Legislative lightning round

Lawmakers scramble with adjournment expected today

By Jared S. Hopkins Times-News writer

BOISE - Rushing to finish the 2009 Legislature and avoid setting the record for the longest session ever. lawmakers hustled Thursday to tie up any loose ends in legislation — and ended up having to fix some that unraveled in the process.

Legislators on Wednesday announced a multipart transportation funding deal reached with Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter intended to end the session, which would tie the longest ever if

it lasts until Saturday. On Thursday, they raced toward adjournment rewriting bills introduced just hours before, tearing through hearings on bills and even stopping a floor debate for 30 minutes to review the legality of a bill.

Still, the expectation from nearly every lawmaker is to finish today. The Senate meets at 9 a.m. The House meets at 10 a.m.

"I hope there's no snags," said House Majority Leader Mike Movle, R-Star, "Keep your fingers crossed."

Both the Senate and House worked late into Thursday evening, with the House grinding until 6:30 p.m., the Senate an hour more. Closed-door meetings — a staple in these final days of the Legislature were held to hammer out

"We prepared affidavits to that effect," said Twin Falls Police Department Capt. Matt Hicks. "We feel the charges are warranted."

Twin Falls Police Chief James Munn Jr. agreed. "I do News to reach Gambrel on believe there was probable cause that these offenses were committed," said Munn, adding "guilt or innocence is not my call, that's the call of the court."

Munn said city police officers met in groups to discuss charges against Gambrel. "They (officers) were devastated by this ... It takes time for it to heal, but we will." During Gambrel's 22-year

Loebs said he is not concerned that cases Gambrel worked on as a police officer could be challenged if he is convicted of a felony. "There would have to be some showing that there was some effect on a case, from some conduct that he (Gambrel) did that was improper," Loebs said.

Other people besides Gambrel were named in the allegations against Sund. They have not been charged with crimes, Loebs con-

According to Idaho Peace from Gambrel's wife in 2005. Officer Standards and Training, Gambrel is not currently employed in law enforcement in the state.

POST Director Jeff Black said an investigation into Gambrel's peace officer certification could ensue. "We will open an investigation as soon as the criminal charges are resolved."

The Idaho Board of Pharmacy and the DEA received numerous complaints about Sund almost seven years ago, according to court records. "The complaints ranged from allegations that she was splitting prescriptions with her patients to practicing as a nurse practitioner while impaired," court records show.

also got a tip about Sund 3380.

She wrote a letter to the board "stating Sund was over-prescribing pain medication for her husband, Curtis Gambrel." The letter also said Sund was "abusing her prescribing rights" and "receiving kickbacks from patients," according to court records.

Sund surrendered her controlled substance registration by October 2007 and has a sentencing hearing set for July 10.

Gambrel is ordered to appear in court May 27. The felony prescription crimes each carry punishments of up to four years in prison. Loebs confirmed.





It's not a great compromise, but it's a compromise

he "going-home" bill finally emerged in the Idaho Legislature on Wednesday, the com-promise that is supposed to send lawmakers packing after 17 weeks.

There's no gas tax increase, as Gov. Butch Otter had wished, but instead a pastiche of legislation designed to raise \$57 million for highway repair funding. The governor had wanted at least \$75 million.

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The deal's essential elements include:

- Higher administrative fees for the Division of Motor Vehicles -\$13.1 million
- Removal of the ethanol tax exemption — \$16.4 million
- Shifting funding from Idaho State Police to the general fund in fiscal year 2011 – \$16.4 million
- Eliminating funding to Parks and Recreation from the gasoline tax - \$4.83 million
- Allowing out-of-state trailers to be registered in Idaho — \$2 million to \$5 million

The key element in that package is the shift in ISP funding away from the Highway Distribution Account - money earmarked primarily for roads — to the General Fund.

The General Fund, a \$2.7 billion kitty of tax revenue that pays for basic government, is a more appropriate place for an essential public need such as the state police. Trouble is, education, health and welfare and most other state services are paid for through the General Fund, which means that cops on the street could be competing with textbooks in the classroom for scarce dollars.

To avoid that in the long run, the Legislature has set up a task force to "identify alternative dedicated funding sources for the Idaho State Police and for the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation on an ongoing basis to offset those funds shifted away ... to fund transportation." It will include three members of the House and three from the Senate, plus the co-chairmen of the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

There's a second task force in the works to look into modernizing transportation funding in Idaho. It's inevitable that among its recommendations will be raising the gasoline tax and probably vehicle registration fees as well.

But those alternatives simply weren't going to happen this session. At some point, the practical argument over whether now was the time to raise fuel taxes turned into a philosophical dispute between the House and the gover-

So at minimum, Idaho will have \$57 million to fix the roads — all earmarked for the Idaho Transportation Department (another \$17 million in federal stimulus money is likely to go the highway districts). That's not enough to put much of a dent is a backlog of highway repairs that now stands at between \$140 million and \$240 million, but it's sure better than nothing — which is what the Legislature appropriated for road repairs last

And it's sufficient, mercifully, to send this session of the Legislature home.

The most aggravating aspect of this compromise is that it contains nothing, at the 116th day of the session, that couldn't have been agreed upon after the 89th day, when the House defeated a 2 cents gas tax increase proposal. At \$30,000 a day, the difference cost Idaho taxpayers \$810,000.

In a recession, that's just too much investment in stubbornness and ego.

Who's to blame? For starters, Countrywide

f there was ever an economic climate in which to play the Blame Game for the financial meltdown of the century, we're wallowing in it.

Time magazine not long ago published its "25 People to Blame for the Financial Crisis." It caught my eye, I must admit, if only to rant about the choices. No. 1 on the Time list is former Texas Sen. Phil Gramm, the same chap who last summer said we were in a "mental recession" and that we have "sort of become a nation of whiners."

At No. 3 is Angelo Mozilo, founder and former chief of the nation's biggest lender of subprime mortgages, Countrywide Financial. Bank of America bought Countrywide and is busy changing its name to a brand less tainted by irresponsible lending.

Mozilo's in great demand. Florida Attorney General Bill McCollum says Mozilo and Countrywide violated the state's deceptive trade practices act by placing consumers in loans they could not afford or with false or misleading rates. He wants Mozilo to come testify in a Florida court.

Which brings us to newer take on the Blame Game. An investigative report called Who's Behind

the Financial Meltdown? was issued this week by the Center for Public Integrity. It identifies the top 25 originators of high-interest subprime loans, accounting for nearly \$1 trillion, from 2005 through 2007.

Who's No. 1? Countrywide.

The nonprofit, nonpartisan center focuses on investigative research on public policy issues. It's backed by the Carnegie Corp. of New York, the Ford Foundation and the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, among other groups.

Here's what's most disturbing. All 25 of the top subprime lenders were mortgage companies like Countrywide, Ameriquest Mortgage and New Century Financial. They existed to make lots of mortgages but relied on someone else to provide their funding actual cash and capital to back mortgages they made.

It turns out that many of the companies funding these subprime mortgage lenders are the giant banks that are now getting bailed out with federal taxpayer and TARP funds.

The center found at least 21 of the 25 subprime lenders were financed by banks receiving bailout money through direct ownership, credit agreements, or buying loans for securitization.

"The mega-banks that funded the subprime industry were not victims of an unforeseen financial collapse, as they have sometimes portrayed themselves," says Center for Public Integrity director Bill Buzenberg. "These banks were deliberate enablers that bankrolled the type of lending that's now threatening the financial system."

According to the center's report, "U.S. and European

investment banks invested enormous sums in subprime lending due to unceasing demand for high-yield, high-risk bonds backed by home mortgages. The banks made huge profits while their executives collected handsome bonuses until the bottom fell out of the real estate market."

Investment banks Lehman Brothers, Merrill Lynch, JP Morgan & Co., and Citigroup Inc. owned and financed subprime lenders. Others, like Credit Suisse First Boston and Goldman Sachs, were big backers of subprime lenders.

Bailouts for the very clowns who fumbled this from the start? Unleash the dogs!

No retreat from No Child Left Behind

tudent achievement results from the "nation's report card" published last week show that we are on the right track. Since enactment of the bipartisan No Child Left Behind Act, which called for all students to be on grade level in reading and math by 2014, students have been making progress in reading and math in elementary and middle school. Improvement has been greatest for African American and Hispanic students and those students who are lowestachieving.

But in our high schools, the National Assessment of Educational Progress data tell a troubling story, especially in light of our need to compete in a global knowl-

edge economy. Scores continue to be flat for 17 year olds in both reading and math over the almost 30-year history of the test. We know that only half of African American and Hispanic students graduate from high school on time. Yet policy-makers have not had the courage to use the real accountability that is working in our elementary and middle schools in our high schools.

It's no accident that the

United States has had nine straight years of increasing scores for elementary school students. In the decades before No Child Left Behind was signed into law in 2002 and the state reforms that led to it, taxpavers spent hundreds of billions of dollars on education and hoped for the best. Since No Child Left Behind, we have expected results. The law required that every student in grades three through eight be assessed annually in reading and math, that those results be disaggregated and that the information be provided to educators and parents. And that is exactly the age group for which we are seeing results. Consider: In the 10 years since 1999, reading scores for 9 year olds have risen eight points; in the nearly three decades before that, scores rose only four points. In the past 10 years, math scores have increased 11 points, while in the nearly three decades prior, scores rose only 13 points.

Teachers and principals who have embraced accountability have made these increases possible. And while this is good progress, we should not be satisfied. The achievement gap continues to plague our country. Because of the state and federal assessment data we now have, we know precisely which districts, schools, teachers and students need help and which are doing well. We've diagnosed the problem the approximately 4,000 schools that have failed to meet their annual goals for five straight years and the 2,000 high schools that produce more than half of all dropouts. Now we have to deal with those chronically low-performing schools — the ones that need more than just tinkering around the edges.

That's why it is troubling that instead of fixing our lowest-performing schools, policy-makers are diverting their attention toward discussing the need to raise standards to international levels. Do a significant number of states need to raise the bar? Yes, and I am hopeful that this rhetoric will lead to better, clearer, higher expectations for every student. I'm also for more sophisticated ways of from 2005 to 2009.

measuring achievement and rewarding teachers who do the hardest work and get results. But we must not let up on an accountability approach that is showing results. As we focus on raising the bar, we must work urgently to turn around the schools that don't even meet minimal standards.

In the coming months, we will hear discussions about postponing gradelevel achievement for all students by 2014. We will hear calls for more resources beyond the \$100 billion in education funding in the federal stimulus package. We will hear that America cannot make further improvements in education until we spend more on the social safety net. We will hear lots of talk that, when boiled down, amounts to retreat from meaningful accountability and would delay requirements that our kids perform on grade level. Turning our attention away from the problem at hand will only slow down or stop the gains we are seeing across the country. Our children deserve better than that.

America's shame: 14-year-old prostitutes

TLANTA – Jasmine Caldwell was 14 and selling sex on the streets when an opportunity arose to escape her pimp: An undercover policeman picked her up.

The cop could have rescued her from the pimp, who ran a string of 13 girls and took every cent they earned. If the cop had taken Jasmine to a shelter, she could have resumed her education and tried to put her life back in order.

Instead, the policeman showed her his handcuffs and threatened to send her to prison. Terrified, she cried and pleaded not to be jailed. Then, she said, he offered to release her in exchange for sex.

Afterward, the policeman returned her to the street. Then her pimp beat her up for failing to collect any money.

"That happens a lot," said Jasmine, who is now 21. "The cops sometimes just want to blackmail you into having

I've often reported on sex trafficking in other countries, and that has made me curious about the situation here in the United States. Prostitution in America isn't as brutal as it is in, say, India, Nepal, Pakistan, Cambodia and Malaysia (where young girls are routinely kidnapped, imprisoned and tortured by brothel owners, occasionally even killed). But the scene on American streets is still appalling and it continues largely because neither the authorities nor society as a whole show much interest in 14year-old girls pimped on the

streets.

If a middle-class white girl goes missing, radio stations broadcast amber alerts, and cable TV fills the air with "missing beauty" updates. But 13-year-old black or Latina girls from poor neighborhoods vanish all the time, and the pimps are among the few people who show any interest.

These domestic girls are often runaways or those called "throwaways" by social workers: teenagers who fight with their parents and are then kicked out of the home. These girls tend to be much younger than the women trafficked from abroad and, as best I can tell, are more likely to be controlled by force.

Pimps are not the business partners they purport to be. They typically take every penny the girls earn. They work the girls seven nights a week. They sometimes tattoo their girls the way ranch-

ers brand their cattle, and they back up their business

model with fists and threats.
"If you don't earn enough
money, you get beat," said
Jasmine, an AfricanAmerican who has turned
her life around with the help
of Covenant House, an
organization that works with

children on the street.

The business model of pimping is remarkably similar whether in Atlanta or Calcutta: Take vulnerable, disposable girls whom nobody cares about, use a mix of "friendship," humiliation, beatings, narcotics and threats to break the girls and induce 100 percent compliance, and then rent out their body parts.

It's not solely violence that keeps the girls working for their pimps. Jasmine fled an abusive home at age 13, and she said she — like most girls — stayed with the pimp mostly because of his emotional manipulation. "I thought he loved me, so I wanted to be around him," she said.

That's common. Girls who are starved of self-esteem finally meet a man who showers them with gifts, drugs and dollops of affection. That, and a lack of alternatives, keeps them working for him — and if that isn't enough, he shoves a gun in the girl's mouth and threatens to kill her.

Solutions are complicated and involve broader efforts to overcome urban poverty, including improving schools

and attempting to shore up the family structure. But a first step is to stop treating these teenagers as criminals and focusing instead on arresting the pimps and the customers — and the corrupt cops.

"The problem isn't the girls in the streets; it's the men in the pews," notes Stephanie Davis, who has worked with Mayor Shirley Franklin to help coordinate a campaign to get teenage prostitutes off the streets.

Two amiable teenage prostitutes, working without a pimp for the "fast money," told me that there will always be women and girls selling sex voluntarily. They're probably right. But we can significantly reduce the number of 14-year-old girls who are terrorized by pimps and raped by many men seven nights a week. That's doable, if it's a national priority, if we're willing to create the equivalent of a nationwide amber alert.

To save jobs, kill the death tax

ew taxes raise less revenue or make less sense than the federal estate tax. It is scheduled to be eliminated temporarily — for 2010 — only to reappear in 2011, and it has been a sore spot to family business owners since its inception. Research shows that these concerns are legitimate — and, if anything, understated.

Faced with the sunset provision, the White House would like to lock in the current tax rate permanently — 45 percent of total assets over \$3.5 million at the time of death. At the same time, some members of Congress are pressing to raise the rate and lower the exclusion, while others would like to do just the reverse.

One thing's for sure: Something needs to be done. The uncertainty helps no one.

In this instance, policy-makers should put aside partisanship and politics and base their decisions on what we know about how the estate tax affects the economy.

We know that high estate-tax rates provide small-business owners

to limit the size of their companies. Why would a business owner want to expand his or her company beyond a certain size if the end result would be a large "death tax" bill that would negate much of the hard work and sacrifices the owner and the owner's family made?

We know, too, that many business owners, faced with the tax, will make the rational decision to spend their business's profits rather than reinvest in the company.

We also know that if profits aren't being pumped back into businesses, and the businesses aren't growing, they also are not hiring.

All this is important.
According to a recent survey by the Robert H. Smith School of Business at the University of Maryland and Network Solutions of Herndon, Va., even as the

economy was plummeting last year, about 69 percent of small businesses were

reporting profits.

Today, the roughly 27 million small businesses in the United States employ more than 40 million workers, according to the Census Bureau. Some estimates place the total number of employees closer to 50 million.

Using a back-of-theenvelope calculation, if just a fraction of the profitable small businesses — say 1 in 10 — added just one additional employee in the coming year, we would be talking about the creation of more than 1.8 million jobs.

But, because of estate taxes, the incentive for many small businesses is to not expand, even in good times.

If lawmakers are really concerned about creating jobs, eliminating the estate tax would be a sensible next step.

California wildfire burns 75 homes in Santa Barbara

The fire was just the latest to ravage the area known as the American Riviera, home to screen stars, former presidents and Oprah Winfrey. The blaze reached the burn area of another wildfire that destroyed about 200 homes Santa Barbara and Montecito.





But warehouse store operator Costco Wholesale Corp. reported a deeper-thanexpected same-store sales drop, hurt by the closing of its stores on Easter.

"I think we are seeing signs of stabilization that is taking hold," said Michael Dart, senior partner at consulting firm Kurt Salmon Associates. "But this will be a long, drawn-out recovery, rather than a quick rebound" amid a litany of economic problems.

Wal-Mart is continuing to take market share away from rivals as shoppers look for deals in the recession. Grocery, health and wellness products, entertainment and home furnishings were among its best-selling items.

Wal-Mart reported a 5 percent same-store sales gain, much better than the 2.9 percent increase that analysts surveyed by Thomson Reuters had expected. That excludes fuel sales. But Castro-Wright said the second quarter

Obama touts \$17B in cuts to budget

WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON - President Obama sent Congress a detailed budget Thursday boasting of cutting or killing 121 federal programs in a belt-tightening he likened to that of most Americans in difficult times. But the trims amounted to a tiny fraction of the new spending he wants, and some have already been nixed by allies on Capitol Hill.

Obama said his cuts would amount to \$17 billion — in a budget totaling well over \$3 trillion for the fiscal year that Peterson, the brash, mustabegins in October. He's estimating the government's red ink will still be about \$1.2 trillion, down only slightly from disappearance more than 1 this year's all-time record.

Republicans scoffed that Obama's cuts were not nearly death of a former wife found enough. - The home also features original Sears, Roebuck-produced door frames. The wooden frames have intricately sculptured details throughout and are prominent in the home's sitting room, parlor and din-
- Speaking of the dining room, closed to the public until this weekend, watch for the built-in China hutch telling of the century-old architec-
- The stairway leading to the second story is also an indicator of building practices prominent during the time: steep and narrow. Take them anyway, and enjoy Victorian pastel paint adorning the many bedrooms on the second floor.
- Original Stricker furniture is salted throughout the home, giving an intimate look into daily life on this prominent Magic Valley frontier prop-

Official says 147 die in U.S.-Taliban clash

KABUL - Sobbing relatives showed U.S. and Xe's contract for Baghdad Afghan investigators the demolished buildings and graves in two western villages where a local official Canopy, was taking over. said Thursday he collected the names of 147 people killed in a disputed incident involving American forces and Taliban militants.

If local reports of the death toll are confirmed, it would be the deadliest case of civilian casualties in Afghanistan since the 2001 U.S.-led invasion that ousted the Taliban regime.

Although the results of the joint U.S.-Afghan investigation were not expected to be announced until today, Afghans blamed U.S. bombing raids for the deaths in the villages of Ganjabad and Gerani. In the capital of Farah province, where the fighting took place, some 150 stone-throwing protesters chanted "Death to America"

and clashed with police. The large number of civilian deaths comes at an awkward time for the Obama administration, as it steps up its military campaign here while emphasizing the importance of nonmilitary efforts to stabilize the country. President Barack Obama expressed sympathy over the loss of life in a White House meeting Wednesday with Afghan President Hamid Karzai, who contends that such killings undermine support for the fight against

the Taliban. Defense Secretary Robert Gates, whose two-day visit in Afghanistan was overshadowed by the case, offered a new expression of U.S. regret for the deaths but stopped short of taking blame. U.S. officials maintained that the Taliban might have been responsible for at least some of the deaths.

IRAQ **Embattled security** firm exits Baghdad

BAGHDAD American security firm once known as Blackwater ended its operations in the diplomatic hub of Baghdad on Thursday, bringing to a close a bitter chapter in U.S.-Iraqi relations that began with a deadly shooting by its contractors.

Iraqis welcomed the departure from the capital of the company, which has protected American diplomats in Iraq since the start of the war in 2003. The company, which has changed its name to Xe, will continue to have guards in some southern areas and to run its aviation service and through September.

The end of the firm's Baghdad operations comes nearly two years after the Iraqi government first demanded it leave after the September 2007 shooting on a busy square in central Baghdad that left as many as 17 Iraqi civilians dead.

West found the only lead to give South a problem in his contract of four spades — namely, a trump. With any other attack, declarer wins, plays ace and another club and, when on play again, a third club. If the club suit fails to break 3-3. South's fourth club can be ruffed in dummy.

It is always difficult to reject a good plan when circumstances render it unlikely to succeed. But South appreciated that the plan of playing on clubs was unlikely to work unless they broke favorably, as the lead must be lost twice, and two further trump returns would denude dummy of ruffing values.

The winning line was perhaps more elegant than taking the club ruff in dummy, but just as sure to come home. It involves a dummy reversal — declarer taking three ruffs in the South hand. Declarer carefully won the opening trump lead in hand with the ace. Then the ace and king of hearts were cashed, a diamond played to dummy's ace, and a heart ruffed high. Another diamond followed, and on winning, West returned another trump. This was won in dummy and a diamond was ruffed. (Notice that care was needed when winning the opening lead and when ruffing a heart, that dummy's trump entry was not compromised.)

Now a club to dummy's ace and a further diamond ruff brought the tally to nine. Although the South hand is now bereft of trumps, the master spade remaining in dummy is the 10th trick.

ANSWER: Your partner's action shows a hand with a long and good club suit. And since a jump to three clubs at his first turn would have been pre-emptive, it makes sense for this sequence to show an opening bid. Having established that, you seem to have enough to raise to three clubs, since you have a decent hand and good club support.
