Hearing Date Scheduled for State Slaying

LEWISTON, Nov. 26 (P)—George Jensen, 31, said today in district court he intended to plead guilty to first degree murder charges, but the court said it wouldn't accept a plea immediately and postponed his arraignment until Wednesday.
 "I can't believe you are in your right mind or that you fully realize the nature of this crime," Judge Leo McGary told the poker-faced man who is charged in the first degree murder of Scarsie Lemmons, a Lemmons and John Hendry, 29, were shot down Thursday night at 11:30 by a masked gunman who escaped through the door, Main street, near Deloit Lane.
 Prosecutor Charles W. Morgan entered the court today ready for Jensen's arraignment. If a plea is made, the state must present evidence.
 "MORGAN" had two witnesses, Mrs. Gladys Kaylor and Mrs. Cope Kellogg. Both were in the tavern at the time of the shooting. Mrs. Kaylor was a barmaid and Mrs. Kellogg was a customer. Morgan also brought a .38 caliber revolver, a glass jacket, a knife and photographs into court.
 Jensen was arrested Friday morning in his room at a Lewiston hotel as six officers crashed through the door. Officers said the murder of Scarsie Lemmons was made Friday afternoon and Jensen waived a preliminary hearing.

Non-Farm Work Declines; Blame Put on Walkouts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—The labor department reported today that non-agricultural employment declined 70,000 persons last month to a total of 42,700,000.

Most of this drop, the department said, was due directly to the coal and steel strikes. Secondary effects of the disputes were "relatively minor."

Heavy declines were recorded between mid-September and mid-October in mining, durable manufacturing, transportation and public utilities.

A decline of 36,000 was registered in the coal and iron mining industries alone.

Some of the decreases were partially offset by increased employment in the furniture, radio, jewelry and toy manufacturing.

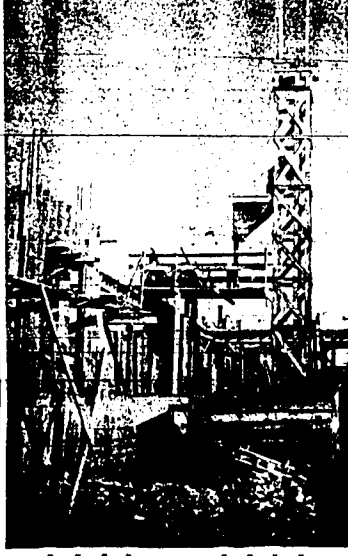

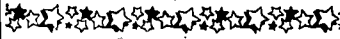

SPORTSMEN PROPOSE TROUT LIMIT CUTS, SPECIAL HUNT FEE

Fourth District Recommends Game Law Changes at Meet

SUN VALLEY, Nov. 26.—Recommendations that the trout bag limit be cut, hours be placed on fishing, reinstatement of fees for special-hunt permits and adoption of present inland bird bag limits and seasons highlighted business at the annual meeting of the Fourth District Association of Sportsmen here today. More than 100 sportsmen representing 22 organized clubs in 11 southern Idaho counties attended the session today to pass resolutions for presentation to the state fish and game commission and elect new district officers.

Dr. George Scholer, Twin Falls, was elected district president, replacing R. A. Adamson, Carey, who has held the post for the past two years. Fred Jerome, a delegate to the proposed revision, was elected vice president; Floyd S. Pillsbury, secretary-treasurer; and O. D. Marquette, H. K. Bartsche, Challa, and Milton Giffey, Board of Directors.

The assembly of 133 delegates divided into four committee meetings for the proposed revisions. Those proposals were reviewed by the assembly and those passed were to be sent to the state fish and game commission.

Dr. Presler, Twin Falls, chairman of the fish committee, presented the following resolutions:

That the trout bag limit be cut to seven pounds and one fish or 13 fish.

That a time limit be placed on fishing and that there will be no fishing between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m. and that no fish be taken on bait or in possession of fishermen.

That the season on Big Lost River from Mackay can south be changed May 21 to Sept. 2.

That there be no change in present trout regulations.

That Snake river from Jackson bridge to Mindoba can be governed by the regular Idaho trout regulations instead of being open the year around to fishing.

That the Snake river be opened to fishing for the general season in 1950.

That the middle fork of Salmon river be closed to fishing from December 1 to August 1.

That the middle fork of Salmon river be closed to fishing from December 1 to August 1.

Recommendations presented to committee by Mr. Harris, Jerome, chairman of the updated bird committee included:

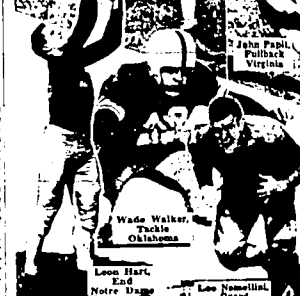

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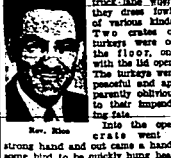

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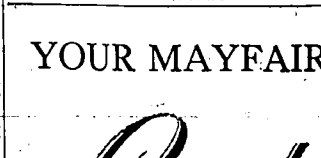

People Spend More on Cars Than Clothes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—The American people are spending almost two-thirds as much on autos and auto parts as they spend on shoes and clothing.

Federal reserve board and commerce department figures showed today that autos and auto parts take \$4.20 of each \$100 spent on consumer purchases. Shoes and clothing cost \$2.60.

Carl Outley High

Compilations by three agencies indicated that never before has the outlay on autos and accessories gone so high.

For one thing, the reserve board explained, consumer incomes are holding high—flowing at a \$700,000,000 annual rate in the third quarter of 1943. This is a solid 190 per cent above prewar period and 18 per cent higher than the post-war period, although off three per cent from the 1942 peak.

Credit Eased

For another, time-payment terms for autos have eased since credit controls went off early in 1940, car production has gone up and prices of new cars have held rather steady while used car prices were declining.

As for clothing, the data also showed that it costs less—seven per cent under last October's peak—because it doesn't take as much money to buy it.

Food Tree Spending

Food and drink, including alcoholic beverages, accounted for the biggest part of consumer spending, 22 1/2 per cent. There was no data to show alcoholic drinks separately.

Furniture and household equipment took 2 1/2 per cent, the same as autos and auto parts.

In prewar 1939, autos and auto parts accounted for only 12 1/2 of each \$100 of consumer spending while clothing and shoes took \$14.60, food and drink just \$28.40 and furniture and household equipment \$3.

Barling Drove

Back then, people as a whole spent a bigger proportion of their incomes, saving only \$2.00 out of each \$100 left after taxes against \$8.00 savings during the third quarter of this year.

Wages and salaries in general went up 100 per cent from 1939 and up 25 per cent from 1942, the first post-war year, but down two per cent from the post-annual rate attained in fourth quarter 1942.

To achieve this end, he proposes to hold extensive hearings early in the next session of congress to get at the root of the trouble. Then, from this information, he will present to congress a water resource policy and a reorganization plan to disintegrate the same.

If successful, O'Mahoney's plan might foreclose the now existing justification for a CVA.

Renewed congressional activity by the Murray-Engle metal-subsidy bill is expected by western lawmakers when congress reconvenes.

The bill, strayed in both houses by fear of a presidential veto if it passed, would restore the wartime premium price policy for mined metals, and establish a "Brannan plan" for the mining industry.

Under terms of the bill, introduced by Sen. James Murray, D., Idaho, and Rep. Carl Engle, D., Calif., the government would establish premium payments to be paid to mine operators unable to produce certain strategic metals at "a reasonable profit."

Like the Brannan plan for agriculture, the program calls for a complete absence of price supports.

Instead, it establishes a parity for strategic metals, based on the 1939-1940 prices, plus such premiums as were paid to wartime. The mined metals would be sold at a supply-and-demand price, and the government would make up the difference between an expected price and the parity figure and stockpile the metals acquired.

Unlike the Brannan plan, the Murray-Engle bill calls for a ceiling of \$100,000,000 to be paid out in one year.

With 70 to 80 per cent of western mines closed because of cut production, the bill would insure throughout the entire mining area as expected to mount for passage of the bill.

Designed to supplement the stockpiling act of 1942, the bill would provide premium payments for metals listed as strategic by the munitions board.

The status of the bill at present is hardly one to give hope to metal-subsidy supporters. In the senate, the Murray bill was reported favorably from committee in the late summer and placed on the calendar. But no date has been set for consideration by the whole senate, because of administration objections.

In the house, the Engle bill identical with its senate counterpart was also reported favorably by the committee, even urged as an "emergency" legislation. But it languishes in the still-pending rule committee, which has the power to keep it from the floor without concerted action to blast it out.

Both houses are faced with an attitude that a veto would be applied to the bill. If passed, the 80th congress, a measure was passed continuing the high wartime premium payments for another two years. This bill was vetoed, which forms the basis for the present legislation.

But Murray-Engle adherents point out that some of the objectionable features of the earlier measure have been removed, and that passage is expected to see if a veto would be forthcoming.

In addition, they say the provision of the Brannan plan for agriculture as a Democratic campaign issue might change the picture. The Murray-Engle plan, they urge, is no more than the Brannan method applied to mining, and industry must have the same need of reactivation.

Another bill, sponsored by Senator O'Mahoney, has passed the senate with administration approval but is

also lining up in the house rules committee.

This bill, also designed to relax the mine law, is objected to by many on the grounds that it offers a "blank check" to the secretary of the interior.

The O'Mahoney bill specifies no metals to be paid for, no rate of payment, and provides no means of qualifying for subsidy payments. It leaves all of these decisions to the virtually unhampered opinion of the secretary.

While the O'Mahoney measure was strongly urged by former Interior Secretary Krug, it is not the whole metal-subsidy program held by his sponsor, Oscar Chapman, in hope of winning Chapman over, Senator Murray and others plan conference with him and other administration leaders shortly after congress reconvenes in January.

In addition, Murray-Engle supporters are counting on a heavy drumfire of letters from home to sway the opinion of congress and senators from mining states to support the measure and grant relief to the nation's struggling industry and boost our diminishing supplies of strategic metals.

Other requirements remain the same, according to Sergeant Kees. Applicants must be between 20 and 24 years of age and must be approved by an examining board.

Cadets receive a year of training, combining flying, academic work and leadership training. During training, the government pays the premium for \$10,000 insurance policy. Classes begin every six weeks.

Graduates of the classes receive commissions as second lieutenants in the air force reserves and the wings of pilot or navigator. Outstanding men are commissioned in the regular air force upon graduation, and other graduates may work for a regular commission during the three-year period of active duty after graduation. Sergeant Kees reported.

Labor Pension Not for Dr. Townsend; Old Crusader Thinks His Way Better

CLEVELAND (INEA)—The picture in the newspaper showed just what Dr. Townsend (senior) workers' pension was worth. His pension had won them \$100-a-month pension.

A lean, white-haired old doctor looked at the newspaper and shook his head sadly. "These labor people don't realize what they're after," he said firmly. "What they want is security and I maintain they would get it that way."

This ancient crusader—Dr. Francis F. Townsend—who knows a better way. He has thought so since 1932 when "old-age" pensions were first introduced. Townsend, a three-old woman, scrounge food from a garbage can. He wrote a letter to a Long Beach, Calif., newspaper. The letter suggested that the government retire everybody except criminals at age 60 on a \$100-a-month pension.

To the everlasting surprise of his author, the letter launched the Townsend plan for old-age pensions. It boomed, but he never was able to put it over. Now he has a new plan, submitted to the 81st congress, which he confidently expects will be debated on the house floor during the upcoming session.

The other day Dr. Townsend was visiting the only son, Robert, in Cleveland and attending a round of congratulations of the Townsend plan's 16th birthday. He is the national chairman of what is now the Townsend plan for national insurance.

A midwestern country doctor who turned political economist, the 81-year-old Townsend still bangs out pieces for the plan's weekly newspaper with the energy of a cub reporter, although he is 82.

Wants His Way

Three months after his initial letter to the editor, Townsend, "the old man of plenty," had 10,000 signatures on a petition which would make his plan the law of the land.

Within three years, Townsend clubs were located all over the country and the movement launched off a congressional investigation. Dr. Townsend stalked out of the hearings and was on the verge of jail for contempt when President Roosevelt pardoned him.

In 1938, a Townsend plan bill was defeated 302 to 97 in the house of representatives. Political observers, however, credited the "Townsend appeal" with setting the stage for liberalizing the social security act, although Dr. Townsend always has criticized social security.

During the war the movement waned, but now there is a drive underway to "revive the membership" by January, 1950. Estimates of present membership run as high as 6,000,000. But Treasurer Bob Townsend claims "infinitely more followers."

The great hope of the Townsend-plan today is a new bill (HR 2185) buried in the house ways and means committee. Unlike the old Townsend plan, it does not call for payment of a "fixed" pension. Instead, it would divide among the aged and interest all proceeds from a three-per cent gross income tax.

The Townsend followers will make a big push to get HR 2185 out of committee during the next congress. Already they claim 178 of the 318

signature needed.

The kicker in the new plan, as in other ones, is the requirement that a pensioner must have \$100 in money he gets within 90 days.

"We want to make good guarantees out of the \$100,000,000 or 15,000,000 old folks," Dr. Townsend said. "If they had money to spend there would be no depression."

The doctor thought he had some points for labor in his pensioning plan. "If they had money to spend there would be no depression."

The fault of virtue-bought pensioner, Dr. Townsend explained, is that even though workers get the high wages and pensions they want, they still can't control the price of things.

The only possible link Dr. Townsend saw in his old-age guarantee plan—opponents say they see plenty of them—is the chance of overproduction. But he's sure we can always find a way to dispose of surplus production.

And as for hearing that monthly allotment, he said, "why should people board if they know they've got a guaranteed income for life?"

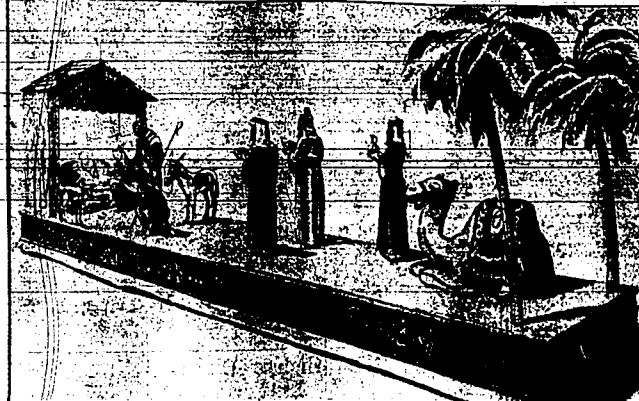

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The age-old struggle for progress, be what it may, is a step of opposition every inch of the way. A foretold example of this was brought out in meeting regarding the recent election in Minidoka county in which a \$75,000 school bond issue was defeated. What shall I say if someone asks why should he be asked for education when he has no children of his own?

This was the status of the nation dependent on the educational status of its citizens. It is estimated that over all children a good education—that if he has no children or grandchild in the line—along the line some one connected either directly or indirectly, has been educated through taxation, and that he himself received his education through the payment of taxes. The evolution of education in ACEQUIA, typical of most pioneer communities, shows education of children is one of the things nearest the hearts of all people.

For the first year a one-room school house of the present of the Palisade place served all children in the district. This was a school there as early as the fall of 1808 probably was because of the needs of two public-spirited women, Mrs. A. L. Meigs and Mrs. Fred Larson, an intensely interested in the cause.

Between them they cooked up the idea and sounded out the sentiment of the community. Reluctant to have their children walk any further than the school they raised two pioneers fought for the "little red school house."

Transportation was a real problem in those days. How many children today would think of walking three or four miles through deep snow? Many of the youngsters come to school each day after their own bit of hard work and sweat.

Homeowners were settling west of town and these two women decided a solution to the problem might be to divide the district. Mrs. Meigs walked from farm to farm through the deep, hot sand, getting sagbrush and get crops planted as quickly as possible.

Chief argument against dividing the district was that old problem, taxes. The farmers weren't having any time getting started in the new land.

Many times discouraged, Mrs. Meigs would stop at the Larson home and say, "There's no use, it can't be done," and just as many times Mrs. Larson would say, "But we can't quit," and Mrs. Meigs would smile and say, "I'll get you settled."

Success came. The first school house was held in the old far-past Odd Fellows building on the townsite. Crude benches and double desks were made by Art Jensen, another early settler, and 43 children of all ages were taught by the Larson's daughter, who was not much older than her eldest pupil.

The new trustees, Mrs. Montgomery, Walter Moore, now a Los Angeles resident, and Fred Larson, now planning a school building—one which would be economical but still meet the needs of a wide school population.
