BLM delays release of Gateway environmental study

Spring release will provide more time to examine alternate routes

In a sign that officials are taking the concerns of private landowners seriously, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management announced

Thursday that it will delay the release of a study on a proposed high-voltage power line project by five to seven months.

The extended study of the 1,150-mile Gateway West transmission project will

give the BLM time to evaluate a number of new alternate routes residents of southern Idaho and Wyoming are working out with Idaho Power Co. and Rocky Mountain Power, said BLM Project Manager Walt

George. The federal agency previously expected to release a draft version of its environmental impact statement in September, but will now wait until spring 2010, he said. It will consider alternate route suggestions

submitted by Sept. 4.

Though the two utility companies are developing the project, George said, the BLM also maps alternate routes in its quest to resolve public concerns about the main route. The delay comes at some cost to the utilities, but will be worth it, he said. "They agreed with us that

this was a reasonable thing to do," George said.

The BLM study focuses on the roughly 500 miles of public land the project would cross in both states. But once completed, it will also serve as a reference document for the government

ITD director fired

BOISE — The Idaho Transportation Board on Thursday voted to fire department Director Pamela Lowe, who for two years led an agency that's been under fire by legislators.

The board met behind closed doors for an hour before voting to dismiss Lowe effective July 31. She was also placed on paid administrative leave, effective immediately.

Board Chairman Darrell Manning said the decision was difficult and one that board members deliberated for several months, including several meetings held in executive session, some with Lowe present.

"The board has determined that change was necessary to help the department continue improving customer service, economy of operations, accountability and our relations with the Legislature," Manning told reporters moments after the vote. "We thank Ms. Lowe for her service and dedication to the department."

The board named Deputy Director Scott Stokes acting director.

The search for a permanent director will begin next week, Manning said.

Lowe, 51, told the *Times-News* she was shocked by the board's decision. She said she had only positive performance reviews until mid-May, when Manning asked her to resign. Under state law, directors may be removed only for "inefficiency, neglect of duty, malfeasance or nonfeasance in office."

"I believe the action today by the board was improper," she said in an interview. "I don't know (if it was political). You would hope not but I can tell you that the board never talked to me about issues about my performance at all."

To others, the board's decision is hardly a surprise, considering Lowe has been under fire from

Paint Magic helps Filer residence shine

FILER — What a difference a little paint can make.

It's been 17 years since the two-story house at 603 Sixth St. in Filer has come in contact with a paint brush. But thanks to volunteer labor from employees of Cactus Petes Resort Casino in Jackpot, Nev., and the yearly Paint Magic program, the once peeling exterior has been revitalized with a new coat of "Angel White" and matching "Amish Green" trim.

Earlier this week, Shirley Gailey's Filer residence became one of 24 homes throughout the Magic Valley to showcase the efforts of this year's Paint Magic program. At 5:30 p.m. Thursday, crews arrived to apply the finishing touches. Thanks to a coor-

inating effort by South Central Community Action Partnership, Gailey's home will also receive insulation.

"This is a dream come true for my son, Ryan, and I," Gailey said. "This group has been just wonderful. We are blessed, because with the economy like it is right now, we couldn't have done this on our own."

Paint Magic was started in 1986 by a group who wanted to reach out to the area's senior residents who, due to financial or physical limitations, were unable to maintain their homes without assistance.

Applicants must be at least 60 years old or disabled and meet specific financial criteria. Applications were available from April to June 1 at the College of Southern Idaho's Office on Aging, which received 65 applications this year.

"Some of these homes get to looking pretty scruffy," said Paint Magic President Ken Robinette "It all comes down to neighbor helping neighbor, and we've painted 500 homes in our 24 years."

Paint Magic is able to offer its services free of charge through donations totaling about \$14,000 per year. Each home, chosen through a drawing, is allocated around \$600.

Robinette said Paint Magic has been impacted by the economy, but new sponsors stepped forward to take up some of the slack.

"We've lost some, gained others and had to cut costs" he said. "It's all worth it when you have the chance to create a bond with homeowners and people pour their hearts out to you and say how grateful they are."

Drug convict escapes from Cassia Courthouse, but caught quickly

BURLEY — A 57-year-old hunchbacked, heroin-trafficking woman in a wheelchair and jail clothes can make a break for freedom but she can't make it far.

Dawn Marcel Johnson, of Filer, managed to escape from the Cassia County Courthouse for a few minutes Monday afternoon when she was scheduled to appear before a judge. On July 9 she was sentenced to seven years in prison for trafficking heroin, possession of cocaine, and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Johnson, described multiple times in court records as a "weak and shaky" woman, has a pronounced hump on her back that helped a witness in the heroin-trafficking case identify her to authorities.

She was taken from the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center in a wheelchair on Monday and, according to Deputy Bryan Bird's police report, she was not secured in leg irons. When she arrived at the courthouse, her lawyer, Robert Squire, met her in a second-floor conference room while Bird was dealing with another defendant.

"I was seeing what was going on for the next sentences when Robert Squire came running into


Benched: TFSD board denies athletic appeal

A senior who will attend Canyon Ridge High School after a change of heart about where to attend school will be ineligible to participate in varsity sports that he played while attending Twin Falls High School.

Richard Powell, the father of student Dylan Powell, received a letter on Thursday

notifying him that the school board has decided to uphold the administration's decision to not permit his son eligibility for varsity sports. The decision comes after a school year in which juniors were given the choice in October of whether they want to attend Twin Falls High School or the new Canyon Ridge High School during their senior year. In Dylan Powell's case, he

initially selected Twin Falls High School on a form he signed, but later transferred to Canyon Ridge High School.

Richard Powell had appealed the administration's decision to not permit his

son to play varsity sports. The father said he never had a chance to approve his son's original choice because the student signed his parent's name on the form without permission.

"It's more of an ego issue

than having anything to do with Dylan being able to participate in varsity ball," Powell said.

The district's letter, dated July 14, states: "While the board now recognizes the original document was forged by Dylan, the administrators have no obligation to check all signatures for forgery."

lawmakers who dealt the department and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter a major legislative blow this spring by rejecting proposals to raise the gas tax and other revenue to pay for road and bridge maintenance.

Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, who generally supported the various fee increases to give the Idaho Transportation Department more revenue to fix roads, said the board made the right decision.

"I think at this point change was needed simply to restore faith in the department," said Patrick. "I'm not one who was critical. I was more supportive than critical. But when things don't go smoothly someone usually pays the price."

Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, who sits on the House transportation committee, said many legislators spoke of some kind of change to Lowe's position. He noted that the atmosphere had reached a point to where lawmakers were "forbidden" from meeting with Lowe and only dealt with her deputies.

"I liked Pam personally, and frankly I thought she had a lot of talent and she was a smart lady. She just got on the wrong side of the Legislature, and traditionally when you're on the wrong side of the

Legislature your tenure is short," said Smith, a former ITD board chairman. "Right from the outset, she's about 5 feet tall and she's a woman in a man's world. She had a tough hill to climb.

"I say that respectfully and think she did a good job considering the world she was working in. So I don't fault her for anything in particular. I just think it was a general thing."

In March, some Republican lawmakers worked to get support for a bill that would give the governor power to dismiss Lowe and hire her replacement. But the bill failed to gather enough support, and Lowe resisted pressure to step down.

Otter spokesman Jon Hanian said the governor "respects the board's decision."

Citing personnel privacy concerns, Manning declined to elaborate on the rationale behind the decision to oust Lowe.

Unlike most Idaho agency directors, who serve at the pleasure of Idaho's governor, the seven-member Idaho Transportation Board appoints its own director, the result of a 1950s decision by lawmakers aiming to insulate the post from changing political whims of Idaho's chief executive.

The letter also quotes Idaho laws about school boards having the power to regulate extracurricular activities and says that reasonable notification and sufficient information about the policy was provided.

The father is concerned that the school district is bypassing parental choice with its decision.

"They acknowledge he forged my name on the document," Richard Powell said. "They're not really reviewing that. ... In my opinion they're saying that we as a community, we as parents, and all of the students that attend any of the schools within the Twin Falls School District really don't have rights."

The elder Powell believes the school district could have done a better job in communicating information by mailing parents the forms requiring their signatures.

"Now that we have all of the correct information, the parents should be the ones to

make that decision," he said. District officials say the district took multiple steps to inform parents and students.

Examples cited include advertised meetings for parents, a newsletter with the policy's information, and meetings and handouts for students stating that their October choice would establish athletic eligibility.

One other student is in a similar bind. Chelsey Haszier changed her mind and transferred back to Twin Falls High School after first picking Canyon Ridge High School for her senior year.

A soccer player since she was 4 years old, Haszier's ineligible to play varsity soccer for her senior year. "It's going to be hard because I'm not going to be in something I've been for the past three years of my life in high school," she said.

roll her over to the courthouse than to have her walk and risk her falling down and getting injured," Kidd said.

"Sometimes people get distracted — in this case by court personnel with a request — and a decision was made that probably shouldn't have been made," Kidd said. "We are scrutinizing some of our procedures, and we're in the process of implementing some changes."

Though Johnson made it out of the courthouse, she was easily found, Cassia County Undersheriff George Warrell said.

"It really wasn't an escape, because she was caught right there. It isn't what you'd normally think of as an escape," he said.

Nonetheless, Johnson is charged with felony escape.

entities charged with approving the route's private-land segments.

In the Magic Valley, landowners in Cassia County have been vocally opposed to the project's proposed path, pushing to relocate much of it onto public land. But residents of other counties have also sought tweaks — on Thursday, for example, former Twin Falls County commissioner Bill Brockman met with current commissioners to express concern about the project. Idaho Power met with Elmore County residents on Thursday evening and plans meetings in Jerome and Gooding counties next week.

In a statement released earlier Thursday, company Vice President Lisa Grow said the meetings are important to the project.

"Collaboration is key to the successful siting and construction of this necessary transmission line project to ensure safe, reliable electric service to our customers and those across the

region," she said.

The governors of both states also welcomed the announcement. Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter said in a statement that the delay proves the companies and the BLM are dedicated to resolving landowner concerns.

"There's no doubt that we need more and better ways to get electricity from one place to another, especially here in Idaho," Otter said. "But that can't mean short-changing private property rights or engaging in unnecessary conflicts."

George noted that many efforts to alter the route are being spearheaded by county commissions, one way that individual landowners seek to secure a more powerful voice. He said he sympathizes with individuals who feel it's difficult to get the federal agency's attention, and said the fact that the route has attracted criticism and controversy proves the federal scoping process is working.

"This is exactly what's supposed to happen," he said.

Murder most foul on the road to Jarbidge

Why was the Warren Commission so sure that Lee Harvey Oswald was the triggerman in the assassination of President John Kennedy? How did the FBI identify the killer of 12-year Polly Klaas in 1993? It's all because Ben Kuhl was a little careless after he gunned down Fred Searcy near Jarbidge 93 years ago — during the last stage-coach robbery in the United States.

On the snowy evening of Dec. 5, 1916, Searcy was driving the mail stage on its last leg between Three Creek and Jarbidge when he was robbed and murdered. A search party found the wagon, horses and Searcy's body on the outskirts of town. About \$3,000 was missing, along with the mail.

Deputies discovered torn letters near the scene, including one with a bloody palm print.

Palm prints contain more detail than fingerprints, but criminal forensic science was still in its infancy in 1916. The first conviction on the basis of fingerprint evidence had happened just 14 years before, and the landmark Illinois Supreme Court decision accepting fingerprints as proof of identification occurred only in 1912.

But according to Elko historian Howard Hickson, District Attorney Ted Carville located a couple of California police fingerprint experts, C.H. Stone and O.W. Bottoroff, who had between them examined 1,500 crime scene palm prints in the previous year. Both testified the print on the letter was Kuhl's.

Convicted of first-degree murder by an Elko jury, Kuhl was sentenced to die. A week before the scheduled execution, the Nevada Supreme Court stayed the sentence pending Kuhl's final appeal.

"The prime argument was, of course, the admissibility of the palm print as evidence," Hickson, now the director emeritus of the Northeastern Nevada Museum, wrote in a 1998 article. "Kuhl's attorney, Harold P. Hale, argued that such prints had never been brought before a court in the United States, England, or, for that matter, anywhere in the world. The justices ruled that the prints were admissible."

Kuhl's sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment, and in 1943 he was paroled by the same man who had prosecuted him, Gov. Ted Carville.

That 1918 Nevada Supreme Court ruling led to subsequent court decisions which reaffirmed the admissibility of palm print evidence. In 1964, the FBI told the Warren Commission that a partial handprint found on the Italian-made rifle that killed Kennedy was Oswald's.

Thirty years later, a fingerprint expert was able to match a palm print found in Polly Klaas' Petaluma, Calif., room to Richard Allen Davis, who is awaiting execution for kidnapping and murder.

Trial over molasses spill not scheduled until May

A lawsuit over alleged damage caused by a January molasses spill in Twin Falls won't go to trial until May of next year, according to court records.

An estimated 10,000 to 15,000 gallons of molasses-based cattle feed leaked out of a tank at Performance Plus-Idaho, 198 Gem St., on the night of Jan. 21 — also seeping onto the neighboring John's Auto Repair and East 5 Points Trailer Court. Both neighboring businesses are owned by John and Frankie Kreps.

Performance Plus General Manager Matt Beed pledged at the time to help his neighbor clean up the mess and pay for the work, telling the *Times-News*, "It's our mess." But on April 2, the Kreps filed a civil complaint seeking nearly \$81,000 in restitution for the spill, alleging Performance Plus was negligent in containing any spills and properly storing and transferring the molasses.

A jury trial on the matter is now scheduled before 5th District Judge G. Richard Bevan for May 2010. But Beed said

Tuesday that a trial may not even be needed if the parties are willing to negotiate a settlement or mediate the matter.

"(Kreps) wants (to be) paid as soon as possible, and we want this cleared up as soon as possible," Beed said. "Money's going to be an issue no matter what."

The Kreps' complaint seeks money for a number of projects, including replanting the lawn at the auto shop and installing a concrete ledge to prevent more spills from seeping onto their property. It alleges that John Kreps suffered both economic and noneconomic damages due to the damage to his truck, and that Frankie

Kreps "has lost the consortium and companionship of her spouse and has suffered separate and distinct damages" that constitute a separate claim.

Attorneys for Performance Plus responded on April 30, denying all allegations in the Kreps' complaint.

Among a number of arguments, they wrote that the company doesn't have enough information to even address a number of the complaints, that some of the damages may have had other causes or even occurred before the spill and that the Kreps aren't even allowed to seek emotional-distress damages in this case.

Beed said his company

did clean up the Kreps' properties as best it could. He alleged that cleaners couldn't get on some of the property, and that the charges listed in the complaint weren't previously agreed upon, leading Performance Plus' insurance to refuse to pay them.

John Kreps has fought the company for several years for allegedly not following environmental standards, and Beed said he believes that history may have somewhat colored the suit.

"In my opinion, he's just trying to make some money off of an incident that had happened that was an accident," Beed said.

John Kreps said Tuesday that there's still much more cleanup work to do and noted his history of troubles with Performance Plus before referring questions to his attorney, Jeff Stoker of Twin Falls. Stoker could not be reached for comment in time for this report.

Brush fire near Hailey turning into annual event

HAILEY — White smoke rising from the trees near the Big Wood River in Hailey Thursday afternoon offered a bit of deja vu for residents of the China Gardens neighborhood.

A brush fire in the trees just behind the neighborhood, reported about 3:10 p.m., was put out quickly. Wood River Fire and Rescue Fire Chief Bart Lassman called it manmade but likely not arson.

The fire was similar to one on July 14 last year, about a quarter-mile north of the same neighborhood.

Both burned just outside city and county jurisdictions on public-access state land in a cottonwood forest, less than 100 yards from residences along Aspen Drive.

Last year's fire was more difficult to control because foliage was drier, while this year's was extinguished

within about an hour and a half.

"This is a man-caused fire, certainly," Lassman said Thursday, noting the absence of power lines, lightning or other obvious sources of ignition. He said the fire department wasn't looking at it specifically as arson, but he didn't dismiss the notion entirely.

"Somebody's playing games, maybe," he said. He

also noted that neighborhood witnesses reportedly saw people coming out of the area just before the fire was reported. "Nobody knows who these people are."

Blaine County Sheriff's Lt. Curtis Miller said the county would investigate, but there were no known suspects yet. "We'll look into it, see what we can come up with."

DEQ seeks outside water information

If you've spent the last year taking water samples from Idaho's rivers and streams, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality would like to have a chat with you.

It's probably safe to assume that the average Idahoan doesn't have a file cabinet full of scientific water studies. But nevertheless, the agency issued a call this week for any and all recent scientific data depicting water quality across the state.

Any information will become part of a report the state plans to submit to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in 2010.

The report identifies water bodies that don't meet state standards and may need improvement, and is supposed to be submitted every two years — though that hasn't always happened, said Don Essig, of DEQ's state office.

DEQ will analyze any data it receives and sort it into three quality tiers based on the age of the data, the way it was gathered and other factors. Submissions must be scientifically rigorous and relevant; the agency gave examples of doctorate or master's theses, published or printed studies or reports, environmental assessments and models as possible sources.

Federal law requires DEQ to seek out "all readily avail-

able information," Essig said. But the practice also helps the agency build on what data it gathered with its own limited resources.

Separate rape cases in court today

Two men are slated to appear this morning for preliminary hearings in Twin Falls 5th District Court on separate rape charges.

One case involves a rape allegation that was re-filed two months after prosecutors dismissed it.

The Twin Falls County Prosecutors Office filed a rape charge against Timothy A. Campeau, 23, on July 2, after dismissing the case May 1, without providing a reason in court records.

The new case appears to be the same as the prior one, with identical affidavits in support of arrest filed for both the March and July versions, court records show.

However, the charging document or criminal complaint varies slightly between the two. The victim's initials are noted consistently in the July versions as "N.M." However, in the dismissed March 23 case the victim is referred to once as "S.L.," court records show.

More work on the rape case needed to be done, said Twin

Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loeb Thursday, when asked why the case was dismissed May 1 and then re-filed this month.

"There was an evidentiary situation that needed to be clarified," said Loeb, declining to elaborate.

Authorities say Campeau on March 13 raped a woman described in court records as a friend who was visiting from Washington. The woman told authorities she asked Campeau — who she had sex with in the past — to stay the night with her at her relative's home in Twin Falls after a party there involving alcohol, according to court records.

However, the woman told police she "passed out quickly from the alcohol" and awoke to find Campeau having sex with her. The woman told police she immediately pulled away and asked Campeau what he was doing, according to the court record.

Campeau allegedly told her "I lost control" and then the woman ran to another room crying and told a family member she had been raped, according to court records. Campeau later told police he had drank "a little

bit" and thought the woman had "drunk a lot," according to the court record.

"Campeau said (the woman) was enticing him ... Suggesting to him that she wanted to have sex," police say in court records. "Campeau said the alcohol and his desire grew too strong"

Campeau told police, according to court records, that he was sorry. "Campeau said he has loved (the woman) since 9th grade. Campeau was apologetic for what he had done and said he still has (N.M.'s) crying inside his head."

Also today in a Twin Falls courtroom, Marty Stone is scheduled to face a May charge that he raped a woman who told authorities she is a lesbian and would never consent to sex with a man.

Stone, 37, is accused of raping the woman after she went with him to another home in Twin Falls County to get darts to play a game, according to court records.

Stone denied the allegations when interviewed by police, and allegedly said sex was consensual, according to court records.

Rape in Idaho can be punished by at least a year of prison to life.

T.F. County will start accepting debit, credit card payments

Twin Falls County commissioners voted Thursday to begin implementation of a program that will allow residents to make payments, including online, to the county using debit and credit cards.

The 3-0 decision directs County Treasurer Debbie Kauffman to set up the service with Point and Pay, beginning in the County Clerk's office, and eventually the treasurer and misdemeanor probation offices.

Kauffman said the service will eventually allow county residents to make payments for all departments online, a growing option at municipalities across the country.

"People want to use debit and credit cards," Kauffman said. "We've had a lot of requests for it."

Currently, debit or credit cards may be used in the county's Department of Motor Vehicles through a state-administered program. Property taxes may also be paid using credit or debit cards, although it's administered through a third party. Citations may be paid with the cards, too.

Recording fees, alcohol fees and marriage licenses are some examples

of items in the clerk's office that would be eligible to be paid for with cards. Kauffman said the initial request came from the parks department because people wanted to reserve parks with their cards.


Officials said there won't be a cost to the county because users will be assessed a convenience charge — at least 2.95 percent and a minimum of \$2 — that will go to Point and Pay. It will take about two months to set up, Kauffman said.

In related news, commissioners held meetings Thursday with employees that were not scheduled on the agenda and without minutes being taken, apparent violations of the state Open Meeting Law.

The meetings included all three commissioners. Only two are needed for a quorum.

Commissioners said they didn't have to publicly post the meetings because they weren't going to make any decisions but only receive information reports from employees.

Still, the inaction by commissioners appeared to contrast a decision earlier that morning in which they amended their agenda in order to meet with Bill Brockman, a former county commissioner, over a proposed transmission project.

Appearances matter in CSI hiring

Kristin Beck may be a great hire by the College of Southern Idaho, but she's in for some second-guessing.

That's because the new director of the CSI Mini-Cassia Center is the daughter of CSI President Jerry Beck.

CSI chose Kristin Beck over 58 other candidates to succeed Annette Braegger, who retired after 17 years at the helm of CSI's Burley operation. Jerry Beck says he wasn't involved in the decision.

But Jeff Fox, CSI's executive vice president and chief academic officer, and John Miller, the instructional dean, were. Fox reports to Jerry Beck; Miller to Fox.

The hire didn't violate CSI's nepotism policy, but was Kristin Beck really the best choice for the \$44,000-a-year job? We don't know because CSI won't release the names of the other candidates.

At 26, Kristin Beck has just one year of administrative experience at a 360-student charter school run by a top administrator who started teaching before Ms. Beck was even born.

At the Mini-Cassia Center, Beck will be in charge of an operation serving as many as 2,000 students.

Herself a CSI grad, Kristin Beck worked for the Twin Falls School District for six years as a teacher and reading coach. She earned a bachelor's in elementary education from Idaho State University in 2002 and a master's degree in educational leadership from the University of Idaho last year.

Braegger, who also holds a master's degree, was 49 when she took over the Mini-Cassia Center.

Hiring or promoting relatives is problematic in any organization, but perhaps nowhere more so than in education. For teachers and administrators, success is determined mostly by subjective factors — you can't measure an educator's performance like you would an assembly-line worker.

What's more, personnel discussions are private — meaning the public, students and fellow employees don't get to know the criteria by which educators are judged.

Nepotism policies in higher education are usually vague. Like CSI, Boise State University, the U of I and ISU all prohibit direct supervision of a relative. Only the U of I does more.

"In reviewing a proposed personnel action, the assistant vice president for human resources shall consider all aspects of the proposed action including ... the effect on supervision, morale, safety, security, nature of job description and applicant pool, and any potential conflicts of interest ...," the U of I personnel policy manual says.

Many college nepotism policies stipulate that administrators must "avoid the appearance of conflict of interest" in personnel decisions involving kin. They recognize that once a relative is hired, it's impossible to prove there was no favoritism.

In this case, three of CSI's five elected trustees say they either didn't know about the hire or were unaware that Kristin Beck is Jerry Beck's daughter.

CSI, a taxpayer-supported public institution, needs more transparency in this process. That includes a new, more detailed nepotism policy that requires trustees to review and sign off when a relative of the president is hired or promoted.

Our view:

The College of Southern Idaho gave new Mini-Cassia Center Director Kristin Beck a great opportunity — and put her in a difficult position.

These guys cheat on their kids, too



Four boys for Steve McNair. Four boys for Mark Sanford. Four children for David Vitter. Three daughters for Eliot Spitzer. Three children for John Ensign. Three children for John Edwards. Three children for Kwame Kilpatrick.

Those two dozen children are enough, without even reaching back a decade for Chelsea Clinton, to demonstrate the impressive swath of psychological destruction for the dalliances of dads.

Even assuming that we all make mistakes, it never ceases to boggle the mind how men, particularly those who stake out high moral ground in politics or build a pristine image in the community as athletes, lay waste to it all in an act of passion.

Here we are, a human race that can peer billions of light years into space, communicate in a click with someone 12,000 miles away, and cure all kinds of diseases, yet cannot find the carnal off-switch. In the normal course of parenting, trust between children and fathers is a devilish ride. So why some dads go all out to be Satan is an enduring fascination.

Once, just once, could a guy like Sanford anticipate his own press clippings and decide that his "soul mate" in Argentina was not worth tearing a piece out of the souls of his boys? He can call his sons "absolute jewels and blessings," as he did at his stranger-than-truth press conference last month, but when he later said, "I knew the cost" of the affair and the cost was worth it because "I will be able to die knowing that I had met my soul mate," you just get the feeling he doesn't get it. The children just end up as cheap collateral damage.

In this world where everything is permanent on the Web, how will the children of the rest of the above deal with, let alone come to terms with knowing either that dad was killed by his lover, dad made calls on prostitutes, or dad's parents paid off mistresses?

There is a surprising paucity of university-based data on the direct effects of affairs on children, but it is easy to extrapolate that many of them will suffer forms of post-betrayal stress similar to living in a broken home; plunging performance in school, hitting the bottle, or doing drugs. Endless studies show that children are disrupted by changes in family structure, and, boy, does infidelity often change family structure.

"When a parent has an affair that is disclosed, the

landscape of the family changes. It can't be denied," according to Janis Abrahms Spring, author of several books on family relationships, including extramarital affairs, and a former clinical supervisor in Yale University's psychology department.

"There are often two losses for the child," she said. "The hurt partner is often filled with anxiety and depression and is not available to the child the same way as before. The unfaithful parent is off with the affair person and not available to the child. The family blows apart."

Spring, who has spent three decades specializing on infidelity issues, said the seemingly nonstop stories of powerful, public men cheating on their wives in very spectacular ways, including deadly results, serves to demonstrate how affairs carry "the power of a crack-cocaine high. They don't think clearly, they don't think of the consequences. The attraction often is not necessarily the person they are having the affair with but how they are

experiencing themselves in that relationship, which can be intoxicating."

With one out of every five men admitting to ever having had an extramarital affair, according to the University of Chicago's National Opinion Research Center, we really need a fresh 12-step program for thinking with the upstairs brain before sneaking into life's basement.

One of the nicest and human sights on the 2008 presidential campaign trail was watching Chelsea Clinton campaigning for her mother, Hillary. She demonstrates that on the surface, a daughter of the president of the United States can come out OK after her father's affair. But we will never know the private hurt. Of the freshly-scarred 24 sons and daughters from the affairs named at the top, only time will tell which ones will rise above the hurt and which ones will be haunted forever.

Health care reform shouldn't cut reimbursement rates

Our nation has reached the point where all of us, including hospital and physician organizations, believe that significant reform of our health care system is needed. Most appreciate there is no silver-bullet solution, but rather a need for both compromise and change across the spectrum, from government and private payers to providers, suppliers, pharmaceutical manufacturers and individuals.

Numerous reform ideas are being proposed. There are aspects of these proposals with merit: coverage for the uninsured, liability reform, physician self-referral limitations, payment for outcomes, payment bundling to address the fractured payment system, attention to primary care services, insurance simplification, and regulatory reform. Most of these proposals have not yet been fully developed. Without further, detailed study of the components, implementation could well lead to unintended consequences.

All of the proposals being considered, however, do have a common theme: reduce payments to providers. This is a tool employed by government (and private) payers for the last 30 years, with history

showing that it has exacerbated many of the current issues we face:

1. Per service underpayment has led to increased utilization of health services.
2. Underpayment from government payers has caused providers to shift costs to the private sector.
3. Underpayment for non-procedural work has contributed to the shortage of vital primary care providers.

The research on utilization is startling. Areas of the country with more doctors, more hospitals, more free-standing facilities like imaging centers and limited service, physician-owned surgery centers and hospitals, places like Florida and Texas, have dramatically higher utilization rates and health care costs per person than states like Utah and Idaho.

What does this mean? Does higher utilization, or in other words, "more" health care services, mean "better" health care? Researchers at Dartmouth say "No."

The problem isn't that lower utilization means lower-quality care; it is that higher utilization means more costly care for the same quality.

For Idaho, this is critical given that current reform proposals would cut reimbursement rates, or the per service amount paid for care, by the same percentage for every area of the country.

The net effect for Idaho, a low utilization and low per capita cost state (a 2007 Kaiser Family Foundation study ranked Idaho third-lowest in the nation), would be dramatically reduced dollars coupled with the same demand for high-quality care. Compare this to states like Florida, where utilization and costs are high and thus there is more opportunity for expense reduction. To address this underlying inequality, Congress needs to account for the impact of utilization. In other words, don't penalize Idaho for having some of the lowest costs per capita and utilization in the country.

Two other areas that must be addressed in order to achieve significant reform are administrative costs and our tremendous regulatory burden.

The U.S. Congressional Research Service estimated administrative costs of pri-

vate insurance and government programs in 2004 at about \$154 billion. The American Hospital Association estimates another \$400 billion is spent by hospitals and medical practices in complying with the thousands of rules and regulations that apply to health care providers. Simplifying administration and the resulting exorbitant cost of compliance and reporting will reduce health care costs.

Administrative costs include the cost of "defensive medicine". The threat of lawsuits causes health care providers to order more tests and procedures than are medically necessary. Reforming the way our society adjudicates injuries from medical malpractice will result in cost savings by reducing this practice of "defensive medicine."

Everyone agrees we must stop our health care system from devouring our economic future. To achieve real reform — the kind that reduces cost AND increases the quality of care — Congress needs to do better than the current legislation.



NASA lost moon footage, but Hollywood restoring it

WASHINGTON — NASA could put a man on the moon but didn't have the sense to keep the original video of the live TV transmission.

In an embarrassing acknowledgment, the space agency said Thursday that it must have erased the Apollo 11 moon footage years ago so that it could reuse the videotape.

But now Hollywood is coming to the rescue.

The studio wizards who restored "Casablanca" are digitally sharpening and cleaning up the ghostly, grainy footage of the moon

landing, making it even better than what TV viewers saw on July 20, 1969. They are doing it by working from four copies that NASA scrounged from around the world.

"There's nothing being created; there's nothing being manufactured," said NASA senior engineer Dick Nafzger, who is in charge of the project. "You can now see the detail that's coming out."

The first batch of restored footage was released just in time for the 40th anniversary of the "one giant leap for mankind;" and some of the details seem new because of their sharpness. Originally, astronaut Neil Armstrong's

face visor was too fuzzy to be seen clearly. The upgraded video of Earth's first moon-walker shows the visor and a reflection in it.

The \$230,000 refurbishing effort is only three weeks into a months-long project, and only 40 percent of the work has been done. But it does show improvements in four snippets: Armstrong walking down the ladder; Buzz Aldrin following him; the two astronauts reading a plaque they left on the moon; and the planting of the flag on the lunar surface.

Nafzger said a huge search that began three years ago for the old moon tapes led to the "inescapable conclusion"

that 45 tapes of Apollo 11 video were erased and reused. His report on that will come out in a few weeks.

The original videos beamed to Earth were stored on giant reels of tape that each contained 15 minutes of video, along with other data from the moon. In the 1970s and '80s, NASA had a shortage of the tapes, so it erased about 200,000 of them and reused them.

How did NASA end up looking like a bumbling husband taping over his wedding video with the Super Bowl?

Nafzger, who was in charge of the live TV recordings back in the Apollo years, said they were mostly thought of

as data tapes. It wasn't his job to preserve history, he said, just to make sure the footage worked. In retrospect, he said he wished NASA hadn't reused the tapes.

Outside historians were aghast.

"It's surprising to me that NASA didn't have the common sense to save perhaps the most important historical footage of the 20th cen-

ture," said Rice University historian and author Douglas Brinkley. He noted that NASA saved all sorts of data and artifacts from Apollo 11, and it is "mind-boggling that the tapes just disappeared."

The remastered copies may look good, but "when dealing with historical film footage, you always want the original to study," Brinkley said.

WASHINGTON Budget chief warns of health plan's costs

Congress' chief budget analyst delivered a devastating assessment Thursday of the health-care proposals drafted by congressional Democrats, fueling an insurrection among fiscal conservatives in the House and pushing negotiators in the Senate to redouble efforts to draw up a new plan that more effectively restrains federal spending.

Under questioning by members of the Senate Budget Committee, Douglas Elmendorf, director of the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office, said bills crafted by House leaders and the Senate health committee do not propose "the sort of fundamental changes" necessary to rein in the skyrocketing cost of government health programs, particularly Medicare. On the contrary, Elmendorf said, the measures would pile on an expensive new program to cover the uninsured.

Though President Obama and Democratic leaders have repeatedly pledged to alter the soaring trajectory of federal health spending, the proposals so far would not meet that goal, Elmendorf said, noting, "The curve is being raised."

His remarks suggested that rather than averting a looming fiscal crisis, the measures could make the nation's bleak budget outlook even worse.

GOP pledges quick vote on Sotomayor

Sonia Sotomayor sped toward confirmation as the nation's first Hispanic justice Thursday, encouraged by Republican promises of a quick vote and cheered on by a Democratic senator's challenge to take on the Supreme Court's conservative wing when she arrives.

"Battle out the ideas that you believe in, because I have a strong hunch that they are closer to the ones that I would like to see adopted by the court," Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, a Republican turned Democrat, told Sotomayor.

Even two of her Republican critics called the 55-year-old

appeals court judge's rulings "mainstream" — noteworthy concessions for President Obama's first high court nominee.

If confirmed, Sotomayor would become the first justice appointed by a Democratic president in 15 years.

Republicans, expressing concern that she would bring bias to the court, gave Frank Ricci, a white New Haven, Conn., firefighter whose reverse discrimination claim was rejected by Sotomayor and two other appeals court judges, a speaking role at the hearing.

He complained that the ruling showed a belief "that citizens should be reduced to racial statistics," but declined when given the chance to say Sotomayor's nomination should be rejected.

PENNSYLVANIA Two-hand transplant patient yearns to feel

PITTSBURGH — The nation's first double hand transplant patient can wriggle his new fingers a little bit now and grab a tennis ball, but what he really wants to do is be able to feel his wife's hands when he holds them.

Jeff Kepner held hands with his wife Thursday as he talked to news reporters about his recovery at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center where he underwent the nine-hour surgery in early May.

So far, he has no feelings in his new hands because the nerves have not grown into them. Nerves grow about an inch a month, according to his doctors.

Kepner said he does daily therapy to develop muscle strength to use his hands, and he hoped to inspire others who need such surgery to consider it. He lost his hands and feet a decade ago to a bacterial infection, and said he did not want to undergo the surgery at first.

"I thought, 'Are you kidding me?' I said, 'There's no way I'm going to do that,'" Kepner recalled telling his wife when she told him about the possibility last fall.

Showing off his hands Thursday, Kepner said he's glad he went through the surgery. He had been ambivalent because he could manage with his prosthetics

and had read that the world's first double hand transplant patient had to have the hands removed because his body rejected them.

N. CAROLINA Woman's jade sets 'Roadshow' record

RALEIGH — Jinx Taylor always thought her father had impeccable taste. Now she knows it's true.

Four pieces of jade that her father bought in the 1930s and '40s at No. 10 Jade St. in Beijing were valued last month at more than \$1 million on PBS' "Antiques Roadshow" while the program was in Raleigh, a record appraisal for the show. They're so valuable, in fact, that Taylor can't afford the insurance on the keepsakes and plans to sell them.

"I adored my father," Taylor, who lives along North Carolina's coast, said in a recent phone interview. "He was interesting and a good, generous man. I'm wishing he could see this and see what was going on."

The four pieces — a vase with ruby detail, a small bowl, a large bowl marked with "By Imperial Order"

and an animal figurine — are from the reign of Ch'ien-lung (1736-1795), said appraiser Jim Callahan, an Asian art expert with Boston-based Skinner Inc.

MISSISSIPPI Wife of ex-lawmaker claims he had affair

JACKSON — The estranged wife of former U.S. Rep. Chip Pickering claims in a lawsuit that the Mississippi Republican had an affair that ruined their marriage and derailed his political career.

Leisha Pickering said in the lawsuit filed this week that her husband and the woman dated in college, reconnected and began having an affair while he was in Congress and living in a building where several Christian lawmakers reside on C Street near the U.S. Capitol. Chip Pickering is the third Republican with ties to the building at 133 C Street SE to find his personal life making headlines in recent weeks, after Nevada U.S. Sen. John Ensign and South Carolina Gov. Mark Sanford.



Wage hike boosts 1 in 4 hospitality jobs

Tips may be declining, so employers will need to make up difference

The third and final phase of a statewide minimum wage increase will have the largest impact on the leisure and hospitality industry, according to Idaho Department of Labor analysts.

One of every four jobs — many held by part-time workers — will be affected when paychecks for 6 per-

cent of Idaho's nonfarm jobs get a little bigger July 24.

The largest impact will be in the leisure and hospitality industry, when state and federal minimum wages are increased to \$7.25 an hour, where according to Idaho Department of Labor analysts, one of every four jobs — many held by part-time workers — are affected.

Overall, nearly 40,000 of Idaho's estimated 650,000 jobs currently pay less than

\$7.25 an hour.

Next week's increase was authorized by the Legislature in 2007 when it tied Idaho's minimum wage to the federal minimum wage. That same year, Congress voted to increase the minimum wage from \$5.15 an hour to \$7.25 an hour in three stages of 70 cents each. The final stage on July 24 raises the wage from \$6.55 to \$7.25.

The minimum wage for Idaho employees in jobs

where they earn tips — bartenders, waiters and waitresses, for example — remains unchanged at \$3.35 an hour. But employers must ensure that tips provide another \$3.90 an hour to reach the new minimum or employers must make up the difference.

Many of those Idaho jobs in leisure and hospitality involve tips, which in most cases not only meet the minimum wage but exceed it. But according to depart-

Idaho among top 10 states for filings

WASHINGTON — The number of U.S. households on the verge of losing their homes soared by nearly 15 percent in the first half of the year, with Idaho being among the top 10 states with the highest number of foreclosure filings.

The mushrooming foreclosure crisis affected more than 1.5 million homes in the first six months of the year as more people lost their jobs and were unable to pay their monthly mortgage bills, according to a report released Thursday by foreclosure listing service RealtyTrac Inc.

The data show that, despite the Obama administration's plan to encourage the lending industry to prevent foreclosures by handing out \$50 billion in subsidies, the nation's housing woes continue to spread. Experts don't expect foreclosures to peak until the middle of next year.


Foreclosure filings rose more than 33 percent in June compared with the same month last year and were up nearly 5 percent from May,

RealtyTrac said. "Despite all the efforts to date, we clearly haven't got a

handle on how to address the situation," said Rick Sharga, RealtyTrac's senior vice president for marketing.

More than 336,000 households received at least one foreclosure-related notice in June, according to the foreclosure listing firm's report. That works out to one in every 380 U.S. homes.

It was the fourth-straight month in which more than 300,000 households receiving a foreclosure filing, which includes default notices and several other legal notices that homeowners receive before they finally lose their homes. Banks repossessed more than

79,000 homes in June, up from about 65,000 a month earlier.

On a state-by-state basis, Nevada had the nation's highest foreclosure rate in the first half of the year, with more than 6 percent of all households receiving a filing. Arizona was No. 2, followed by Florida, California and Utah. Rounding out the top 10 were Georgia, Michigan, Illinois, Idaho and Colorado.

The Obama administration in March launched a \$50 billion plan to give the lending industry financial incentives to modify mortgages to lower payments, but it's off

Idaho high court rejects Micron price-fixing claim

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has refused to revive a lawsuit brought by a shareholder who claimed Micron Technology's top officials were taking part in a price-fixing scheme.

In its unanimous ruling handed down Thursday, the high court agreed with 4th District Judge Darla Williamson and said the shareholder, Scott Orrock, failed to first demand to Micron's board members fix the problem, which is required for a derivative lawsuit.

Barry Kaplan, the attorney who represents the board of the Boise-based major producer of computer chips, could not be immediately reached for comment Thursday. Neither could Marc Umeda, the attorney who represented Orrock in the case.

A derivative lawsuit allows shareholders to sue executives or board members over claims that their actions harmed the company as a whole. Orrock's lawsuit alleged that Micron President, Chairman and CEO Steven Appleton and several members of the board participated in a price-fixing scheme starting in 2000. He also claimed that the board failed to correct the behavior or hold anyone responsible for years.

In its unanimous ruling, the high court agreed with 4th District Judge Darla Williamson and said the shareholder, Scott Orrock, failed to first demand to Micron's board members fix the problem.

During oral arguments last month, Kaplan argued that Orrock failed to show the board did not act in good faith. Kaplan also said the board fully cooperated with a U.S. Justice Department investigation into price-fixing allegations.

The Justice Department was investigating whether chip companies conspired to manipulate the number of DRAM chips released to market to inflate prices. Micron was granted immunity by the department, and the investigation resulted in fines of more than \$730 million and guilty pleas from four companies — Samsung Electronics Co., Elpida Memory Inc., Infineon Technologies AG and Hynix Semiconductor Inc.

Orrock's attorney, Marc Umeda, told the Supreme

Home-based businesses can have pitfalls

Editor's note: This is the first of two columns on starting a home-based business. Next week: Making the adjustments you need to operate out of your home.

For many of the people laid off during the recession, the next career move is a home-based business. It's an ideal solution for many, but these new entrepreneurs need to be aware of some caveats in running a company from home.

One is taxes. It's much easier to claim a deduction for a home-based business than it was years ago, when it almost guaranteed a visit from the IRS. But it's still possible to make a mistake,

claim too big a deduction, and grab the government's attention. Another pitfall to look out for is insurance. Chances are you'll need to buy additional insurance if you're operating out of your house or apartment.

And, you need to be sure running a business in your home doesn't violate any local laws or regulations, or, if you're part of a homeowners' association or cop, its bylaws.

You should take taxes into consideration as you decide where in your home you're going to operate a business. Mark Toolan, a certified public accountant in Exton, Pa., noted that the space you choose "must be exclusively used for business."

That means you can't claim your entire family room if the kids watch TV and play there too. You might be able to claim the part of the room with your desk and PC, but keep in mind you might need to prove to the IRS that your kids don't sit there for hours at a time playing computer games or visiting Facebook.

Claiming part of your home for business use means you can deduct the

part of the mortgage or rent, insurance, maintenance costs and repairs that can be attributed to that space. For example, if your business takes up 10 percent of your home and you spend \$10,000 on home expenses, you can deduct \$1,000. If you have a cleaning service and spend \$2,500 a year to have your home cleaned, you can deduct \$250.

The key word to keep in mind when claiming a home office deduction is "reasonable," a word that actually applies to all the business expenses you claim on your tax return. The IRS will have a sense of how much you should be deducting. If you

Jobless claims drop clouded by shutdowns





have a consulting business and you get your roof repaired, the government will look askance at your trying to deduct 50 percent of the bill.

You don't have to conduct all of your business activities from your home to qualify for the deduction. If you spend your work time visiting customers but do your administrative work such as billing and keeping your books at home, you can claim the deduction. It's a good idea to consult with a tax professional before you set up the home business, or, at the least, before you start compiling your tax return.

Then there's the matter of insurance. Don't assume your standard homeowners policy will

also cover your business. Check your policy, but also call your broker or the customer service number for your provider to be sure what is and isn't covered.

Someone who's a freelance writer at home may have some coverage under a homeowners policy. But the more complex your business, the more likely you'll need separate insurance. If a business visitor trips over a toy on the sidewalk or is nipped by your poodle, homeowners insurance might not cover the mishap. And if you have employees, it's almost certain you'll need additional liability coverage.

It's not just slips and falls you need to worry about. If you have a lot of business-related equipment in your home, it

might not be covered in the event of a fire, natural disaster or theft. You also need to make the same determination for vehicles that are used for both personal and business purposes.

It may be possible to put a rider on your homeowners policy, rather than buying completely separate coverage. Check with your broker.

Before you start a business at home, you also need to be sure that you don't run afoul of local ordinances or zoning regulations, or any limits imposed by a homeowners' association.

Chances are it's fine to run something like a consulting or freelance writing business, said Barbara Weltman, a tax attorney in Millwood,

Changes within the district include the hiring of Roger Keller, formerly vice principal of Twin Falls High School, to be the high school principal.


Now that those positions are filled the district is ready to move in a positive direction, Stutzman said.

"We have a great team in place and we all work really well together," he said.

Stutzman said his management style is that of a "team player" and someone who wants district educators to take ownership of their schools.

"The staff made a lot of decisions," Stutzman said.

While at the middle school Stutzman said teachers and administrators created a "fun

Friday" where students with exemplary attendance were awarded twice a month by getting one period off to play foosball, ping pong and other activities.

The program was created to increase attendance and it worked, bringing average daily attendance from 92 percent to 94 percent in just a matter of one year, Stutzman said.

"More students mean you can afford more teachers and that in turn helps educate kids," Stutzman said.

Although Stutzman, a 1977 Buhl graduate, said he one day wanted to serve as the district's superintendent, he didn't think it would come so fast.

"I'm really excited," Stutzman said. "But kind of scared, too. I didn't expect it."

Stutzman was appointed to the position for a one-year interim term but has the option of throwing his hat into permanent consideration for the position next year.

School Board Chairman Jim Barker wouldn't release details of Cox's retirement, saying,

"Margaret Cox, as of July 1, took early retirement and left the district. That's all I can say about that."

Cox was hired in December 2006 and was contracted through 2011 to serve as superintendent.

Barker said the board is confident in Stutzman's ability to fill the position.

"We discussed our possibilities but in the end it was unanimous that Byron is appointed," he said. "We're trying to implement collaborative leadership and I believe he will fit that role very well. As for Margaret, I for one, wish her well."

Keller, who officially begins his new job Aug. 1, is already coming to the high school and acquainting himself with the district.

Keller, who resides in Kimberly, worked for the Kimberly School District for 14 years and the Twin Falls district for seven years, most recently as the TFHS vice principal.

"I like the size of the school district, it's quite similar to Kimberly and I like the community," Keller said. "Having lived in Buhl ... I knew some of the staff."

He's looking at ways to adjust class schedules to lower the student-to-teacher ratio in the classroom.

Architectural photographer Julius Shulman dies in LA at 98

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Photographer Julius Shulman, who turned photos of Modernist buildings into works of art, has died, colleagues said Thursday. He was 98.

Shulman died Wednesday night at his home in the Hollywood Hills and had been in declining health, said gallery owner Craig Krull, who represented him.

"He, in my opinion and the opinions of many, is the most important architectural photographer in history. He elevated what you might consider a commercial genre to a fine art," Krull said.

The Getty Center bought Shulman's archive of 260,000 photos in 1995. Shulman then teamed up

with collaborator Juergen Nogai and worked into his 90s to build another library of photos.

Shulman's pictures at one time sold for less than \$50 each, but in later years would bring between \$2,000 and \$20,000.

His most famous work was a black-and-white photo taken of a glass and steel frame home built by architect Pierre Koenig in the Hollywood Hills above Laurel Canyon Boulevard as the sun was setting in 1960. It was No. 22 in John Entenza's Arts & Architecture magazine's Case Study housing program.

The picture from outside the cantilevered house was shot through its glass walls

toward a sea of sparkling city lights below. Two women seem to be chatting in the living room, and the horizontal pattern of the ceiling above them extends outside to the house's overhang. It was a lifestyle statement that made Shulman's career.

It was also a last-minute job for the photographer known as one-shot Shulman because he never used a light meter and seldom had to take more than one shot.

"He may not have considered himself an artist, but his work has been reviewed in all the important art magazines of the day," said Krull, who has represented Shulman for 20 years.

An exhibit of Shulman's latest work has been on display at Krull's gallery in Santa Monica since July 4 and will continue through Aug. 8.

UNITED NATIONS Powers impose new sanctions on N. Korea

The U.N. imposed new sanctions Thursday against five North Korean officials, four companies and a state agency, and banned imports of two weapons-making materials, in a rare unified push by the world's powers to thwart Pyongyang's nuclear ambitions.

The sanctions, which take immediate effect and are to be carried out by all of the U.N.'s 192 member nations, include travel bans and a freeze on the financial assets against the officials, companies and state agency. Nations also were instructed to refrain from supplying North Korea with certain types of graphite and para-aramid fiber — two of the materials used in ballistic missile parts.

"It is of course significant that we have also put individuals on the list, as this is the first time. This shows that the sanctions are going on a higher level at this moment," said Fazli Corman, Turkey's deputy U.N. ambassador, who chairs the panel.

HONDURAS Aide: Ousted leader en route to Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA — A top

aide said exiled Honduran President Manuel Zelaya was heading home Thursday to set up an alternative seat of government inside the country, and will use it as his headquarters in a "final battle" against the coup leaders.

Zelaya's foreign minister, Patricia Rodas, said he is "on his way" back, but refused to say how or when he planned to enter Honduras. Zelaya's current whereabouts are

unclear and the leaders who replaced him after the military sent him into exile have vowed to arrest him if he returns.

"Our president will be in Honduras at some point and

some moment. He is already on his way," Rodas told reporters in La Paz, Bolivia, where she joined a meeting of leftist presidents.

PAKISTAN U.N. worker killed in kidnap attempt

PESHAWAR — A senior Pakistani staff member of the United Nations refugee agency was shot and killed Thursday morning in an apparent kidnapping attempt while leaving a refugee camp near this northwestern city, according to U.N. officials.

Zill-e-Uzman, 59, was one of three people in a marked United Nations vehicle on their way out of the Katcha Ghari refugee camp at about 11:30 a.m. when another vehicle intercepted their path and gunmen opened fire, said Stephanie Bunker, a spokeswoman for the U.N. refugee agency.

Uzman was shot several times in the chest and died. A second U.N. official, repatriation clerk Ishfaq Ahmed, was shot in the leg and was expected to survive. The driver of the vehicle is believed to have escaped unharmed, Bunker said.

A guard with the Commissionerate of Afghan Refugees was also killed and another guard was injured in the shootout, according to a U.N. statement.

Metamorphosis, he changes places with his assistant, Beth Bishop, who is locked inside a box. Don't blink — you might miss it.


"A lot of people refer to it as the fastest illusion in the world," Byers said.



Intrigue at the auction

Thriller uses Sun Valley wine setting

Kristine Bretall is always looking for a way to get out the word about Sun Valley's vaunted wine auction.

But Sun Valley Center for the Arts' marketing director never could have imagined the type of publicity she's getting this summer as Ridley Pearson's latest thriller hits the bookstores.

Sun Valley is again the setting for murder and

mayhem in the third of Pearson's "Killer" series. And this time the Sun Valley Center for the Arts' Wine Auction is the target.

Or is it?

Readers will be kept guessing as they come across more twists and turns in Pearson's new "Killer Summer" than on the Bald Mountain trail up Baldy.

"I have a love of heist movies like 'Ocean's Eleven.' But I've never written a heist novel," said Pearson, who has lived full or part time in the Wood River Valley since 1980.

"I thought it would be a great challenge. And it was, keeping the reader turning and twisting every 20 pages. Just when you think you know what's going on,

you learn: That's not what's really going on. This is what's really going on."

Pearson has more than 10 million books in print, including a series based around fictional Seattle detective Lou Boldt.

"Killer Summer" is the third in a series of suspense novels based in Sun Valley. Its hero is Sheriff Walt Fleming, whom Pearson patterned after the real Blaine County Sheriff Walt Femling.

In "Killer Weekend," Fleming had to deal with a suspected assassin in the midst of a conference patterned after Sun Valley's annual Allen and Co. con-fab. He tracked the bad guys across mountains and through avalanches to stop the poisoning of the environment in last summer's "Killer View."

This year's book has the mild-mannered sheriff guarding three bottles of wine owned by Thomas Jefferson and given to John Adams.

Pearson said he got the idea for the book from a *Wall Street Journal* article that told of a man who bought a couple of bottles

He and humor columnist Dave Barry will be at the Hailey Public Library at 6 p.m. Aug. 4 to promote their new "Peter and the Starcatchers: Sword of Mercy," which comes out in October. The book series has explored the origins of Peter Pan and how he learned to fly. Pearson also has a new book for junior rangers called "Steel Trapp: The Program" due out in early 2010. And a third Kingdom Keepers book, "Kingdom Keepers: Disney," out in April. And, yes, you can expect more murder and mayhem in Sun Valley next summer as even Sheriff Walt gets tied up in "Killer Silence."



from Jefferson's wine collection. A few months later, the man began to doubt their authenticity and spent more than a million dollars of his own to prove they were fake.

"With one of the top wine auctions in the country here in Sun Valley, I thought, 'Here's my story,'" said Pearson, who included a few locals in his book as well.

The real-life Femling assisted Pearson in masterminding some of the twists and turns. And, yes, it's true he's an expert tracker.

In fact, Femling attended the first certified tracking school for SWAT teams in the country. Such skills came in handy, he said, when trying to determine whether teen Sarah Johnson was telling the truth about an intruder leaving her Bellevue residence following the murder of her parents.

But, in contrast to Pearson's books, Femling is happily married and close to his father, Jerry, a retired FBI agent who handled some high-profile cases.

"Doing the book with (Pearson) was a lot of fun. He has a quick mind — he'd have been a good detective," said Femling. "I'm just glad we don't have to deal with the types of cases that Ridley dreams up in real life."

Sun Valley is the perfect setting for a thriller because it offers such contrasts of personal wealth, lifestyles and moral values, Pearson said. "It's a rich tapestry of billionaires, movie stars, ski bums, dirt farmers and the occasional crazy clown — fertile ground for all kinds of dramatic conflict."

The setting also has apparently been good for business, as the Sun Valley series has outsold his other books. Both previous Sun Valley books have also land-

ed on *New York Times* best-selling lists.

"There's a mystique about Sun Valley, and Allen and Co. gets a lot of press," he said. "People know people like Bruce Willis and Arnold Schwarzenegger and Tom Hanks live here, and so

everyone's curious about it."

Bretall can't wait to read the book. But she'll probably have to put it on hold until next week's Wine Auction is over.

"We're not expecting anything as dramatic at this year's Wine Auction as

what's in the book," she said. "People raising paddles (to bid on auction items) will be as dramatic as it gets."

Wine Auction organizers report hearty sales, donations

Jesus turned water into wine. Now, 2,000 years later, the Sun Valley Center for the Arts is performing its own wonders with wine.

For 28 years, the arts center has been turning wine into scholarships and free programs that attract up to 30,000 people each year.

It raised more than a million dollars last year with its auction, vintner dinners, wine picnic and wine tasting. And it hopes to do the same again this year, July 23-25, with three days of events that have consistently earned it recognition as one of the Top Ten U.S. Charity Auctions from "Wine Spectator."

"People mark these dates on their calendars months in advance to be sure they don't double-book themselves," said Wine Auction director Christi Holzl. "It's a big motivator to know you will have a great time while raising money for a good cause."

Organizers were holding their breath since they began organizing this year's event just as the economy imploded.

But they've been pleasantly surprised as the dinners are almost sold out and tickets are going well for the picnic, said Kristine Bretall, The Center's marketing director.

And auction donors are offering some wonderful packages, including a trip to Greece for eight, said Jennifer Roberts, chairing the event with her husband, Peter.

"People said, 'What bad luck doing this in the worst economic times! But people could not have been more generous,'" she said. "A committee of us went on a trip to Napa, and the wine growers sat down with us and brainstormed about how they could get the best auction packages possible, even though they get hit up for donations by telephone, fax, e-mail several times a day. I came away so proud of my fellow man."

This year's event will feature a couple of new venues July 24-25, with Friday evening's Gala Dinner being set at Dollar Mountain and Saturday night's picnic on the grounds of the former Warm Springs Golf Course.

And there will be a couple of new features, as well — most notably, a gala dinner prepared by celebrity chef Rick Moonen, who will appear on Top Chef Masters a week before the Sun Valley Wine Auction, and The Center's first Riedel Wine Symposium.

Featuring guest chefs at the Gala Dinner is a new idea spearheaded by Peter and Jennifer Roberts. "Fine wine and fine food are a natural pairing, so it makes sense to evolve the Wine Auction in this direction," Jennifer Roberts said.

This year's event kicks off Thursday, with Dinner with the Vintners at 12 lavish Sun Valley residences. The

under the big tent at Dollar Mountain Lodge on the afternoon of July 25. Tasters may sample hundreds of wines from more than 125 vintners in a souvenir Riedel glass, which they can take home.

The weekend will wrap up that evening with a Wine Picnic and Concert at Warm Springs Ranch Resort. Duane Runswick of Feast Catering will prepare an upscale gourmet picnic while picnickers savor an assortment of wines and tap their toes to the Americana-influenced music of Ryebender.

Sun Valley Center will

provide transportation from town via a free champagne shuttle.







Explore a world of dance as festival returns to Mini-Cassia


BURLEY — Several hundred dancers speaking the universal language of music will make a stop in Burley again this year during the Idaho International Dance and Music Festival.

Festival spokeswoman Kristine Handy said this is the Rexburg-based festival's 24th anniversary and the sixth year it has performed in Burley and Rupert. The festival is one of only four held annually in the U.S. and features a colorful parade, free youth culture workshops and performances at the King Fine Arts Center.

Also stopping in Idaho Falls and Blackfoot, this year the festival will feature teams from nine countries — Germany, Japan, Lithuania, Mexico, Romania, Russia/Cossacks, South Korea, Taiwan and the U.S. — with anywhere from 250 to 350 dance team members.

"It will give the teams a chance to experience that part of American culture and should be really fun for them," Handy said.



From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 30 the dance festival will host a Youth Culture Day in Burley, Handy said, which allows children to meet the performers and learn more about the different cultures.

The dancers, too, "get to know what people are really like rather than just what is on the news, and it builds bridges among the countries," she said.

Handy said host families are found each year for the dancers while they stay in the area, which allows Mini-Cassia families to experience the teams' cultures in a personal way.

"They really get to find

out what the differences and similarities are," said Handy, whose family has hosted dancers each year.

Handy said organizers try to place two dancers in each home and try to put team members into the same neighborhoods so they are not far apart from one another.

"Our neighborhood is hosting the Romanians," Handy said. "One year we had Israeli kids and they were so much fun; they sang all night long."

Feast with the Basques in Gooding on Sunday

GOODING — The smell of chorizos and paella will fill the air Sunday in Gooding, as the Gooding Basque Association hosts its 28th annual Basque Picnic.

The picnic gets Basques together and supports the Gooding Basque Association.

“The picnic is an opportunity to raise money for the Basque people and a chance to bring everyone together from around different places,” said Victor Otazua of Twin Falls, who has volunteered to help cook for the picnic for 25 years. “We got people coming from Nevada, California, and everywhere else, because it’s important to keep the Basque tradition going. It’s our chance to visit with friends we don’t see every year, and reconnect with where we came from.”

People from Boise, Mountain Home and Twin Falls will be in the crowd, too — and with such an extensive agenda, it’s no wonder.

is a chief component of the connection to Basque roots. After the 11 a.m. Catholic mass Sunday, a traditional lunch will follow: salad, red beans, lamb chops and paella (traditional rice). Later in the day, however, is the real treat as chorizos — tasty Basque sausages — are served.

You can hear Euskara at this picnic, and watch Basque dancing and games. Dancing is one of their oldest traditions, common at weddings, birthdays or summer festivals. Performing this year are the Boise Oinkari Basque Dancers, the Gooding Txiki Oina and the Mountain Home Basque Dancers.

Soka Tira (tug-of-war), Txinga (weight carrying) and Arri Altxetea (weight lifting) are some of the games to be played. However, drinking is as much a contest to the Basques as it is a luxury. The Bota contest will test who can drink the longest from a Bota Bag. Children will also have games and races. Prizes are awarded. Following is an auction for shepherders bread, baskets with cheese and wine,

and lambs.

“It’s important for the Basques to maintain an appreciation for their history and culture,” said Phil Sarasqueta, president of the Gooding Basque Association, who added that 600 to 800 people typically attend the picnic. “Besides being fun, Basque dancing, gaming and food keep the Basque community connected and is a rich aspect of Idaho history for Basques and non-Basques alike.”

Sarasqueta said much of the money from the annual fundraiser goes to the Basque Cultural Center in Gooding and to two \$500 scholarships granted by the association; recipients this year are Kayla Urrutia of Twin Falls and Ariel Burk of Bliss. The event also helps fund the Gooding Txiki Ona Basque Dancers.

Ponder black holes at Herrett Center

Is it possible that scientists could accidentally create a catastrophic black hole at the cavernous Large Hadron Collider beneath Meyrin, Switzerland?

The Internet has no shortage of made-for-Hollywood theories. The Hadron even had an antimatter story line in the newest Tom Hanks film, “Angels and Demons.”

Chris Anderson, Centennial Observatory coordinator and production specialist for the Faulkner Planetarium, will discuss these and other topics at his Astronomy Talk starting at 8:30 p.m. July 24.

The goal of the Hadron, Anderson explains, is to produce the remaining subatomic particle that has not been seen yet — the Higgs boson. Some theories on the behavior of gravity on subatomic scales predict that the

collider may actually be capable of creating a microscopic black hole, which has caused concern among non-scientists. In fact, it even prompted a lawsuit to halt the experiment in order to prevent a global calamity.

Anderson said he’ll provide the facts about black holes, the small likelihood that man can create them, and what would be the outcome if we do.

The Astronomy Talk will be held in the Rick Allen Community Room of the Herrett Center for Arts and Science. Admission is \$2.50 per person and \$1.50 for students; children under 6 are admitted free. After the talk, at about 9:30, all participants may go upstairs to the Centennial Observatory for free sky viewing through the Herrett Telescope.

Jimenez passes Watson for British Open lead

TURNBERRY, Scotland — On the eve of the British Open, Tom Watson got a modern-day text message from Jack Nicklaus' wife. Then it was time to turn back the clock at Turnberry.

Thirty-two years after his epic "Duel in the Sun" with the Golden Bear, Watson took advantage of pristine conditions on the very same course to shoot a stunning 5-under 65 on Thursday. He held the lead until Spain's Miguel Angel Jimenez stole it away late in the day with a 64, only one

shot off the record for lowest score in any major championship.

Still, it was Watson, the 59-year-old, five-time Open champion, who maintained the lead role — if only for a day.

"What a legend," Jimenez said.

Watson had been practicing well all week, and got an extra boost a day earlier when Barbara Nicklaus sent a text wishing him good luck.

"I texted her back and said,

"You know, we really miss you over here?" Watson said. "And I really meant it. It's not the same without Jack playing in the tournament."

Nicklaus played his final British Open at St. Andrews in 2005 and faded into retirement. But the guy who beat him at Turnberry in '77 — with a 65 on the final day, no less — still has a few shots left.

Watson kept the ball in the fairway, rolled in five birdies and bailed himself out the few times he got into trouble, including a testy 6-footer at the final hole to preserve a bogey-free round.

T.F. teen qualifies for junior Olympics

Slip inside the mind of Bobby Rios when his feet are poised in the starting blocks, and you'll find a plethora of thoughts swirling about. But all of those have one common goal: getting to the finish line faster than everyone lined up beside him.

But while Rios is focused solely on technique and mechanics, those watching him run, such as O'Leary Junior High coach Mike Wilkinson, have another thought on their minds: "Kid's fast as crap."

Rios, a freshman-to-be at Twin Falls High School, will take his high speed sprinting skills to Greensboro, N.C., later this month to compete in the USATF National Junior Olympics. He earned that right with impressive showings at qualifying events in Boise and Nampa last month.

Rios finished first in both the 100- and 200-meter runs in the intermediate division at the USATF Snake River Association Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships held June 18-20 in Boise. He clocked a time of 12.08 seconds in the 100 and covered the 200 in 24.96 seconds. He bettered those efforts at the USATF Region 11 Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships held June 25-27 in Nampa, his times of 11.8 and 24.75 good for second place in both events.

Obvious credit goes to Rios for his work ethic in making the July 27-Aug. 2 national meet.

"He doesn't need to be pushed, he does it himself — it's his internal drive," said Wilkinson.

But there are others, including Rios' parents, who have been integral to his success. His father, Robert Rios, has served as his trainer this summer.

"He's goes with (Bobby) everywhere and does everything with

him," said Heather Rios-Voyles of Robert's work with Bobby.

5-time British Open champ turns it on at Turnberry

TURNBERRY, Scotland — These kind of things usually don't end well, no matter how much we might want them to. Golf is a tough enough game for even the youngsters playing in this British Open, and 59-year-olds have no business getting in the way — no matter what their pedigree might be.

But then Tom Watson starts talking about feeling something spiritual out on the links, and you start wondering. He calls the golf course "she," like Turnberry is an eccentric old aunt, and says he feels a serenity when he is with her.

On Thursday, he went out underneath a retro argyle sweater with a 16-year-old as one of his playing partners and shot a 5-under 65 that was as remarkable as it was improbable. It matched the score he posted in the final round on the same course in 1977 to beat Jack Nicklaus by a shot and win the claret jug trophy in what would live in golf lore as the "Duel in the Sun."

The ease with which it came made a lot of his fans — and there are many in Britain, where his success has been great — want to believe. But he's at an age where the supreme confidence of one day can mysteriously disappear by the next.

The day before, he had teased reporters by telling them what a great story it would be if he might somehow win, then laughed at the silliness of it all. He didn't mention anything about the text messages wishing him good luck from a woman named Barbara, who just happens to be married to the man he beat 32 years ago.

He doesn't have many other secrets, because Watson has always been an open book, at least when it comes to golf. He's played on the public stage in four different decades now, and his five British Open wins, second only to Harry Vardon, would testify to a brilliant career even if he had never done anything else.


But win a sixth just nine months after undergoing hip surgery? Against a field that includes Tiger Woods and a host of 20-somethings who hit the ball long and far?

Not likely. Not at an age when nerves fray quicker and muscles ache longer.

Golf may be the one sport that can be played competitively at a comparatively old age, but that age comes with a burden. The oldest player to win one of the four major championships was Julius Boros, who won the 1968 PGA Championship at 48, and the oldest to win the British was Old Tom Morris himself at 46 — and that was 142 years ago.

So how about it, Old Tom Watson? What if it somehow, some way, it came true?

"It would be amazing," Watson said. "You can put all kinds of superlative adjectives and all sorts of

things to it. It would be amazing."

Indeed, the whole thing is way too crazy, something Watson seems to know but won't just come out and say. Not when the competitive juices are flowing and the game that can sometimes be so humiliating is fun again, at least for a day.

He's been in a similar position before, and it didn't end well. That was the 2003 U.S. Open outside Chicago where the then-53-year-old opened with a 65 before fading and ending up in a tie for 28th.

On his bag for that tournament was longtime friend and caddie Bruce Edwards, who had been diagnosed earlier that year with Lou Gehrig's disease. The cheers that day as they walked up the 18th hole were for both men: a golfer who was playing beyond his years and his dying caddie, who was struggling just to walk.

"If I shoot 90 tomorrow, I don't care," Watson said after that round.

Thursday's round at Turnberry didn't carry that kind of emotion, and Watson isn't a lot for sentimental reflection. But he can recite every shot he hit in his famous showdown with Nicklaus, and every hole at Turnberry brings back some different memory.

He beat Nicklaus in 1977 and won the 2003 Senior British Open with a final round 64. And there was the near miss in 1994, when he and Nicklaus had some dinner and a few bottles of wine after the final round, then sneaked on to play the adjoining par-3 course in the dark. A security guard came to shoo them away, only to find the greatest player ever and a five-time British Open champion engaged in a bit of fun.

Golf hasn't been as much fun lately, and Watson knows time is running out, so that makes the round that left him just a stroke behind Miguel Angel Jimenez so special. British Open champions once had a lifetime pass to the tournament, but the age limit is now 60, meaning next year's tournament at St. Andrews will be his last.

He seems resigned to that and says he doesn't want to play when he has no chance to win. But he feels he still has a few rounds left in him, and believes there is something magical here that he can't quite explain.

"I feel inspired playing here," Watson said. "It doesn't feel a whole lot out of the ordinary from 32 years ago except that I don't have the confidence in my putting as I had 32 years ago. But, again, a few of them might go in."

They just might, assuming the cosmic gods of golf want it that way.

This is, after all, a love affair between a man and a course.

Lee (5-9) hadn't won since a three-hit shutout against St. Louis on June 14, a game in which he took a no-hitter into the eighth inning.

The reigning AL Cy Young Award winner had lost three straight starts. The Indians scored three runs or less in 11 of his 20 starts.

Grady Sizemore, batting leadoff for the first time since May 16, had two hits and drove in a run for Cleveland.


Garrett Olson (3-3) allowed three runs in 2 2-3 innings in his first start since July 4 for the Mariners, who made four errors.

Tour stage.

"It's a big thing for me to perform at this level at this age," he said. "I started bike racing when I was 19 and I always hoped that I could maybe go on for many years, and I think it shows today that it is possible."

Armstrong, the seven-time champion, rejoined the main pack after his mishap during the 131-mile ride from Tonnerre to Vittel. He pulled over to the side of the road while his team repaired a

punctured back wheel. After a few moments, four teammates helped him catch up.

Teammate Levi Leipheimer, who is fourth overall, fell off his bike nearly two miles from the finish in a crash involving two-time Tour runner-up Cadel Evans. Leipheimer had cuts and bruises on his right wrist, shoulder and back. He hopes to ride Friday.

"My wrist hurts, but surprisingly it's OK. It could have been a lot worse," Leipheimer said. "I was a bit

surprised by a left corner. ... My tire was sliding and I couldn't quite save my bike from sliding out."

Armstrong is taking a cautious approach until the three-week race reaches the Alps on Sunday. He said the flat stages were nerve-racking.

"It is stressful with the crashes, on a stage like this where you have nothing to gain and then you lose everything because of a crash or a split in the group," the 37-year-old Texan said before the start. "You have to

Dad is also the source of the genes that make Bobby a natural sprinter. Said Robert: "I was pretty quick when I was young, but he's definitely a lot faster at his age than I was."

Mostly, Robert passes along ideas on starting stances, transitions and way to finish stronger at the end of each race.

"It's fun, and he pushes me really hard," said Bobby. "We just come out here for a half hour or an hour a day and get to work out on certain things that I need to touch up on a little."

As a result, Bobby said he's improved "a lot" in recent weeks.

He also has his biggest fan — Mom — cheering him on.

"She screams more than anyone else," said Bobby. "She overpowers everyone else with her screaming."

That'll come in handy in North Carolina, where he'll face "extreme competition," according to Wilkinson. Rios will have to finish well in the preliminaries just to make the finals.

"But he's motivated, and he's training hard, and I think he'll do OK," the O'Leary coach added.

Bobby will be joined on the trip by his mother, father, young sister and grandfather. But he'll see another familiar face at North Carolina A&T's Irwin Belk Track. Ryan Carlson, a teammate with Rios on O'Leary's eighth-grade team this past spring, qualified for nationals in the high jump with a first-place effort of 5 feet, 10.75 inches at the region meet in Nampa.

"We're very good friends," Rios said.

And both very good at

their events.

Carlson recorded the nation's best high jump of the 2008-09 season among junior-high athletes with a mark of 6-1 on May 5.

"Ryan's 6-1 jump was an extraordinary jump, but I think he's jumping that pretty regularly now," said Wilkinson. "If he can do that in his age group, he'll have a good chance."

Rios, whose personal bests are 11.5 and 24.2 seconds, respectively, said he hopes to earn a top-10 finish in Greensboro, adding another highlight to a busy summer. On top of his training at the track, he's at the TFHS gym each day getting ready for the Bruins' football season. There have also been two trips to Disneyland and an upcoming whitewater rafting trip.

But not all of life is a

sprint for Rios. At home, he can be found hanging out with friends, jumping on the trampoline or teasing his parents with his sarcastic sense of humor.

But put him in the starting blocks, and it's all business.

"I think to myself what I'm going to do during the race, like my transitions of staying down low for the first 30 meters," said Rios. "I just let the wind take me to a straight-up running position. And I think to myself: swing my arms and keep my legs straight as far as I can. And when I get tired: pump my arms more."

All that's left is the sounds of the race and the approaching finish line.

"I hear breathing, everyone grunting and 'Go Bobby,'" said Rios.

Thank Mom for that last one.

Holtz leads class being enshrined in Hall of Fame



SOUTH BEND, Ind. — He is the only man to lead six universities to bowl games. Still, Lou Holtz never considered coaching his primary calling. He had a lot more to teach than X's and O's.

"I coached life. The same thing that would enable you to be a good player would enable you to be a good student, a good father, a good business person, et cetera," he said.

Holtz, who led Notre Dame to its last national championship in 1988 and also coached William & Mary, North Carolina State, Arkansas, Minnesota and South Carolina during his 33-season career, will be enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame on Saturday. He will be joined by fellow coaches John Cooper, the only coach to win a Rose Bowl with bot a Pac-10 school (Arizona State) and Big Ten school (Ohio State), Jim Donnan, who coached at Marshall and Georgia, and former Missouri Valley coach Volney Ashford.

Former UCLA quarterback Troy Aikman, 1959 Heisman Trophy winner Billy Cannon of LSU and former Oklahoma State tailback Thurman Thomas head

the class of 17 players being enshrined during two days of festivities Friday and Saturday.

Despite all the star power, Holtz will be the main attraction as he returns to the city where he enjoyed his biggest successes, bringing Notre Dame back to power after five lean seasons under Gerry Faust.

Who would have thought that the frail-looking kid who graduated 234th out of

a class of 278 at East Liverpool High School in Ohio would have become a standout coach and master motivator? Certainly not his high school guidance counselor, who once told Holtz: "A lot of people don't know what's going on, but you don't even suspect anything's going on."

Holtz proved her wrong. There always seems to be something going on when the wisecracking, bespecta-

pled man with lisp is around. He led every team he coached to a bowl game by his second year on campus and led the Fighting Irish to a national championship in his third season en route to a 100-30-2 record in 11 seasons at Notre Dame. That gives him the second most wins in Irish history, just behind Knute Rockne's record of 105-12-5.

Holtz ranks eighth all-time in number of victories by Football Bowl Subdivision coaches, 11 ahead of Ohio State's Woody Hayes, a mentor. Holtz was the defensive backs coach for the Buckeyes when they won the national title in 1968.

What he learned from Hayes was not to worry about being popular with his players.

"Your obligation is to make them the best you possibly can and to have high standards, not lower the standards, and to believe in people," Holtz said.

Former Notre Dame split end Derrick Mayes said the key to Holtz's success was his ability to inspire.

"Let's face it, it wasn't the X's and O's," Mayes said. "There were many times he'd throw the playbook out the window and say, 'We're going to hit them in the mouth, knock them in the dirt.'"

Player infidelity

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The shocking death of former NFL quarterback Steve McNair and infidelity among sports stars is the main topic of discussion among families of professional athletes.

"They can't take their mind off it," said Tisha DeShields, ex-wife of former major leaguer Delino DeShields.

McNair had been married 12 years before he was shot to death on July 4 at his condo by 20-year-old Sahel Kazemi, who then turned the gun on herself. Police said Kazemi was struggling financially and suspected McNair might be involved with another lover.

DeShields, a 38-year-old Atlanta businesswoman who divorced her husband after discovering his seven-year affair, remains friends with a number of male pro athletes and their wives. She said that McNair's death is what they've been discussing.

"If this was a banker down the street, then it would just be the banker down the street," she said. "But this was one of their own, their colleague, someone they respected."

up is will any of the athletes learn from the tragedy.

Dr. Sherry Blake called McNair's death "a wake up call" for players, but she expects most eventually will forget about the murder-suicide and return to their old habits.

"Many players have had extra affairs for years," said Blake, a clinical psychologist who practices in the Atlanta area and has counseled athletes and entertainers about the temptations of drugs, alcohol and women.

Some affairs involving marquee players have played out in public.

In 2003, NBA star Kobe Bryant — then 24 — admitted to adultery when accused of sexually assaulting a 19-year-old woman who worked at the exclusive Colorado spa where Bryant was staying for knee surgery. That case later was dismissed. Last year, Cynthia Rodriguez divorced Yankees star Alex

Rodriguez after allegations of repeated infidelity.

One way to possibly get athletes to heed the warnings of experts is for the advice to come from their peers.

Chris Sanders, who played with McNair, says he should have been more involved in the personal life of his one-time teammate.

"I beat myself up ever since it happened," the former Tennessee Titans wide receiver said. "Maybe it was something I could have said, or maybe it was something I could have did, instead of just talking about football. Maybe the situation would have been different."

Sanders said most of pro leagues have "player development programs," designed to help with certain personal aspects of their lives, such as finances. But he said the programs don't deal enough with relationships or marriage. The NFL discusses the

potential risks in personal relationships at its annual rookie symposium each June. Each club can access the Life Skills options that include programs for managing relationships and violence against women.

"Relationship management is a critical part of what we do in Player Development," NFL spokesman Greg Aiello wrote in an e-mail.

The 36-year-old McNair was an NFL veteran who had retired just 9 months before meeting Kazemi.

Blake said pro athletes — particularly retirees — often seek women to validate "they still got it ... although they may have the perfect setup at home."

In seeking out such women, Steven Ortiz, an associate professor of sociology at Oregon State University, said pro athletes often fall victim to groupies — women who make themselves accessible to the players — and who can be quite persistent.

"It's like a fast-food sex mentality," said Ortiz, who interviewed 47 wives of pro athletes over a four-year period and is currently writing a book based on his findings.

Free agent in '10, or extension now for NBA stars?

LeBron James was more Don King than King James as he faced the cameras to promote the huge event planned for next summer.

"I think July 1, 2010, is a very big day," he said last November. "It's probably going to be one of the biggest days in free-agent history in the NBA."

Unless James and his pals call the whole thing off.

The Cleveland Cavaliers can offer the NBA's MVP a contract extension Saturday, shortly after fellow potential 2010 free agents Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh became eligible to receive theirs on the three-year anniversary of the signing of their last deals.

If all three accepted, it would halt the talk of next year boasting the deepest free-agent class in league history.

Miami presented Wade with his offer immediately. Toronto president Bryan Colangelo intends to offer Bosh the extension but has indicated he will wait until after he has filled out the Raptors' roster for next season.

None are expected to sign — they can re-up for longer and make millions more by waiting a year — but the agent for Bosh and Wade will study them.

"I will just say that I will evaluate everything about any extension offers they



receive," Henry Thomas wrote in an e-mail. "It is simply an option that will be evaluated and considered."

James' agent, Leon Rose, didn't return a request for comment.

James didn't give the impression he was thinking about an extension when he made his prediction last fall. That was back when the 2010 free agency frenzy was at its peak, with James playing in New York only days after the Knicks had boldly positioned themselves for a run at him with a pair of trades that opened up loads of salary cap room.

The enthusiasm has dampened now, though. The economic downturn and the resulting drop in revenues have sent forecasts for the 2010-11 salary cap tumbling, with the NBA warning teams it could come in some \$10 million lower than the \$62-63 million that was previously expected.

The decreasing cap means little personally to James, Wade and Bosh, especially if they re-sign with their teams. What it can do is crush any hopes they might have of playing somewhere together, because a cap in the low \$50-million range would make it difficult to afford two maximum salary players and fill out a professional roster around them.

T'Wolves boss plans trip to discuss Rubio buyout

MINNEAPOLIS — The Minnesota Timberwolves cannot do much financially to help Ricky Rubio with a multimillion-dollar buyout of his contract with DKV Joventut in Spain.

So team president David Kahn will head across the Atlantic next week to meet with the team personally in hopes of lowering the \$6.6 million price tag that has threatened to keep the wunderkind point guard in Europe for at least next season.

Kahn confirmed his plans to travel to Spain in a text message to The Associated Press on Thursday, but declined further comment. It was first reported by YahooSports.com.

Rubio, who was drafted fifth overall by the Timberwolves in June, is still under contract with Joventut for the next two seasons. After helping Spain to a silver medal at the Beijing Olympics and playing in the Spanish ACB since the tender age of 14, the 18-year-old is ready to test his skills in the NBA.

The one thing holding him back appears to be money. Rubio made less than \$100,000 playing for Joventut last season, so it is no surprise that the prospect of being on the hook for millions of dollars before he even plays a game in the United States would give him pause.

Further complicating the matter is a rule in the NBA's collective bargaining agreement that stipulates the Timberwolves can only pay \$500,000 of that large sum to help offset the cost.

From the day Kahn drafted Rubio, to the delight of the Timberwolves fan base, the new president has taken a pragmatic approach to a sticky situation. He said the young and rebuilding team would be willing to wait a year, or even two, if Rubio could not reach an agreeable buyout agreement with Joventut.

Before joining the NBA,

Kahn was an attorney at the law firm Proskauer Rose, the same firm that produced NBA commissioner David Stern. That experience could help him as the Timberwolves try to navigate what he has called "a thorny" legal issue.

"We will be totally supportive of Ricky and his family and (agent Dan) Fegan in any way, shape or form," Kahn said the day after Rubio was drafted. "If there's anything we can do to be of assistance or of help, as long as it is within the rules, we will."

JAZZ TO KEEP F PAUL MILLSAP

SALT LAKE CITY — The Utah Jazz are going to hang on to forward Paul Millsap.

The Jazz posted on their Web site Thursday evening that they plan to match

Portland's offer to Millsap, a restricted free agent. A formal announcement was scheduled for Friday, the last day Utah can match the \$32 million deal that includes \$10.3 million up front.

Millsap averaged 13.5 points and 8.6 rebounds last season, playing mostly as a reserve. He stepped in when starter Carlos Boozer missed 41 games with a knee injury and had a string of 19 straight double-doubles.

UNSIGNED LEE WON'T PLAY IN USA BASKETBALL MINICAMP

NEW YORK — David Lee's unresolved contract situation will keep him on the sideline next week when USA Basketball holds its minicamp in Las Vegas.

Mark Bartelstein, Lee's agent, said Thursday the New York Knicks forward will travel to Las Vegas but won't take part in competition. The Americans are scheduled to practice July 23-24 and play an intrasquad scrimmage on July 25.

Lee was one of 25 young players invited to participate.

Calif. teen youngest to sail solo around world

MARINA DEL REY, Calif. (AP) — A 17-year-old Californian Thursday became the youngest person to sail around the world alone.

Zac Sunderland docked in the coastal community west of Los Angeles, completing a 28,000-mile trip that began last year. His family, friends and hundreds of onlookers cheered as his 36-foot Intrepid boat entered the harbor.

Also on hand was a team from the American Sailing Association, which certified his accomplishment.

The shaggy-haired sailor later gave a whoop of joy before addressing the crowd.

"It's been a crazy 13 months," said Sunderland, hugging his younger siblings.

Sunderland was 16 when he left Marina del Rey on June 14, 2008 — a voyage that included encounters with pirates and wild storms.

His father, shipwright Laurence Sunderland, met him at various stops and helped him repair damage to the boat while Zac surfed.

Sunderland's father was tearful and prayerful when he took the microphone.

"We wouldn't be a family if it wasn't for our lord Jesus Christ," he said, pointing up

to the sky as the crowd yelled "Jesus!"

The younger Sunderland mainly ate freeze-dried and canned foods, with one of his sponsors providing fresh vegetables. His father's company, Sunderland's Yacht Management & Shipwrights, was his main sponsor.

Sunderland said his toughest challenge was the sleep deprivation when his boat broke down and he needed to guide it through the night.

During the leg from Australia to the Coco Islands, he said that pirates followed him and he was forced to call Australian

authorities to scare them off.

"I had this boat following me all over the place and circling," Sunderland said.

He said he was humbled by meeting people around the world who live in poor conditions.


"In other countries, 13 people are living in a dirt hut and when you meet them, they're the most kindest, generous people," Sunderland said.

"There's so much more potential to what young people can do. Go out there and do your own thing," he told the crowd.



THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

In today's deal you can hardly blame North for getting carried away when you admit to a spade suit. And since the club queen on its own might be enough for slam, he can hardly expect you to cooperate intelligently in any slam venture.

Let's look at the prospect for making six spades when West starts with the diamond jack. The simple hope is to find trumps 2-2 and the heart ace outside, but in the real world, West's pre-empt when vulnerable will guarantee possession of the heart ace.

Another chance is to find the Q-J of clubs doubleton. Is there any other way to avoid a club loser? Only if you can somehow find a home for dummy's clubs. And is there any hope of that? The answer, rather surprisingly, is yes, but only if you are careful about it.

Start by winning the diamond, drawing trumps, then cashing the second top diamond and the two top clubs. Assuming the missing club honors do not both fall, you lead dummy's singleton heart and put up an honor from hand. West must win this trick with the heart ace and cannot play a diamond or you ruff in hand and pitch dummy's clubs on this trick and your remaining top heart.

Equally, if West leads a heart, whether a big or a small one, you run the lead around to your hand, then establish a second discard from the heart spots while you still have the spade re-entry to your hand.

ANSWER: Your partner's sequence suggests a very strong hand, which may or may not have heart support. You are best advised to bid two no-trump (after all, you have the next best thing to a club stop) and let partner decide where to go from here. Repeating your hearts would be consistent with a far weaker hand than this.

In 1981, 114 people were killed when a pair of walkways above the lobby of the Kansas City Hyatt Regency Hotel collapsed, one atop the other, during a tea dance.

In 1996, TWA Flight 800, a Paris-bound Boeing 747, exploded and crashed off Long Island, N.Y., shortly after leaving John F. Kennedy International Airport, killing all 230 people aboard.

Ten years ago: A search began for the missing plane that was carrying John F. Kennedy Jr., his wife,

Carolyn, and her sister, Lauren Bessette, on a flight from New Jersey to Massachusetts. (The plane had crashed into the Atlantic Ocean near Martha's Vineyard the night before, killing all three.)

Five years ago: Palestinian Prime Minister Ahmed Qureia submitted his resignation to Yasser Arafat, who rejected it the next day. California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger mockingly used the term "girlie men" during a rally as he claimed Democrats were delaying the state budget by catering to special interests.

One year ago: The FDA lifted its salmonella warning on tomatoes amid signs the record outbreak, while not over, might finally be slowing. President George W. Bush and Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki held a secure video conference during which they agreed to set a "general time horizon" for bringing more U.S. troops home from the Iraq war.


