Conference Will Set Date; Boy Shows No Remorse In County Jail Cell Here

"Too much has been said about the whole thing now, but the fellows (peace officers) are all square shooters and I guess I'm not. I want to save all the trouble possible to the folks."

Neal Butterfield, 16-year-old confessed kidnaper-slayer of 7-year-old Glenda Joyce Hirsola, still was composed, stolid and unremorseful as he made that remark during an interview in his cell at the Twin Falls county jail Saturday.

Several times during the 15-minute talk with a Times-News reporter, Butterfield's clean-cut face wrinkled into a slight grin. He was not nervous.

He denied he had made any threats to the little blond girl "just because she was pretty." But he still could not say why he committed the crime, most dastardly crime in recent history.

In fact, he hardly seemed to realize the sadistic scope of the tiny girl's murder. He still denied he raped the girl.

He also told about his little brother, Gary, a second-grader, and about his mother, Mrs. M. J. Hirsola, and his father, who died in a car crash.

He said he was "pretty tired" of having his picture taken—last night he had to go to court and he had to go to school.

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A charge of first degree murder for the thrill-aying of Glenda Joyce Hirsola Saturday (see News Butterfield, 16, 6-foot, 1-inch Hayburn high school football star who confessed Friday afternoon).

Cassia County Prosecutor Adonis Nilsson said Saturday night he would confer with District Judge Hugh A. Baker to set a time for the trial. The youth was bound over for the county term of the Cassia county district court when arraigned in a weird aguish setting at 10:10 p. m. Friday.

Immediately he was returned to the Twin Falls county jail for protection. An angry group of several hundred citizens had formed at the Cassia county courthouse.

The arrangements in a neighborhood out of sight of the highway around town lasted about 15 minutes. The arrangements were made because of the high ceiling in the jail.

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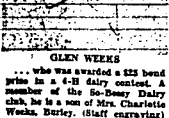

### Sanborn Raps Present Ways Of Demo Rule

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 18.—Jerome county Republican women met at the home of Mrs. H. Miller Proctor Friday afternoon to hear Rep. John Sanborn rap the present administration on several counts. Sanborn said "I am very pessimistic about many things that are happening to us."

He cited many instances of decisions reached by present officials in the government which show a trend trying to make a socialist state of the world.

Sanborn, who has endeavored to get assistance for the Hunt project, believes it would do more good to help those people get a good than to give big sums to certain for use for socialist experimentation.

**School Program Frow**

He said the school program for the project is meeting with poor success. However, he was successful in getting through congress his bill for loans through the farmers home administration.

Touching on cars and balancing the budget, Sanborn favors curtailing some of the spending and balancing the budget. He said, "The power to tax is the power to destroy." High taxes are now stagnating business and causing jobs to disappear, he warned.

He touched briefly on the added Brannon plan and stated that subsidizing cannot stand without tariff protection.

**Assault CVA**

He assailed CVA as "just one more step of those socialist ideas and this administration is full of them." Using a map he showed the nine proposed valley authorities of the United States, which, if they are passed, will be controlled by 11 men, appointed by the President of the United States.

Sanborn went on to explain the disadvantages of government control and advantages of privately owned concerns. He compared CVA service and rates with those of the Idaho Power company.

A question period followed. When asked if he thought the Democratic victory in New York would help to push through the Truman plan,

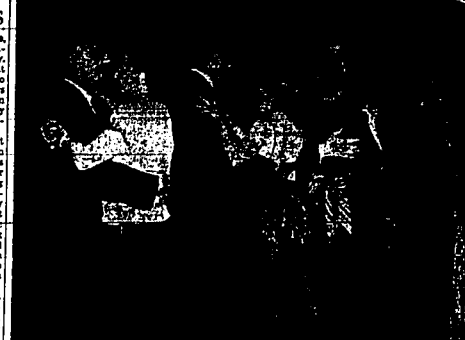

### September's Auto Deaths Are Set at 29

Twenty-nine deaths occurred in Idaho during September because of motor vehicle accidents, according to an accidental death summary released by the department of public health, division of vital statistics. A total of 58 accidental deaths was reported.

Twelve deaths occurred as a result of occupational accidents; nine as a result of accidents in the home; and eight as a result of accidents with public non-motor vehicles.

The report listed five pedestrians killed; three from collisions with railroad trains; one from a collision with a fire object; and seven as a result of non-collision accidents. Ten persons died from other unspecified accidents.

In the occupational field, five deaths resulted in the agricultural occupation; five in logging; one in public utilities and one in an unspecified occupation.

Accidents in the home included five deaths resulting from drowning; one from firearms; one from a fall; one from other falls to a different level; and one unspecified home accident.

From the public non-motor vehicle accidents, one person was killed on a railroad accident; one on a motor vehicle; two were killed while being transported on the water; two who were struck; one from a fall on the same level and two other unspecified public accidents.

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

This week, a new contributor joins Times-News correspondents and staff writers in bringing you Life in Magic Valley. From L. Agate Butte come these poignant memories of yesterday on the Salmon track.

We cannot claim we are pioneers of Twin Falls, but we can remember "way back when" we used to go to Twin on Saturday in the number wagon for the week's supply of groceries.

We would tie the horse to the racks back of Clawson's store when we bought our groceries. Mr. Clawson always put in a small sack of green candy—his treat to us children. We always left home in the morning but hardly ever could get home—again—until almost dark.

Cars, or automobiles as they were called then, were not numerous in our neighborhood and we could hear them chugging on the road a long time before they came into sight.

Those were the days before hard-snow roads, and the dust used to get really deep. The boy friend said that if one stamped his foot the dust would splash, it did.

Sometimes before the alfalfa was cut, we would look out over the green expanse and instead it was a vast body of water, the wind ruffling the surface of the field and forming a virtual standing on a distant shore.

On a clear day we could see the jagged rim of the Sawtooth in the distance to the north or the snow-capped peaks of mountains in Nevada. To the east, Mountain Lake and Snake river could be seen meandering in the morning sun.

Our vintage post had its drawbacks also, for on some hot summer days our chimney seemed to be a deathknell for flying swarms of ants which lit on the peak and trickled down the sides of the stovepipe into the kitchen.

In self defense then, the only thing to do was to build a hot fire in the stove to speed them on their way somewhere else—anywhere but there!

Sunday school at Mountain View schoolhouse was a weekly privilege with Mrs. John Tinsley, now Mrs. "Dolly" Hildbrand, as the teacher. Usually there was a social with homemade ice cream and cake. Hot suppers were fun too, although the boys couldn't always be sure whose supper they were hiding on.

One time the teacher's friend thought our hot supper was the one the teacher had brought and hid it up to more than \$25—good by sun at that time. Imagine his chagrin when he discovered he had brought the supper for the wrong girl!

Once, on a frosty late fall night when the rest of the family had gone to bed, we were toasting our feet on the oven door of the kitchen range and perusing a magazine. There was a sudden commotion outside the kitchen wall.

In the lamplight, we caught a glimpse of a coyote-leaping after our cat, "Judy," which fled for refuge to the flat roof of the kitchen. As time went on the door for a better look, it was gone. "Judy" had escaped by a hair's breadth.

When we heard the yapping of a pack of coyotes, or the eerie wail of a lone one on the butte back of our house, sometimes we found their tracks back of ours on the rungs from which where they apparently had followed at some distance trailing us, for we never could turn around quickly enough to catch them behind us.

Things you can't forget—the fragrance of sage in the breeze after a spring shower—the gurgle of water running in the ditch at twilight—the scent of sweet clover along the canal bank at noon—the moonlight on the Snake river near the Perrine bridge—the distant view of rugged mountains under the purple beam of autumn—the liquid brill of a meadow lark sitting on a fence post on a sunny morning of early summer.
