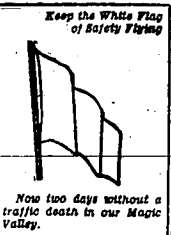

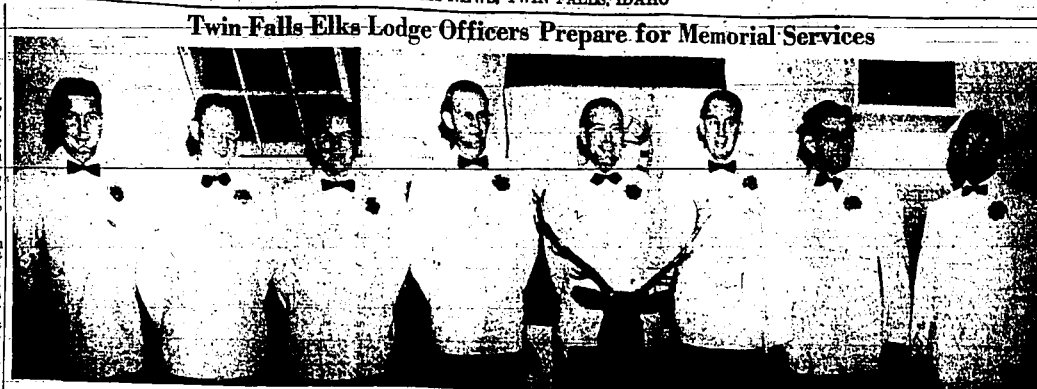

2 Disease-Resistant Varieties Of Beans Are Recommended

Two comparatively new bean varieties are recommended for Twin Falls county farmers as resistant to curly-top, common mosaic and new mosaic according to reports of the Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station.

The two new varieties were obtained by the University of Idaho experimental station from Great Northern and Red Mexican varieties as parents. They were first introduced in the summer of 1934 as a new type of mosaic appeared in the UT 13 variety.

The new varieties possess desirable virus and seed characteristics of the UT 13 and in seed size are comparable to UT 50, according to Delph. They both mature a few days earlier than the older varieties and are somewhat less winter hard.

There are minor differences in the virus characteristics of the two varieties, UT 13 has a somewhat greater leaf and vine under conditions of high fertility in a new mosaic virus.

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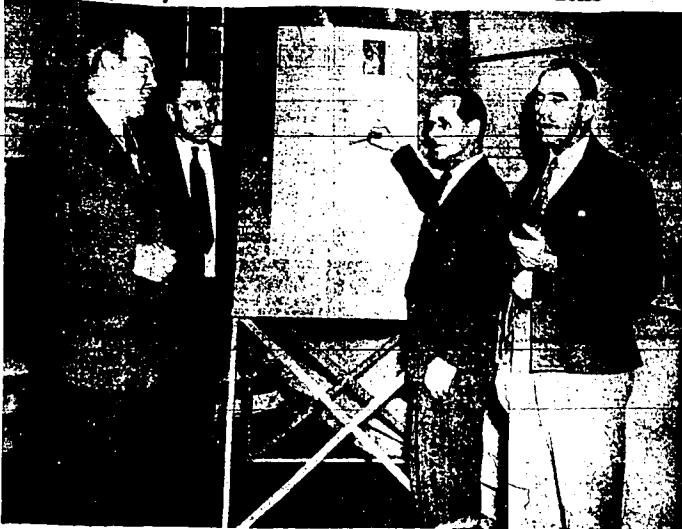

Buying Trend Use Cited by Farm Agency

RUPERT, Dec. 9.—Farmers as well as other producers are turning their production to consumer trends, says Carl K. Mera, chairman of the Idaho state PMA committee. "Farmers are limited to certain crops by climate, market and soil and water conditions, but within these limits production should be headed to the direction of consumer trends."

Significant changes in eating habits are the clue to changes in farm production, the chairman points out. The trend is toward more leafy vegetables, more citrus and tomatoes, more milk, more poultry, eggs, and away from potatoes, sweet potatoes, grain products and bread.

Serve as Guide This trend, says the chairman, should help serve as a guide to farmers in the use of their land—the land taken out of allotment crops. Some of the allotment crops are on the side of the product of declining use, while good conservation use of the land fits into the trend of more protein foods. Mera says that consumers should buy the allotment and market quotas are not aimed at less food but rather at a more abundant abundance. The wheat allotment does not mean less bread because the allotment is largely stored for as much bread as people have been using plus a safe reserve. This same is true of other crops.

Purpose Explained Crop adjustments are based on the effort to use our available soil to produce what is needed, the chairman explains. Rather than use up good soil fertility in producing more than is needed, some products while there is need for production of others, the allotment programs seek to balance production in line with consumer demands and in line with consumer trends.

A balanced abundance and reserve in the soil for future abundance are the aims of these programs," the chairman said.

Radio Equipment Ordered for Idaho's Snowplows to End Winter's Troubles

BOISE, Dec. 9.—Highway equipment operation will be in close touch with the Idaho highway district office in Shoshone this winter, following installation of radio stations on the south peak of Moho Basin south of here and two-way radios in the cab of all main snowplows, graders and cars.

Work was begun last week on a piece on the hills about three weeks ago and the work the base for the power was being installed. A power pole and transformer will be placed on the route summit next to the radio tower.

R. A. Schuppert, district maintenance engineer, is supervising the work which is being done through the local highway office in Shoshone with Henry Stierberg, district engineer, in charge.

The disastrous winter of last year, in which all highway machinery

as well as many privately owned machines were crowded to the utmost, brought about the need for better control of machinery movements.

The new radio will have a range of the entire highway district which reaches from Salmon on the north and to the Nevada line on the south. Machinery can be sent from one point to another without loss of time and complete knowledge of all parts of the district will be available to the engineer.

The radio will be used throughout all the year for convenience and saving of time, and will make unnecessary much of the travel to and from the shop of treated telephones.

Through agreement with the bureau of land management, the highway department will use the same telephone line and power line used for the grading service's look-out station, located on the north summit of the butte.

The grading service has a two-way radio aerial there now but the

From Boise, the Associated Press reported the Link Radio corporation, New York City, Friday received a \$2384 contract to furnish radio equipment for three such stations.

J. R. McKinney, commissioner of public works, said fixed transmitters will be set up at Boise, Pocatello and Shoshone. Others will be installed later at Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene.

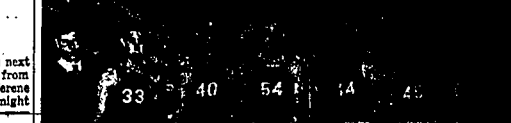

(Free Press Staff) C. A. Dye, Jr. received unanimous approval. He also explained the bill to stimulate exploration, now pending in congress. It has two purposes, he explained. First is to provide federal aid for exploration and development of new mineral sources. Second is to prevent halting of mine operations under circumstances making it impossible to secure when needed for national security.

"This Great" The bill (S. 2102) "provides a thin crust for a rich industry," Palmer declared, but "it should be supported although it fails to solve all our problems." Palmer also lambasted federal help to competing foreign mines through the immense U. S. aid program. He cited the cash loans to Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia to revive that nation's mining, aid to Morocco for the same purpose and subsidies to the U. S. merchant marine and harbor authorities to provide cheap transportation for foreign ores and concentrates to this country.

"A mining man asks ourselves: 'Can we operate our mines in an economy such as this without adjusting our fundamental concepts to present day standards?'" Palmer said.

Keynote of the meeting was sounded at an afternoon roundtable discussion by Koenig. He explained the purpose of the meeting and objectives of the new association as:

1. Education of the public on status of small mine operators and the indirect benefits most of the people receive from stimulation of the industry.

2. Education of congress, government bureaus and state legislatures on the economic importance of a healthy mineral industry.

3. Stimulation of metal products consumption.

4. Stimulation of primary financing for new mine exploration and development.

Other speakers included Idaho Secretary of State J. D. (Cly) Price, State Mine Inspector George McDowell and U. S. Sen. Henry Dworshak, M. Ida.

Mining in Idaho means money—some \$70,000,000 a year—jobs for 4,000 men and the bread and butter for 24,000 people, Price declared.

"The prospector and small mine operator form the backbone of the industry," he added, agreeing that all possible support and help should be given.

McDowell was in full accord with the discussion, especially on plans concerning revision of mine taxations policies.

Study is Made Dworshak pointed out that during the past nine months he has made extensive investigation into Idaho mining problems and believes he has a comprehensive understanding of the industry.

The senator cited mining legislation opportunities from non-mining states. He pointed out it is necessary to foster amiable relations with other countries, but "we know that it is vitally important that we make our own country less dependent on imports, not because our security depends on our ability to withstand aggression from any approach and with no assistance."

Quarried on the possible effect of a CVA on the mining industry, Dworshak said complete controls would be vested in a three-man board. Everyone "could arrive at a logical conclusion by considering that fact," he explained.

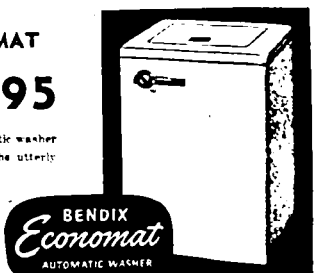

oction on his own property. It is undoubtedly true that the person knew that dogs ate fish, but he might have reasoned that: "Well, they don't have to eat it unless they want to."

In the mind of the poisoner it might have been a case of mistaken identity. We once know how many hours of sleep this person had had during the howling and yapping of neighborhood pets. He might have had the feeling that comes to you when the neighborhood cats put on their "Moonlight Serenade" under your window in the wee small hours of the morning.

Regardless of the circumstances, however, the judgment of the community on the deed is unanimous. No one blames the dogs for eating the fish. The blame is entirely upon the poisoner. And that is as it should be. There is no such thing as justifiable murder.

This episode of the dog poisoning is given for comparison with a second happening in our valley. They follow the same general pattern, yet public opinion judges them differently. Let us look at the comparison. If you will, and then form your own conclusion.

Poison will be spread in our fair land. Not just in one small locality, but it is broadcast over the length and breadth of the country. It is as cleverly concealed as was the poison in the fish, and it is equally as enticing. This time, however,

it is human beings that are poisoned, and the murder, the account of which has filled our papers, is one of the results. This act was the result of a poisoned mind.

No individual with a normal mind could do such a deed. It is quite an indication of the type of inhumanity of some of our citizens and fiction when a boy will say, that having seen murder and death on the screen and read of it in books, he wanted to experience it first hand.

But he is not the only youth whose mind has been poisoned. The low moral tone of many pictures and books tear down character faster than it can be rebuilt. Too often goodness is ridiculed and the questionable is highlighted. The honest virtues that make America great are often ignored and even that which should be sacred becomes a laughing stock. And knowing all this, we still go along with little concern, even furnishing the funds with which our children buy this mind poison.

Let us now take a look at community judgment. In the first instance it is the person furnishing the poison who is judged guilty. In the second, it is not the dispenser, but the one poisoned, who pays the penalty. All poisoned minds do not commit murder, but the process of poisoning does kill some of the finer human values.

But, you will say, they don't have to read the books or see the pictures that are bad. Quite true, but neither did the dogs have to eat the poisoned fish. We protect the dogs by keeping that which is harmful out of their reach.

A bit of philosophizing on the subject leads to the conclusion that we value the physical strength of our dogs more than we value the moral, mental and spiritual health of our children.

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People Reject Socialism in New Zealand

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR.
 AN English statesman, who has spent 14 years of his life in New Zealand, voting out their 14-year-old socialist government and substituting one which favors free enterprise, has visited the old country that you don't think of as being a part of the British Empire.

The much regulation of how they could buy and sell, of how much they should pay and get paid; too much government spending; too many taxes; too much government and too little private enterprise. These are the reasons given.

The new government, the Labour party, promises to reverse government spending, try to get along with the outgoing labor government, but not to interfere with long-standing social benefits.

It received a larger majority in parliament than had been enjoyed by the outgoing labor government.

The issue had been sharply drawn between a complete welfare state and a break on welfare in the same and in England shortly later.

Similar courses.

In New Zealand, much mentioned in Australia, England is still called "home," and affairs are prone to take similar courses. One factor in labor's defeat may have been the recent adoption of the British pound and its subsequent devaluation.

The free enterprise man have continued the people that they could not see their case, but get it cheaper under better management. That was the conservative party claiming in Britain. But it took 14 years for a small majority of New Zealanders to get that point, plus a period in which all governments are having their economic troubles.

British Tory Socialism

Britain's Labor party has had only four years to try its hand, and four trying years at that. Britain are great folk for giving a fellow a fair chance.

The odds among American observers are that Britain, which follows New Zealand and late socialism, is not yet ready to follow in the swift-track.

Ask Dr. Townsend.

People are marrying younger today and living longer. They get through the child-raising period sooner, but that doesn't mean they want to call life quits. More and more they spend their declining years declining to admit that they still have a function to perform in their grandchildren.

Look around you and see who's doing the knitting and quilting Not Oranney. All that's too old-fashioned for her. She's taken up painting—like Grandma Moses. And Grandpa's gone fishing.

Wendell Country Mail Carrier Retires After 33-Year Service

WENDELL, Dec. 9—After carrying as rural mail carrier for the past 33 years, G. C. "Doc" Walsberg retired Thursday after delivering his last mail Wednesday evening.

He came to Wendell in April, 1912, two years after his father's tract opened and he and his father opened a general store on the corner of Sprague and Main streets. He has seen Wendell grow from a few scattered homes on a saguaro flat. The town has seen a community grow to the business center it is today.

In 1918, the community had become settled sufficiently to warrant a rural mail route. He started as a substitute carrier, delivering 20 pieces of mail a day, and 33 years later it had grown to 2200.

The settlement had grown considerably by 1918 and another route was needed. On May 1, 1919, route two was established and for two months "Doc" delivered mail on both, covering the 31 miles with his team and buggy.


