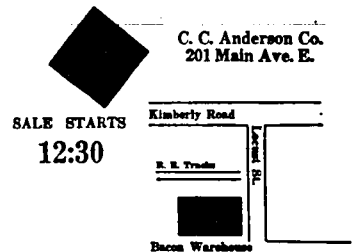

Housing Act Explained to FHA Groups

SHOENOV, Nov. 20—An explanation of the provisions of the housing act of 1934 pertaining to rural districts was given at a meeting Tuesday afternoon at the Twin Falls county commission room in the American legion hall here.

Morning sessions were open to the public and dealt with general phases of the law while the afternoon meeting was for committee members and dealt with special situations under the law passed by congress.

Franklin Lous Art, representative of the FHA, explained the law and its intent to improve rural areas by insuring it include improvements on farm dwellings. The law is designed to bring homes with good living environments for all farm families and to offer loans to farmers who could be unable otherwise to obtain money for home improvements, according to him.

Summ said applications for loans may be made throughout the year but the loan will be completed in a month's time. Though recently the Twin Falls office has been explained to all FHA supervisors and agents and they have been instructed to utilize procedures for granting the loans.

During the afternoon sessions responsibilities of committees were discussed and the need for an examination of owners and determination of their credit and the value of land owned by the applicant and reasons for the application and means of repayment of the loan.

Antidote for Winter Crashes Sought in Research Program

CHICAGO, Nov. 20—(Special)—An antidote for adding accidents and traffic jams on roads and to the highways of winter motorists, will be sought this winter when the National Safety Council conducts its sixth winter hazards research program.

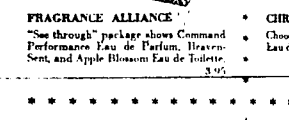

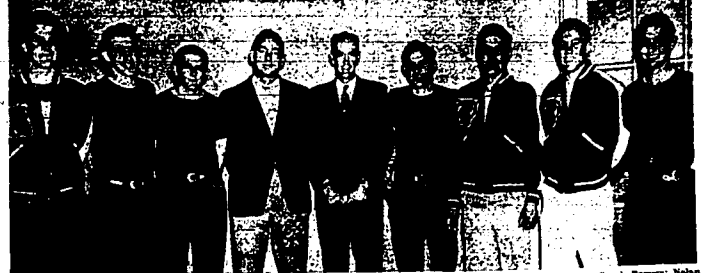

PUC Rules It Has No Control Over Oil Tanker Firms

BOISE Nov. 30 (AP)—The Idaho Public Utilities commission, in a two to one decision, today ruled that the commission has no authority over the application of oil tanker companies to operate "anywhere for hire" in the state.

Commissioner H. M. Beamer and B. Auger signed the majority decision.

"It is difficult to understand how a carrier anywhere for hire can operate on a fixed schedule of times and rates," the decision said. "We find the applications herein are on the basis of anywhere for hire and not on the basis of between fixed terminal or over a regular route."

Commissioner W. B. Joy, in his dissenting opinion, said the applications were merely for extension of operations under existing PUC permits.

He said the oil firms have regular and customary routes over which they operate primarily. Joy said the question involved is a determination of what is meant by regular routes for the oil carriers.

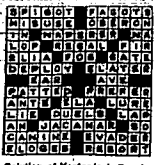

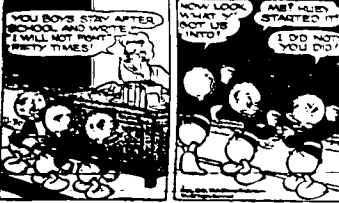

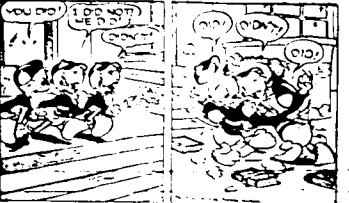

Leaders' Future Hurt by Suits

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—The future of the rail leaders is threatened by the suits filed by the government against them for their part in the war-time price-fixing program.

PARIS, France—Revealing France after an absence of two years, you do not have to seek out the changes. The evidence of recovery is everywhere. It is the past—the prosperous, elegant, highly individualistic life that has been restored.

American aid under the Marshall plan is largely responsible for this recovery. Without it France would have been a Communist-dominated country.

But there is a Marquis Childs catch in this surface recovery. If Marshall plan aid were to stop or even to be substantially diminished, it would be likely to atrophy.

This is the grim reality of the present moment. So long as the dollars flow from the United States, so long will the prosperity surface be maintained. And practically every member of congress in the endless procession passing through here will have made it plain that Marshall plan assistance would be drastically cut next year.

Some have said it threateningly, venting their familiar isolationist prejudices. Others have spoken more in sorrow than in anger of the economy drive that would cut the ECA appropriation back to a billion and a half or even perhaps a billion. The amount appropriated this year, after nine months of wrangling, was \$2,000,000,000.

Americans who administer the ECA program are afraid that such a sweeping cut would invalidate the gains they have made in the ground as gold by the casual peasant or the agent to Sweden and America by the nervous industrialist.
