## T.F. family evacuates apartment for mercury cleanup

Mercury found near a Twin Falls apartment complex apparently came from several thermometers that were intentionally broken by a youth, investigators said Friday.


Meanwhile, a search for further contaminated areas has left a family temporarily displaced from one of the apartments until environmental officials can clean up a spill of the toxic metal.

Cleanup and containment of the two sites could take time, though officials hope to have the apartment cleaned out within a couple of days, said Tom Askew, a hazardous waste science officer with the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality.

The news means investigators from DEQ, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Twin Falls Fire Department and other agencies have finally found some answers to the contamination discovered on Tuesday. Responding to a call, representatives of those and other local, state and federal agencies

## Judge allows Aragon jury to hear testimony from deceased deputy

SHOSHONE — Fifth District Court Judge Richard Bevan ruled Friday to allow a taped testimony from a now deceased deputy sheriff in the trial next month of Robert Aragon.

Aragon, 56, of Jerome, is charged with involuntary manslaughter and injury to a child stemming from the hypothermia death of his daughter, Sage, 11, and hypothermia injury to his son, Bear, 12, last Dec. 25.

Aragon allegedly allowed the two

children to try to walk nearly 10 miles to visit their mother, JoLeta Jenks, on Christmas after his vehicle became stuck in snow on West Magic Road in the northern part of Lincoln County.

Lincoln County Prosecuting Attorney E. Scott Paul originally filed charges of second-degree murder against Aragon and his cousin, Kenneth Quintana. The case against Quintana was dismissed and the second-degree murder charge against Aragon was amended to involuntary manslaughter.

Aragon has pleaded not guilty to

both charges against him. A trial is scheduled to begin Oct. 5 in Shoshone.

Paul had filed the motion on Aug. 28 to allow audio testimony by Lincoln County Chief Deputy Josh Eggleston at Aragon's trial.

Eggleston, 35, died July 18, after a blown tire caused his sheriff's cruiser to roll on Idaho Highway 24.

Paul said Eggleston was the lead investigator in the case and his testimony is necessary.

## Cassia County may lure federal prison

BURLEY — Former Idaho Sen. Larry Craig could be hired by Mini-Cassia county commissioners to lobby the federal government to build a new prison near a geothermal plant outside of Malta.

That possibility was revealed Thursday night to a crowd of about 30 people, mostly Mini-Cassia and Burley officials, at the King Fine Arts Center in Burley. Those in attendance had gathered to hear about the delayed Magic Valley Poultry project, which could bring 1,000 jobs to the area.

Instead, Doug Manning, Burley's economic development director, apologized and said the financial group scheduled to deliver a presentation had "some kind of emergency" and canceled.

Cassia County Commissioner Clay Handy then surprised many in the audience by announcing a proposal for a federal prison near the U.S. Geothermal Services plant south of Malta.

## Attendance dips at Twin Falls County Fair

Attendance at the Twin Falls County Fair was down this year by nearly 3 percent.

The fair had 82,050 people attend, down 2,266 people from the 2008 Twin Falls County Fair, which had an attendance of 84,316.

While attendance was down, crossing the 80,000 mark in attendance is better than Fair Manager John Pitz says he would have guessed several months ago.

"We obviously hope for 90,000 and up, but you don't always see it," Pitz said, adding that the economy played a role.

For the fair, having an attendance of 80,000 puts it in a position to break even, which is expected for this year, Pitz said.

Fair officials are still gathering information on how well all the vendors did. But preliminary results don't show an overall downward trend of fair food lovers avoiding vendors.

Initial numbers show that some vendors were 8 percent to 10 percent down, while others were 2 percent to 20 percent up.

Pitz said that bringing new attractions at the fair, such as a hypnotist and an alligator show, helped the fair's attendance.

While the fair's expected to break even overall, not all fair events were a financial success.

The Magic Valley Stampede rodeo, for example, is estimated to be \$7,000 to \$8,000 in the red. But that can be attributed more toward the costs of beefing up the rodeo with a specialty act and clown show performance rather than diminished gate sales, Pitz said.

He also thanked the fair's supporters.

"The businesses were really great sponsors, especially in the economy," Pitz said.

With sponsors, that helps keep fees down for everyone attending the fair, he said.

Fair attendance elsewhere has gone down too. Ticket sales at the Western Idaho Fair last month were down 2 percent compared to 2008.

## Carey residents blast St. Luke's service

CAREY — The debate over health care took on a decidedly local flavor Thursday night when Carey residents released years of pent-up frustration at representatives of St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center.

Carey residents said that they had been promised urgent care in Hailey at the time St. Luke's built a hospital just south of Ketchum nearly 10 years ago. Then, they said, St. Luke's closed the Carey clinic a year ago after inconsistent service.

"Now we have to drive almost to Ketchum," said Carey City Councilman Craig Adamson, describing a 40-mile drive, which includes two long stretches of 25-mile per hour driving through Bellevue and Hailey. "We can make better time going to Jerome or Twin Falls, where they haven't broken our trust."

The meeting between St. Luke's representatives and Carey residents was organ-

ized by Blaine County Commissioner Larry Schoen at Carey Mayor Rick Baird's suggestion.

Bruce Jensen, chief executive officer of St. Luke's Wood River, told about 30 people gathered at Carey City Hall that he was willing to apologize for any false commitments that were made before he took over.

Jensen said that St. Luke's closed the Carey clinic because it was averaging three patients a week.

Bevan conditionally denied a separate motion by Paul asking the court to permit jurors to view the road where the children walked. He left open the possibility of the prosecution renewing the motion.

Paul said he had originally planned to have Eggleston narrate a video of the route the children took for a jury.

He said he wants the jury to see the scale of what the children experienced Dec. 25.

Defense attorney Patrick McMillen said he was concerned that taking jurors on a round trip in a van would double the length of travel.

"I think there's a chance for a distortion there," he said.

McMillen also said differences in weather and walking conditions between October and December could give jurors an inaccurate representation of what the situation was like.

"What we're going to see

in October is not what it was like in December," he said.

With discussions of the possibility that a large number of people in Lincoln County are familiar with the case and might have opinions on it, the court will summon three pools of 60 jurors.

Paul responded to a question from Bevan about a possible settlement of the case.

"Approximately a month ago, Mr. McMillen proposed a resolution and I proposed a counter resolution and neither of them were acceptable," Paul said.

Rescue workers found the body of Sage Aragon about three miles from where she left her father's car at 2 a.m., Dec. 26. Searchers located her brother alive but hypothermic in a Bureau of Land Management restroom about 11 hours after the children left their father's car.

collected about 2 teaspoons of mercury from a parking lot outside the apartment complex at 359 and 341 Pheasant Road W. They expanded their search on Wednesday, searching nearby lots and the apartments themselves to ensure none of the mercury ended up in other locations.

Twin Falls Fire Battalion Chief Brian Cunningham, who has also served as the site's incident commander, said the mercury in the one apartment apparently came from the larger source in the parking lot, brought in by children and accidentally spilled. Levels of the element in the room exceeded EPA standards, prompting the evacuation, and a contractor will be brought in to bring the site back down to acceptable levels.

"If it's a simple matter of pulling up the carpet, then that's the action they'll

take," Cunningham said, noting that he's also asked how long the process will take.

The South Central Public Health District still plans to analyze data collected during the investigation to develop risk assessments, Askew said, and will stay involved in the apartment clean-up to monitor indoor air quality.

"We don't think it's very severe, but again, sometimes we get surprised with things," he said.

Investigators reached their conclusions after two days of interviews and examinations — of about 40 neighborhood kids, seven admitted to having played with the substance, necessitating searches of some nearby homes as well, Cunningham said. All of the mercury collected so far is now in a sealed salvage drum that will be taken away by the clean-up contractor.

Anticipating that Carey was about to double or triple in size, the hospital had an architect examine the possibility of turning the old high school into a clinic, he added.

But then the clinic lost its provider and, before St. Luke's could find a new one, the economy collapsed.

Come November, however, Carey residents will be afforded medical care just 30 miles away, thanks to a new 30,000-square-foot medical facility opening near the Hailey airport, he said.

The facility, which cost \$11.5 million excluding the land, will feature a family medical clinic, St. Luke's Center for Community Health offices, physical therapy services provided by Idaho Elks Rehabilitation Hospital and physician offices.

Devan Johnson, St. Luke's regional planning director, shared how he'd driven 427

miles that day checking in on St. Luke's clinics in four different communities, including Homedale, Challis and Mountain Home.

Each community approaches its health care differently, paying for the services with a variety of methods including user fees, philanthropic gifts, grants and taxes, he said.

Johnson's description of communities using such things as property taxes to subsidize health care prompted Baird to direct a question at the commissioners.

"When did we stop being part of Blaine County?" he asked. "For us to get the same service the rest of the county gets we have to develop a special taxing district?"

Johnson reiterated that every community needs to decide for itself what kind of health care it wants and how it's going to pay for it. The question is whether Carey wants to work with St.

Luke's to come up with its own model, he said.

"We tried to get you down here for months and you didn't come. We didn't walk away from you. You walked away from us," said Adamson.

The exchange prompted Commissioner Tom Bowman to ask whether Carey citizens wanted to reestablish relations with St. Luke's or whether they wanted to shop for another health care provider.

"I think we've already got a lot of connections (with St. Luke's). I think we do need to move forward," Adamson said, setting up a move to form a task force.

Schoen told Carey residents that when he became commissioner two years ago constituents immediately began asking him where the urgent care was in Hailey that they'd been promised.

"It's taken time but now we have an \$11 million investment ready to open," he said.

## Ringle withdraws from Burley mayor race

BURLEY — Burley Mayor Jon Anderson will face only one challenger Nov. 3, after one candidate pulled out of the mayoral election Friday.

Dave Ringle, a former Burley city councilman, announced to the *Times-News* Friday that he was pulling out of the race for mayor.

"Because of changes in my family's circumstances and situation I've decided to withdraw from the mayoral contest," Ringle said. "I want to thank all of those who encouraged and supported me in this. And I believe I could have run a viable campaign. If I didn't think that, I wouldn't have run."

In May 2005, while Ringle was serving on the City Council, he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving under the influence. Ringle was sentenced to a withheld judgment and 12 months of supervised probation, according to court records.

The charges stemmed from an incident that occurred in February 2005 where Ringle ran over a stop sign, hit a fence and ran into his garage door, according to a Cassia County sheriff's report. The report said the deputies found him asleep in his vehicle with the motor still running. Ringle said he had taken muscle relaxers along with a cold medication, the report said.

In October 2005 a court order changed his supervised probation to unsupervised.

Anderson, a two-term mayor, will run against Robert Terry Greenman.

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# Number of H1N1 cases jumps locally

The South Central Public Health District has confirmed that five area residents have tested positive for novel H1N1 influenza virus infection, according to a press release Friday.

The individuals reside in Gooding, Jerome, and Blaine counties. None of them were hospitalized and all are recovering at home.

Officials from the health district are working with health care providers and family members to implement strategies to reduce the chances of transmitting the virus to other people.

Symptoms of the H1N1

infection are similar to seasonal flu, which is beginning to circulate locally.

Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, body ache, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people have also reported diarrhea and vomiting.

Influenza is thought to spread mainly person-to-person through coughing or sneezing of infected people.

Anyone experiencing these symptoms should consult a health care provider for testing. Only testing can determine whether you have the novel H1N1 infection.

# Cannon trial to stay in Shoshone

## Judge denies motion for change of venue based on media coverage

SHOSHONE — The defense attorney for Michael Cannon, the alleged trigger man in the shooting of Craig Hadden, argued in Lincoln County 5th District Court Friday that his client cannot get a fair trial in Shoshone because of pre-trial news reports.

Defense attorney David Heida had sought to move the trial to Ada County, saying Boise media gave the cases against Cannon, Traci Hadden and Blue Hadden less attention than media in the Magic Valley.

Cannon, 16, Traci Hadden, 34, and Blue Hadden, 15, all of Shoshone, were arrested June 12 for charges related to the April 1 shooting of Craig Hadden. The 61-year-old Shoshone businessman was shot four times in the driveway of his home, leaving him seriously injured.

Cannon is charged as an adult with attempted murder and an enhancement for the use of a deadly weapon in the commission of a felony. An additional related charge of criminal solicitation to commit a crime was dismissed July 15 by motion of the prosecutor.

Judge Richard Bevan conditionally denied the motion for change of venue, though he said he would allow the defense to renew the motion if it appears an impartial jury cannot be empanelled in Lincoln County. He warned that even if a change of venue does become neces-

sary, it's possible that he would simply shift it to Twin Falls County where potential jurors were exposed to the same news coverage.

"I know the Times-News and KMVT are seated there," Bevan said.

"We have a much larger pool of untainted jurors (in Ada County)," Heida said.

In his argument, the defense attorney singled out only one article that appeared in the Times-News on June 18. Heida recited the headline: "Shoshone murder plot: Two boys remain jailed for safety! It was all over the front page," he said.

The article covered a court hearing where Judge Mark Ingram ruled against releasing the boys pending trial, saying it was for their own safety and for that of the community.

Heida mainly pointed to the volume of news stories and broadcasts about the case.

"There are approximately one-half to three-quarters of an inch of documentation from KMVT, and documentation from the Times-News, and documentation from the Lincoln County Chatter blog," Heida said.

Because of Lincoln County's small population it would be difficult to find jurors who do not know of the case, he said.

"The size of the community is a huge factor," Heida said.

Lincoln County Prosecuting Attorney E.

Scott Paul countered by saying that there are about 2,700 potential jurors in Lincoln County and even if there were three separate trials for Cannon and both Haddens, about 900 potential jurors would remain for each trial. Paul called that number sufficient.

The hearing recessed while Deputy Attorney General Chris Topmiller

joined the proceeding via teleconference. He is the prosecutor for the case. Paul appeared for the hearing.

Heida said he wants the case continued until December or January. He said he plans to file several motions after further discovery.

No new trial date was scheduled, though Bevan said January is likely.

# Utah authorities find body of missing man

FILLMORE, Utah (AP) — Authorities have found the body of a man missing since last week in west central Utah.

The Salt Lake Tribune reported on its Web site Friday that the Millard County sheriff's office says deputies found the body of 31-year-old LeRoy Buckley on Thursday. Buckley is from Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

Authorities have said he and 44-year-old Kurt Gregory, of Twin Falls,

hiked to Notch Peak to BASE jump on Sept. 9. Gregory lost sight of Buckley along a ledge near the base of the peak.

Gregory searched but couldn't find Buckley and called police using an emergency beacon when he ran out of water.

Efforts were under way Friday to recover Buckley's body.

BASE jumpers use a quick-release parachute to jump from mountains, cliffs and buildings.

According to the report, the "terrorist attack" involved the group shooting "undercover video that was staged to put a bad image on the company" and then posting it on the Internet.

The manager said the company has had no problems at the Burley plant but wanted the sheriff's office to be aware of the incident because Spencer is a rural community about the same size as Burley.

# First swine flu vaccines might be nasal spray

ATLANTA (AP) — The first doses of swine flu vaccine may all be the nasal spray version, government health officials said Friday.

The government has said a trickle of vaccine will be available in early October, but on Friday they defined the size of that trickle — an estimated 3.4 million doses.

Currently it looks like all of them will be a nasal spray vaccine that is approved only for healthy people ages 2 to 49, said Dr. Jay Butler, an official with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The nasal spray, called FluMist, is not recommended for some of the people most in danger of severe swine flu complications. That includes pregnant women, children younger than 2, and people with asthma and other chronic

respiratory diseases.

However, it's possible that some vaccine shots will become available by the first week of October as well, said Butler, chief of the CDC's swine flu vaccine task force.

Flu shots are made of killed influenza virus, while FluMist is a live but weakened strain. The nasal spray is only approved in the United States, and is made by the Maryland-based MedImmune, an AstraZeneca PLC subsidiary. Four other companies are making flu shots for the U.S.

The initial vaccine doses will go to up to 90,000 sites, including schools and clinics, across the U.S. State health departments will determine which offices and clinics get the shots, and whether health care workers or others get the first doses,

Butler said at a CDC press conference Friday.

The government has ordered 195 million doses and may order more if there's enough demand. Butler said it's good news that the flow of vaccines will start soon.

"When we open the faucet, there won't be a puff of smoke. There will be vaccine," he said.

FluMist was designed with kids in mind, and the company's research suggests it is more effective in youngsters than a shot in the arm against seasonal flu.

Studies in adults have found that shots are more effective. Some researchers think that's because adults have had longer exposure to flu viruses and flu vaccines and their immune systems don't respond as dramatically to the live-virus vaccine.

# First lady says U.S. health care is unacceptable

WASHINGTON (AP) — Michelle Obama, speaking as a wife, mother and daughter — but not as a policymaker like a previous first lady — urged women on Friday to join her husband's fight to overhaul health care.

Her 23-minute speech, embraced by a receptive female audience at the

White House, contributed to the administration's all-out public relations push on health care. President Barack Obama will resume it Sunday with appearances on five morning news shows, followed by a visit Monday to CBS's David Letterman show.

the White House's efforts to expand coverage and block insurers' ability to drop customers who get seriously ill.

But she stopped well short of the deeply involved, hands-on role played by another first lady, Hillary Rodham Clinton, nearly two decades ago.

# Official: Suspect admits al-Qaida association

DENVER (AP) — A man under investigation in a terrorism probe in New York and Denver has indicated he is associated with al-Qaida and played a key role in a planned terror attack, a senior U.S. intelligence official said Friday.

Najibullah Zazi's attorney says he has never met with

al-Qaida operatives and isn't involved in terrorism. Zazi completed a third day of questioning by FBI agents in Denver Friday but was not under arrest. More questioning was expected Saturday.

The intelligence official in Washington told The Associated Press that Zazi

has indicated that he is directly linked with al-Qaida. The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity in order to discuss intelligence matters, said Zazi played a crucial role in an intended terrorist attack but that it was not immediately clear what the targets were.



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

## United Way sells office to help the needy

**CHEERS:** To the United Way of South Central Idaho, for keeping its priorities straight.

After announcing a 20 percent cut in the money distributed to area charities — the agency's donations are down because of the recession — the United Way announced it's moving to a donated workplace and will sell its former office. Revenue from that sale will go into the community fund.

The United Way reported revenue of \$240,939 in 2007. Of \$236,859 in expenses, \$155,416 went to program services, \$21,585 was for fundraising expenses, and \$59,858 was for management and general expenses that include payroll and accounting and legal fees.

Now it's putting its limited resources where the needs are, which is exactly what non-profits should do in hard times.

**JEERS:** Blake Hall's days as a Republican leader — or any kind of public official in Idaho — should be over.

The Bonneville County Republican Central Committee in Hall's hometown of Idaho Falls voted this week to ask for Hall's resignation as national GOP committeeman following a restraining order filed against him by a former girlfriend. We couldn't agree more.

The order prohibits the 56-year-old lawyer from coming within 900 feet of his former girlfriend or her residence. Idaho Falls



Police say they are investigating a complaint filed by her.

In issuing the restraining order, 7th District Judge Penny Stanford said Hall "represents an immediate and present danger of domestic violence" to the woman.

Hall, one of three Idahoans on the Republican National Committee, works for Bonneville County Prosecutor Dane Watkins

as a \$60,000-a-year chief civil deputy. He also has a private law practice that includes lobbying for the cleanup contractor at the Idaho National Laboratory and legal work for the Idaho Counties Risk Management Program and state Catastrophic Health Care Program. Hall bills government agencies about \$600,000 a year.

He and his ex-wife, Laurel, divorced in 2007, after a fifth divorce filing. After one filing in August 1994, Laurel Hall told sheriff's deputies her husband struck her while she was at work in the office of then-Rep. Mike Crapo. She recanted three days later, according to a sheriff's report. No charges were filed. Hall's credibility is shot. He

should be separated from any involvement with public policy.

**CHEERS:** To the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office for becoming the fifth of eight counties in the 5th Judicial District to conduct video court appearances when a jail inmate appears before a judge.

Absent now is a wave of shackled defendants moving in a strictly monitored line through the Courthouse, since the new video arraignment system started earlier this month.

The new technology, which cost \$17,318, should save time and the taxpayers' money. And since fewer criminal defendants leave the jail to go to court, it also enhances public safety.



## Those who hate Obama see him as enemy

**O**n Aug. 16, pastor Steven Anderson of Faithful Word Baptist Church in Tempe, Ariz., told his congregation that he prays for the death of President Obama. In a sermon titled "Why I Hate Barack Obama," Anderson preached: "I'm not going to pray for his good, I'm going to pray he dies and goes to hell."

Anderson is not the only man of the cloth to wish widowhood upon Michelle Obama. In June, the Rev. Wiley Drake of First Southern Baptist Church in Buena Park, Calif., said he was praying for the president's death.

Anderson, however, was explicit in his wish. "I'd like him to die of natural causes. I don't want him to be a martyr; we don't need another holiday. I'd like to see him die, like Ted Kennedy, of brain cancer."

I pray God will not answer their petitions. While I'm at it, I'm going to send up one for the men and women of the Secret Service who endeavor to protect the nation's 44th president and his family.

There's something loose in the land, an ugliness and hatred directed toward Barack Obama, the nation's first African-American president, that takes the breath away. The thread of resentment is woven through conservative commentary, right-wing radio and cable TV

shows, all the way to Capitol Hill.

Look back to Obama's speech to a joint session of Congress last week and South Carolina Republican Joe Wilson's crude "you lie" shout. Witness the boorish behavior in the GOP seats.

They are an inspiration to Obama-haters.

It's not just those calling on God to harm the president who cause worry; consider what comes with the territory.

The day after Anderson's "I Hate Barack Obama" sermon, Chris Broughton, a member of Anderson's congregation, appeared at Obama's speech in Arizona with an AR-15 and a pistol — not to harm the president, Broughton said, but to exercise his constitutional right to have weapons.

Then there are the walking time bombs.

Richard Poplawski of Pittsburgh slept with a gun under his pillow, hated Jews, feared Obama was scheming to take away his guns, and thought Obama got good press because he was black. In April, Poplawski showed he meant business. He

fatally shot three police officers and wounded a fourth when they showed up at his house in response to a 911 call. Then there's George Sodini, who went to a Bridgeville, Pa., health club in August, opened his gym bag, pulled out a weapon and shot and killed three women and wounded nine others. Sodini had planned the shooting for the summer, but delayed because, as he wrote on his Web site, he wanted to "stick around to see the (presidential) election outcome."

Inflamed by sexual rejection and his hatred of black men, Sodini opened fire on those attending a fitness class filled with white women he apparently couldn't have.

OK, now let me have it: "King, you're generalizing, making a big story out of small, isolated examples. People like Anderson, Broughton and Drake, and shooters Poplawski and Sodini, are kooks, representing no one but themselves. Most people who oppose Obama don't want him dead. They wish him and his family no physical harm." I won't argue with that.

What I will say, however, is that a lot of malicious words have been thrown around about Obama since his election: words that inflame and that inspire the kind of

hatred spewed from those two Arizona and California pulpits.

Right-wing ranters don't regard the president as a political opponent. Barack Obama, in their minds, is the enemy. He is, to them, dangerous and harmful to the country.

Do the Andersons and Drakes have a right to say they hate Obama and want him to die? Yes. Did Poplawski and Sodini have a right to trash the "liberal" press and expound their racist views? You bet.

Still, the depth of the hostility is extraordinary.

From a right-wing talk show host who opposed allowing students to see the president's education speech: "Make September 8 Parentally Approved Skip Day. You are your child's moral tutor, not that shady lawyer from Chicago." And from a parent's e-mail to a Florida TV station's Web site: "This is exactly how Hitler rose to power in Germany, by preaching to those most vulnerable members of society."

Smears? Paranoia? It's all sweet music to the ears of Lee Harvey Oswald wannabes.

If the president of the United States ever needed heartfelt prayers, it's now.

# Health-care hysteria hijacks student loans

Let's listen to the sound of the House of Representatives debating student loan reform on Wednesday:

"I don't want a single-payer health care system, and I don't want a single-payer student loan system!"

"We're not talking about health care today, but perhaps we should be!"

"The big gulp of the public option swallowing the private option!"

I think we have a pattern here. Last year, it seemed as though the whole world was a derivative. This year, no matter what the subject, there's a death panel lurking behind every bush.

The student loan bill actually has very little in common with the great hairball that is known as health care reform. For one thing, so far, it seems to be moving through Congress rather nicely.

For another, it's pretty easy to explain. It would simplify the federally guaranteed loan system, save an

estimated \$87 billion over 10 years and use that money to increase aid to low-income students, improve community colleges and raise standards for early childhood education.

Let us stop here and recall how the current system loan system works:

1. Federal government provides private banks with capital.

2. Federal government pays private banks a subsidy to lend that capital to students.

3. Federal government guarantees said loans so the banks don't have any risk.

And now, the proposed reform:

1. The federal government makes the loans.

Wow. You really do wonder why nobody came up

with this idea before.

"We thought about this for a long time," said George Miller, the chairman of the House Committee on Education and Labor. "Before, we never had the horses to do it."

It is a tad depressing to imagine all those committees of yore, sitting there and saying: "Gee, it sure would be nice to improve Pell grants and community colleges. But everybody says we need that money to give to the banks."

The House Republicans have a different proposal. Which, as Rep. John Kline of Minnesota explained, is to leave everything the way it is and "convene a non-partisan commission."

Perhaps there will come a time when the words "convene a nonpartisan commission" do not cause people to topple over in depression and despair. But it may take a while.

Just hours before, Sen. Max Baucus had unveiled the long-awaited product of

those reconciliation maneuvers that allow them to pass a bill with a mere majority of votes, radical as that might seem.

If it all works out, Congress will have come a way toward fixing this problem, at least when it comes to federally financed student loans. There's already a new law that forgives part or all of the debt for graduates who go into careers in public service.

Terms will be easier for low-income debtors. But there's a lot longer way to go. The central problem with financing higher education is that tuition keeps running ahead of the rate of inflation like Secretariat closing in the Belmont. The assumption that kids can just pay the bill with borrowed money has to be one of the reasons schools aren't feeling more pressure to control costs.

"That's a very serious subject of conversation on my committee. We have not come up with a good

answer. We've come up with a lot of gibberish," Miller said.

Two-thirds of college students now borrow to pay for college. They have a sympathetic ear in the White House. Back during the presidential campaign, there was nothing Barack and Michelle Obama talked about with more passion than the burden of student loans. Really, there's nothing like the memory of \$80,000 in debt to put fervor in your delivery.

There was a time when the Obamas doubted they'd ever get out of hock. Then Barack became a world-famous political figure, sales of his memoir skyrocketed and the family was able to pay off all the student loans.

Unfortunately, this is not a financial plan that many other people can replicate.

## Obama's troubling step toward protectionism

In an economic debate measured by staggering multibillion-dollar sums and unemployment figures logging in the hundreds of thousands, the stakes in the rubber tire import dispute with China seem stunningly small.

The government's International Trade Commission reported that a surge of Chinese exports of low-cost tires has cost U.S. workers 5,000 jobs. On the basis of that report, President Obama slapped tariffs, beginning at 35 percent, on Chinese-made tires.

By itself, the issue seems hardly important. But like a pebble in the shoe, the irritation it has caused and the ramifications of the dispute may have greater consequences.

The case against the imports was filed by the United Steelworkers Union, an important political ally of the president and congressional Democrats — especially those Obama is laboring to keep on board for his landmark health care legislation.

Many in business fear that this is just the opening round in what could become a much larger and more dangerous trade war.

For now, the Chinese have threatened only minor retaliation, a cutback in auto and chicken parts from the U.S. But both sides have plenty of other, larger weapons they could deploy.

Obama told a Wall Street audience this week that is not where he is headed. He noted that the Chinese had agreed, as part of the negotiations allowing entry into the World Trade Organization, that the U.S. could clamp down on "surges" of imports, without having to prove unfair trade practices. The surge is real — a tripling of tire imports in a few short years — and Obama said he is simply enforcing the rule the Chinese had accepted.

But as always with trade disputes, the story is more complicated. Most of the Chinese tires that will be penalized are made in four American-owned factories over there. American tire manufacturers have moved to the high end of the market. The likelihood is that if the Chinese imports are blocked, other low-wage foreign countries will replace them.

The larger question is what this decision tells us about Obama's approach to trade. In the campaign, he was deliberately murky, promising to expand exports but at times endorsing plainly protectionist measures. Since the election, we have heard nothing about his demagogic promise to renegotiate the North American Free Trade Agreement. But his administration has not pushed for action on pending trade agreements left over from the George W. Bush years.

Bill Clinton was similarly mushy at the start, but in the end became a strong advo-

cate of expanded world trade. The powerful forces reshaping the international economy will probably push Obama in the same direction. But his party is increasingly skeptical about the benefits of trade, and he is likely to duck and dodge more than he sets a straight course.

The danger is that once you strike the first blow against foreign competitors,

you can't tell what will happen next. Obama has taken that risk, so fingers are crossed.

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


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## Fed plan would police banks' pay for 1st time

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve for the first time would police banks' pay policies to make sure they don't encourage excessive risk taking under a plan the Fed is drafting.

The proposal is the Fed's latest response to criticism that it failed to crack down on lax lending, reckless

gambling and other practices that led to the financial crisis.

The central bank's more activist stance carries a risk, though: It could intensify accusations from lawmakers and other critics that the Fed is overstepping its bounds and should be reined in.

The compensation issue is likely to surface when President Barack Obama meets with his counterparts

from other major industrialized countries in Pittsburgh next week. French President Nicolas Sarkozy is leading a European attempt to rein in banker bonuses at the Group of 20 summit.

G-20 leaders promised at their London meeting in April to pass "tough new principles on pay and compensation." But little progress has yet been made.

Under its proposal, the

Fed would review — and could reject — pay policies that could cause too much risk taking by executives or other employers, according to two people familiar with the plan. The Fed would not actually set compensation, however, those people said.

They spoke on condition of anonymity because the proposal has not been finalized.

Yet the proposal is far

reaching. The Fed would review salaries, bonuses and other compensation for CEOs and other senior management, the people with knowledge of the proposal said.

It also would cover certain employees, such as traders, who can take big risks on behalf of a firm, they said. And it would cover some workers whose compensation could affect their risk-

taking, such as loan officers making mortgages, they added.

The Fed could examine not only the compensation level but also how it's structured, such as when it is awarded, the sources said.

The goal is to make sure banks' pay policies don't encourage top managers or other employees to take

## Big price jump for natural gas this week

NEW YORK — Natural gas prices have mostly moved in one direction this summer, down, and the vast caverns that hold it are close to reaching capacity. Yet since the beginning of the month prices have spiked 44 percent.

A record number of futures contracts were snapped up this week, most likely because buyers didn't see prices for natural gas getting much cheaper.

The jump in price would certainly be a troubling sign for people who use natural gas to heat their homes, save for the fact that, even with a 28 percent run-up this week, prices are still about a third of they were last year.

It's extremely cheap and no one expects that to change anytime soon.

"It's going to be very good winter for natural gas customers," analyst and trader Stephen Schork said.

Natural gas for October delivery added 32 cents Friday to settle at \$3.778 per 1,000 cubic feet on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

All other types of fuel sank. Benchmark crude for October delivery gave up 43 cents to settle at \$72.04 a barrel.

Just as oil prices spiked and then leveled off earlier this year, natural gas prices jumped more than 44 percent after sinking to \$2.40 per 1,000 cubic feet on Sept. 4.

Investors flooded the market and natural gas futures reached a record 404,450 contracts on Tuesday, according to derivatives market CME Group.

The reason consumers and businesses that use a lot of electricity needn't worry is simple. The supply of natural gas is enormous.

American power plants are using a lot less natural gas because the recession has sapped demand for power. Stockpiles are quickly approaching the limit for what can be stored in underground caverns, and producers

### 42 states lose jobs, up from 29 in July

### Idaho reports only minor losses for month

WASHINGTON — Forty-two states lost jobs last month, up from 29 in July, with the biggest net payroll cuts coming in Texas, Michigan, Georgia and Ohio.

The Labor Department also reported Friday that 27 states saw their unemployment rates increase in August, and 14 states and Washington D.C., reported unemployment rates of 10 percent or above.

The report shows jobs remain scarce even as most analysts believe the economy is pulling out of the worst recession since the 1930s. Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said earlier this week that the recovery isn't likely to be rapid enough to reduce unemployment for some time.

The jobless rate nationwide is expected to peak above 10 percent next year, from

its current 9.7 percent.

"You are seeing the pace of job losses slow a little bit," said Mike Lynch, a regional economist at IHS Global Insight. But states "are not out of the woods yet."

From July to August 2009, Idaho's unemployment rate grew one tenth of a percent from 8.8 to 8.9 percent.

The state also saw a year-over-year increase of 3.7 percent, from 5.2 percent in August 2008 to 8.9 percent in August 2009. That's a loss of 34,400 jobs, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The United States lost 216,000 jobs in August, the department said earlier this month, down from 276,000 in July. Employers have eliminated 6.9 million jobs since the recession began in December 2007.

## Don't change that channel:

### DTV woes still abound

NEW YORK — Think the digital TV transition is over? Not quite.

Many viewers have found that they can't pick up certain stations after the switch, even with the right TVs or converter boxes. The

stations are still trying to figure out ways to help them tune in.

The main problem is that when the last major stations turned off their analog TV on June 12 to broadcast entirely in digital, some of them moved their digital signals from the UHF frequency band (channels 14 to 69) to VHF (channels 2 to 13). To most viewers, these channels are just different numbers on the remote. But as signals in the airwaves, they have very different characteristics.

VHF hadn't been used much for digital signals, and there were indications that there would be problems with the switch, partly because viewers had inadequate indoor antennas. Still, the switch went ahead.

Since then, at least 20 VHF stations have asked the Federal Communications Commission to move their digital signals back to UHF, and more would like to do so. However, the government has sold off some of the UHF



# AP sources: Intel report drove new missile plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Robert Gates said Friday that the new missile defense system planned for Europe has the flexibility to adapt to changes in Iranian missile capabilities even if U.S. intelligence about Tehran's slower-than-expected pace turns out to be wrong.

President Obama's decision to scrap a Bush-era missile intercept system in Europe was based largely on a new U.S. intelligence assessment that Iran's effort to build a nuclear-capable long-range missile would take three years to five years longer than originally thought, officials said earlier.

Gates, a former CIA director, said that even if Iran moves more quickly on its long-range missile program, the revised program will have the flexibility to deal more quickly and effectively with the change.

"We actually are better able to deal with a changed

situation — in which the intelligence assessments are wrong — with the new architecture than we were with the old one," Gates told reporters.

The new assessment asserts Iran is unlikely to have a nuclear-capable intercontinental ballistic missile until 2015 to 2020, a U.S. government official familiar with the report told The Associated Press. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because the report remains classified.

It is the second time in two years U.S. intelligence has revised downward the threat posed by Iran's weapons programs.

Obama on Thursday abruptly canceled a long-planned missile shield for Eastern Europe, replacing the Bush-era project that was strongly opposed by Russia with a plan the president contended would better defend against a growing threat of Iranian missiles.

The United States no longer will seek to erect a missile base and radar site in Poland and the Czech Republic, virtually on Russia's doorstep. President George W. Bush contended that the missile base was needed to shoot down any Iranian missile if it ever developed one with adequate range to threaten the United States or Europe. The U.S. already has a similar missile site and radar in Alaska.

Previous intelligence assessed that Iran would have an ICBM capable of menacing Europe and the United States sometime between 2012 and 2015, another U.S. government official said.

The assessment changed because Iran has not been conducting the kind of observable development and testing that would be expected to accompany a robust long-range missile program, the second official said.

## NATO chief proposes linked defense

BRUSSELS (AP) — The head of NATO called Friday for the U.S., Russia and NATO to link their missile defense systems against potential new nuclear threats from Asia and the Middle East, saying that the old foes must forget their lingering Cold War animosity.

Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen appealed for unity a day after the U.S. shelved a Bush-era plan for an Eastern European missile defense shield that has been a major irritant in relations with Russia.

"We should explore the potential for linking the U.S., NATO and Russia missile defense systems at an appropriate time," Fogh

Rasmussen said.

"Both NATO and Russia have a wealth of experience in missile defense. We should now work to combine this experience to our mutual benefit," he said.

Russian envoy Dmitry Rogozin said the NATO chief's address had a "very positive tone."

"Cooperation with Russia is not a matter of choice but of necessity," Rogozin said.

Fogh Rasmussen called for a reconsideration of NATO-Russia relations. He said long-range ballistic missile technology in the hands of such countries as North Korea and Iran threatens both the West and Russia.

### Shooting in Mexico City subway kills 2

MEXICO CITY — A gunman opened fire inside a Mexico City subway car during rush hour Friday, killing at least two people before he was subdued by police.

Pedro Estrada, director of Mexico City's forensic experts, said a passenger and a female police officer were killed. Five others were wounded.

Mexico City Mayor Marcelo Ebrard said the gunman has been captured.

Witnesses told radio station Formato 21 the gunman got on the subway at the Balderas station and began shooting while yelling the attack was against the government.

Police officers guarding the station subdued and captured the gunman, witnesses told the Mexican newspaper Reforma.

The Mexican government is locked in a bloody conflict with feuding drug cartels, but unrelated shooting rampages are relatively rare in Mexico.

Millions of commuters ride the capital city's Metro each day. Balderas station is a major transfer point between subway lines.

### California pastor gets life term for abusing 5 girls

MORENO VALLEY, Calif. — A 65-year-old California pastor has been sentenced to life in prison for beating and drugging her five adopted daughters and locking them in a Riverside County garage.

Jessica Banks received consecutive life terms Friday after being convicted in July of sexually abusing two of her daughters and forcing all the sisters to go without food for days.

Banks was arrested in 2005 after one emaciated girl was found lying outside a Moreno Valley business.

Prosecutors say the sisters, who were ages 4 to 11 at the time, lived in a hidden room in Banks' garage with no air conditioning or heating.

They attended school at the Word of Life Apostolic Church, where Banks was pastor.

### In hundreds of U.S. cities, parking spaces become parks

LOS ANGELES — Activists across the nation parked themselves curbside Friday, taking up spaces reserved for cars and transforming them into mini parks with sod, potted plants, lawn chairs and even barbecues to raise awareness about how the auto has won the battle over public space in big cities.

On a busy street in Los Angeles, a neighborhood association took up seven parking spots and set up a hangout with a grill, a kiddie pool and a gardening workshop to teach people how to grow drought-tolerant plants. In Chicago, an architecture firm turned two parking spaces into a pit stop where bicyclists can chill out on a grassy knoll and refuel on drinks and snacks. In New York City, theater students from Fordham University staged a "Shakespeare in the Parking Spot" festival.

Construction workers on their lunch break sat on cardboard chairs and watched the students read "Richard and Juliet," "Richard III" and other plays from a portable stage.

"I was impressed," said adjunct professor Sandra McKee.

# Chief: Police may never know Yale killing motive

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Police may never know the motive for the killing of a Yale University graduate student whose body was found hidden behind a wall on what should have been her wedding day, the police chief said Friday.

"The only person who knows the motive is the suspect," Chief James Lewis told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "It's true in many cases. You never know absolutely unless the person confesses, and in this case it's too early to tell."

Raymond Clark III, a technician in the lab where Annie Le conducted research, was arrested Thursday, a day after authorities took DNA samples from him to compare with evidence from the crime scene. His bond was set at \$3 million, and he did not enter a plea.

A telephone message seeking comment from the public defenders' office, which is representing Clark, was not immediately returned Friday.

Lewis said Friday that no further arrests were expected, but investigators were sifting through hundreds of pieces of evidence. He said police had trailed other people before they zeroed in on Clark as a suspect.

A law enforcement official who talked to the AP on condition of anonymity because the investigation was ongoing and many details remained sealed said Thursday that co-workers called Clark a "control freak" who was territorial about the mice whose cages he cleaned. Authorities are investigating whether that attitude might have set off a clash between Clark and Le.

Clark tried to hide evidence even as investigators worked in the basement lab around him, authorities said, then coolly played a softball game on the day Le's body was found stuffed inside a nearby wall.

An investigator observed Clark trying to hide cleaning equipment that contained blood splatters as teams



Clark

probed the disappearance of Le, who was 24, according to a law enforcement official familiar with the investigation who spoke to The Hartford Courant.

Investigators have records of Clark, also 24, cleaning areas that Le was in before she was reported missing Sept. 8, the official told the Courant, speaking on condition of anonymity.

But despite Clark's efforts, investigators found the DNA of both suspect and victim in the ceiling and in the wall recess where Le's body was hidden, the official told the paper. New Haven police wouldn't confirm that information to the AP.

The body of Le, a pharmacology student from Placerville, Calif., was recovered Sunday, the day she was to get married on New York's Long Island.

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## MADD peddling alcohol-free beverages

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mothers Against Drunk Driving wants you to have a beer — alcohol-free, natch.

MADD is putting its name on a bevy of non-alcoholic drinks, including mojitos, margaritas, pina colodas, beer, and red, white and sparkling wines.

The advocacy group says it signed a license agreement with a Toronto-based marketing firm to produce the line of beverages, called MADD Virgin Drinks. They'll be sold starting this fall, with some of the profits directed toward discouraging drunk driving.

They're an alternative for people who want to serve drinks with "the great taste needed to make guests feel like they are part of the party — but without the alcohol," said MADD's national president, Laura Dean-Mooney.

The drinks are licensed with Hill Street Marketing Inc. The company and MADD officials said they are still working out distribution, but plan to offer the drinks in grocery, drug and specialty stores.





TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Tens of thousands of protesters — many decked out in the green colors of the reform movement and chanting "Death to the dictator!" — rallied Friday in defiance of Iran's Islamic leadership, clashing with police and confronting state-run anti-Israel rallies.



Both offenses recorded more than 400 yards, and both teams split the yards evenly between the ground game and in the air. What made the difference for the Bruins were key Tiger turnovers and defensive stops near or in the red zone. Jerome quarterback Cameron Stauffer's night ended 21 of 36 with more than 200 yards passing, but he threw two picks, had a few more passes deflected, lost one fumble and was sacked three times.

Bruin lineman Ben Hanchey, who sacked Stauffer along with Brady Barton and Zack Van Loo, said he'll remember how hard the Tigers could hit and how he and his teammates pulled together to be what the team calls "One Bruin."

Fresno State gave up a lot of big plays too, but that sort of thing isn't supposed to happen to the Boise State defense, a defense boasting a bid to keep everyone out of the end zone.

That surely didn't happen Friday in Fresno. The Bulldogs scored 34 points against a defense that had allowed only eight points through two games. And they did it mainly by busting plays. Every time the two teams actually sustained a drive, they ended up kicking field goals.

The big plays made this game. The two teams had 10 combined possessions

resulting in touchdowns that took four plays or fewer. It's not like Fresno was pounding on the BSU defense. Matthews would just break one every now and then. If you take out his three touchdown runs, he had 37 yards on 16 carries.

The Bronco offense wasn't exactly stagnant either. I mean, 51 points?

It was just a night of big plays. On the first series of the game, Winston Venable returned an interception for a scores. D.J. Harper had a 60-yard touchdown run. Robbie Rouse set up the Bulldogs' first score with a 36-yard run.

Titus Young had a 77-yard kickoff return and a 104-yard TD return negat-

ed by offsetting penalties. When Young's 104-yarder was negated, Doug Martin returned the re-kick 77 yards to set up a Kyle Brotzman 30-yard field goal. Ryan Colburn hit Chastin West for 41 yards, then came back to Devon Wylie for 21 yards as the teams exchanged touchdowns.

Jeremy Avery broke free for a 74-yard run. Avery was breaking free all day, like a prisoner with no guards. Colburn would also hit Seyi Ajitrotutu for 22 yards and then West again for 30. Moore hit Avery on a 67-yard screen-play for a touchdown and that ... was ... enough.

The numbers are insane. The defenses looked lost.

The offenses proved opportunistic. But when the game ended, all those big plays measured up the same as a little one, a kneel by Kellen Moore. That's what football is, a collection of plays, great and small, mashed together in an hour of game time to create a legend.

The difference in this game was simply that the Broncos made a handful more critical plays and got the win.

There are some flaws on this Bronco team, but they won. That's all that matters.

Wildcat offensive set with David Griffin at quarterback. Eight rushing plays later, Espinoza plunged into the end zone from 9 yards out and Pete Coats tacked on the 2-point conversion for an 8-0 lead.

Two plays later, Espinoza intercepted Burley quarterback Jake Mills and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. It was a pass for which Espinoza had prepared.

"I looked at that in film about 10-15 times each day," he said. "When he motioned, I knew it was going to be a slant, so I jumped it. It was a big spark, we needed that motivation."

The May brothers, Colby and Brady, each scored rushing touchdowns in the third quarter, with each score set up by Burley turnovers.

"It's a rivalry game and Burley came ready to play," said Minico coach Tim Perrigot. "(Burley coach) Eugene Kramer had his kids ready to go. We didn't execute real well and we struggled to find any momentum. I'm glad our defense kept us in the game."

Burley (1-3, 1-1) twice drove inside Minico's 20-yard line in the first half, but came away with nothing. The Spartans had four interceptions in the second

half, two by Espinoza and one each by David Griffin and Bruce Hansen. Griffin now has 13 picks in the last 13 games for Minico, dating back to last season.

Minico rushed for 144 yards, 116 of which came after halftime.

Burley's Mills completed 19 of 42 passes for 197 yards, but was also sacked six times, led by Dalton Mickelsen's two.

"We played well three out of the four quarters and you can't do that, you have to play hard all four quarters," said Kramer. "They (the Bobcats) are capable of playing with anybody in the state of Idaho, they've just

got to believe that. We're going to make some surprises this season."

Minico has won five in a row and 11 of the last 15 against its Mini-Cassia rival.

Friday's final score was the closest margin since Burley last won in 2004.

The Spartans host their first home game of the season next week against Wood River, while the Bobcats have a bye.

The Vandals (1-1) appear to be superior to last year's edition, but today will be a good gauge for how far they've come.

Idaho will break in the renovated Kibbie Dome against San Diego State, which handed Idaho a 45-17 beatdown last year in California. The Aztecs return quarterback Ryan Lindley and dynamic receiver Vincent Brown, so Vandals fans will get to judge for themselves if there has been improvement or not.

"I hope we've stirred their excitement a little bit with the two first ballgames," Vandal head coach Robb Akey said of Idaho faithful. "... If nothing else (I want them to) come check out the Dome. I just want them in here."

Akey thinks a revved-up crowd can help sidetrack an SDSU offense that features Brown, a 6-foot junior who already has 281 receiving yards in the first year in Brady Hoke's system.

Hoke, the head coach at Ball State last year, brought Al Borges, a longtime Pac-10 assistant and former Auburn offen-

sive coordinator, with him to San Diego to lead the offense.

The Aztecs are 1-1 after a loss at UCLA

and a home win over Football Championship Subdivision foe Southern Utah.

The Vandals, meanwhile, are hoping for better defensive results after shaking up things in the secondary. Isaac Butts and Kenneth Patten, in particular, could see fewer minutes at cornerback with the emergence of freshman Aaron Grymes.

# No. 7 BYU plays home opener against 'Noles

PROVO, Utah (AP) — After upsetting Oklahoma to start the season, BYU already is trying to make its case for the postseason.

Back in the Top 10 and unbeaten, BYU's BCS dreams are very much alive as the seventh-ranked Cougars host Florida State on Saturday (5 p.m., Versus).

"We're trying to make a name for ourselves and make a name for our conference," defensive end Jan Jorgensen said. "The only way to do that is by beating teams like Oklahoma and beating teams like Florida State."

Although the Seminoles (1-1) have stumbled through the first two games, this is still Florida State, which hasn't started a season 1-2 in 20 years.

The Cougars (2-0) are playing their home opener, three weeks after a 14-13 upset of Oklahoma and last week's 54-3 rout at Tulane.

With 10 games left to play, the Cougars are leaving any speculation about a Bowl Championship Series title run to the fans.

"We've been here before, and I think we know we can't get ahead of ourselves," quarterback Max Hall said.

This season is the 25th anniversary of BYU's 1984 national championship, and the school has plans to celebrate throughout the season. If the current Cougars make a run for another title, college football's most conservative campus could get downright chaotic.

"I think this is the most physical BYU team that I've seen in the years that we've played them," Florida State coach Bobby Bowden.

Florida State opened this season with a crushing loss to Miami on a dropped pass that would have won it on the final play. Last week, the Seminoles rallied with two touchdowns in the final 35 seconds to defeat lower-division Jacksonville (Ala.) State 19-9.

"It's good timing," quarterback Christian Ponder said. "We can put those two games in the past, and we have a great opportunity this week. This could really be a changing factor for the rest of the season."

## Bengals happy to play team in own division

POCATELLO — This is more like it.

John Zamberlin and the Idaho State Bengals finally play an opponent close to their level today when they head down the road to Ogden, Utah, to take on Weber State in the Big Sky Conference opener for both clubs. Not that Weber State is a pushover — they are the defending conference co-champs — but the Wildcats aren't on the same level as Football Bowl Subdivision teams Arizona State and Oklahoma, which combined to outscore ISU 114-3.

"They're a very good football team," Zamberlin said of Weber State. "But now we're on the same level. We're going down there to find out how far we've come from last year — and to win a foot-

## Martin starts Chase with strong shot at title

LOUDON, N.H. (AP) — It's been seven years since Mark Martin legitimately challenged for the championship. Now he's got his best shot at the title that's so painfully eluded him over 27 years in NASCAR.

He'll only have to deal with Jimmie Johnson.

And Jeff Gordon. And Tony Stewart.

Oh, don't forget Denny Hamlin. Or Juan Pablo Montoya.

The tightest Chase for the championship since its 2004 inception begins Sunday at New Hampshire Motor Speedway, and Martin starts as the points leader. The sentimental favorite earned the top spot with four victories during an invigorating "regular season" that saw him match in 26 races his

entire win total from 2000 to 2008.

"This is certainly the best year of my career, the most fun," said the 50-year-old driver. "We'll see how things fare here. Anybody in this Chase can win this Chase. Every team that's in it is capable of putting together a 10-race row. That's all it takes is the magic 10 races, and anybody can win it."

Everyone in contention came to New Hampshire ready to roll, proven by a quick qualifying session Friday that saw Chase drivers claim the first five spots. Montoya, in his first Chase since moving from Formula One three seasons ago, won the pole with a record-breaking lap in his Earnhardt Ganassi Racing Chevrolet. His lap of 133.431 mph bet-

teammate, three-time defending champion Johnson, was 16th.

Newman was 18th, Greg Biffle was 22nd and Brian Vickers was the worst of the Chase qualifiers at 26th.

But Martin, who is convinced his car is far better than his qualifying effort, said Sunday's opener won't give much of an indication of how this Chase will shape up.

"It'll take five races. You're not going to know anything after this race, I'm telling you," Martin said. "You could have a terrible finish and run here and then come back and rebound from it. It's going to take five races to see. And then when it's four to go, the picture is going to get much clearer."

Tomlinson's carries will go to Darren Sproles and Michael Bennett, a late-season addition last year who made the roster out of training camp.

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

**Q:** I get pulled over by police everywhere but never get cited. I confess that I used to hang around some bad people who always found ways to get arrested. Is this harassment, or am I just always going to be stopped for no reason?

**A:** The question I have for you is what reasons were you being pulled over for? If you were not in violation of traffic laws, then one other reason you would have been pulled over was because you were known to have a suspended driver's license. In a small community it's easy to distinguish people driving on suspended licenses just because of how well you get to be known.

The answer I can give with the information provided is that you are probably not being harassed. Harassment is defined in "Black's Law Dictionary" as "a course of conduct directed at a specific person that causes substantial emotional distress in such person and serves no legitimate purpose."

To prove harassment, you'd have to be targeted by one person — in this case an officer — multiple times. Otherwise, if you're just talking about police in general, you're probably talking about conspiracy instead of harassment, which is even less likely, especially for law-abiding citizens.

If you think you're being harassed by police, you should probably take a better look at what's going on. Maybe you drive just a tad too fast or in an erratic manner. Maybe you're out at times, like after the bars close, that police look for these behaviors. I really can't tell from your question.

Hopefully you understand we're not out to harass you. We're just looking out for everybody's safety on the road when we pull someone over for violating the law.

He looked at me and asked if I had ever tried breathing in steam from hot water. I told him I hadn't, so he advised me to place a towel over my head and breath in the steam. while, but in about a month, I should start to see a difference. I thanked him and was discharged.

The next day, I began my regimen of steaming. I did it about three or four times a day and took about 12 deep breaths each time. I didn't notice anything different initially, but the next month, I found I didn't have as massive a migraine with my menstrual cycle as I normally did.

I now steam before and

after work. My symptoms have subsided. If I feel a migraine coming, I steam. It usually subsides within an hour. This treatment saved my quality of life, and I hope you pass it on to your readers.

**DEAR READER:** Thank you for sharing this unusual treatment for migraines. Other sufferers who try this should inform me of their results so I can print a follow-up on its effectiveness.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I would appreciate your thoughts on a medical problem. My guy is in his 40s and has had considerable pain for more than four months. He went to a chiropractor, who initially treated him and then sent him for an MRI. The results showed two herniated discs. He was then referred to a surgeon with the comment, "I don't know how you even walk with this pain."

He does not want to have surgery but has to take pain

medication and has a hard time just getting basic life tasks completed. His right hand and arm are so affected he can barely shave. Are there any other options such as physical therapy or traction that might help him? Could he be making his condition worse by not having the surgery?

**DEAR READER:** The spinal column is made up of the spinal cord (nerves that run from the base of the brain to just above the tailbone), vertebral bones and discs. Discs are interspaced between the bones, allowing us to bend and twist. Without discs, the

bones would be solid and unyielding, failing to allow efficient movement for walking, sitting or lying down.

When one or more of the spinal discs is herniated, it slips out of the alignment. This can put pressure on the spinal cord and allow the vertebral bones above and below this disc to touch, and may pinch surrounding muscles or nerves. This often leads to pain and weakness.

Depending on what those nerves supply, the arms, legs or even bladder and bowel functions can become affected.

I understand his hesitation to having surgery. I urge him to request a referral to a physical therapist or a hospital-based physical-therapy program, where he can be evaluated and taken through a series of specially designed exercises. It may be several weeks before results are seen, and not everyone will see significant improvement. If the physical therapy is ineffective, he may wish to try a pain clinic or specialist. In this setting, a pain specialist will evaluate the level of pain and cause, and then work with your boyfriend to determine the best course of action, which may include medication, water exercises, acupuncture or acupressure, chiropractic manipulation or massage.

I don't recommend traction despite its popularity because there is little proof that it is beneficial or that the results are long-lasting. There have even been reports of worsening of the degree of herniation and an increase in the amount of pain experienced.

If these conservative measures fail to improve function and decrease pain, surgery to correct the deformity may be appropriate; however, this step is not a guarantee of relief of pain

or improvement of function. It is a last resort that may well solve his difficulties.

Your boyfriend needs to speak to his physician about correcting the herniated discs, not just covering up the pain by using medication.

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## New Utah governor Herbert favors unlimited campaign donations

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah Gov. Gary Herbert says he would support a law requiring disclosure of campaign contributions within 48 hours, but not one limiting how much money someone can donate to a campaign.

Utah is one of just a handful of states that places no limits on campaign contributions or where they can come from, and companies regularly donate tens of thousands of dollars to state office holders.

In a recent interview with The Associated Press, Herbert said he believes caps on campaign contributions limit free speech, although federal courts have disagreed.

Herbert also said allowing unlimited contributions levels the playing field so less affluent candidates can run for office.

"What I don't want to see either is a wholesale turnover to the election process to only the wealthy and those who have celebrity status," he said. "We don't want to have a sign that's put out in front of the statehouse that says, 'Only the rich need apply.'"

Herbert faces a special election in 2010 to fill out the remainder of former Gov. Jon Huntsman's term and counts energy companies and the Utah Association of Realtors among his biggest contributors.

Huntsman resigned in August to become U.S. ambassador to China.

When Huntsman and

Herbert ran on the same ticket, Huntsman placed a voluntary \$20,000 limit on his campaign. Herbert has no such intentions and the Utah Association of Realtors has already surpassed that, according to his most recent filing.

This year, the Republican-controlled Legislature passed a law

requiring state candidates to disclose campaign contributions within 30 days to achieve greater transparency. But some candidates, including Herbert, are choosing to use political action committees exempt from those more frequent disclosure requirements as their primary campaign account.


"The Ukrainian government wants us to come, because it helps



## Ex-Mormon group offers support to those who've left the fold

Wondering what that billboard on U.S. Highway 93 in Jerome County that reads "You are not alone" is all about?

Jeff Ricks will tell you it's an invitation.

Ricks, 54, was raised in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He was taught the church's doctrines and values, and believed in what it promulgated.

That changed in 1993 when a business venture in Idaho Falls went under and he lost faith in the church's teachings about tithing. He expected blessings from paying a full tithe, not the hardship that came from losing his home and business.

"Everybody who leaves the church leaves for different reasons," Ricks said, admitting that his reason for leaving is "a little odd." "Everyone has a trigger that brings them to that point. This (tithing) was my trigger."

He began to study outside the realm of church-

approved literature, and took issue with more of its teachings. When Ricks decided to leave Mormonism, he didn't expect the loneliness and ridicule he felt afterward. He was tagged as an apostate, a black sheep, an anti-Mormon instead of someone who fell out of faith with his church.

"It was very lonely for me," Ricks said. "I couldn't talk to anyone about it. I lost friends. People didn't know how to relate to me anymore."

Ricks, a fourth-generation Mormon — Ricks College, now BYU-Idaho in Rexburg, was named after his great-great grandfather, Thomas Ricks — decided former Mormons such as himself likely experience the same things he went through and launched PostMormon.org, a non-profit group and Web site to support others who've left

the church.

An engineer from Logan, Utah, Ricks says he has no plans to return to the church, nor does he encourage others to leave it.

PostMormon.org has local chapters throughout the country, including one in Boise, and some overseas. Members meet at least once a month to discuss a variety of topics, including religion.

The group purchased space along Highway 30 in western Twin Falls County

to place the billboard once it leaves the Jerome site, north of State Highway 25 along U.S. Highway 93.

Ricks does not consider his group "anti-Mormon," he said, though that's often the first thing church members label it.


Ricks calls it an uninformed, knee-jerk reaction.

"To me an anti-Mormon is someone who tries to get people away from the church," he said. "They hold signs at Temple Square ... I think it's disgusting to see that. We're not like that in any way."

"Mormonism has a lot of good, positive things about it. It's a good life for a lot of people. But our organization supports those who, for one reason or another, can't support the church anymore."

Ricks might not aim for his group to be anti-Mormon, but some of the comments posted on the Web site's blog could be offensive to some church members. A number of people have posted "exit" stories.

## Emulating the Great Healer

### Sun Valley man answers inner call to serve wounded in Afghanistan

Brack Davis served as team physician for the San Francisco 49ers through 13 seasons and five Super Bowls.

But a few years ago, he found a calling that was even more rewarding.

The retired orthopedic surgeon, who has lived in Sun Valley for 14 years, answered an inner call to offer his healing touch to wounded children and adults in Afghanistan.


The calling came at the annual Allen and Company meeting in Sun Valley where Davis was invited to listen to three military officials just back from Iraq.

"Tom Brokaw said things weren't getting better. I figured here I was hiking and fishing and enjoying the good life. There must be something I can do," said Davis, whose Christian faith always has him striving for ways he can emulate The Great Healer.

Davis looked for a way in and found it in a civilian hospital in Kabul, which had just received a \$3 million USAID grant.

Davis was the only American doctor in a 250-bed hospital built by Czechs in 1962.

The staff had just one X-ray, a few syringes and hardly any IV's or medicine for treating those wounded in suicide bomb-

ings, landmines and gunfire.

"Instead of taking an X-ray, they would lift someone's leg until he screamed and diagnose him that way," said Davis. "The Japanese donated portable X-ray machines, but there was no one to service them so they went unused."

Davis performed elective surgery and made house calls in areas where the sewage went right down the middle of narrow streets.

He got a walker for a boy with muscular dystrophy that couldn't walk and he helped others who had lost limbs in landmines with bad fitting prostheses. He talked about Christianity and the United States with his new Muslim doctor friends. And he fell in love with the people, who drew their water from wells,

# A quest for America's spiritual mysteries

## Event discusses religious movements in upstate N.Y.

PHOENICIA, N.Y. — In his role as editor of the online magazine Lapis, Ralph White is scholarly and staid, offering literary explorations of myths, traditions, symbols and lore that have swayed thought for centuries.

But once a year, White, 60, leads a number of adventurous souls on quests for the deeper mysteries of spiritual experience in castles, cathedrals, temples, tombs and ancient ruins around the world.

Recently, White and 65 others attended "An Esoteric Quest for Inner America" in Rip Van Winkle country, or upstate New York, which is the birthplace of such homegrown spiritual and cultural movements as the 19th-century utopian Oneida Community and the 1969 Woodstock festival.

The area also served as a launching pad for the westward shift to the land of new beginnings that was California.

Among the alternative cultural and religious movements that began in the New York region were the Six Nations Iroquois Confederation, which maintained peaceful relations among American Indian tribes; the Hudson River School painters, who celebrated spiritual and other glories of the American landscape, and the Shakers, who have all but died out, not least because its members practiced celibacy. There were sisters Kate, Leah and Maggie Fox, whose reports of mysterious knocks on the walls of their rural home in 1848 triggered the rise of spiritualism, a movement that flourished after World War I as friends and relatives of slain soldiers desperately tried to communicate with their dead loved ones.

Leaning against a tree at the edge of a pond sprinkled with fallen maple leaves, White said, "They may have been a little loopy, but nobody can say they weren't true to themselves, and genuinely fascinating."

"These were all vibrant American spirits worthy of closer

examination," he added. "We want to bring alive an extraordinary, yet half-forgotten history of Western culture and, in the process, fire people's imaginations. We are heirs to their quirky and often beautiful works and writings and would all do well to see their relevance in the present day."

This year's conference began Aug. 24 when participants met at the Menla Mountain Retreat, a 320-acre private nature preserve in the Catskill Mountains near Woodstock, for a series of lectures on the nature and development of esoteric perceptions.

The retreat lies in the heart of terrain swept over by so many religious movements during the last two centuries that scholars know it as "a caldron."

Outsiders might dismiss them as collections of eccentrics and misfits. To members of their communities, however, they were zones of enlightenment and peace in a world gone wrong.

"They were rather comical, even ridiculous," said Joscelyn Godwin, a music professor at Colgate University in New York and author of several books on America's obscure spiritual dimensions. "But they all had something that seized them and gave them their life's work. I honor their experience."

By the start of the 1900s, some of New England's spiritual communities and lesser-known religions were setting up shop in California. Mormonism, which began in upstate New York, had already spread throughout the western United States. Separately, offshoots of New York City's Theosophical Society were established in Hollywood, Oceanside and at Point Loma promontory west of San Diego.

One conference lecture examined how mystical notions — for example, spiritualism, Freemasonry and the Transcendentalism of poets Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry David Thoreau — helped shape America in surprising ways.

# Religious sect's plan stirs concern in Fort Hall

FORT HALL (AP) — A plan by a self-described religious sect to build a three-story dormitory in Fort Hall, Idaho, has drawn protest from residents.

Roughly three dozen members of The Church of the Firstborn and General Assembly of Heaven moved to a home on Reservation Road from Utah this summer, adding a handful of trailers at the site, the *Idaho State Journal* reported.

On Monday, more than 100 people packed the Land Use Policy Commission meeting for a hearing on the group's plan to build an 18,000-square-foot motel-

like building with as many as 38 rooms.

Jennie Bloxham, whose home is just to the east of the group's property, said she fears the influx of people to the rural neighborhood is placing too much stress on a well shared by four homes, including hers and the home used by the sect.

Some residents voiced concern about the sect itself.

Sect member Geody Harman declined to comment on the church or its construction proposal. The group hasn't made any formal statement about its move to Idaho from Magna, Utah.

Its Web site, http://the-firstborn.org, says the sect was started by Terrill Dalton, who was excommunicated from the Mormon church and now claims to be the

Holy Ghost.

The Web site also says Dalton and Harmon translated records from God. Among those records were references to plural marriage and instructions to tithe to Dalton.

"Repent, repent ye wicked perverse master batters of imperfect love shelled like a wasted broom needle nut and thrown to the way side like the husk of a peanut eaten at a road side show," reads one of the records, titled "Zodak the Prophet."

There were no public phone listings for Harman, Dalton, or for property owner Joseph Ahlstrom.

HILDALE, Utah — Former members of a polygamous church are offering outsiders a guided tour with promises to answer questions about the history and traditions of the community.

Richard Holm and his brother Heber Holm are among those who are launching "The Polygamy Experience: A Guided Tour of Colorado City." The first tour is today.

Colorado City, Ariz., and Hildale, Utah, are twin towns controlled by the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

The four-hour tour will include accounts from those who have lived in the towns. Richard Holm was exiled from the FLDS faith in 2003

by church leader Warren Jeffs. Heber Holm left the community 35 years ago.

FLDS spokesman Willie Jessop says he hopes people won't get suckered into what he calls a scam.

### Malaysian judge orders man to jail for drinking

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia — A judge has ordered a Muslim man to be caned and jailed for drinking alcohol, two months after triggering a national debate for sentencing a woman to be whipped for a similar offense.

Islamic High Court judge Abdul Rahman Yunos in eastern Pahang state ordered the Indonesian worker to serve a year in jail and be whipped six times, a court official said Tuesday. She declined to be identi-

fied, citing protocol.

She said Nazarudin Kamaruddin pleaded guilty earlier this month to drinking liquor at a restaurant on Aug. 27. Unable to post bail, he has been in prison since being charged on Sept. 2, she said. He faced a maximum of three years in jail for the offense.

Consumption of alcohol in Muslim-majority Malaysia is a punishable offense, but only three of 13 states impose whipping. The rest provide for jail and fines, but Muslims caught by religious authorities are usually let off with a warning or fine.

In July, Abdul Rahman sentenced a Malaysian woman to six cane strokes and a fine for drinking beer in public, triggering public outrage. If the sentence is carried out, the married mother of two will be the

first woman to be caned in Malaysia.

### Church reopens after fire that police say was arson

LAFAYETTE, Ala. — A church in Lafayette that was destroyed in a Valentine's Day fire that authorities said was the work of arsonists has reopened.

Liberty CME Church, one of three churches burned in alleged arsons last February, was dedicated Sept. 13. The service began with a ribbon-cutting at the front of the church. Two choirs sang.

"What the devil did, God turned around," said the Rev. Shelia Crabb, pastor at Liberty.

The former building was about 175 years old.

## Ohio town moves to preserve church

LAKEWOOD, Ohio (AP) — A proposal to protect a landmark Roman Catholic church has the potential to turn into a fight over private property rights and church-state separation.

Council members and the mayor in this Cleveland suburb along Lake Erie are moving to create a law that would stop the Cleveland diocese or any future owner from tearing down the church or gutting its ornate interior if the church closes as expected.

St. James Church, a towering stone building, is one of 52 parishes in the eight-county diocese slated to be eliminated by next year through mergers and closings.

A proposed ordinance would protect any structure that the city designates a historical or cultural landmark. It is designed specifically to save the church and is on track to become law next month.

"They can challenge it legally, and there would be a

fight," said Mayor Ed FitzGerald. "But I think we're on solid ground. We're making sure they have due process."

The diocese, spokesman Robert Tayek said, is taking the matter under advisement to determine how to interact with the city on the matter.

It has not said what it

plans to do with the church, but the city doesn't want to take any chances.

The church, built over 10 years beginning in 1925, has polished marble, granite sculptures, carved oak and inlaid ceramic tiles.

Architectural historian Tim Barrett, who works for the city of Cleveland, said it's filled with an array of

fine stone.

"St. James is one of the most exotic buildings in the region," he said. "It's a total experience walking into that building. It really is one of a kind."

Parishioners are hoping to persuade Bishop Richard Lennon to keep the church open.

But FitzGerald, who met with the bishop privately in March, doesn't think that will happen.

"This is not a dying parish," said Joe Dwyer, a 23-year member. "This is so baffling. There is nothing wrong with St. James that can't be fixed."

slept on the roof in carpets and blankets and were too embarrassed to take their burkas off in hospitals

He especially fell in love with the children who lived amidst bombed out buildings, tanks sunk in the ground and the constant threat of landmines.

"Was I frightened? No. I'm an old man-and the Afghans respect age," he said. "And the suicide bombers target soldiers in uniform."

That said, Davis saw war up close, coming home with pictures of a charred foot of a suicide bomber who blew himself up outside the hospital, killing 12 people and injuring 30.

And Davis was given a flak jacket and a 45 revolver when he accompanied Dynacorp's private military contractors on field trips.

"I told them that doctors don't carry guns," Davis

said. "They told me: If we get into a firefight, we need every gun we can get."

After his first sojourn in Afghanistan, Davis returned to work in the country the size of Texas.

He toured the country in an old Russian plane that took him up and over 25,000-foot mountain peaks to visit towns that looked as if they could be on the pages of National Geographic.

The country, which lies on the Silk Road between China and Europe, grows rice, fruits, nuts, wheat and 9,000 tons of poppies, which brings in \$3 billion. The Afghans' other major source of income is \$10 billion in international aid.

"The people are poor as can be — they cut corn by hand. People get around by horse drawn wagons and mule trains on roads that resemble the dirt road up Trail Creek Summit. But

they're happy and smiling. The children don't know what tourists are so they don't beg for candy, as they do in so many Third World countries," he said.

At 78, Davis concedes that he's getting too old to return — he's slowing down when it comes to hiking the five-mile trail up Bald Mountain.

But that hasn't kept him from collecting computers for a girl's school in the Northern province of Kunduz. He and his wife Joanne also support an orphanage in Kabul, paying two teachers' salaries of \$200 a month.

Even that has hit a temporary roadblock — the only way you can get money to them now is in person, and that's impossible right now given the war's escalation.

Davis cringes every time he reads a newspaper report of the Taliban shooting students, intimidating parents into taking their children out

of school. He wonders if they might be some of the students he met, who hold school every day in stalls and tents with nothing more than a blackboard as a teaching tool.

"I can only keep hoping and praying," he said. "I firmly believe that education can help turn that country around."

Ketchum resident Bill Snadecki, who attends church with Davis, said that he has enormous respect for what his friend has done: "At a time when doctors get blamed for being greedy, it's so wonderful to see him doing something like this. And he's such a modest man-he doesn't boast about it."

Joanne Davis is proud of her husband, as well: "He just wants to give back a little of himself"

# Universities acquire rare religious texts

LOS ANGELES — The words of gods have appeared in many forms over the centuries, as scribes and printers have transmitted holy writings by hand and machine.

Now two Southern California universities are preserving some of this history with separate sets of rare religious texts that originated 1,500 years apart but share a common biblical thread.

Azusa Pacific University has acquired five fragments of the Dead Sea Scrolls, the earliest known versions of the Hebrew Bible.

The 2,000-year-old goatskin shards, featuring passages from the books of Exodus, Leviticus and Deuteronomy, will be exhibited in May at the evangelical Christian university.

At Loyola Marymount University, a leaf from one of the first Gutenberg Bibles is now available for public viewing at the campus.

The double-sided page, including chapters from the Book of Isaiah in black gothic script, was printed in the 1450s by Johannes Gutenberg, who is credited with inventing the printing press.

Biblical scholars say the artifacts offer tantalizing new research possibilities and provide the public with rare glimpses of history.

"You get a tingle from this stuff that you don't get from looking at an image on the Web," said Stephen Tabor, curator of early printed books at the Huntington Library in San Marino, which owns a nearly complete Gutenberg Bible and has exhibited photos of the Dead Sea Scrolls. "It's the opportunity to re-verify for yourself that history is real."

The Dead Sea Scrolls were discovered in 1947 by a Bedouin shepherd in a cave near the ruins of

Qumran, east of Jerusalem. In all, more than 950 worn and incomplete scrolls were eventually recovered from 11 caves, setting off decades of sometimes turbulent jockeying by scholars eager to study manuscripts that date from about the time of Jesus.

The five fragments in the Azusa Pacific collection, each about the size of an adult's palm, are stored in a campus safe until they can be readied for the May exhibition that will use artifacts to tell the history of the Bible.

The university bought four of the fragments from a private rare-manuscript dealer. The fifth came from a Christian ministry in Phoenix that collects biblical artifacts.

University officials would not say how much they paid for the pieces.

The university released a photograph of one fragment that already has been studied by an outside researcher. The brownish-colored section with frayed edges shows part of the 27th chapter of Deuteronomy. In it, Moses delivers a discourse from God, telling the Jewish people to build an altar of stone once they cross the River Jordan into the land of Israel.

The fragment lists the location for the altar as Mount Gerizim. Modern Bibles mentioned another site, Mount Ebal.

James H. Charlesworth, a New Testament professor at Princeton Theological Seminary, said the difference suggests that the fragment may be an original copy of Deuteronomy that was altered at some point by warring factions of Jews.

Azusa Pacific said it is only the third U.S. institution of higher education to acquire fragments of the Dead Sea Scrolls. And some scholars say the purchase has elevated the name of the 8,500-student campus. "They are now on the map," Charlesworth said.

Some former Mormons, Ricks included, claim the church has grown into a powerful public relations organization and has covered up some of its own history. Others say they've felt current leaders are out of sync with real-life issues and offer only pat answers to real problems. Others have taken issue with Mormon standards or church doctrine.

Those who've joined the post-Mormon community often do not reveal their full names for fear of backlash, Ricks said. Some, he said, have lost jobs over it.

While church officials are disappointed whenever someone leaves the church, they say it's not right for members to treat former Mormons unkindly.

"We're always saddened when someone leaves the church," Terry McCurdy, area spokesman for the LDS church, said. "That's a decision they make, for whatever reason. We can't force them to come back, but we'd love to see them return."

McCurdy said Tuesday that he had not seen PostMormon.org's billboard or heard about the group, but said those who leave the church do need support.

"When you're in the church you have friends, and any time you're out of the church you have a different group of friends," McCurdy said. "I've seen it happen,

and have great empathy for those who are in that situation."

The church, he said, encourages members to reach out to neighbors, including those who've been estranged. It's not Christian conduct to judge them harshly, he said, and it makes it more difficult for those who might want to return.

LDS Church President Thomas S. Monson, after inviting estranged Mormons to return to the church's "open arms" during its spring 2008 general conference, said, "I would encourage members of the church wherever they may be to show kindness and respect for all people everywhere. The world in which we live is filled with diversity. We can and should demonstrate respect toward those whose beliefs differ

from ours."

The best thing any Mormon can do, McCurdy said, is to love those who've left. "We'd love to see them come back," he said. "Being a true friend, and truly loving them, that's the key."

Though it's been a rough road, Ricks said he has found his own moral compass since leaving the church.

"I wasn't expecting my personal outcome to be what it is, but I am happier outside the church than inside the church," Ricks said. "I can read and search, seek and find, and don't have to check everything against what the church leaders say ... I've discovered that I do have an inner moral compass."

Of his group, he said: "I love it when people come to our Web site and say, 'Wow, this is the first time I feel that I'm not alone.' That's what keeps me going."

# Eastern Idaho committee urges GOP activist to resign

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Bonneville County Republican Central Committee in eastern Idaho is asking Blake Hall to step down as national committeeman following a restraining order filed against him by his former girlfriend.

The committee voted 21-13 Thursday in a non-binding resolution expressing no confidence in Hall's ability to continue as one of three Idaho representatives on the Republican National Committee.

The resolution says that "Hall has failed to conduct himself in a manner that maintains trust, honor and

respect for himself" and his position.

Tim Urling, chairman of the subcommittee that drafted the resolution, said a restraining order filed against Hall by his ex-girlfriend prompted the action by the committee.

The restraining order issued last week prohibits the 56-year-old Hall from coming within 900 feet of his former girlfriend or her residence until Sept. 9, 2010. He is also prohibited from contacting the woman by telephone or other means.

The order by 7th District Judge Penny Stanford said Hall "represents an imme-

diated and present danger of domestic violence" to the woman.

Idaho Falls Police said they are investigating a complaint filed by the woman on Aug. 31.

Hall didn't attend Thursday's meeting. He did not immediately return a call from The Associated Press on Friday.

Central Committee chairman Damond Watkins argued against the resolution on Thursday, saying Hall should be judged by his work on the RNC's budget committee.

Hall has helped raise millions of dollars for Republican candidates in

statewide races and is desperately needed again in the next election cycle, Watkins said.

"In my opinion, Blake should be evaluated on his performance on the committee, not on his personal life," Watkins said, the Post Register reported.

According to state Republican Party rules, a national committeeman can only leave the post if his term is up or if he resigns.

The Jefferson County Republican Central Committee is planning to consider a similar resolution regarding Hall next month, said Corbet Miskin, chairman of the committee.

## AROUND THE WEST

### Report: Restoring Amtrak in Idaho and Oregon costly

BOISE — Consultants hired to look at restoring the passenger rail service to southern Idaho and eastern Oregon say Amtrak service would help a region in need of more transportation options.

But their preliminary report says bringing back Amtrak's Pioneer Route would be costly and would not pay for itself without substantial subsidies.

The Pioneer Route stretched from Denver to Portland and included stops in between in places like Boise. The route was discontinued in 1997 because of financial losses.

Idaho Republican Sen. Mike Crapo and Oregon Democratic Sen. Ron Wyden have both advocated restoring Amtrak service.

Amtrak will accept comment until Oct. 1 on the preliminary study.

A final report will be presented by Oct. 15 to Congress, which may have the final say in restoring Amtrak service.

### Company adds new options for disputed power line

CHEYENNE — Local landowners and the Wyoming governor's office are taking a cautious approach to the introduction of new potential routes for the Gateway West transmission line.

Rocky Mountain Power and Idaho Power held meetings in Wheatland, Medicine Bow, Laramie and Douglas this week to present new "conceptual alternatives" for part of the proposed line.

The utilities have proposed building the \$2 billion, 1,150-mile line to carry wind and fossil-fuel power to their customers in Wyoming, Idaho and other western states. They hope to complete the project by 2014.

The companies delayed their siting process in July to try to settle issues raised by landowners and local governments along the route in Wyoming and Idaho.

"I think this new map and the additional conceptual alternative routes is proof

that the companies are listening to what residents and other stakeholders in this area have been saying," Rocky Mountain Power spokesman Jeff Hymas said Friday.

The proposed line would cross federal, state and private land. It would start in Glenrock and cross southern Wyoming and southern Idaho to a substation near Murphy, Idaho.

In Wyoming, two possible routes that cut across the northern Laramie Range prompted opposition among local landowners, who formed the Northern Laramie Range Alliance to push development away from the mountains. In August, Rocky Mountain Power President Richard Walje said the company would find another alignment for the disputed segment.

The new conceptual alternatives would skirt the northern Laramie Range to the west or east from Glenrock down to the Medicine Bow area.

The Bureau of Land Management is expected to issue a draft environmental impact statement, including

a preferred route, next spring.

### Blast that destroyed home investigated

NAMPA — The Nampa Fire Department says natural gas is suspected to be the cause of an explosion that demolished one home, sending the man inside to the hospital, and damaged three other houses.

Nampa Fire Department Capt. Keith Elkins says the man, identified by neighbors as private detective Larry King, suffered multiple broken bones and burns in the blast and was taken to a hospital for treatment. Elkins said emergency workers found him buried under kitchen appliances and other rubble outside the footprint of the home.

Eight people were evacuated from neighboring homes, Elkins said. One of the homes suffered structural damage so severe that the family won't be allowed back inside, Elkins said, and another one had at least moderate structural damage with broken supports in a weight-bearing wall.

Today's deal from the women's quarterfinals of the Mind Sports Games last year shows an opportunity missed and one taken.

The Danish declarer elected to play four hearts, not three no-trump. West doubled and led a club to the jack and queen. Declarer laid down the heart ace to find the bad news, then led a heart to the 10 and king, followed by a club to the 10 and a third heart to West.

Now a diamond shift picked up the diamond queen, and declarer led the club ace, ruffed and over-ruffed. Next came a spade to the king, and two more rounds of diamonds ending in hand. The fourth club allowed declarer to score dummy's heart eight for her 10th trick.

The French declarer (today's South) also played four hearts (not doubled) on a club lead, and also cashed the heart ace. Now came a heart to Nevena Senior's 10, ducked. Senior shifted to a diamond and declarer won cheaply, led the heart nine, covered all around, then played a club to the 10.

In the identical position to the one that had been reached by the Danish declarer, South led the club ace, but Senior found the winning defense when she pitched a diamond rather than ruffing in. Declarer now tried to cash two diamonds ending in hand, but Senior could ruff in for down one.

Had declarer cashed two diamonds earlier, ending in hand, then led the club ace and another club, Senior would have been able to pitch two spades and maneuver a spade ruff.


