PRINCIPLE NEEDED

A man named Webb, president Webb, professor of history at the University of Texas, has some ideas on politics that are new and different. Whether they are right is another question. But they seem to have enough support in history to merit our attention.

Politics is not a game. It is a struggle to understand the ups and downs of American political parties. Swings in the economy from boom to bust, the cycle of social change, the warring and warring personalities, these are among the factors set down to explain the rise and fall of party fortunes.

Webb, writing in the magazine Southwest Review, takes a longer view than any of the political commentators. He believes that political parties inevitably focuses on some great principle.

"The party that originates the principle and establishes it, does so in a national crisis," says Webb. "The principle which it is almost impossible to dialogue the party that discovered it."

He contends the Republican party found such a principle after the Civil war. It itself with a "great principle" which was business and fostered the idea that what is good for business is good for the country.

According to Webb, that principle worked for a long time and kept the GOP in national power most of the period from the Civil war until the great depression.

In that crisis, he adds, the Democrats seized the chance to try out a new principle—wider use of government authority for the relief and welfare of farmers, workmen, business owners, and many other groups in society.

Webb passes no judgment on this principle, but simply notes that, like the one adopted by the Republicans in the 1850's, it has become politically effective.

He thinks the Democrats' principle will go on working until, in some crisis, it fails. Only then, he says, will the GOP have an opportunity to move on to a new principle. He believes another new principle that can gain popular support.

In the meantime, Webb believes the Republicans can only criticize the operation of the Democrats' welfare principle, and hide their eyes.

AAU Teams to Invade Many Foreign Lands

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12 (AP)—The American Athletic Union teams are traveling far and wide next year, competing on a greatly expanded globe.

The American Athletic Union closed its 51st annual convention by approving the most extensive invasion of foreign countries in many years.

The foreign relations committee accepted invitations to send teams to Japan, England, Ireland, Finland, Scotland, Union of South Africa, Sweden, Norway, New Zealand and The Argentine.

AAU's committee also accepted many new American records (27 for track and field and some 80 for swimming), awarded various championship events and installed new officers.

The 1951 convention was tentatively awarded to Daytona Beach, Fla., subject to later ratification. The dates were set for Dec. 8-9.

Outgoing president James A. Flood, of New York, Ohio, announced the appointment of committees to prepare for the participation in the Pan-American games at Buenos Aires in 1951 and the Olympic games in 1952.

Two radical proposals were rejected. One was a proposition to bar foreigners from AAU championship events. The other was a recommendation to permit an athlete to compete as an amateur in one sport and as a pro in another.

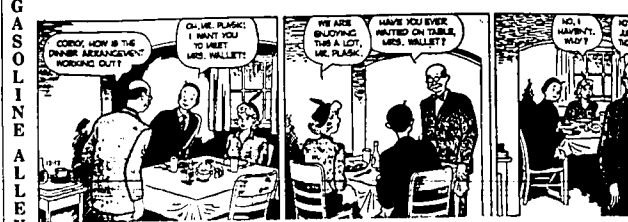

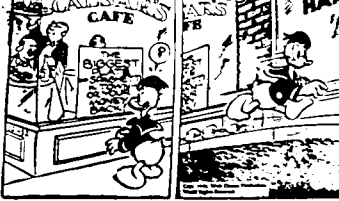

Red Subs Are Called Navy's No. 1 Problem

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—Russia's submarine fleet, larger and including more effective types than Germany's at the start of World war II, is today the No. 1 problem that the U.S. navy must be prepared to meet.

According to recent estimates by American navy officers, the Russians have between 250 and 300 U-boats. Even if the exact number is no more than 200, the red submarine fleet is considerably larger than Germany's at the start of the last war.

U-boats can run beneath the surface almost indefinitely, with only a small breathing tube for their diesel engines above the water. Their diesel can draw air from a sustained depth where the batteries which power their frequent to recharge their batteries. Mrs. Ruth Eckman, who toppled from a second floor window 84 feet to the street, was rescued by firemen but she died before she could be taken to the hospital.

Rentals Chief Proves Idea For Housing

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Rent Director "Felix H. Woods" says he has hit the best method for housing. He has found that the "rental plan" is a low-cost development near here. He already has sunk \$80,000 of his own money into the project.

First buyers in the controversial project—tentatively named Redwood village—are furnishing a "Wood" contention that a small family with only about \$50 per month to pay for housing can live happily in a home 14 by 34 feet.

Twelve of the big-window, non-bed-room, redwood-sided homes have been finished and sold. Nine buyers have moved in. The remaining 14 houses will be completed by the end of the year. The original price of \$4,400 has been upped to \$4,750.

"I've got more than 200 live applications for the residences," Woods reports. "I am convinced I believe I had a blind telephone. I believe we have proved what I thought all along—there is an almost untapped field in home sales to the man making \$50 a week."

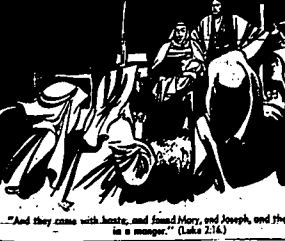

Horse Holding On Despite His Lack of Work

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Apparently there is no immediate danger that the modern horse will disappear, as did little colts.

Present day horses of the west are believed to have been derived from the mountain-land, stayer or stallion of the Spanish conquistadors.

Stockpiles, whose fossilized bones have been found in western states, was a small four-toed creature of the some which science recognizes as one of the earliest ancestors of the horse—and of the tapir and rhinoceros.

Output of Zinc Is Down for October

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The bureau of mines reports domestic production of zinc declined nine per cent during October to 37,988 tons, the smallest monthly output since July, 1944.

Zinc production in states east of the Mississippi river dropped 23 per cent. The bureau said this was largely due to the continued labor strike at the Palmerton, Pa., smelter of the New Jersey Zinc company.

In Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma the combined zinc output dropped slightly more than two per cent.

Zinc production in the combined western states in October was four per cent higher than in September.
