Phone Expansion Cost Estimates Off Only \$4,000, Company Avers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Expenditures for plant facilities of the telephone company in Idaho in 1949 are estimated to total \$10,000,000, according to a report today by J. R. Spangier, Denver, assistant general manager of the company. He said that disbursements amounting to \$9,996,000 had been made for improvements in 1949 as compared with \$10,000,000 for the same period in 1948. The rate increase shows more than \$1,000,000 additional work was done in 1949, officials were questioned regarding accounting methods and the number of various classes of service. Spangier pointed out that while prices for crops have gone down, the situation has limited farmers to pay other increased prices, they said.

Better Space Predicted for Farm Timber

MOSCOO, Dec. 20—With the government demanding reductions in cultivated crop acreage for 1950, there may be more room on Idaho farms for windbreaks and wooded plantings than ever before, according to I. H. Harris, director of forestry nursery in going to meet the increased demand for utility tree plantings, says Vernon Raynescroft, extension forester. There is a substantial increase in the number of trees the nursery will have to offer this year.

"Next spring ought to be a fine time for many of our farmers to make windbreak plantings not only around their farm buildings but also on the windward side of some of their fields," Raynescroft suggests. "We learned a long time ago that wind protection in our fields paid off in better crops and less erosion. Some of the farmers who gave this a try found that they produced as much as 15 per cent more crop per acre on fields that were protected against the winds. There is still wind damage in some sections, and there is every reason to believe that protection now being the same returns that it used to bring."

The forester has talked with many southern Idaho farmers who would like to have wind protection on their fields. In the past some of them have felt that they could not justify the use of valuable ground for the windbreaks although experiments show that little ground is necessary with the right selection and use of trees.

Government enforced reductions in cultivated crops may make it more feasible to use windward sections of the fields for this purpose. "Breaks" of one tree species or another will do well in all parts of Idaho, the forester declares.

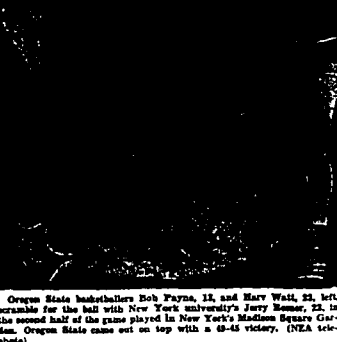

Coaches Rap Ruling On Late Cage Fouls

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (AP)—Bruce Drake of Oklahoma and Sam Barry of Southern California, members of the national basketball rules committee, both predicted Monday that the controversial two-minute rule will be wiped off the books by next season.

The rule, providing that a team which is fouled in the last two minutes of a game not only gets to make the free throw but also retains possession of the ball, has been severely criticized. Both Barry and Drake expressed disapproval of the rule, but pointed out that it had been approved by vote of the National Coaching Association before it was put into the code.

"We spent four hours on the last two minutes," Drake said, "and explained to the coaches why the two-minute rule had been tried unsuccessfully in AAU basketball and I think it is bad for the game. I don't know whether we are cleaning up the game; we may be making it worse. The rule has to be prepared before the penalty becomes so severe."

Drake also explained that the Pacific Coast and Big 10 conferences are experimenting with slightly different rules. On the Pacific coast the clock is stopped until the ball is put in play after a free throw in the last two minutes. In the Big 10 all fouls from the foul line in the last two minutes call for two fouls. These experiments are being carried on by special permission of the committee.

"We treat the last two minutes just the same as the other part," Barry explained. "It's not the answer except that it gets the agony over in about three minutes instead of taking much longer."

Forester Notes Winter's Chores

MOSCOW, Dec. 29—If you have a fairly warm shed that is large enough for the operation, you can do all right with fence-post treatment during the winter months. Vernon E. Barremer, extension forester, says the pentachlorophenol solution used for treating posts does not freeze in ordinary cold weather and will go ahead and penetrate posts, though at a little slower rate. That means that you could have the posts all ready to go next spring. There's only one catch to it. Be sure that the posts do not have a much moisture in them that ice crystals will form in the gaps of the wood. When this occurs, the solution is unable to find its way far enough into the posts to make sure of penetration. Posts will treat okay if well seasoned or if the wood is not too green.



Few Friends Of West Are Left in China

By RIGOLD ARNE

For anyone who has even read the headlines about communism's march across middle Europe the past few years, the west's outlook for friends in China is rather grim.

Yet the British government appears to be ready to take the proverbial "Chinese man's chance" and attempt to do business with the new communist government.

People Approve
It's likely that after some months the American government will do the same thing. Each government has a set of reasons.

A British spokesman here says there is, first, a basic reason: the communist leadership appears to be the government of the Chinese people want, since they put up no marked resistance.

Further, it has long been British policy to recognize a government that has become a "fact" and with the reds prevailing all over China there can hardly be any quibbling that they do control the nation.

Then the British mention their investments in China. American experts are prone to put this issue first insofar as the British are concerned. 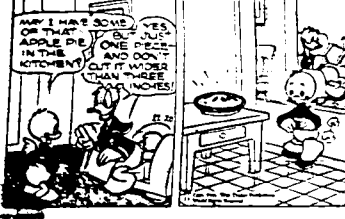

Editor's note: This is the first of a series of articles in which Peter Eden, M.A., divulges the "inside" story of the Communist Party's activities in the United States.

The 30-year war against communism in the United States has been in, in a sense, a talking war. Words are the revolutionary's weapon of biggest caliber. Counter-propaganda is the fortress.

The communists have used words more aggressively, more sensationally, with a louder clang than the anti. The direct assault has hardly been effective. But real success has been done by the "sub-rosa"—subsidized organs of front groups and well-meaning but misguided liberals.

The infiltration into Hollywood is well known because of the pending supreme court case against two of the 10 writers charged with contempt of congress. In the war years there was some penetration of radio and shortly after 7-8 day, both NBC and ABC took seven-league steps to get rid of the influence on their writing staffs.
