Blue Lakes work ahead of schedule

Construction could be done by mid-September

Roadwork on Blue Lakes Boulevard is more than two months ahead of schedule, the Idaho Transportation Department said Friday.

Construction on the busiest road in Twin Falls should be complete by mid-September, well ahead of the original November target and the revised Oct. 26 date, said Kimbol Allen, the ITD resident engineer overseeing the project.

"It's excellent," said Allen. "A lot of it is because the public and businesses have worked with (the workers) so well because they've given them as much room to work at possible."

It's the most comprehensive work on the road in a quarter century. When finished, the road is expected to last 20 to 30 years with-

out further major work.

On Friday, workers tested paving and they should know today whether the quality of the road is strong enough to keep going, Kimbol said. If so, Blue Lakes from Bridgeview Drive to Pole Line Road will be finished by week's end, he said. Both left-hand turn lanes from Pole Line Road on to Blue Lakes Boulevard would also open.

Allen said paving is on schedule even though the paver was also completing a project on Highway 75. Otherwise, the contractor's equipment would have been idle in Twin Falls until the road bed was ready, he said.

By next week paving on the western portion between Pole Line and Falls Avenue should begin. No work south of Falls Avenue is scheduled.

Traffic should shift to the new lanes by July 4, allowing workers to repave the east-side lanes.

Wendell condemns 235 acres of farmland

City plans to acquire land through eminent domain

WENDELL - The Wendell City Council unanimously approved a resolution Thursday to condemn mental Quality, she said the 235 acres of farmland south of the city, effectively beginning the process to acquire the property through eminent domain.

Obtaining the farmland, currently owned by Robert Mevers, Kathi Meyers, Joseph Hults and Kay Hults, is a critical step in moving forward with the city's planned wastewater system upgrade.

Eminent domain is the process by which a state can appropriate property for public use. Pursuant to the Idaho Constitution, cities have the right of eminent domain for any use necessary for the preservation of the health of its inhabitants. The wastewater system upgrade falls under this need.

City officials say they have contacted the joint owners of the property for purchase but no agreement could be made.

"We have attempted numerous times to work in an equitable manner and have not gotten the same back," said Mayor Rick Cowen.

While Kay Hults said she understands the city's predicament in bringing the sewer into compliance, as mandated by the Idaho Department of Environowners have never received a written offer by the city for the land's purchase.

"We had two meetings with the city but never entered into written negotiations, Hults told the Times-News. "I don't even know what they are willing to offer us for the land. The only written correspondence I've ever had with the city was a letter from their attorney stating they were condemning it."

During Thursday's meeting residents expressed their concern over the city taking the farm.

"You need to look at their farm as a job ... and you are taking part of their livelihood," said resident Carl Sir.

Sir also pointed out that the city failed to notify owners of the surrounding property of the condemnation.



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Fifteen more bodies found in Atlantic Air France crash

RECIFE, Brazil - Search ships methodically worked through a "sea of debris" from a doomed Air France jet Sunday, recovering 15 more bodies near the spot where the Airbus A330 is believed to have gone down a week ago.

Two bodies were recovered Saturday, and Brazilian and French ships picked up 15 more Sunday afternoon after pilots participating in a grid search reported additional sightings. The bodies have been found in an area about 45 miles from where the jet sent out messages signaling electrical failures and loss of cabin pressure.

"We're navigating through a sea of debris," Brazilian Navy Giucemar Tabosa Cardoso said.

ACAPULCO, Mexico -Mexican soldiers fought a two-hour battle with heavily armed men holed up at a house in an Acapulco hotel zone, killing 15 of the gunmen as Mexican tourist cowered in their rooms nearby.

One soldier was killed and the wounded included three soldiers and three bystanders. Several Mexican tourists were evacuated from small hotels in a faded neighborhood once frequented by Hollywood stars.

When soldiers arrived at the house on a tip, the gunmen opened fire and hurled some 50 grenades, according to an Army colonel, who wore a ski mask to protect his identity as he led reporters on a tour of the scene Sunday. He spoke on condition of anonymity for security reasons.

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Alternative medicine goes mainstream

But evidence shows many therapies, pills lack value

BALTIMORE - At one of the nation's top trauma hospitals, a nurse circles a patient's bed, humming and waving her arms as if shooing evil spirits. Another woman rubs a quartz bowl with a wand, making tunes that mix with the beeping monitors and hissing respirator keeping the man alive.

They are doing Reiki therapy, which claims to heal image, many of these prodthrough invisible energy fields. The anesthesia chief, Dr. Richard Dutton, calls it "mystical mumbo jumbo." Still, he's a fan.

"It's self-hypnosis" that manipulate emotions, just can help patients relax, he like ads for hot cars and cool said. "If you tell yourself you clothes. have less pain, you actually do have less pain."

Alternative medicine has become mainstream. It is finding wider acceptance by doctors, insurers and hospitals like the shock trauma center at the University of Maryland Medical Center.

People turn to unconventional therapies and herbal remedies for everything from hot flashes and trouble sleeping to cancer and heart disease. They crave more "care" in their health care. They distrust drug companies and the way? government. They want natural, safer remedies.

But often, that is not what get. Government actions and powerful interest groups have left consumers vulnerable to flawed products and misleading marketing.

Dietary supplements do not have to be proved safe or effective before they can be sold. Some contain natural things you might not want, such as lead and arsenic. Some interfere with other things you may be taking, such as birth control pills.

vulnerable and gravely ill. • Some medical schools are teaching future doctors about alternative medicine, sometimes with federal grants. The goal is to educate them about what patients are using so they can give evidencebased, nonjudgmental care. But some schools have ties to alternative medicine practi-

tioners and advocates. • Health insurers are cutting deals to let alternative medicine providers market supplements and services directly to members. Some insurers steer patients to Internet sellers of supplements, even though patients must pay for these out of

A few herbal supplements can directly threaten health. A surprising number do not supply what their labels claim, contain potentially harmful substances like lead, or are laced with hidden versions of prescription drugs.

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"In testing, one out of four supplements has a problem," said Dr. Tod Cooperman, president of ConsumerLab.com, an independent company that rates

Even when the ingredients some offer treatments with for a product with no proven benefit is no small harm.

But sometimes the cost is far greater. Cancer patients can lose their only chance of beating the disease. People with clogged arteries can suffer a heart attack. Children can be harmed by unproven therapies forced on them by parents who distrust conventional medicine.

Mainstream medicine and prescription drugs have problems, too. Popular drugs such as the painkillers Vioxx and Bextra were pulled from the market after serious side effects emerged once they were widely used by consumers. But at least there are regulatory systems, guideline-setting groups and watchdog agencies helping to keep traditional medicine in





Ketchum should seriously consider a city manager

utside of Idaho, the mayor isn't such a big shot. A large majority of American cities with more than 12,000 people are run by a city manager, who serves at the pleasure of an elected council. The mayor may cut a lot of ribbons, but he's just another member of the council.

Yet in the Gem State, only three cities — Twin Falls, Lewiston and McCall - have councilmanager-style government. But a fourth may be on the way.

Several members of the Ketchum City Council are gingerly pushing to dump the town's strong-mayor system and put a professional in City Hall.

"Personally, I'm in favor of going this direction," Councilman Larry Helzel said. But, he added, the firestorm that arose over a bid to merge Ketchum and Sun Valley showed that unattended consequences of moving too fast can take what might be a good idea off the agenda "perhaps forever."

"I would urge a calm and thorough debate, no matter how long it takes," he said. "This community is slow to embrace change. It would rather move in baby steps."

As it stands, Mayor Randy Hall runs day-today operations with the help of a hired city admin-

istrator whose duties are delegated by the mayor. Under a council-manager system, the city manager would have the administrative duties.

Former Ketchum Mayor Ed Simon believes the city manager form depoliticizes personnel issues, freeing the council to work on issues.

The evidence from Twin Falls suggests that's true. Folks who do business with the city know the rules in advance and deal with a professional hierarchy. The council legislates; it doesn't manage.

Most public administration academics and municipal-management specialists believe the council-manager system is more efficient because it's more professional and less prone to corruption. It's hard, after all, to run patronage government when the boss can't dispense political favors without the consent of the council.

The right city manager, however, can be hard to find. Because of the nature of their responsibilities, managers are lightning rods for anyone who's unhappy with municipal government. And since they serve at the pleasure of the council, job security is limited.

For those reasons, most city managers move on every five years or so. That can be an advantage to a community, since it regularly brings fresh perspective to City Hall.

A manager isn't right for every town, but he or she could be a good fit for Ketchum. It's a goodgovernment community, whose citizens are intensely involved in the decision-making process and whose council is forever pushing the envelope to find ways to save money and run government better.

In short, a city manager would have to satisfy a tough audience in Ketchum. That, it seems to us, is exactly how it should be.

A new line in the sand for Iran

he Iranian nuclear challenge was transformed on President George W. Bush's watch. Events in Iran have advanced faster than the policy community's thinking about the problem. The brute fact is that Iran has crossed a threshold that is painful to acknowledge but impossible to ignore: It has lost its nuclear virginity.

Over the past eight years, the United States has insisted that Iran would never be allowed to develop the capability to enrich uranium, as that could be used to build a nuclear bomb. Three unanimous U.N. Security Council resolutions demanded that Iran "suspend all enrichment-related activities." That was a worthy aim. Technically, mastery of enrichment is the brightest red line short of nuclear weapons. Israelis have called it the "point of no return." Bush chose the right

operational objective when he declared, "We cannot allow the Iranians to have the capacity to enrich." Sadly, the strategy he pursued to prevent Iran from crossing that red line failed. One can debate whether a different strategy would have produced a different outcome. At this point, however, we must recognize the irreversible bottom line: Iran has demonstrably mastered the capability to manufacture and operate centrifuges to enrich uranium. The February report of the International Atomic **Energy Agency documents** the details: Iran is operating 4,000 centrifuges and has already produced more than a ton of low-enriched uranium — an amount sufficient, after further enrichment, to make its first nuclear bomb.

The policy consequences



down the road to a nuclear bomb are profound. These new facts require a fundamental reassessment not only of how we engage Iran but also of what we can realistically hope to achieve.

First, the long-held American objective to prevent Iran from acquiring the technical know-how to enrich uranium has been overtaken by events. While it was an appropriate goal at the time, Iran has acquired this capability. Its knowledge of how to enrich uranium cannot be erased. There is no realistic future in which Iran will not be "nuclear enrichment capable," that is, have the knowhow to replicate its current enrichment facility at Natanz — either overtly or covertly.

Second, the predominant focus of U.S. and international policy on Iran's observable nuclear enrichment facility at Natanz is largely misplaced. Preoccupation with the "known" to the neglect of the "known unknown" is common in policy-making. But at this point, it has become a caricature of the story of the drunk looking for his car keys under the lamppost, even though he knows he dropped them a hundred yards away,

because that is where the light is. If Iran detonates a nuclear bomb in the next four years, the likelihood that the highly enriched uranium for that bomb will have been produced at Natanz is less than 10 percent. Thus, erasing Natanz today, either by Israel's threatened military attack or through negotiations, addresses the smaller part of the threat.

Further, and third, the source of the highly enriched uranium for Iran's bomb - if Iran makes and tests a bomb during Obama's first term — will be a covert enrichment plant that we have not discovered. By definition, we don't know the location or status of secret, undiscovered facilities. But as an American intelligence officer quipped, if Iran's nuclear project manager has put all his eggs in the one basket that is under the spotlight of international inspection, he should be fired.

The bottom line for American policy is that the menu of feasible options has shrunk. Every option available at this point requires living with an Iran that knows how to enrich uranium. Continued denial of this truth is self-delusion.

The central policy question becomes: What combi-

nation of arrangements, inside and outside Iran, has the best chance of persuading it to stop short of a nuclear bomb? More important than how many centrifuges Iran continues operating at Natanz is how transparent it will be about all of its nuclear activities, including the manufacture of centrifuges. Maximizing the likelihood that covert enrichment will be discovered is the best way to minimize the likelihood that it will be pursued. The best hope for defining a meaningful red line is to enshrine the Iranian supreme leader's affirmations that Iran will never acquire nuclear weapons in a solemn international agreement that commits Russia and China to join the United States in specific, devastating penalties for violation of that

pledge.

perhaps, is it just semantic game-playing? The Europeans appear to be more upfront about language and un-blushingly call it "socialism."

Our college textbooks on economics state the obvious: Three participants are mandatory under capitalism; and they are the sub-marginal, the marginal and the supramarginal: the working poor, the middle class and

the wealthy. It could be said that the working class must spend beyond their paycheck, the lower middle class is only a few paychecks from being part of the working class and the wealthy are the real beneficiaries of this structure. The lower classes tolerate this setup on the chance, however remote, that they too will somehow become wealthy. The guilt-ridden rich often excuse themselves by arguing that the opportunity is there for everyone if they're willing to "work hard" and take the

risk. It happens, but the odds for it are infinite. Marxists say that the wealthy exploit the poor and bourgeoisie lackevs. thereby stealing unearned riches. Not true?


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

Snake River Canyon at Centennial Park

Why: Walking uphill burns more calories than walking on a flat surface, and really works the glutes and thigh muscles. The road to Centennial Park, at the north end of Twin Falls, is a

favorite for fitness walkers, so most

drivers know to take it slow around the turns. Still, keep to the side of the road and don't blast your iPod too loud so you can listen for oncoming traffic.

For a great workout: Park at the canvon rim and trek down on the road to the park. Head back up to the top of the canyon at a brisk pace, engaging your arms and abs as you walk. The road averages a 10 degree grade, so make your steps shorter and quicker for a killer workout. The beautiful canyon and waterfall views will help keep your mind off the burn.

Why: The trail, which runs next to the Snake River in Heyburn, is paved and well-maintained. It's wide and mostly flat, which makes it ideal for wheelchairs or family bicycle trips with the little ones. The fish are usually jumping by

the docks, so listen for the signature splash that adds character to this trail. For a great workout: The trail is half a mile long, then loops back on itself. Sprint from the beginning of the trail, which starts behind the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce, to the picnic tables near the fishing docks. Do two sets of 10 elevated push-ups on the benches, then jog to the loop at the end of the trail. Do two sets of 10 lunges, then jog back to the picnic area. Once you're there, do 20 squats (if your legs can handle it), then cool down with a casual walk back to your car.

Tanning beds have been associated with an increased risk of melanoma and nonmelanoma skin cancer, according to the American Academy of Dermatologists. Several studies have shown that tanning-bed use before age 35 is associated with an increased risk of melanoma,

Check it out if you're not whizzing by too fast.

For a great workout: Bring your bike for this one, friend. The trail is mostly flat and is very bike friendly, so you don't have to worry much about constantly changing

gears. Because the trail is so long, don't sprint instead, work at a moderate pace, so you are slightly out of breath and it's possible to have a conversation. You're going for distance and endurance, not speed. Remember to pass joggers and slower bikers on the left and let people know you're coming up to them. Although the trail starts
