Historic Hideaway

SHOSHONE — Eight miles north of Shoshone sits one of Idaho's greatest unknown wonders, hidden under the desert floor.

The Idaho Mammoth Cave is home to not only a piece of geological history, but is also a piece of American history dating to the Cold War.

Richard Olsen and his two sons, Paul and James, operate the Idaho Mammoth Cave and Shoshone Bird Museum of Natural History about two miles west of Idaho Highway 75.

Olsen obtained title to the cave in the 1950s under the Idaho Small Tract Act. He grew mushrooms there before opening it to the public. Olsen has cleared and maintained a path that stretches nearly one-fourth of a mile deep into the cave's half-mile-long lava tube, which he calls the largest lava cave now open to the public, and offers tours.

Although the cave welcomes nearly 8,000 people each summer, said Olsen, many southern Idaho residents have never visited the site.

"I don't know why," he said.

That's a shame, Olsen said, because the Mammoth Cave is more than just a massive cave; it is saturated with American history, largely in connection to early settlers and strategic use associated with national defense.

The first recorded cave

Temporary turn lane for Wal-Mart OK'd by city

The city of Twin Falls has set up a temporary left turn on Washington Street North for the eastern entrance of Wal-Mart to alleviate congestion and improve safety.

The turn lane might surprise drivers — it was not part of the city's agreement with Wal-Mart, which included the right-in, right-out requirement at the eastern entrance, and didn't come up internally in the city until April.

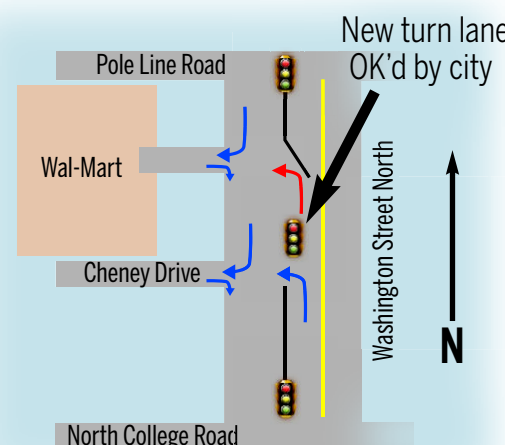
Traffic and congestion in

the area, of course, has drawn attention over the past few years. Canyon Ridge High School will open in August and a new hospital will open on Grandview Drive and Pole Line Road in the summer of 2011.

City Engineer Jackie Fields said she made the decision to open the lane. No formal study was done but Fields said she has traffic figures from Wal-Mart to prove the need for the turn.

"I think it's an appropriate move because congestion at Cheney, south of the

Program to organize neighborhoods in case of disaster

It's one thing to face a major disaster on your own. It's quite another to have some help from the family next door.

Twin Falls city residents and, eventually, others living in Twin Falls County will get some advice on preparing for disaster situations as part of a nationally used program aimed at empowering neighborhoods to care for themselves. Coordinated through the county emergency services office, "Map Your Neighborhood" teaches local residents nine steps for responding to such situations, allowing them to address minor problems while police, medical workers and other agencies focus on bigger issues.

Fewer burps for Bessie: Greener diet reduces dairy cows' methane burps

COVENTRY, Vt. — Vermont dairy farmers Tim Maikshilo and Kristen Dellert, mindful of shrinking their carbon footprint, have changed their cows' diet to reduce the amount of gas the animals burp — dairy cows' contribution to global warming.

Coventry Valley Farm is one of 15 Vermont farms working with Stonyfield Farm Inc., whose yogurt is made with their organic

milk, to reduce the cows' intestinal methane by feeding them flaxseed, alfalfa, and grasses high in Omega 3 fatty acids. The gas cows belch is the dairy industry's biggest greenhouse gas contributor, research shows, most of it emitted from the front and not the back end of the cow.

"I just figured a cow was a cow and they were going to do whatever they were going to do in terms of cow things for gas," said Dellert. "It was pretty shocking to me that just being organic wasn't

She learned it wasn't. The dairy industry contributes about 2 percent to the coun-

try's total greenhouse gas production, said Rick Naczi, a vice president at Dairy Management Inc., which funds research and promotes dairy products. Most of it comes from the cow, the rest from growing feed crops for the cattle to processing and transporting the milk.

To satisfy consumers' demands for sustainable production, the Innovation Center for U.S. Dairy in Rosemont, Ill., is looking at everything from growing

usage was in 1902, according to Olsen, when Basque sheep herders used it in the winter and left their marks on the cave's walls in charcoal.

During the Cold War, the cave was also used as a civil defense shelter, which was more widely known in a time when fears of nuclear attack were rampant, Olsen said.

The government approached Olsen in the 1960s, when it suspected that the Soviet Union had targeted Mountain Home Air Force Base, which was then home to Strategic Air Command nuke-packing bombers and the command center for three Titan inter-continental ballistic missile complexes. The government agreed to construct a gravel road from Highway 75 to the cave in return for its use as a shelter if the area came under atomic attack, Olsen said.

The cave was rated “at 1,000 plus,” which he said meant it was one of the safest shelters in the United States. It was stocked with enough food and materials for 8,000 people, even though the cave's capacity was much higher.

Though never pressed into service, the cave remained a defense shelter and water and supplies were stored there until well after the Cold War was over, Olsen said. In the late 1980s, all the food — found to have been contaminated with botulism

— and supplies were removed except for an 8,000-gallon water reservoir built by Olsen and his sons.

Olsen said he hasn't heard from the government in years, though a sign on the highway still directs motorists to the “Mammoth Cave Civil Defense Shelter” at the other end of the road the government built.

The cave, which is separate from the nearby Shoshone Ice Caves, also has another entrance. It too is marked by a giant blue sign reading “CAVE.” While both roads will get you to the Mammoth Cave, neither will lead to an actual civil defense shelter anymore.

“The sign should come down,” said Gary Davis, Idaho Department of Homeland Security central area field officer. According to Davis, the civil defense shelter program ended about 10 years ago.

Olsen said he doesn't know if the federal government will again want to use the cave as a shelter, being that nuclear threats — this time from North Korea and terrorist groups — may be back on the table.

As for now, he and his sons are happy just showing off “the beauty of the cave,” he said.

signal, is going to be a problem,” Fields said.

Fields hopes — and encourages — Wal-Mart shoppers to use Pole Line Road. But she understands not everyone can and hopes this scenario helps.

Here's the breakdown:

• Heading north on Washington Street North, Wal-Mart may be accessed by turning left onto Cheney Drive and going into the store's parking lot.

• However, Washington Street North is currently just one lane — and the turn bay onto Cheney Drive is very

small. So, the city decided to allow vehicles to proceed north just beyond Cheney Drive and into a temporary lane to turn left into Wal-Mart's eastern entrance.

• The temporary turn lane was hatched because the road is eventually going to be a left-turn lane to head east on Cheney Drive. But the problem is that road hasn't been built yet.

• A third option is for motorists to make a U-turn before reaching the Pole Line Road signal. This was done in response to the widening of Washington Street North, which begins this fall and

lasts for about a year. At that time, the temporary turning lane is expected to be removed.

“Nobody is going to be using that left turn bay,” Fields said. “It could sit there, with nothing going on, empty ... or we can use it to alleviate temporary traffic congestion, until we get two northbound lanes.”

But would someone really go ahead and make a U-turn if they could use the temporary median? Fields said she hopes drivers will be courteous enough to do just that if there is not room to make a U-turn.

“Just be nice and go around,” she said. “Just show that regular, old-fashioned Twin Falls courtesy that somebody always swears that there is.”

The other option was to have an unused lane — which Fields said would probably draw people anyway unless there was a barrier — and have a big backup of vehicles trying to make a left onto Cheney.

This temporary setup cost around \$200 for a few signs.

County emergency services coordinator Jackie Frey said she's turned to church and volunteer groups to help organize the project, with leaders such as Hansen receiving Community Emergency Response Team training.

The volunteers have been working for about eight months now to get the project off the ground, Frey said. Twin Falls city comes first — covering just more than half of the county's residents. Afterwards, they intend to expand the program across the county.

Workbooks passed out for the program contain the suggested nine steps — including shutting off water and gas lines to your home and setting a gathering site for neighbors — and places to record who lives in each house and what sorts of

NINE SIMPLE STEPS

The Map Your Neighborhood program suggests this checklist for responding to a disaster:

- 1) Take care of your loved ones.
- 2) Dress for safety, including head protection and sturdy shoes.
- 3) Check and shut off the natural gas or propane at your home.
- 4) Shut off water at the house main to keep pollutants out of your drinking water.
- 5) Place a sign in your window indicating if you need help.
- 6) Put your fire extinguisher on the sidewalk, where neighbors can use it if you don't need it.
- 7) Gather at one site in your neighborhood.
- 8) Form teams to listen for emergency radio broadcasts, check on neighbors and perform other tasks.
- 9) Return to the site and compare notes.

skills or equipment they could contribute in an emergency, among other information.

“It's just one more resource to help prepare citizens of our county for a disaster incident,” Frey said.

Getting organized will take some time. Hansen

said he and seven other project leaders have divided about one-third of the city of Twin Falls into the neighborhood units so far. Once the lines are drawn up, they'll find a captain for each neighborhood, who in turn will hold a neighborhood meeting and walk residents through the prepara-

tion process.

The system, he said, has many possible uses — coordinating reactions to anything from a pandemic to a deep blizzard. The workbooks include signs people can post indicating whether they need help. And besides the nine-step checklist, captains would follow a chain of command to check in, with Hansen and his peers providing reports to first-responders.

“The neighborhood would come together, and they would provide for their needs,” Hansen said.

First, though, Hansen has to get residents' attention, and convince them when he starts to go door-to-door that he's only trying to help.

“We're not selling anything,” he observed.

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Polish consulate to open in Ketchum

Idahoans may not think of their state as having a large Polish population. But an honorary Polish consulate is being created in Ketchum. Susan Passovoy, a Ketchum resident, who is not Polish, will act as honorary consulate for one of only 13 Polish consulates in the U.S.

Passovoy, whose husband has Polish ties, was named honorary consulate this spring.

"We are intrigued by the country, fascinated with its history, and aware of its increasingly important role in the European Union," said Passovoy.

To officially open the consulate, the Polish ambassador to the U.S., Robert Kupiecki, will visit Ketchum June 27 and 28.

In addition to the consulate event on Sunday, June 28, Kupiecki will introduce and view a Polish movie at The Community Library in Ketchum.

The consulate, currently

located in the office of Passovoy's home, was created first to provide assistance to Polish nationals visiting or living in Idaho; second, to introduce Poland to the state of Idaho; and third, to promote business, cultural and educational exchange between the citizens of Idaho and Poland, according to Passovoy.

Passovoy will serve as honorary consulate for the next four years. She and her husband will spend almost five months in Poland next

year, but she will continue to fulfill her duties with the help of her Polish assistant in Ketchum, Aneta Bednick, said Passovoy. "Although not large, there is a population of people in Idaho who came from Poland, or who have family or history in Poland," said Passovoy. In the future, Passovoy hopes to work with the Sun Valley Symphony next year to create a celebration commemorating the 200th birthday of Polish composer Frederic Chopin.

Gooding charter school staying put

North Valley Academy is staying put at its current location in Gooding for this upcoming school year.

The charter school had been looking around for additional space for this fall, when it adds the high-school grades to its kindergarten through eighth-grade student body. The school's charter allows up to 96 high-school students.

Because of additional space that's available at the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind, the charter school will continue leasing at its current location, said Deby Infanger, chairwoman of the board of NVA. Two more rooms became available, and the school is reconfiguring its classrooms to make room for the high-school grades, she said.

"We'll be snug, but we'll be OK for another year," Infanger said.

In the meantime, the school will keep looking for other locations for a long-term site. Unlike non-charter public school districts, charter schools cannot float bonds for building projects.

Currently, about 255 students are enrolled for this fall, and there are still slots available, Infanger said. The charter school opened in fall 2008.

The school's lease at ISDB will increase from about

\$50,000 to roughly \$70,000.

Infanger noted that about half of the new students enrolling are from outside Gooding. This fall, the

school will add a bus route to Wendell for students.

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Storms bring flooding concerns, rainfall record

A series of storms crossing southern Idaho this weekend once again prompted flood watches and set at least one new rainfall record.

South-central Idaho received high amounts of rain on Saturday, leading the National Weather Service to announce its concerns about potential flooding on Sunday. Flood advisories that ended by 7 p.m. on Sunday warned of possible flooding in west-

central Gooding County and northeastern Cassia County, as well as parts of Elmore and Owyhee counties. Actual, though small-scale, flooding was reported near Bruneau and Glenns Ferry and in parts of Cassia County.

Flash-flood watches in Cassia and Blaine counties were set to end at midnight Saturday, but were extended at least 24 hours more, prompted by new storms. Cassia County was also under a severe thunderstorm watch on Sunday until

9 p.m. The watches simply warned that conditions that cause severe weather could develop.

The Jerome County Airport weather station recorded a new daily rainfall record on Saturday, receiving .98 inches. The previous record was .29 inches, set in 1984.

Records available on the NWS Web site showed Saturday's rain wasn't limited to Jerome. The Twin Falls airport received half an inch in 24 hours, and at least

three-tenths of an inch fell in Burley over the course of the day. Eastern Idaho seemed to take the brunt of Sunday's storms: Dean Hazen, a NWS science officer in Pocatello, said mid-afternoon he'd received reports of hail in various areas ranging from pea to golf ball-sized.

Nature may now have worked the storms out of its system for a few days. Forecasts across the region call for some clouds, but no precipitation through at least Thursday.

Levy passes in Three Creek district

ROGERSON — The Three Creek Joint School District's supplemental levy passed 26-3 Tuesday evening, with 89.6 percent approval.

A total of 10 absentee ballots were cast in both Twin Falls and Owyhee counties, with 21 voters casting ballots at both polls. Among 31 ballots cast in the election, two were rejected.

Parent Kristi Severe said, "the community meeting helped me understand why we needed a levy."

"It's good for the community," said board member Antonia Gonzalez.

When asked about the results, Chairman Harlan Mink said, "It speaks to the support for the school from the community."

Obama's own party worried health plan lacks votes

WASHINGTON — A Republican senator seeking a bipartisan health care deal spoke Sunday of lowering expectations while one of President Barack Obama's Democratic allies questioned whether the White House had the votes necessary for a such a costly and comprehensive plan during a recession.

Obama's proposal to provide health care coverage for some 50 million Americans who lack it has become a contentious point for a Democratic-controlled House and Senate struggling to reach a consensus Obama desperately wants.

Much of the concern came after the nonpartisan

Congressional Budget Office estimated that the plan would cost \$1 trillion over 10 years but cover only about one-third of those now lacking health insurance.

Democrats protested that the estimate overlooked important money-savers to be added later. But Republicans seized on the costly projection and the bill's half-finished nature, throwing Democratic leaders on the defensive.

The United States is the only developed nation that does not have a comprehensive national health care plan for all its citizens.

Sen. Chuck Grassley, the top Republican on the Finance Committee, said officials would have to rethink their best-case scenario for providing a sweep-

ing overhaul of the health care system at a relatively low price.

"So we're in the position of dialing down some of our expectations to get the costs down so that it's affordable and, most importantly, so that it's paid for because we can't go to the point where we are now of not paying for something when we have trillions of dollars of debt," said the Iowa senator.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, a California Democrat, said she wasn't certain there are enough votes in the president's own party to support the proposal.

"I think there's a lot of concern in the Democratic caucus," she said.

The overhaul's chief proponent in the Senate, Chris Dodd of Connecticut, urged

patience as lawmakers continued working on the bill. However, Republican Sens. John McCain of Arizona, and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, said the bill's cost was problematic.

"You do the math," McCain said. "It comes up to \$3 trillion. And so far, we have no proposal for having to pay for it."

The CBO estimates "were a death blow to a government-run health care plan," Graham said. "The Finance Committee has abandoned that. We do need to deal with inflation in health care, private and public inflation, but we're not going to go down to the government-owning-health-care road in America and I think that's the story of this week. There's been a bipartisan rejection of that."

New detector not much better catching nuke matter

WASHINGTON — Federal investigators say the government's next generation of radiation detectors are only marginally better at detecting hidden nuclear material than monitors already at U.S. ports, but would cost more than twice as much.

The machines are intended to prevent terrorists or criminals from smuggling into the U.S. a nuclear bomb or its explosive components hidden in a cargo container.

The monitors now in use can detect the presence of radiation, but they cannot distinguish between threatening and nonthreatening material. Radioactive material can be found naturally in ceramics and kitty litter, but would be of no use in making a bomb, for instance.

The Department of Homeland Security has said the new machines it is developing can distinguish between kitty litter and dan-

gerous radioactive material and produce fewer false alarms than the current ones.

The new ones are also better at detecting lightly shielded material. But the machines perform at about the same level when detecting radiological and nuclear materials hidden in a lead box or casing, the most likely way a terrorist would try to sneak the materials into this country, the Government Accountability Office said in a report to be released Monday.

The report by Congress' investigating agency was requested by Sen. Joseph Lieberman, the Connecticut independent who is chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee.

The report raises the question whether the new machines, at about \$822,000 each, are worth the cost if they're not that much better than current ones that cost about

\$308,000.

The department believes the benefits outweigh the additional cost. But department spokeswoman Sara Kuban said Friday the department would not comment specifically on a report that was not yet public. She said the new machines still are being tested.

In March, Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano told Lieberman's committee that the administration is not asking for money to purchase these machines in 2010.

"The reason is because we were not persuaded that the technology... the capacity of the technology that we needed, was actually there," she said. "Before we come to Congress and ask for more money for new technology, we needed to see something better from the science community."

For years, Congress and the GAO have been skeptical about the cost and testing of the new machines. The new report did not criticize the

department's latest tests, but found the results disappointing.

The new monitors "have a limited ability to detect certain nuclear materials at anything more than light shielding levels," the report said.

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N.M police looking for suspects in Denny's robbery that killed one

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Albuquerque police on Sunday were looking for at least two men who they believe helped commit an armed robbery that turned deadly at a packed Denny's Restaurant.

Two suspects were arrested within minutes of the crime Saturday on suspicion of murder, kidnapping, robbery and child abuse because there were at least five children in the restaurant, Albuquerque Officer Nadine Hamby said.

Hamby said the men who were arrested are in their late 20s to early 30s and are from South America, but she did not know where specifically. She said police were working with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to verify their identities.

Hamby said at least four masked men with rifles and handguns rushed into the northwest Albuquerque Denny's around 9:30 a.m. Saturday and demanded money.

A teenage female employee was fatally shot during the robbery. Police have not yet identified her.

One restaurant employee told police a manager was forced to open the cash register and the robbers took an undetermined amount of cash.

Hamby said police believe the men committed 10 similar robberies in the Albuquerque area in the past year, but no one was shot in those incidents.

She said about 35 detectives, who were in the area as part of a special operation targeting robberies, responded to the restaurant and found two of the suspects quickly.

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. — The U.S. Open moved one round closer to a conclusion Sunday afternoon, even if very little was settled on soggy Bethpage Black and the champion would not be decided for at least one more day.

Ricky Barnes scratched out an even-par 70 and kept his one-shot lead over Lucas Glover.

It was the final hour of the rain-delayed third round that suddenly raised so many intriguing possibilities.

Not long after Barnes became only the fourth player in U.S. Open history to reach double digits under par, his game became a struggle. He went to the back nine with a six-shot lead, but when his 4-foot par putt on the 18th didn't touch the hole, most of that was gone.

Barnes, who has never held a 54-hole lead anywhere but the minor leagues, was at 8-under 202

and paired in the final group with Glover, who rallied with three birdies on the back nine to shoot 70.

"I knew it was going to be wet and tough, and I knew my nerves would be tested," Barnes said. "I wouldn't have liked to bogey the last hole and end it that way. But I've got to go back, take my shoes off and think, 'Hey, I shot even par on Saturday with the lead! If I go out and do the same thing, someone is going to have to really come back low ... to catch me.'"

While it was another four shots to find the next group of challengers, they were optimistic — particularly Phil Mickelson.

Mickelson, determined to finally bring home a U.S. Open trophy to a wife battling breast cancer, knocked in a 30-foot birdie on the 16th hole and finished with a 35-foot birdie on the final hole to shoot 69, leaving him six shots behind.

He made his share of mistakes, as always. But he also made

seven birdies.

"I'm one good round away," Mickelson said. "I feel like if I can get a hot round going, I can make up the difference."

David Duval, winless in eight years and now No. 882 in the world ranking, continued to stay in the picture. Right when he looked to be fading, he carved a shot out of the trampled rough and around the trees to 10 feet for birdie on the 16th, then stuffed a 7-iron into seven feet on the final hole for another birdie and a 70. He was at 3-under 207 with rising star Ross Fisher of England, who had a 69.

The fourth round started at 5:45 p.m., with the leaders likely to get in only a couple of holes before darkness forced them to return for a Monday finish.

Eleven players remained under par, a group that did not include defending champion Tiger Woods.

SONOMA, Calif. — Kasey Kahne gave struggling Richard Petty Motorsports a much-needed boost Sunday, holding off Tony Stewart at Infineon Raceway to snap a 37-race winless streak.

Kahne was met in Victory Lane by Richard Petty, who made his first trip as a car owner in more than a decade. A Petty-owned

car had not won a race since John Andretti's victory at Martinsville in April, 1999.

"I feel just as good as he does," said The King, clad in his trademark cowboy hat and sunglasses. "It's great, man. It's great."

Petty's race team teetered on the verge of collapse at the end of last season and needed a January merger with Gillett-Evernam Motorsports to stay in business. The team was rebranded as Richard Petty Motorsports and

kicked off the season with a strong showing at the Daytona 500.

But it's been a rough ride, since Team manufacturer Chrysler is in Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection, and funding to RPM has slowed to a crawl as Dodge restructures. The team laid off nine employees earlier this month and made company-wide salary cuts, and it's been plagued by whispers of financial instability the last several weeks.

Just Saturday, majority team owner George Gillett agreed to sell the NHL's Montreal Canadiens in a deal that should help him fight any solvency issues.

It's made for a frustrating season for Kahne, the star of the four-driver team, who at times this year has been vocal about RPM's progress. His criticism prompted team officials to push

Judge to consider sentencing Jayson Williams

TRENTON, N.J. — A judge on Monday will consider whether former NBA star Jayson Williams should be sentenced for covering up a fatal shooting at his mansion in 2002, given Williams' recent erratic behavior, including a assault on Nrt Croin.

Williams, 31, was acquitted of aggravated manslaughter in 2004 but convicted on four counts of trying to cover up the shooting of a hired driver at his Hunterdon County mansion. The jury couldn't reach a verdict on a reckless manslaughter count, and State Superior Court

Judge Edward M. Coleman has delayed sentencing pending Williams' retrial on that charge.

Prosecutors are asking the judge to reconsider the sentencing delay due to Williams' recent run-ins with the law.

In April, police used a stun gun on Williams during an altercation in a New York hotel room, and in May he was arrested in North Carolina and charged with assault for allegedly punching someone in a barroom dispute. Earlier this year, his wife filed divorce papers claiming he was abusive and had a drug problem.

The four cover-up counts on which Williams was convicted — including witness and evidence

tampering — carry a combined maximum sentence of 13 years in prison. However, Williams was not expected to receive a term longer than five years, the maximum sentence for the most serious charge.

Williams' retrial, scheduled for January, has been pushed back several times, notably after it was disclosed in 2007 that an investigator in the prosecutor's office used a racial slur to describe Williams in 2002. Williams' defense team is seeking to have the cover-up convictions reversed on grounds of racial bias.

Hunterdon County Assistant Prosecutor Bennett Barlyn has asked Coleman to set a sentencing

hearing, citing Williams' behavior.

"Defendant's escalating acts of unlawful and aberrant behavior constitute a clear and present danger to the public and the safety of the community," Barlyn wrote in his motion asking for the sentencing.

"I thought he should have been sentenced from the day we got the verdict from the jury," said Christofi's sister, Andrea Adams, speaking by telephone from a restaurant she owns in Somerville, not far from the courthouse where the trial was held.

"If it were anyone else, he would have already been sentenced," she added. "I guess when you have money, that's what happens."

According to witnesses, 55-year-old Costas Christofi was killed when Williams took a loaded 12-gauge shotgun from a cabinet in his bedroom in front of several people and cracked it open, then snapped it closed. The gun fired once, hitting Christofi in the chest.

Witnesses testified that Williams wiped down the shotgun and placed it in the victim's hands, then stripped off his own clothes and jumped into his pool.

Williams' defense team says the shooting was an accident and that the gun misfired. Christofi's family received a reported \$2.75 million settlement from Williams in 2003.

Franchitti wins Iowa 250 ahead of Briscoe

NEWTON, Iowa — Dario Franchitti was disappointed that Saturday's qualifying for the Iowa Corn Indy 250 was canceled. He felt that a few late tweaks made to his No. 10 car had turned it into a "rocket ship."

Franchitti settled instead for Sunday's checkered flag — his second victory in two tries at the Iowa Speedway.

Franchitti took the lead with 50 laps to go and cruised to victory in the Iowa Corn Indy 250. Franchitti beat Ryan Briscoe by just over five seconds to grab his first victory since the Streets of Long Beach in April and move into second place in the IRL standings.

It was the 10th career IndyCar win for the Scot, who took the lead three laps after making his final pit stop on the 7/8-mile oval.

"In the last stop, the changes were fantastic and I was able to pull away — I had a good gap on (Briscoe)," Franchitti said. "I was able to get through traffic really well."

Briscoe finished second for the third straight race despite leading for 85 laps. Hideki Mutoh took a season-best third

after notching a career best of second in Iowa in 2008.

Dan Wheldon was fourth, while pole-sitter Helio Castroneves took seventh.

Briscoe maintained his lead in the points race — becoming the first driver this season to do so for more than one race. He's three points ahead of Franchitti and 15 up on Scott Dixon, who finished fifth.

"I don't think we're doing anything wrong. We're doing an extraordinary job as a whole team," said Briscoe, who has led the most laps at each of his last three races. "It's just going to be like this the rest of the season. It's going to be very close."

The start of the race was marred by a number of accidents and cautions. By the halfway point, seven cars had been knocked out — including Tony Kanaan, who had led for 48 laps.

Kanaan crashed for the third time at Iowa, this time by hitting the wall shortly after a pit stop. After three straight top-five finishes to start the season, Kanaan hasn't finished three of his last four races.

Worse yet, Kanaan has crashed in the same corner three straight years at Iowa.

Danica Patrick took her first lead of the season 38 laps in after Justin Wilson's spinout brought out a yellow flag. Raphael Matos then spun out and Mario Moraes lost control trying to avoid him, drawing the fourth caution of the day just 55 laps in.

Patrick led for 24 laps but wound up ninth, her worst finish since taking 19th at the Streets of St. Petersburg.

Castroneves hit Dixon from behind on lap 18, forcing Castroneves into pit row for a new right wing and Dixon for new tires.

E.J. Viso's No. 13 car got loose during the first lap and hit the wall, knocking him out for the seventh time in seven races. Ryan Hunter-Reay, in his first race for A.J. Foyt Racing, got caught up in the debris and couldn't continue.

Heavy rain swept through central Iowa on Sunday morning but was gone about three hours before the start of the race. There were lingering concerns over whether "weepers" — water that seeps up through the track following heavy precipitation — would delay the race, but it started on time.

The race was reminiscent of the inaugural event in 2007, which also featured a number of cautions and Franchitti on the podium.

Woods made only one mistake — taking two hacks with the wedge to escape knee-high grass around the 14th green — but more troubling was that he made only three birdies after giving himself so many chances inside 15 feet. He had to settle for a 68 and was nine shots behind. He has never won a tournament trailing by more than eight going into the final round.

"Obviously, it's not totally in my control," said Woods, at 1-over 211. "Only thing I can control is whether I can play a good one or not."

Control belongs to Barnes, although not as much as he would have liked.

He set the 36-hole U.S. Open scoring record, then looked as though he might shatter several more when he rolled in a 25-foot eagle putt at No. 4 to reach 11 under. The only other players to be double digits under par at a U.S. Open were Gil Morgan (1992), Tiger Woods (2000) and Jim Furyk (2003). Woods is the only player to finish there.

But with a six-shot lead at the turn, Barnes suddenly looked shaky.

He hit only three fairways on the back nine, and birdie chances were limited. He steadied himself with a good chip to 4 feet for birdie on the par-5 13th, and rolled in a 35-foot birdie from behind the hole at the par-3 17th.

But from the 18th fairway, his approach buried in deep grass and he missed the par save.

Glover closed on him quickly, shooting a 32 on the back nine to get back in the game. He went into the final round feeling as though no one was giving him a chance to win — not with such an unlikely leader in Barnes, and so many other All-Stars behind him like former Masters champion Mike Weir in the group at 208, two-time U.S. Open champion Retief Goosen at 209, even Woods.

Twin Falls County should ponder parting with SIRCOMM

Consider the options that the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office has in receiving emergency calls and dispatching officers. Less than a mile from the Courthouse, the city of Twin Falls runs a relatively trouble-free, five-year-old 911 dispatch facility into which county calls could be seamlessly integrated.

Fourteen miles away in Jerome sits the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center — an operation with recent management problems, outdated equipment that will be expensive to upgrade, and no bookkeeper.

Twin Falls County now partners with Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties to operate SIRCOMM, but Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter said recently he's had informal discussions with Twin Falls Police Chief Jim Munn about switching to the city's call center.

“It would absolutely make sense both professionally and fiscally,” Carter told the *Times-News*.

The sheriff would be remiss if he *didn't* consider changing. An all-Twin Falls 911 operation would have advantages.

In part that's because Carter has moved closer to integrating TFCSO with other law enforcement agencies in the county. He's authorized Twin Falls city, Buhl, Kimberly and Filer police to make arrests in the county's jurisdiction, and county and Twin Falls city detectives might share office space.

Likewise, there would likely be efficiencies to be found in a dispatch merger.

The city of Twin Falls and SIRCOMM went through a messy divorce in 2003, with the city claiming it was being overcharged for the service it was receiving. Twin Falls also complained that SIRCOMM's staffing was inadequate, that its employees lacked professionalism, and that dispatchers couldn't adequately differentiate between calls that required police attention and those that didn't.

Twin Falls eventually paid a settlement of almost \$1 million to go its own way. The pricetag might be similar for Twin Falls County, and it's contractually obligated to give two years' notice before departing SIRCOMM.

What would become of SIRCOMM without Twin Falls County's participation is anybody's guess. Half of SIRCOMM's annual revenue — \$1 million — comes from the county.

It's far from certain that Twin Falls County would leave. Carter says he's not contemplating it, and County Commissioner Tom Mikesell is the chairman of the SIRCOMM Joint Powers Board.

But much depends on whether SIRCOMM's soon-to-be-named director can solve the dispatch center's chronic problems. If things don't turn around, Carter and Twin Falls County can go another way.

Our view: Twin Falls County has been an integral part of the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center since it was established 15 years ago. But combining dispatch operations with the City of Twin Falls might be an attractive alternative.

Obama's not really a burger-and-fries guy

WASHINGTON — Even as he grows arugula in the White House vegetable garden, Barack Obama never again wants to be seen as the hoity-toity guy fretting over the price of arugula at Whole Foods.

That is why the president ends up sending mixed signals on food. He clearly feels strongly about nutrition and fat. The child who looks a little chubby in that famous picture of himself with his long-lost father in Hawaii grew up to be extremely careful about eating and drinking in a healthy way.

The willowy commander in chief urges out-of-shape and overweight aides to go to his Chicago trainer who now works part-time at the White House — and even offers to treat especially recalcitrant cases.

On a date night this spring with Michelle at the Georgetown restaurant Citronelle, the president showed how calorie-conscious he was when, over a three-hour meal, he managed the impossible feat of nibbling only one french fry. “He wants to stay skinny, you know?” chef Michel Richard mischievously told “Extra” afterward.

On the campaign, Obama seemed an organic proselytizer for healthier eating, telling black audiences to stop serving their kids cold Popeyes chicken and “give 'em some breakfast.”

It was easy to imagine a scenario where the president and his body man, Reggie Love, would have their own early-morning TV show called “Downward Facing Dawn,” coaxing a reluctant nation into a regimen of yoga and yogurt.

When he talked to the American Medical Association on Monday, the president again urged Americans to make their children “step away from the video games and spend more time playing outside” and cut “down on all the junk food that's fueling an epidemic of obesity.”

He said he was trying to instill this lesson in his own daughters and at schools around the country. “As some of you know, we started a White House vegetable garden,” he noted. “I say ‘we’ generously, because Michelle's done most of the work.”

But often, when the cameras are rolling, Obama puts his organic tea aside and makes a show of heading for the nearest greasy spoon.

He boosted the business of Ray's Hell Burger in Arlington, Va., after he took Joe Biden there in a monster



motorcade for lunch and ordered a cheese-burger with Dijon mustard (a spicy detail that amused Republicans).

When Brian Williams did his day-at-the-White House special two weeks ago, the president took the anchor to a Five Guys burger joint. He ordered himself a cheese-burger and fries and, in an extravagant attempt to prove his meaty regular guynom, brought back \$80 worth of burgers and fries in a greasy bag for White House staffers. (After a tour of the Sphinx in Egypt, the president evoked his love of red meat again, saying “Five Guys was good. This is better.”)

Michelle sometimes takes her staff on impromptu lunch trips to Five Guys or other burger and barbeque spots.

But Tuesday, when schoolchildren were harvesting crops in the White House vegetable garden (though not the Thomas Jefferson lettuce, which had gone to seed), they were brushed back from fried food by Michelle and her associate chef, Sam Kass.

“This is a healthier version of fried chicken,” the first lady, wearing orange jeans, said as the kids prepared their own baked chicken snack.

Kass added: “Breaded and baked is the new fried.”

Michelle said she had wanted the organic garden as a way to underscore the need for better nutrition.

“Nearly a third of the children in

this country are either overweight or obese, and a third will suffer from diabetes at some point in their lifetime,” she said. “In Hispanic and African-American communities, those numbers climb even

higher so that nearly half of the children in those communities will suffer the same fate.”

She said America has become so unhealthy because too many kids “are not eating right and they're not moving their bodies at all.”

When she was growing up, she recalled that desserts and fast food were rare: “It was a special treat. And we would beg to get it, and it was exciting if we drove into a fast-food place and got a hamburger. We were thrilled. It was like Christmas. ... If we got pizza on a Friday night, that was a treat.”

Obama ostentatiously treats himself to fries and burgers to beef up his average-Joe image (even though he's anything but). Yet maybe when Charlie Gibson and Diane Sawyer come next week to broadcast a special on health care from inside the White House, the president should forgo the photo-op of the grease-stained bovine bag and take the TV stars out for what he really wants and America really needs: some steamed fish with a side of snap peas.

Simple education for Magic Valley drivers

As a public service to the Magic Valley, I've taken it upon myself to educate the masses about automobile transportation. None of what you see here is new or revolutionary, though as the years, nay, days, go by, our brains fill up and kick out seemingly useless information. What follows isn't useless, though it seems many brains out there feel as such. So, I've compiled a short list of common courtesies to keep in mind while piloting your vehicle.

You have a blinker, use it. And by “use it” I don't mean put it on after you're in the turn lane. This helps no one. Once a vehicle is in the designated turn lane, the rest of us figure you're pretty much going to go ahead and turn. Before, not after, please.

Related to the first rule, while turning across traffic, please use the median lane — that's the long strip bordered by a solid and dashed yellow line on each side. 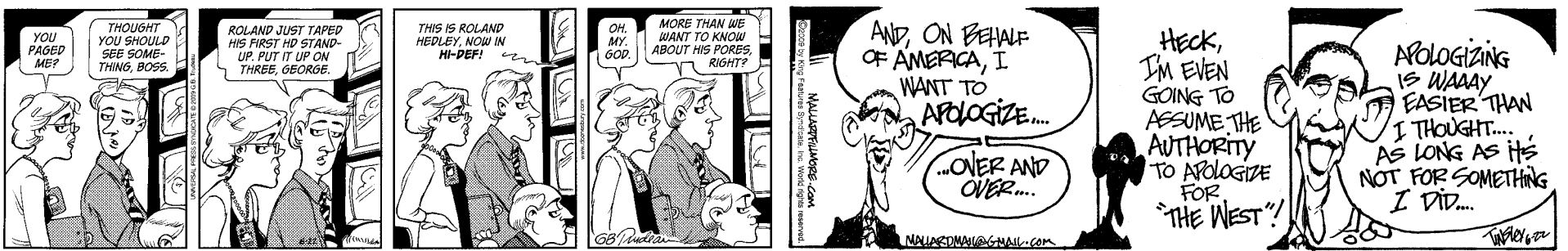

Arrests of Rafsanjani kin show Iran clerics split

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran's government said Sunday it arrested the daughter and four other relatives of former President Hashemi Rafsanjani, one of the country's most powerful men, in a move that exposed a rift among the ruling Islamic clerics over the disputed presidential election.

State media also reported at least 10 more deaths, bringing the official toll for a week of confrontations to at least 17. State television inside Iran said 10 were killed and 100 injured in clashes Saturday between demonstrators contesting the result of the June 12 election and black-clad police wielding truncheons, tear gas and water cannons.

Police and members of the Basij militia took up positions in the afternoon on major streets and squares, including the site of Saturday's clashes. There was no word on any new clashes Sunday, although

after dark many people in Tehran went to their rooftops to shout "Death to the dictator" and Allahu akbar," a common form of defiance in recent days.

State-run Press TV reported that Rafsanjani's eldest daughter, Faezeh Hashemi, and four other unidentified family members were arrested late Saturday. Initial reports suggested Hashemi was still being held Sunday after the others were released. But

both Iran's ambassador to France, Seyed Mehdi Miraboutalebi, speaking on France's RFI radio, and Iran's al-Alam Arabic-language television channel said Sunday that she'd been released as well.

Last week, state television showed images of Hashemi, 46, speaking to hundreds of supporters of opposition candidate Mir Hossein Mousavi. He alleges fraud in the June 12 election, which the government

said President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad won.

After Hashemi's appearance, hard-line students gathered outside the Tehran prosecutor's office and accused her of treason, state radio reported.

The arrests are the strongest sign yet of a serious divide among Iran's ruling clerics.

Also Sunday, Parliament Speaker Ali Larijani said on state television that the number of people questioning the election results was large and "this group should be respected and one should not mix this big population's account with a small group of rioters."

Rafsanjani, 75, heads two powerful institutions. One of them, the cleric-run Assembly of Experts, has the power to monitor and remove the supreme leader, the country's most powerful figure. The second is the Expediency Council, a body that arbitrates disputes between parliament and the unelected Guardian Council, which can block legislation.

Afghan firefight shows challenge for U.S. troops

NOW ZAD, Afghanistan — Missiles, machine guns and strafing runs from fighter jets destroyed much of a Taliban compound, but the insurgents had a final surprise for a pair of U.S. Marines who pushed into the smoldering building just before nightfall.

As the two men walked up an alley, the Taliban opened fire from less than 15 yards, sending bullets and tracer fire crackling inches past them. They fled under covering fire from their comrades, who hurled grenades at the enemy position before sprinting to their armored vehicles.

The assault capped a day of fighting Saturday in the poppy fields, orchards and walled compounds of southern Afghanistan between newly arrived U.S. Marines and well dug-in Taliban fighters. It was a foretaste of what will likely be a bloody summer as Washington tries to turn around a bogged-down, eight-year-old war with a surge of 21,000 troops.

"This was the first time we pushed this far. I guess they don't like us coming into their back door," said Staff Sgt. Luke Medlin, who was sweeping the alley for booby traps as Marine Gunner John Daly covered him from behind when the Taliban struck.

"And now they know we will be back," said Medlin, from Indiana.

The fighting was on the outskirts of Now Zad, a town that in many ways symbolizes what went wrong in Afghanistan and the enormous challenges facing the United States. It is in Helmand province, a center of the insurgency and the opium poppy trade that helps fund it.

Like much of Afghanistan, Now Zad and the surround-

ing area were largely peaceful after the 2001 invasion. The United Nations and other Western-funded agencies sent staff to build wells and health clinics.

But in 2006 — with American attention focused on Iraq — the insurgency stepped up in the south. Almost all the city's 35,000 people fled, along with the aid workers.

British and Estonian troops, then garrisoned in Now Zad, were unable to defeat the insurgents. They were replaced last year by a small company of about 300 U.S. Marines, who live in a base in the center of the deserted town and on two hills overlooking it.

The Taliban hold much of the northern outskirts and the orchards beyond, where they have entrenched defensive positions, tunnels and bunkers.

The Marines outnumber the Taliban in the area by at least 3-to-1 and have vastly superior weapons but avoid offensive operations because they lack the manpower to hold territory once they take it. There are no Afghan police or troops

here to help.

"We don't have the people to backfill us. Why clear something that we cannot hold?" said Lt. Col. Patrick Cashman, head of the battalion in charge of Now Zad and other districts in Helmand and Farah provinces, where some 10,000 Marines are slowly spreading out in the first wave of the troop surge.

Cashman said the Marines did not intend to allow the Taliban free rein in parts of Now Zad, but was unable to give any specific plans or time frame for addressing what he acknowledged is "a bad situation."

Saturday's mission was aimed at gathering intelli-

gence and drawing a response from enemy positions close to a street called "Pakistani alley" because of one-time reports suggesting fighters from across the border had dug in there.

"We're bait," one Marine said as the convoy of five vehicles left the base at 8 a.m. and trundled north.

It quickly came across a roadside bomb — the kind which killed a member of the company on June 6 and has wounded at least seven others in the four weeks since the company has been stationed here. An engineer was dispatched and came back an hour later carrying the parts of the bomb — two 82mm mortar shells attached to a pressure plate.

Vote decriminalizing some drug use raises objections in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — Could Mexican cities become Latin Amsterdams, flooded by drug users seeking penalty-free tokes and toots?

That is the fear, if somewhat overstated, of some Mexican officials, especially in northern border states that serve as a mecca for underage American drinkers.

The Mexican legislature has voted quietly to decriminalize the possession of small amounts of pot, cocaine, methamphetamine and other drugs, an effort that in the past has proved highly controversial.

There has been less protest this time around, in part because there hasn't been much publicity.

Some critics have suggested easing the punishment on

drug possession sends the wrong message at a time when President Felipe Calderon is waging a bloody war on major narcotics traffickers. The battle between law enforcement authorities and drug suspects has claimed more than 11,000 lives in the last 2 1/2 years.

But it was Calderon himself who proposed the decriminalization legislation.

His reasoning: It makes sense to distinguish between small-time users and big-time dealers, while re-targeting major crime-fighting resources away from the former and toward the latter and their drug lord bosses.

"The important thing is ... that consumers are not treated as criminals," said Rafael Ruiz Mena, secretary general of the National Institute of Penal Sciences.

Tips for working out before the sun's up

If you have someone meeting you at the gym, chances are you won't leave them hanging to get an extra hour of sleep, Snow said. So talk to a co-worker, a friend, a family member or anyone who will hold you accountable. And in the process, you'll be helping them work out, too.

Keep it interesting

It's simple: If you don't enjoy your morning workout, you are less likely to get out of bed for it, Snow said. So if you hate bicycling, don't sign up for a 5 a.m. spinning class.

If you find yourself tiring of your regular routine, switch it up. Go for a walk and watch the sun rise instead of spending 20 minutes on the elliptical, or try new ab exercises. Give yourself a workout to look forward to.

OMG, get off the couch, U R 2 lazy today

You know that little voice in your head? The one that nags you to go to the gym after spending a sedentary weekend watching the "Real Housewives of New Jersey" marathon on TV?

University of Southern California researchers are trying to convert that voice into a series of text messages that could motivate the obese teens to get active and lose weight.

The team has devised a wireless body area network that includes an accelerometer, a heart rate monitor, a GPS device and a sensor that measures the electrical conductivity of skin. All the data is relayed to a Nokia phone, which then transmits it to a secure server.

The device will become so attuned to its wearer that the researchers have dubbed this the KNOWME Networks study, said Donna Spruijt-Metz of the Keck School of Medicine, who described the project at the Childhood Obesity Conference in Los Angeles.

"We'll train the sensors to guess pretty well what you're doing," she said.

And if they conclude that you've been parked on the couch too long on a sunny afternoon, the network won't hesitate to let you know.

"We'd like to be able to ping you and say, 'You've been inactive for six hours, and your friend Courtney is three miles away and running - there's an activity possibility for you,'" said Spruijt-Metz, an associate professor in preventive medicine.

The device can tell whether the wearer is walking, running or engaging in another form of physical activity. But there are some exceptions. The current model isn't waterproof, so swimming doesn't count. The accelerometers also have trouble sensing when the wearer is peddling a bicycle. Team members from the USC Viterbi School of Engineering are working out those kinks, Spruijt-Metz said.

The researchers hope to strap the belts onto about two dozen high school students by the end of the year, with the ultimate goal of tracking - and nagging - 50 obese teens for a week. The study is being funded by a \$1 million grant from the National Institutes of Health.

Smoking and obesity are equally risky, study finds

Pop quiz for teenagers: Are you more likely to die from smoking more than 10 cigarettes a day or from being obese? According to a study from the British Medical Journal, it's a tie.

Swedish researchers studied health records of 45,920 men drafted by the Swedish army in 1969-70 at an average age of 18 years, 8 months. Then they consulted Sweden's national cause of death registry and found that 2,897 had died as of Sept. 1, 2007.

It turned out that compared with having a healthy body mass index of 18.5 to 24.9, being overweight (BMI of 25 to 29.9) increased the risk of death by 35 percent, and being obese (BMI above 30) boosted it by a factor of 2.25. Compared with non-smokers, light smokers were

55 percent more likely to die and heavy smokers increased their risk of death by a factor of 2.18.

Not surprisingly, those most likely to die were obese heavy smokers - their risk was nearly fivefold higher than for nonsmokers of healthy weight.

"I get it over and done with," Iverson said. Since Iverson started working out regularly, he has lost 15 pounds and two inches off his waist. He comes with his mother, who goes to the first spinning class of the day.

Eric Snow, fitness director at YMCA Twin Falls, said that early-morning workouts can stimulate metabo-

lism and keep energy up throughout the day. And according to fitness site Sparkpeople.com, a morning workout can increase concentration at work by stimulating blood flow to the brain and decreasing stress levels.

Adults aren't the only ones who benefit from a morning workout. Downstairs, brothers Uriah, Barrett and McKenzie Manning played racquetball.

The homeschooled boys like to come to the gym early in the morning in the summers to avoid the crowds, said Uriah. The brothers get to the gym by 5:15 a.m., while their parents, Bill and Brenda Manning, participate in the spinning class.

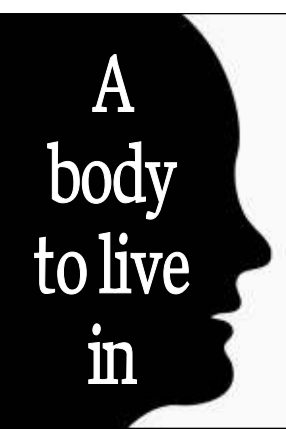
The boys admitted that the allure of a warm, cozy bed sometimes prevents them from getting up in the mornings. And even Snow said he sometimes struggles

with early-morning motivation.

"I know for myself it's not always easy to get up," Snow said.

Magic Valley Pride planning event.

The tests, which coincide with National HIV Testing Day, require no more than a risk evaluation and a finger poke, said Twin Falls clinic nurse Mary Jensen. The appointment takes about 30 minutes and yields immediate results. If a test comes up as positive, nurses will collect another blood sample to send to the Idaho state laboratory for verification.

HIV tests normally cost \$60 at the district health office if the patient is paying out-of-pocket, Jensen said. Tests at physicians' offices cost even more.

Don and Jensen said it is important for people to know their HIV status, especially if they are sexually active. And with medication and lifestyle changes, HIV patients can live regular lives.

"It's not really a death sentence anymore," said Don, who added that he plans to live until he is 90 years old.

It has been 17 years since Don received his diagnosis. He lives with his partner, who is HIV-negative, and takes his medications on a regular schedule.

He said he understands the fear of potentially having HIV, but said it is even scarier to not know one's HIV status.

"Not knowing will kill you," Don said. "Knowing might save your life."

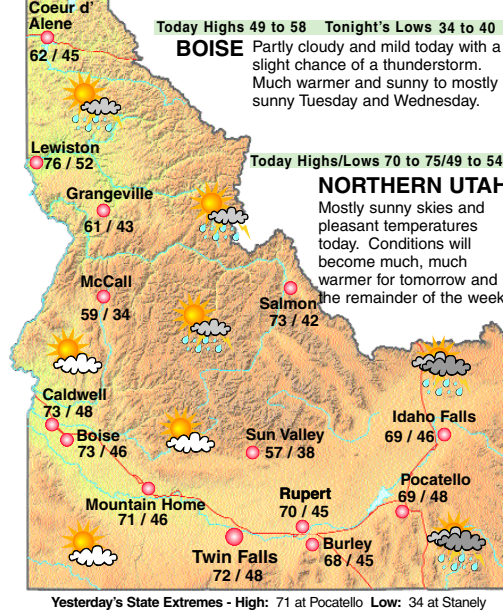

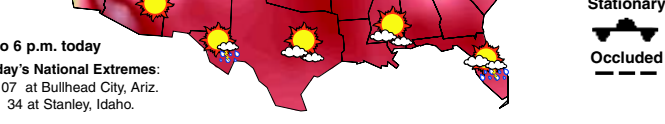
