Union and Republic Steel Reach Accord To End Long Tieup

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 8 (AP)—Republic Steel corporation and the CIO United Steel Workers today signed a pension and insurance agreement which ended a 49-day strike of 45,000 union employees against the nation's third largest steel mill.

The agreement provides: Insurance—Republic's present contributory insurance plan is continued but with increased benefits. Employees will continue to pay three and one-half cents per hour and the company will pay two and one-half cents per hour.

Pension—The plan is an exact replica of the Bethlehem agreement, company agreed to call in about 45,000 who have 25 years service will receive a minimum pension of \$100 a month, including paid security. Employees 65 years old with 15 to 25 years' service will receive proportional pensions.

Signed by Officials—The agreement was signed by CIO and Republic officials. CIO representatives were led by Philip Murray and E. J. Magee, acting director of Republic industrial relations.

Earlier Tuesday the union signed an agreement with the nation's No. 4 producer, Jones and Laughlin Steel corporation. That settlement, too, was in line with the Bethlehem steel pact and ended the strike of 26,000 workers.

Republic steel, with a total of about 75,000 employees, had approximately 2,000 employees with eligibility for retirement on Jan. 1, although retirement will not be compulsory.

Another News—Peace also seemed near for Great Lakes Steel corporation. Union and Republic agreed to suspend all maintenance work to "enable the plant to be placed in operation as soon as possible." A final agreement was reached Tuesday.

A joint statement declared: "The two companies have agreed to suspend all maintenance work until the maintenance crew agreement is reached."

Deal Still Stripped—Against the steel industry, efforts to ease the steel strike of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers remained at a standstill.

Federal Mediator Roy Childs reported that the two sides had made a deal after a meeting with southern coal operators. He said the deal was a "rough" one, but a corporation deal for a fresh try.

Package Program Is Proposed for Region

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The interior department has announced it is getting ready to present to congress something new—its first packaged program for a section of the United States.

The initial program call for spending \$1,500,000,000 over the next six years for interior department work in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana. Assistant Secretary of the Interior C. Girard Davidson said the regional program "is in no way a substitute for a Columbia valley administration," as has been proposed by President Truman.

As the daughter of an engineer, she has lived at various places in England and Scotland, but calls London and Edinburgh home. The problems of commodity rationing for her family she regards as her problems, and keeps informed on what the people at home need in packages from America.

During the war, she, slim, dark-haired girl with an officer in the A.T.S. British women's army service, and recruited women in London. She handled the rationing of many American girls into British service and thought they were a wonderful group.

When she reported at Seattle more than three years ago for her foreign office work, she decided to get an apartment with an American girl so she could find out how Americans are like at home. "I would be outnumbered," she relates, "and it was no time at all until I found out how Americans live."

Her strong idea that she can be of better service to her country if she knows the people of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Alaska has made her Idaho trip more exciting. She is sincerely interested in what Idahoans do and think, and she gets as enthusiastic as a child about everything out of the ordinary she sees.

In Seattle Miss Flynn frequently saw Demoras Padelly, a long-time friend from England who was working on a Vancouver R. E. newspaper. They were married in February of this year and live in Seattle. She writes fiction and an occasional article for British and Canadian magazines. Her favorite stars, she retains her "Miss" title.

Miss Flynn has spent some time in Florida, New York, Minnesota, Washington and Oregon and has loved every minute of her travels. Her husband knows the United States even better, but both of them want to see more of the country. She tells everyone, "Our ambition is to buy a car big enough to pull a trailer home anywhere. Then we'll load up and stop for six months at any place we like."

The charming foreign officer will leave Twin Falls Wednesday and go on to Portland and Idaho Falls and then back to Seattle. It's her last Idaho stop, she thinks. She adds, "I want my husband to see how delightful my state is."

CHICAGO, Nov. 8 (U.P.)—A University of Chicago professor offered some advice today on how to grow old gracefully.

Dr. Robert J. Havighurst told the meeting of the Gerontological Society, Inc., he had compiled a list of approved and disapproved activities for older people. He has the opinions of 1,200 people on a questionnaire entitled, "What do you think—should activities for older people?"

"Reasonable" Spending—The survey showed that people live longer in life as to middle age with "reasonable" spending of "the things you can do to achieve this and don't burn your 'work' load" and "retire from work between the ages of 65 and 70."

"Mating good people at stated times, usually holidays, but otherwise leading a separate life" was felt to be all right by the group.

Sheets "Act Age"—They thought that as you grow older you should act your age by "playing specific old people roles." To do this, you should spend a "great deal of time playing with your grandchildren or great-grandchildren" and "accept an old-age position when your savings are used up."

Rated only "moderately approved" were "still dancing and seeming to enjoy it," "going on a trip around the world," and "campaigning actively for your political party."

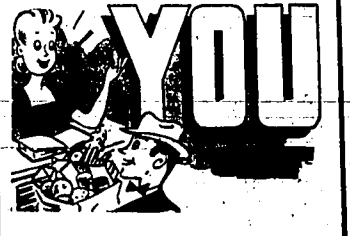
