### Textbooks for 3 Studies Get Board's Okay

**BOISE, Dec. 7 (P)—**The state board of education, upon recommendation of the Textbook Development committee, has approved adoption of textbooks for three courses of study.

Alton B. Jones, state superintendent of public instruction, said the adoption would take effect Jan. 1, 1953 for texts for health and science studies in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, and all high school mathematics grades 9 to 12.

"Schools will be given two years in which to change over to their present materials," Jones said.

The present program of bringing textbooks in the classroom right up to date and thereby improving the quality of the classroom offering was made possible by appropriation by the last legislature," he added.

The present plan reduced the multiplicity of books by making for economy for parents or transfer of students.

All students will have the advantage of more practical and interesting approaches to textbook preparation by using the new books. The average teacher will have more time, with the assurance that the textbook has been selected after study by a professional committee. It also will remove the practice of school board members, parents and teachers making hurried purchases of new books," Jones said.

Jones said that he has previously shown that more than 40 different publishing companies have books in Idaho in selected health and mathematics. The new adoption reduces this to 10 publishing companies.

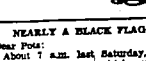

### CONSUMER CREDIT CLAIMS

**BY**—By the end of 1949 consumer credit is expected to reach \$17,000,000,000 mark. Measured in dollars, the private debt of the American people is twice as great as in previous years and three times its level at the end of World War II.

**BY**—The economy of the federal reserve board does not like to see this continuing growth of credit. But the men who are actually lending the money aren't yet worried. They believe their credit can be expanded safely another \$1,000,000,000 to \$5,000,000,000.

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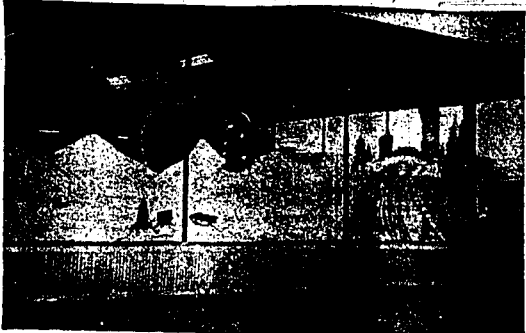

### Costs Cut for Production of Synthetic Oils

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The U. S. bureau of mines had reported today in Hialeah, Colo., experiments which show that the cost of producing synthetic oil from shale "to the point of commercial production" is being cut.

The bureau's director, James Boyd, said that the cost of shale oil is being cut by as much as 40 cents a ton from the 47 cents of a year ago.

"We can produce synthetic shale oil at a cost of about 10 to 22.50 a barrel, which is just about the same as it costs to produce shale oil," he said.

The synthetic oil can be used for diesel equipment, automobiles, airplanes and jet aircraft, the bureau said.

The shale plant is tapping a field of shale which contains an estimated 300,000,000,000 barrels of oil. The present rate of production is for about 150 years. The nation for shale oil is estimated to be about 300,000,000,000 barrels of oil last year.

More important, a bureau report said, the cost of producing synthetic oil indicates that it may become a major source of oil for the U. S. in the time of need, to depend entirely on domestic oil.

### Anti-Red Record of States

Since 1919, there have been 116 laws dealing with communism introduced in all but five of the states—Republican Maine, Democratic Mississippi and border state Missouri. The following digest of laws on the second level of government level:

States requiring that a party have a certain percentage of the total membership in the party before it can be recognized as a political party: Arkansas, Georgia, Kansas, New Mexico and South Carolina.

States barring any party affiliated with communism or a foreign political party: Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Wyoming and Wisconsin.

Similar legislation was enacted in California and Illinois but judicially ruled unconstitutional.

States requiring loyalty oaths from teachers and other public employees: 27.

States requiring banning communists from all public employment: 17.

States issuing an affidavit from political candidates that they do not advocate overthrow of the government by force or violence, or the use of force: Arkansas, Delaware, Indiana, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Wyoming.

States with laws against sedition (inciting disorder leading to insurrection): 20.

States which have had committees investigating communist and other subversive activity: New York, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, California, Washington, Illinois, Maryland and New Jersey. Loyalty laws have been found unconstitutional by state courts.

### Legal U.S. Anti-Red Weapons Aren't Exactly 'Heavy Guns'

Editorial note: This is the state in which the law is the law. It is not a matter of opinion. It is a matter of fact.

The weapons brought up by congress and the supreme court have hardly been what might be termed military artillery against the communist.

The court says it cannot act effectively. Congress has not strengthened the basic laws which may be used against communism. The sedition conspiracy act (1801); the espionage act (1917); and the Smith act (1940).

Conversely, congress maintains that it cannot strengthen these laws because of the constitutionality of the bill which would inevitably be ruled unconstitutional as an abridgment of the rights of free speech.

There is, in essence, the weak strength in the D. C. act against communism from a democratic point of view. The constitution and the bill of rights are good and sacred. From a communist point of view, the bill of rights is a mere piece of paper making it impossible to put down all but the bomb-throwing type of revolution.

Consider congress first. Session after session has doggedly studied the exact laws which would subvert the rights of free speech and freedom of assembly. The Smith act and the Smith act, voted in the 1939-40 session, were aimed at the communist party in New York. Rep. Hamilton Fish, Jr., New York, headed the first attempt to write a basic anti-communist act in 1931. It was introduced in 1931, but was not reported by the committee at all. ### U. N. Colonies Action Angers British Rulers

There is no doubt that the British ruler is feeling sore over what he regards as an attempt by the United Nations to take a hand in his affairs.

This indignity to his colonial appendage was inflicted last Friday when the U. N. assembly, overruling British opposition, adopted several measures calling for more information about the world's non-self-governing peoples.

The declaration of the action came on the heels of a fast declaration by Hector McNeil, chief of the League of Nations, that the country couldn't accept international interference with any area under the British flag.

A particularly outspoken reaction was given by the London Sunday Express which declared the U. N. was "making its first move to push the British empire to pieces." The paper urged Britain to withdraw from the U. N. and asserted:

"The jockals are keeping on the job because they think he is making a good year in his job."

There is of course no reason to think for a moment that British friends to withdraw from the peace organization. However, his inquiries in informed British quarters may give a clue that there is a strong indignation over what is regarded as interference with Britain's colonial prerogatives.

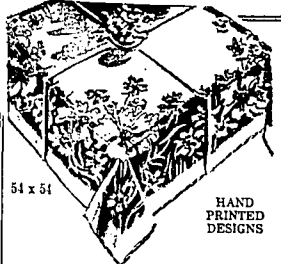

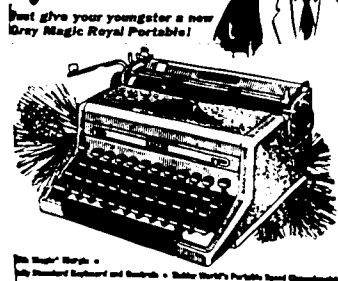

### 7 Billions Set As 'Need' for U. S. Schools

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Rep. Tom Steed, D. Okla., said today it would cost American taxpayers \$7,000,000,000 to put the American school system in tip-top shape. But he said the benefits the nation would reap from such a system would far outweigh the cost.

Steed is a member of a house labor subcommittee which recently finished three weeks of hearings on school conditions in the southwest and west.

"There are very few school districts in the United States that, because of increased enrollment, aren't hunched," he told a reporter. "None are desperate."

"It's a tragic situation—one that requires rapid action to overlook. The time for action is now—by the first congress at its next session."

He said a \$200,000,000-a-year program for building aid would go a long way in meeting the problem. This would be in addition to the \$200,000,000 a year in federal aid for higher teachers' pay and maintenance—a situation that bogged down in the house this year in a dispute over federal funds for private and parochial schools.

The report says that during the epidemic last year, only one case was reported in Idaho. In 1939, there were 13 cases reported in Idaho, and in 1940 there were 300 cases reported.

The epidemic started in Idaho in August and then spread to other parts of the state in October. The rate then began dropping and by the end of the year, the rate was as low as the last year.

Case incidence high

There were seven non-cases in August and nine in September. During the week of March 1940, there were seven non-cases. In August, 30 cases were reported. In the past four weeks only one case has been reported.

### Scientist Says Atomic Power Cannot Be Used in Automobile

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 7 (AP)—You're waiting for an atomic-powered automobile or seeing machines you are doomed to disappointment.

Atomic power, according to small packages, a top atomic scientist explained today.

"It's been a fundamental concept of atom work in the so-called 'critical size'."

Explained Lawrence F. H. ... of reactor development of the U. S. atomic energy commission.

"The minimum or critical size happens to be quite large. As a result the machines for producing atomic energy are all necessarily of a relatively large size. This in turn limits the applications to those in which power is used in correspondingly large amounts."

"These atom-powered automobiles, sewing machines and household gadgets should be promptly eliminated from our thinking."

Dr. H. M. ... of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers holding its 42nd annual convention here.

He said that although large electric power plants and atomic power reactors are of more nearly comparable size, cheap electric power from atomic sources is not assured.

A reactor is a kind of atomic oven. Articles dropped into it become radioactive.

Dr. H. M. ... declared:

"The money the consumer pays for electricity goes largely to cover the cost of distribution. Relatively the cost of the coal or other fuel is small. Therefore, since atomic energy promises further reduction in fuel costs only, it is clear that even essential power-producing reactions could bring little, if any, immediate reduction in the cost of electric power to the consumer."

The supply of high grade uranium ore, the basic fuel for reactors, is definitely limited, Dr. H. M. ... estimated only 7/16 of one per cent of the reasonable amount.

One of the first concerns of atomic scientists is the probability of use of the relatively large amount of non-fissionable U-238 with a "breeder" type of reactor.

"Unless the breeding of new fuel becomes successful, the probability of civilian use of atomic power is dim," he declared. "The difficulties we face are clearly large."

"Even if the future holds nothing less dismal than the continued production of atom bombs, it behooves this nation to keep in the forefront of reactor technology."

### Illinois Medic Named as U.S. No. 1 Doctor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—Dr. Andy Hall, a small town physician of Mount Vernon, Ill., has been named the outstanding practitioner of the American Medical Association for the year.

Hall, who will be 83 next month, was first chosen at the AMA's house of delegates meeting here in their 101st annual session, second choice was Dr. Thomas Edward Ryan, Thornton, Ark.

Dr. Hall, who was born in 1858 on a farm in Hamilton county, Ill., still has an active practice in Mount Vernon. He is in Washington to attend the AMA's sessions.

Later in the week he will be formally cited and will be given a gold medal. Hall replies that he has a small town doctor in that he averages delivered on the average, 80 to 70 babies a year. It is estimated that he has delivered some 2,500 children, which is about one-third the population of his home county.

### Britain Ready To Recognize Chinese Reds

Despite U. S. reluctance, the ball of recognition for communist China is rolling slowly.

Notice that Burma will establish relations with the Peking regime before Christmas follows by only a day the word from Prime Minister Churchill that India cannot delay much longer. Reports from Britain say she will do so next month.

Will these be?

That is expected to break the dam throughout the former dominions making the American decision more and more urgent.

Mr. Churchill was friendly enough during his recent visit to the United States to get himself denounced by Franks, but he has recently adopted an attitude toward the Chinese communists which typifies the difference between American and Oriental thinking on the subject.

He described communism in China as part of the Chinese independence and democracy. He says the Peking regime is communist, all right, but that it is working within the framework of Chinese conditions and setting up a mixed economy which is neither communist, socialist nor yet capitalist.

Assessment here

That economy problem is what is working on all the countries in the case of a country like Burma, the assessment is to prevent invasion. Burma, with three of four anti-communist factors including the government contenting for power, is very unstable, and unless something like 100,000,000 people.

If the nationalist could stabilize their time at any point and give appearance of permanent nature, there is at least a possibility that they would receive American help in holding on. This would be complicated by the American desire to avoid direct contact with the communists. It is hoped that economic conditions will gradually produce re-infiltration.

There seems to be a good chance, however, that the U. S. will not be forced to compromise between its present balancing act and the importance of maintaining solid friendship with Britain and the so-called non-communist but not anti-communist countries of the east.

### Childs Sees Amazing Parallel In English and U. S. Politics

LONDON—Even the passing observer can find certain striking parallels between the political scenes in the United States. On the one side it is pointed up by the current visit of American trade union leaders here to form a world confederation of free trade unions.

Such a politically conscious trade union leader as Walter E. Reuther, head of the United States Workers and chief of the CIO delegation now in London, talks the same language as the leaders of Britain's Labor party.

While members of the A. F. of L. delegation, headed by William Green, are far more conservative in their attitude, nevertheless the trend in the older and more traditionally-minded organization is toward the part of direct and active participation by labor in politics.

That is the other side of the political fence, in the conservative party, that the parallel is most evident. Ever since the defeat of 1944, they are preparing to face an election early next year with a great outward show of confidence. The Labor party is already charging that the conservatives have a war chest for propaganda of millions of dollars provided by big industrialists. And that will sound familiar to American readers, too.

Beneath the surface, however, the confidence is not quite so great. There is even the suspicion that the conservatives, or important elements among them, do not really want to win.

To win would be to assume responsibility with all its risks in the case of Britain's prolonged crisis. It would mean that Winston Churchill would once again become prime minister. And with all this during the romantic dash, Churchill would precipitate the kind of showdown with organized labor that many industrialists fear.

The parallels should not, of course, be pushed too far. But the conservatives even have their Colonel McCormick in Lord Beaverbrook who is for empire first, last and always.

The victors might easily come away with the impression that a labor victory in February or March is a foregone conclusion. In view of what happened in the United States on Nov. 1, 1944, caution is in order. Here, then, are two views of what is likely to happen at the forthcoming election.

Majority view: The word should be overwhelming rather than insurrectionary. Except for conscious suppression of party confidence by party leaders, there is little dissent in the belief that the Labor party will win by a reduced majority, but with sufficient seats in the House of Commons to form a government.

This belief is based on conclusions that will sound familiar to Americans who will substitute Democrat for labor and Republican for conservative. The Labor party, so the argument runs, has passed on so many battles to so many people that inevitably the beneficiaries must add up to a majority.

The strange thing is getting more food. There is not merely full employment but perhaps even overemployment, by which it is meant that people are kept in jobs where they are not doing a full day's work and not contributing to productivity. The national compulsory insurance system has benefited millions, although a superabundance of red tape has probably curtailed these benefits.

The other face of the argument is that the Conservative party has no positive program to offer. Their policies might mean unemployment or they are merely saying that they can pass out the benefits more efficiently.

Minority view: This is expressed by several highly informed editors who, far from wanting a conservative victory, believe it might be a calamity. They base their belief in part on a secret poll recently taken, showing that whereas labor won nearly 40 per cent of the vote in 1945 and the conservatives 40 per cent, with the balance going to the liberals and scattering independent parties, that ratio now has been almost exactly reversed.

By the poll the conservatives are shown to have 40 per cent labor 20 and the liberals 40. The margin is so great, it is argued, that even the crude measurement of a poll cannot do this type wrong.

For those holding the minority view, the polls confirm a growing intuition that a considerable segment of the British public has revolted against regimentation and bungling on the part of the struggling labor government. This is held to be particularly true of housewives and the middle class.

As is readily acknowledged in both camps, a great deal can happen in politics in three months. And here again American experience will be recalled—in that ancient phrase, "You pay your money and you take your choice," calmly ignoring the prophecies and the propensities.
