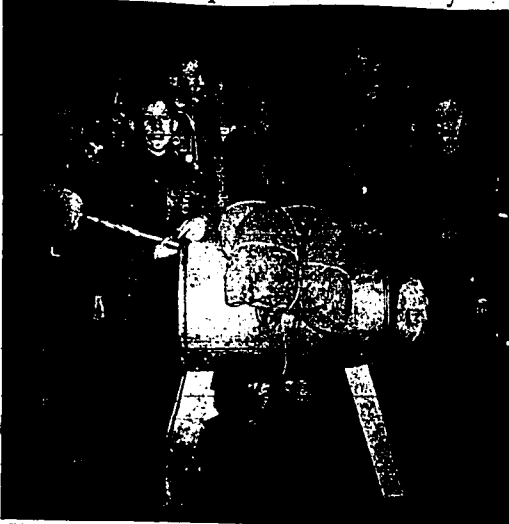

Deadlines for Vets' Benefits Are Reported

Important deadlines for veterans to apply for benefits administered by the veterans administration were met Friday in Twin Falls. The contact representative for Magic...

For education and training under the GI bill, veterans discharged before July 25, 1947, must start their GI education or training before July 25, 1947, and must begin their courses within four years after discharge. The GI bill training must be completed by July 25, 1950.

Disabled veterans of World War I may begin public law 16 education or training at any time after July 25, 1947, but must complete their course by July 25, 1950.

World War II veterans may apply for loans guaranteed or insured under the GI bill until July 25, 1947. An exception has been made for veterans who enlisted or reenlisted after the armistice of World War I. They have 10 years to apply.

Insurance Possible A veteran of World War I may apply for new insurance or restate a lapsed national service life insurance policy before July 25, 1947. If a disability has occurred since the date of discharge, the veteran may apply for a new policy.

Also Deadlines Near World War II veterans who lost, or lost the use of, one or both eyes or above the ankle in service may be entitled to special allowances or other advantages at government expense if they apply before June 30, 1936.

Survivors of deceased veterans of all wars and of certain deceased veterans of previous service must file claims for burial allowances within two years after permanent burial or cremation.

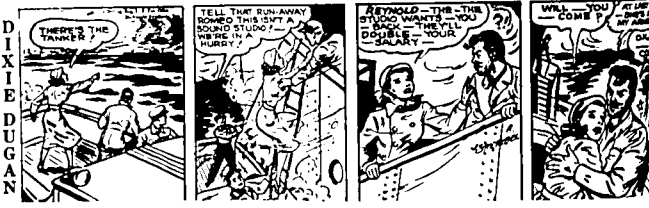

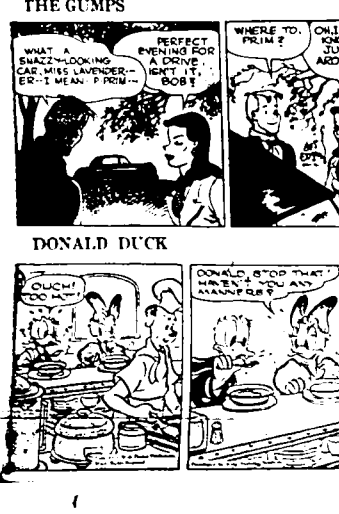

Veterinarian Speaks

Dr. L. V. Roebel, veterinarian, was guest speaker at the evening event, outlined the history of the livestock industry. Roebel stated that the industry is the backbone of our economy and meat eating countries have the highest production of livestock in the United States, Australia and Argentina as examples.

He explained that cereal raising countries such as China and India have the most livestock because their soils are depleted from constant row cropping, whereas meat producing countries rotate crops, maintaining the fertility of their soil.

Roebel said: "We are the highest meat consuming country which attributes largely to our success both in the past and today."

He further stated that meat production is the farmers' greatest source of income, bringing in 31 cent of every dollar.

Turned to industry

Roebel used that as an introduction of the importance of the economy of our nation and led up to the fact that the foot and mouth disease is potentially the greatest threat to the livestock industry.

He gave many reasons why the United States currently is spending \$300,000 a week to fight this disease in Mexico to prevent its spread into this country. He explained the difficulties encountered in having to work with the uneducated farmer and rancher of Mexico in fighting the disease.

Roebel's talk was interspersed with his usual wit and humor which was well received by young and old alike. The main purpose of the meeting was to inspire them to put forth their best efforts to produce better animals.

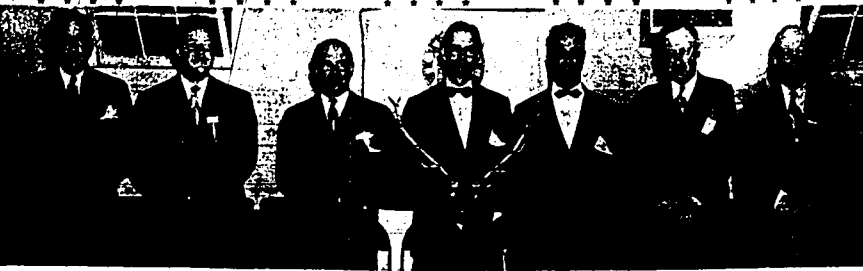
