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

T.F. Police haven't issued any fireworks citations

The rockets' red glare wasn't accompanied by flashing red lights this Fourth of July.

The Twin Falls Police Department issued just one citation for a fireworks violation last year and none so far this summer, police said Thursday.

Last year, Christopher Estridge was found guilty of two fireworks-related misdemeanors — discharge of illegal fireworks and disturbing the peace — and paid \$275.50 in fines and fees. But this year, there have been no citations or fines issued, said Twin Falls Police Capt. Matt Hicks. There have been 106 noise complaints in July so far, most of which are probably related to fireworks, Hicks said.

The lack of citations is because the department prefers to confiscate illegal fireworks rather than bring someone

Seeking help in the Promised Land

Refugees struggle to start lives in America

Before arriving in Twin Falls, Som Subedi lived the life of a Bhutanese refugee in a bamboo hut.

It had a dirt floor, with no electricity — only a kerosene lamp. The roof was made of plastic woven among the bamboo.

Such was a life he lived for about 18 years in Timai, one of seven refugee camps in Nepal that are home for more than 100,000 Bhutanese refugees.

Subedi lived with his wife and three children in the hut,

which was only about the same size as his Twin Falls apartment's carpeted living room. And so, for nearly two decades, the United States was a promised land of sorts for Subedi, a place where refugees hoped to go for a better life.

But after coming to Twin Falls through the College of Southern Idaho's Refugee Center, Subedi is having second thoughts.

He has found no job and is struggling to learn English. The eight-month period in which refugees receive cash payments to help with rent and living

Sotomayor puts on best face, but who is she?

NEW YORK — For weeks, Sonya Sotomayor has put on her best face, displaying a pleasant disposition that has somewhat fended off critics of her nomination to become the nation's first Hispanic Supreme Court justice.

A federal judge the past 17 years, 11 of them on the 2nd Circuit Court of Appeals, Sotomayor escaped the rough South Bronx streets of her childhood cheerfully immersed in Nancy Drew books and Perry Mason episodes on TV.

In the seven weeks since President Obama nominated her, Sotomayor has faced a barrage of questions about her past with no public avenues to respond, aside from carefully scripted White House statements about her rise from the housing project where her Puerto Rican parents relocated after World War II, and comments from friends and colleagues.

Critics of her selection, aware she will

Feinstein: CIA concealment broke the law

WASHINGTON — Six months into Barack Obama's presidency, his Democratic allies are pushing for twin investigations into Bush-era torture and anti-terrorism policies.

Two senators including the head of the intelligence committee suggested Sunday that the prior administration broke

the law by concealing a CIA counterterrorism program from Congress.

The assertion that Vice President Dick Cheney ordered the concealment came amid word that Attorney General Eric Holder is contemplating opening a criminal probe of possible CIA torture.

A move to appoint a criminal prosecutor is certain to stir partisan bickering that could prove

a distraction to Obama's efforts to push ambitious health care and energy reform.

Obama has repeatedly expressed reluctance to probing alleged Bush-era abuses. He resisted an effort by congressional Democrats to establish a "truth commission," saying the nation should be "looking forward and not backwards."

Regarding the 8-year-old counterterrorism program, the

Bush administration's failure to notify Congress "is a big problem, because the law is very clear," said Senate Intelligence Committee chairwoman Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif.

Congress should investigate the secrecy because "it could be illegal," Democratic Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., said.

According to Feinstein, CIA

Warm weather rallies valley bikers for charity

Weekend event raised money for sick kids

MURTAUGH — Despite the clouds, a warm sun still shone down Saturday on Murtaugh Lake Park.

It was just what the members of the Snake River Bros. biker organization had hoped for when they rescheduled their annual Rally in the Valley for a July weekend rather than a June one.

The rally, in its fourth year, has become the nonprofit's major source of funds for children in need of medical attention. For \$20 — just \$15 for teenagers — a person could

camp out on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, enjoying music, an evening bonfire, raffles and other events.

Jeff Olson, the group's events chairman, said Saturday that attendance had already beat out last year's, when cold

weather discouraged all but roughly 520 people from showing up. The group raised \$19,000 two years ago, and keeps its expenses to a minimum to save as much money as possible for the kids, he said. The group has given away about \$90,000 in the nine years it's been around, raised from events that also include a charity ride to Elko, Nev., scheduled for the end of this week.

This year, members heard from bikers as far away as Canada and Seattle interested in coming. Besides the

fundraising, the rally has helped garner attention for Snake River Bros., current president Bob Steinmetz said.

"It's a good deal," he said. "Everybody likes it."

Mid-afternoon on Saturday, boats roamed across the lake as bikers lounged in the shade on shore and band Sound County began a four-hour set on stage.

likely reinforce the liberal wing of the high court, have put a microscope to her past statements, speeches, rulings and the sometimes brusque questions that she's posed to lawyers over the years in an effort to portray her as an activist ideologue.

The search for who she really is escalates this week when she faces critics and supporters alike in the very public forum of Senate Judiciary Committee hearings that will be beamed across the nation on television.

So far, the nation has seen a friendly Sotomayor, 54, shaking hands with the denizens of Capitol Hill and smiling through the pain of a broken ankle that occurred as she boarded a flight from New York to Washington to visit senators who will decide her fate.

A generally sunny nature has characterized her spirited approach to overcoming a litany of heartaches that began even before she was 10, when she faced the death of her father and was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes.

"I like to laugh," she says, describing herself in an interview when she became a federal appeals court judge in 1998 as "fun-loving, very open and very human."

In Greenwich Village, where she lives, she celebrates her fondness for food and friends with frequent dinner gatherings and outings to watch dance, ballet, opera and baseball. Her romantic life has been sporadic. Her seven-year marriage to a high school sweetheart ended in divorce.

She credits laughter with easing her childhood in the projects in the late '50s and

early '60s, when subsidized housing was less dangerous than decades later but lacked the comforts and quiet of the suburbs. She went to a Catholic high school, Princeton and Yale Law School.

She worked several years as a state prosecutor under Manhattan District Attorney Robert M. Morgenthau, a man Sotomayor says "I greatly admire" and someone slated to testify at her hearing. She also worked at a Manhattan law firm before she became a judge in 1992.

In court, Sotomayor has regularly confronted lawyers, often brisk but not belligerent in her questioning of them after thoroughly researching a case and studying the relevant law and related cases on her own. Unprepared lawyers are no match for her.

Sotomayor has acknowledged that she is "extraordinarily intense," has had to seek out laughs where she could find them in recent weeks. Since her nomination, she has been alternately praised and pilloried.

Her foes labeled her a racial activist for siding with the city of New Haven, Conn., after it tossed out a promotional examination for firemen when minorities performed worse than their white counterparts. The Supreme Court in a 5-to-4 ruling overturned the decision two weeks ago.

She defended her membership in an all-female networking club, saying it did not practice "invidious discrimination," then resigned from it to erase it as a distraction from the analysis of her qualifications and record.

expenses has ended. He worries about being evicted and living in the streets without a home for his family.

"Now, I'm thinking that the life in camp is way better," Subedi said in an interview with the *Times-News*, speaking through a translator. "... Right now, there is no one to help me."

While more luxurious than a bamboo hut that he paid no rent for, Subedi's sparsely furnished apartment costs \$550 a month in rent. And his challenges are made more difficult with a rocky economy and a statewide unemployment rate that reached 8.4 percent in June.

The economy means refugees like Subedi are likely to face stiffer competition for jobs than in past years.

"It used to be there were enough job openings that marginal individuals could slide into," said Ron Black, director of the refugee center. "It's an employer's market and they're being real picky. You're not one of two or three. You're one of 50 or 100."

While it's more difficult for refugees to find work, Black stresses that putting all the blame on the econo-

my oversimplifies the issue. Instead, the economy has become one more obstacle among other challenges, like the need for refugees to apply themselves to learning English and be willing to take whatever work is available.

Typically, the goal is for refugees to be employed by their fourth month here, though that timeline has slipped a bit beyond that month, Black said. While the situation is less than ideal, the CSI Refugee Center received a spot of bright news on Friday.

The center, along with other resettlement programs in Idaho, was notified

that the government is allowing more flexibility in how federal Office of Refugee Resettlement funds are used in the Gem State for transitional housing. For families like Subedi's, that could mean additional assistance with rent beyond the eighth month, though Black cautions that it's not an open-ended arrangement.

Instead, it potentially can provide refugees another month or so of help while moving toward a life of independence, he said, adding that the center is actively seeking resources for the family.

Black said the center's

working hard to find jobs for refugees and make contacts with potential employers.

In the Boise area, the federal government's decision could help between 10 and 20 refugee families each month, said Wendy Morgan, communications specialist for the Idaho Office for Refugees.

While refugees — like the rest of the state — wait for the economy to rebound, Morgan said they are encouraged to sharpen their English skills, take job-training classes and build a work history with part-time and temporary jobs.

Others in the community of Bhutanese refugees of Twin Falls sympathize with Subedi, saying he is not alone in his struggle. Krishna Regmi, also of Bhutanese origins, echoes what Subedi says: That it makes no sense for the government to bring refugees to the United States if it cannot provide the help they need.

After all, once the refugees arrive in the United States, they stay here.

"I wish I had a fund to buy tickets back for some of those who are struggling but want to go back, but there is no fund," Black said.

through the criminal justice system, Hicks said. He said officers, typically prompted by witnesses or reports, ask people to voluntarily give them up.

"It's an issue we acknowledge people may be not be familiar with the law," Hicks said. "It would take too much manpower and paper work ... if we issued citations every time we encountered someone with illegal fireworks."

The confiscated fireworks — police have collected hundreds so far — are stored in a police bunker and eventually destroyed.

City Councilman Lee Heider, who at Monday's council meeting questioned whether the city was being consistent in its policy, said Thursday he was glad to hear no citations were made. He said police are using the right approach.

"I think that's a lot bet-

ter than issuing citations to kids just out having some fun," he said. "It's one thing to have fireworks confiscated and lose 50 bucks and it's another thing to get a misdemeanor."

Hicks said the lack of citations proves the policy is consistent. Council members also touched on how they've heard people travel outside the city, purchase illegal fireworks and return home to let them off.

Hicks said when vendors get their city permit, they're given a copy of the ordinance and know what is legal.

Hicks said he's not sure where people get the illegal fireworks.

"Where these people get their fireworks, we're not sure," Hicks said. "We would hope they're not getting them from vendors with licenses here in Twin or even in the state of Idaho."

director Leon Panetta told Congress late last month that "he had just learned about the program, described it to us, indicated that he had canceled it and ... did tell us that he was told that the vice president had ordered that the program not be briefed to the Congress."

"We were kept in the dark. That's something that should never, ever happen again," said Feinstein.

Feinstein said that she understands the need for strong countermeasures following the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

However, "I think you weaken your case when you go outside of the law," she added.

"This continued attack on the CIA and our intelligence gathering organizations is undermining the morale and capacity of those organizations to gather intelligence," said Republican Judd Gregg of New Hampshire.

Reports about the coun-

terterrorism program, Cheney's role in directing its existence be kept from Congress and the attorney general's consideration of a special prosecutor came on the eve of Senate Judiciary Committee hearings for Supreme Court nominee Sonia Sotomayor.

A Justice Department official told The Associated Press that Holder will decide in the next few weeks whether to appoint a prosecutor to investigate the Bush administration's harsh interrogation practices. The official spoke on the condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak on a pending matter.

In response to the report, Justice Department spokesman Matt Miller said Saturday that Holder planned to "follow the facts and the law" and noted that Holder has said that "it would be unfair to prosecute any official who acted in good faith based on legal guidance from the Justice Department."

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Author critical of Sun Valley resort billionaire to speak in Ketchum

Author Stephen Trimble lives an ironic life. Although Trimble loves to ski, he is also a lifetime environmentalist critical of the commercialization of public lands and concerned with the future of America's open spaces.

In Trimble's book, "Bargaining for Eden: The Fight for the Last Open Spaces in America," he explores the transformation of the American West from an abundance of open lands into a land-owning power

struggle where the man with the money, Earl Holding, wins.

What adds irony to Trimble's life is that he will bring his book to Ketchum, home to one of the most famous northwestern ski resorts, Sun Valley, owned by Holding.

Trimble will present his book and a photo sideshow of his 10-year project in obtaining information and anecdotes on the story of Mount Ogden and Earl Holding at the Ketchum Community Library at 6 p.m. Wednesday.

Trimble's book focuses on the values of people in a David-and-Goliath tale of money, power and politics, with a focus on Holding. Trimble describes it as a literary nonfiction piece that tells "stories about people and their beliefs and values toward landscape."

Although the antagonist of the book is Holding, Trimble says Holding is not the villain; because as well as focusing on Holding, Trimble himself finds his "inner Earl" when he tells of his experiences as a land developer on a smaller scale.

"I think it's a really important book," said Sarah

Hedrick, owner of Iconoclast Books in Ketchum, "but it is slightly controversial."

Trimble said he is not so much nervous but intrigued about the reaction he will receive in Ketchum. Trimble has also appeared in Salt Lake City and the Ogden Valley in Utah, and has received feedback from both Holding's opponents and supporters, adding, "I've already gone through the gauntlet."

A question-and-answer session and book signing will follow Trimble's presentation.

Council to consider comp plan suggestions

The Twin Falls City Council is scheduled tonight to decide whether to allow city staff to start working on 10 projects recommended by the city's new comprehensive plan.

The new plan — a planning and land-use guide for the next 20 or so years — was adopted in January. City

staff compiled a list of projects they deemed important and included planning, engineering and other possible changes to review.

Among the possible changes:

- Landscaping amendments, including reviewing the city's various requirements and to determine whether xeriscaping should be encouraged or mandated.
- New zoning districts,

including mixed-use zones.

• Downtown: the code currently doesn't contain any architectural requirements for downtown buildings or standard landscaping requirements.

• Changes to storm water calculation and pressurized irrigation requirements.

Other agenda items:

- Approve the selection of HDR to develop the city's plan for spending \$183,600

for energy efficiency. The funding is part of the stimulus package.

• Approve a resolution that changes the city's policy for reimbursement to private companies for development and installation of public infrastructure.

City Council meetings are held at 5 p.m. at 305 Third Ave. E. and are open to the public.

EPA questions plan for cooling Snake River

BOISE (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency is questioning the effectiveness of a plan that aims to cool Snake River waters to improve habitat for fish.

The EPA says Idaho Power Co. needs to find a way to reduce temperatures below Hells Canyon before it can get a new 30-year license to run power plants, because the Snake River can be too warm in fall for chinook salmon and steelhead spawning.

But the agency's preference for cooling the Snake could raise Idaho Power customers' rates.

The utility proposes that it spend \$3 million a year to restore trees to shade the Snake's upstream tributaries, and to raise flows along with some other measures.

But EPA administrators doubt the plan will be enough to keep the water cool throughout the 100-mile journey through the Snake and its reservoirs. The agency is eyeing an alternate that could cost the utility up to \$250 million.

The Endangered Species Act requires the region to do something about the spawning problem.

"Right now it's very unclear what these projects are going to be and that they would represent any temperature benefits downstream," said John Palmer, an EPA senior policy adviser who wrote a letter to Idaho Power expressing the agency's doubts. "We think to get the level of

temperature reduction it would require a significant amount of restoration."

Idaho Power argues that it exceeds federal water quality standards only during a two-week period in October. The company opposes spending so much for a temperature control structure needed for such a short time.

"It's really addressing a symptom instead of the cause," said Idaho Power attorney Jim Tucker.

The dispute is the last major issue holding up Idaho Power's nearly 15-year effort to obtain a new license to operate Brownlee, Oxbow and Hells Canyon dams. It has cost \$107 million so far.

In 2004, the company estimated the process and its requirements would cost more than \$325 million

over 30 years.

Other groups and officials have said they prefer the company's watershed restoration approach.

The decision ultimately rests with the Federal

Energy Regulatory Commission, which is waiting for responses from Idaho and Oregon officials. A decision from the FERC isn't expected until at least 2011.

Palin says she's not leaving politics

Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin said she's not only staying involved in national politics, but she plans to jump back into the national scrum when she leaves office at the end of the month.

The former Republican vice presidential nominee said she plans to write a book, campaign for political candidates from coast to coast — even Democrats who share her views on limited government, national defense and energy independence — and build a right-of-center coalition.

"I will go around the country on behalf of candidates who believe in the right things, regardless of their party label or affiliation," she said during an interview published Sunday in The Washington Times.

Palin shocked critics and allies alike when she announced on July 3 that she would leave the governor's office while in the middle of her first term. The governor chose not to seek re-election and suggested it was unfair to hold onto the office as a lame duck. Instead, she will step down July 26 and pursue a national profile. She has not said whether she is building toward a presidential campaign for 2012.

GOP unifies against any more stimulus

Republicans lined up Sunday in opposition to a second economic stimulus package, a rare demonstration of unity from an out-of-power political party in search of a rallying cry against President Obama.

Republicans called Obama's \$787 billion spending plan a "flop" and said it hasn't fulfilled its hype. They criticized the White House for increasing the federal deficit and doing little to combat an unemployment rate that hit 9.5 percent in June.

"The reality is it hasn't helped yet," said Sen. Jon Kyl, R-Ariz. "Only about 6.8 percent of the money has actually been spent. What I

proposed is, after you complete the contracts that are already committed, the things that are in the pipeline, stop it."

Obama has urged patience with his spending program, which administration officials acknowledge was designed with incorrect or incomplete economic data. On Saturday, Obama used his weekly radio and Internet address to tell Americans they should let the plan move forward before denouncing it.

CALIFORNIA
Lawmakers face tough choices in budget talks

SACRAMENTO — California's top lawmakers on Sunday focused on cost-saving reforms to social welfare programs and how deeply to cut an array of state services as they dove into the complex task of closing the state's \$26 billion deficit.

Lawmakers on both sides warned that severe cuts to many state programs were unavoidable. But they also seemed more optimistic than they have been in weeks that they could find a way out of California's fiscal morass.

"We're all going to get through this, and California is going to come through it just fine," Senate leader Darrell Steinberg, D-Sacramento, said before entering a closed-door meeting between Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and the three other legislative leaders. Sunday's talks were expected to last into the evening.

That Republicans, Democrats and Schwarzenegger were back on speaking terms and making apparent headway was a welcome sign after two weeks of acrimony and partisan infighting that temporarily derailed budget negotiations. During a low point last week, the office of the Assembly speaker, a Democrat, accused the governor's office of disrespecting female lawmakers.

Officials push for health care despite delay

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama's overhaul of the nation's health systems is unlikely to be completed by the White House's August deadline, lawmakers said Sunday as Congress turns its attention to other priorities.

Democrats and Republicans alike said the administration's sweeping health care proposals are moving forward in Capitol Hill but cautioned against rushing into a spending plan that could cost trillions of dollars over the next decade. Obama's health and human services secretary said she remains optimistic Congress would send the White House legislation before the year ends.

"I think everything is on the table and discussions are under way," HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius said.

But the White House's strategy to leave the legislative back-and-forth to Congress has produced varying and sometimes contradictory versions of

health care legislation — along with delays. As the Senate turns its attention to Supreme Court nominee Sonia Sotomayor's confirmation hearings, the focus will turn away from Obama's top domestic priority.

The administration's Democratic partners in Congress hinted they would not deliver legislation before leaving town for an August recess. Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich., said Obama should be pleased with lawmakers' progress; Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D., said "there really is plenty of time."

And Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., insisted that lawmakers would have the overhaul in place before leaving town in August. He does not, however, expect Obama to sign it before lawmakers return to their home states.

The delay would be a blow to the White House and to Democrats' electoral prospects.

The House and Senate are working toward legislation that would deliver on Obama's popular goals from his presidential cam-

paign, but they are hardly in unison. House Democrats have proposed raising taxes on wealthy Americans to pay for the plan. Democratic leaders, meanwhile, have tried to calm moderate and conservative lawmakers about a proposal that could make their re-election bids more difficult.

Republicans, seizing on an issue that affects all Americans and has shown a glimmer for hope for an out-of-power political party, have lambasted the proposals as rash and irresponsible. They also see the issue as a way to win House and Senate seats in the 2010 midterm elections.

"I think the bigger issue here is why are we going to increase spending and health care by \$1 trillion, \$2 trillion, \$3 trillion?" said Sen. Judd Gregg, R-N.H. "Most of which we can't afford, add that to the debt or add it the tax burden of the American people. Why don't we approach this horse from the other end?"

Gregg and other GOP leaders have painted the Democrats' plan as a government takeover of health care delivery systems that

leads to rationing of treatment and backlogs at doctors' offices. More broadly, Republicans have tied the plan to out-of-control spending and a bloated federal government.

"There is no chance that it's going to be done by August," said Sen. Jon Kyl, R-Ariz. "President Obama was right about one thing: He said if it's not done quickly, it won't be done at all. Why did he say that? Because the longer it hangs out there, the more the American people are skeptical, anxious and even in opposition to it."

Sebelius tried to calm jittery voters who fear Democrats' plan to tax some employer-provided health care benefits as income. She said the details are far from over.

"Well, the House has a version," she said, discounting any version as final. "There are a couple of different proposals being worked on in the Senate."

Sebelius, Stabenow, Conrad and Gregg appeared on CNN's "State of the Union." Schumer appeared on NBC's "Meet the Press." Kyl appeared on ABC's "This Week."

Study: More families are becoming homeless

WASHINGTON — Louis Gill doesn't like to turn anyone away. The director of the Bakersfield Homeless Center in California has taken to laying out cots and mattresses between the shelter's 174 registered beds to cope with the rush of homeless families brought to his doors by the financial crisis.

"Last year, we saw a 34 percent increase in homeless families and a 24 percent increase in homeless children," he said. "Why do we go beyond capacity? Because in a just society, a child should not have to sleep outside or in a car."

Gill is a frontline witness to the change in the makeup of the country's homeless. The stereotype of a homeless person as a single man no longer applies. A resident of the Bakersfield center is far more likely to be a young mother with a "good, solid job and a mortgage that she just couldn't pay."

"They're like folks you know and that you've worked with," Gill said.

"Maybe the work's not there right now. Maybe they got behind on their payments. But the idea of a typical homeless person has changed. We're seeing individuals come in that have never had to access the safety net before."

Government figures support Gill's experience. The ravages of the recession, including a surge in foreclosures and unemployment approaching 10 percent, have driven thousands of families onto the streets.

Although the number of homeless individuals remained relatively stable between 2007 and 2008, the number of homeless families rose 9 percent, and in rural and suburban areas the number jumped by 56 percent, according to a report released last week by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In real terms, homelessness is still concentrated in urban areas and among adult males; 20 percent of homeless people live in Los Angeles, New York and Detroit. About 1.6 million people used an emergency shelter between Oct. 1,

2007, and Sept. 30, 2008, including 516,700 people in families.

But administration officials acknowledge that the economic crisis is turning stereotypes on their heads.

"The typical homeless person has changed to become less focused on the chronically homeless or single-individual homeless to somebody who is part of a family, whether it be a mother or a father or a child in a homeless family," HUD Secretary Shaun Donovan said. "I think what that tells us is that the economic crisis is forcing more families who had previously been well-housed into homelessness."

Women make up 81 percent of adults in homeless

families, according to the report. And unlike homeless men, who are usually middle-aged, homeless women tend to be younger than 25 with children younger than 5. "The life of a homeless woman is particularly fraught with danger," said Suzanne Wenzel, a community psychologist and professor at the University of Southern California School of Social Work. "These young women are at much greater risk of being victimized when they have no stable home. It can be more difficult to obtain needed services. For anyone in this situation, it is destabilizing and extremely stressful. That's why these new figures are horrifying."

Armstrong stays in 3rd place, eyes more Tour

TARBES, France — With the Pyrenees behind him but the toughest rides still to come, Lance Armstrong is already talking about another run next year in the Tour de France.

The 37-year-old Texan, coming out of 3½ years of retirement, remained in third place after Sunday's ninth stage. Astana teammate Alberto Contador stayed in second place with about one-third of the race over and Rinaldo Nocentini of Italy held the yellow jersey a third straight day.

Armstrong rode deliberately during the 100-mile leg that was won by France's Pierrick Fedrigo and took cyclists from Saint-Gaudens to Tarbes and through the Roman Catholic shrine town of Lourdes.

"Today was pretty controlled, I thought, although it's never easy," Armstrong said. "It was very hot; the tempo was pretty regular ... We (Astana) just sat there and kind of rode our race."

The seven-time champion's appetite for competition clearly is not satisfied. After the day's racing, he was asked on French television if this would be his last year in cycling's premier race.

"Probably not," he said. "Maybe one more Tour?"

Armstrong, who is riding for Astana without salary this year, has previously hinted he may launch his own team next season. When Astana was hit by

JI CLAIMS WOMEN'S OPEN

BETHLEHEM, Pa. — Eun Hee Ji found surprising calm in a double-bogey and a dramatic victory with an improbable birdie.

The 23-year-old from South Korea made a lengthy birdie putt on the 72nd hole to emerge from a Sunday scramble with an even-par 71 and claim the U.S. Women's Open.

She outlasted playing partner and third-round leader Cristie Kerr, who struggled from the outset in the final round and failed in her bid for a second Women's Open title in three years.

"I didn't even dream about winning this tournament, but, well, I did it, and I think this is going to be one of the most memorable moments in my life," Ji said through an interpreter.

Ji recovered from two bogeys in her first four holes and a double-bogey at the 10th, making three birdies over the final six holes to finish at even-par 284 at Saucon Valley Country Club.

Another of a legion of South Korean players who were inspired to play the game by 1998 champion Se Ri Pak, Ji claimed the biggest prize in golf in just her second try. Last year, she tied for 42nd.


She is the second straight South Korean to win the event, following Inbee Park. Countrywoman Birdie Kim claimed the championship in 2005.

Candia Kung of Taiwan had a 2-under 69 and was alone in second at 1-over 285.

Despite her struggles, Kerr held the lead until the back nine and shot a 4-over 75, tying In-Kyung Kim of South Korea for third at 2-over 286.

Ji said the double-bogey at the 10th had a calming effect, and that's when she tried to focus on making a run. She went on to make birdies at 13th, 14th and 18th.

"Up until that point, Cristie Kerr as so far ahead, I just didn't think anyone was going to be able to catch her," Ji said. "But after that double-bogey on No. 10, I basically cleared my mind and said let's go and play

out the rest of the round."

Dario Franchitti wins at Toronto

TORONTO — Dario Franchitti had nearly forgotten what it was like to win on the streets of Toronto. After a decade, he refreshed his memory.

Franchitti won the Honda Indy on Sunday over the tricky street course at Exhibition Place, easily holding off Penske drivers Ryan Briscoe and Will Power on a late restart for his third triumph of the IndyCar Series season.

"It's 10 years since my first one here and it feels good," said Franchitti, who won a Champ Car race in 1999. "I guess we timed it right with strategy."

It was the first race in Toronto for the series. Starting from the pole, Franchitti was both lucky and good in regaining the series lead by two points over Target Chip Ganassi teammate Scott Dixon.

Franchitti is seeking his second series championship in three years after racing last season in NASCAR's Sprint Cup series. Penske and Ganassi drivers have won 16 of 18 races dating to last season.

"I spent a lot of years chasing the Target cars here and finishing behind," Franchitti said. "I have to thank Chip. He gave me the opportunity to come back here."

Dixon was fourth, followed by Justin Wilson of Dale Coyne Racing, who won a week ago at Watkins Glen, and Danica Patrick.

Canadian drivers Paul Tracy and Alex Tagliani, seeking full-time rides, acquitted themselves well before late accidents spoiled their days. Tracy collided with Helio Castroneves with 20 laps remaining in the 85-lap race and both cars, running in the top three at the time, had to retire.

Tagliani, who led twice for 21 laps, was involved in a three-car collision with 10 laps left and finished ninth.

Franchitti easily took the lead at the start and led the first 23 laps as chaos erupted behind him on the tricky 11-turn, 1.75-mile course. It is bumpy and treacherous because its patched sections of concrete become slicker and slicker with each lap, and three drivers found early trouble.

Too many clueless drivers endanger too many cyclists

David Webster was an avid bicyclist, and by all accounts an extraordinarily careful one. But his life ended on June 25 east of Twin Falls when he was struck by a pickup truck trying to pass another vehicle, according to the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Would that Webster's case were an isolated one, but it hasn't been this spring and summer. Three bicyclists were killed in Boise in May and June, and there have been many more injuries across southern Idaho.

Blame unreasonably wet weather and a growing number of vehicles and bikes sharing urban streets and crowded roads, but most blame a paucity of awareness. Motorists who drive in Twin Falls — and they include visitors from all over south-central Idaho and northeastern Nevada — are surpassingly careless about the bikes with which they interact.

Falls Avenue East, where Webster was killed, is one of the worst stretches of blacktop for bike-vs.-vehicle encounters. The road is relatively narrow — and the shoulders even narrower. Folks drive too fast for conditions, aren't fussy about unannounced turns and often don't pay attention to what they're doing.

But there are other Twin Falls-area roads where near-death experiences happen for bicyclists, including Washington Street North, Eastland Drive, Filer Avenue, Fillmore Street North and the environs of the College of Southern Idaho campus.


It's true that Idaho bicycle safety laws could be more effective — various national cycling groups have graded them between "C" and "D" — but this issue has less to do with enforcement than it does with awareness. Motorists in grown-up rural areas such as Twin Falls don't have the roads to themselves anymore.

It's possible for bikes, cars and trucks to coexist safely in Idaho, as the Wood River Valley's long experience demonstrates. Blaine County didn't always have dedicated bike paths; for most of its history cyclists shared Idaho Highway 75; Elkhorn, Sun Valley and Warm Springs roads, and the Main streets of Ketchum, Hailey and Bellevue with motor vehicles. Rules of the road were established, but more importantly mutual respect was established.

Webster, a plant breeder, geneticist and athlete, shouldn't have ended his life on a country road. Nor should anyone else.


If you drive, slow down and look around you. If you bike, take care.

There's trouble brewing on the horizon for Obamacare

WASHINGTON — President Obama's welcome home from his latest successful overseas trip is clouded by the growing doubts about his most important domestic initiative, the overhaul of the dysfunctional U.S. health care system.

On the surface, things went well for the No. 1 project on his list while he was away. Hospitals pledged to find \$150 billion in savings that could be applied to expanding coverage to more of the uninsured.

The chairmen of three House committees that share jurisdiction over health care prepared to unveil a single, common proposal — a step the Clintons were never able to achieve in their effort at reform. Insurers, doctors and other key interest groups continued to negotiate with the administration, rather than launching broadsides against its plans.

But if you probe a little deeper, what you find are growing questions among the insiders — the kind of fault lines that could spread to threaten public support for the ambitious overhaul Obama has in mind and the political coalitions needed to move it through Congress.

Veterans of previous health care battles I inter-

viewed this past week are still mainly of the view that Obama can succeed.

Dissatisfaction with the status quo pervades much of business leadership, the ranks of state government and millions of households. Obama is widely praised among the insiders for staying flexible and keeping himself available to negotiate the needed compromises.

But on several fronts, forces have been moving against him, leaving even some of his allies uncertain whether he will prevail.

The staggering economy and the continued uncertainty about the timing and strength of a recovery have sapped public confidence in Washington's ability to pull off big ventures. Growing talk that unemployment may top 10 percent and require another stimulus bill could complicate the task of finding a trillion dollars over the next 10 years to finance expanded health care coverage to the millions of uninsured.

Increasingly, Republicans on Capitol Hill and even some Democrats are voicing

doubts about adding to the already enormous budget deficits. Obama has long insisted that his reform can be paid for without increasing the debt, but as the legislative process has unfolded, the question of where the offsetting savings will come from has become more urgent.

Democratic Sen. Ron Wyden of Oregon, the co-author of the one bipartisan bill already scored as saving money, told me, "As you look at what is being proposed (in two Senate committees) you don't see savings in the 10-year budget. That's why the discussion has shifted to finding new money to finance expanded coverage. But at home, when you tell people we're already spending \$2.5 trillion a year on health care and now we're going to spend \$1 trillion more, it just doesn't add up."

The realization is spreading in Congress that to achieve significant cost controls, a fundamental restructuring of health care delivery will be needed. But Rep. Jim Cooper of Tennessee, a veteran of the failed Clinton effort and the leader of conservative "blue dog" Democrats on health reform, told me that the proposals under discussion "are weak on delivery system reform."

Obama, he said, clearly

gets the need for drastic change. The president has been citing the June 1 New Yorker article by Dr. Atul Gawande pointing out the extraordinary differences in the cost of health care between El Paso and McAllen, Texas. El Paso has reorganized its medical services into cooperative networks of practitioners, delivering quality care at low cost. McAllen, like most American cities, relies on an unstructured collection of individual physicians and hospitals, competing for business and raking in as much money as they can.

Many others who have worked in the system argue similar points, and some of them have begun to suggest that before attempting to reorganize the whole health care system, Congress should rationalize Medicare, where costs are soaring in McAllen-like fashion.

But Congress shows no sign of having the will or the skill to challenge the myriad, well-entrenched and influential players in the current delivery system. Unless he can prod it to act differently, Obama may find himself signing a bill that condemns us to continued medical inflation.

Developers already invest in Twin Falls' future

"Growth doesn't pay its own way" and I believe in the tooth fairy.

Growth has brought better jobs, larger tax base, better schools, more choices in services, more opportunity for new businesses, new cutting-edge hospitals, more doctors, dentists, optometric, and even retirement centers. Yeah, it is tough out there. Blue Lakes isn't the only street in town. Let's take a 40-acre subdivision and see if it doesn't pay its own way.

We purchase land from a farmer who may have paid \$1,000 per acre 30 years ago, paying him \$40,000 per acre or \$1.56 million in all. The government takes over \$400,000 in capital-gains tax, and it may take

more later from the farmer's estate if it's too large in the eyes of the IRS.

Nothing has changed on the land, but over \$900,000 has gone to the federal and state governments. We haven't turned a shovel of dirt yet but we started to pay for growth.

The property probably has a road and an overhead power line and not much more. Twin Falls doesn't allow a property to be annexed unless it is adjacent to the city limits so there are improvements like water, sewer and an improved roadway to the edge of the property. It is now my turn to pay my fair share.

I hired a civil engineer to supply the required documentation to set the benchmark that everything will

flow from: 40 acres, three lots per acre. One hundred twenty lots is the rule for subdivision north of Rock Creek Canyon. To the south, we try for four lots per acre to spread the cost of development over more lots but we limit ourselves with the size of home we can later build on that size lot.

So let's recap: \$1.6 million in land cost, \$200,000 in engineering cost, \$25,000 in city fees, \$100,000 to Idaho Power to upgrade the power grid, \$50,000 for my share of the regional PI pump station, for a total of \$1.975 million invested.

Now I dedicate \$680,000 worth of land to public

rights-of-way, a regional park and other uses. I install \$2.5 million in water, sewer and irrigation lines; curb and gutter; sidewalks; bike paths and roadways, and I upgrade the road to city standard. This doesn't include the \$200,000 worth of improvements I am required to install for my neighbors' use.

Improvements completed, I hand them over to the city at no cost to the public. That is \$3.18 million worth of land and improvements, which the city will be required to maintain. Who pays for the cost of that maintenance? The land does. Now we have 120 developed residential lots valued at \$50,000 per lot or \$6 million worth of assessed land at an annual property

tax rate of 1.2 percent. I think the city's share is about half of that. That would go to help pay the cost for the maintenance of the improved lots without any homes.

The city must provide drinking water and treat the sewer generated by these lots once somebody lives there. It seems like property taxes should cover those cost.

Land development and home building generates income and jobs for local residents and revenue for local government.

Now we are adding impact fees, increases for Idaho Power service, future capacity fees, school fees and most likely, higher taxes. I almost forgot the future energy regulations

that will eventually mandate "more expensive Energy Efficient building practices." Where is all this additional home value going to come from?

It is important to make decisions based on fact and the best interests of the community. Affordable housing is in jeopardy in the Magic Valley.

"Don't shoot the piano player; he's doing the best he can." Builders and developers risk a lot and everybody benefits. Be thankful somebody is willing to invest in the future of Twin Falls or we would still have dirt roads and one City Park.

A fight for everyday peace

NAWA, Afghanistan — Most of the mud-brick stalls that line the street in this sweltering town on the Helmand River closed down a year ago when Taliban fighters began swaggering through the bazaar, levying taxes on merchants and seeding the roads with homemade bombs. Shopkeepers placed their wares behind padlocked tin doors, teachers shuttered the school, the doctor abandoned the health clinic and residents with means fled to other parts of southern Afghanistan.

This town does not merit a dot on most maps of Afghanistan.

But U.S. civilian and military officials believe what happens to the chockablock market here will be a key indicator of whether President Obama can salvage a war the United States has been losing.

About 4,000 troops — most of them U.S. Marines — descended upon Nawa and other towns along the lower Helmand River valley 10 days ago in a massive operation to root out the Taliban. Their aim is to combat the insurgency in a new way: Instead of targeting extremist strongholds, they will aim to protect communities from the Taliban.

In Nawa, that means getting life back to normal. If that occurs, military commanders reason, it will be much more difficult for the insurgents to hold sway here.

"We'll be successful when we can walk up and down that street and most shops will be open, there will be a flow of commerce, there will be a recognizable and functioning government, there will be kids in school and doctors in the clinic," said Capt. Frank "Gus" Biggio, a Marine Reservist who is on leave from the Washington law firm Patton Boggs to lead a civil-affairs unit in Nawa.

But employing U.S. forces to restore a sense of normalcy in a country ravaged by 30 years of war involves a series of assumptions and a set of challenges that are already proving more complicated than mounting hunt-and-

kill missions against the Taliban. Will residents want the Marines to stick around? Will those who do be convinced that the Americans will stay until security improves? Will residents trust the local leaders — including the police chief, whom one Marine officer calls "the Tony Soprano of Nawa" — to run the town better than the Taliban?

An affirmative answer to those questions is not at all certain, and it will not just require the Marines to wage a different sort of war. The United States will have to spend billions more dollars to expand training for Afghanistan's army and police forces. Ineffective development programs will have to be overhauled. State Department diplomats and Agriculture Department specialists will need to deploy in larger numbers. And if the approach being employed in the Helmand River valley is extended to other areas under Taliban control, it could well result in the need for thousands more U.S. troops.

Marines have been heartened by the initial indications in Nawa. A dozen stalls have reopened in the market. People have approached patrols to express support for the troop presence. And perhaps most significantly, the Taliban appears to have retreated — for now.

"Thirty days from now, the people will say: 'Okay. Great. You've cleared the Taliban out. Now what's in it for me?'" said Brig. Gen.

Two Marines killed in bomb blasts

KABUL — A bomb blast killed two U.S. Marines in Afghanistan's dangerous south, where thousands of American troops have deployed in a massive operation to oust Taliban fighters from the country's opium poppy region, officials said Sunday. Some 4,000 Marines moved into Helmand province this month, the largest Marine operation in Afghanistan since the 2001 U.S. invasion. They have met little head-on resistance but remain vulnerable to guerrilla tactics like suicide and roadside bombs. "These terrorist attacks are hard to prevent, can be carried out by a few individuals, and do not require a military force capable of confronting the Marines," said Arturo Munoz, an expert on the tribal environment in Helmand province with the Washington-based RAND Corp.

Lawrence D. Nicholson, the commander of Marine forces in southern Afghanistan. "We have a very narrow window to bring about change."

From his plywood-paneled office at Camp Leatherneck, a sprawling and dusty base in the desert northwest of here, Nicholson understands that the same urgency applies to Washington. Nicholson's superiors — including national security adviser James Jones, who recently visited Leatherneck — are making clear that the clock is ticking: The Obama White House wants results within a year.

Within hours of the Marine landing, the town turned eerily quiet. Taliban attacks on the government office, which had been an almost nightly occurrence, ceased. So, too, did militant activity in other parts of town. Marines would later apprehend vehicles full of young men driving out of the district. In one car was a letter with instructions from a

local Taliban leader to regroup in the town of Marjah, to the northwest.

Lt. Col. William McCollough, commander of the Marine battalion here, professes little concern that many insurgents have simply moved away. "While they're regrouping, we'll be consolidating our gains," he said. "By working with people here, we're seeing poison in the water. Every day they're away, it'll be harder for them to come back."

As a Marine patrol walked through the bazaar on a recent morning, its presence prompted a group of men sipping tea in front of a motorcycle repair shop to voice concern — not that the Americans had arrived but that they might depart before the Taliban had been vanquished.

"If you leave, everything will be the same," a middle-aged man who called himself Sayed Gul told McCollough. "If you guys stay for a long time, everything will be fine."

CHINA China raises riot injured toll to 1,680

URUMQI — China on Sunday raised the injured toll from ethnic clashes a week ago to 1,680 — one more bit in the trickle of information the government has released on the unrest in the far west, though much remains unknown.

The official Xinhua News Agency said the number of people wounded during the ethnic violence that broke out July 5 in the regional capital of Urumqi has increased by nearly 600, according to Xinjiang Governor Nur Bekri during a televised speech. He said that more than 900 of the injured remained hospitalized, and 74 "are on the verge of death."

The protest last Sunday by minority Uighurs escalated into deadly attacks on members of the Han Chinese majority. In subsequent days, large groups of Han Chinese armed themselves and roamed the streets looking for revenge. It remains unclear how many people may have been injured.

IRAQ Car bomb explodes outside Iraqi church, kills 4

BAGHDAD — A car bomb exploded near a church as worshippers left Sunday Mass, killing at least four civilians and injuring 18 in one of several attacks on Iraq's beleaguered Christian minority.

The coordinated assault

came as the Iraqi military predicted that insurgent attacks, though declining, could continue for a few years, raising the prospect of militant violence after the scheduled withdrawal of all U.S. troops by the end of 2011.

Three Christians and one Muslim died in the bombing at around 7 p.m. near a church on Palestine Street in eastern Baghdad, said a police officer who was at the scene. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media.

An official at al-Kindi hospital confirmed the death toll and said at least 18 people were injured.

SPAIN Four more runners gored in Sunday bull-running

PAMPLONA — Bulls gored four runners, seriously injuring two of them, during a packed running of the bulls on the sixth day of the San Fermin festival on Sunday.

One man, a Pamplona resident, was caught in the chest and legs when a large bull became separated from the pack on the slippery cobblestone streets leading to the bullring.

The bull, a Miura weighing 1,268 pounds, jerked the 44-year-old runner upward and then rolled him along the ground in the entrance to the ring.

Miuras are the largest and most famous of Spain's fighting bulls.

Another man, a 56-year-old from nearby Rioja, was

caught under the jaw by a horn. The sixth running of the bulls at the annual festival was held two days after a

27-year-old man was gored to death, the first such fatality since 1995.

Zoom your heart rate

KETCHUM — Looking to make the pounds melt away? Regular, high-intensity cardio could be the best way to achieve that goal, and not much is higher intensity than Zumba.

The Latin dance-based exercise class mixes salsa, merengue and cumbia moves with hip-hop and traditional exercises like lunges and squats, and all of its instructors are certified by an international organization.

At the Ketchum YMCA, the Zumba teacher is Fernando Valdez, who grew up in Gooding but says his Mexican heritage gives him an advantage in teaching the Latin-based moves. "It's part of my blood, it's in my genes," he said.

At least one of his students agrees. "He is fabulous. I've tried doing this in many cities, and Fernando's your man," said Debbie Lagerquist of Sun Valley.

How it went down

When the music comes on, Valdez's smile lights up, and it doesn't quit until the class does. Both his smile and the music are infectious, inspiring many in the class to begin twitching their hips even before the exercise starts.

And once it starts, it doesn't stop. For the first half of the class, the music didn't pause long enough for me to wipe my forehead, let alone check my sports watch to find out where my heart rate was. Halfway through, we got about 45 seconds to suck down some water, and my watch said I was working out at 93 percent of my capacity. My sweat towel said so, too.

At the beginning of each month, Valdez changes up the music and re-choreographs the moves, so I wasn't too far behind the rest in the class I took on Tuesday. But as someone who is not the world's most coordinated, I did take several iterations before I could copy some of the footwork. Fortunately, each set of moves is repeated several times during each song, so if I didn't get it immediately, I had another chance.

Smoking cessation harder for women, research finds

Women appear to have a tougher time quitting smoking than men, according to researchers at Women's Health Research at Yale.

While the percentage of men who have given up cigarettes between 1965 and 2006 was 54.5 percent, the rate of decline among women was less steep, at 47.5 percent.

Consequently, the gap in the percentages of male and female smokers has narrowed. In 1965, slightly more than half of all men smoked, while about a third of women did. Today, 23.3 percent of men smoke, compared with 18.6 percent of women.

We talked to Carolyn Mazure, a professor of psychiatry and director of the research program, about why women are not kicking the habit at the same rate as men.

Question: So what does the research show?

Answer: Well, the first thing I want to say is that smoking

remains a serious public health issue. Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death and illness in the U.S. Those deaths and morbid occurrences are from cancers, respiratory illness, cardiovascular disease.

Q: And why is it harder for women to quit smoking?

A: It appears as though when men quit smoking, the most prominent symptoms of withdrawal are biological symptoms of craving.

However, we find women are more likely to use cigarettes to manage moods, to deal with stress and to control weight. In other words, women are smoking for different reasons, and if you're not helping with those particular reasons for smoking in your cessation



treatment, you wouldn't necessarily expect your treatment to work.

A good example is the nicotine patch, which often is considered the first line of treatment for smoking. The research data on the nicotine patch suggest that women do less well quitting smoking when using the patch than men do,

probably because it targets symptoms of craving rather than the symptoms that are more prominent for women.

So this begins to make an argument for gender-specific approaches to smoking cessation. ... With the medication Zyban (the generic is bupropion), it appears that women do as well in quitting when using this treatment as men do. ... Zyban can help with mood symptoms. It was originally developed as an antidepressant drug, Wellbutrin. That's an important part of the story in that we do think there is a relationship between depressed mood and smoking.

Q: Are women moodier than men or less good at managing stress?

A: I wouldn't say that at all, but we clearly know that the rates of depression are higher in women than in men, not only in this country but in the world.

We find stress a pathway to depression in both men and women, although stress appears to be a more potent predictor of

depression in women than men. Knowing that, we can understand how women would be attempting to use a variety of strategies to handle stress, including smoking. Nicotine can help someone reduce anxiety and modulate mood. It does have transient positive effects. But those positive effects are not worth the long-term health risk by any measure.

Q: Cigarette smoking does affect weight, right?

A: Yes, it can. When people quit smoking, it's not uncommon to gain a few pounds. Often this is a deterrent, particularly among women.

You have to deal with the fact that you may gain some weight and prepare for that and really factor that into whatever cessation program you undertake. ... The main concept is to include some form of exercise and support. And the exercise should be something that is manageable and really fits into your day.

Q: Does the menstrual cycle have any effect on attempts to quit smoking?

A: We tell women to think about the time within their menstrual cycle that is most difficult personally and advise them not to quit during that time because you are likely to

have a harder time resisting cigarettes during that time. In addition, before you quit, prepare for that time in your cycle. What are you going to do when you feel badly? Call a (quit smoking hot line), take a walk, you have to have a plan.

Q: Do you think there

should be special cessation programs for women?

A: I think in general we need to integrate the care for women into the mainstream of health care, but importantly, we have to be gender-sensitive in terms of what works for women and what works for men.

The second half-hour was slightly lower intensity than the first, but only slightly. Although I've been working out regularly on an elliptical trainer, I'm still not in the best shape, and by the end of the hour I found myself stumbling a little and opting for easier versions of the steps done by the instructor and most of the rest of the class. I was tired!

In the last five minutes Valdez led stretches, which felt fabulous — and I can imagine how tight my muscles might have been without them.

Who should stay away

Be very cautious if you've had injuries to your feet, knees or hips, because Zumba involves a lot of twisting, quick back-and-forth movements and some jumping. However, it's not difficult to adjust to your own comfort level, if you slow down the moves or don't do them to full exten-

sion. Consult your doctor, of course, if you have any concerns.

If you're super-coordinated or have a dance background, feel free to jump in and start the class at any time. However, if you'll be frustrated if you can't keep up when learning moves, contact the instructor of the class you want to attend and ask when the music and moves will change. Then join at the beginning of the new choreography, and the others won't have such an advantage over you.

What was sore the next morning

Surprisingly little. I expected to hurt a lot more than I did, but I think the quick transitions between moves and the fact that I didn't lunge as deep or twist as hard as the class regulars may have eased the muscular impact on me.

My sports watch said I burned nearly 600 calories in the hour-long class, and I believe it! Since 3,500 calories is about equal to a pound of weight, it's easy to see how regular Zumba could result in fairly quick weight loss.

I'm considering adding Zumba to my regular routine, and I hope I'll see results like Liliana Ayllon of Hailey, who went from 164

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"Great men are they who see ... that thoughts rule the world." —Ralph Waldo Emerson

Today's deal is a good example of how the Rule of Eleven (which has survived from the days of whist) can be used to help find the winning play.

Consider the auction briefly before looking at the play. North's sequence, even by a passed hand, was forcing, showing at least five clubs and a four-card major. South had the option to continue by bidding three diamonds, showing values and suggesting a possible weakness in one major, but that might have been too subtle.

Against South's three no-trump, West led the heart five. East won with the ace and returned the jack, and declarer had to decide whether to cover. The possibility that East held the king can be ruled out, so his only relevant original holdings are A-J doubleton (when it gains to duck) and A-J-9 (when it gains to cover).

The Rule of Eleven tells us that there are six (11 minus 5) cards in the North, East and South hands that are higher than the five, but South can see only five of them (the 10, seven, ace, jack and queen), so East must have one more. Therefore, he cannot have started with A-J alone, so it can never gain to play low on the heart jack.

Incidentally, when South regains the lead, he should start clubs by cashing dummy's king. If West has five hearts, he is more likely to have a club void than East.

ANSWER: In situations of this sort, you can be sure your partner has stretched to enter the auction with what you know must be limited values. So you should assume that he did so because he wants his suit led. Therefore, lead a diamond (the jack, of course) and not a club.




