Notice of the election must be published 20 days prior to the vote, Blandford said, thereby placing the ballot sometime late in January.

The clipping is headed "A Tree for Christmas," and is dated "Twin Falls, Christmas Eve, 1914." The article, as it appeared in the *Tribune*, Dec. 24, 1914, follows: "Twin Falls, Idaho, is planning to have a community Christmas tree this year, and the selection of the tree is being left to the citizens. The tree will be located at the intersection of Main avenue and Shoshone street. The tree will be decorated with lights and ornaments. The tree will be lit on Christmas Eve. ### CHRISTMAS DAY

Often you hear someone say it would be better people did not make so much of Christmas. By fastening upon this one great ceremonial occasion as the time to show kindness and warm-heartedness and generosity, people tend to compare themselves with people they need not display these traits in such abundance on the ordinary days of the year. JUST MORE POLITICS, MAYBE? Idaho directors of the International Four States Highway association have come to the conclusion that it is going to require a little amount of pressure to get U. S. 93 brought up to proper standards in this state.

Although it is one of south central Idaho's most important highways, U. S. 93 has been neglected for years. Appeals from official representatives of Mexico, California, Nevada, Montana and Canada, that Idaho do its part in improving this international highway, have been given little consideration.

It's the section through Idaho that is giving U. S. 93 a black eye. Other states along the route have recognized the importance of this highway, inasmuch as it is one of the chief routes of travel between Mexico and Canada. And in bringing their portions of U. S. 93 up to modern standards, these other states have had every reason to regret on Idaho's apparent indifference and neglect.

MEANWHILE, THROUGH TRAFFIC OVER U. S. 93 IS being detoured around Idaho to a large extent. The area between Galena summit and the Montana line in no way measures up to the standards of a federal highway. Some of the stretches in that vicinity are scarcely more than wagon trails.

IF U. S. 93 through Idaho were nothing more than some secondary state road, it would be a different story. But when it apparently is regarded as such it is something of a mystery. Are all these other states wrong in attaching so much importance to this trunk highway across the western United States? Or is Idaho fast asleep to a real opportunity?

The Idaho directors of the International Four States Highway association meeting in Ketchikan the other day decided to bombard the governor with a demand for action on U. S. 93. More power to them. It is high time that we got off our dead, white-horse, callous and opened our eyes to some of our biggest opportunities.

You hear a lot of talk about getting greater tourist traffic through Idaho and we permit a barrier to exist on one of the main thoroughfares over which such traffic must pass through our state.

Maybe it's because much of U. S. 93 in Idaho traverses sparsely populated areas having few voters. Politics, as we know, plays an important part in the conduct of our state highway department.

### Puppy Leads Way to Pair Of Lost Tots

WICKIPE VALLE, Tex., Dec. 22 (AP)—Two little boys, killed when they were buried in a spot where they may have lain unburied forever, had not a puppy's mournful whining led searchers to the spot, authorities said today.

The two 5-year-old boys, Billy Rogers and Donald Totten, disappeared yesterday afternoon. They were seen by a person, found a hunt for them in fear they may have been kidnapped. Billy was the son of C. L. Rogers, a well-known contractor. Donald was the son of Mrs. Reba Totten. His grandfather works for Rogers' construction company.

Attracted by Pappy, leader in the search, a puppy whining at a spot where a bulldozer had leveled ground earlier in the day.

A power shov, mated to the scene, found the boys buried in the earth. Billy's boy was found first under a foot of dirt and gravel. Ten minutes later Donald was found under two feet of gravel.

A coroner said he had found the boys' bodies in the early hours earlier from suffocation. Business operators along the road had seen the boys playing with the puppy on a hill near where he was buried.

They Were Warned He warned them not to play there. "I thought they had left and went to the boys apparently were playing in one of the many gullies in the area where they had been buried.

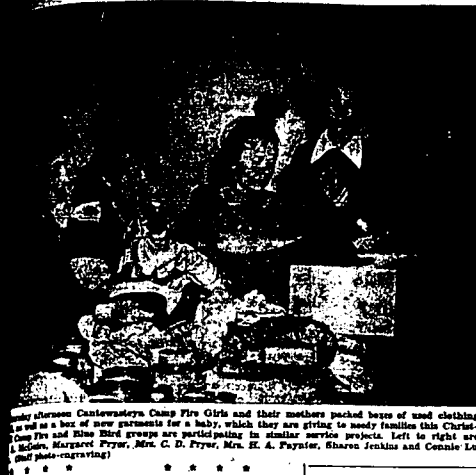

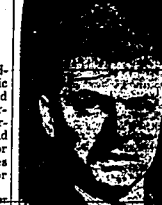

### Road Bureau Prepared for Winter Snows

BOISE, Dec. 10 (AP)—Idaho's bureau of highways will be better prepared this year than last to meet winter conditions.

Officials said today one of the changes during the 1936-37 season was the old snow removal equipment that was unable to stand up under hard and constant use.

New Plans Revealed  
So far, six of ten big trucks equipped with plows have been delivered to the bureau of highways. Four more are expected momentarily.

Last winter, worn out equipment would break down necessitating a quick replacement, and if the replacement wasn't immediately available, crews faced a longer snow removal job as the drifts piled up.

The new four-wheel drive trucks will be largely distributed through southern Idaho highway districts. Officials said north Idaho districts are generally better equipped.

South Idaho Cuts Made  
A large portion of the \$200,000 shipment of new trucks and plows will go to district one, two and three to accomplish Idaho.

Bureau officials said that during the recent autumn, calls came in every day from these districts for help in clearing snow and ice from the highways.

Another important addition to equipment used by highway crews will be installation of much needed radio in plows and trucks.

Facilities Reported  
Previously last winter, no snow was forthcoming for some time from isolated stretches of highway where crews were at work, having through drifts. Now they will be able to respond to these areas more promptly.

Antenna and other installations are now being ready for the equipment about \$2,000 worth. When it arrives, officials said, everything will be ready for its installation.

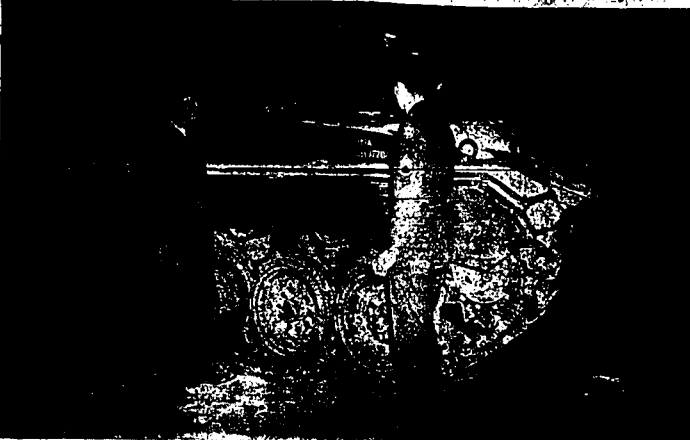

**Fair Employment Practices to Be Basis of 1950 Politics Row**

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 24**—The way in which Democrats and Republicans will square off in the political ring in 1950 is becoming fairly clear. The Democrats seem to have determined the nature of the sparring in the first round.

They have done this by a move that, whatever its inherent virtues is extremely shrewd strategy. Senate Majority Leader Charles McNary said that one of the first things to be done in 1950 is to pass a fair employment practice law.

McNary said this would seem to be a foolish beginning. For it will certainly touch off a southern rebellion, complete with filibuster, that is bound to get in the way of the administration program. But from the Democratic point of view it does some other things.

It puts the Republicans in the uncomfortable spot. Are they for civil rights or are they not? What's more difficult to argue against the background of honest, direct appeal for a union between the Democrats and the southern Democrats.

The latter circumstance has a lot of Republicans worried. Their first wish for the new year is that Senator McNary and his proponents should be contained to the outer reaches of oblivion.

Another complication is the fact, very much in the minds of Negro and other minority groups, that in the first session their party must get back the Negro vote. As one group, they are pointing to the outcome of New Jersey's November election, when Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll was re-elected and the Negro machine overthrown.

In a revealing analysis, Arthur Brynner in the Newark Evening News has shown how significant were Driscoll's heavy majorities in districts largely populated by Negroes. This is in fact, where there are 11,000 Negroes, Driscoll in some Negro districts was ahead by three to one and in others by four to one.

The third ward in Newark hasn't been dominated since 1928. Driscoll carried every district in that ward. While Driscoll lost the county by a narrow margin, he carried the city. Negro leaders asserted their independence and he won in most districts in which the Negro population is in the majority.

The governor sponsored and worked for the strong civil rights provisions in New Jersey's constitution. Fair employment practice provisions have been endorsed more earnestly than in most states having such laws.

Those who have studied the returns believe this is the explanation for the Negro vote. Although President Truman in November of last failed by a fairly small margin to carry the state, he got majorities of one to one of more in Negro districts.

**Mail Office Is Using 'Whip' On Magazines**

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 23**—(AP)—The postoffice has cracked down again on magazines that feature pornographic matter, obscene letters, lewd clubs and girls in sexy poses.

Five publishers were summoned here during the past month to discuss the issue with department officials. The postoffice has cracked down on 30 magazines which are about the worst of the periodicals dealing in girls, their curves and problems.

The department held unpublished hearings on about a dozen of the magazines and refused to let copies of them go through the mails.

Asked About Ads

Department examiners asked the publishers repeatedly if they had checked up to find out if the lewd letters advertised in their magazines had good intentions or not.

The department has received complaints from many love-letter writers that some of the clubs are outlets for "robust correspondence." Also at issue at the hearings were pictures of women in various stages of undress that might be dubbed "sawdy cheesecake."

"Didn't Realize"

Postoffice officials said the publishers pleaded that they didn't realize the pictures and ads are obscene.

The publishers were told in reply to clear up their publications—or else. The postoffice said that publishers complied—at least on the editors subsequently sent through the mails. Local postmasters, they said, are watching to make sure later editions maintain "proper standards."

### Improvement Noted in U. S. Indian Status

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—The bureau of Indian affairs reports that the status of the Indians is heading into the critical winter months in better shape than last year. But it said the plight of some individual tribes is still desperate.

H. M. Critchfield of the bureau said despite these so-called danger spots, however, most reservations have been able to stock up on grain and hay to prevent a repetition of the mass starvation that accompanied last winter's blizzard.

This is particularly true in the southwest, he said, where government and private agencies have spent money profusely to help the Hopi and Navaho tribes.

Critchfield said, however, that because of long-range economic ill-effects, some tribes were unable to make provisions for a hard winter.

Critchfield and other Indian bureau officials pointed out that the weather handicaps through much more dramatic than the every-day problems, is not nearly so hard to figure out as the long-range problem of bettering the economic and social lot of the entire Indian population.

"We can't separate the two problems," one official said. "Until the long-range planning is accomplished and the Indian economy is set upon better footing, the problem of tough winters will be with us."

Critchfield said some tribes "cut-off from eastern Oklahoma, across the plains and into northern Montana are in a desperate situation."

### Jerome Man, 95 on Christmas, Recalls Different Yule Aspect

JEROME, Dec. 11.—"Merry Christmas, that is, Happy Birthday, Granddaddy!" TV's combining isn't it, but this is the sort of greeting John Emmons will receive Sunday, for on this Christmas day he will celebrate his 95th birthday anniversary.

Birthdays just seem to fall on holidays for the Emmons family as one of Emmons' brothers was born on New Year's day.

While Abraham Lincoln still was practicing law, John Emmons was born at Fort Recovery, O., Dec. 24, 1841. Memories of his early life are quite vague at times, but after all, that's a long time to remember. But he does remember such things as hunting wild turkeys in Ohio while still a boy.

Emmons is one of a family of nine children, the only one still living. He recalls Christmas at the Emmons' home was a day of activity for they had two reasons to celebrate. "Ohio didn't grow pines," Emmons says, "so we didn't have Christmas trees until they could be purchased commercially."

"Oh, yes," he said, with a far-away look in his eyes, "we always hung up our stockings on Christmas eve and were thankful for the little things that mother would contrive to put in them."

In 55 years of Christmas, Emmons has seen a vast change. From the simple religious celebration of the birth of Christ to the now highly commercialized holiday season, he

thought would be enough for him.

Now at 95, Emmons—who until a year ago was very active and was able to read a lot without the aid of glasses—makes his own bed, waits on himself, does his best to make as little work as possible for his daughter and above all keeps a cheerful disposition.

Last summer, while staying with his daughter in Jerome, he spent lots of enjoyable hours watching the children at the swimming pool. A year ago he hardly ever missed walking up town morning and afternoon for his cup of coffee and piece of pie or a doughnut.

This Christmas, all the family living in Magic Valley plan to celebrate his birthday and Christmas at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Pettit.

When asked what he wanted for that one for a while, but I will tell you this, good health is the most important thing in all this world, money and worldly goods are nothing without health, and for that I am thankful."

When Emmons was born, Franklin Pierce was President of the United States. He has lived during the terms of 13 presidents and through four major wars vitally affecting this country. He has watched his native state of Ohio grow from a simple farming state to one of the nation's greatest industrial states.

"When you stop to think of it," he has lived through probably more progressive years in all this country than any other man.

BORN IN BOHNSVILLE, OHIO, Dec. 24, 1841, Mr. Emmons was the eighth of a son born to Dr. George C. Emmons, a College hospital, Berlin.

Remembering their father in the early days, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Emmons like to recall the spelling bees held at their home around the old stove at night. Father must have been quite a speller as he never failed to "rummy" them.

He was a jolly man and delighted in getting the best of his children. Not only in spelling but in pulling jokes on them and teasing them. And even now he loves to tease and tease his great-grandchildren in "hot water" when they come to visit.

Emmons is a really remarkable man, for to all those who he never has smoked and never has been known to utter a swear word. He never has been known to go to a hospital and only once in his lifetime can his children remember him going to a doctor and that was several years ago when he visited here and caught pneumonia from one of his grandchildren.

In examining him the doctor remarked that if he would pull his teeth, he would live another hundred years—but he didn't have his teeth pulled, for his first hundred years

**New Type of Windshield Cuts Down Dangerous Road Glare**

NEW YORK—(UPI)—A glassmaker has come up with a new automobile windshield glass that will take some of the sting out of the glaring headlights of oncoming cars.

Since "veiled beam" headlights were developed some years back, the average car's main lights have been so dazzling they are nearly always a great annoyance to motorists and often a serious danger on the roads.

To meet this problem at least part way, one company has produced a new glare-reducing safety plate glass for windshields. It has a slight bluish-green tint. When added to the raw material mixture largely does the trick.

The new glass has been road-tested and has been found to cut glare materially, whether from headlights or the sun. No claim is made, however, that the product will do too much toward protecting a driver's eyes from the direct rays of a rising or setting sun.

Drivers who have used the glass say they don't particularly care any more whether oncoming cars at night dim their headlights or not. They say the tinted windshield softens the glare considerably.

Regular windshield glass allows 88 per cent of available light to pass through. The new product lowers this figure to 82 per cent. That is just four per cent above the minimum demanded by state laws for safety's sake.

The new glass has a second feature—It blocks about 18 per cent of the sun's heat-producing infrared rays.

Not too many may realize that doctors believe actual physical damage is done to the eyes by the direct rays of bright headlights. And according to the Automobile Club of New York, such glare can cause temporary blindness for as long as three seconds.

The National Safety Council says the high beams most drivers use on the roads constitute a major difficulty in night driving safety. "Annoyance due to glare is frequent in many cities," it adds.

Connecticut found that in one year 3.8 per cent of its highway mishaps could be ascribed directly to blinding headlights. Illinois reported a figure of around three per cent, and Minnesota and New Jersey of about two per cent. Most other states lumped these accidents with others caused by different kinds of obstructing vision.

The freighter, the Ida Z O, piled the seas on routine trade voyages up until some eight years ago, when it was sabotaged in Mobile Bay just before the United States' entry into World War II.

The Italian crew wrecked the ship's gear and machinery in an effort to prevent its use by the allied forces.

Later, the government seized and repaired the Ida Z O and put it into service conveying supplies to allied armies in Europe.

A German torpedo sent the freighter to the bottom during an Atlantic crossing.

The former Italian owners of the ship came into federal court in Mobile after the war and asked that they be compensated for the loss of the freighter.

The United States district attorney filed notice that an American liberty ship had been given to the Italian owners of the Ida Z O, and asked the case be dismissed. The judge granted the request.

### Top Spot Due Farmer News In Next Year

By OYD A. MARVIN

The new year promises to give agriculture a top spot in the news. Agriculture is confronted with a difficult task of adjusting its output from high war and postwar levels to more nearly normal peacetime demands. Foreign buying of American farm products, which ceased off some in 1949, is most likely to fall off further.

Anticipating a reduced demand, the government has broadened limited controls on some crops in an effort to slow down output. But even so, some surplus will be produced, accompanied by the prospect of lower farm prices and farm income.

This threat promises to become a major political issue involving not only farmers, but consumers and taxpayers.

The Truman administration will seek to solve the problem of surpluses and declining farm buying power by means of the so-called "Brannan" farm plan, named for its originator, Secretary of Agriculture Bruce B. Babbitt.

Prices of per acre farm production will be allowed to meet their natural level if returns dropped below a set rate. If returns are above, the government would make up the difference to producers.

Some Republicans and some Democrats are violently opposed to the Brannan plan. So are some of the major farm organizations. Critics contend the plan would be too costly for the government and that it would completely regiment farmers.

The Brannan plan promises to be a major issue in the 1950 congressional campaign. President Truman will seek election of a congress committed to its passage.

### New Type of Highway Guard Bounces Cars Back on Road

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A new, non-rigid highway guard has been designed to reduce damage and loss of life when cars smash into it. The principle involved is a new kind of tilting post to support a steel cable fence.

The new post is a steel tripod, it is anchored to a block of concrete, but only by a short piece of cable. When a car crashes into the guard, the tripod tilts back because the anchor cable, while set in concrete at the bottom, provides several inches of slack at the top. The shock of the crash is thus reduced, and normal tension along the fence then serves to swerve the car back on the highway.

The new guard's inventor, John Ogenorth, Alameda, says the new rail is less likely to break and allow a car to crash on through because the shock is distributed along an extended length of the fence. He estimates the new guard can be made at about the same cost as ordinary wooden rail guards or steel guards commonly set on rigid posts. His non-rigid posts are spaced from 25 to 30 feet apart.

### Medicos May Furnish '50's Biggest News

Medicine is likely to furnish 1950's most interesting events in science. One will be antibiotics. This is the medicine that started with penicillin.

Each antibiotic is a chemical compound made by a mold, mildew or fungus, for its own use as a food or to protect its own life. There are thousands of these bug-made chemicals, most of them deadly to man. But occasionally one spares man and destroys his infectious diseases.

Work is speeded  
To get one you have to grow the mold and extract its poisons, trying each to turn this is called "trying slow work, but there penicillin took more than 10 years to develop, the time is now cut to one or two.

Streptomycin, neomycin, chloromycetin and aureomycin are in the new class. The search for new antibiotics now covers hundreds of samples and they are coming out faster every year.

Chronic disease fight  
The chronic diseases start a new kind of medicine in 1949. They are rheumatism, cancer, all the troubles that come from the body's own works going wrong instead of from germs and viruses.

The chronic diseases cause more suffering than the great infections, but not as sudden death. New things for chronic diseases are two: hormone, cortisone and ACTH. Starting with quick relief of the pain of arthritis, these two have shown favorable effects on numerous chronic diseases.

DETROIT, (AP)—In a plainly furnished, lonely room nearly six years ago, a middle-aged man wrote a letter into it he poured his "desperate desire for companionship while there is still time."

"I'm very single and solitary, once a widower and once divorced," he wrote. "In the years I have gone my way alone. At my age it seems difficult to meet new feminine acquaintances."

He signed the note "Reluctant Recluse," and mailed it to a Detroit newspaper. Today, because of that letter, hundreds of young and old in all parts of the world have found friendships that give their lives new meaning.

### More Oxygen for Turkeys Urged to Get Bigger Birds

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A heavier diet of oxygen will produce more and stronger turkeys.

That's the apparent result of a series of experiments conducted by a hatchery in the high altitude of Salt Lake City.

W. H. Warner, manager of the postmaster hatchery, began experimenting two years ago with supplemental oxygen on batches of turkey eggs. He had noted that eggs hatched in lower levels always produced better birds.

In 1948, Warner maintained an oxygen concentration of 22 per cent in some of the hatchery's incubators. The normal concentration of oxygen at Salt Lake City's altitude is about 18.5 per cent. At sea level, it's approximately 21.5 per cent.

The slight increase in concentration, Warner said, had boosted the supply of pure air to 28.8 per cent, the results were highly favorable. Warner recorded 24 to 25 per cent higher batches.

### Farmer Invents 2-Crop Device For Harvesting

WINSTON, Tex., (AP)—Ollie Barrier, cotton farmer, says, "It's simple," when people ask him how he operates a double-duty combine which serves as a two-crop machine.

Barrier invented the dual-purpose four-row vehicle to harvest grain in the spring and strip cotton in the fall.

When he wants to harvest cotton he adds stripper teeth and a picker roller to the front of the machine. Barrier estimates the combine stripper can cover an acre of cotton and remove 80 per cent of the bolls from the stalks in 20 minutes.

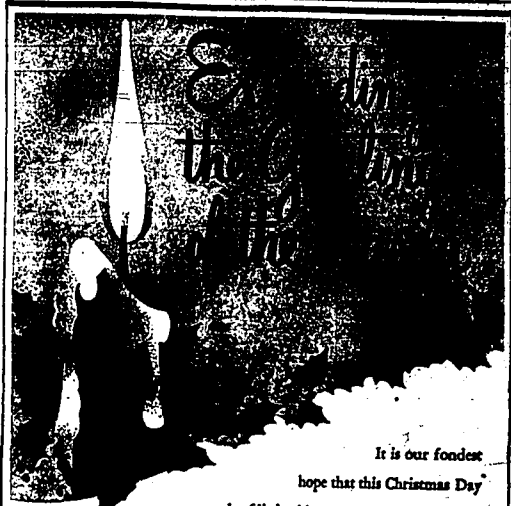

**The "Die and let live" idea is likely to be found giving way to the belief that no real peace is possible until not only the rest of the world, but Russia also, is freed from the machinations of what is variously known as Russian communism, Lenin-Stalinism, or as just plain Russian-sponsored world revolution.**

**Crossed May Arise**  
Russia will not do anything during 1950 designed to precipitate a war. But a war crisis could arise in the spring from something the Kremlin thinks it can get away with during the American and British election campaigns.

Eastern Europeans can't get it in their heads that domestic political instability in the democracies means no indication in international affairs.

### Christmas of 74 Years Ago at Albion Remembered Vividly by Declo Settler

(Editor's note: Mrs. E. Lewis, 81, turns the memory back 74 years for the Declo Christmas in Maple Valley. **DECLO, Dec. 23**—Blue smoke from pulpier fires slipped from the stone chimneys of a handful of scattered frontier cabins and rose straight up into a calm blue sky. It was a clear morning, Dec. 24, 1874, in Marsh Basin, now known as Albion.

Mrs. Mary Lewis stood in her doorway and looked down wistfully at those cabins. She shaded her eyes against the glare from tremendous

stacks of blowing, glistening snow. Broken trees and stumps by tringes of willows along stream banks and by distant, bare, bluffs of frozen bounding what is now called Albion.

Mrs. Lewis was hunched in by this snowy prairie and sentenced by a queer prank of fate to pass a dreary winter here alone with her two small children, Rachel, 9, and Elyrium, 7.

The first of November her husband, James E. Lewis, went to Corvallis, Wash. for goods and winter supplies and was blocked there by an early and heavy fall of snow. Roads were quite impassable.

Freight wagons from Malton and Corvallis no longer lumbered through Marsh Basin and roads were unbroken. The few families had left the bleak and dreary little valley to spend the winter among friends and relatives in Utah as the food supply was low.

The Lewises had moved from Brigham City, Utah, to Marsh Basin, arriving with all their belongings in a covered wagon on June 1, 1874. During the summer they had built a one-room log cabin which had a dirt roof and a dirt floor. Only a

few of the new settlers had put up a little wild hay and kept a milk cow or two.

The outlook was not encouraging for those hardy settlers who had elected to winter in Marsh Basin and it was truly discouraging to the lonely and homesick little mother who looked hopefully toward the Cassia creek summit, the way her husband would come.

Now as Christmas was near, she realized her man could not cross that pass blocked with drifts from three to 30-feet deep which would not melt until spring. She wondered how to make their food last until then.

She had plenty of wood which had been hauled during the summer and stored along side the one-room cabin. She also knew she and her children would have to cut the wood to burn in the open fireplace. They had no stove.

Her little home looked dry and comfortable this morning, the day before Christmas. She gazed toward

the present site of Albion and wondered what sort of holidays her neighbors miles away could possibly enjoy.

She also thought of the happy times she had had in her native land of Sweden. And as the hours, she seemed to see something moving down below on the surface of the snow.

She called her children and they watched the moving object. As it came closer and seemed to be bound toward their home, their excitement could not be restrained. Finally, slowly battling through the heavy drifts, the object came close.

It turned out to be a chariot of deliverance in the form of a sled driven by a representative of Santa Claus himself. It was Babe Potter with an invitation to spend the holidays with the Potter family six miles away.

Noble was an invitation more heartily and joyously accepted and never was a Christmas time more thoroughly enjoyed. They had a real cedar Christmas tree, and the decorations were of shavings whittled from soft pine.

On Christmas morning, each of

the children was given two pieces of fancy, bright colored stockings. And so with a ringing welcome and good cheer and joyous laughter the first Christmas celebration in Marsh Basin came to an end. It was truly a frontier holiday.

Those were the days of log cabins with dirt roofs. Sometimes the dirt floors were covered with flat rocks and perhaps a deer or cow hide, spread to the dirt with the hair up, as a rug.

Those were the days, too, of rock fireplaces with iron pots and bake ovens, rough hewn tables, home made benches, patch-work quilts, tallow candles and frontier food.

With them went wholehearted hospitality, friendliness, neighborly interest, cooperation and unity of purpose. These attributes broke the stern antagonism of the wilderness and bound into a firm brotherhood the staid men and women of that time.



**1949 Is Year Of 'First 100' Video Outlets**

This is the year of television's first 100 stations. Also it is approaching a new goal in the number of receivers in public hands—getting closer to the first 4,000,000. But the station total is expected to remain more or less steady. The year is not expected to go so very much beyond the first 100 stations—not more than 20.

This is due to a "freeze" on the issuance of further licenses by the federal communications commission pending adaptation of channel assignment problems.

**Color TV Problem**

Coupled with that is the matter of what to do about color television. More hearings and demonstrations of color are scheduled as far ahead as February.

After that the commission will have to study the evidence and data before it can begin issuing licenses. There are more than 250 station applications pending.

While the color program has tended to put a temporary damper on the industry's television enthusiasm, it has had comparatively little effect on the public's eager acceptance of the new form of entertainment.

After a summer slump it began snapping up home receivers so fast that manufacturers again got behind in their orders. This spurt boosted the monthly production rate to 300,000, the highest yet.

## Large Crops And Supports Clash in 1949

By WILLIAM PEREIRA  
CHICAGO, Dec. 21 (AP)—Bumper crops and the government's price support program clashed head-on today.

After such harvest, the bumper crop will be the better of the program. Prices slipped below the level at which the government exerted its support.

But as the immediate marketing of surplus cereals dwindled, the program began to bring tangible benefits. Prices started a timid climb. By year's end wheat was selling at the support level in most parts of the country, and oats approached their support.

Corn, harvested in the autumn, fell most under the price support level and had the most difficulty in reaching its low ground. It still was being offered at less than support prices as the year drew to a close.

The price support program drained the commodity credit corporation of funds. All year and it was planning to ask congress for more money. There was little doubt in grain trade circles that its request would be granted.

Beautiful crops  
Once again the good earth produced bountiful crops. The aggregate volume of all 1949 crop production was second only to 1948.

Production of eight grains—wheat, oats, barley, rye, corn, grain sorghum, rice and buckwheat—totalled nearly 187,000,000 tons, exceeded only in 1948 and 1949. Output of soybeans—a legume, not a grain—was the second largest on record.

While the harvest of major cereals was not as large as in 1948, prices were actually higher than in 1948. That was because of large carryovers from the 1948 crop, which contrasted with the small carryovers of other postwar years.

Prices tumbled in all grains, particularly after the harvest. Cash wheat, after touching a high of \$2.20 in Chicago in April, fell to \$1.79 in August. Later, it started a climb and got back above the \$2 level in March. It reached a high of \$2.40 in April, a low of \$1.10 in July, a peak of \$2.10 in October, and a low of \$1.29 in April.

## Harness Maker, 84, Learns World Has Passed His Craft

OSWEGO, N. Y.—William Goldsmith says harness making is dead as the phrase, "Thanks for the busy ride."  
He should know. At 84, after 23 years in the business, he's retiring because of the lack of business and because his eyesight is failing. A sign made with a pencil and another printed with homemade implements spell out the end of the trail for a business that at one time was one of the liveliest in town.

Penciled on cardboard, one of the signs says "No more repair work. I am done working. I have a little line of harness goods for sale also."

The other sign advertises "My business for sale, tools and stock, on account of my eyesight."  
Goldsmith signed both of them.

Harness making was one of the best trades going when Goldsmith started about 1926. It was still booming pretty well as late as 12 years ago, before almost every farm was mechanized. He was not sold a set of harness this year—not even a collar.

**Museum Showing Ancient Printing**  
MAANZ, Germany (AP)—The oldest printed page in the world is kept in the Gutenberg museum here.

Johann Gutenberg, inventor of the printing press, printed two postage size pages of the "last judgment" in 1457. Prof. Dr. Stapp, director of the museum, estimated their value at 24,000 D-marks (about \$4,000).

The museum also contains the famous Gutenberg Bible, hand printed by Gutenberg from 1457 to 1465, which is the highest valued book in the world. It is valued at 1,000,000 D-marks (about \$200,000) and was exhibited in the congressional library in Washington, D. C.

Other famous books in the museum include the handwritten Bible of Charlemagne, the "Palatinum" in 1456, and the illustrated history Bible of Eberhard Leuber, dating back to 1420.

## Eskimo Language Study Is Planned

COPENHAGEN (AP)—The Smithsonian Institute of Washington and the Arctic Institute of North America have been negotiating with the Danish linguist, Prof. J. Hammerich, about a one-man expedition to Alaska to study the Eskimo language.

Prof. Hammerich said Alaska is the best place for studies of this kind, because the Eskimo language is the most primitive of the north-

ern languages. He would probably visit the island of Pitmevak, southwest of Alaska. He said that as the old primitive Eskimos have become almost extinct and the younger generation is losing its close contact with the outer world, it is of great importance to carry out the investigation of the language now.

The Danish museum inspector Niels Larsen also will undertake a one-man expedition to Alaska, to study the life of the last inland Eskimo there.

## Big Problem In '50 to Be Dollar Value

By HARRY T. MONTGOMERY  
AP Economics Writer

The problem of what the dollar will buy promises to be a major puzzle of 1950. The year will begin with the economy fairly balanced between inflation, with its higher prices and pressure on wages, and deflation, with lower prices and pressure on business to keep going.

Either trend could get out of hand and bring hard times for everybody. Strong currents in both directions maintain the balance as the year begins.

**Prosperity Predicted**

Most guessers believe 1949 will be a year of continued prosperity for the country as a whole on a level slightly below that of 1948. The year starts with a good rate of activity, but part of it is based on business held back by the steel and coal strikes.

The long-ranged trend is downward from the all-time peaks of 1948. Those looking for a good 1950 expect the leveling-off will be gradual.

**Prospects Good**

Prospects are generally good for major industries such as building, automobile, steel and those markets the consumer goods and the money is plentiful and if the in-

flation-deflation balance is maintained, spending should continue high.

Farmers are expected to fare about as well as in 1948.

A further drop in foreign trade is looked for, and throughout the economy at home there may be regional difficulties and trouble in some lines. These factors could multiply toward a recession deeper than the mild turn-down of mid-1948.

U. S. Role Vital

The federal government's role is important, and that in turn is influenced by political factors both at home and abroad.

Government spending for rearmament and European aid have been major items in our latest prosperity. But such spending means high taxes and increasing debt, so that a fine balance must be maintained to keep the country on an even keel.

## Helicopter Used As Fishing Help

SAN DIEGO (AP)—The first use of a helicopter by a tuna clipper for spotting schools of fish has proved successful, according to Capt. Joe Machado, skipper of the tuna boat Espirito Santo.

The clipper returned from an 85-day fishing trip with a full load of 350 tons of tuna, caught mostly off Central America.

Machado took along a 1,400-pound helicopter for spotting fish. The aircraft has a cruising range of 180 miles.

## States Pay More Attention to Loss Of Pay by Illness

CHICAGO (AP)—State legislatures are giving more attention to wage losses caused by non-occupational illness.

The Research Council for Economic Security reports that although only four states now have compulsory programs for cash payments for sickness, 71 such bills were introduced in 16 state legislatures this year.

Rhode Island, California, New Jersey and New York now have such programs.

The programs in effect provide for payments ranging from \$10 to \$25 weekly, depending upon past earnings. Exceptions are New Jersey, where the range is from \$5 to \$25, and New York, which has a \$25 maximum. Rhode Island grants benefits for all sicknesses including pregnancy and duplication under workers' compensation up to a combined benefit of 85 per cent of the average weekly wage.

California, New Jersey and New York pay benefits for everything except pregnancy and those illnesses compensable under workers' compensation.

In all four programs, the employee contributes from 1/2 to 1 per cent, varying with the state, and the employer makes some contribution.
