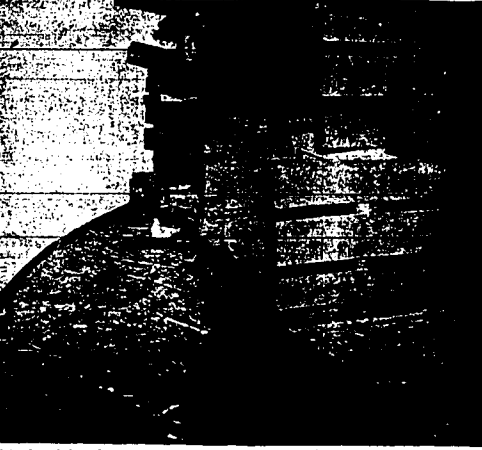

This is the greatest production year in the history of the automobile industry. In less than 10 months the motor industry has turned out 20,000,000 cars and trucks, amounting to the 20-year record established in booming 1929.

The new peak was achieved despite numerous work stoppages, a shutdown forced by the recent steel and coal strikes could not spoil the record, although some experts predict the factories will lose easily a month's output through depletion of the steel stocks. The year's output is expected to reach 25,000,000 units. And this huge output must somehow be accommodated by already congested highways and parking facilities throughout the country.

What curbs production will follow in the years ahead no one can tell for sure, of course. But Sumner Blitcher, veteran economist, forecasts in the current Atlantic Monthly that by 1940 there will be two cars for every family in the United States. That would put the automobile population somewhere above 80,000,000, as compared with the present 41,000,000.

When it only half this gain is realized, it will place burdens upon the nation's road network that will make today's traffic difficulties look like child's play. Some of the highway systems since that was ended have tried to put it back where it was in 1933—in terms of general condition and adequacy. We still have the 1933-1940 lag to make up even though we start keeping pace with current advances in traffic volume.

As traffic volume and population multiples in our big cities, the cost of highway development becomes staggering. Every evidence indicates that the cost of new revenue will fall very short of meeting the needs of a sound system.

Either the nation must be prepared to face the stiff addition to its general tax bill or it must accept broad use of toll highways to get the required expansion.

Government officials frown on toll roads as wasteful, duplicating, and an extra tax burden on motorists. But state after state continues to fight for the answer to the pressing traffic puzzle. Tolls seem easier to live with than new general levies.

The outlook is no brighter when it comes to parking facilities. Cars by the thousands congest every day on the downtown areas of giant centers like New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. The flow in and out resembles the Sunday crawl that has long plagued holiday days. But the most serious problem is that often there is no place to put the car once you get it downtown.

A few cities have developed big underground garages as partial solutions. But unless huge new cities are created soon in many places, the downtown areas are likely to lose more and more business to outlying sections where parking is possible.

Someone recently suggested the ultimate dilemma to which we may come. It may come in this jam-packed automobile age: a man will buy a car in a downtown showroom and find that he can't get it onto the street to drive home.

Maybe we ought to be glad steel shortages will cost us that one month's production. That's 500,000 fewer cars to clog the highway by Christmas.

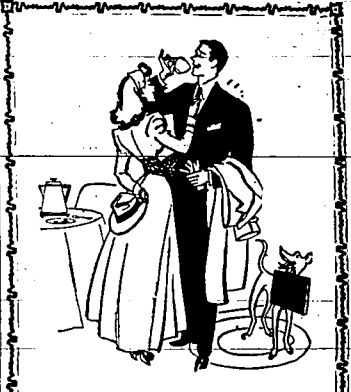

Fixing Length Of Light-Year Not A Easy Task

A few years ago Dr. A. H. Kuus in a University of Oregon examination asked the question, "What is a light-year?" One boy answered in a rather unique fashion. He wrote—evidently rather hopefully and with considerable deliberation: "A light-year is much longer than an ordinary year."

"How in-the-know" will agree that the light-year is noted for its astronomical inconceivability. How long is it? We speak of 10 years as a decade; 100 as a century; and 1,000 as a millennium. Does one who departs this world at the ripe old age of a light-year beat even a millennium in his span?

No comparison
A year and a light-year cannot be compared any more than can a minute and a mile. The light-year is a unit of length and is defined as the distance light travels in one year.

Without discussing the probable nature of light, it is now known that it requires time to move from its source to some other location. Old time held that light traveled instantaneously on the eclipses of the moons of Jupiter. Further work for light to pass across the width of the earth's orbit. We now know that light travels approximately 186,200 miles per second.

Use Olives Method
How far will light travel in a year? This is easy if you do not mind a little mathematics. First the number of seconds in a year by carrying out the indicated process of multiplication, then multiply the result by 186,200 and come up with 5,878,196,800,000 miles.

To make it easier, we usually say "A light-year is about six trillion miles." This is a million times six million. No wonder the student decided it was a bit longer than an ordinary year.

System by Eader
But why use light-years instead of miles? Simply because the great universal spaces are so inconceivably vast that our numbers become hopelessly large if we try to use miles. It appears far simpler to state that the distance to the nearest star is 43 light-years away than to say 25,581,174,560,000 miles.

Stars Are Distant
On the other hand, many known stars are distant 100,000 light-years. The outside star systems are reckoned in millions and hundreds of millions of light-years away.

And the most distant known, recently photographed with the new 200-inch Hale telescope, is thought to be so remote that the light which struck the photographic plate started from its star's vicinity some 115,000 years ago.
