## Man found dead near Raft River late Saturday

### Cassia Co. seeking suspect with Aberdeen ties

An unidentified man was found dead Saturday night in the Raft River area after Cassia County sheriff's deputies responded to a 911 call, in which a woman said she and the victim were

assaulted and their vehicle stolen.

Cassia County Sheriff's Office and Idaho State Police are investigating the death and seeking a Bingham County man, Gerry Salgado, 22, whom they have named as a suspect in the case.

Deputies responded to the woman's call around 9:42 p.m. Saturday, after she called for assistance saying she and her boyfriend were assaulted, according to a press release from Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd

Sunday night.

The male victim, whose identity was being held pending the notification of family, was approximately 35 years old, according to Kidd's statement. The woman, 46, also unnamed, was transported to a local hospital with several injuries, the

statement said.

An autopsy will be performed to determine the cause of death.

Kidd said his office is seeking information on Salgado, naming him as a suspect in the death and the stolen vehicle. The sheriff's office said Salgado is known to have lived in and frequented the Aberdeen area.

"The suspect had taken the car belonging to the victims,"

Kidd said in his statement. "The car has since been located and recovered."

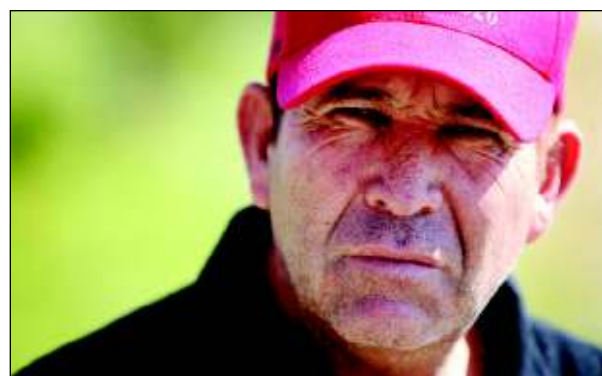
The press release gave no information indicating where the victim's body was found, nor of the vehicle's location when it was found.

State court records show a lengthy criminal record for a Gerry Salgado of Aberdeen. In 2005, he served 90 days at St. Anthony's juvenile detention center for a charge of

driving under the influence. Salgado was also convicted as a juvenile for separate cases involving charges of battery, driving a vehicle without owners consent, and resisting or obstructing officers.

A dispatch officer for Idaho State Police told the Times-News that state police were assisting Cassia County in the investigation.

## Swindled citizenship

### Shoshone man claims \$16,000 loss from immigration fraud

SHOSHONE — Tiburcio Bedolla was swindled out of his money and an American dream.

Bedolla, 48, was taken for more than \$16,000 and broke down in tears Friday when asked if he trusted the immigration consultant — who is now under investigation for fraud — because she was Latino.

Wiping away the tears, Bedolla didn't answer the question, and said through a Spanish-speaking translator that he just wants his

money back.

He's not alone.

Bedolla is only one of more than 30 victims of immigration fraud that Jerome County Sheriff's Office authorities are investigating. Sheriff's deputies raided the home and office of a Celia Perez at 325 West, 100 North in Jerome on Aug. 27 and seized a truckload of paperwork that is still being investigated without a timeline for completion, Det. Rick Cowen said Friday.

## Bliss receives more wastewater money

The city of Bliss received more federal stimulus funding for its wastewater system overhaul on Friday, adding to a mixed pot of funds that should be able to cover the whole project.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers signed a partnering agreement with city officials that provided \$2.1 million from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 for the work. The money is being provided through a cost-sharing program and does not have to be repaid, the corps confirmed.

The \$6.8 million project will provide a total containment lagoon, gravity and pressure mains and other

new systems for the city, improving protections for surface water and groundwater in the process. The city currently relies

# Offering a lifeline

### Assistance program contributes to higher-than-average phone use

Idaho is a national leader when it comes to the number of households with telephone service, boosted in part by participation in a program that helps pay for such service for low-income households.

The Lifeline Assistance program, created in 1984, pays for \$10 of the cost of one phone line per month for qualifying households — ensuring families can call 911 or other services in emergencies. An Idaho program created two years later, the Idaho Telephone Service Assistance Program, chips

in another \$3.50.

Combined, the sum can cover nearly half of the monthly bill for basic phone service, without long-distance, voicemail or other perks, said Gene Fadness, spokesman for the Idaho Public Utilities Commission. The PUC determines the monthly charge on residential, business and wireless phones that funds the state program — currently 6 cents per line — and the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare determines who qualifies for the service.

According to figures from

## BLM weighs comments on changes to Craters travel

CAREY — Fifty additional miles of roads would be closed in the Craters of the Moon National Monument under a proposed new travel management plan.

But 22 miles of road would be upgraded to improve access for hunters, hikers and fire suppression vehicles. And parking areas would be paved at Ant Butte,

Bear Trap and South Park Well to mitigate the risk of fire from catalytic converters on vehicles.

The plan, first called for in the November 2000 presidential proclamation that expanded Craters of the Moon's boundaries, is meant to address issues related to noxious weeds, human-caused wildfires and other threats. Monument officials and the U.S. Bureau of Land Management released a

draft of the plan in August and will now begin sifting through the roughly 100 public comments they obtained during a comment period that ended Friday.

David Freiberg, a BLM outdoor recreation planner in Shoshone who is also serving as the project leader, said Friday he's received input from motorized groups, livestock producers, county officials and a wide selection of the public.

"It's pretty comprehen-

sive, I think," he said, noting final revisions should be made within weeks. "I'm happy with it."

Some of that comment came from a Thursday night meeting at Carey City Hall, where Freiberg walked a group of 40 people through the details of the plan.

The roads closed are in the pristine zone, primarily made up of lava fields. Or they're redundant or unused

Some of the victims are in the country legally, others aren't, but all paid to get help with citizenship paperwork for themselves or family members. The victims who are living illegally in the country are not facing charges absent any other wrongdoing, authorities said.

Perez has not yet been charged with a crime after allegedly posing as an immigration consultant, taking money and then not following through on promises to handle citizenship paperwork for Bedolla's wife and sons, he said Friday.

For two years Bedolla said he did what Perez told him to do for his family's immigration plight. Bedolla said Perez was referred to him by a friend. He says he refinanced his sprawling wooden home in Shoshone to make all the payments to Perez.

The trust broke last month, Bedolla said, when he went to an immigration office in Boise and was told there had been no paperwork filed or fees paid for his family through Perez or anyone else.

Meanwhile, Bedolla has a stack of money-order receipts made out to "USCIS" totaling \$14,600. He is out another \$1,500 that he paid to Perez for fees, he said. USCIS stands for the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, which handles citizenship and naturalization forms and the fees they carry.

Perez won't return Bedolla's calls, he said, and she sent back his family's records in the mail in June —

Other agencies currently or planning to contribute to the work include the Idaho departments of Environmental Quality and Commerce, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development program, said City Clerk Leslie Lopes. Voters overwhelmingly approved a \$1 million bond earlier this year to help pay for the project, though the full amount may not be needed.

"We should have enough funding," Lopes said.

The commander of the corps' Walla Walla District, Lt. Col. Michael J. Farrell,

was expected to attend Friday's signing, one of five such arrangements the corps recently made with southern Idaho towns. He said in a statement that such projects are "win-win for everyone."

"Partnering with communities on projects like these improves public health and safety, protects natural resources and infuses funds into the local economies," he said.

City officials have previously said that work on the new system could start as early as next spring. The corps now stated it should begin around October 2010 and be completed by summer 2011.

## Paul crash hospitalizes three Sunday

Three passengers were seriously injured early Sunday morning after their car slid off a Paul road and struck a utility pole, a fire hydrant and then a house. The crash sent the driver and two other passengers to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise,

according to Idaho State Police.

The male juvenile driver of a white Chevrolet Cobalt was traveling westbound on Ellis Street near North Second Avenue East around 12:30 a.m., and attempted to pass another vehicle headed in the same direction, the ISP release said.

The driver then lost con-

trol of the Chevy Cobalt and entered a broad slide onto the right shoulder of the road. It struck the utility pole and a fire hydrant before it crossed North Second Avenue, then hit a house at 123 E. Ellis St.

The driver, a female juvenile passenger, and a male infant passenger were transported to Minidoka Memorial Hospital. All

occupants were later transported to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center and are in critical condition, the press release said.

The ISP press statement said no occupants were wearing seatbelts, and that alcohol is believed to have been a factor in the crash. The incident is still under investigation.

## Gooding fire controlled, new blaze starts near Glens Ferry

Bureau of Land Management crews were able to control one fire in the western areas of Magic Valley Sunday evening, just as another fire broke out.

The State Highway 46 Fire, which burned around

1,500 total acres in an area 10 miles north of Gooding, was controlled by 8 p.m. Sunday. The fire began Saturday afternoon and spread with increased winds hitting the dry desert acreage.

Crews responded to a new fire that began around

5:30 p.m. Sunday, nine miles east of Glens Ferry off of Interstate 84. Called the Mile Marker 127 fire, the blaze covered 25 acres by 9:30 p.m. due to high winds that continued in the area Sunday. Four BLM fire engines from Boise, and two from Twin Falls responded

to the scene, along with one helicopter and one air attack plane from Boise. The King Hill Rural Fire Department was also at the scene.

BLM spokeswoman Barbara Bassler said crews expected to have the fire contained by Sunday night and controlled by today.

the Federal Communications Commission, Idaho ranks eighth in the nation for the overall number of homes with telephones, about 97.3 percent. For subscribers with an annual income of less than \$10,000, the state ranks fourth-best at 95.2 percent.

Fadness said he believes the state has always ranked fairly high when it comes to telephone subscribers. But the low-income figure, he said, has definitely been affected by the Lifeline pro-

gram, which is also coordinated regionally through Community Action Partnership agencies. About 28,000 Idaho households participated in the program in 2008, out of a total of 618,000 local-access landlines and 984,500 local-access cell phones.

"I think Idaho just has had a good working relationship with the people at the CAP agencies and at (Health and Welfare) to get the word out," Fadness said.

The assistance program has benefitted people such

as Delores Bennett of Twin Falls, who has a cell phone through Syringa Wireless. A participant for nearly a year, Bennett chips in enough of her own money to afford long-distance service to talk to her daughter, who lives out of state.

"It's worked out really good for me," she said. "There were times when I would not have a phone if not for the help they give me."

The PUC released the FCC figures to celebrate "Lifeline Awareness Week,"

Sept. 14-20. According to FCC data from March, overall telephone subscribership nationwide is currently at its highest level — 95.6 percent — since the Census Bureau began collecting the information in November 1983. All 50 states and the District of Columbia have phones in at least 92 percent of homes.

roads, he said. The closures are designed to protect biological resources — a one-kilometer area around sage-grouse leks will be temporarily closed during nights in the spring — and reduce the risk of human-caused fires. Travel by foot or horseback will still be permitted.

Livestock producers have been especially concerned about maintaining access to the area. Carey rancher

Raymond Baird said ranchers were given promises when the Craters of the Moon area expanded under President Clinton's administration that there would be no effect on livestock use. But ranchers are finding it more and more difficult to continue operations, he said.

At one time, said Carey Mayor Rick Baird, 70,000 head of cattle and 20,000 sheep grazed the area with-

out seemingly doing any harm to the sage grouse he said. Today there are only 3,000 head of cattle there and "a lot less sheep."

Another sheep-permit holder, Rochelle Oxarango of Rupert and Soda Springs, shared similar concerns at a Wednesday meeting of the BLM's Twin Falls District Resource Advisory Council.

The RAC submitted its own comments approving of most of the plan while

asking for some areas to stay unchanged — members said access needs to be maintained to the scenic view at Higgins Butte, for example.

RAC Chairman Marc Brackett also told the *Times-News* that some of the distance restrictions between leks and producers may be too impractical.

"We have the concern that some of the language might be impossible to fulfill," he said.

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# Legislators talk affordable housing in Blaine County

HAILEY — In a year when budgets are on all minds, affordable housing may be near the top of household priority lists. For three state representatives, it's on the table for the upcoming legislative session.

Idaho Reps. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, Donna Pence, D-Gooding, and Phyllis King, D-Boise, met with Blaine County commissioners and representatives of affordable housing organizations, city officials and others Wednesday to outline priorities.

Among the issues discussed were:

- **Mortgage lending:** If a condo building is 50 percent or more rental, or 20 percent or more commercial, lending to lower-income buyers is hampered. Jaquet said representatives need to know more about whether federal or state laws, or simply lender policy, is behind this before it can be changed.

- **It flies in the face of planning trends, which is toward mixed-use,"** said Kathy Grotto, Blaine County Housing Authority executive administrator.

- **The 80 percent rule:** To qualify for Federal Housing Authority grant funds, potential homeowners must make less than 80 percent of the area median income, which varies dependent on household size. "We have people who are making more money but still can't afford

to buy a house," Jaquet said. Commissioner Larry Schoen said he would like to see more opportunities to create mixed affordability within the same development, but when they have been proposed, developers tend to build all the lots to the same affordability level.

- **Inclusionary zoning:** Although some ordinances related to inclusionary zoning have been overturned by courts in recent years, affordable housing advocates are still excited about the idea that developers be required to set aside a portion of new construction for less costly units.

Among alternatives suggested was offering incentives for developers to provide such housing, such as allowing greater density, higher structures or other incentives otherwise prohibited by design guidelines. This has worked in Sun Valley, said Sun Valley City Councilman Nils Ribi, describing 12 affordable units that were created by permitting extra stories in a multifamily structure.

"We don't get anywhere because 38 counties don't care," Schoen said, noting that the idea of inclusionary zoning isn't of interest statewide. Jaquet agreed, saying opposition from developers and realtors could nix a measure at the state level.

- **Impact fees:** Though state law currently restricts impact fees to apply to things like sewer, water and

police stations, there have been suggestions that they also apply to affordable housing and public transportation. Jaquet said the latter has been a nonstarter, but adding housing provisions may be possible.

Schoen argued that opposition against extending impact fees is shortsighted, as Idaho is not keeping up with the impact of development in many categories, including affordable housing.

"This is an economic development issue, reducing economic costs to taxpayers," he said. "That's the way it needs to be sold."

- **Tax forgiveness:** When nuclear processor Areva was looking at Idaho Falls as a location, one attraction was a law passed by the Legislature to offer tax forgiveness.

Jaquet said it may be possible to extend that law to other businesses if they provide benefits to the state, including affordable housing. It would work on a local level, she said, much like the local option taxes that the Wood River Valley already uses.

Another alternative might be tax credits for individuals or businesses that donate land to affordable housing organizations.

Ending the meeting, Jaquet said she'd move forward with as many of these issues as she could. "We have a big menu, but you have work to do too," she told the attendees.

# 'Mad Men,' '30 Rock' take top series Emmys

LOS ANGELES — "Mad Men" and "30 Rock" led a pack of Emmy winners who successfully defended their titles at Sunday's show, but the snappy ceremony and a star turn by host Neil Patrick Harris made the evening far from a rerun.

AMC's glossy 1960s Madison Avenue saga "Mad Men," which last year became the first basic cable show to win a top series award, won the best drama trophy for a second time.

"It is an amazing time to work in TV," said "Mad Men" creator Matthew Weiner. "And, I know that everything is changing, but I'm not afraid of it because I feel like all these different media is just more choice and more entertainment. It's better for the viewers in the end and I'm glad to be a part of it."

NBC's "30 Rock," a satirical take on life inside a TV variety show, was honored for the third time as best comedy series, while star Alec Baldwin won his second award as best comedy actor.

"We want to thank our friends at NBC for keeping us on the air ... even though we are so much more expensive than a talk show," said "30 Rock" creator and star Tina Fey, referring to Jay Leno's new daily prime-time comedy show, which NBC likes to note is cheaper to produce than a scripted series.

Baldwin, accepting his acting trophy for "30 Rock" from "Brothers & Sisters" star Rob Lowe, joked, "I'll be honest with you. I'd trade this to look like him."

Glenn Close's perform-

ance as a ruthless trial attorney on "Damages" and Bryan Cranston's turn as a meth-making, cancer-stricken teacher on "Breaking Bad" were honored with the top drama series acting Emmys, the second consecutive trophies for both.

"Oh my goodness," exclaimed Cranston. "I'm a poor kid from the valley. I don't know what I'm doing up here. I feel like Cinderella."

Close called it a "huge privilege" to be part of entertainment community, then tweaked her show's writers.

Her role is "maybe the character of my lifetime, depending on what they do this season," Close said.

Michael Emerson, who plays the cruelly devious Ben on "Lost," and Cherry Jones, the stalwart U.S. president on "24," were honored as best supporting actors in drama series.

"Wowza," Jones said. Emerson accepted his award for what he called "the role of my lifetime."

Toni Collette of Showtime's "United States of Tara" was honored as best lead actress in a comedy series for her role as a mother with multiple personalities.

"Wow, this is insanely confronting," said a beaming Collette. She thanked series creator Diablo Cody, the Oscar-winning screenwriter of "Juno."

Collette's victory deprived Fey of "30 Rock" of winning a second consecutive award in the category. But Fey took the stage a few moments later to acknowledge a guest actor award she received for her Sarah Palin impersonation on "Saturday Night Live."

Kristin Chenoweth of "Pushing Daisies" and Jon Cryer of "Two and a Half Men" won supporting acting Emmys for their comedies and proved that acceptance speeches can be entertaining.

"I'm not employed now so I'd like to be on 'Mad Men.' I also like 'The Office' and '24,'" said Chenoweth, alternating between tears and smiles as she accepted for her canceled ABC series. "Thank you so much to the academy for recognizing a show that's no longer on the air!"

Backstage, the Tony Award-winning Chenoweth noted that she is appearing on an upcoming episode of Fox's show "Glee," has shot two movies and is doing a series of concerts.

The Twin Falls City Council meeting and public hearing tonight includes an appeal from a business owner who wants to expand his property and the final plats of residential subdivisions.

The council will meet at 5 p.m. today in council chambers, 305 Third Ave. E.

The following items are on the agenda:

- The final plat for the Fieldstone 1st Amended Subdivision, a 1.7-acre subdivision with seven single-family residential lots and one tract on the east side of the 1300-1400 blocks of Fieldstone Way North.

- A request for a second one-year extension of the approval of the final plat of North Haven Subdivision, which consists of 21 lots on 29.1 acres at the northeast corner of Cheney Drive West and Park View Drive.

- The final plat of Canyon

Falls Subdivision, a four-lot, 2.5-acre subdivision on the 1800-1900 blocks of Harrison Street North.

- An amendment to the Bureau of Land Management helipad construction agreement that will include additional items costing \$64,000 to \$74,000.

- Five right-of-way agreements for the Falls Avenue West Road project.

There's also a 6 p.m. public hearing to hear an appeal. Burkes Tractor of Twin Falls is appealing one of the conditions of approval set by the Planning and Zoning Commission for a special use permit needed to add four acres to the site of Burkes Tractor.

The business site is currently about nine acres along Kimberly Road and the owner is appealing the paving requirements set by the commission as a condition for the special-use permit.

The land is intended to be used for displaying farm

equipment, according to city documents.

The original site plan shows a 30-foot paved area, which the city believes is not adequate considering the size of the equipment.

City staff believes a minimum of a 70-foot paved area is needed for maneuvering and displaying the equipment to follow city code, records show.

There also will be a hearing for input about new fees for Magic Valley Regional Airport.

The fee changes proposed are: For landing fees, up 16.67 percent from 90 cents per 1,000 pounds to \$1.05 per 1,000 pounds; fuel flowage fee up 16.67 percent from 6 cents a gallon to 7 cents a gallon; and aircraft rescue and firefighting fees up from \$55 and hour to \$60 an hour, 9 percent.

## Insane killer caught in Goldendale, Wash.

SEATTLE (AP) — An insane killer who slipped away from the staff of a mental institution on a field trip to the Spokane County International Fair was recaptured Sunday without injury more than 180 miles away in south-central Washington state.

With a helicopter overhead and dozens of federal, state and local law enforcement officers swarming around Goldendale, Phillip Arnold Paul, 47, seemed ready to surrender when he walked out to the Goldendale-Bickleton road about 22 miles east of town shortly after 4 p.m., just as search personnel arrived at the scene, Klickitat County Sheriff Rick McComas told The Associated Press.

Spokane County sheriff's Capt. Dave Reagan said Paul was preparing to hitchhike. But McComas said Paul offered no resistance as he turned himself in.

"He came out of the brush, onto the roadway, as law enforcement officers were going by," McComas said. "His intent was to voluntarily give himself up because he knew we were going to find him."

The sheriff said he didn't know how Paul reached the area, adding the information that he might be near-

by came from authorities in Spokane. Authorities have offered no clues as to what

Paul was doing in the Goldendale area or where he may have been headed.

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## Idaho officials fear job spiral with budget cuts

BOISE (AP) — Idaho officials say they are concerned about budget cuts that could curtail state jobs at the same time unemployment is being blamed as one reason for a state budget shortfall.

Idaho had fewer jobs in August of this year than it did in August 2005 despite adding 100,000 residents over that period.

"To me, that's a scary number," state budget director Wayne Hammon told The Spokesman Review. "We need jobs. A jobless recovery doesn't help balance the state's budget."

Most of Idaho's state tax revenue comes from individual income tax. About 40 percent comes from sales tax. When workers lose their jobs they no longer pay income tax and usually they reduce their purchases.

"We're 60,000 jobs less than we were two years ago," said state House Minority Leader John Ruche, D-Lewiston. "We talk about the budget shortfall, but that's the symptom. The disease is the

fact that people aren't working."

The Idaho Department of Financial Management report released earlier this month predicts state general fund revenue is on track to total \$151 million less than the \$2.5 billion budget approved by lawmakers earlier this year.

At the time, lawmakers had hoped their extensive budget-cutting and other austerity measures would leave the state with a \$49 million balance when fiscal year 2010 expires in June.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter responded by calling meetings with state department

heads and top Republican lawmakers to explore ways to make ends meet.

Last week, the state Board of Education directed Idaho colleges and universities to draft plans on how they would deal with a 4 percent or 6 percent holdback in spending.

Otter said a tax increase is not an option to deal with the shortfall.

Other possible options include making a deal with lawmakers to dip into the state's remaining \$274 million in reserves.

Otter has asked agency heads to turn in money-saving plans.

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## 2 Colorado men, 1 NYC man arrested in terror probe

AURORA, Colo. — The arrest of a Colorado airport shuttle driver as part of a terrorism investigation reveals a murky plot that involved him receiving explosives training with al-Qaida in Pakistan and downloading instructions on his computer on how to build bombs.

But one thing is missing — actual terrorism charges.

Najibullah Zazi was only charged with making false statements to the government, raising questions about the nature of the plot.

Zazi's defense team denied reports that he considered a plea deal related to terror charges, and Zazi's attorney, Arthur Folsom, has dismissed as rumor remarks by a senior U.S. intelligence official in Washington that Zazi played a crucial role in an intended terrorist attack.

"All of that hype and it comes down to charging him with lying to the government. It sounds disproportionate to the hype," Taj Ashaheed, Colorado Muslim Society spokesman, said at a festival for the end of Ramadan in the Denver suburb of Aurora.

Wendy Aiello, a spokeswoman for Zazi's defense team, didn't immediately return a call Sunday seeking comment on the charges.

Zazi, who lives in an apartment in the Denver suburb of Aurora, was arrested late Saturday after three days of questioning by the FBI. He was due to appear in federal court Monday.

Also arrested were Zazi's father, Mohammed Wali Zazi, 53, in Denver; and an associate, Ahmad Wais Afzali, 37, of New York City, the Justice Department said. Both also were charged with making false statements to

federal agents, which carries a penalty of eight years in prison. Court appearances for both also were set Monday.

Carl Tobias, a law professor at the University of Richmond who has been tracking terrorist investigations around the country, said authorities could have made the arrests now because they feared too much information was get-

ting out to the suspects. Additional charges could be filed later, he said.

In supporting documents filed with the court, investigators say Zazi admitted to FBI agents last week that in 2008 he received weapons and explosives training from al-Qaida in the federally administered tribal areas of Pakistan.

The investigation escalated after Zazi rented a car and

drove from Denver to New York, crossing into Manhattan on Sept. 10. Zazi said he went to New York to resolve some issues with a coffee cart he owns in Manhattan, then flew home to Denver. The FBI searched Zazi's rental car and laptop during the New York trip and listened in on telephone conversations, according to the affidavits.

On his laptop, investigators found images of nine pages of handwritten notes containing formulas and instructions for making bombs, detonators and a fuse, the FBI said.

Zazi told the FBI he must have unintentionally downloaded the notes as part of a religious book he downloaded in August. Zazi said he immediately deleted the religious book within days of downloading it after realizing that its contents discussed jihad.

## 5 children, woman found dead in Florida apartment

NAPLES, Fla. (AP) — Five young children and their mother were found dead in a Florida apartment, and authorities were searching Sunday for the woman's husband, who had left the country.

Mesac Damas, 33, boarded a flight to Haiti from Miami International Airport on Friday, said Collier County Sheriff's Office spokeswoman Michelle Batten. Damas has family from Haiti, she said. Sheriff's officials said they want to talk to Damas, who is a person of interest.

Haitian police spokesman Frantz Lerebours could not immediately be reached for comment. A message was also left with the FBI.

The victims were identified as Guerline Damas, 32, and her children: Michzach, 9; Marven, 6; Maven, 5; Megan, 3; and 11-month-old Morgan. Batten would not say how they died.

Family members contacted authorities Thursday saying they hadn't heard from the mother. A missing person report was filed the next day, and on Saturday, the sheriff's office entered the home in a gated community in Naples and found the bodies, Batten said.

## Obama: Afghan troops decision can wait

WASHINGTON — President Obama says he hasn't asked his top commander in Afghanistan to sit on an expected request for U.S. reinforcements in a backsliding war, but he gave no deadline for making a decision about whether to send more Americans into harm's way.

Obama said in a series of television interviews broadcast Sunday that he will not allow politics to govern his decision. He left little doubt he is re-evaluating whether the renewed focus on hunting al-Qaida that he announced just months ago has become blurred and whether more forces will do any good.

"The first question is, 'Are we doing the right thing?'" Obama said. "Are we pursuing the right strategy?"

The war has taken on a highly partisan edge. Senate Republicans are demanding an influx of forces to turn around a war that soon will enter its ninth year, while members of Obama's own party are trying to put on the brakes.

"No, no, no, no," Obama responded when asked whether he or aides had directed Gen. Stanley McChrystal to temporarily withhold a request for additional U.S. forces and other resources.

"The only thing I've said to my folks is, 'A, I want an unvarnished assessment, but, B, I don't want to put the resource question before the strategy question,'" Obama said. "Because there is a natural inclination to say, 'If I get more, then I can do more.'"

Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, told Congress last week he expected McChrystal's request for additional forces and other resources "in the very near future."

Other military officials had said the request would

go to McChrystal's boss, Gen. David Petraeus, and up the chain of command in a matter of weeks. The White House discounted that timeline, but has remained vague about how long it would take to receive the report and act on it.

Media reports Friday and Saturday said McChrystal has finished it but was told to pocket it, partly because of the charged politics surrounding the decision. McChrystal's senior spokesman, Rear Adm. Gregory Smith, told The Associated Press on Sunday that the report is

not complete.

"The resource request is being finalized and will be sent forward to the chain of command at some point in the near future," Smith said from Afghanistan.

McChrystal found security worse than he expected when he took command this summer to lead what Obama described as a narrowed, intensive campaign to uproot al-Qaida and prevent the terrorist group from again using Afghanistan as a safe haven.

In the interviews taped Friday at the White House, Obama mentioned con-

cerns about the "mission creep" that befell former President George W. Bush's attempt to build and prop up a viable democratic government in a country unaccustomed to central rule and sensitive to foreign meddling.

Obama said he's asking this question now of the military regarding his plan: "How does this advance America's national security interests? How does it make sure that al-Qaida and its extremist allies cannot attack the United States homeland, our allies, our troops who are based in Europe?"

"If supporting the Afghan national government and building capacity for their army and securing certain provinces advances that strategy, then we'll move forward," the president continued. "But if it doesn't, then I'm not interested in just being in Afghanistan for the sake of being in Afghanistan or saving face or, in some way, you know, sending a message that America is here for the duration."

Obama has ordered 21,000 more troops to Afghanistan, increasing the number of U.S. forces there to a record 68,000, and watched as Marines pushed deep into Taliban-controlled districts ahead of Friday at the White House, Obama mentioned con-

## Report: 35 million-plus worldwide have dementia

WASHINGTON — More than 35 million people around the world are living with Alzheimer's disease or other types of dementia, says the most in-depth attempt yet to assess the brain-destroying illness — and it's an ominous forecast as the population grays.

The new count is about 10 percent higher than what scientists had predicted just a few years ago, because earlier research underestimated Alzheimer's growing impact in developing countries.

Barring a medical breakthrough, the World Alzheimer Report projects dementia will nearly double every 20 years. By 2050, it will affect a staggering 115.4 million people, the report concludes.

"We are facing an emergency," said Dr. Daisy

Acosta, who heads Alzheimer's Disease International, which released the report Monday.

The U.S. and other developed countries long have been bracing for Alzheimer's to skyrocket. But the report aims to raise awareness of the threat in poorer countries, where finally people are living long enough to face what is mostly a disease of the 65-and-older population.

While age is the biggest driver of Alzheimer's, some of the same factors that trigger heart disease — obesity, high cholesterol, diabetes — seem to increase the risk of dementia, too. Those are problems also on the rise in many developing countries.

In poorer countries, "dementia is a hidden issue," Acosta said, and that's complicating efforts to improve earlier diagnosis. "You're not supposed to

talk about it."

For example, the report notes that in India, such terms such as "tired brain" or "weak brain" are used for Alzheimer's symptoms amid widespread belief that dementia is a normal part of aging — when it's not.

That mistake isn't confined to the developing world. Even in Britain, the report found, just over half of the families caring for someone with dementia believed the same thing.

The new study updates global figures last reported in 2005, when British researchers estimated that more than 24 million people were living with dementia. Using that forecast, scientists had expected about 31 million people would be struggling with dementia by 2010.

But since 2005, a flurry of research on Alzheimer's in developing countries has

been published, leading Alzheimer's Disease International — a nonprofit federation of more than 70 national groups — to ask those scientists to re-evaluate. After analyzing dozens of studies, the scientists projected 35.6 million cases of dementia worldwide by 2010.

That includes nearly 7 million people in Western Europe, nearly 7 million in South and Southeast Asia, about 5.5 million in China and East Asia and about 3 million in Latin America.

The report puts North America's total at 4.4 million, although the Alzheimer's Association of the U.S. uses a less conservative count to say more than 5 million people in this country alone are affected. The disease afflicts one in eight people 65 and older, and nearly one in two people over 85.

## Obama favors investigation into ACORN's activities

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Obama says there should be an investigation into the hidden-camera video involving employees at the activist group ACORN and a couple posing as a prostitute and her pimp.

The two ACORN workers are seen apparently advising the couple to lie about her profession and launder her earnings to get housing aid.

The video is only the latest problem for the group, which

had nearly \$1 million embezzled by its founder's brother and has been accused of voter registration fraud. The House and Senate voted last week to deny federal funds to ACORN.

Obama told ABC's "This Week" in an interview broadcast Sunday that what he saw on the video "was certainly inappropriate and deserves to be investigated." But the president did not say who should investigate. And he

said it is not a major national issue he pays much attention to.

"Frankly, it's not really something I've followed closely," Obama said. "I didn't even know that ACORN was getting a whole lot of federal money."

Asked about the president calling for an investigation, ACORN chief executive Bertha Lewis said Sunday, "Well, that's his opinion." ACORN said last week it

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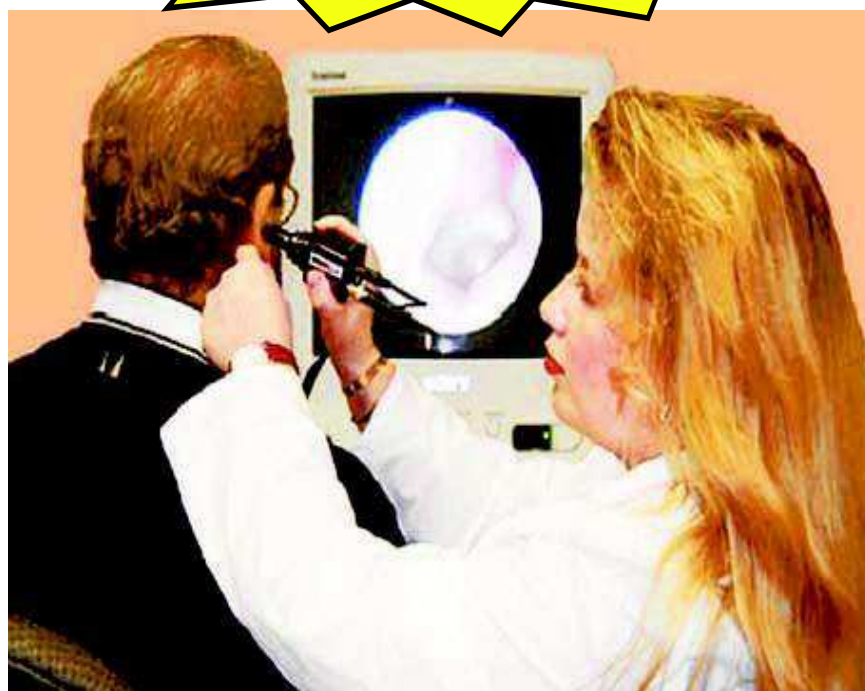

# 49ers lead NFC West at Seahawks expense

SAN FRANCISCO — Frank Gore's spectacular day single-handedly re-established the run game for San Francisco.

Gore had touchdown runs of 79 and a career-best 80 yards and finished with 207 yards on 16 carries, and the 49ers beat the Seattle Seahawks 23-10 to take an early hold atop the NFC West standings.

Gore, who surpassed San Francisco's Week 1 rushing total of 21 yards in the first series, nearly reached his franchise mark of 212 yards set in 2006 before leaving the game in the fourth quarter with a sprained right ankle that didn't appear serious. He became only the second player in NFL history to have two TD runs of 79 or more yards in the same game, joining Barry Sanders. Sanders had runs of 80 and 82 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1997.

Seattle (1-1), coming off a 28-0 season-opening win at St. Louis, took a big blow losing quarterback Matt Hasselbeck to a rib injury just before halftime following a hard hit near the goal line by Patrick Willis. Hasselbeck didn't return after completing 10 of 18 passes for 97 yards and no touchdowns.

Gore also posted just the third 200-yard rushing game in team history. Charlie Garner ran for 201 yards at Dallas on Sept. 24, 2000. Gore had his 212-yard day Nov. 19, 2006, also at Candlestick Park against Seattle. His 246 total yards from scrimmage Sunday

was a career high, topping the 238 he had in that '06 game with the Seahawks.

Joe Nedney kicked field goals of 37, 42 and 39 yards for the 49ers. Coach Mike Singletary's team is off to a 2-0 start after he demanded that his players perform better this week and find their identity as a running team. San Francisco won at defending NFC champion Arizona in Week 1.

The 49ers' defense was dominant again this week, handing former 49ers defensive coordinator Jim Mora his first loss since taking over this season for Mike Holmgren.

What a difference from Singletary's debut at Candlestick Park last October, when he took over for the fired Mike Nolan. San Francisco lost to the Seahawks in a game in which he benched quarterback J.T. O'Sullivan in favor of Shaun Hill, pulled his pants down at halftime to make a point and sent volatile tight end Vernon Davis to the showers early after a personal foul penalty.

Hill was 19 for 26 for 144 yards with no TDs or interceptions and was sacked four times. He improved to 6-0 as a starter at Candlestick and 9-3 overall as an NFL starter. His job was easy: give the ball to Gore.

Gore, who had just 30 yards on 22 carries in the win over the Cardinals, had averaged 76 yards against Seattle in the previous four meetings since his Pro Bowl 2006 season. He ran for 144 yards in the other '06 game versus Seattle.

## BSU lands in single digits, BYU tumbles in AP poll

NEW YORK — Boise State University moved up two spots to No. 8 in The Associated Press college football poll released Sunday.

Boise State beat Fresno State 51-34 on Friday and plays at Bowling Green on Saturday.

BYU dropped out of the top 10 this week, falling from seventh to 19th after a 54-28 home loss to Florida State. Utah, which had its 16-game win streak snapped by Oregon, fell out of the poll altogether.

BYU's loss makes Boise State the highest ranked team from a non-BCS conference. Southern California dropped nine spots and out of the top 10.

A day after the Huskies upset the Trojans 16-13 on a late field goal, USC fell from No. 3 to No. 12 in the media poll.

The Trojans became the second preseason top-five team to lose in the first three weeks of the season. Preseason No. 3 Oklahoma lost its opener to BYU.

Washington, ranked for the first time since Sept. 28, 2003, is No. 24.

Miami is in the top 10 for first time since the final regular-season poll of the 2005 season. The Hurricanes play at No. 11 Virginia Tech on Saturday in a huge Atlantic Coast Conference game.

Since Nov. 3, 2002, Pete Carroll's second season at USC, the Trojans have spent only six weeks out of the top 10 — all in 2007 following an early October home loss to 40-point underdog Stanford.

Washington finished that 2003 season 6-5 and hasn't had a winning season since. The Huskies hit rock bottom last season, becoming the first Pac-10 team to go 0-12.

Jake Locker and the Huskies snapped a 15-game losing streak last week with a 42-23 victory against Idaho, but beating the Vandals could hardly be viewed as a sign that Washington was ready to defeat USC for the first time since 2001.

## Jay Haas wins second Greater Hickory Classic

CONOVER, N.C. — Jay Haas has won plenty of times on the Champions Tour.

This one may leave quite an impression.

Haas overcame a slow start to shoot a 7-under 65 on Sunday, setting a tournament record while winning his second Greater Hickory Classic by two shots over Russ Cochran and Andy Bean.

Haas, who also won the event in 2005, finished at 18-under 198 at Rock Barn Golf and Spa's Robert Trent Jones course. His three-day total broke the tournament mark by one shot, set by R.W. Eaks in 2007.

It also made the 13-time winner on the 50-and-over tour the second repeat winner in the tournament's seven-year history. Eaks won back-to-back titles in 2007 and '08.

"I didn't see this coming, certainly not a couple weeks ago," said Haas, who had been receiving treatment for tendonitis in his right elbow, which kept him off the tour for a month.

"A couple weeks ago, I just didn't know what was going to happen. I didn't know if my shot was going to work," he said. "But today, it felt great — no pain at all."

Haas and Price, who were tied for the lead at 11-under after Saturday's round, both got off to slow starts Sunday. Haas

didn't get his first birdie until the fifth hole and tacked on a second on No. 7, while Price bogeyed his first two holes to fall two strokes behind.

That opened the door for Cochran, who had earned provisional qualifying status on the Champions Tour at the start of the season, and earned exempt status after a third-place finish at the U.S. Senior Open.

Making just his 11th start, Cochran made four birdies on the front nine, the last two tying him for the lead. He then birdied No. 12 to pull ahead, and tacked on another birdie on No. 13.

Haas, who shot a 10-under 62 on Friday, assumed command of the tour-

nament with birdies on five of the last six holes.

SAN DIEGO — Na Yeon Choi blew her best chance for the first LPGA Tour win of her career.

Her second chance worked out just fine.

After losing a seven-stroke lead Sunday, the South Korean rallied to shoot 1-under 71 Sunday to win the Samsung World Championship on the 18th hole.

Choi finished at 16-under 272 and held off runner-up Ai Miyazato of Japan, who shot a 69, the low round of the day at Torrey Pines.

## A touch of Evel: Coming soon, access to Knievel jump site

**W**hat's the buzz at The Buzz? Visitors at the Buzz Langdon Visitors Center on the rim of the Snake River Canyon want primarily to know two things: Where's Shoshone Falls, and where's the ramp from which Evel Knievel launched his ill-fated attempt to jump the Snake River Canyon on Sept. 8, 1974?

The latter will soon be much easier to answer. The Twin Falls City Council last week agreed to make technical changes to an agreement designed to allow the city to receive property that includes the Knievel jump site.

The 7-0 decision pertains to a 2007 deal the city struck with Casper Southgate LLC, in which the Twin Falls would trade nearly seven acres for land that includes the jump site and nearby land for parking and access to Hankins Road. The developer would also build the city a paved access road through his proposed subdivision to the city's police gun range.

Since then Casper Southgate LLC sold its land to Renaissance Development LLC, which plans to develop the subdivision. The council agreed to allow the subdivision to be developed in multiple phases and to change limitations for who can use the access road to the police gun range.

The changes were needed in order for the city to continue efforts to open access along the Snake River and allow people to visit the dirt ramp Knievel used 35 years ago.

Twin Falls has long sought to make it available for tourism. Although there's now a provision for access by vehicles, we hope this will remain primarily a pedestrian site — and a jewel in the crown of the city's remarkable canyonside trails system.

Arguably, that network is the city's greatest man-made asset. From Federation Point to the Knievel jump site, it will draw tourists and local alike. Eventually, the system will link up with a trail coming out of Rock Creek Canyon.

Question is, how should the city mark the actual jump site?

A monument of some kind is in order. Perhaps it could be the latest piece of public art to grace the canyon rim.

Shoot, maybe we could even bring back the Knievel “tombstone” carved locally for the daredevil before the jump attempt in 1974 and shipped to Butte, Mont., after his death in 2007.

## Teachers – even great teachers – aren't miracle-workers

**I**t seems so simple and fair. Because teachers are hired to teach, let's evaluate them on the basis of student performance. After all, employees in other fields are rated on their ability to perform their designated tasks. When teachers resist being similarly judged, therefore, they clearly are trying to evade accountability.



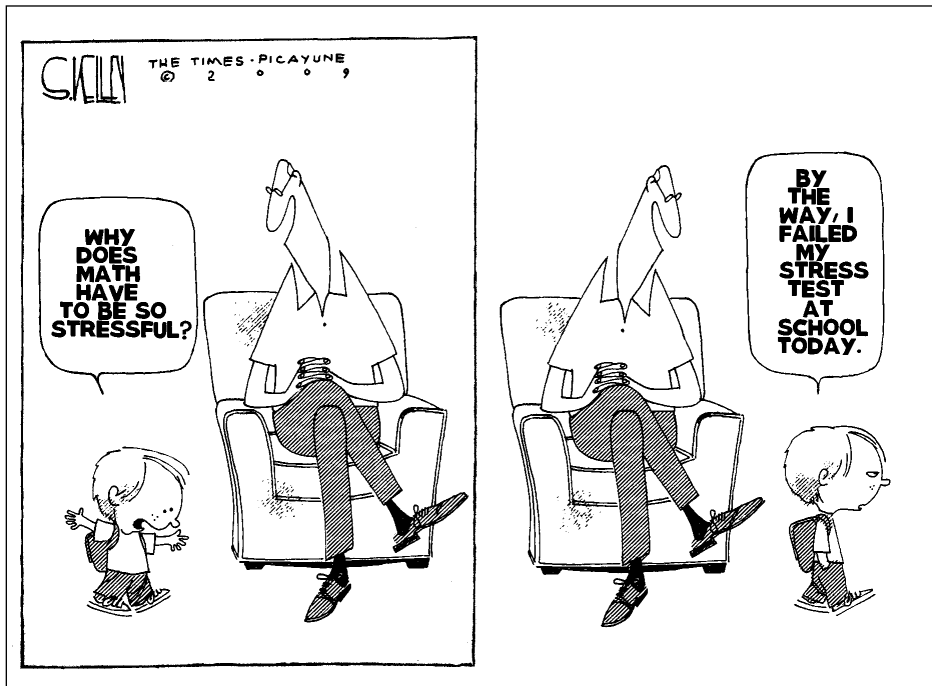

At least that's the common perception in the debate over the U.S. Department of Education's \$4-billion “Race to the Top” fund. California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and the state's Legislature are weighing whether to change a 2006 law to allow this performance/evaluation linkage so the state can qualify for some of this money.

But before jumping to conclusions, taxpayers need to read the fine print that lays out the rules for the distribution of these funds in what is the federal government's greatest involvement in education reform in our history. To be labeled effective, teachers have to demonstrate that their students achieve “acceptable rates” of growth in an academic year.

It's precisely in the 5,000 chronically failing public schools targeted by the initiative that this particular mandate needs to be debated most openly. These schools are almost always located in inner cities and in rural areas. They are overwhelmingly populated by poor students who come from chaotic backgrounds.

When teachers inherit classroom after classroom of these students year after year, it's extremely difficult to focus on instruction.



That's because of the powerful effect of out-of-school factors on learning. Too many poor students go to school each day without a nutritious breakfast, without sufficient sleep and without parents who are involved in their education. As a result, teachers are forced to perform triage rather than teach.

This bleak situation has long existed, but the recession has increased the number of students who are homeless and who have lost access to health care. About 1.6 million people, including 340,000 children, were homeless across the nation before the recession began, according to the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities. With unemployment on the rise, the situation will only get worse.

This outlook directly affects learning because the rate at which people move from place to place causes problems similar to those created by non-attendance. In 2008, about 6.5 percent of all children lived in their current residence for fewer than six months. For poor children, however, the rate was 10 percent, according to the Partnership for America's Economic Success.

It's not surprising, therefore, that most teachers are vehemently opposed to the demands of Race to the Top to link their evaluations to progress on standardized test scores, which in turn forms the basis for determining if students have advanced one grade level per school year.

Some argue that this position is merely an excuse. They cite the examples of schools that serve large numbers of students who qualify for free lunches because of their parents' income and yet have boosted standardized test scores. If they can do it, why can't all schools follow suit?

These schools certainly deserve high praise. But their success is neither sustainable nor achievable for the nation's 90,000 public schools serving 50 million students.

Heroic efforts extract too steep a price from teachers to form the basis of education reform. This is seen in the burnout in schools with a disproportionate number of needy students. At the Knowledge Is Power Program schools, for example, teachers are expected to teach every other Saturday and for three weeks during the summer in addition to

their typical 10-hour days. How long can they maintain this schedule?

The potential for high teacher turnover already exists in public schools. Each year, U.S. school districts hire more than 200,000 new teachers for the first day of class. But by the time summer rolls around, 22,000 have quit, according to the National Center for Education Statistics.

For students attending the failing schools that are the principal focus of Race to the Top, even the best of the nation's teachers will not be able to overcome the huge deficits in socialization, motivation and intellectual development they bring to class through no fault of their own.

The sooner we disabuse ourselves of the notion that teachers are miracle workers, the sooner we can address the fundamental causes of student failure.

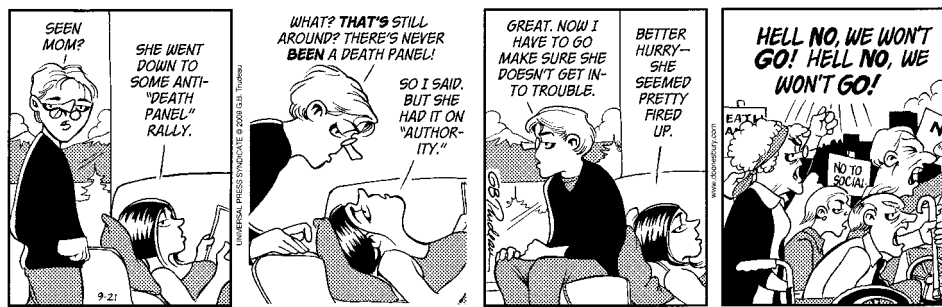

## ... ending liquor license quotas

Idaho Statesman, Boise

The state really has no business being in the business of rationing liquor licenses. And now, unfortunately, taxpayers will pick up the legal tab for defending this antiquated and pointless practice.

One license holder, Daniel Fuchs, has sued the Idaho State Police, which administers the state's license system.

Fuchs isn't a sympathetic character; he's a speculator in a ginned-up government market. Still, he raises a legitimate beef.

The Twin Falls pharmacy manager snapped up liquor licenses across the state, in hopes of flipping the licenses for fast money. He knew all the angles, permissible under state law.

He and his brothers opened up small bars in Nampa so they could legally sell off his liquor licenses. He sold one license for more than \$60,000.

Fuchs also bided his time. He gobbled up spots on waiting lists for these lucrative licenses. According to a state law ... a city can award one license per 1,500 residents. In this case, time and municipal growth were both on Fuchs' side.

However, the state changed the rules in 2007, in a halfhearted attempt to dry up the flow of profits for speculators. Now, applicants can no longer hold multiple spots on a city's waiting list. Fuchs lost 16 spots on waiting lists and was reimbursed \$5,175 in fees — a fraction of what a single license can be worth.

It isn't easy to feel sorry for Fuchs, since he signed up on spec. But his lawsuit points up problems with the state's liquor license law.

The quota system is a farce. Designed to promote temperance, the system instead created an artificial scarcity of liquor licenses ...

... earlier this year, the House rejected a bill — passed by the Senate and endorsed by Gov. Butch Otter — that would have gotten rid of the quota system entirely.

Trotting out the same old justifications about temperance, the House refused to allow cities local control over liquor licenses. They also kept the state in the ... business of profiting from



liquor license transfers (when someone ... sells off a liquor license, Idaho gets a 10 percent cut on the deal).

It's past time for lawmakers to get rid of this quota system, once and for all ...

## ... time to raise taxes?

Six years ago, then-Gov. Dirk Kempthorne decided he didn't want to preside over the dismantling of Idaho's schools and other government programs.

He persuaded a reluctant Legislature to raise the sales tax — temporarily — in the middle of a recession.

The same choice now confronts (Gov.) C.L. "Butch" Otter, and the new crop of legislators.

Last week, Otter's budget office concluded tax revenues would fall \$173 million short — or 7 percent less than lawmakers thought they'd have. Coming on the heels of last year's \$440 million cuts, this marks the first back-to-back loss in Idaho's history.

It could get worse ... Unemployment continues to rise, so wages — which fuel income taxes — and consumer spending — which yields sales taxes — could be depressed further.

We've run out of time. We can't grow our way out of this. Idaho has \$274 million in reserves. It won't be enough ...

There isn't enough fat in state government to avoid cutting into the muscle. If a tax increase of some kind isn't on the table, then dismantling Idaho's schools, universities, security and social safety net is the only option.

At any point when this demolition operation becomes unbearable to you, speak up. Possibly, Boise will listen.

## ... lean budgets build character

The recent news that state tax revenue is projected to come in about \$173 million below already-conservative estimates underscores the wisdom of Gov.

Butch Otter and lawmakers in putting together a bare-bones budget for the 2010 fiscal year.

Decisions in the spring's legislative session to retain millions of dollars in "rainy day" reserve accounts drew criticism from some who said more funding should be released to aid schools and human services. But Otter and lawmakers held firm in their beliefs that the economic downturn could last awhile and that those reserve accounts might be needed to help the 2011 and 2012 budgets as well.

Last year, Otter responded to the economic downturn by asking state agency heads to slash \$130 million, or 4 percent, from spending in the final six months of fiscal year 2009.

Lawmakers trimmed spending and crafted a budget that cut spending by another 8.6 percent. Cuts to agency budgets and programs and transfers from savings accounts would have been deeper if not for the \$1.1 billion the state received in federal stimulus cash.

... the state is on track for a \$151 million shortfall in the \$2.5 billion spending plan for the 2010 fiscal year, which started July 1. (This month), the governor asked agency heads to look for ways to cut even deeper. Those recommendations (were) due (Friday).

The outcome: Some public services have not and will not be provided.

Although unpleasant, these steps are critical to keep the state's spending in check. Just as families have had to cut back to make ends meet, so does state government.

Idaho remains among the states with the highest foreclosure rates in the nation. (This month), Dell announced it would close a Twin Falls call center that employs 500 workers. Small businesses continue to face tough times. These factors and others all indicate that tax collections will continue to take a beating ...

... it could take many months or even years for state tax revenue to reach pre-2008 levels. The state is in a better position to weather that storm because of decisions the governor and lawmakers have made.

## Remember immigration reform? It's coming back

The chances of building a sane immigration system seemed unlikely enough in 2007 before they were squashed by divisions among Democrats and a talk radio-fueled revolt on the right. If anything, they look even worse now, given the competing debates

over health care and energy, a jobless rate edging toward 10 percent, and a plateau or decline in the number of illegal immigrants in the country.

All that seems to have sapped the immigration debate of its urgency, while leaving intact its potential to enrage conservatives — as we were reminded by Rep. Joe Wilson's dyspeptic outburst and the subsequent chorus of "You go, Joe" from his constituents in South Carolina.

But Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., is drafting legislation to overhaul immigration, and President Obama says he intends to make a fresh push on the issue next year. That may not be as crazy as it sounds.

It's not that the anemic U.S. economy is going to take the problem off the politicians' hands. Despite high unemployment and sluggish growth here, the Mexican economy is in far worse straits: It is expected to shrink by 7 percent this year, much more than the U.S. economy, and both the tourism and oil industries — mainstays of Mexico's economy — are in bad shape. The main factors that have prompted millions of Mexicans to leave home for decades are going strong.

But the recession, coupled with tougher enforcement, has slowed the flow of Mexicans, by far the largest chunk of undocumented immigrants, who cross into this country. And — depending on which numbers you believe — it may also have prompted those already here to go home in greater numbers. The total number of illegal immigrants in the country has either leveled off at around 11 million or 12 million or declined somewhat.

That's one reason the politics may have shifted. Another is that the immigration issue, despite being red meat for some conservatives, has mostly been an electoral bust for the right. In 20 of 22 competitive House and Senate races last November, the candidates favoring broader immigration reform — generally Democrats — defeated their harder-line opponents, according to an analysis by America's Voice, a pro-reform group.

Those results, which followed similar outcomes in the 2006 congressional elections, should give centrist and swing-state Democrats some assurance that a vote for a

sensible immigration policy is not a career-ender.

The Obama administration has also been smart to expand the E-Verify system, which forces employers to confirm that new hires are authorized to work here, and to press ahead with the federal program to deputize local police to help deport unauthorized immigrants. Those steps provide a basis for the president and fence-sitters in his own party to argue that the administra-

tion has been serious about enforcing existing law.

Some moderate Republicans will also have noticed the mounting long-term folly of continuing to oppose issues that matter to Hispanic voters, the single fastest-growing segment of the electorate. That constituency, which was critical in helping Democrats win four swing states in 2008 — Florida, New Mexico, Nevada and Colorado — has grim memories of the immigrant-bashing rhetoric of state and local Republicans. And it has been badly hurt by a recession that took hold during the Bush administration: Income for Hispanic households fell by 5.6 percent in 2008 compared with the previous year, a rate of decline twice that of African-Americans.

If Republicans hope to reverse what could be a generational shift of Hispanic voters to the Democrats, they won't get there by bashing whatever immigration reform legislation emerges in the Senate.

Moderates, at least, will have to rebrand themselves, and immigration reform is a perfect opportunity.

There is room for reframing and repackaging the immigration debate so that it does not become a replay of the Bush administration's failed attempts of 2006 and 2007. But to be successful in reshaping the country's dysfunctional system, any legislation needs to recognize economic realities: that millions of immigrant workers are here to stay; that many or most do jobs that native-born Americans don't want; and that Mexico's comparative poverty will continue to drive immigrants north to a better life.

Recession or no recession, a comprehensive reform bill must provide a way out of this mess born of neglect by offering a path to legality for undocumented immigrants already here and a mechanism for future workers, skilled and unskilled, to enter the country in adequate numbers to meet the job market's demands.

## Government plan will get passed on to us

This is stupid; employers are currently able to deduct the cost of health insurance for employees and they do not have to pay all of the other hidden costs that are attached to employees' earnings. If an employee were to pay \$600 per month for health insurance premiums, he would have to earn (25 percent tax bracket) \$800 to have the same take-home pay. When an employer pays an employee \$800 additional salary, he also has to pay withholding tax, unemployment tax, etc. About 40 percent additional or about \$320. That means the real cost to an employer for giving an employee an \$800 raise is about \$1,132. If an employer pays the health insurance premium for his employee, the savings are at about 47 percent. I know that most health insurance programs are more expensive than \$600 per month, but I think that anyone can understand the concept.

Another thing is that most insurance companies are not ripping the public off. Their premiums are mandated to cover their costs, and to make a reasonable profit for their

investors. The real problem lies in two places: first, government mandates requiring coverage for unnecessary procedures; second, hospitals charging the insured high room rates, etc., to make up for the people who do not pay (particularly illegal aliens). When the medical people have to charge insured people more to make up for those people who don't pay, then insurance companies

have to charge more to cover these charges. If the latest government proposal goes through and insurance companies have to pay an additional 35 percent tax, it will be passed on to the insured and premiums will go up. In fact, this will cause a lot of employers and individuals to drop their plans, thus we end up with socialized medicine.

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# Obama has tough task in renewing Mideast talks

JERUSALEM — Barack Obama will try to get Mideast peacemaking back on track this week in a meeting with the Israeli and Palestinian leaders, hoping the weight of the U.S. presidency can resolve a show-down over Israeli settlement construction and get the sides talking again after months of deadlock.

For Obama, it's high-stakes diplomacy that relies on resolving the Israeli-Palestinian conflict as key to cracking other world problems. He'll be bringing Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas together in New York on Tuesday for their first encounter since Netanyahu took office in March.

Obama faces a tough task. The Israelis and Palestinians have dug in deep to positions that have eluded compromise, despite multiple visits by Washington's special U.S. envoy. Deep divisions among the Palestinians further complicate the process. And it's far from clear whether there is enough common ground between the hawkish Netanyahu and the weakened Abbas.

The Palestinians hope to build a state in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, with east Jerusalem as its capital. Israel captured those territories in 1967. While Israel pulled out of Gaza in 2005, Netanyahu has given little indication that he is ready to make territorial compromises in the West Bank and east Jerusalem that would be crucial to reaching an accord.

After the meeting was announced Saturday, Netanyahu's office said he "warmly accepts" the invitation. A senior Israeli official said the meetings in New York were meant to lay the groundwork for negotiations but would not constitute a relaunch of talks.

He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to articulate government policy

on the record.

Chief Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erekat said the Palestinians "felt the intervention of President Obama is a good sign, a sign of commitment on the part of the president."

He said they would talk about "obligations and commitments" and that the Palestinians "believe this (the trilateral meeting) is an opportunity."

Talks on the Palestinian side are being handled by Abbas and his moderate Palestinian Authority. The Islamic militant Hamas group that overran Gaza in 2007 is not a party to the negotiation process.

In Gaza on Sunday, Hamas Prime Minister Ismail Haniyeh castigated the new U.S. administration and said he wouldn't recognize any accord.

"Any signature will be invalid, and it won't bind the Palestinian people to anything," he said in a sermon in Gaza City at the start of the Muslim Eid al-Fitr holiday.

Obama is eager to mend relations with the Muslim world, which frayed badly over the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks and the U.S.-led wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. He knows Washington's close alliance with Israel goes to the heart of Muslim anger toward the West.

With this in mind, Obama has put heavy pressure on Israel to halt construction of settlements in the West Bank and east Jerusalem. Netanyahu has said he will slow construction, but refused to accept an absolute freeze.

While the tough stance toward Israel has been welcomed in the Arab world, it also appears to have raised Palestinian expectations. Should Obama fail to wring significant concessions from Israel, his credibility could suffer among Muslims and Arabs.

His public spat with Israel over the settlements has also strained relations with the Jewish state, where many wonder whether Obama is as committed to their safety as previous U.S. leaders were.

## Medvedev: Israel not planning Iran strike

MOSCOW — Russian President Dmitry Medvedev says Israeli officials have assured him that they are not planning a military strike on Iran.

In an interview with CNN television broadcast Sunday, Medvedev also confirmed that Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu made a secret visit to Moscow this month that included a meeting with the Russian president.

In a transcript of the interview released by the Kremlin, Medvedev hedges on the question of whether Russia would support Iran if it were attacked by Israel.

Although Russia has no defense agreement with Iran "this does not mean we would like to be or will be indifferent to such an occurrence. This is the worst thing that can be imagined," Medvedev said of a potential Israeli strike.

"What would happen after that? Humanitarian disaster, a vast number of refugees, Iran's wish to take revenge — and not only upon Israel, to be honest, but upon other countries as well?"

"But my Israeli colleagues told me they were not planning to act in this way, and I trust them," Medvedev said.

It was not clear whether those referred to included Netanyahu. In a CNN clip played on Israeli TV and

dubbed in English, Medvedev refers to Israeli President Shimon Peres as the source of the assurances.

"In one hour I will talk with the president of Israel, Mr. Peres, who when recently visiting me he told me a very important thing to all of us. He said Israel doesn't intend to deliver any strike against Iran. He said, 'We are a peaceful country.'"

Netanyahu spokesman Mark Regev refused to comment Sunday on whether the Israeli premier had given any such assurance to Medvedev, or to confirm that Netanyahu ever made the Moscow trip. Medvedev gave the first confirmation from the Russian side that the meeting with Netanyahu had taken place.

Netanyahu was absent from public view in Israel for most of the day on Sept. 7. His office said he had visited a secret security facility, but there was widespread speculation that he had gone to Russia — either to pressure Moscow not to deliver S-300 air-defense missiles to Iran or to inform the Kremlin of attack plans.

"Prime Minister Netanyahu came to Moscow. He did this under a closed regime, this was his decision. I don't understand what this was connected with, but sometimes our partners decide it this way," Medvedev said. He did not give details of the meeting.

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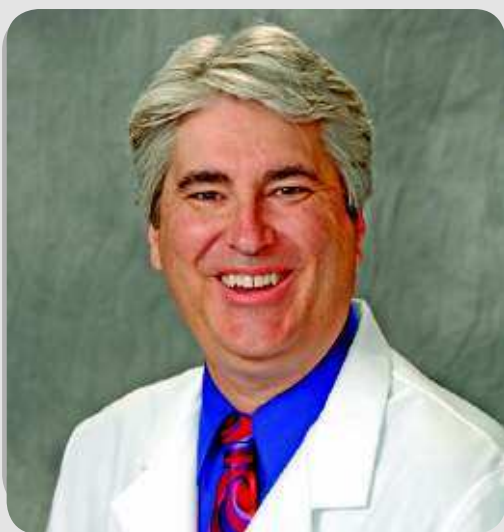

## A belly dance troupe with wrinkles

**T**he women know they're older than most who perform. They have more wrinkles and gray hairs than the other dancers. They see the smirks in the crowd when they get on stage and forget a move.

But they're not there for the audience.

The five women, ranging in age from 50 to 70, make up Twin Falls-based belly dance troupe Afsana. Although they started dancing for different reasons, they stay for the exercise, self-confidence and camaraderie.

In many ways, they're identical to other dance troupes. Their music lineup includes Shakira, ABBA and traditional Turkish music, and their costumes range from sparkly and risque to conservative, Gypsy-like dresses.

Most of them have been dancing on and off for decades. Colorful costumes first attracted Sherri George, 50.

"I saw the dancers in the park and said, 'I want to wear those clothes!'" George said.

George started doing singing-and-belly-dancing telegrams, where she got paid to go to someone's house and dance. ("That was many years and many pounds and many children ago," George said.) She stopped dancing for a while but got back into it a few years ago.

Dorothy Geist, 70, didn't start belly dancing until about five years ago.

"Before I did this, I could never dance," Geist said. "I could never!" Now, she shimmies on the floor with dancers who have years of experience.

Judy Louise Buck, 64, said dancing helps with posture and is a fantastic exercise. It also helps the women get in touch with their sensual sides.

"It's about honoring our feminine selves," Buck said. It also helps foster relationships with the women they practice with and dancers in other troupes.

A *New York Times* article from 1997 says elderly belly dancers can benefit from strengthened spines and decreased stiffness.

Some standard belly dance moves are harder — or impossible — for the Afsana women now that they're older. Any dips are hard on the knees, said Connie Baxter, 66, and back bends and lowering to the floor are out of the question.

But there are upsides, too. They no longer care what people think of them and have stopped comparing themselves with other dancers. Instead, they're focused on what they can bring to the dance floor, and what the dance can do for them.

## An H1N1 humor injection: Can you say FluTube?

The YouTube video starts with a tightly cropped shot of a white lab coat embroidered with the name "John D. Clarke, M.D.?" The camera zooms out and Clarke, wearing aviator sunglasses and taking himself very seriously, launches into his rap, set to an earnest buh-doom, buh-doom beat.

*H1N1 swine flu infection*

*For intervention, I bring prevention.*

*Dr. Clarke here I come to make your head numb ...*

*I'm recommending wash your hands for protection*

*Front and back real thorough while you count 20 seconds.*

*Hand sanitizer, I advise you get it, why?*

*It makes germs die when you rub and let it dry.*

Watch out, Dr. Dre, there's a new rapping doctor out there — and he actually went to medical school.

You can see him at [www.youtube.com/USGOVHHS](http://www.youtube.com/USGOVHHS), home of the Department of Health and Human Services' contest for public service announcements about flu prevention. Launched in July, the contest aimed to enlist public creativity to get out the department's message about washing your hands, not touching your face, and coughing into your sleeve or a tissue. Entries were required to end with a shout-out to the Web site Flu.gov.

The contest drew about 240 entries; most can still be seen on YouTube.

In one, a disembodied hand takes a toothbrush out of its bathroom holder, then scrubs it across ATM buttons, a computer mouse, a car door handle, a handrail and a cat before placing it carefully back over the sink. (This is all set to dainty classical music. Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 4 in G, to be specific.) The video ends with the text, "It's the same as touching your mouth without washing your hands!"

"We wanted people to be creative and be funny because, frankly, that gets the message across better," said Richard Stapleton, deputy director of HHS' division of Web communications and new media. "You don't get your message across until people watch it, and if you have some dude lecturing you, not a lot of people are watching that."

In other words, they want the message to go ... viral.

"Love it," wrote one YouTube viewer. "Very un-government-like!"

Stapleton said, "Everybody who looks at them gets the message of ways to prevent the spread of the flu. Before we find a winner and promote that, it's already been a tremendous success!"

The contest winner, to be announced Tuesday, gets \$2,500; the PSA will be used on national television during this fall's flu season.

John "The Physician Musician" Clarke, whose day job is medical director of the Long Island Rail Road, has been creating "health hop" music since 1997. He wrote his 60-second PSA three months ago (plus a freestyle, or improvised, version, which is also on YouTube) before he knew about the HHS contest.

"I'm excited about it because I do strongly believe that health hop, using rap music to reach young people with health information, is effective," Clarke said.

# Hand sanitizer can kill flu germs

Wash your hands early and often. That's standard advice for preventing the flu. But that's not always practical.

If hand-washing isn't possible, the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention suggests using alcohol-based hand rubs.

Studies show that products with sufficient alcohol content are effective at reducing the

number of viral and bacterial germs on the hands. These products are also quick and convenient.

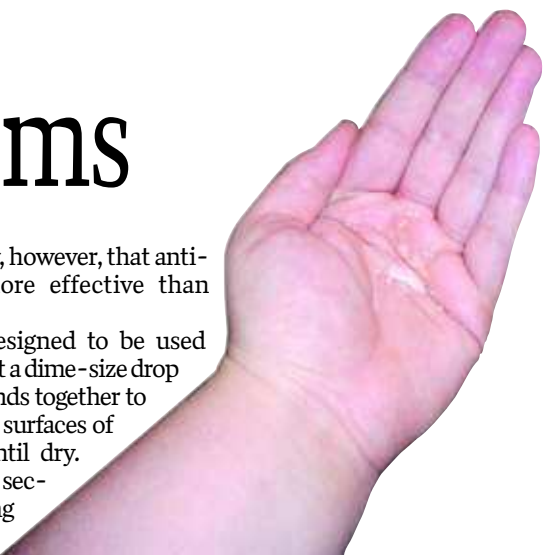
Note that only hand sanitizers that contain at least 60 percent alcohol are effective. (Some products on the market contain just 40 percent alcohol.) Either gel or liquid is fine, but choose products that contain isopropyl or ethanol alcohol.

Also note that hand sanitizers are different from antimicrobial soap. Antibacterial soap is used with water and is marketed as being able to

kill bacteria. Studies show, however, that antibacterial soap is no more effective than nonantibacterial soap.

Hand sanitizers are designed to be used without water. Apply about a dime-size drop on one palm. Run your hands together to smear the product over all surfaces of the hands and fingers until dry.

This should take about 20 seconds — or you're not using enough sanitizer.

## SYMPTOMS OF SLEEP APNEA

It is hard to tell that someone has sleep apnea simply by reviewing symptoms. A firm diagnosis can be made only after a patient undergoes an overnight sleep study, in which his or her breathing is monitored. If you have symptoms that might indicate apnea, discuss them with your regular doctor, who may send you to an otolaryngologist, a specialist in the systems of the ears, nose and throat.

### Symptoms:

- Excessive daytime sleepiness
- Loud snoring
- Breathing cessation during sleep, followed by a gasping for breath
- Headache and dry mouth in the morning
- Sweating while sleeping
- Restlessness while sleeping (You may have sleep apnea even if you don't have all of these symptoms.)

### Children:

In children, snoring is a key symptom of sleep apnea. Also look for breathing through the mouth, night sweating and restlessness, and daytime tiredness.

WASHINGTON — Sleeping used to be one of my favorite activities — until I got lousy at it.

I started having trouble with it last year when I found myself feeling more tired when I woke up than when I went to sleep. I practically fell asleep at my desk. (Okay, I did fall asleep on my keyboard.) My once respectable memory took a precipitous decline into the “I can’t remember my own telephone number” range. And then there was the problem, for my husband and anyone within a three-room radius, of the snoring.

So I asked some doctors to tell me why I was so exhausted.

One said I was super-anxious and should get massages. (I didn’t feel anxious.) Another said I was depressed. (I wasn’t.)

A third said that it could be hormonal. (What isn’t?) Or not.

Finally I decided to figure it out myself. After investigating possible causes for all my symptoms, I began to suspect I had apnea.

Sleep apnea, it turns out, is a common disorder in which you momentarily stop breathing, or take very short breaths, while you are sleeping. The number of times your breathing is interrupted per hour determines the degree of your apnea. (A mild case is marked by five to 15 episodes; a severe case involves more than 30.)

These interruptions disturb your sleep patterns, possibly reducing the body’s ability to refresh itself and the brain’s ability to consolidate memories.

The interruptions also

mean that your brain doesn’t get all the oxygen it needs to function well, and they can cause high blood pressure, hypertension and stroke. Researchers at the National Center on Sleep Disorders Research say that tens of thousands of cardiovascular deaths annually are in some way related to sleep apnea.

In 2004, apnea was linked to the death of National Football League star Reggie White at age 43.

And here’s more disturbing news: The National Institutes of Health estimates that at least 18 million Americans suffer from sleep apnea — and that as many as 90 percent of them are not aware that they have the condition. One reason is that there is no easy way to tell if you have it.

To see if my amateur diagnosis might be correct, I called my brother-in-law, Mark Dettelbach, who, lucky for me, is an ear, nose and throat specialist. He said that as a somewhat trim, 53-year-old woman, I wasn’t the most obvious of candidates (apparently, obese men older than 50 are the most common sufferers) but that apnea was certainly possible.

“A lot of people have apnea who don’t fit the stereotype,” he said. “It can be tricky. A lot of times doctors don’t think about sleep apnea in someone who does not look like a picture of the stereotypical sleep apnea patient.”

Indeed, he said, thin people can get apnea (although being overweight is a risk factor). Kids get it, too, the most common cause being enlarged adenoids and/or tonsils. And even though loud snoring is one common symptom, non-snorers can have the condition.

There are two basic types of

sleep apnea. Obstructive sleep apnea, the more common, occurs when throat muscles relax and block passage of air; central sleep apnea occurs when the brain fails to send signals to the muscles to relax for air to flow. Some unlucky people have both.

Mark instructed me to have an overnight sleep study, called a poly-somnogram, at the Sleep Disorders Clinic in Chevy Chase, Md. The clinic is run by Helene A. Emsellem, a doctor who is an expert in sleep disorders and the author of a book about teenagers and sleep, “Snooze ... or Lose!”

“We are seeing more and more patients presenting with fatigue that remains unexplained,” Emsellem said. “And we are seeing them after some have been to an internist, a psychiatrist to rule out depression, a rheumatologist to rule out aches and pains,” she said.

I went to the clinic one Sunday night, and a technician wired me up to electrodes to monitor brain waves, eye movements, heart rate and other functions while I slept. I was also fitted for a mask through which air would be forced — in a technique called continuous positive airway pressure, or CPAP — if it was determined in the first part of the sleep study that I did have apnea.

It may seem difficult to sleep when you are connected to wires, but not if you are as tired as I was. I found myself being awakened at about 2 a.m. when the CPAP mask was connected to a small machine that forced air through a tube and into my nose.

I indeed did have apnea. (I learned later that my breathing either stopped or was shortened 27 times an hour.)

Lying there with the mask covering my nose, I felt a brief

surge of anger at the doctors who hadn’t diagnosed it earlier, and at the fact that I would now have to be hooked up to a machine while I slept. Then I took a deep breath of the air and felt an unusual flash of clarity. “This isn’t the worst thing in the world,” I thought.

The clinic sent me home at 6:30 the next morning (after the technician looked at my results and said, “I don’t know how you get up in the morning”), and within a few days my own personal CPAP machine was delivered to my house. I didn’t even have to call for it; the sleep center arranged it, and my insurance paid for it. Small enough to sit on my nightstand, it makes a low humming noise (white noise). Now I sleep better and don’t snore.

Still, adjusting the mask and learning to sleep in a position that keeps it on my face is something of a trick, and Emsellem said research is under way to find a less cumbersome, equally effective treatment.

Doctors also say that lifestyle changes can sometimes help relieve apnea symptoms: losing weight, avoiding alcohol and quitting smoking. And surgical procedures can help alleviate some cases of sleep apnea, though they are not always successful.

# Fit in 10:

## Give your body a workout in 10 minutes

**N**EW YORK — No need to spend 30 minutes slogging away on the elliptical or making the rounds on the weight machines.

Here's a 10 minute no-equipment program that works the entire body from Peter Park, fitness expert for Livestrong.com and Lance Armstrong's strength and conditioning coach.

Note: Park recommends doing the workout twice a day for better posture, a stronger core and a balanced body.



**3. Plank** (For your abs, core): Lie flat on your stomach with your toes touching the floor. Place your elbows directly under your shoulders with your forearms flat on the ground. Using your abs, lift your hips in the air until your body is parallel to the floor in a push up position. Squeeze your glutes and brace your abdominals while holding a rigid plank position. Hold for 30 seconds. Then lower. Repeat.



**4. Back Extension** (For the lower back): Lie flat on your stomach, your arms at your sides, with your legs extended straight behind you, heels touching and toes on the floor. Squeeze legs together. Press your elbows into your ribcage. Lift your hands off the floor. Raise your chest into the air while keeping your feet on the ground. Then lower. Do 2 sets of 15 repetitions. On the last rep of each set, hold the highest position possible for an additional 15 seconds.

**5. Hip Flexor Stretch** (For the hip flexors, quads): Step into a long lunge. Lift arms straight above your head and extend them back slightly. Bend your torso back and away from the rear leg to stretch the side of the body. Hold for 30 seconds. Do the same on the other side.



**7. Negative Push Up** (Arms): Move into the plank position, and slowly lower body evenly to the ground, holding strong through the core. The negative push up should take 15 seconds from top to bottom, in a constant slow motion.



**1. Chair Pose** (This works the lower back, hamstrings): Stand with your feet 6 inches apart. Bend your knees slightly and push your hips back. Lift your arms up above your head as high as possible while looking straight ahead. Keep your weight on your heels. Hold the pose for 30 seconds.

**2. Glute Bridge** (For the glutes): Lie on your back with your arms at your side, palms down by your hips, knees bent at 90 degrees. Your feet should be six inches apart and flat on the floor. Push up through your heels to lift your hips as high as possible while squeezing the glute muscles. Hold for 15 seconds. Then lower. Repeat four times.



## Salt a larger part of diets

It's not news that too much sodium is bad for your heart. But salt consumption among Americans has risen by 50 percent since the 1970s, and instances of high blood pressure and heart disease have risen right along with it.

According to the American Heart Association (AHA), Americans eat an average of 9 to 12 grams of salt per day (about 3,600-4,800 milligrams of sodium). The recommended amount is 5 to 6 grams of salt, or 2,000-2,400 milligrams of sodium.

Much of the sodium we consume comes not from our salt shakers but from processed foods, so opting for low-sodium products can make a big difference. If every American cut 3 grams of salt out of their daily diet, there would be a quarter-million fewer new heart disease cases and over 200,000 fewer deaths over a decade, AHA researchers calculate. Now that's worth watching your salt intake for!

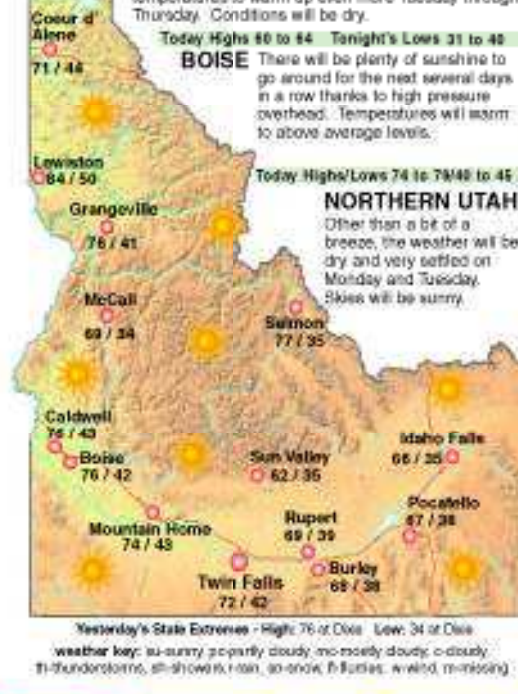
