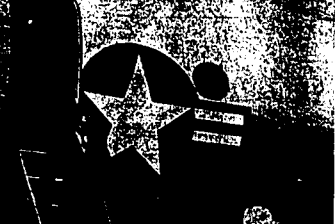

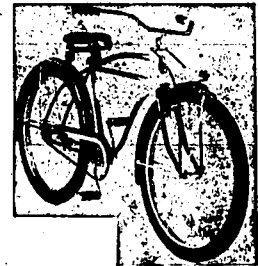

GERMANY GROWS STRONGER

Grave risks attend the mounting competition between the Soviet Union and Germany for the Balkans. Although still divided into eastern and western zones, Germany today is stronger than it would have been without such split rivalry. Tomorrow it may be far stronger if the east-west tug-of-war goes on.

There is bitter irony in this situation. The allied nations felt they had been too soft on Germany after World War I. They believed that the Soviet Union, by its failure to take the rise of Nazism and opened the way to another war. And they were determined it should not happen again.

The decisions taken at Yalta and Potsdam by the allied leaders were designed to create a postwar Germany that would be robbed forever of its war-making power. In those days there was even serious talk of reducing Germany to an agricultural state.

What they did not expect was Russia's uncooperative policy in Germany. This attitude quickly wrecked all hopes for smooth progress toward a peace treaty and threw back the west in a new struggle for the Balkans, the industry and the land of Germany.

Naturally this contest sharpened rather than lessened the division of its territory into two warring camps. Each contestant must be prepared to fight to the bitter end, not only to keep them in hand but to woo Germans from the other side.

From such competition arose the west German republic governed from Bonn and the east German republic based in Berlin. When the Russians set up their German state, they granted certain privileges they felt sure would also be attractive to Germans in the west.

Burns thought the leaders of the Bonn republic would promptly accept new concessions to offset those gained in the eastern section. Just a few days ago the west accepted some of these demands and laid the groundwork for a considerably more powerful postwar Germany.

The western countries agreed to stop dismantling 13 factories making steel, oil and synthetic rubber. One plant in the Ruhr region would be permitted to produce 100,000 tons of steel-making capacity. Restrictions of German merchant shipping were relaxed. The Bonn government will be allowed to have 200,000 tons of foreign exchange.

Western Germany did, of course, make certain promises in return. It acknowledged international control of the rich Ruhr industrial district. Existing limits on steel output—5 million tons a year—were to be maintained.

To reinforce these promises, Secretary of Defense Johnson has declared that the west has no intention of foisting a revived German army under western authority.

The idea of a revived German army and these concessions, it to develop western Germany as a strong contributor to the security of the free world against the Russian communist threat, is a fine—but the dangers cannot be overlooked.

The stronger western Germany gets, the bigger prize it becomes in any bidding for its allegiance. This the more likely are further concessions to be made to the easterner hand within the western nations' family.

The west is admittedly trapped in a difficult situation by Russia's rivalry. But that cannot minimize the fact that day by day we are building more and more strength in Germany. We said a few years ago should never again be powerful enough to wage war.

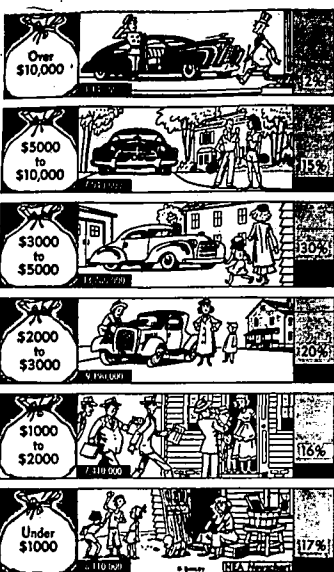

Gasoline Prices Decline Slightly For Local Users

The price of gasoline in Twin Falls has decreased slightly because of a reduction in freight rates to the area, a survey of local service stations and petroleum distributors shows.

Six wholesale petroleum distributors reported the reduction rates had reduced the price of gasoline to them by two-tenths of one cent per gallon. They said the reduction had been passed on to retailers. The new prices became effective Dec. 10 and are ranging from 1.5¢, varying by individual companies.

A survey of 30 retail service stations in Twin Falls shows two stations in the two-tenths of one cent saving on to the consumer. Price reductions reduced the price of the regular one-half gallon to 16.1¢. The average price of regular gasoline is now 17.1¢ per gallon and 18.1¢ per gallon.

Distributors also reported reductions in the price of other petroleum products, varying from one-tenth to two-tenths of a cent.

Winter Safety Advice Given State Drivers

BOISE, Dec. 6—Idaho motorists today were urged to the caution while driving under winter weather conditions. State Safety Director George Vaughn cautioned drivers not to give a "rope hole" on their windshields on frosty mornings. He pointed out that the entire windshield should be free of frost to assure better vision while driving.

He said that motorists can avoid frost on the windshield by placing a newspaper over the glass at night. He also said the car should be started several minutes before you plan to move. That gives the oil in the motor time to warm up and gives the heater a chance to dry out the car windows.

The safety director advised motorists to drive carefully as spots of ice on the road are often hard to detect. Already several accidents have been caused this winter by cars slipping on frost-covered highways, he said.

Don't Use Brake
If your car goes into a spin, refrain from using the brake. Vaughn warned. He said the front wheels of the car should be turned in the direction of the spin.

Vaughn also advised motorists to keep their cars off the streets as much as possible during the winter. Numerous fenders are wrinkled each winter when moving vehicles slide into parked cars, he mentioned.

Better Mousetrap Aids Poultrymen

PRESTON, Dec. 8—Franklin county poultrymen have built a better mousetrap—and Field Merrill, extension poultryman of the University of Idaho, is beating a path to other poultry growers, telling about the idea.

"They took an ordinary shoe box," Merrill said, "put a hole in each end large enough for a mouse or rat to get through, but too small for chickens. They placed a tin can belted with poisonous wheat inside the box. Beavers were good. They were a lot of dead mice and rats. The chickens suffered no casualties."

In applying the shoe box stunt, poultrymen were advised to place the boxes under roosts and behind wire so chickens cannot get at the dead pests.

Speaker Urges Cut in Taxes, U. S. Spending

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The head of America's largest life insurance company has charged the government with hampering business expansion in this country. He urged Congress and the administration to cut present taxation and spending programs which he said are draining the flow of investment capital into new enterprises.

The appeal was made by LeRoy W. Throck, president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company of New York whose assets of \$4,000,000 are one-sixth of the total of the life insurance companies in the United States.

Throck said in a statement that the government's policies can be changed by legislation in the executive economic committee which is trying to reduce the reasons for a reported decline in the flow of investment capital into new enterprises.

He asserted that the government should be willing to encourage business expansion if it would cut taxes and spending so as to "inject an economic climate" in which investors will be willing to risk their money in new ventures.

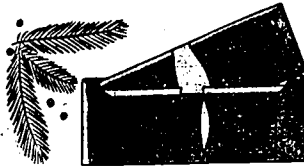

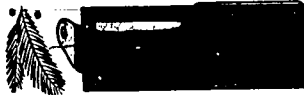

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The nation's industrial and business leaders were urged today to prepare now for the end of the European recovery program in 1933.

And, meanwhile, they were told by men close to international affairs they must make that program workable.

There was a foreign affairs dinner to the opening session of the National Association of Manufacturers' 84th annual conference at the American Hotel.

"Prepared for attack" — the speaker said — "and business men had the assurance of Defense Secretary Louis Johnson that the United States is prepared for any emergency."

"Better prepared," Johnson told them, "than we have been at any time since we laid down our arms in 1918."

The meeting heard economic cooperation Administrator Paul Hoffman say his agency had determined to go out of business on June 30, 1933.

"Good Start Curia," said the speaker, "is the United States chairman of the League of Nations and an authority on international affairs, said the League may be able to help prepare for the end of ERP."

Curia said the United States must balance its trade and imports or lose the objectives gained through spending billions of dollars for foreign aid.

Marshall Plan Places Europe On High Level; Change Needed

By MARSHALL CHILDREN
LONDON, England—Henry Ford II visited London not long ago with a proposal to build a large new Ford plant. This led to a controversy which illustrates the economic situation in America and Europe today.

Ford wanted to build a plant near Detroit and a second factory at Dagenham. But Dagenham is ruled by the government as an area of social service in both man and machine.

Ford was told that a new payroll of \$10,000,000 at Dagenham would produce a Jerry-built town that would quickly deteriorate into a slum. This is contrary to the plan of the Marshall Plan, which will seek relief in the new year.

The controls applied by labor ministers who have extraordinarily broad powers often seem not merely to irritate and irritate but down-right self-defeating. A tourist who wants to buy goods with dollars and take them back to his home finds himself stalling in red tape that makes it all but impossible.

The transportation operating system has just announced that the current year will most likely see a substantial increase in freight charges, and that in turn threatens a drive to reduce production costs so exports can be sent out to earn dollars.

It is not surprising that, by a hard-headed rule of thumb, the position of Britain in the recent past has been judged hopeless. All the while the fact that these crowded islands hold from five to 10 million more in population than that can be sustained without imports for which under the present circumstances, there is no way of paying.

From this, it is inevitable, that the plain British have led to the conclusion that the only sound course is to cut British loans. That, in my opinion, is a threat of major peril not for England alone, but perhaps in even greater degree of the U. S. A.

We in America have got in the habit of warning, on every occasion, what would happen to western Europe if American aid were withdrawn. Europe, we have said so often, would go communist and so as part of the Russian totalitarian system. This sometimes seems to imply that America would stand aside from such disaster in immaculate isolation.

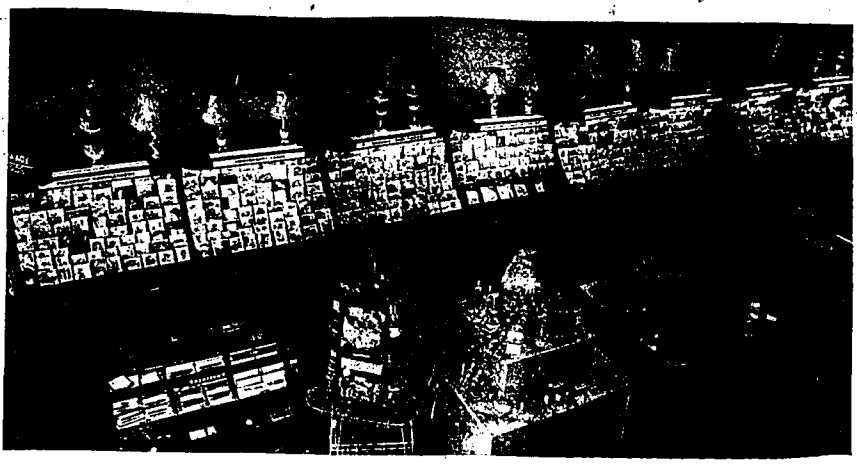

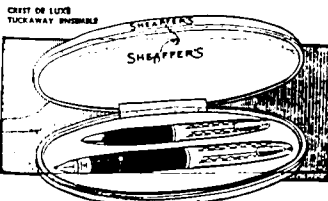

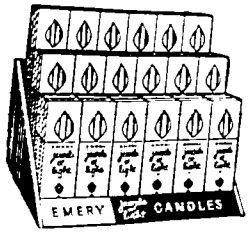

Irish Potato Growers Set Vote on Rule

Growers of Irish potatoes in Idaho and Malheur county, Ore., will vote from Monday through Dec. 19 on proposed amendments to the federal marketing order which regulates the handling of Irish potatoes.

George Rice, chairman of the Idaho state production and marketing administration committee, said ballots will be placed in the mail Friday. The marketing order is handled by Malheur county, Ore., Adams, Valley, Latah, Clark, Fremont counties, and all counties south of them in Idaho.

Growers who fail to receive ballots in the mail may obtain extra ballots and copies of instructions at their county FMA offices, Rice said.

The amendments were proposed by the Idaho potato administrative committee, which represents both growers and handlers and was set up last year. A public hearing on the proposed amendments was held at Pocatello last August as a result of the hearing, the U. S. department of agriculture recommended that the proposed amendments be adopted, subject to growers approval in the referendum.

The amendments would allow greater flexibility in grade and size regulations so that growers and size regulators could handle the crop in the most practical manner. The definition of "handlers" would be broadened to include all shippers, including truckers, provide for indemnification of ministry when potato prices are above parity and allow the board to issue orders for the sale of excess production for practical handling of exports.

To advance the opening date of the fiscal year would be advanced to June 1 so the new committee for the board could be organized in time for handling the early crop potatoes.

The proposed amendments to the marketing order must be favored by at least 75 percent of the growers and by a majority of the handlers representing at least 50 percent of the volume covered by the agreement to become effective.

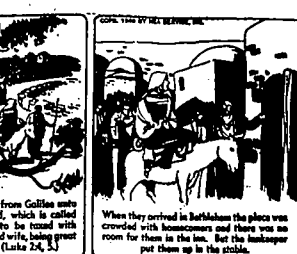

Formosa Now "Hot Potato," Analyst Says

China's big island of Formosa, which has been equipped by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek for the nationalistic last-ditch stand against the communists, is becoming another international hot potato.

Senator Smith, R., N. J., stated last Friday that Gen. Douglas MacArthur recently told him Formosa is essential to the security of American Pacific defenses. The senator also believed MacArthur would favor sending U. S. troops to the island to head off any communist invasion. The Chinese, he said, are

way, are said to plan occupation of Formosa by next summer.

Frank U.S. Defense

And why should Formosa be essential to American defenses? Well, the military experts say this island in the Pacific basin would rank the U. S. defensive area in that vital area, including our great base of Okinawa. Formosa lies halfway between the entrance to the China sea, between China and the Philippines. Its southern tip is only 500 miles from the northern shore of Luzon, chief Philippine island containing Manila and the U.S. base at Cavite. Formosa also is about 400 miles from Japan proper, and some 400 miles from Britain's big colony of Hong Kong.

Island Formosa (or Taiwan, as the Japanese call it) is about the size of Massachusetts. Connecticut and Rhode Island combined. Its population is some 6,000,000. The island is 100 miles in shape—84 miles long and 30 miles across at its greatest width. It has a good harbor and modern transport, though it has a mountainous backbone upon which, incidentally, five aviation headquarters are located. It is rich in natural resources.

This island was ceded to Japan at the end of the China-Japan war of 1895.

Some military grade insist that American control of Formosa is imperative. Other grade incline to the view that it would be a good thing for the United States to control the island, but that it isn't essential since we have control of the sea and the air.

No Vote Taken

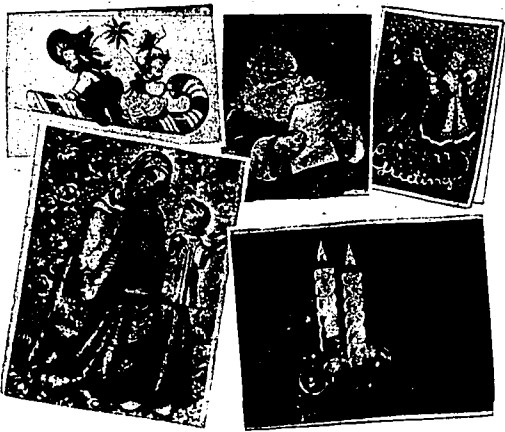
A vote was taken but a petition forwarded to the committee by the schools, whose population is about 45 per cent Jewish, and Catholic and 10 per cent Protestant.

With Christmas approaching, safety reminders are offered by City Electrician Harry E. Smock regarding faulty wiring and fire. The suggestions are compiled by the Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.

Use electric lights, not candles, for illuminating window decorations. Be sure all lamp bulbs are several inches from the nearest flammable material. Don't place cotton and other flammable material around the Christmas tree, Smock added.

Keep freshly cut Christmas trees outdoors until needed, he says. Before bringing them into the house, saw off the butt and at an angle one inch above the original cut. Then cut vertical grooves into the trunk. When brought into the house, place the tree in water and keep the water level above the cuts. The tree will absorb water, retaining its color and needles, reducing possibility of fire.

Tree sets and decorative pieces designed for indoor use should not be used outdoors. Do not use frayed strings of Christmas-tree lights or strings with worn wiring, Smock warned.

The maximum number of Christmas tree lighting units that should be connected together are 10 night-lamp, miniature base, series-connected units; candleless base, multiple-connected units based on a

consumption of 7.5 watts per lamp, which will involve a total of not more than 80 lampholders; or intermediate base, multiple connected units based on a consumption of 10 watts per lamp, which will involve a total of not more than 60 lampholders, he explained.

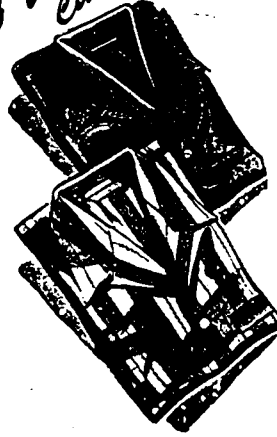
