

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—John L. Lewis' supposedly shrewd move in signing new contracts with 15 small operators in the West is being regarded as a bold move to call another nationwide strike after he was forced in a last desperate effort to sign his own contracts.

The terms of his off-the-cuff deals which were designed to break the solid front of the operators' resistance, are so antagonistic that his few friends in that group have decried them.

Bodies banding on a 40-cent-a-day scale, and a 35-cent-a-day scale for the winter 1936 in place of the current 20 cents, are insisted on by the operators and his men will work only when they are willing to strike.

WORRIED—That alleged enables him to call a walkout or declare a three-day work-week without making any reference to the Taft-Hartley act. In a moment of weakness, the operators included in the new contracts are formally protesting that clause for the future.

The new contracts also list the miners not covered by the 40-cent-a-day rate. They are working at the old rate, and the districts are receiving no payments from the operators. ONUS—Lewis does not want to order another strike because he does not want to challenge the Taft-Hartley act. He is worried about the heavy fines recently levied against himself and his union. But the union leadership of miners may force him to do the job.

The three-day work-week, for one thing, is producing no effect on the operators. It is producing a surplus on hand, current output means that industry, the railroad and residential consumers can get their coal.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Dec. 30—A total of 374 high school and grade school teachers are attending the University of Idaho classes in their home towns. The extension program, under the direction of Harlow H. Campbell, educational field service director, has grown up in 13 different Idaho school systems.

Twenty-two classes in curriculum construction, modern teaching methods and guidance methods are taught by local instructors who receive the material from the University of Idaho and relay it to the classes. A full-time extension instructor, Prof. Chester C. Friddle, is in charge of supervision, grading and instruction.

"Although the teachers are busy with their own classes, they are glad to see the students as the ones who really gain by the program. Teacher participation in the program is reflected in the classroom."

Schools using The University of Idaho extension program are at Nampa, Caldwell, Boise, Council Bluffs, ID., and other locations. Prof. W. M. Moore, Grangeville, Payette, Emmett, Glenn Ferry and other locations.

Local teachers who complete the course may apply three credit hours to each course to a higher educational degree. Classes meet for three-hour sessions weekly for 16 weeks. Courses of study, textbooks and lesson guides are selected by Professor Friddle for use in the course.

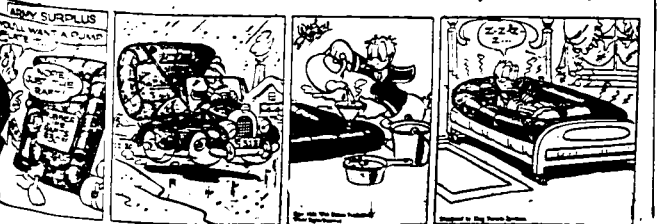
