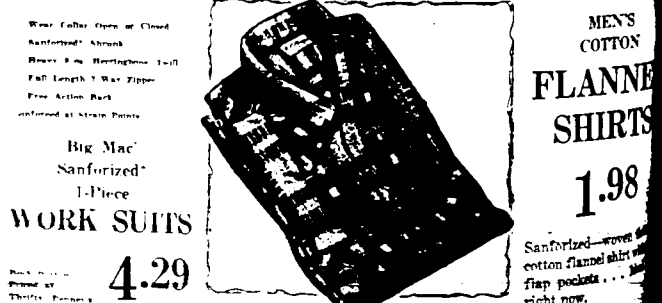
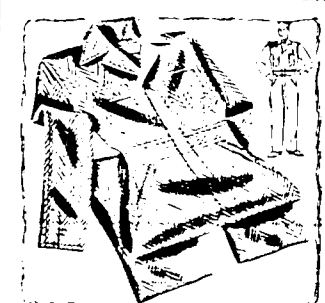

Idaho Potato Seed Getting 'Even Better'

BOISE, Oct. 27—Excellent Idaho potato seed is getting even better. Results of plots tested in California show that 94 per cent of the samples entered by Idaho growers were eligible for certification, T. C. Blackburn, manager of the Idaho Crop Improvement Association, announced today.

The reputation of seed produced in Idaho has been high for many years, Blackburn said, and has been advanced further by the recent critical tests.

One third of the 223 samples taken from the 1934 crop were entirely free from disease. Seventy-seven samples, or 34 per cent, showed less than one per cent disease. Thirty, or 13 per cent, had less than 2.5 per cent disease; 30 showed as much as 2.5 per cent to 6 per cent.

Only 13 samples, totaling four per cent of the entire lot, were found to be ineligible.

"These tests demonstrate," Blackburn said, "that Idaho potato growers can rely on seed from certified producers in their own state. The high standard also means that potato farmers in other states can look with confidence on them state seed."

Several buyers from California, Washington, and other states have been in Idaho this fall obtaining substantial quantities of seed.

Each Service Has Berth in Defense Plan

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (AP)—Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson said last night that each branch of the armed services has an "honorable role" in our defense setup but it must always act in role it wants.

Johnson discussed the nation's military strategy in a prepared speech for the third session of the annual New York Herald Tribune forum.

Build Defense Team
He said this strategy is to build a defense "team of air, sea and ground forces" capable not only of defending the nation against a possible "barbarian" but also able to strike the enemy in "deadly combat."

"To effect this strategy," he said, "honorable roles and missions are assigned to each of the three services."

Judgment of Staff
"Each gets the part it is best qualified to do" in the judgment of the joint chiefs of staff.
"This of course does not mean that each is directed to do what it would best like to do."

The defense secretary said this country has "powerful friends among other nations and our military planners must take all possible steps consistent with the sound financial structure of our own nation's economy to strengthen these national resources."

Delegates from three northwest states will attend.

Whiskers in Your Hibiscus? Your Lawn Requires Shave

NEW YORK (NEA)—Men, do you have a "clock shadow"? Do you have bristles among your whiskers? Or whiskers among your bristles? When you lie in the backyard, does the grass scratch you? What your lawn needs is a good shave, and among the new gadgets on display at the 1937 national hardware show here is just the ticket for the job.

It's a gimmick called the grass-shaver, dreamed up by Cornelius Hubner, and it employs used razor blades for the cutting process. Hubner, a man obviously obsessed with the idea that it is a great waste to throw old blades away, figured that blades too dull to slice whiskers could still slice grass.

So the "grass-shaver" was born—it looks like an overgrown straight razor. You insert four old blades in it and start shaving. The nice thing is that you don't have to lather the lawn first. For afterwards, a dab on your Kentucky blue fertilizer still is recommended.

The "grass-haver" was only one of 2,000 worth of products displayed by almost 800 exhibitors at New York's grand central palace. It may be the most novel item, but it's a close race.
