Britain's High Taxes Cutting Landed Class

The disappearance of England's landed aristocracy through heavy taxation continues, since, and the economic revolution is no respecter of persons.

Among the latest victims is King George's own nephew, the young Earl of Harwood, son of Princess Mary (the princess royal) and the sixth Earl of Harwood who died in 1941. The present 26-year-old earl inherited an estate valued at \$2,180,000 and this has been taxed \$770,772.

In order to raise the cash to pay the taxes he must sell much of his property, which has been in the family for generations. More than incidentally this practically deprives him of a large revenue.

Air Accident Toll of Lives Isn't Record

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—This year already has gone down in the records as the second worst history for scheduled airlines in numbers of fatalities.

But when the big increase in passenger volume is considered, the 1944 fatality rate may be among the lowest ever.

The Monday night crash of a Capital DCC-1 strliner in the Potomac river was the fourth on scheduled airlines this year.

193 Contained Dead

The four fatalities—two passengers and two crewmen—raised the 1943 death toll to 21 passengers and 11 crewmen. This was exceeded only in 1941, when 199 passengers and 11 crew members perished in five crashes.

Harring further statistics before Jan. 1, civil aeronautics board officials estimate the 1944 fatality rate may average about 12 or 13 passengers for every 100,000,000 passenger-miles flown. This would be among the lowest rates in civil aviation history.

Causes In Sought

Government investigators still are trying to determine the cause of Monday's crash, in which 16 passengers and one crewman escaped death.

The tragedy touched off new congressional demands for re-establishment of the civil safety board which was wiped out by a presidential directive in 1940.

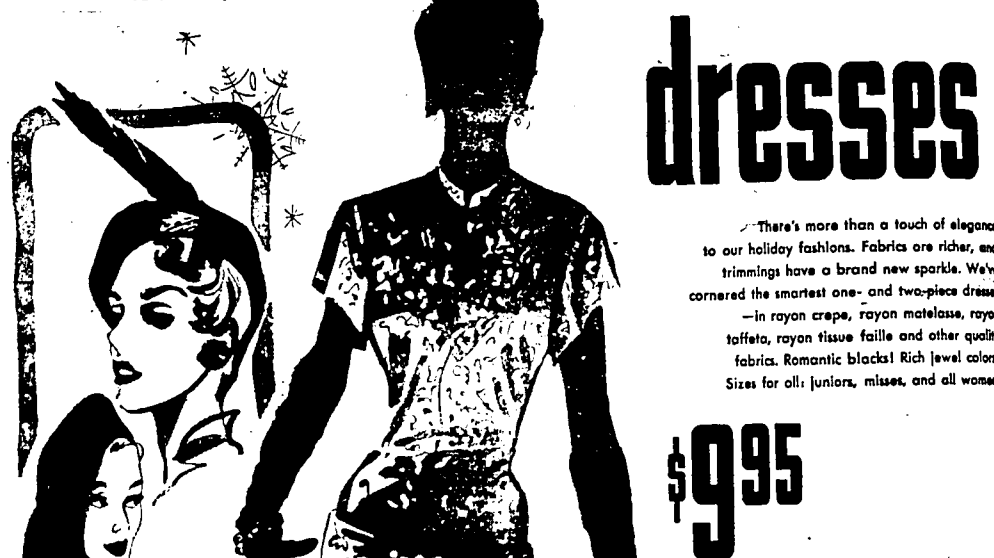

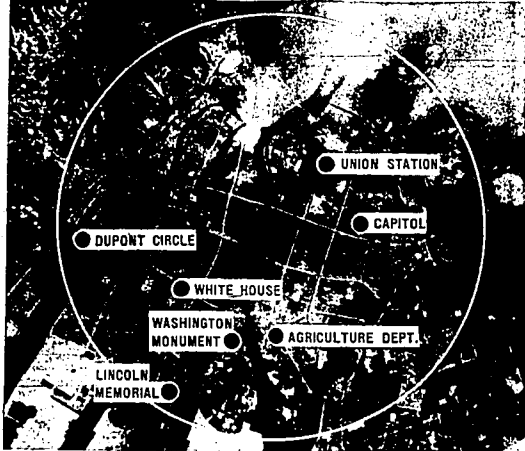

Peace Treaty With Germans Termed Wise

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10 (AP)—Rep. John Marshafield, D. Mont., urged the west today for a peace treaty with western Germany "at this critical moment."

Calling Germany "the big prize which Russia wants," he said that "whoever has Germany on its side will be in a position to exercise great control over the future of Europe."

The recommendation was one of a down Marshafield made a lengthy appeal to the house foreign affairs committee on his recent survey of conditions in Europe. He also proposed:

1. An immediate halt to dismantling German industries. What remains is necessary for the economy and of little use to any other nation, he said.
2. An end to disputes between western Germany and the democracies.
3. A 50 per cent cutback in U. S. civilian and military forces in Austria and an unspecified reduction of civilian personnel in Germany.
4. A change in policy so American occupation troops are "taken off the streets and put on maneuvers."

Impact Here Good

8. Serious consideration to importing more goods from western Europe along the alternative may be "the exporting of more dollars."

9. France and Britain should be given western Germany on a "sustaining" basis rather than one of "occupation or force."

10. Removal of customs barriers and inclusion of western Germany in the western economic zone of Europe.

11. Additional international control for the western German and Austrian governments.

Papers Unveil Mexico Reds' Plan of Revolt

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 10 (AP)—A 60-page document discovered in the home of a red labor leader set 1930 as the date for a communist Mexican revolution government under the leadership of the late labor leader.

Federal Dist. Judge General Carlos Prunier said details of a "red" revolution to impose a communist regime on the republic were discovered among 3,000 documents taken from the Mexico City residence of Victor Carranza, railway union official.

Held For Year

Carranza was arrested last month after spending a year in hiding. He is being held in a federal prison on charges of fraudulently using railway union funds for communist propaganda.

Both said the government had previously charged Carranza with membership of the communist international since 1932 and was a high official in Mexico "red" group, which goes under the name of a left-wing labor group, the United Socialist association.

Living Cost Problem

"The communist directors planned simultaneous demonstrations throughout the country in order to precipitate the high cost of living," both said.

Both charged that the communist demonstrations were part of a Pan-American red front plan to overthrow the governments in Cuba, Haiti, Santo Domingo, and Colombia. He said the plot was to cause "disorder among the nations of the hemisphere."

"They're given everything they ask for, she said. They do everything they feel like; they monopolize the conversation; they're vicious, and they're destructive."

"It's just not civilized," in Mrs. Barkins' opinion.

"But their parents are so accustomed to it, they just sit and say, 'The child has a "don't" in his vocal voice. The children don't find any more.'"

"You can't ask them without the children. You'd just call on them you spotted the whole time admiring the children's record of listening to the babble about what they learned in current events. Even in the dead of night, boys poke at you out of the sofa and baby carriage trip you in the hall."

Her's Have Manners

Mrs. Barkins said her own children were being raised without benefit of psychology books. They got manners — just like grandfathers taught them. "That makes them pleasant to have around. Mrs. Barkins said.

"They've also got frustrations. That, she hopes, may keep them sane. She's afraid herds of their contemporaries are going to go a-kick-raving crazy when they grow up and discover that the rest of the world won't know as dear little Mania and Papa used to do."

Phone Union Seeks Added Pay, Pension

DENVER, Dec. 14 (AP)—General wage increases, elimination of area differentials and a company pension program are being sought in contract negotiations with the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company.

The general goals were announced by Le Roy H. Purdy, Denver, division president of the Communication Workers of America, CIO. He said negotiations have started on a department basis.

The current contract expires Dec. 31. It carries a pay range of \$20 to \$45 a week for women workers and \$34 to \$100 for men, depending on the type of work and the area of employment.

Purdy said no flat wage figures has been set as a goal. "That depends on general adjustments," he added.

He said the security goal was an adequate company-financed minimum pension program. "It would be entirely apart from social security benefits to which both the company and workers now contribute."

Washington Population Is Growing Fast

ATLANTA, Dec. 14 (AP)—The state department says the population of the state of Washington in 1948 was 8 1/2 per cent more for the same date than in 1947.

The estimate was 2,364,100. It was estimated at 2,190,000 in 1947.

The figures are based on a report by the state registrar for a recent estimate of the state's population.

Three largest cities were by some 62,000 persons. Seattle was listed as increasing from 476,000 to 538,000 from 137,900 to 190,000.

Census Bureau Is Sticking by Plan For Income Query

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The census bureau is sticking by its decision to question Americans about their income, although some congressmen have denounced the plan as an unwarranted invasion of privacy.

However, anybody who doesn't want to disclose directly to the census takers how much money he makes will have the privilege of mailing the information to the census bureau on a special card.

The income question will be posed to every fifth household when the census takers make their rounds next year. Those whose incomes are more than \$10,000 may simply answer "over \$10,000." More specific information will be required from those with less than \$10,000.

Acting Census Director Philip M. Hauser emphasized in a statement today that the income data will be kept confidential.

Hauser said the bureau has received numerous requests for the income information from a cross-section of the public. Businessmen and advertising agencies find such data useful in planning sales campaigns. Hauser said the information also would be valuable to labor organizations and to the government itself.

Cold War Is Undertone in U. N. Meeting

Post-mortem evaluation of the work of the 1963 United Nations general assembly depends on where you sit.

As usual with all international conferences these days, the sessions served to emphasize the cold war. Russia followed what has become a set policy. She used the forum to appeal to the masses in a manner not possible directly from Moscow, trying to ingratiate the motives of the west. The more she talked, the bigger the majorities rolled up against her.

Reds Sought Split
She sought by every means to split the western power to play on any discord which developed. Her efforts only redoubled western determination to preserve unity—as witness British delay in recognizing communist China.

West Exasperated
It exasperated the west of Russia's warming-over efforts. Russia's aim being used to increase the tension between the west and communist China.

The small nations viewing the east-west struggle were inclined to see a picture on both sides. But the upshot gave every evidence that world opinion was leaning toward and more solidified on the western side.

Other Actions Laid
There was a long list of other possible actions:

To intervene in South Africa's handling of Southwest Africa; to intervene in colonial affairs everywhere; to bring the world court more actively into the adjudication of disputes and as legal advisors to the U. S. to keep an eye on Korea and the Balkans through commissions; to provide the first international guard force for such missions; to provide technical assistance for underdeveloped countries in line with President Truman's "point four" program. There were others of varying importance and practicality.

Dec. 14 (AP)—Residents of Firth will be able to buy liquor by drink following an election here Tuesday.

Free Enterprise Regime Installed By New Zealand

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 14 (AP)—New Zealand made the formal changeover yesterday from a labor to a free enterprise government. Australia is to make her similar shift next Monday.

Labor regimes had been voted to both the British commonwealth nations, neighbors in the south Pacific, in the last two weeks.

New Zealand's new national party government of Prime Minister Sidney G. Holland was sworn in at Wellington, the capital, on Dec. 14. Of the 49 seats in a parliamentary election Nov. 30, it ended 14 years of labor rule. Prime Minister Peter Fraser's labor cabinet resigned last week, but had remained on in a caretaker capacity.

"There's not going to be any more socialization in New Zealand—the people want in this afternoon," said Holland when asked if the government would continue to buy up privately-owned coal mines. "That is not to say the government will never buy anything, but there will not be any more socialization. Traders, manufacturers and farmers are now free to make a success of their businesses, free from the fear that the government will take over."

Cheyenne Chosen For Land Office

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Cheyenne has been selected as the site of a consolidated Wyoming district land office of the bureau of land management was announced Tuesday by Secretary of Interior Chapman.

Chapman said the Cheyenne location was chosen in preference to one at Casper. The new office, to be opened Jan. 16, will consolidate activities of the present offices at Cheyenne, Buffalo and Evanston.

Similar consolidated state land offices already have been established in Phoenix, Ariz.; Santa Fe, N. M.; Boise, 104; Portland, Ore.; Denver, Colo.; and Salt Lake City, Utah.

Wyoming, which is in the bureau of land management's region three, contains 11,268,782 acres of public land under jurisdiction of the interior department.
