Gambrel booked on felony charges

Former T.F. detective faces five prescription drug charges

By Andrea Jackson Times-News writer

He arrested people for 22 years, but on Wednesday, deputies booked Curtis Gambrel into the Twin Falls County Jail on felony pre-

scription drug charges. The retired Twin Falls Police Department detective was arraigned in Twin Falls 5th District Court for two counts of conspiracy to obtain a prescription by fraud, and three counts of obtaining a prescription by fraud. He faces up to four years in prison on each count.

Gambrel, 44, retired from the force more than two years ago. But while still a police officer, he allegedly obtained medically unnecessary prescriptions for oxycodone and hydrocodone from a former area nurse practitioner, Jan Sund, according to court records.

Gambrel allegedly split between January 2005 and ed out by a deputy for book-April 2, 2007, according to ing at the jail.

He was charged about a week after Sund, 55, pleaded guilty on April 30 to two counts of prescription fraud conspiracy and two counts of prescription fraud. At her plea hearing Sund told the court: "I wrote a prescription for hydrocodone and Curtis (Gambrel) filled it and split it with me."

Αt Wednesday, Gambrel sat beside a handcuffed female inmate and said little, but acknowledged he understood his rights and waived a reading of the charges against him.

Gambrel was summoned into court for the quick hearing, and when it ended the drugs with Sund he was immediately escort-

The Ada County Sheriff's records. his arraignment Office gave the criminal complaint against Gambrel to his Boise-based lawyer, though there was no arrest ment. or bond set.

Because of a potential Falls County prosecutors asked Ada County authorities to handle the case. But it is "unknown to the court" what agency originated the case, according to court



Despite a drop in donations and participants, the Western Days parade is scheduled for this Saturday and organizers are optimistic the Twin Falls event will be a success.



Sheriff Tom Carter presented the award to Vaughan for his assistance with an elderly man diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. The elderly man had gone missing from a Twin Falls care facility on April 10 several hours before Vaughan saw the man and stopped to help

While authorities were searching for the man, Vaughan observed an elderly man while driving on Fillmore Street in Twin Falls. Vaughan said the man appeared to be trying to cross Filer Avenue at rush hour. After realizing that things "just weren't right," Vaughan decided to turn around and help the man cross the street. Vaughan realized immediately that the man was extremely disoriented and confused.

"After talking to him for a second, I got the idea he didn't know where he had been or where he was going," said Vaughan.

Vaughan then helped the man to his car where he tried to get more information from him. The elderly man eventually gave Vaughan a telephone number which he called. The people who answered the call told Vaughan they would be there right away.

Soon after Vaughn made the call, the officers who had been searching for the man arrived and he was returned to his care facility unharmed.



Deliberations postponed on Quigley Canyon

HAILEY – Extending what has already been a long process, the Hailey City Council on Tuesday postponed the start of deliberations on whether or not to annex Quigley Canyon, a large project that would include 377 homes, a golf course and Nordic center.

The council also heard public complaints that the hearing process has not been clear enough or provided enough information on the city's Web site.

Some of the complaints were about unadvertised meetings designed to give staff and the applicant additional opportunities to hash out specifics on issues like water and wastewater. The results of these meetings were described on Tuesday night, but not in great detail.

"I don't view this as full disclosure," said Marty Flannes during the public comment portion of the hearing. "I ask you to reconsider the closed-door process."

Others said that repeatcancellations rescheduling of meetings on specific issues like water have made it difficult to make their opinions

detail, the council has said it wishes to have as much these issues in order to make the best decision for

the city. Because of the level of detail being discussed, though, some in the audience said they feel annexation is all but a

"The rest falls away unless we can work that out," said Councilwoman Martha Burke.



In bad economy, more counties join Rx discount plan

BOISE – As the recession cent. continues and jobless ranks swell, more U.S. counties are joining a prescription drug discount program counties that's saved uninsured and underinsured residents \$179 million on medications since 2005, the National Association of Counties

Ada County, Idaho's most populous, became the latest to sign on Wednesday, joining 25 others in the state and about 1,250 across the nation already enrolled. Neighboring Canyon County, which joined Feb. 17, reports people using the drug discount cards there have saved an average of \$9 per prescription, or nearly 22 percent.

The National Association of Counties, which runs the program with pharmacv giant CVS Caremark Corp., based in Rhode Island, said about 60,000 U.S. pharmacies nationwide, or 90 percent of the total, accept the cards.

There are no age or income eligibility requirements, but the cards, which are free to consumers, can't be used with other drug discount programs.

People with prescription coverage can use them for drug purchases not covered by their insurance policies. Customers can save on brand name drugs as well as generics.

They can also use them for some prescriptions for pets. Savings can be 50 percent on some generic drug

Program lets inmates make suplies for grade schools

POCATELLO (AP) new program at the Women's Pocatello Correctional Center in eastern Idaho has inmates making teaching materials for local elementary schools from donated items.

"There are women who will be here for the rest of their lives, and they're excited to give back to the community;" inmate Denise Whittle, 40, told the Idaho State Journal.

Called Teaching with Conviction, the program lets inmates make needed items for Tendoy and Jefferson elementary schools.

Tami Romriell, an administrative assistant at the prison, came up with the idea. She said many local teachers are faced with budget shortfalls and can't afford some school supplies.

"We thought we might be able to take that load off of them and be able to have the inmates stay busy with this," Romriell said.

Inmates are making items such as school supply bags, flip charts to help students learn to read, and pillows children can sit on during story time.

Whittle makes a handmade booklet for students.

"It's a homework log," she said. "That keeps them accountable and starts teaching them responsibility at a young age, which is really important?"

Another inmate, Anna Conley, 38, cut shapes from construction paper to be used as templates for puppets.

"We can do this to help teachers out and make it easier (for them) and make it easier for the kids to learn," Conley said.

Romriell said the program needs more donations to make more school supply bags and pillows.

"The real success of this program will depend on the donations we receive from the community," Romriell said. "Based on what we receive, we hope to be able to create something that students can use in the classroom."

Items needed, she said, include fabric, construction paper, and cardstock.



Hospital, county finally resolve clinic dispute

t took a lot of lawyering and a fair amount of public officials' time, but Twin Falls County and St. Luke's Magic Valley finally resolved their dispute Wednesday over who's picking up the tab for remodeling the old Magic Valley Clinic and Hospital in

downtown Twin Falls. The building was transferred to the county in the 2006 sale of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center to Boise-based St. Luke's Health System.

In essence, St. Luke's agreed to pay the county \$1.6 million more than it had already committed in order to settle the clinic controversy and other issues.

So why did this dispute take 17 months, the services of a mediator and thousands of dollars in legal costs to resolve? Partly because of the complexity of the agreement that grew out of voter-approved sale of the hospital three years ago. The language of the compact didn't foresee every contin-

Even so, it's clear that some egos got in the way. Matters came to a head on Jan. 11, 2008, when county officials changed the locks on four offices on the clinic's second floor and hospital officials called the Twin Falls Police Department to escort Commissioner Tom Mikesell off the premises.

At issue was sales agreement language that required St. Luke's to contribute \$3 million of in-kind services for the remodel at a maximum of \$45 per square-foot.

The parties disagreed about just what the section required, but Wednesday's compromise made it moot: To resolve the

matter, St. Luke's will give roughly \$4.6 million to the county for remodeling, and the county in turn will release the hospital from the previous requirements. The extra \$1.6 million is new money, said hospital CEO Mark Schwartz.

Wednesday's deal does resolve some potential thorny issues:

- It further refines what indigent medical fees and charges count toward a roughly \$1 million cap on such expenses. Any excess is refunded to the coun-
- It alters the sales agreement's restrictions on competition to allow Twin Falls County to develop its own inpatient adolescent mental-health program. In turn, St. Luke's - which closed its adolescent inpatient program in August 2007 – is released from any obligation for such a service.
- County officials won't ask St. Luke's for more money to renovate or demolish the current hospital once it's vacated. Currently, \$1.5 million is held in escrow to assist with the work.
- The official process for resolving disputes now includes an initial six-month period for both parties to work out problems before other steps are neces-
- It releases both parties from any liability for events leading up to the revisions, and prevents future lawsuits over the matter.

The covenant was the result of hard work by hospital officials and by Commissioners George Urie and Terry Kramer, who worked to restore the lines of communication.

The result is a good deal for the county that allows St. Luke's to concentrate on running a hospital and building its replacement.

Reforms greatly improve Open Meeting Law

ou probably couldn't tell from the piece on this page by Tom Grote on Wednesday that virtually every news media organization in Idaho supported and applauded the passage of the important reforms to the Idaho Open Meeting Law this year — in fact, we helped write them.

The bill, sponsored by Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden, fixed our open meeting law after an Idaho Supreme Court decision in 2007 blew a giant hole in it.

Here's what happened: In State vs. Yzaguirre, an Ada County case, the Idaho Supreme Court gave a new and very different meaning to the word "knowingly" as used in the law, creating an incentive for ignorance. If a public official didn't know the Idaho open meeting law, then he or she couldn't

"knowingly" violate it.
As a reporter for *The* Spokesman-Review, I filed an open meeting complaint last year against the State Board of Education. Our attorney general conducted an extensive investigation, but concluded that while the board may have violated the law, he couldn't prove that they'd done so "know-

ingly" under the court's new interpretation.

This validated the fears of many open government advocates after the Supreme Court decision – that the law had been essentially emasculated.

After the Board of Ed case, Attorney General Wasden's office contacted various stakeholders, including myself, other media representatives, representatives of local governments including cities, counties and prosecutors, and many others, to work on improvements to our open meeting law. The result was SB1142. I can't say that I love every piece of this bill, nor do the local government interests; but I can say that on balance, it's a good package of reforms that fixes the "knowingly" problem; clarifies exemptions that have been construed over-broadly; and clears up murky language to that agendas are changed make clear what's required,

the sanctions are. Among the media organ-

izations endorsing the bill were the Idaho Press Club; the Idaho Allied Daily Newspapers; and IDOG, or Idahoans for Openness in Government, whose board includes representatives of the state's broadcasters and other journalism organizations (Mr. Grote is a member of the board), as well as civic groups like the League of Women Voters.

The meat of the bill is fixing the "knowingly" problem by setting up a new two-tiered violation system. This allows all violations to be sanctioned, but sets a very low fine of up to \$50 for the first-time, inadvertent violation. The more egregious, knowing or repeated violations would bring fines of up to \$500.

SB1142 also makes several other changes, most of them clarifying previously unclear language. While I don't like the idea of agendas being changed during a meeting, our current law allows them to be changed "up to and including the hour of the meeting." Reporters in Idaho know all the time, and no reason

what's forbidden, and what is given. The interpretation of the "hour of the meeting" language has led to agenda changes during the meeting, during the first hour of the meeting, and so


The new law allows agenda changes during meetings, but only with a statement of a good-faith reason for the change, a motion, and a majority vote on the record. Good-faith is important here. It would be bad faith to change an agenda in order to make a decision without the public being present or knowing about it in advance. That would be a violation of the Open Meeting Law – a knowing violation, subject to the higher fine of up to \$500. While I might prefer to allow no changes to agendas for any reason, the bill as written provides far greater transparency than our current law.


The bill passed overwhelmingly in both houses and the governor signed it into law; it takes effect July 1.


Just three cities in Idaho operate with city-manager forms of government. They are Lewiston, McCall and Twin Falls.

nial duties by making him or her just one of a 5member or 7-member city council.

They also argue that the city-manager form improves efficiency by moving responsibility for day-to-day management from a mayor to a professional administrator. Yet, Ketchum already employs a professional administrator, albeit one far less powerful than one under the city manager system ...

The dilemma posed by a city manager system is that it could be a system in which accountability becomes so diffuse that no one is really in charge at City Hall ...

Shareholders have spoken truth to Idaho Power Co. They told the state's preeminent electric utility to green up - and ASAP. A shareholder resolution, passed Thursday, gives Idaho Power until Sept. 30 to spell out specific plans to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Good advice ... Idaho Power has been going in this direction, but not quickly enough to suit the groups that successfully pushed the resolution. They recognized the tenuous situation facing Idaho Power – and, by extension, its 487,000 customers.

At a time when green power is becoming a national imperative, Idaho Power needs to find new sources of electricity. In 2008, the utility produced only 79 percent of its

power in-house. And even though Idaho Power operates a string of hydroelectric plants along the Snake River ... the utility derives as much as 53 percent of its electricity from coal ...

... shareholders did Idaho Power a favor. This resolution should empower Idaho Power to make decisions that make sense for the company and for Idaho.

Conservation programs and green power production are best for the utility's long-term health. They will also best serve a state that must compete for jobs — while expanding an energy portfolio already struggling to meet existing demand.

... Shifting to greener power would likely result in a rate increase. But ... Idaho Power rates rank ninthlowest in the nation ...

The issue comes down to timing. Does Idaho Power do the right thing now, or does it wait until later? Company officials have said they want to wait and see the final version of a climate change bill.

Backers of the resolution offered a better idea, urging Idaho Power to get out ahead of the ever-growing demand for renewable power. And they received a startling and unprecedented 52 percent vote of confidence

The rise of anti-government feeling

mericans should look carefully at the anti-politician, anti-government mood exhibited in California last week. Just as Proposition 13 and the anti-tax movement of 1978 were the forerunners of the Reagan presidential victory, so the results of Tuesday's vote are a harbinger of things to

The repudiation of the the series of initiative defeats could hardly have been more decisive. Five taxing and spending measures were rejected by 62.6 to 66.4 percent of the voters. This vote is the second great signal that the American people are getting fed up with corrupt politicians, arrogant bureaucrats, greedy interests and incompetent, destructive government.

The elites ridiculed or ignored the first harbinger of rebellion, the recent tea parties. While it will be harder to ignore this massive anti-tax, anti-spending vote, they will attempt to do just that.

Scientists use tags to track Columbia River salmon

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) Scientists are using acoustic tags to better understand how juvenile salmon and steelhead travel from John Day Dam on the Columbia River to the Pacific Ocean.

Researchers from the Pacific Northwest National Laboratory in Richland and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Portland District are tagging about 240 fish each day over the next several weeks to study why some young fish survive the ocean journey and others perish.

The tagged fish will emit high-pitched beeps that can be picked up by underwater sensors as they approach and pass the dam near Rufus, Ore., the Tri-City Herald reported.

"It tells you how fast (the fish) is moving and which route it is taking," said Geoff McMichael, the PNNL's program manager.

The corps uses the acoustic tagging system as a primary tool to assess juvenile salmon survival in the Columbia River.

Researchers said the tags, which are smaller than pencil erasers and inserted into the belly of juvenile salmon, will help improve salmon passage at the dam.

"It allows us to select the best operation of the dam," balancing demands of fish, power and recreation, said Brad Eppard, a corps fisheries biologist.

UI professor questions money spent in New Mexico

MOSCOW (AP) - The University of Idaho is spending nearly \$400,000 a year to support three employees in New Mexico without any oversight, an electrical engineering professor at the school says.

"I've asked the question of three different university administrators, 'Why do we have an operation in New Mexico, and what are they doing?"' David Egolf told the Lewiston Tribune. "And I've never gotten an answer."

The money for the work in the Albuquerque office comes from the school's Center for Advanced Microelectronics and Biomolecular Research, where a 2005 audit turned up possible wrongdoing.

Jack McIver, UI research vice president, said he is scrutinizing the New Mexico operation.

"I'm looking at what they've been doing over the last couple of years, and whether that is supportable," McIver said. "I've always had problems in my previous jobs with remote sites."

He said researchers in Albuquerque work mainly on computer chip designs.

The research center is being investigated by the Idaho attorney general's office, said Bob Cooper. spokesman for the attorney general. He said he couldn't comment on an active investigation.

The investigation stems from a 2005 audit that found evidence of possible theft, computer crimes, acceptance of rewards by state employees, and criminal nepotism. The audit also found employees were failing to disclose ownership interests in another chip maker, Concise Logic Inc., based in Albuquerque.

McIver said the university now monitors such publicprivate partnerships more closely.





Southern Idaho's Centennial Observatory, the farthest object visible with our 24" telescope is 3C273, an active galactic nucleus, or quasar, which appears as a faint, bluish, star-like dot. But quantifying that distance is somewhat diffi-

For example, Twin Falls and Boise are about 130 miles apart. We might also describe Boise as being two hours away, by which we mean it takes two hours to get there by driving the speed limit.

However, the distance to 3C273 in light years and the time it takes light to reach us are two different numbers.

The reason is because the universe is expanding, causing the distances between objects on extragalactic scales to constantly increase. So, in our terrestrial analogy, replace the solid earth with a giant "earth-balloon" being steadily inflated. Then, we could speak of the distance between Twin Falls and Boise in four different

Jupiter: SSE, low

One hour after sunset: Saturn: SW, high Moon: First quarter Saturday, 9:22 p.m. Below Saturn Sunday night.

First is the length of the highway between Twin Falls and Boise at the time we start the journey. Second is the time it takes to make the trip, given that the road on balloonearth gets longer throughout the journey.

Third is the final reading on our odometer at the end of our journey on an ever-lengthening road. And fourth is the distance between the two cities as of the time we arrive in

Boise. In the case of 3C273, an observer sees the light that left it when the quasar was

1.82 billion light years

away. That light, traveling at 670 million miles per hour, took 1.96 billion years to reach us. During its journey, the light traversed 2.10 billion light years of expanding space. And when the light arrives, 3C273 has moved to a point 2.44 billion light years away.

If this seems mindnumbing, hang on to your hat. The volume of space encompassed by a sphere with earth at the center and 3C273 at its outer edge still comprises a minuscule fraction of the observable universe.

Roughing it up at off-road motorcyle school in California

My ride to RawHyde off-road Adventures' motorcycle school in Castaic in Southern California is typically heroic: daring and expert lane splitting, fistfuls of throttle and clutch, spectacular knee-dragging cornering. I even pop a wheelie or two. My riding skills astound me.

So imagine my surprise when, having left the asphalt to turn into the ranch's gravel driveway and going all of about 10 feet, I fall off my borrowed BMW F800GS in a spray of loose rock and liberated motorcycle parts ... Hey, whoa, what the ... ker-RASSHH! Pain and humiliation mingle inside my helmet. I have not dropped a bike ever, and yet here I am, resting gently on my face. The marquee lights around my motorcycleriding ego suddenly go dim. The squirrels laugh. Gravel tastes funny.

So begins my five-day education in off-road riding. A half-mile up the hill, Jim Hyde, the founder and owner of RawHyde, is waiting for me under a canopy of camo netting. near a cluster of the school's BMW motorcycles. Hyde - a fit, barrelchested 52-year-old with a red face and a white goatee is sympathetic, sort of. At least he doesn't laugh.

"You know, we've had more people spill in the driveway than anywhere else," he says, smiling. Uhhuh. I suppose some sort of warning sign is out of the question?

RawHyde teaches something called "adventure riding," which involves piloting ridiculously large and powerful motorcycles - so-called dual-sport bikes such as the BMW R1200GS, KTM Adventure, bush. Dirt roads, sandy desert whoops, rockstrewn switchbacks, water crossings, you name it. After a couple days' instruction, students can his put their new skills to the test on an expedition to what Hvde calls Base Camp Alpha, a 400-plusmile round-trip ride into the Mojave desert through some of the most dramatic and inaccessible terrain in California. That's why I'm

and more limber suspension, dual-sport bikes are the SUVs of motorcycling; and as with SUVs, relatively few owners take advantage of the bikes' off-road abilities.

"People can be intimidated by these bikes," Hyde says. And not unreasonably. For one thing, they are expensive. A BMW R1200GS Adventure — the gold standard for this kind of riding - lists at \$16,750, and that's before all the panniers, fog lights, crash bars, navigation and communication systems that flush-with-cash owners typically bolt on. For another, the bikes are heavy. The same BMW weighs 563 pounds, without gear. To drop one on the trail is to oblige yourself to pick it up again, which is, in Hyde's words, "tiresome."

And if you go off-road, eventually, you'll drop it. That's RawHyde Adventures' Lesson No. 1.

As we gain altitude, the air cools and the road ropes through a thick, lovely pine forest and mountain meadows golden with wildflowers. It soon becomes clear that my group, led by Stickelmaier, is quicker than the second group. And we don't wait.

Harley-Davidsons falling turn off California 138 and victim to the credit crunch, dual-sports are the hottest segment in motorcycling. Buyers are typically older and wealthier, which is to say, they don't need credit. Dual-sports are also the quintessential midlife crisis bikes, and male menopause is always a growth industry. For guys - and we are talking about guys here, almost exclusively — who want to take that epic three-month road trip of man-discovery to find their inner Fonda, a big dual-sport bike is the only choice.

"It's cheaper than a says riding instructor Mark Stickelmaier, 52, a theatrical equipment contractor by trade.

Riding these bikes — my F800GS weighs nearly 500 pounds – resembles nothing so much as judo because riders have to leverage their weight against the far greater weight of an opponent (the "These bikes are way too

big to try to muscle them around," Stickelmaier says. The trick — far easier said than done — is to stand on the foot pegs and counterbalance your weight against the motorcycle, which wants to fall in whatever direction it's turning. The posture is strange, with the rider's one foot lifted off the bike entirely and a knee jammed into the fuel tank, almost as if he's trying to jump off A couple of students

struggle. Patrick Presley, a bridge inspector for the city of Phoenix, is riding 2000-model-year F1150GS, a huge bike about 100 pounds heavier than a new F1200GS. Presley graduated out of Harleys -"I got sick of the pose," he says - so he knows a heavy bike when he lifts one. He drops the big yellow bike over and over until, on Sunday afternoon, his face With their tall saddles is ashen from the effort. I ask him whether he's considering getting a newer, lighter bike. "That was the plan all along," he says, smiling wearily.

Some riders, meanwhile, are simply gifted.

During the last exercise on the second day, in the school's sand pit, I bury my front wheel and slam into the ground. Sitting up, slightly dazed, I feel as if I've been swiped by a dragon's tail but, slipping a hand under my riding gear, am pleased to discover I haven't broken my collar-

When I stand to get my diploma on Sunday night, I've got a bag of ice bandaged to my shoulder. On Monday morning,

This was the old route out of the Antelope Valley during the 1920s. In the switchbacks, deep sand - my nemesis has collected in awful wallows. I topple off my bike again, falling on my bruised shoulder, which is by now turning wondrous colors of purple and yellow.

As we gain altitude, the air cools and the road ropes divorce and a girlfriend," through a thick, lovely pine forest and mountain meadows golden with wildflowers.

The next day's ride is far more challenging, a 250mile enduro from the Pinnacles - extraordinary spires of calcium carbonate rising out of the badlands south of Trona — to Lake Isabella, a route that includes 10 miles of rollercoaster desert sand, which continues to terrify me.

The last off-road section of the day is also the most spectacular: a 30-mile traof the Piute Mountains, which takes us from the sere scrub of Iawbone Canyon to the lush, cool meadows of Kelso Valley and then up 5,000 feet to the Sequoialined ridge road over the mountains. It's steep and difficult terrain, with dangerous cliffs and sections of technical riding that test all the lessons learned at RawHyde. I fall only once; unfortunately, I fall on top of my Good Samaritan, Reilly, who has gone down just ahead of me.

Deadline closing in on super hunt drawing

Off-road vehicle registration endorsed

CARSON CITY, Nev. -A state Assembly panel has voted for a bill requiring owners of off-road vehicles, or ORVs, to register their rigs with the Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles.

SB394, endorsed by the Assembly Transportation Committee, would mandate that ORVs, such as allterrain vehicles, snowmobiles, dune buggies and allterrain motorcycles, be registered at an annual cost of \$20 to \$30. A titling fee would run about \$28.

Nearly \$7 million could

be generated over the next two years from the registration, titling and other fees for about 227,000 off-Nevada, according to DMV figures.

The bill, proposed by Sen. Dean Rhoads, R-Tuscarora, would designate responsibility for title and registration processing to ORV dealers. Rhoads said the plan wouldn't take effect until it can be adequately funded. He added that efforts are under way to find grants.

Environmental groups challenge Canada lynx plan

MISSOULA, Mont. -Afor eight elk, eight deer, lawsuit by four environmental groups says the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service falls short in how much land it intends to designate as critical habitat for the Canada lynx, a cat protected under the Endangered Species Act.

The service proposes designating about 39,000 square miles in six states, up from 1,841 square miles in three states.

The suit filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Missoula says protecting more habitat in western Montana and eastern Idaho is particularly important. license vendors, all Fish The suit also says the Fish and Wildlife Service erred by not including part of Colorado in the proposed designation

Protecting property from wolves

uestion: "What are the laws about what a citizen can do to protect themselves and their property from wolves?"

Answer: The answer to your question is spelled out in Idaho Code 36-1107(c).

In part, this law says: "Wolves may be disposed of without permit by livestock or domestic animal owners, their employees, agents and animal damage control personnel when they are molesting or attacking livestock or domestic animals."

The law requires those killing a wolf while protecting their property to report the incident to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game within 72 hours.

All wolves killed remain property of the State of Idaho.

The public may take any non-lethal steps necessary to protect their property. If wolves are not attacking or molesting domestic animals a permit must be obtained in order to kill a

For the purposes of this law "molesting" means the "actions of a wolf that are annoying, disturbing, or persecuting, especially with hostile intent or inju-

rious effect, or chasing, driving, flushing, worrying, following after or on the trail of, or stalking or lying in wait for, livestock or domestic animals."

The bottom-line is: • Non-lethal measures such as scare guns are allowed any time to protect

domestic animals. • If domestic animals are being attacked, pursued, stalked, or if the domestic animals are responding to the presence of a wolf, such as running in flight or fight, lethal measures are allowed

authorization. • If the wolf is not in hunting mode and the domestic animals show no concern by the presence of a wolf or if the wolves

Stimulus money saves Jerome school jobs

JEROME – Jerome school trustees learned Tuesday that teachers would keep their jobs with the district stimulated by a 36-percent federal funding increase.

District **Business** Manager Mike Gibson told the board that thanks to federal stimulus money, the budget crisis that appeared dismal a few months ago has shrunk substantially.

He said he had anticipated teacher layoffs state funding when appeared meager at best.

Since then, \$1.68 million in additional federal money poured into the district.

"We have a presentable budget, Gibson told the board, noting that programs will continue but funding will not be at the highest levels.

The district has eliminated 1.75 administrative positions and teachers are facing 1.9 percent salary reductions.

"If it weren't for the federal dollars I would have a very different story to tell you tonight and it wouldn't be a pleasant one," Gibson said.

In other business, after six consecutive years of Jerome High School graduations being held at the College of Southern Idaho, a group of 2010 JHS graduates and several parents told the board they want graduation moved back to the school. They presented a petition with 130 signatures in support of their cause.

Graduation was moved from JHS to CSI a few years ago for adequate indoor accommodations in the event of rain and a better sound system at the college.

Student Brian Harper asked the board to allow

Cause of chronic fatigue can be difficult to diagnose

DEAR DR. GOTT: I like reading your column and seeing you help other people with their medical issues. However, I have yet to see anything published that might help me. I'm a 47-year-old female who has struggled with fatigue for years. I was worried about holding down my job because I was having a hard time getting up to go to work. While at work, I was falling asleep on my halfhour lunch break for two hours.

My primary-care physician couldn't figure out why I was so tired. He sent me to an endocrinologist who didn't discover anything. I've lost my job and insurance and am just as

tired today. Breakfast acts as a tranquilizer and sends me off to sleep again. I battle taking naps all day. I had a heart attack at 44 and know I have had hepatitis C for at least 11 years. My doctor didn't see any connection. My quality of life is very poor, and I would appreciate as much insight as you might have.

DEAR READER: I feel somewhat handicapped because I don't have a

complete picture of what is If so, what was the outgoing on.

Initially, while suffering from a heart attack at 44 is not unheard of, you are young and should be at the top of your game. I wonder what, if anything, preceded the attack. Do you have chronic fatigue syndrome? Do you have a family history of heart disease? Was your diet improper? Did you suffer from high-cholesterol levels? Do you have unrelated medical conditions? Were you inactive and/or overweight? Did you get regular medical checkups? If you can answer "yes" to any of my questions, were positive measures taken to work toward a healthier lifestyle? come?

To lose a job, insurance and be unable to stay awake and alert is quite a lot for one individual to handle. We cannot be too quick to zero in on the basis for your fatigue, but must keep open minds that will cover many of the possibilities.

If you can pinpoint the initial stage for your symptoms, you might be headed in the right direction. For example, was the attack followed by the fatigue, or did the exhaustion precede it? Are you on any medication that could have an unwanted and uncommon side effect of fatigue? Do you have friends or family you can talk with to share

your concerns? While many of us are private when it comes to our own lives, having someone to talk with can make an enormous difference. If you don't have anyone or don't feel comfortable, consider a therapist. This type of specialist will sift through the issues, dismissing some and addressing others.

It's time to wipe the slate clean and begin from scratch with a new physician, at least until things get sorted out. You will need blood work, followup on your hepatitis C, referral to a cardiologist and perhaps a referral to other specialists and thyroid testing. Even if you have to borrow the money,

it will be well spent if it gets you back on your feet.

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



LAHORE, Pakistan -Officers guarding buildings for some of the Pakistani heartland's top police and intelligence officials saw the gunmen jump out of a white van stopped at their gate.

The assailants wore white shirts and trousers, and sprayed gunfire in the air and at police. One tossed a grenade in the direction of officers who had begun firing back.

Then, on a bustling workday morning in the heart of Pakistan's second largest city, the explosives-laden van rammed the steel gate and exploded. Roadside bomb kills U.S. soldier in Baghdad

BAGHDAD (AP) - A roadside bomb killed a U.S. soldier Wednesday in Baghdad, making May the deadliest month for the American military since September.

Also Wednesday, the government's watchdog agency announced that nearly 1,000 arrest warrants have been issued this year as part of a crackdown on corruption. They include warrants for nearly 50 senior civil servants, the agency said.

The fatal attack occurred two days after a blast struck a U.S. convoy west of the capital, killing three Americans, including two civilians and a soldier.

The spike in deaths comes as U.S. forces face a June 30 deadline to pull back from urban areas as part of a U.S.-Iraqi security pact that took effect this year.

At least 20 American service members have died so far this month, compared with 25 in September, according to an Associated Press tally.

The 20 deaths include five service members killed in a May 11 shooting at a mental health clinic in Baghdad. Sgt. John M. Russell has been charged with murder in the case.

April had at least 19 American troop deaths, more than double the nine killed in March, the lowest since the war began.





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



Tyson seems destined to live a tragic life

There's a picture stuck away in a box somewhere in my house of a younger Mike Tyson standing behind my son, his arms draped over him and a huge smile on his face.

The picture never made the family album, was never brought out to show around when friends came over. Brian never asked me to have it framed.

It was taken at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas in 1990, and by that time Tyson's life had already spun far out of control and disintegrated into soap opera status. His wife at the time had accused him on national TV of abusing her, he had lost the only two father figures he had ever known, and, thanks to Buster Douglas, he was no longer the heavyweight champion of the world.

Soon he was going to be charged with rape. It wasn't the time to be showing his picture around.

Not that I had any worries about letting my son hang briefly with the baddest man on the planet. With Tyson you got pretty much what you saw, with none of the phoniness or pretentiousness of most athletes.

A lot of times it wasn't pretty, and a lot of times the decisions he made were pretty bad. But there was always an underlying endearing quality to Tyson that was missed by those more interested in his left hook or his many problems.

You could see by the way he joked with my son and put his arm around him that he loved kids. That may have been because in many ways he was still a kid himself.

A kid who cried after failing to make the 1984 Olympic team. A kid who had no idea what to do when promoters and socalled friends were shoving their hands in his suddenly deep pockets.

A kid who took an awfully long time to grow

16. Private riding arenas are for the personal use of the owners, owner's family and friends where no commercial gain is realized and where all activities are contained within an enclosed building.

SECTION 14: The Official Schedule of Height and Area Regulations in Heyburn Code Section 8-5-3 shall be amended to clarify setback requirements as follows:

OFFICIAL SCHEDULE OF HEIGHT AND AREA REGULATIONS FOR 8-5-3:

The following setbacks and minimum yard requirements shall apply in the respective zones:

Setbacks shall be measured from property lines unless a property line is in the center of the road or street. In such case setback shall be measured from the road or street right-of-way.

Setbacks shall be measured to the wall of a structure with projections of twenty-four (24) inches or less. For walls with projections of greater than twenty-four (24) inches setbacks shall be measured to the projections. Projections over public way will be governed by provisions of this ordinance and the International Building Code.

SECTION 15: There shall be added to Section 8-6-6 an amended subsection K to read as follows:

K. Manufactured or Mobile Homes: 1. A manufactured or mobile home shall not be moved onto a site or occupied before a Building Permit has been issued;

At least one inspection after the Permit is issued shall be to verify compliance with applicable zoning, health, installation, and building requirements;

A permit shall be required for all classes of Manufactured Homes and shall be in addition to any other required zoning, permit, or hook-up fees;

Manufactured or mobile homes as defined in this ordinance shall only be used for residential purposes; and 5. Manufactured or mobile homes that are no longer occupied and have become run down, dilapidated or deemed unsafe or a public nuisance shall be removed and/or deposed of at the owner; Çs

SECTION 16: Title 8, chapter 13 shall be amended to add new section 8-13-6 dealing with utility hookup provisions and renumbering subsequent sections as follows: 8-13-6 SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ISSUANCE OF BUILDING PERMITS:

The following are requirements dealing with providing utility hookups and payment of hookup fees prior to the issuance of a zoning/building permit

A. It shall be unlawful to request or demand from any utility, private or public, the connection of power to any structure, house, building, installation, including manufactured homes, for which a building permit is required, without first displaying to said utility or other company a valid building permit.

B. Each utility, private or public, receiving such a request for connection of utilities without compliance with the terms of this section, shall promptly notify the City.

C. No building permit shall be issued for any structures located within the corporate limits of the cities which would require public services without verification that the appropriate hookup fees or deposits have been paid. D. Manufactured Home Parks (Mobile Home Parks) shall not allow a unit to be connected to utilities without verification that a building permit has been issued as required by state law and local

ordinances.

E. No building permit shall be issued for structures utilizing private septic systems without first obtaining a Subsurface Sewage Permit from the applicable health authority. SECTION 17: Heyburn Code Section 8-14-12 shall be amended to provide changes to the process of appeals:

8-14-12. REQUEST FOR HEARING BY AFFECTED PERSONS: An "affected person" shall mean one having an interest in real property, which may be adversely affected by the issuance or denial of a permit authorizing the development.

Any affected person may at any time prior to final action on rezone, special use, or variance permit Rezone, Special Use, or Variance Permit, if no hearing has been held on the application, petition the Gemmission or Beard Commission or Board or respective equined Council in writing to hold a hearing as required above in Section 8-14-7 through petition for a hearing, the hearing shall be held. After a hearing, the Commission, Board or respective City Council may:

 A. Grant or deny a permit; or B. Delay such a decision for a definite period of time for further study or hearing not to exceed sixty (60) days.

SECTION 18: Title 8 Chapter 14 shall be amended to add new section dealing with appeals as follows and renumber subsequent sections: 8-14-13. APPLICATION AND STANDARDS FOR APPEALS: An administrative appeal or a decision of the Commission shall not be considered until an appeal is submitted in writing to the Administrator

and/or Board or applicable City Council containing:

 A. Name, address and phone number of appellant; B. Legal description of property;

C. Description of nature of the appeal requested;

D. A narrative statement demonstrating legal basis and reason for the appeal; and

E. Applicable fee as established by the Board or applicable City Council.

SECTION 22: Heyburn Code Section 8-17-4 B. shall be amended as follows:

B. EXPANSION OF EXISTING CONFINED ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATIONS: Non-conforming animal feeding operations shall not increase in size or capacity without first conforming to the requirements of this chapter and obtaining applicable approval for a Confined Animal Feeding Operation Confined Animal Feeding Operation.

2. Upon establishment of the records for a non-conforming Confined Animal Feeding Operation Confined Animal Feeding Operation, an operation of one thousand (1000) animal units or less may apply for a one-time expansion up to ten percent (10%) of the existing operation but not to exceed a total of (1000) animal units. 3. The expansion of a non-conforming confined animal feeding operation Confined Animal Feeding Operation will be allowed if it does not result in the required expansion of the lagoon or runoff

containment.

than the following distances from occupied uses not associated with the Confined Animal Feeding Operation including residential uses, churches, schools or other buildings used for human occupancy, including mobile homes, not associated with the Confined Animal Feeding Operation: SECTION 24: Heyburn Code Subsection 8-17-10-C shall be deleted in its entirety and the remaining and subsequent subsections as shall be renumbered accordingly.

SECTION 25: Heyburn Code Section 9-3-3-K 1. shall be amended as follows: K. Approval Period: Failure to file and obtain the certification of the acceptance of the final plat application by the developer within one year after action by the Commission shall cause all approvals of said preliminary plat
to be null and void, unless an extension of time is applied for and granted by the Commission prior to the expiration date. The approval period for the final plat may be in excess of one year if so

requested in the application or in writing before the expiration of he preliminary plat and approved by the Commission and Council SECTION 26: The City Council having by authorizing motion and vote waived the rule of requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance, by title and in full, therefore this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its first and only reading, passage, approval and publication.

The players at the Dyspeptics Club are united by a common lack of respect for one another's game. East in particular has been known to speculate that West got into the gene pool while the lifeguard was not watching. But he got his comeuppance in today's deal.

After East opened a tactical strong no-trump, South elected to overcall in spades, and subsequently was not going to let the chance of a vulnerable game escape him.

West led his singleton diamond, which East won with the ace to return the suit-preference two, ruffed by West. A club to East's ace saw the diamond queen ruffed by declarer's ace. What should West discard?

Had West discarded a club, declarer would have cashed the club queen, ruffed a club with the spade nine, played a spade back to his ace, and ruffed another club with the spade king. Now declarer would simply have had to cash the heart ace, ruff a heart back to hand, and draw trumps. The clubs would all be good.

It is no better if West discards a heart, because declarer changes tack and ruffs two hearts in hand to set up that suit.

However, West found the right defense when he underruffed the spade ace. (It spoiled the performance a little when he tried to gather in the trick, thinking South had ruffed low.) Declarer now did not have the entries to set up dummy's hearts, and he could not ruff three clubs in the dummy without letting East score his lowly spade five.

ANSWER: Your partner's call is encouraging but not forcing, and you have a minimum hand, but you should still raise to two spades. Since you have stronger bids available, this is more of a courtesy raise than a real gametry, and its purpose is almost as much to keep the opponents out as it is to invite game.

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
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
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
