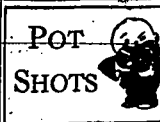

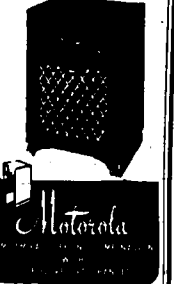

Trucks Help Dairy Farms; Speaker Says

The need for keeping highway transportation strong and for improving state highways was stressed Thursday night at a meeting of the Twin Falls chapter of the Motor Transport association. Bert Frank, Boise, manager of the association, was principal speaker.

An estimated 35 association members were present at the meeting held in the Idaho Power auditorium. Frank claimed that prior to the 1935 trucks began operating it was "practically impossible" for Idaho dairy products to be sold in California because of "exceptionally high" freight rates. "It is to the advantage of the farmer to see that the large trucks are not taxed out of existence due to premium from transportation to truck transportation," he said.

Industry Growing
Frank said the trucking industry has grown to a point where it employs over 15,000 persons in the state, more than any other industry, he claimed. On a nation-wide basis, the trucking industry employs more than five million workers, more than three times those employed by all other industries.

Frank claimed the 60,000 trucks used in Idaho cost 60 per cent more to the highway taxes, according to figures of the bureau of public roads, than the 100,000 trucks used in comparison to \$6,893,000 paid by 180,000 passenger car owners.

Utilization of highways by the state number of the highway is now owned by private industry which would be done in complete regulation law so that the maximum revenue would be assured instead of the present law.

Trucks Link Nation
Frank said trucks and have linked every crossroad into a national system for the distribution of industry's products and their farm to market. "Trucks have made it possible to provide fresh food to the cities instead of just in season," he said.
