Storms boost hopes for a good water year

One month after Idaho mountain snowpacks traditionally peak, hydrologists and irrigators say April storms helped reinforce a good water year in some areas while other basins will continue to struggle to meet demand.

Flood-control releases from reservoirs in the upper Snake River should draw down soon, but irrigators depending on the Snake still have plenty of unthawed snow in Wyoming to draw from - as much as 117 percent of the normal snowpack just across the Idaho border, according to provisional data for Tuesday.

The healthy snowpack in both Idaho and Wyoming is

Burley may end early morning parking prohibition



BURLEY Cassia County cops have been busy since Sheriff Randy Kidd took over in January, but they may soon get a partial break from writing early morning parking tickets in downtown Burley.

The Burley City Council agreed Tuesday night to consider a resolution that would remove signs in the downtown corridor that prohibit parking from 4 a.m. to 6 a.m.

"I imagine they were originally put up for street sweeping and snow removal," City Administrator Mark Mitton said,

Those underappreciated containers holding soap in restrooms aren't usually the talk of a town or school.

But that can change when the containers in a school don't have soap and there are media reports about swine flu. For Jerome Middle School, there's no longer a soap shortage this week in restrooms, which was a problem last week.

"We've got soap all over," said Victor Arreaga, vice principal of the school. "We're just swimming in soap."

Last week, some parents were upset when they found out their children were going to school without access to soap in the boys restrooms. Arreaga said the school put soap in the dispensers after the problem was brought to the school's attention.

Dan Kriz, an environmental health specialist with the South Central Public Health District, said he talked last week to the school's janitor and has been informed that soap is available in restrooms. There was only one restroom without soap, he said.

"There was soap," he said of the school's current soap status.

Complaints had prompted the health district to visit the school early last week, where no soap was found in a boys restroom.

Annie Firth, a parent with a son at Jerome Middle School, said her child went for more than a week without soap in the restroom before the problem was remedied.

"The end verdict was that they were putting it back in because there were so many of us who complained," she said, adding that her son had a cold during the soap shortage.

Firth said that there have been issues with students pumping the soap onto the floor, though she



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



A 5-mile road into **Twin Falls' future**

few months ago, the U.S. 30/93 Bypass – technically, Stage 2 of the Twin Falls Alternate Route – was barely a blip on the Idaho Transportation Department's radar. Now, thanks to \$41 million in federal stimulus money, it's about to happen. ITD plans to advertise for bids this month or next, and start work this fall.

Grandview Drive and the Highway 30/93 junction is the costliest enter prise on Gov. Butch Otter's list of "shovelready" projects designed to create 2,800 jobs and funnel \$148 million into the state economy.

When it's completed, through traffic won't have to navigate Blue Lakes Boulevard North. The bypass will relieve congestion on Blue Lakes and on Washington Street, but put more pressure on Pole Line Road and the bottleneck at the southern end of the Perrine Bridge.

And its completion will nearly coincide with the opening of the new St. Luke's Magic Valley at the intersection of Pole Line and Grandview. Canyon Ridge High School and a Wal-Mart store on Washington will open this summer.

Among them, the

bypass, the hospital, the high school and Wal-Mart will funnel thousands more vehicles a day into a relatively small corner of northwest Twin Falls.

The city of Twin Falls says it has done enough research to ensure that won't be a problem, but that's debatable.

And a moot question, at this point. The traffic is coming, ready or not.

What certainly will change are commercial development patterns in Twin Falls. Businesses are already moving farther west on Pole Line, a pattern that is likely to accelerate. Residential growth in northwest Twin Falls and adjacent areas of Twin Falls County will follow.

None of this was supposed to happen quite so fast. Before the stimulus came along, the bypass was far down the list of ITD's priorities. But the fact that this road will link two recent ITD projects – the 93/30 interchange and Stage 1 of the alternate route – made this enterprise "shovel ready," and a prime candidate for federal money. We welcome the project and the jobs that will come with it. But it will change the way Twin Falls – both city and county – lives, works and gets around. While not opposing the bypass, downtown business owners and many members of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce worry that the project will divert traffic - and shoppers - away from the city's core. They prefer a proposal to reroute Highway 30 downtown to make the area easier to get to. That may yet happen. But the more immediate priority is to begin a community conversation about how Twin Falls should manage the traffic that will soon clog the Perrine Bridge and its feeder streets.





Today, if Republicans had learned the right lessons from the Westerns, or at least John Ford Westerns, they would not be the party of untrammeled freedom and maximum individual choice. They would once again be the party of community and civic order.

They would begin every day by reminding themselves of the concrete ways people build orderly neighborhoods, and how those neighborhoods bind a nation. They would ask: What threatens Americans efforts to build orderly places to raise their kids? The answers would produce an agenda: the disruption caused by a boom and bust economy; the fragility of the American family; the explosion of public and private debt; the wild swings in energy costs; the fraying of the health care system; the segmentation of society and the way the ladders of social mobility seem to be dissolv-

ing. But the Republican Party has mis-learned that history. The party sometimes seems cut off from the concrete relationships of neighborhood life. Republicans are so much the party of individualism and freedom these days that they are no longer the party of community and order. This puts them out of touch with the young, who are exceptionally community-oriented. It gives them nothing to say to the lower middle class, who fear that capitalism has gone haywire. It gives them little to say to the upper middle class, who are interested in the environment and other common concerns.

The Republicans talk more about the market than about society, more about income than quality of life. They celebrate capitalism, which is a means, and are inarticulate about the good life, which is the end. They take things like tax cuts, which are tactics that are good in some circumstances, and elevate them to holy principle, to be pursued in all circumstances.

The emphasis on freedom and individual choice may work in the sparsely populated parts of the country. People there naturally want to do whatever they want on their own land. But it doesn't work in the densely populated parts of the country: the cities and suburbs where Republicans are getting slaughtered. People in these areas understand that their lives are profoundly influenced by other people's individual choices. People

there are used to worrying about the health of the communal order.

If the Republicans are going to rebound, they will have to re-establish themselves as the party of civic order. First, they will have to stylistically decontaminate their brand. That means they will have to find a leader who is calm, prudent, reassuring and reasonable.

Then they will have to explain that there are two theories of civic order. There is the liberal theory, in which teams of experts draw up plans to engineer order wherever problems arise. And there is the more conservative vision in which government sets certain rules, but mostly empowers the complex web of institutions in which the market is embedded.

Both of these visions are now contained within the Democratic Party. The Republicans know they need to change but seem almost imprisoned by old themes that no longer resonate. The answer is to be found in devotion to community and order, and in the bonds that built the nation.

Obama talks transparency, practices opacity

nunlight is for suckers. The New York Post reported on Tuesday that the White House will not release the \$328,835 snapshots taken of the president's Boeing VC-25A that buzzed lower Manhattan. The entire world has seen news and amateur photos and videos of the incident, but if President Obama has his way, taxpayers won't be able to see the flyover photos they paid for with their own money.

This will make for an interesting response to my Freedom of Information Act requests. After the bizarre mission caused distress and panic among countless New York City residents who were intentionally left in the dark about the photo-op stunt, I filed public records requests with the Office of the Secretary of Defense and the Joint Staff FOIA Requester Service Center.

The first one requests any and all communication including e-mail and other public records and including any and all correspondence between the White House Military Office, Department of Defense and other agencies. Specifically, I requested all public records related



to and including the flight manifests and related to the origin of the request for the mission. The second filing requests any and all photos taken during the planned federal aerial mission approved by the White House Military Office.

What rationale could they possibly use to stifle public disclosure? National security? These were glamour shots to enhance the Air Force One photo portfolio. That's no secret. The White House 'fessed up on that. Withholding the photos serves only one purpose: protecting the backsides of those involved in this botched PR mission.

From Day One, Obama has demonstrated a rather self-serving selectivity when it comes to transparency. The Obama White House rushed to reverse an 18-year ban photographing the flag-draped coffins of troops arriving back on

American soil. And at the behest of the American Civil Liberties Union, his administration is set to release at least 21 classified photographs by May 28 showing detainee abuse in prisons in Iraq and Afghanistan. Openness in government is fine if it hurts America's reputation, but not if it harms Obama's.

Hostility to transparency is a running thread through Obama's cabinet:

 Secretary of State Hillary Clinton for years fought disclosure of massive donations from foreign governments and corporations that filled her husband's library and foundation coffers.

• Top Obama adviser David Axelrod ran fearmongering campaigns in support of a huge utility rate hike – and failed to disclose that the ads were funded for Commonwealth Edison in Chicago.

• Labor Secretary Hilda Solis failed to disclose that she was director and treasurer of a union-promoting lobbying group pushing legislation that she was cosponsoring.


• Attorney General Eric Holder overruled his own lawyers in the Justice Department on the issue of D.C. voting rights (which he and Obama support) and refused to make public the staffers' opinion that a House bill on the matter was unconstitutional.

 And as I reported last month, Obama's nominee for the No. 2 official at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, former King County, Wash., executive Ron Sims, has the distinction of being the most fined government official in his state's history for suppressing public records from taxpayers.

Obama set the tone, breaking his transparency pledge with the very first bill he signed into law. On Jan. 29, the White House announced that the Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act had been posted online for review. One problem: Obama had already signed it in violation of his "sunlight before signing" pledge to post legislation for public comment on the White House Web site five days before he sealed any deal.



ike most parents, I'm sure my two-year-old son is destined for great things. So I created a college savings plan to give him a leg up on life.

I did this because the cost of higher education is rising faster than water levels in the Palisades – I also want the tax deduction next year.

According to the Idaho State Board of Education, the annual cost of college in Idaho increased about 6 percent in 2008 compared to the previous year.

A plan can be opened for as little as \$25 a month, which would rise to more than \$6,000 over a 12-year period recording 8 percent annual growth. That's not bad, especially when you consider that the money grows taxdeferred.

Parents can also benefit by getting a state tax deduction of up to \$8,000 if filing jointly.



Informants allege **Blackwater tried** to dump weapons

RALEIGH – A defense contractor charged with trying to smuggle firearms out of Iraq claimed Blackwater guards asked him to help get rid of weapons after a deadly 2007 shooting in Baghdad, two government informants say in court documents.

The contractor told one of the informants that Blackwater guards wanted to dispose of the weapons before an investigation into the September 2007 shooting that left several civilians dead, according to a criminal complaint filed in the smuggling case. The contractor, John Houston, did not work for Blackwater.

Both informants, whose names weren't revealed by federal investigators, were Army reservists stationed in Iraq. Houston approached them for help with smuggling, the complaint states, and one of them tipped off investigators about the scheme.

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





cherish park's quiet days before summer crush **By Ruffin Prevost** Billings Gazette

YELLOWSTONE NAT-IONAL PARK - Baseball fans relish opening day, movie mavens line the sidewalks at Hollywood premieres and the glamorous glitterati flock to fashion week.

But for nature lovers and animal aficionados, there is no match for the first few weeks of the summer season in Yellowstone National Park.

Though May in Yellowstone seldom seems like summer, it marks a time when locals make that first dash into the park, as well as a chance for workers to gear up for the impending crush of the millions that will visit over the next few months.

Friday was the first day that auto traffic was allowed through the east gate, while some other entrances had been open for a week.

Ranger Candice Phipps was the lone worker checking visitors through the east entrance, a job that requires two or three others working multiple lanes during the height of summer, as hundreds of cars and buses stream through each hour. But 30 minutes after opening at 8 a.m., only a dozen cars had passed through, Phipps said. including a couple of local photographers who were waiting at 7:30. The scarcity of visitors let nature take center stage over the next eight hours and 200 miles, with dozens of species of animals and ever-changing weather on display. Nine miles inside the park, Svlvan Lake looks like a sheet of pristine, white satin, adorned with sparkling crystals. Snow is piled and plowed on both sides of the road, often higher than passing cars. At times, the crisp edges of the neatly plowed snow resemble a giant wedding cake, smothered in white frosting. Yellowstone Lake is invisible beyond an impenetrable fog and beneath a static gray sky. Fishing Bridge slumbers under a thick blanket of snow, its store and other amenities closed, like many other spots in the park will be until the crowds pick up. By 9:45, 36 miles in, a trio of sandhill cranes stands in the shallow water where Trout Creek meets the Yellowstone River. The birds take on an alien appearance in the fog, with one resembling a monstrous muppet, a silhouette of legs and shaggy feathers with no visible head. Hunt makes up for long drive north

We had planned the trip weeks earlier – to hunt turkeys in northern Idaho.

After work on Friday, April 17, I took my place behind the wheel of my Jimmy, which was packed to the gunwales with hunting gear, and drove east.

Its gobbles echoed off the trees and remaining snow banks. Each series of gobbles from the amorous tom was answered with the raspy screeching of the hen call Cameron executed so well. The teasing and flirting calls back and forth continued while we located a

clearing, set up the decoy and found a hiding place within shooting range of the decoy.

There was shooting light now and we had the gobbler moving toward us. We were concealed among the boughs of a fir tree and watched with fascination as two toms strutted into the far

"There's two of them," Cameron whispered.

"OK, you take the left one and I'll take the right one," I whispered back.

The males strutted and periodically fanned their tails, making their way directly toward the hen decoy, oblivious to our presence. We watched them carefully, our hearts racing and thumbs positioned to slide the safety switch on our guns as trigger fingers grew antsy.

They came on toward the decoy – gobbling, strutting and fanning to attract the attention of the hen. They We were probably a mile away from were separated by about 10 yards, each striving to persuade the female that he was the greater of the two.

At about 30 yards Cameron blasted the one on the left with a charge of No. 5 buckshot. He toppled the tom on the left while the one on the right seemed stunned and stuck to the ground for a couple of heartbeats before he was toppled with No. 4 buckshot from my 20 gauge.

We dashed out and gathered up our bounties. They were beautiful Merriams with 8-inch beards and respectable wattles weighing about 20 pounds.

We congratulated each other and decided this was some kind of record. Both turkey tags were filled by 6:20 a.m.



TRAPSHOOTING SCORES

An upgraded rifle and round

hough the .30-06 Springfield had faithfully served U.S. and Allied soldiers through two world wars and a Korean conflict, military planners in the 1950s and early '60s believed that a new martial cartridge better suited to semi and full automatic weapons was needed.



Initially the 7.62x51 NATO cartridge (.308 Winchester in civilian garb) housed in the sturdy M14 selective-fire rifle got the nod, but battle conditions in Vietnam strongly suggested the need for an alternative rifle and round.

Rich

After extensive testing, the Army decided to go with Gene Stoner's spaceage Armalite AR15 rifle and an enlarged and higher pressure version of Remington's .222 varmint cartridge. In military guise, the black plasticstocked selective fire rifle became known as the M16 and its high velocity small bore cartridge, the 5.56x45mm NATO.

But like all new developments, things were not perfect right out of the gate. As it turns out, the Army had changed the 5.56's performance requirements just prior to its adoption and Winchester (Olin Corp.) had scrambled to meet those new criteria by developing and charging



the cases with a brand new powder.

Since Gene Stoner had not been made privy to the powder switch, the M16 went General Issue before any design modifications could be made to better cope with the new ballistic characteristics of the modified 5.56 round.

This design inconsistency coupled with the horrendous conditions of jungle warfare played havoc with our new battle rifle. Malfunctions and jams plagued the rifle and more than one GI was found dead beside his jammed and partially disassembled weapon.

Since those early days, however, the rifle and round have been considerably modified and upgraded. Today both are marshaled by the armed forces of most NATO nations, as well as tens of millions of law enforcement personnel, civilian shooters and hunters.

It has been said, "If you want to guarantee the success of a new cartridge, chamber it in a standard military firearm." This adage has proven true with such perennial favorites as the .30-06, .308 Winchester, .45 ACP, and 9mm Parabellum. The civilian version of the 5.56 NATO, the .223 Remington, has certainly maintained this tradition. Next to the ubiquitous .22 LR, the .223 is the biggestselling small bore round in America today. So what is it about the

Being a small caliber round, the .223 generates mild, manageable recoil that, with practice, all but guarantees good shooting habits. Its lightweight high velocity bullets slice through the air easily, providing a reasonably flat trajectory, fair wind resistance and ade-

quate downrange energy for its intended target.

The .223's abbreviated size allows it to be housed in everything from single shot break-open handguns to bull-barreled target and dedicated varmint rifles. My personal favorites are a well-used Ruger Mini-14 for coyotegetting and home defense and my inexpensive but deadly accurate Stevens 200 bolt gun. This one keeps the ground squirrels and rock chucks on the lookout.

So if you're in the market for an economical precision small game, varmint, or home defense piece, you might want to consider joining the ranks of .223 Remington aficionados. Like ground squirrels these days, they seem to be everywhere. Good shooting!

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U. of Tenn. experts map out whitewater for good fish habitat

ONEIDA, Tenn. - There were plenty of rapids, but this was no recreational whitewater run. With \$20,000 worth of camera equipment on board, there was a strong incentive to remain upright.

Think of it as cartography from a kayak.


In the lead boat was an underwater video camera and a surface video camera that ran continuously while Bryan McConkey, a graduate student at the University of Tennessee, paddled down North White Oak Creek.

Following in the second kayak was Paul Ayers, a professor of biosystems engineering and soil science at UT who is working with the National Park Service to develop 21st-century maps of the streams of the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area and the Obed Wild and Scenic River.

The purpose of the stream mapping is to identify good habitat for freshwater mussels and rare fishes. The project uses an innovative underwater video system that takes Global Positioning and stores it continuously on the audio track of the DVD as the kayak floats down river.

Simultaneously, the river's surface features are recorded using a similar geo-referenced video camera. From the video footage shot so far, biologists already know that the deepest pool in the Big South Fork is 60 feet deep, and that the average depth of nearly all the polls is 35 feet.

Five habitat attributes are gleaned from the video footage: flow characteristics of the river (pool, run, riffle); the type of substrate (slab rock, cobble, gravel, sand or silt); the embeddedness of the substrate; the presence of coal contamination; and river depth.

Historically, the Big South Fork River inside the park contained 71 species of mussels. Today, 26 mussel species live in the river, along with three species of federally endangered fish.

The video footage taken from the kayak presents a virtual tour of the stream. Advocates of the system say it's an inexpensive way to map long stretches of river, and it's a lot quicker than snorkeling with an underwater camera.

Giant spots dim the light of this fast-spinning star

n 1612 Galileo correctly interpreted sunspots as features on the sun's surface, not intervening orbiting bodies as was previously believed.

Four centuries of intervening sunspot observations have found that the largest ones typically comprise no more than 1/400th of the sun's face.

Spots are expressions of a star's magnetic field, powered in part by its rotation. The sun's magnetic field, although vastly larger than Earth's. is only a little stronger, because the sun only rotates on its axis about once per month. Faster rotating stars can have considerably stronger magnetic fields.

One example is Cor Caroli, the brightest star in the constellation of Canes Venatici, the Hunting Dogs. It's currently high overhead around 10 p.m, about 15 degrees - or three-quarters of the width of your hand at arm's length with fingers outstretched - south of the end of the Big Dipper's handle.

Cor Caroli is actually a binary star. The brighter component is the prototype of a class of variable stars known as the Alpha-2 Canum Venaticorum stars. Despite being 260 percent wider than the sun, Cor Caroli rotates almost five times faster, and its magnetic field is 1,500 times stronger. Its "star spots" are large enough to dim Cor Caroli by 15 percent. At 110 light years, or 700 trillion miles, Cor Caroli is too far away for photos to reveal its spots – their existence is inferred entirely from the





Lack of asthma symptoms leaves triathlete wondering

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 47-year-old female amateur triathlete in very good health. I take meloxicam for chronic bursitis in my heels, but that is all. I was quite surprised at my last physical to be diagnosed with asthma, since I had no symptoms. My doctor had me get a chest X-ray, which showed inflammation. She then had me get a pul-



monary-function test, which showed improvement with medication. She

told me to use an inhaler as needed.

How do I know when I need an inhaler if I feel no symptoms? Is it safe to assume my asthma is not serious if I don't experience anything? Besides, if the asthma is so mild, why is it showing up in all these tests?

DEAR READER: Most people with asthma attacks

experience wheezing, long-term shortness of breath, chest tightness, nasal flaring, prolonged exhalation, chest pain, abnormal breathing patterns and cough. Some may have a personal or family history of hay fever or eczema. I find it interesting that you've had no symptoms and that you remain so active.

Asthma is a chronic lung disease that is caused by airway inflammation. People of all ages can be affected; however, the condition often begins in childhood. Of the 22 million people in the United States that carry the diagnosis, more than 25 percent of them are children.

When an attack occurs, the muscles that surround the airways become tight, causing the lining of the passages to swell. This results in the familiar wheeze associated with the condition. Triggers include mold, pollen, airborne chemicals, dust, animal dander and tobacco.

Recognizing and avoiding triggers are the first
