CHAMBERLAIN, Dec. 10. (AP)—Russia will conquer the world without a shot being fired, according to the federal government for handouts, the nation's foremost scientific administrator warns.

The statement came from Dr. Yannerovitch at a Massachusetts Institute of Technology colloquium. He said the Russian dictator will "win" the world through the "soft" defeat of the United States.

"This threat, Bush said, cannot be met if we turn this country into a wishy-washy imitation of totalitarianism, where every man's life has been placed to the preserving favor of some bureaucracy."

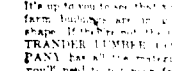

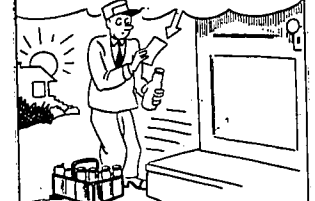

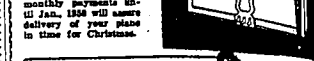
