President Okays Largest Peacetime Military Fund For U.S.; Vetoes Air Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—President Truman overrode congress today on the hotly-debated 66-group air force issue. He signed a \$16,685,693,498 military appropriation—the biggest in peacetime history—but in doing so he ordered the secretary of defense to impound \$615,000,000 that the lawmakers had voted to build up the air force to 63 groups. Mr. Truman's budget provided for a 48-group force and that is about what he'll now get. The air force will acquire about 1,400 new planes instead of 1,800.

Undaunted, McCarran began bombarding his senate colleagues with cables telling them to throttle the new DP bill. He said that the senate leaders had taken the rare step of bringing the measure to the floor over the committee chairman's objections.

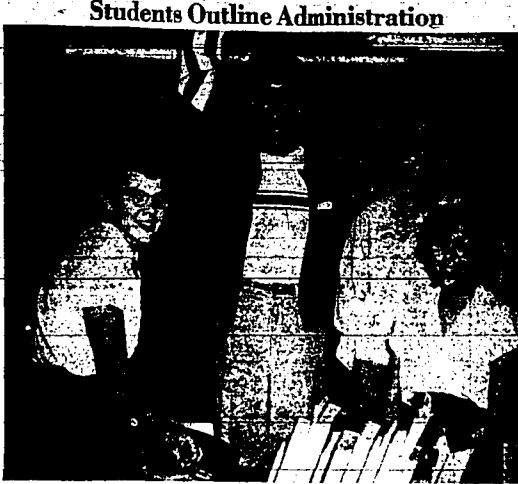

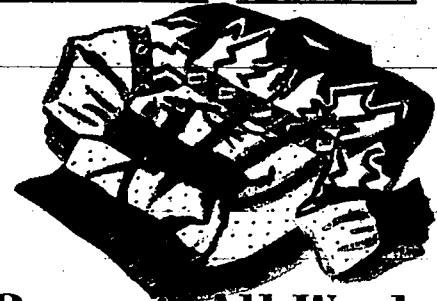

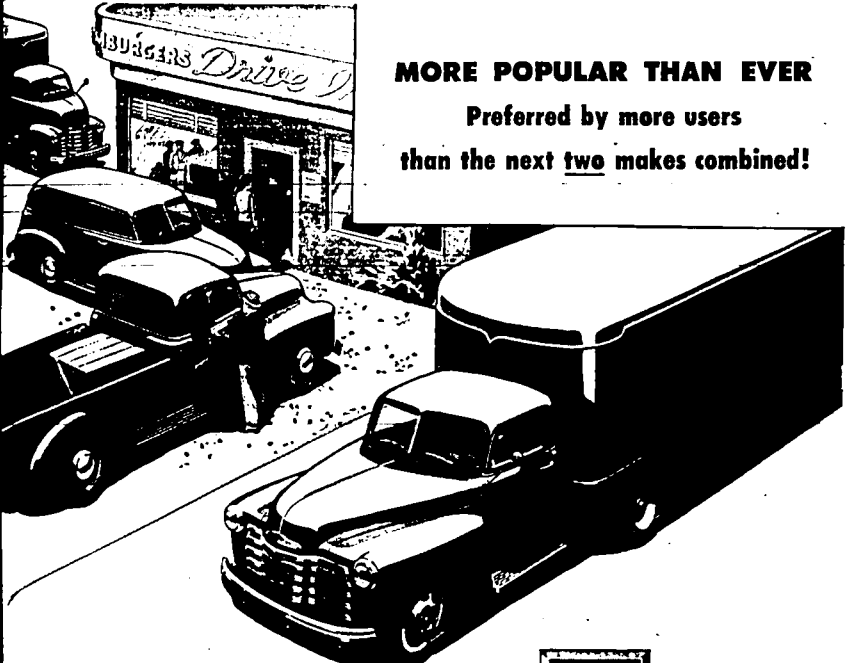

Reclamation offers a word of caution to state politicians who may be planning a quick "trial" of water from Idaho, Washington and Oregon to "give" it to California thirty hours.

First of all, the plan would take more than 20 years to develop.

Second, even if congress authorized it right now more than 10 years would elapse before any dirt was moved because of the sheer magnitude of planning the biggest irrigation project of all time.

Thirdly, even before the McCasland report is prepared, most reclamation officials agree that costs are so high that constructing such a vast project in these highly inflated times is virtually out of the question.

As one economist described the situation, it will take another 20 years to get united western started.

However, government "planners" think that Idaho, Washington and Oregon may be able to use only 50 per cent of the Columbia's vast water and power potential in the foreseeable future.

The highly explosive political elements involved in any scheme to re-allocate water are influencing reclamation bureau thinking as to possible plans. They are afraid of a water fight of all time, because which Colorado river controversy and the Snake river settlements would pale in comparison.

The ideal plan from an engineering point of view, they say, would be to take water from Columbia river, divert it to the Snake river, the Clark fork of Snake river in Idaho and then let nature take its course by sending it through long tunnels through the intervening mountains all the way to California.

Power could even be generated in these tunnels while another according to the plan's sponsors.

This is least popular with northwesterners who argue that diverting water so far up-stream not only threatens their irrigation but also makes it impossible to develop enough "firm" power.

It is the opinion of Assistant Secretary of the Interior William E. Warren, a Californian who is pushing the reclamation plan, that a diversion below Bonneville's power generators "brutely non-political engineers oppose this because it would result in some transmission lines at the expense of the power-shed northwest."

Another idea that looks like a "winning contractor's dream" is to literally pipe the water from the mouth of the Columbia along the Pacific coast to the Golden Gate. Reclamation engineers put this in the category of "radical fiction" and characterize it as completely impractical.

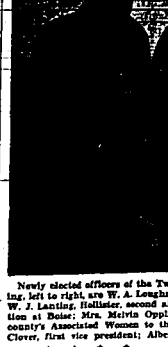
A short term compromise plan pending agreement on full scale united western program involves the fairly modest proposal to divert the Klamath river to Central valley and the San Francisco bay area.

This campaign would gradually creep northward sucking up water-sheds as it progressed until the mouth of the Willamette was tapped. Until this happens the reclamation bureau anticipates the incoming water war can be staved off.

CVA also plays a part in this grand strategy of water and power politics. Anti-CVA forces have held upon this idea of diverting the Columbia as an "interim" agreement against any valley authority.

The three men sitting on the governing board of a valley authority would be a lot more amenable to the pressure of California's 21 congressmen (she gets eight more soon) than would the governors and legislators of three sovereign states, they argue.

However, Assistant Secretary Warren and many Californians claim that adoption of one of these schemes is "inevitable in the long run" while 1940-ers continue to pour into water-improved states and the mighty Columbia pours billions of unused gallons of water into the Pacific 600 miles to the north.

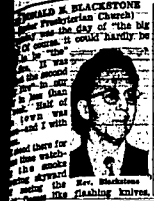

Fires can wipe out our families, our cities, our industries and our future. To be sure, a man can insure against financial loss, but no insurance company on earth will ever be able to pay for

the time and thought, happiness and worry, strength and hope that were spent in the building of that which was destroyed. Every time that man's achievement burns, that part of his life that went into that, goes up in flames, too.

It is the nature of our age, that it is especially vulnerable to fire—both ordinary and atomic. The reason is that our achievements are so largely in consumable things. An aptly which specialized in the achievement of clearer thinking, wiser thought, longer vision, higher character, nobler living, would not be so easily damaged or defeated by fire. With atomic war as definitely within the realm of possibility these matters would seem to be worthy of our more serious ponderings.
