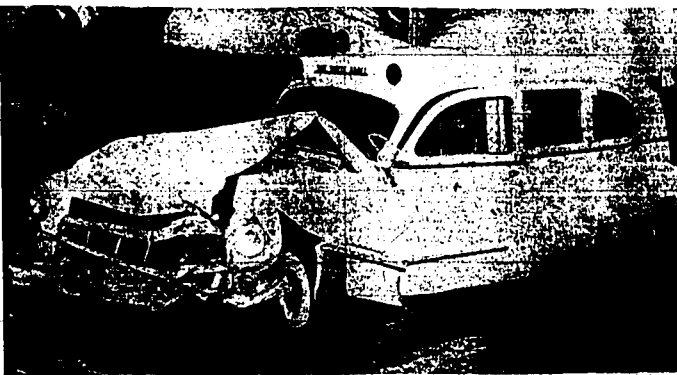

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Pickup-Ambulance Crash Claims Life Of Second Person

A shattering, almost head-on crash between a pickup truck and a new ambulance claimed its second victim, Tom Gordon, about 65, Jerome, only a few hours after his father-in-law, William Edward Sinclair, 85, also Jerome, was killed instantly in the collision.

Riding in the 1949 pickup truck with them was Mrs. Tom Gordon who was reported in critical condition Thursday morning at the Twin Falls county hospital. The three were thrown from the vehicles.

Officers said the collision occurred about 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday on U. S. highway 30 approximately one-half mile east of the Twin Falls community.

Neither driver nor passenger, James Lindsay, Iowa, Ore., was injured in the crash but George's son, Christopher, 12, was hospitalized for treatment of shock.

HERE'S A SUGGESTION

We believe the people of Magic Valley will agree that the time has arrived for drastic action to curb the number of tragedies occurring on our highways.

During the last several weeks we have had a series of appalling catastrophes which is nothing short of appalling. Surely we must realize that this needless slaughter cannot go on.

In this connection, a reader of the Times-News has offered a suggestion which we think is one that could enlist the aid of the general public in being on the lookout for drivers who deliberately run stop signs and pass cars on the crest of hills.

At first blush, this may sound like a steeplechase campaign. But when you stop to think it over, is there anything wrong in reporting those who are largely responsible for all this killing and maiming on our highways?

Isn't it after all, our responsibility as good citizens to help bring traffic law violators under control?

We have discussed this idea with the sheriff of each of the counties and the chief police officer of Twin Falls. They not only think it is sound and good, but endorse the plan wholeheartedly and ask for the public's cooperation.

If the people of this vicinity will attempt to make a good citizenism in this matter, nothing but good can come from this plan of attack. If they will report only those who commit serious traffic law violations, such as running stop signs and crossing the white line at stop signs, the campaign will serve its purpose.

Care should be taken in getting the violator's correct auto license number. Then the number should be reported either to the sheriff or chief of police. If the informant prefers, his name will be kept in confidence. If, for the good of the cause, he would prefer to be identified, however, his complaint would be even more effective. Additionally, there would be an advantage in reporting the name of the violator.

POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON - The act which has put to rest Mrs. Bester McCullough of Greenwich, Conn., in the Draper-Adler libel suit, is an unresolvable and political decision of the United States circuit court of appeals for the second circuit written by Judge Learned Brandeis.

Judge Hand wrote that there was no important difference between saying that a man was a Communist and saying that the same man merely sympathized with the objects and methods of the Communist party.

That is an absurd holding and its effects have been pernicious because it went on to say that it was an offense to say either. It is a plain fact and Hand should have laid down the law that it is no offense against our laws to be a Communist.

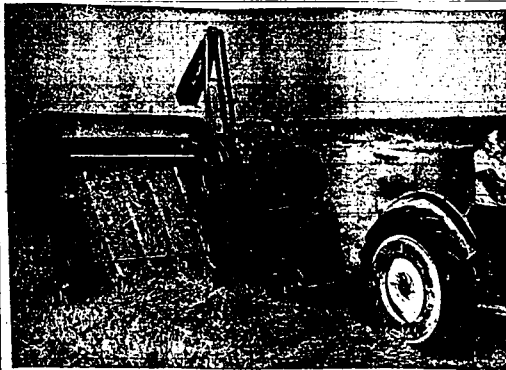
League Groups Stage Varied Meets

Woman's Unrelenting, 36-Year-Campaign for "Unification" Is Credited for Nationwide Holiday on Thanksgiving Day



Thank the long-bering soul of a woman for Thanksgiving, says a nationalistic group. She was Sarah Josepha Hale, born in Newbury, N. H., in 1781. One of America's first "lady editors," she put on an unrelenting campaign for a national day of thanksgiving for 36 years. Here's the story of Thanksgiving and Sarah Hale's remarkable life.



The origin of Thanksgiving as a day for rejoicing and prayer is generally attributed to William Bradford, first governor of Massachusetts, who proclaimed Dec. 12, 1619, as a day for which the Pilgrims at Plymouth should thank God for a bountiful harvest and for their victory over great hardships in establishing new homes in the wilderness. The Pilgrims themselves actually had a cross and a cross-shaped, friendly chief of the Wampanoag Indians, and his wife joined in the feast of gratitude. They contributed venison, cranberries and oysters, which they considered a great delicacy. It is said that this is the origin of the tradition that there be invited guests at every Thanksgiving table.



The first "last Thursday in November" Thanksgiving for all the states was proclaimed by George Washington. At the request of congress he named Thursday, Nov. 26, 1789, a day to "acknowledge with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording an opportunity to establish a constitution."



Never again, until 1863, did the country as a whole celebrate Thanksgiving. In 1863, Sarah Hale was "editor" of the Ladies Magazine in Boston. She wrote an editorial urging a unified Thanksgiving day—"the same as the Fourth of July." That was the start of her incredible campaign. She continued to promote the idea.



But from 1848 on, Mrs. Hale really put on the heat. She had then been editor of Godey's Lady's Book for nine years. Year after year she wrote to governors of states and territories, urging state Thanksgiving days. To put pressure on them, she wrote thousands of letters to senators, congressmen and other influential people.



By 1863 she had won 30 states and all territories. But that day, unfortunately failed. Sarah Hale pleaded for unification in her long, letters bombarded Presidents Fillmore, Pierce and Buchanan. They "No." Then—Lincoln and the Civil war. In 1863, she begged "Thanksgiving day of peace." The plan failed. It failed in 1863, but Sarah Hale won. Lincoln proclaimed Thursday, Nov. 26, 1863, then in 1893, most Presidents named the "last Thursday" in the month as the "next to last Thursday." Continued and revised resulted. So in 1941 congress established the fourth Thursday in November as Thanksgiving day, a legal holiday that needs no prodding.

But there is another responsibility and that is to make sure that the opportunity exists here to tell America's own story. Largely because of the severe restrictions imposed by the Yugoslav government on the United States information service this is not possible today.

Alex N. Dragich, an American of Yugoslav origin, is said to be doing an excellent job as head of the information service and cultural attaché in the embassy. He is handicapped by a small staff—only two American assistants and 10 Yugoslavs. The time has come, it seems to me, to say definitely and firmly that the narrow restrictions must be lifted. And then Washington must make sure that the service is equipped.

The importance of Tito's break with the Soviet union may be exaggerated. The question is how great a restraining influence it exerts on communist intention and performance. But as great as the signal of the Soviet union can be defied by a democracy it is an example of its significance.

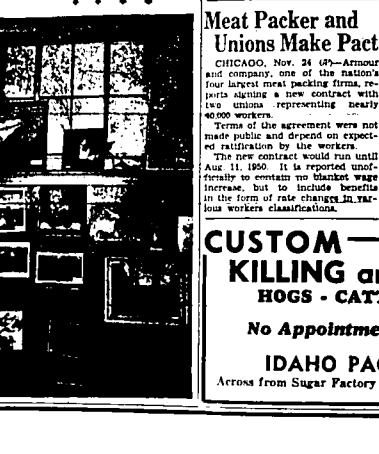

U. of I. Trees Are Available For Farmers

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Nov. 18.—Trees for Idaho's windbreak woodlands, erosion control, and game food and cover, can be ordered any time this season from now until March 1, 1943, according to an announcement by Vernon Havenscroft, extension forester for the University of Idaho.

County agricultural agents have the trees on hand ready for distribution to farmers and will be glad to help in figuring the needs for individual farms. (Farmers need some 400,000 trees will be ready for delivery from now through April 1.)

Prices for the trees are slightly higher this year than over the past seasons but are still within the reach of the purse for they run only two cents to three cents each depending on the number ordered.

Regulations Changed

There is a slight change in this year's regulations as to what is entitled to the trees. Havenscroft reports all landowners who are engaged in conservation of utility value in rural areas, but the best legislation has been changed to allow any group of individuals to buy trees for the purpose of planting.

In addition to the farm plantings which we have previously made such groups as school, town, city, business, trees and industries or individuals can buy for forest type plantings.

New Types Available

The university nursery will have four new classes for release this year, the former released, South-western shrub, and the new growing shrub will be available for woodlands that need speedy growth.

Southwestern can be substituted for the old favorite Roberts Pine, a slow growing tree. The new variety is suitable in all parts of Idaho except the cold mountain valleys and may prove to do well there in later years.

Advantages and Disadvantages Are Told for "Fencing" Shrub

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Nov. 18.—Although it is going to find a place in Idaho agriculture for game food and cover and may be used to a considerable extent for windbreak and erosion control, the "fencing" shrub will take the place of few posts and barbed-wire fences, according to Vernon Havenscroft, extension forester for the University of Idaho.

Mullifera is the much touted shrub that has been used widely throughout some midwestern and southern states for fencing farm land. Its use covers the past 30 years in some areas.

"We find some features of the rose that do not lend themselves to the usual conditions," the forester declares. "First there is the element of weather and general climatic conditions. We know the rose is doing well in most of our warmer areas where we expect it to continue to do well."

"We know, too, that it has winter-killed badly in such climates as Minnesota, and we have some areas that approach their winters. We will not recommend it for the upper Snake river valley until we have given it additional testing. There are sections of northern Idaho in which its ability to take the winter weather is still in doubt."

The forester points out that mulifera does not spread from the roots but may spread by "topping," a system which the tips of some plants bend over and take root. This means that it will have to be pruned, moved, or graded to keep it within bounds.

"The new take-up enough room without spreading," Havenscroft reports. "In some states, it reportedly occupies eight feet of space for the fence row and grows to about that height. But in Idaho it seems to do better than that."

"One 10-year-old planting near Moscow is now better than 12-foot fence row. That is more space than most farmers are willing to give it. This is especially true in the 'travest' sections."

In the right place and for the right purpose, however, mulifera is an excellent shrub and does a good job, the forester says. For example, it is probably that it will find its greatest use in fence close to the farmstead where it will both add to the appearance of the home and farm and serve as a fence for livestock.

It could be particularly appealing used in a dairy farm setting of similar landscape as it lends beauty wherever it grows.

Undoubtedly the rose will find a useful place on such backhills fields and pastures where cattle or other farm animals are to be discarded from plunging into unfenced forest or wilderness areas.

By nibbling the tender ends of the young branches, sheep would keep the rose from tipping and becoming too broad in its cover, Havenscroft says. As a fence, the rose would become effective in three years under ordinary conditions.

"It is as a source of food and cover for our game birds and animals that mulifera is going to pay its way in Idaho," the forester predicts. "The old story of Deer Habitat and his sheltering rabbit patch will certainly come true for pheasants, partridge, grouse, quail and cottontail rabbits who have access to a patch of mulifera."

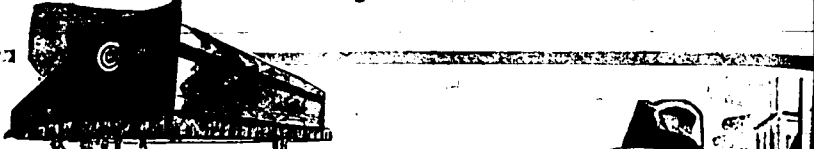

Visiting Dutch Teach Yankee Thing or Two

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—America has made its first five-year Marshall plan visit. Last spring the economic cooperation administration brought young Dutch farmers to the U. S. to learn American farming methods. Now that they are on their way home, it is reported that they contributed more to U. S. farming than they are taking away with them.

They all spent the summer and fall on various farms all over the country, working and studying. Here are some of the things they left behind:

In the state of Washington a group of fruit farmers was shown how to trim and coat newly-planted trees so that when they begin bearing fruit limbs are stronger and they have a more desirable shape.

Major Seed Yield

In Idaho one of the young Dutch farmers showed a farmer how to get a bigger yield by planting potatoes closer together.

In Illinois a group of farmers was given a demonstration on how to start a new wheat crop with a tractor, saving the purchase of special machinery for that purpose.

In Wisconsin the farmers in one neighborhood learned how to store manure to get several times more efficiency out of it when it is used as fertilizer.

Whenever it was discovered that one of the Dutch farmers was in demand as a speaker before farm groups, mostly the young visiting officials were asked to talk about farming methods in Holland. They visited "DOLLA".

U. S. Calls World Parley on Sugar

Doctors Find New Cure for Colds in Drug

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP)—People who take sugar pills, thinking they are getting cold medicine, reported many fewer colds, a physician said today.

At least 10 percent of those taking the sugar pills said they had fewer colds, Dr. Joseph H. Kohn, of the University of Pennsylvania, reported in the journal of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Kohn, U. S. naval hospital physician, and his colleagues at Philadelphia, Pa., reported that the anti-allergy drug cured 10 percent of the first researchers to test it.

The belief is that colds start as allergic reactions. The sugar pills were made with one drug, phenaminone (trade name, phenaminone).

Dr. Kohn said 84 percent of those who took the pills were cured. He said that if they started the pills six hours after the cold appeared, the drug still worked.

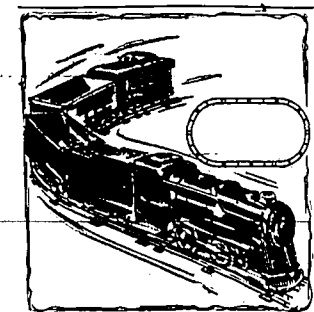

Originator in Missouri! The Montadale sheep was originated in Missouri by C. G. Velje, Fortfall, and K. H. Mattingly, St. Louis, now secretary-treasurer of the Montadale Sheep Breeders' association which was organized in 1911.

"All-Purpose" Sheep
Their goal was the ideal all-purpose sheep, one which would economically produce both a high quality of wool and a large meat carcass. The result is a sheep which looks like the cheviot except it is heavier. It has a white, open face with no wool hanging over the eyes. Mattingly reports a flock of Montadales averages 12 to 13 pounds of the light-braking long staple wool. The breeding is difficult. They also produce more meat than other breeds.

Banker Asks 'Stable' U. S. Budget Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—Minneapolis Banker J. Cameron Thompson has urged congress to establish a stable system of government expenditures based on an equally-stable system of government revenues.

In a statement prepared for a joint congressional economic subcommittee Thompson said that during a period of high employment, such a tax system should provide the government with enough funds to pay off part of its debt and to reduce the "cash consolidation."

Would Show Needs
 "A cash consolidated" budget, drafted from the regular administrative budget submitted to congress each year, showed the amount of money the government must actually pay out to the public under its various social security, veterans and other governmental programs.

Thompson, president of the Northwestern Bankers Association, represents the committee for economic development. Other witnesses included Braxley Ruml, New York economist, and Emil Rieve, president of the Textile Workers Union (CIO).

Study Fiscal Policies
 "The subcommittee is studying all phases of the government's credit monetary and fiscal policies."

Tuesday, the subcommittee heard Edward E. Brown, president of the First National bank of Chicago, describe as "a highly dangerous proposal" that the federal reserve give absolute authority over the government's credit policies.

Brown said "the body of men, not even the federal reserve board, should take that much power."
