Teacher raises raise eyebrows

Report shows 44 percent of Idaho teachers received raises this year; Luna decries pay increases during downturn

BOISE — Less than a week before the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee will set the fiscal year 2011 budget for public schools, a report showing many school administrators and teachers

received raises this year is also raising some eyebrows. The Idaho State Department of Education report shows that 37.4 percent of administrative employees have increased salaries this year, while 44.2 percent of teachers across the state are earning more. This comes as state

agencies are freezing salaries and assessing further days to employees in efforts to offset declining revenues.

“Quite frankly, I was surprised when I saw this,” Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna said in a statement. “In this economic situation, I don’t know how anyone can justify giving anyone a raise. This is \$22 million in pay increases that could have been used to preserve successful classroom programs.”

The ability of school districts to declare a financial emergency and renegotiate teacher contracts — one tool to potentially decrease employee expenses — is a key component of how salary increases played out. Though the state didn’t appropriate money this year for teacher salary increases based on experience, districts like Twin Falls School District still awarded the raises.

Because the Twin Falls

Dell workers get \$1.3M assist

U.S. Dept. of Labor grant to help 275 laid off workers

The U.S. Department of Labor said Wednesday it has awarded the Idaho Department of Labor more than \$1.3 million in grant money to assist workers affected by layoffs at the Dell call center in Twin Falls.

The grant will provide 275 workers who were laid off last year with access to dislocated-worker services, including skills assessment, basic skills training, individual career counseling and occupational skills training. However, the labor office will only assist in training workers for jobs that it considers to be in demand.

An Idaho Department of Labor analysis earlier this year indicated possible upcoming job vacancies in nursing, elementary and secondary education, and general and operations managerial occupations. “We could definitely put

SNOW CAMEO

Snow comes to valley; February precipitation still below average

Snow made another cameo appearance in the Magic Valley on Wednesday, drifting down in the morning before rain turned it to slush.

The storm came fairly directly from the Pacific Ocean, meteorologists say, carrying a little more moisture with it as a result. But in the broader picture of the region’s water supply, it didn’t do much more than look pretty and snarl traffic.

Reports compiled by the National Weather Service show about an inch of snow fell near Buhl, Twin Falls and Rupert. Quite a bit more fell at higher elevations; a storm spotter measured seven inches of new snow near Pine shortly before 2:30 p.m.

The weather was apparently enough to throw off drivers in some parts of the valley in the morning. Though some dispatch centers reported few to no slide-offs, the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center ended up with a busy morning.

“We haven’t had any that have been very serious, just

lots of them,” SIRCOMM dispatcher Julie Haycock said of vehicle crashes.

So far, February appears likely to continue a trend of below-normal rain and snow this winter, starving mountain snowpacks. A water-supply forecast released earlier this month by the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service warned that the upper Snake River “is in desperate need of more snow,” with some measurement stations nearing record lows.

Such dire forecasts have occasionally been turned around by early spring rains — a similar situation happened last year. But irrigators and scientists say they don’t expect that sort of last-minute aid to come often.

Ron Abramovich, a NRCS water-supply specialist, said Wednesday that Idaho





Tilt finds a home in Kimberly

Couple adopts dog who survived a gunshot wound

There are happy endings. For Tilt the puppy, their names are Maria and Sam Thiemann.

On Tuesday, the Kimberly couple adopted the 10- to 12-week-old border collie and Australian shepherd mix who survived a gunshot wound to her head. Because

of the injury, her head tilts, thus her name.

“She just grabs my heart,” said Maria Thiemann, who had been following the story online. She didn’t think the puppy would find a home because of her special needs.

“The one thing that made me think about it was we don’t throw our handicapped people off, so why treat animals any different?” said Sam Thiemann.

Because of the news coverage, more than five people called about adopting Tilt, said Kathleen Olmstead, of

the People for Pets Humane Society that operates the Twin Falls Animal Shelter. The Thiemanns fell in love with the puppy, she said.

The couple has another shelter-adopted dog, Roxie, and two cats. Roxie had been sad because of the loss of their other dog to cancer, but now she’ll have a new friend in Tilt, Sam said. And they plan to keep the name, his wife added.

Olmstead said the shelter staff is happy and grateful for community help that included for financial support for Tilt’s medical bills.

District was unqualified to declare a financial emergency, district officials were legally bound by state law to give teachers raises based on experience, district Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said.

While state funding for teacher pay increases has diminished, districts still have the option to use their own funds, such as reserves and carryover, to cover raises.

Legislators expressed concerns about the salary increases, but also acknowledged that school districts are locally controlled.

"In a way it's disturbing and in another way it is local control," said Jerome Republican Rep. Maxine Bell, co-chairwoman of JEAC.

She said a school board has the right to set salaries and spend discretionary dollars as it sees fit.

"It's a little bit frustrating, frankly when you're trying to do the best you can to make every dollar count," she said.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, in an Idaho Press Club event on Wednesday, said some districts gave salary increases. When asked, he didn't express support for encouraging districts to freeze salaries.

"I would encourage offering an abundance of caution on how they spend that money," Otter said.

Districts vary in the awarding of salary increases. Minidoka County School

District, for example, did not hike administrator pay.

Twin Falls Republican Rep. Stephen Hartgen, a member of the House Education Committee, said school districts need to be willing to share the burden of cuts.

"I think they should have chosen voluntarily not to do so (award raises), given the economy," he said.

Rep. Donna Pence, D-Gooding, a member of the House Education Committee, said salary decisions must be left to local school boards.

Twin Falls School District followed the teacher salary schedule after negotiations and consulting its attorney, Dobbs said. There's also a salary schedule for administrators that is based on experience. In TFSD, administrators also receive salary increases that are proportional to teachers'.

"We all move in the same direction," Dobbs said. "That will be the case this year when we make our cuts."

Gaylen Smyer, superintendent of Cassia County School District, said some increases in his district were from administrative employees taking over duties added to their workloads by a vacancy.

Ten of the district's 20 administrative employees' salaries increased this year, according to the report.

that money to good use," said Jan Roeser, regional economist with Idaho Department of Labor.

Layoffs at the Dell call center began in November 2009 and continued through January with the facility's closure. Of the \$1.3 million in grant money, \$614,808 will be released initially. Additional funding up to the

amount approved will be made available as the state demonstrates a continued need for assistance.

The amount released Wednesday will be funded by resources made available for National Emergency Grants through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. Any money that is not used will be returned to the federal government.

"This grant will provide important re-employment and retraining services to help workers in Idaho access job opportunities in expanding fields," said Secretary of Labor Hilda L. Solis in a written statement.

National Emergency Grants are part of the secretary of labor's discretionary fund and are awarded based on a state's ability to meet specific guidelines.

make the process more political, Anderson said.

"It could add additional projects to the original plan that weren't originally figured on," she said, adding that a tax district may want URA assistance for a project in exchange for its support.

Another bill also allows affected tax districts to opt out of proposed boundaries. Anderson said that would create a need to go back to the drawing board and possibly extend the length of financing.

"You may end up having to totally redo it," she said.

She expressed concerns about a bill that would require URA commissioners to be elected. That's because the bill calls for countywide elections, which means voters from far beyond the URA's area would participate, she said.

"It's not that we have a

problem with elections," Anderson said. Instead, commissioners are appointed to URA boards without a public vote.

Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, chairman of the subcommittee and a member of Twin Falls URA board, said he wouldn't want to run for that office.

At the same time, Smith said he understands the concerns about public involvement.

"It bothers me that there's no link between the voting public and that board," he said.

ABOUT THE BILLS ON URA REFORM

Voter approval: Rep. Steve Kren, R-Nampa, is sponsoring a bill that would require voter approval for an urban renewal agency to begin operating.

Public involvement: Rep. Phil Hart, R-Hayden, is carrying four bills, all aimed at increasing public involvement. They require voter election of URA commissioners, a 60-day comment period and public hearing for proposed urban renewal plans, and a majority approval of all affected tax districts in a URA must approve the boundaries. Hart also gives affected tax entities the ability to opt out of a proposed urban renewal area.

Excess cash: Rep. Raul Labrador, R-Eagle, wants a requirement overseeing excess funding. Under his proposal, when a URA's revenues exceed the funds needed to cover bonds, the excess money would go back to the other taxing districts within its boundaries.

Sizing it up: Rep. Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, is sponsoring a bill that would establish a classification system for projects that separates projects for deteriorating areas from other projects aimed at economic, residential, industrial and mixed-use development. It also limits a district's revenue allocation area. The limits are: 10 percent of overall assessed value of the district's city, and 15 percent of the land area in its city.

has only received 20 to 35 percent of its normal February precipitation, meaning the March water forecast is likely to drop even further.

"This storm today is only a drop in the bucket," he said.

Irrigators will likely now have to rely even more on reservoirs that, while healthy, can't replace all of the natural river flow they

need. In the upper Snake, Palisades and American Falls both still hold more water than average and more than they did last year, according to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Jackson Lake is about on par with last year's storage, still above average for it as well.

The good news, Abramovich said, is that cold temperatures have kept the snow that has fallen in place and firm for winter recreation. But while it's sticking around, it's not being added to. And the

forecast isn't encouraging.

"There's still nothing major on the horizon," Abramovich said.

"Hopefully March will be better for us." Looking at the next week, another storm system may come through southern Idaho Friday evening through Saturday, said NWS meteorologist Megan Thimmesch. Temperatures today and early next week will likely be above normal, she said, with Monday and Tuesday looking fairly dry and mild.

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State seeks dismissal of \$5 million IDOC lawsuit

A lawyer for the state is seeking the dismissal of a \$5 million complaint in federal court records made by a former “Violent Sexual Predator” who claims he was labeled unconstitutionally. Convicted sex offender Mark Wicklund, 56, of Boise, filed a complaint and demand for jury trial in U.S. District Court on Feb. 4, after his designation as a Violent Sexual Predator (VSP) was vacated by a judge in 4th District Court. Defendants named in Wicklund’s civil rights complaint include: the Idaho Department of Correction, the Sex Offender Classification Board, IDOC Director Brent Reinke and the state of Idaho. About a year ago in a case involving a former VSP and former Twin Falls resident, Jason Smith, the Idaho Supreme Court determined that “Smith’s designation was not constitutionally sound” and vacated the designation. In his complaint, Wicklund claims that his VSP label was vacated by a 4th District Court judge after the Smith decision, and he seeks millions because “he suffered by the unconstitutional designation.” But a response from the government filed Monday by Boise lawyer Phillip Collier denies most of Wicklund’s allegations. The state, IDOC, Reinke and the classification board are all immune from the complaint, which should be dismissed, according to an answer and demand for trial from Collier. “The individual defendants are entitled to qualified immunity because the acts or omissions complained of, if any, were undertaken by defendants in good faith, with honest and reasonable belief such actions were necessary and constitutionally proper,” the response reads. Wicklund should not get any money from his complaint, according to the response. “These answering defendants pray that (Wicklund) takes nothing by his complaint, that the same be dismissed, and that these answering defendants be awarded their costs of suit and attorney fees, and such other and further relief as the court deems just.” The response also says, “(Wicklund) was guilty of negligent and careless misconduct at the time of and in connection with the matters and damages alleged in the complaint, which misconduct on his part proximately caused and contributed to said events and resultant damages, if any.” Idaho has stopped issuing new VSP labels until the process involved is “fixed” said IDOC spokesman Jeff Ray on Wednesday. Jerome County feedlot case nears hearing

Different judge will hear arguments on proposed Big Sky CAFO

After more than a year, a 5th District judge is soon set to hear arguments regarding a controversial Jerome County feedlot. It’s the second time that decisions regarding the large confined-animal feeding operation, initially proposed by Big Sky Farms but now owned by South View Dairy, have been challenged in court. The case has attracted attention in part because the land is just more than one mile west of the Minidoka National Historic Site, the former home of the Hunt Camp for Japanese-American detainees during World War II. To recap the long case: In 2006, Eden business-

man Don McFarland applied on behalf of Big Sky for a feedlot housing more than 18,000 animals. In May 2007, he submitted a revised application for only 13,000 animals, or 8,000 animal units as tallied by the county. In October 2007, the Jerome County commissioners voted 2-1 not to grant the permit. McFarland filed for judicial review of the denial, and in February 2008 also sold roughly 1,150 acres of the 1,200-acre property to South View Dairy partners Tony and Ryan Visser and William Dejong. Fifth District Judge G. Richard Bevan ruled against the commissioners in June 2008, criticizing their reasoning, and sent the issue back to them for reconsideration. The commission then approved the permit application that September. One month later, in October 2008, a coalition of state and national advocacy groups, along with neighbors of the planned site in Jerome County, filed another peti-

tion for judicial review, this time challenging the site’s approval. Now, the county and feedlot attorneys, on opposite sides during the first appeal, have presented similar arguments defending the commissioners’ second decision. They face a different judge than before, Judge Robert Elgee. The parties spent all of 2009 debating what would and would not be allowed in the record of the case. Then on Jan. 20, 2010, the plaintiffs filed a memorandum supporting their appeal. It alleged that the commissioners denied their due process rights, in part because Idaho law limits public testimony to people who live within one mile of a proposed CAFO. The plaintiffs also alleged commissioners failed to follow their own zoning ordinances,

approved an incomplete permit application and did not properly reason out their approval. The county and South View each filed rebuttals just last week. County Deputy Prosecutor Mike Seib, in language highly dismissive of the appeal, argued the case is based on false premises backed up by few actual details. The organizations among the plaintiffs don’t even have standing, Seib wrote, and the county took many steps to provide public notice of a 2007 hearing regarding the permit. South View attorney John Lothspeich listed similar concerns. “Not only does it not raise legitimate issues,” Seib wrote of the appeal, “it does not even raise one’s curiosity as to whether the innuendos that it creates are even true.” Oregon attorney Charlie Tebbutt, one of the three attorneys representing the plaintiffs, said the group will submit a reply brief by March 5. A hearing is expected to be set for later this spring in Jerome.

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

Sage grouse group plans open house

The Shoshone Basin Sage Grouse Local Working Group will hold a public information meeting on Tuesday to share updates on population trends in southern Idaho, the bird's possible listing under the Endangered Species Act and the Idaho Sage-Grouse Plan.

The meeting will run from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at the Magic Valley Fish and Game Regional Office, 324 S., 417 E., U.S. Highway 93 Business Park.

The local working group was formed in 1994 to collaboratively develop and implement a local conservation plan for the birds, which face a number of threats to their habitat. It is one of four groups addressing areas within the Magic Valley — its territory generally encompasses that portion of Twin Falls County east of Salmon Falls Creek.

The group recently completed a management plan for the east side of the planning area and is reorganizing before beginning work on the west side. It would like to broaden its membership to include stakeholders and key area residents who are interested in working positively together in this effort.

SIRCOMM makes progress on fees issue

The Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center has largely succeeded in its attempt to recover fees it charges to users of Voice over Internet Protocol systems, which allow people to place emergency phone calls using a computer.

More than half of SIRCOMM's revenue comes from a \$1.25 surcharge assessed to telephone customers for 911 calls received. Officials said last August that they planned to try to recover the VoIP funds, which were not all being paid.

Last month, communications technician Jerry Gonterman said most companies had simply fallen out of the loop and fixed their payments after just a phone call.

"We have pretty much caught up to every company out there," Gonterman told SIRCOMM's governing board.

Many companies had turned over handling their fees to accounting firms, he said, which often only passed on \$1 of the fee because they didn't know better.

The extra 25 cents goes on to the state of Idaho for its Emergency Communications Fund. At a board meeting just this week, SIRCOMM Director John Moore said the center has passed on \$160,000 owed to the state fund from the last two quarters of the 2009 fiscal year.

Center staff had believed they owed more, but looked over the formula used for the fees and arrived at the \$160,000 figure, Moore said. The center will now pass the fee directly on to the state rather than go through its member counties.

Buhl declares emergency on down well

BUHL — With spring lawn watering just around the corner, Buhl officials know a well that's currently out of commission needs to be back on line quickly.

On Monday, the council declared the situation an emergency, allowing city crews to focus on getting the well fixed without following the typical law requiring the project to go out for bid, a process that could take months.

Engineer Scott Bybee told the council the declaration is "not a license to spend money."

"We'll work to watch things very closely,"

Bybee said.

The well is one of six the city has but is the primary "workhorse" and has been shut down for about three months, following a resident complaint of having "dirty water," Bybee said at Monday's meeting. Three city wells are used as back-up, and another well is currently offline because it is involved in the city's arsenic filtration project, leaving the city just one working well.

"We're not in good shape," water operator Jeff Huntington told the council.

Mayor Tom McCauley told the *Times-News* the well was inspected Wednesday. An early estimate for critical repairs to

the well casing, pump and other equipment sits at \$27,000.

"We don't really have the money but we don't have a decision either," McCauley said. "We are looking into accounts to see if there is savings we could use, inquiring if this repair could be covered by the bond money or grants we have because this is the city's water supply."

McCauley said the city will also discuss how to remedy the initial cause of the problem: a declining water table.

"Aquifer levels are dropping all over... it is my personal recommendation that we lower the well level 100 feet and I believe that is the engineer's recom-

mendation as well. The council will be deciding if that is a prudent measure to take," McCauley said.

The mayor commended the public works department for working with the city's fire department to make sure the city is protected in the event of a fire.

"The city is doing everything it can to make this necessary repair, and while it is being done the city is protected and has the water it needs," he said.

McCauley said the city is on track to have the well back online before warm weather hits and water consumption increases.

Jerome commissioners approve jail ballot language

JEROME — Voters in Jerome County will again ponder whether to build a new jail with lease-to-purchase financing when they venture to the polls for the primary election on May 25.

County commissioners on Monday approved language for the ballot question that is nearly identical to the one that failed by a small margin last November.

The proposed Jerome County Justice Facility, which would have included a 165-bed jail and sheriff's station, fell just short of the

state-mandated two-thirds supermajority approval in November.

In May, voters will consider whether they will authorize Jerome County to enter into the lease-to-purchase agreement with annual lease payments not to exceed \$985,000 and a maximum term of 30 years.

The county is estimating a range of interest rates between 2 and 8 percent with an estimated total cost of \$30.22 million over 30 years.

Commissioner Charlie Howell said he has discussed potential election-related questions from the public with Sheriff

Doug McFall, Prosecuting Attorney John Horgan and others.

He said two questions frequently asked during the fall 2009 campaign were related to a location for the new facility and a floor plan.

Howell said he hopes to better address those issues with voters.

He said that while two of the original three potential locations remain available, McFall prefers a site near the Idaho State Police and Interstate 84. The county has yet to narrow the choices of sites to one.

He said the commission would have to consider whether to expend \$3,000

to have a blueprint made for public inspection.

Howell also said he wants to ask Twin Falls County for commission action supporting participation to rent jail beds and for that item to appear in Twin Falls County's commissioners' minutes.

Part of Jerome County's business plan for the proposed jail has been to rent jail beds to other counties to generate revenue until Jerome County's needs grow into the new facility.

Blaine Co. to consider nursing home levy

HAILEY — Blaine County commissioners are set to ask county voters whether they're willing to fund a levy to help pay for the county's nursing facility, Blaine Manor.

Although the Croy Canyon Ranch Foundation is raising funds to build a replacement facility, the completion of the new nursing home is likely more than a few years away. In the meantime, the county is subsidizing Blaine Manor to the tune of about \$700,000 yearly.

On Tuesday, the county heard Blaine Manor's latest independent audit results, and next Tuesday at 11 a.m.,

commissioners will hear Blaine Manor's argument for asking voters to approve a levy. Details of how much taxpayers would owe if they approve the levy will also be presented then.

Following that presentation, the county will hold two public hearings — at 6:30 p.m. March 3, and at 3 p.m. March 4 — to hear what voters have to say about the idea.

Commissioner Angenie McCleary, the county's representative to the Blaine Manor board, said she doesn't support a levy at this time, though she's keeping an open mind to hear what Blaine Manor has to say.

Her objection to asking the voters to consider a levy

in the May election comes down to timing.

"We're setting ourselves up for multiple two-year levies if we do it now," she said, because she doesn't believe the Croy Canyon Ranch facility will be able to take over the Medicare and Medicaid nursing load for the county within a single two-year levy period.

In other Blaine Manor news, the city on Monday eased the way for the Croy Canyon Ranch Foundation by rezoning the site of the existing Blaine Manor in Hailey from limited business to business.

"In theory it would increase the value of the property," said Beth Robrahn, Hailey planning director.

The city has also agreed to provide sewer services to the proposed nursing facility, even though it will be on county land. "We're trying to facilitate that endeavor as best we can," said Hailey Mayor Rick Davis.

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Senator’s vote on tobacco products raises conflict-of-interest questions

BOISE — Sen. Elliot Werk thought he’d won.

The Boise Democrat left Monday’s Health and Welfare Committee meeting thinking his bill to ban candy-like tobacco products in Idaho had survived a narrow 5-4 decision. Another senator came out of the hearing room and into the glow of the Idaho Capitol’s basement skylights to congratulate him.

His victory was short-lived.

“Somebody came out of the room and told me, ‘You should get back in there, they just killed your bill,’” Werk told The Associated Press.

Here’s what happened: Sen. Melinda Smyser, R-Parma and the wife of a tobacco industry lobbyist, originally voted for Werk’s bill to ban dissolvable tobacco. But after everyone else on the nine-member panel had weighed in, she decided the

ban would have been “premature,” and changed her mind.

Smyser’s about-face on a measure that could affect an industry her husband lobbies for is raising questions among some about whether the Legislature’s conflict-of-interest rules failed. The Idaho Democratic Party said Wednesday Smyser’s vote shows the Legislature needs stronger rules to fight the “unrestrained power” of business groups.

“The people of Idaho are entitled to know that the public’s business is managed in the public interest, not to advance special interests,” said Democratic Chairman Keith Roark, in a statement.

Idaho Legislature’s rules do require senators and representatives disclose a possible conflict of interest before they vote, a provision that’s meant to allow citizen legislators to weigh in on a range of issues that may be close to their hearts — or families.

Smyser did that before she voted the first time, for

Werk’s bill.

But allowing legislators to vote on any bill means they must take extra care to avoid the appearance of impropriety that could undermine voters’ faith. The National Conference of State Legislatures says lawmakers should police themselves.

“The very fact of having a conflict of interest is not inherently bad,” said Peggy Kerns, director of the group’s ethics center. “Where things get bad is how a person responds to the conflict.”

Instances where conflicts are elevated to grave concerns in the Idaho Legislature are rare.

In February 2005, then-state Sen. Jack Noble, a Republican, tried unsuccessfully to introduce a measure that would have benefited his convenience store by allowing it to sell alcohol, even though it was close to a school. The Senate Ethics Committee later voted to censure Noble for lying under oath; he quit before the

official reprimand.

Smyser’s husband, Skip Smyser, lobbies for Altria Group Inc. Altria doesn’t currently have dissolvable tobacco products on the market; a company spokesman declined to say if the Richmond, Va.-based maker of Marlboro cigarettes and Skoal smokeless tobacco is developing dissolvable tobacco products similar to its rival R.J. Reynolds.

Idaho House sides with cities over taxpayer funding for projects

BOISE (AP) — The House sided with cities in a 4-year-old fight over whether they can finance projects like airport parking garages without asking voters first.

On a 57-12 vote Wednesday, the chamber approved a constitutional amendment to allow publicly owned airports to finance new facilities without a vote, if no taxpayer money covers the debt.

If this wins two-thirds support in the Senate, it heads to voters in November.

The Idaho Supreme Court in 2006 ruled the Idaho Constitution’s anti-debt provisions forbid Boise from building a new parking garage without its residents’ approval — even though the city planned to use parking revenue, not taxes, to pay off the building.

David Frazier, the activist who won the 2006 case against Boise, contends this amendment will let government-owned facilities compete unfairly with the private sector.

Whale kills trainer as spectators watch on in horror at SeaWorld

ORLANDO, Fla. — A SeaWorld killer whale snatched a trainer from a poolside platform Wednesday in its jaws and thrashed the woman around underwater, killing her in front of a horrified audience. It marked the third time the animal had been involved in a human death.

Distraught audience members were hustled out of the stadium immediately, and the park was closed.

Trainer Dawn Brancheau, 40, was one of the park’s most experienced. Her sister said Brancheau wouldn’t want anything done to the whale that killed her because she loved the animals like children.

Brancheau was rubbing Tilikum after a noontime show when the 12,000-pound whale grabbed her and pulled her in, said Chuck Tompkins, head of animal training at all SeaWorld parks. It was not clear if she drowned or died from the thrashing.

Because of his size and the previous deaths, trainers were not supposed to get into the water with Tilikum, and only about a dozen of the park’s 29 trainers worked with him. Brancheau had more experience with the 30-year-old whale than most.

“We recognized he was different,” Tompkins said. He said no decision has been made yet about what will happen to Tilikum, such as transferring him to another facility.

A retired couple from Michigan told The Associated Press that they were among some stragglers in the audience who had stayed to watch the animals and trainers.

Eldon Skaggs, 72, said Brancheau’s interaction with the whale appeared leisurely and informal at first. But then the whale “pulled her under and started swimming around with her,” he said.


Skaggs said an alarm sounded and staff rushed the audience out of the stadium as workers scrambled around with nets.

Skaggs said he heard that during an earlier show the whale was not responding to directions. Others who attended the earlier show said the whale was behaving like an ornery child.

The couple left and didn’t find out until later that the trainer had died.

“We were just a little bit stunned,” said Skaggs’ wife, Sue Nichols, 67.

Another audience member, Victoria Biniak, told WKMG-TV the whale “took off really fast in the tank, and then he came back, shot up in the air, grabbed the trainer by the waist and started thrashing around, and one of her shoes flew off.”

Two other witnesses told the Orlando Sentinel that the whale grabbed the woman by the upper arm and tossed her around in its mouth while swimming rapidly around the tank. Brazilian tourist Joao Lucio DeCosta Sobrinho and his girlfriend were at an underwater viewing area when they suddenly saw a whale with a person in its mouth.

The couple said they watched the whale show at

the park two days earlier and came back to take pictures. But on Wednesday the whales appeared agitated.

“It was terrible. It’s very difficult to see the image,” Sobrinho said.

A SeaWorld spokesman said Tilikum was one of three orcas blamed for killing a trainer in 1991 after the woman lost her balance and fell in the pool at Sealand of the Pacific near Victoria, British Columbia.

After the deluge: What’s next for Idaho gov’t?

Now what? In an ideal world, Idaho senators and representatives, the Legislature’s Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee and the governor’s office would be having regular discussions with Superintendent of Pubic Instruction Tom Luna, college and university presidents, Department of Health and Welfare Director Dick Armstrong, Department of Correction Director Brent Reinke and members of the Idaho Transportation Board about what Idaho government should look like after the current economic crisis subsides.

There hasn’t been much talk about our long-term future, for obvious reasons: State government is still trying to figure out how to pay the bills *this* year.

Yet now, with general fund spending down 23 percent since fiscal year 2009, is a perfect time to reimagine state government — or at least to start asking the right questions:

- Should Health and Welfare, which spends about 20 percent of state general fund dollars, be simply a pass-through agency for Medicaid, or should it continue to have a distinct character and mission of its own? Can we justify any more having a separate Department of Health and Welfare and health districts?
- Does our bifurcated public education system — different agencies run higher education and the public schools — make fiscal sense any more?
- Idaho could get more bang for its taxpayer buck if there were half as many school districts and high-way districts. Isn’t now the time to get serious about consolidation?
- The state needs a different model for higher education in order to compete in the 21st century. What better time to start the reform process than the present?
- Idaho will miss \$250 million in taxes that it is legally owed this year because it doesn’t have enough manpower to collect them. Shouldn’t the state Tax Commission be a more robust agency with enough resources to keep the dollars flowing to Idaho schools and other public purposes?
- Should the state agency that keeps murderers and rapists at bay really have to compete for tax dollars with, say, public television and community colleges?
- Given what’s befallen state employees in the past two years — furloughs, layoffs, higher premiums for health care insurance — where is the next generation of state workers going to come from?
- The Idaho Transportation Department spends twice as much as higher education in Idaho, although most of the agency’s money is federal. Is it reasonable any more to have IDT in, but not of, state government? And shouldn’t the governor be appointing its director?

The reductive strategy employed so far by the Legislature is spend-less-and-make-government-go-away. That’s not going to get it done in the long run.

If there is no fundamental redefinition of the role and purpose of state government, then the next round of major budget increases will simply waste the taxpayers’ money.

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Health reform sinks into the mire

Barack Obama came to Washington with the nation’s hope for change riding on his shoulders. He promised to reform the health care system. He hired many of the country’s top experts who had written brilliantly about how to do reform.


He immediately moved away from some of their ideas. This was understandable. America isn’t Plato’s Republic. It’s not a nation governed by experts. It’s a democracy. To get things passed, you’ve got to allow for political reality.

So Obama promised to keep health insurance the same for most Americans. This meant it was going to be harder to bring down costs. This meant it wouldn’t be possible to replace the fraying employer-based insurance system. But these compromises could be justified.

Then the Congress began its dealmaking. There were special favors put in for certain senators. There were special arrangements made for big Democratic donors, like the trial lawyers. These were compromises, too. They were ugly, and they soiled everybody involved. But, again, they could be justified for reasons of political expediency. The bill that emerged from the Senate was not to everybody’s liking. It wouldn’t reduce the nation’s overall health care spending.

But at least the Senate bill had some integrity. It would cover 30 million people without adding to the deficit. It did this in real ways. It included real Medicare cuts. Most importantly, it included an excise tax on luxury insurance plans.

The excise tax is one of those ideas that health care economists of all stripes love. Currently, we have a



perverse tax system that taxes salaries but not health benefits. This exclusion favors the rich over the middle class. It encourages extravagant health spending.

According to the Congressional Budget Office, taxing health benefits is one of the two most effective ways to bring down health care costs. Plus, it brings in a ton of revenue. According to the Lewin Group, a health care consulting firm, the excise tax in the Senate bill would bring in \$957 billion between 2020 and 2029. This is what pays for expanding coverage. This is why the president could promise to veto any bill that adds a dime to the deficit.

But, alas, this is Washington, 2010. The muck rises. The compromises never stop.

As the year went on, health care reform grew more unpopular. If you average the last 10 polls, 38 percent of voters support the reform plans and 53 percent oppose. Obama’s reform is more unpopular than Bill Clinton’s was as it died.

As the political costs rose, members of Congress squealed louder. Congress is not a bastion of courage in the best of circumstances. When it is asked to actually

pay for its expenditures, it verges on hysteria.

Some Republicans campaigned against the excise tax. John McCain had made the excise tax a centerpiece of his reform plan. But Scott Brown of Massachusetts and others ran against it.

Unions went next. They demanded a special deal so their members would be exempt from the tax. The Democrats caved and gave it to them.

Blood was now in the water. Everyone smelled weakness. If the White House hopes to pass something in this atmosphere, it needs every Democratic vote it can get. It needs to cater to every special-interest plea. Right now, the White House has no leverage.

Efforts to kill the tax mounted. On Jan. 27, Nancy Pelosi told a group of journalists, “The excise tax has no support, very little support, in our caucus.” The pollsters said it was a loser. That was a sign the congressional leadership wanted it dead.

On Monday, the White House made another compromise. On the surface, it seems mundane. The imposition of the excise tax will be delayed until 2018, and the threshold at which the tax kicks in will be raised. In reality, the delay turns the

tax into another Washington gimmick. Lord, give me virtue, but not yet.

The odds are high that the excise tax will never actually happen. There is no reason to think that the Congress of 2018 will be any braver than the Congress of today. It will probably get around the pay-go rules or whatever else might apply and it’ll postpone the tax again. The excise tax will turn into another “doc fix.” This is a mythical provision in which doctors are always about to get their reimbursements cut. But somehow they never do because the cuts are always pushed back, year after year.

So we’ve sunk another level in our tawdry tale. The White House, to its enormous credit, has tried to think about the long term. But it has been dragged ever lower into the mire by congressional special interests that are parochial in the extreme.

This bill may be deficit-neutral on paper. But it has just become a fiscal time bomb. The revenue will never come. Compromises have to be made to keep it (barely) alive. But responsibility ebbs. Politics wins.

right into it. She understands that every time she is mocked by you, the elite left, her fortunes rise.



Corruptocrat Eric Holder’s national security cover-up

The White House wants to play Transparency Olympics with the Tea Party movement. President Obama’s Chief Technology Officer Andrew McLaughlin dared Tea Party activists and conservatives last week to “push the administration to make its policies more open” and make it a “political competition ... to see who can be more radical in their openness,” The Hill reported.

So, let’s start by knocking down Attorney General Eric Holder’s national security stonewall at the Department of Justice, shall we? Let the sun shine in.

For more than a year, I’ve been writing about the looming national security and conflict-of-interest problems posed by Holder’s status as a former partner at the prestigious law firm Covington and Burling. The company currently represents or has provided pro bono representation and sob-story media-relations campaigns in the past to more than a dozen Gitmo detainees from Yemen who are seeking civilian trials on American soil.

The firm wasn’t just a bit

player. It led the charge, contributing more than 3,000 hours to Gitmo litigation in 2007, according to *The American Lawyer*. At least one known Covington big shot and fellow former Clintonite, Lanny Breuer, now works for Holder as head of the DOJ’s criminal division. Though he himself did not participate in the detainee cases, Holder’s celebrity undoubtedly boosted company-wide prestige.

How many of Holder’s former colleagues and associates are now on the DOJ payroll? How many like them, who worked at other law firms or for left-wing lobbying groups, now inhabit DOJ offices? How many of them have been allowed to work on government terrorism cases related to their past crusades for al-Qaida-tied clients? How many have had to recuse themselves — and have those recusals been full and forthcoming? How can the public judge

whether these lawyers are representing America’s best interests — or those of the jihadis?

GOP Sen. Charles Grassley of Iowa has been trying to get answers. DOJ information suppressors have snubbed him repeatedly. As the Washington Examiner’s Byron York reported on Friday, Holder has now acknowledged that “at least” nine Obama appointees in the Justice Department “have represented or advocated for terrorist detainees before joining the Justice Department.” But the tight-lipped, taxpayer-funded litigators at the agency won’t name names or cough up any relevant details.

Grassley asked for “the names of political appointees in the department who represented detainees (or) worked for organizations advocating on behalf of detainees ... the cases or projects that these appointees worked on with respect to detainees prior to joining the Justice Department ... and the cases or projects relating to detainees that they have worked on since joining the Justice Department. ...” Beyond two DOJ appointees whose work for jihadi defendants had already been made public, Holder gave up nothing. Zip. Zilch.

It’s not even clear that the Gitmo Nine are the end of the line. The list is not a comprehensive tally of DOJ appointees, Holder told Grassley and other GOP senators who pressed for public disclosure. Why not? What are they trying to hide? Who are they trying to spare?

Americans have a right to know whether they are subsidizing jihadi sympathizers, and whether their

Justice Department is now a sanctuary for human rights transnationalists and little terrorists’ helpers in the mold of Lynne Stewart, who was convicted of abetting Muslim terrorist mastermind Sheikh Omar Abdel Rahman and spreading messages inciting violence on his behalf while representing him.

Americans have a right to know whether Holder — who put political interests ahead of security interests at the Clinton Justice Department in both the Marc Rich pardon scandal and the Puerto Rican FALN terrorist debacle — has made hiring decisions that provide for the common defense and promote the general welfare.

Tellingly, Holder has treated the GOP’s national security concerns dismissively. He’s hoping his non-responsive blow-off of Grassley’s request will die

on the vine. And just as he used his past lapses in judgment during the Clinton era to argue that they made him more qualified for the job he holds now, Holder argues that the phantom jihadi lawyers on the DOJ payroll are a good thing for the country, so we should just shut up:

“A prosecutor of white-collar fraud cases may have previously represented defendants in such cases. This familiarity with and experience in the relevant area of law redounds to the government’s benefit.”

As usual, Holder puts ordinary civilian crimes on the same footing as terrorism plots and acts of war against our country. But why not let the people decide for themselves whether his staff decisions redound to their benefit? “The American people have the right to information about their government’s activities,” Holder himself said in a press release trumpeting new freedom of information rules last year. Put up or shut up, Mr. Attorney General.

Starving the beast, Republican-style

OK, the beast is starving. Now what? That’s the question confronting Republicans. But they’re refusing to answer, or even to engage in any serious discussion about what to do.

For readers who don’t know what I’m talking about: Ever since Reagan, the GOP has been run by people who want a much smaller government. In the famous words of the activist Grover Norquist, conservatives want to get the government “down to the size where we can drown it in the bathtub.”

But there has always been a political problem with this agenda. Voters may say that they oppose big government, but the programs that actually dominate federal spending — Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security — are very popular. So how can the public be persuaded to accept large spending cuts?

The conservative answer, which evolved in the late 1970s, would be dubbed “starving the beast” during the Reagan years. The idea was basically that sympathetic politicians should engage in a game of bait-and-switch. Rather than proposing unpopular spending cuts, Republicans would push through popular tax cuts, with the deliberate intention of worsening the government’s fiscal position. Spending cuts could then be sold as a necessity rather than a choice, the only way to eliminate an unsustainable budget deficit.

And the deficit came. True, more than half of this year’s budget deficit is the result of the Great Recession, which has both depressed revenues and required a temporary surge in spending to contain the damage. But even when the crisis is over, the budget will remain deeply in the red, largely as a result of

Bush-era tax cuts (and Bush-era unfunded wars). And the combination of an aging population and rising medical costs will, unless something is done, lead to explosive debt growth after 2020.

So the beast is starving, as planned. It should be time, then, for conservatives to explain which parts of the beast they want to cut. And President Barack Obama has, in effect, invited them to do just that, by calling for a bipartisan deficit commission.

Many progressives were deeply worried by this proposal, fearing that it would turn into a kind of Trojan horse — in particular, that the commission would end up reviving the long-standing Republican goal of gutting Social Security. But they needn’t have worried: Senate Republicans overwhelmingly voted against legislation that would have created a commission with some actual power, and it is unlikely that anything meaningful will come from the much weaker commission Obama established by executive order.

Why won’t Republicans sit down and talk? Because they would then be forced to put up or shut up. Since they’re adamantly opposed to reducing the deficit with tax increases, they would have to explain what spending they want to cut. And guess what? After three decades of preparing the ground for this moment, they’re still not willing to do that.

In fact, conservatives have backed away from spending cuts they themselves proposed in the past. In the 1990s, for example, Republicans in Congress tried to force through

sharp cuts in Medicare. But now they have made opposition to any effort to spend Medicare funds more wisely the core of their campaign against health care reform (death panels!). And presidential hopefuls say things like this, from Gov. Tim Pawlenty of Minnesota: “I don’t think anybody’s gonna go back now and say, ‘Let’s abolish, or reduce, Medicare and Medicaid.’”

What about Social Security? Five years ago the Bush administration proposed limiting future payments to upper- and middle-income workers, in effect means-testing retirement benefits. But in December, The Wall Street Journal’s editorial page denounced any such means-testing, because “middle- and upper-middle-class voters would get less than they were promised in return for a lifetime of payroll taxes.”

At this point, then,

Republicans insist that the deficit must be eliminated, but they’re not willing either to raise taxes or to support cuts in any major government programs. And they’re not willing to participate in bipartisan discussions, either, because that might force them to explain their plan — and there isn’t any plan, except to regain power.

But there is a kind of logic to the current Republican position: In effect, the party is doubling down on starve-the-beast. Depriving the government of revenue, it turns out, wasn’t enough to push politicians into dismantling the welfare state. So now the de facto strategy is to oppose any responsible action until we are in the midst of a fiscal catastrophe. You read it here first.

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Teacher hailed as a hero after tackling Colorado school shooting suspect

DENVER — During regular emergency drills at Deer Creek Middle School in suburban Denver, math teacher David Benke always told himself and his students that, should something dire occur, he would try to protect them.

So when he spotted a rifleman beginning to shoot students leaving school Tuesday, Benke didn't hesitate. "I made a promise," he said.

The 57-year-old teacher charged the gunman and knocked him to the ground. While an assistant principal grabbed the rifle, Benke and another teacher kept the shooter pinned until police arrived.

On Wednesday, a judge ordered the accused gunman, 32-year-old Bruco Strong Eagle Eastwood, held on \$1-million bail on suspicion of two counts of attempted murder. Two students were wounded — one in the arm, the other in the rib and lung.

The shooting was a few miles from Columbine High School, the site of the worst school massacre in U.S. history, where in 1999 two teenage gunmen killed 12 students and a teacher. Authorities said Benke's heroism may have staved off a similar tragedy at Deer Creek.

Jefferson County Sheriff Ted Mink shook Benke's hand before television cameras Tuesday night and said "You're a fine man." A new Facebook page titled "Dr. David Benke is a Hero!" had 14,000 followers by Wednesday morning.

Eastwood is an unemployed ranch hand with a long history of arrests for assault and domestic violence. His father told the Denver Post that his son has mental problems and hears voices in his head.

In the early 1990s, authorities said, Eastwood attended Deer Creek in Littleton. He returned there midday Tuesday and checked in at the office, but it is unclear what happened next.

"There was some dialogue with staff and then he left. Then the shooting began," Jacki Kelley, a spokeswoman for the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, said at a news conference. "He was not asked to leave, he just left."

Kelley said Eastwood has been cooperating with authorities but declined to say what explanation the suspect gave for the attack. She said Eastwood was using his father's rifle.

Benke was one of four teachers outside the school watching children leave at about 3 p.m. when he heard the first shot.

Benke said he turned and

saw Eastwood. "I noticed he was working a bolt action rifle," Benke said at a news conference at district headquarters Wednesday. "I realized I had time to get him before he could chamber another round."

After Benke, who is 6-foot-5, tackled Eastwood, the two men fell to the

ground grappling. Assistant Principal Becky Brown dashed over and pulled the gun away from Eastwood. Brown said she, too, didn't hesitate.

"Those kids are my kids," she said. "When I saw him (Benke) and saw what he was doing I wanted to help."

Another teacher climbed

on top of Eastwood, who complained that he was being brutalized and that he would sue the school for excessive force, Benke said.

A laconic, soft-spoken man, Benke on Wednesday brushed off accolades for his actions. "You're just doing what you can do to try to protect your kids," he said.

Foundations propose plaza revitalization

Two community foundations hope to redevelop the Fountain Plaza at the intersection of Main Street and Hansen Street in downtown Twin Falls.

The Community Foundation and the Seagraves Family Foundation have commissioned a study by The Land Group Inc. to con-

vert the 1970s-era fountain into a ‘pocket park.’ The study, which was funded entirely by donations through the foundations, will propose ways to expand seating, pedestrian travel and landscaping — part of an effort to accommodate more diversified and increased use since the plaza was first built.

Foundation officials are stopping short of calling for the removal of the existing

fountain, but they say there are other options that might better serve the community’s needs.

“Right now nothing is set in stone, but the plan is just to create something that provides more for the public,” said Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer.

He said one idea might include flat fountains, such as those used in the Boise Centre On the Grove.

The Community Foundation, which was created about two years ago by former mayor Lance Clow, sought support from the Twin Falls City Council earlier this month, but was met with some skepticism about removing the fountain.

City Councilman Trip Craig asked Scott Allen, a senior planner with The Land Group, whether or not the fountain would stay.

Allen responded by saying the study would explore all options and that many residents have mixed feelings about the fountain.

“I’d just as soon have the fountain there,” Craig said.

Despite concerns, the city council voted unanimously to support the study.

Bowyer said the financing is not yet in place to perform any construction work, adding that both founda-

tions, the Historic Downtown Business Improvement District and the city of Twin Falls would like to partner with the private sector to pay for any changes that are recommended in the study.

He said the study, which cost about \$3,000, is expected to be completed in March.

Construction crews will remove the last vats and piping this week from a micro-brewery that once produced award-winning beers in Twin Falls.

Trail Creek Brewing Co. ceased brewery operations last year at its location at 516 Hansen St. S., and the equipment sat idle for more

than 10 months.

Scott Featherstone, owner of the building and the Trail Creek Brewing Co., said the nearly 5 year-old brewery is saying farewell to Twin Falls. The closure of the brewery

does not affect Pandora’s restaurant, which is a tenant in the building.

“The foundation for this decision was built upon the notable lack of support toward our operation and

our award-winning beers from the remaining business and civic community,” he said. “In retrospect, we found our company goals to be mismatched with the desires of the area.”

Trail Creek’s beers were served locally at only two locations — Pandora’s and Woody’s — after the brewery closed its restaurant in

America’s thrifts break even in 2009

WASHINGTON — America’s thrifts posted a small profit last year after two years of losses, evidence the industry may be stabilizing amid the economic recovery.

The Office of Thrift Supervision said Wednesday that savings and loans earned \$29 million last year, after reporting net losses of \$15.9 billion in 2008 and \$649 million in 2007.

That is the industry’s first annual profit since 2006.

Thrifts earned \$505 million in the fourth quarter, the second profitable quarter in a row.

The number of troubled thrifts — those with low capital reserves and other problems — was unchanged at 43 in the October-December period, compared to the third quarter.

Still, that is up from 26 a year earlier.

John Bowman, acting director of the OTS, said the industry is still not out of the woods. The industry set aside \$3.9 billion in reserves in the fourth quarter to offset expected losses. While that’s lower than it set aside earlier in 2009, it’s still the eighth highest on record.

“Too many people continue to struggle to pay their mortgages ... and financial institutions continue to deal with high levels of loan delinquencies and foreclosures,” Bowman said.

The thrift industry’s troubled assets — loans that are overdue and repossessed property — as a percentage of total assets dropped to 3.25 percent in the fourth quarter from 3.65 percent in the July-September period. That’s



Senate OKs tax breaks for hiring the jobless

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democrats delivered the first of several promised election-year jobs bills Wednesday, passing a measure blending highway funding eagerly sought by the states with tax breaks for companies that hire unemployed workers.

The bipartisan 70-28 vote to pass the bill sends it to the House, where many Democrats say it is too puny — but where pressure is on to pass it this week anyway to score a badly needed win for President Barack Obama and a Democratic Party that's dropped badly in opinion polls and faces major losses in midterm elections.

It's the first major bill to pass the Senate since the Christmas Eve passage of a deeply controversial health care bill and the subsequent election of Massachusetts Republican Scott Brown, which rocked Democrats by demonstrating their falling standing even among voters who tend to vote Democratic.

Democrats promise additional measures to create jobs, promising help for small businesses having trouble getting loans, aid for cash-strapped state governments, and subsidies for people who make their homes more energy efficient.

The bill contains two major provisions. First, it would exempt businesses hiring the unemployed from the 6.2 percent Social Security payroll tax through December and give them an additional \$1,000 credit if new workers stay on the job a full year. The Social Security trust funds would be reimbursed for the lost revenue.

Second, it would extend highway and mass transit programs through the end of the year and pump \$20 billion into them in time for the spring construction season. The money would make up for lower-than-expected gasoline tax revenues.

Toyota chief apologizes, blasted by lawmakers

WASHINGTON — Under blistering criticism, Toyota President Akio Toyoda personally and repeatedly apologized to Congress and millions of anxious American car-owners Wednesday for deadly defects in popular models produced by his Japanese company. But angry lawmakers forcefully declared it was hardly enough.

“Where is the remorse?” scolded Rep. Marcy Kaptur, D-Ohio. And Republican John Mica of Florida held aloft what he called an “absolutely appalling” Toyota report bragging of defusing a safety investigation.

Of Toyoda's apology, Kaptur said, “I do not think it reflects significant remorse for those who have died.” Federal safety officials

have received reports linking 34 deaths in the United States to safety defects in Toyota cars and trucks over the past decade.

“I extend my sincerest condolences to them from the bottom of my heart,” responded Toyoda, grandson of the founder of the world's largest auto company. “I'm deeply sorry for any accident that Toyota drivers have experienced.”

But what's most important to American drivers — and what lawmakers pressed Toyoda and a top aide to provide — was a better explanation for slow actions to deal with the defects and believable assurances the problems that led to sudden unintended accelerations will be fixed. Toyoda said those changes are being made nearly around the

clock, but he repeated the company's insistence that there is no link to the cars' electronic systems.

Many drivers filing complaints with Toyota and the government say their acceleration problems had nothing to do with floor mat interference or sticky gas pedals — the culprits the company is pointing to. Outside experts have suggested electronic problems.

Toyota has recalled 8.5 million vehicles, more than 6 million of them in the United States, mostly to fix problems with floor mats trapping gas pedals or with pedals getting stuck. Toyoda said great strides were being taken by his company to put “safety first” and it was working hard to refit the millions of cars and trucks that have been recalled.

Obama, Dems already looking beyond health summit


WASHINGTON — President Obama and congressional Democrats, holding out little hope for today's televised bipartisan summit on health care, are prepared to try for a far-reaching bill in the coming weeks without a single Republican vote.

Barring an unexpected two-party breakthrough at the summit, Democratic leaders feel they can't afford to fail, leaving them empty-handed on a huge priority in an already difficult election year. It's far from clear they can gather the votes, however, and it will take a major effort to unite fractious Democrats.

A bipartisan compromise seems highly unlikely, members of both parties said Wednesday. Popular insurance reform measures, which Republicans might support, require Democratic-backed measures the GOP staunchly opposes, such as government subsidies to enable millions of low-income Americans to buy health coverage.

With Democrats unwilling to start from scratch, “I think it's nearly impossible to imagine a scenario under which we could reach an agreement,” said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., who will attend the televised six-hour meeting across from the White House.

Given such comments, Democratic leaders say they hope to persuade House Democrats to swallow their

objections and approve a health bill the Senate passed on Christmas Eve. In return, Senate Democrats would have to agree to make various changes to health care laws under budget reconciliation rules, which bar GOP delaying tactics.

“Tomorrow we'll have that meeting.... But far more important after that meeting, you can either join us or get out of the way,” Sen. Chris Dodd, D-Conn., said

at a rally Wednesday.

Said Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., “If the Republicans refuse to support the end of debate so that a majority can work its will we're fortunate enough to have a process so the majority can work its will through the reconciliation activities.”

While deriding the summit, Republicans plan to focus on six main areas, according to congressional aides: state incentives to lower costs; making insurance affordable to those with pre-existing conditions; purchasing health insurance across state lines; ending frivolous lawsuits; small business health plans and expanding health savings accounts.

Democrats control 59 of the Senate's 100 seats, one vote short of the number needed to stop GOP filibusters. Republicans strenuously oppose using the reconciliation strategy, but Democrats note the GOP has used it for major legislation in years past.

The House in November passed its version of the health care overhaul 220-

Plan to fire all teachers roils R.I. city

CENTRAL FALLS, R.I. — The blue-and-white banner exclaiming “anticipation” on the front of Central Falls High School seems like a cruel joke for an institution so chronically troubled that its leaders decided to fire every teacher by year's end.

No more than half those instructors would be hired back under a federal option that has enraged the state's powerful teachers union, earned criticism from students, and brought praise from U.S. Education Secretary Arne Duncan and some parents.

The mass firings were approved by the school district's board of trustees Tuesday night after talks failed between Superintendent Frances Gallo and the local teachers union over implementing changes, including offering more tutoring and a longer school day. The teachers say they want more pay for the additional work.

“If it's only an hour or two a week, I think teachers can afford to do that,” said Robert Rivera, 40, who worries about sending his 13-year-old daughter to the troubled high school next year. He dropped out of school as a teenager and works more than 60 hours a week as an appliance repairman.

He's determined his daughter will go to college, although he sometimes feels her teachers have a nonchalant attitude when he seeks help.

“I just feel like maybe they're not putting in the effort,” he said.

The shake-up comes as Rhode Island's new educa-

tion commissioner, Deborah Gist, pushes the state to compete for millions of dollars in federal funding to reform the worst 5 percent of its schools, including in Central Falls.

State law requires schools to warn teachers by March 1 if their jobs are in jeopardy for the following school year.

To get the money, schools must choose one of four paths set under federal law, including mass firings. Gallo has said she initially hoped to avoid layoffs by adopting a plan that would have lengthened the school day and required teachers to get additional training and offer more tutoring.

U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan applauded the plan, saying students only have one chance for an education.

“When schools continue to struggle we have a collective obligation to take action,” he said in a written statement.







Snow storms blanket Northeast; 2nd storm on tap

ALBANY, N.Y. — A powerful winter storm dumped a foot or more of snow in the Northeast on Wednesday, knocking out power to thousands and stalling air traffic from Boston to Philadelphia, all ahead of a second system packing strong winds that could blanket the area with another foot of snow.

The storm cut a swath from eastern Pennsylvania into northern New England, slamming typically snowy regions that had been spared the paralyzing storms that hit cities farther south earlier this winter. About 150,000 customers lost power Wednesday, hundreds of schools were closed and at least three traffic deaths were blamed on the storm.

An 89-year-old woman died in a crash in New York's Hudson Valley. In Pennsylvania's Pocono Mountains, a woman and a boy died when their vehicle slid off snow- and ice-covered Interstate 80; The man driving the car was not expected to survive.

The system was the first of a 1-2 winter punch. Another storm forecast to hit Thursday is expected to pack wind gusts up to 35 mph, which could cause more power outages, and dump a foot or more of snow on some areas by Friday. Meteorologists said some areas of New York's Adirondack and Catskill mountains and Vermont's Green Mountains could get as much as 2 feet by the weekend.

Philadelphia, which has had its snowiest winter with more than 70 inches and is still digging out from earlier back-to-back storms, could see as much as a foot of snow.

"It might not be until early next week that we get rid of the storm completely," said meteorologist Hugh Johnson of the National Weather Service's Albany office.

A description of the coming storm as a "snowicane" by State College, Pa.-based Accuweather Inc. touched off criticism — one newspaper called it a "smackdown" — by the National Weather Service.

On Tuesday, 48 hours before the storm was to hit, Accuweather called it "hurricane-like" a "monster," and a "powerful storm of historical proportions" that would wreak havoc from Pennsylvania to Maine and by Wednesday was using the term "snowicane."

That prompted a stern response from National Weather Service meteorolo-

gist Craig Evanego.

"It's almost inciting the public, inciting panic," he said.

The Weather Channel called the hurricane talk "bad meteorology."

Accuweather senior meteorologist and director of forecasting operations Ken Reeves called the NWS criticism "unfounded" and said there is nothing wrong in using language that gets people's attention when the situation calls for it.

The northern edge of Wednesday's storm reached into the Massachusetts' Berkshires, Vermont and New Hampshire, dumping more than a foot of snow in some areas and prompting flooding concerns in Maine.

The hardest hit area Wednesday was Albany, N.Y., where some outlying areas had about 2 feet of snow by afternoon. The snow was so thick and heavy that even pickup trucks got stuck trying to plow it out.

"We tried the snowblower

and it didn't work. It keeps clogging up," said Pat McDonough as she shoveled her front walk in Voorheesville, a village just west of Albany.

While parts of the Northeast dealt with Wednesday's weather, other cities were preparing for another blast of winter.

In New York City, Mayor Michael Bloomberg said the city was making sure building owners were aware of the predicted high winds and were taking steps to tie down anything that could come loose.

"My hope is that the snow will stay to the north and west of us and we'll just have rain — our kids need another school day," Bloomberg said.

"We will cancel school only if it really would be dangerous to get the kids into school and get them home."

In Pennsylvania, State Transportation Secretary Allen Biehler is urging motorists to avoid unnecessary travel in a storm fore-

cast to bring snow and gusty winds. The system expected to create the storm that will travel up the Atlantic Coast was causing problems in the South on Wednesday. The weather service issued a winter storm warning through Friday morning for mountainous areas of western North Carolina, where forecasters said up to 10 inches was possible by tonight.


The past is not forgotten. It's been a year since Zak Slotten lost to Jake Williams of Eagle in the Class 5A 171-pound finals of the state wrestling tournament. He still remembers how it felt.

"The feeling of getting there and not winning it, I haven't felt like that ever. It's the worst feeling I've probably ever had," Slotten said. "Every day in the room it's a thing that keeps me going, keeps me working hard."

Slotten is one of 138 wrestlers from District IV who will compete at this weekend's state wrestling tournament at Holt Arena in Pocatello.

With a season record of 26-1, Slotten earned the top seed and is favored to finish his senior year with a state title. It won't be easy, however, with several talented grapplers in the bracket, including Minico's Colby May (29-9).

Slotten and May are ranked Nos. 1 and 2, respectively, by IdahoWrestlingNews.com. Besides sharing the cover of the *Times-News'* Magic Valley Prep Football fall preview in 2009, the two senior rivals are also familiar with one another on the mat. They've met three times this

season, with Slotten coming out on top each time.

"The key is just taking him down," Slotten said of May. "He's tough to turn, so I've got to be better on my feet."

Said May of Slotten: "He's a good technical wrestler, and he's strong. I have a shot with him, but I'll have to wrestle one of my best matches of the year to beat him."

Twin Falls seniors Will Keeter (37-2) at 140 pounds and Joe Hamilton (29-5) at 125 join Slotten in receiving the top seed in their brackets. Keeter was a 135-pound champion in Class 5A last year, while Hamilton took third at 119.

"Our coaches push us every day to be the best we can be, and our seniors are leading the team," Slotten said. "Our seniors have

been (to state), and we know what it takes. We try to help the younger guys out and show them what it takes and lead by example. We've got eight kids going to state, which is the most we've had since I've been here."

Heavy hitters Columbia, Blackfoot and Pocatello are expected to vie for the Class 4A team crown. Jerome, Twin Falls or Minico could be in the running for a team third- or fourth-place trophy if they wrestle well.


"I love it," said Jones. "It's a challenge. Every time we go to a game, and they put me on a player that they want to be stopped, it just pushes me to do a better job."

U.S., PARISE SURVIVE TENSE GAME TO REACH SEMIFINALS

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — The longer it went, the tighter the Americans got. They clanged shots off the post, then the crossbar. A wrist shot early in the game by Phil Kessel that looked like a bad omen hit both. Everything else the U.S. hockey team threw on net Wednesday, Swiss goalie Jonas Hiller smothered. But Zach Parise put all that frustration aside, deflecting a wrist shot from Brian Rafalski early in the third period, then scored into an empty net late to seal a 2-0 quarterfinal win that sends the U.S. to the next round against Finland.

Ryan Miller made 19 saves to backstop the victory and move the Americans within two wins of its first men's hockey gold medal in 30 years. Parise, the top-line forward who struck posts with two other shots, got a stick on Rafalski's shot and bounced it off the mask and arm of Hiller before the puck sneaked past his pad and inside the left post 2:08 into the third. The goal came 12 seconds into a power play. He then sealed the win by scoring into an empty net with 11.2 seconds left.

Vonn crashes; U.S. hockey pulls out tight game

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Lindsey Vonn went down hard. Zach Parise made sure the U.S. men's hockey team didn't.

Hours after Vonn broke her right pinkie in a giant slalom crash, the hockey guys found themselves in trouble against Switzerland. The game was scoreless a couple minutes into the third period until Parise broke through. He added an empty-net goal in the closing seconds to seal a 2-0 victory and put the Americans into the semifinals.

The Canadians advanced, too, finally looking like the juggernaut they're supposed to be — and they did it against Russia, the matchup many expected to be for the gold medal, but happened in only a quarterfinal.

Next up for the U.S. squad is Finland. NBC already has said it will show that game live, in all time zones, at 1 p.m., MST Friday. Canada advances to the other semifinal, against the winner of Wednesday's late quarterfinal between Sweden and Slovakia.

Vonn's status isn't so clear. She landed on her left hip and battered her chin with a ski during her fall. Besides the finger, her back hurt, as did the bruised right shin that's slowed her for weeks.

The cover girl coming into these Winter Games, Vonn's scorecard so far shows two medals (a gold and a bronze) and two wipeouts. It wasn't known if she will ski her final event — the slalom — on Friday.

The second leg of the giant slalom was delayed until Thursday because of fog so thick "you cannot really see the snow on the ground," a Finnish skier said. More delays could give Vonn more time to heal, as happened with her shin, but there isn't much time left in the Olympics.

Americans added to their over-all haul with bronze in women's bobsled and short-track speed-skating's women's relay. The total is up to 28, inching toward their record of 34 set at Salt Lake City in 2002.

Germany has 24 medals, perhaps missing another when a bobsled crew lost control on its

final run, the brakeman flying out the back and the driver flying down the course inside the sled. Both walked away.

HOCKEY

Swiss goalie Jonas Hiller kept the Americans scoreless by stuffing Parise several times, with two more of Parise's shots clanking against the goal posts.

Then there was the shot that Hiller tried swatting away, but it went off his shoulder and into the net — a millisecond or two after the second period ended.

"We kept saying on the bench, 'Don't get frustrated,'" Parise recalled.

Parise finally scored 2:08 into the final period by redirecting a shot by Brian Rafalski early in a power play. Switzerland fought to tie it, but Ryan Miller made 19 saves and Parise scored again with 11.2 seconds left. The Americans are two wins from their first Olympic gold medal since the "Miracle on Ice" in 1980.

Canada gave its nervous nation a huge sigh of relief, jumping to leads of 3-0 and 4-1 in the first period alone on its way to 7-3 trouncing of Alex Ovechkin and the world champion Russians.

"We just wanted to step on the gas pedal from the drop of the puck," defenseman Chris Pronger said.

This was the first time Canada beat Russia at the Olympics in 50

years, and only the second time in 11 Olympics games against the Russians or Soviets.

Finland, the 2006 silver medalist, advanced with a 2-0 victory over the Czech Republic, breaking a scoreless tie when Nicklas Hagman tipped in a power-play goal with 6:26 left and stretching it with an empty-netter.

GIANT SLALOM

While this is Vonn's worst event, no skier wants to go out like she did.

"I was like a pretzel," she said, "so tangled up."

American Julia Mancuso, the defending Olympic champion, was next, and starters made the mistake of sending her out while Vonn was still down. That meant a restart, which is tough on the body and the mind. She wound up 18th — and furious. She'll have at least one night to keep stewing over it.

Elisabeth Goergl of Austria was the leader. The top American was Sara Schleper, in 14th place.

SHORT TRACK SPEEDSKATING

The 3,000-meter relay team of Allison Bayer, Alyson Dudek, Lana Gehring and Katherine Reutter was last across the finish in the four-team final, but got promoted to third when the apparent winners from South Korea were disqualified.

Reutter also set an Olympic

record in winning her heat in the 1,000 meters. The rest of the quarterfinals, semifinals and finals are Friday.

Apolo Anton Ohno is a baby step closer to another medal, too, winning his 500-meter heat. He, too, has to endure three more rounds if he's going to extend his record of Winter Olympics medals by an American. He has seven, including gold in this event four years ago.

SPEEDSKATING

Martina Sablikova of the Czech Republic captured her second gold medal in Vancouver, adding the 5,000 meters to the 3,000 title she's already won.

Stephanie Beckert of Germany got silver, and 37-year-old, defending Olympic champion Clara Hughes of Canada thrilled the crowd by taking bronze.

"This crowd gave me wings," said Hughes, who also won two bronze medals in cycling at the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta. "It was one of the best races of my life. Now, I am officially retired."

Jilleanne Rookard was the top American, finishing eighth.

AERIALS

Australia's Lydia Lassila not only prevented China from sweeping the women's event, she wound up atop the podium. It's especially satisfying for her after tearing up her knee during qualifying at the Turin Games.

CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING

Marcus Hellner was so far ahead at the end of his anchor leg that he had time to collect a Swedish flag to wave as he skied to the finish of the team relay, earning his second gold medal of these Olympics and Sweden's first in this event since 1988.

Norway got silver, and the Czech Republic took bronze. The Americans were 13th.

MEN'S CURLING

The reigning world champion British men aren't going to get a medal. They're headed home, eliminated by a Swedish team that will next face top-seeded and unbeaten Canada.

Holmstead finished the game 1-for-7 from the field and scored two points.

North Idaho's leading scorer, freshman Kama Griffiths, had a similar experience with Jones last week. Griffiths came into last Friday's game averaging 16.2 points but managed only eight against Jones, visibly frustrated during a 2-for-16 shooting night.

"Because she's so athletic and so gifted, when she gives effort she's pretty good," CSI head coach Randy Rogers said of Jones.

And now the freshman from Utah's Bear River High School is blossoming on the offensive end as well.

Jones is averaging just 4.1 points on 31-percent shooting for the season but has scored 7.1 per game through the past seven games and 9.3 in her last three outings.

In addition to shutting down Griffiths last week, Jones also tallied 12 points, 10 rebounds and five assists in CSI's upset of the No. 17 Cardinals. Jones' offensive repertoire is a nice complement to fellow freshman guard Daidra Brown. While both possess quickness and are solid defenders, Brown excels at getting to the hoop and getting to the foul line, where she's earned 125 free throw attempts this season. Jones prefers midrange jumpers and has put up only 22 foul shots all season.

"We think Flip can get to the rim even more because she's got quickness on almost everyone she plays against," said Rogers. "Sometimes she just doesn't trust her ability to get all the way there. Saying that, we don't mind that 12-foot pull-up,

because she's getting pretty effective with it."

"I like to get to the rim, but my problem is finishing when I get there," said Jones. "My pull-up, I worked on it all through high school."

It shows as Jones can hit her midrange shot from all angles, often while being off-balance or fading away from the hoop.

But no matter how many points she scores, Jones always maintains that she prefers a big stop over a big basket — a rare trait among basketball players. But Jones has always stood out from the crowd. She was born and raised in the small and predominantly white town of Tremonton, Utah, after her father left Amarillo, Texas, in search of space and outdoor activities.

"It was really weird to be honest," Jones said of growing up in Tremonton. "It took a while to get used to. But once you got older, you had more recognition because people knew who you were. It was different. But I'm glad I grew up in a small town like that."

As for her nickname, that was given to her by her sister's friend and soon picked up by her family.

When she told CSI's players her name was Felicity during her recruiting trip last season, she was told that was too long. "Well, my family calls me 'Flip,'" she replied. The nickname stuck with her the way she sticks to opponents.

Her ability, coupled with that of Brown and freshman post Laurel Kearsley will give CSI three talented players to build around next season.

"Couldn't ask for any better start to a new team," said Rogers.

But the current Golden Eagles (20-8, 12-6 Scenic West Athletic Conference) are far from through. After hosting SWAC cellar-dwellers Colorado Northwestern Community College (5:30 p.m., today) and the College of Eastern Utah (3 p.m., Saturday), CSI will set its sights on the winning the March 4-6 Region 18 Tournament and earning a berth to the NJCAA Tournament in Salina, Kan.

ISU men try to earn Big Sky berth

Disappointing Bengals cap regular season on the road

POCATELLO — It's been a season that has caused Idaho State men's head basketball coach Joe O'Brien to scratch his head, throw up his hands and even become speechless.

They entered the season with lofty expectations, but now the Bengals' hopes of just making the Big Sky Conference postseason tournament are hanging by a thread.

But it hasn't completely turned to ashes.

With a few days left in the regular season, the Bengals (7-20, 4-10 Big Sky) stayed alive last week despite getting blown out at Weber State, thanks to losses by others in the conference. This week, they have to help themselves as they travel to Portland State on Friday and Eastern Washington on Saturday.

his week, they have to help themselves as they travel to Portland State on Friday and Eastern Washington on Saturday.

The fact that Idaho State plays hard some nights and doesn't bother to show up on others has made this the most frustrating year in O'Brien's two-plus decades as a head coach.

"I told them I don't know who they are," O'Brien said. "I've coached them, and they are all back from last year, but they're not the same kids as last season. Last year, we had some tenacity, consistency and desire. This year, it's a crapshoot. I don't know what's going to happen from game to game."

One thing that's been a

hallmark of O'Brien's teams is solid, fundamental defense. That makes this season, with six players who have been in Pocatello for four seasons, so hard for the coach to understand.

"This should be the best defensive team I've had, because I've got all these guys that have been here forever," O'Brien said. "I think we're the worst defensive team that I've had in my four years here. That's sad."

Heading into tonight's game at Portland State, five Big Sky teams have clinched postseason berths. Three clubs are in the running for the remaining spot. Both Portland State and Idaho State control their own destinies, as two wins by either team gives them the No. 6 seed. The Bengals will be eliminated with a loss. They would qualify with a win over Portland State coupled with Weber State wins over Eastern Washington and Portland State, and a Sacramento State loss to either Northern Arizona or Northern Colorado.

But Idaho State has had trouble winning in the Pacific Northwest under O'Brien. There's also the injury to star guard Broderick Gilcrest (foot), who sat the Weber State game with a walking boot on his foot. He is questionable this week.

O'Brien and his staff plan to take a hard look at the hoops program following the season, analyzing everything from coaching style to the type of players recruited and how practices are run.

It's all an effort to figure out a season that had the capacity to be great but has turned into one of the most forgettable in school history.

Emotional LT bids farewell to San Diego

POWAY, Calif. — LaDainian Tomlinson bid an emotional farewell to San Diego, then looked toward a future that he hopes will include an elusive Super Bowl title.

"It's definitely sad to leave, but I'm excited, as well, about the future," Tomlinson said during a press conference Wednesday. The Chargers released him Monday after a mostly brilliant nine-year run in which he became one of the greatest running backs in NFL history.

Tomlinson thanked the fans; his teammates throughout the years; the Chargers, for giving him a chance; and lastly, his pregnant wife, LaTorsha, who was sitting to his right in a ballroom at a suburban golf course.

Had Tomlinson won a Super Bowl title or two with the Chargers, he may very well have been announcing his retirement.

He didn't even make it to a Super Bowl, though, and said he plans to keep pursuing his goal with whichever team will give him a chance.

PROSECUTORS: MICHAEL IRVIN WON'T FACE RAPE CHARGES

MIAMI — South Florida prosecutors said Wednesday they will not file rape charges against former Dallas Cowboys star Michael Irvin.

A woman filed a lawsuit Feb. 4 in Broward County Circuit Court seeking unspecified damages for a sexual assault that allegedly occurred July 4 or 5, 2007, at the Seminole Hard Rock Hotel & Casino in Hollywood. The Broward State Attorney's office reported it would not file charges.

The incident was reported to Seminole tribal police on July 20, 2007, but the woman later signed a waiver of prosecution, according to tribe officials.

The Broward State Attorney's office was investigating the claims, but a spokesman said there was no physical evidence because the woman waited more than two weeks to report the incident.

Irvin, 43, is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame who starred at wide receiver for the Cowboys from 1988 to 1999. The Fort Lauderdale native was also a star in college for the University of Miami, playing on the Hurricanes' 1987 national championship team. Irvin is now an analyst for the NFL Network.

NFL DECLINES TO PUNISH RAIDERS COACH CABLE

ALAMEDA, Calif. — Oakland Raiders coach Tom Cable will not be punished by the NFL after an investigation into allegations of domestic violence against women and a fight with an assistant coach.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello said Wednesday that Cable's role in the training camp altercation with assistant Randy Hanson warranted an evaluation under the league's personal conduct policy.

Cable, a former University of Idaho head football coach, was accused of breaking Hanson's jaw and teeth during a fight at the team's training camp hotel in August. The Napa County district attorney declined to file criminal charges in the case because of inconsistencies in Hanson's story. Because there were no criminal charges, the league did not punish Cable.

COWBOYS, BENGALS TO PLAY HALL OF FAME EXHIBITION

NEW YORK — The Dallas Cowboys will play the Cincinnati Bengals in the 2010 Hall of Fame exhibition game, one day after Cowboys star Emmitt Smith and longtime Bengals coach Dick LeBeau are inducted.

The game will be played on Aug. 8 in Canton, Ohio, marking the beginning of the NFL's preseason schedule.

Induction ceremonies will be held on Aug. 7. Smith, the NFL's career leader in yards rushing, was elected along with six other players, including Jerry Rice, John Randle, Rickey Jackson, Russ Grimm and Floyd Little.

Leg pain is troublesome, especially at night

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been experiencing unusual discomfort in my legs. It began when I started to exercise in the summer of 2009. I attributed it to the exercise on the glute machine, so I stopped. The pain went away, but I then began to experience leg pain/discomfort that can be described as similar to shin splints. It's not a sharp pain, just a throbbing discomfort. I feel it especially at night, and it wakes me up. This usually happens when I lie on my side. Sometimes I put a pillow between my legs, hoping to avoid it, but it doesn't always help. When I wake up, I turn on my back and the discomfort dissipates, allowing me to go back to sleep. There are nights

when the pain doesn't awaken me, and I'm not sure what that is attributed to.

During the day, I occasionally feel the same discomfort but not to the same degree, and it's not as bothersome. Do you have any ideas on what it could be or how I can work toward making it go away?

I'm 51 years old, slender and in good health. I do not smoke or drink, am not diabetic, and I don't have high blood pressure. My cholesterol levels are a little

higher than they should be, so I have been taking red yeast rice. Also, I've developed a bit of a rash on the inside of both my knees. I hope you have some ideas because my doctor doesn't. I've been researching circulatory problems, but nothing there rings a bell.

DEAR READER: Your initial pain certainly could have resulted from using the glute machine. The use of any new and different piece of equipment may result in unexpected stress and strain on bones and their connective tissues.

The outer edge of the tibia, the large prominent bone in the front of the lower leg, causes the pain of shin splints. And frequent starts and stops from sports such as tennis or

basketball, from training too quickly and/or to excess, are what cause shin splints. The pain may be continuous. Relief is often found through rest, ice or hot packs, over-the-counter salves with cayenne pepper or eucalyptus formulas, physical therapy and massage.

If the pain is in the calf area, it's possible your red yeast rice could play a role. This product contains lovastatin (with statin being the key part of the word). About 10 years ago, the Food and Drug Administration came down hard on several manufacturers and has since monitored the market closely. Any red-yeast-rice product found to contain more than "trace" amounts of

lovastatin is considered an "unapproved drug" and may be banned. Studies have shown the product does work for some people (despite low statin levels, suggesting something else might be at work), but it may still cause the problems statins cause. Given its unregulated manufacture, there is no way for consumers to know exactly what dosage they are using.

Side effects include muscle pain or damage and kidney problems, and it isn't recommended for people with liver disease. I don't think your problem is vascular in nature. I suggest you buy a hypoallergenic pillow for your knees.

Discontinue the red yeast rice to determine whether the pain subsides,

use ice or hot packs, exercise in moderation, and attempt to control your cholesterol levels through proper diet. If these recommendations fail to provide relief, request a second opinion.



Father of missing N.J. baby charged with murder

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A New Jersey man was charged Wednesday with murder for allegedly throwing his 3-month-old daughter off a highway bridge into an icy river last week.

Shamsid-Din Abdur-Raheem, of Galloway Township, assaulted the child's maternal grandmother at her East Orange apartment and ripped the child from her arms on Feb. 16, the same day the girl's mother sought a restraining order against him, police said.

Attorney General Paula Dow said the search for the baby was ongoing. Despite the lack of a body, Dow said there was enough evidence to file a first-degree murder charge.

"While our ongoing exhaustive search has not located the victim, we are moving forward with our investigation and our pursuit of justice in this tragic case of domestic violence," Dow said in a statement.

Abdur-Raheem pleaded not guilty to attempted murder and other charges filed last week. Tom Rosenthal, a spokesman for the New Jersey Office of the Public Defender, which is repre-

sending Abdur-Raheem, said the office had just received the case file Wednesday and that it was too early to comment on the new court.

Abdur-Raheem remains in the Essex County jail. His bail has been increased to \$2 million on the new charge, which was filed in Middlesex County and carries a possible sentence of 30 years to life in prison.

The search for the baby, Zara Malani-lin Abdur, has centered around the Garden State Parkway's Driscoll Bridge, which spans the

Raritan River between Sayreville and Woodbridge.

The child's mother, Venetta Benjamin, had sole custody and had left the infant in her mother's care while she sought a restraining order against Abdur-Raheem in a Newark court.

Abdur-Raheem allegedly abducted the child from her grandmother's home around 4 p.m. on Feb. 16, choking and assaulting the woman and then striking her with his van as she attempted to block his escape, authorities said.

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Venus has highs and lows in 2010

Venus is probably the most noticed planet, for two reasons: It is the brightest planet, easily outshining everything in the sky except the sun and moon; and when visible it's always within a few hours of sunrise or sunset, never in the middle of the night.

An appearance of Venus (known as an apparition) begins with Venus between the earth and sun (called inferior conjunction) or behind the sun (superior conjunction). At inferior conjunction, Venus is close, and appears to practically leap into the pre-dawn sky, achieving its maximum separation from the sun just over 70 days after conjunction. From superior conjunction, the more distant Venus appears to move far slower, taking over 220 days to reach its maximum separation from the sun (in the evening sky).

Venus takes 225 days to return to the same place in its orbit. In the meantime, Earth has moved on, so the two planets only return to the same position relative to one another after 19 months.

The best evening planetary apparitions occur in the spring, when the plane of the solar system tilts high in the sky after sunset. So a ideal springtime apparition of Venus, when the planet sets around four hours after sunset, is followed by an autumn apparition the following year, when Venus sets only two hours after sunset.

Venus' last evening apparition spanned late

2008 and early 2009, meaning 2010's evening apparition (19 months later) will occur this summer, in a less-than-ideal position for viewing. At its greatest separation from the sun, in late August, Venus will set barely 90 minutes after sunset.

August's early-to-bed Venus will placate sky watchers by appearing closely grouped with Mars and Saturn. And early risers will get some great views of Venus in dark, pre-dawn skies in December.

Campgrounds open early for fishing, safety reasons

Four campgrounds will open a bit early along the Salmon River near Stanley because of the demand to fish for steelhead, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The four campgrounds — Salmon River, Mormon Bend, Whiskey Flats and Holman Creek in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area — will open March 5 and are located downriver from Stanley close to popular fishing areas.

"We're trying to get them all open," Steve Frost, SNRA's recreation program manager, told the *Times-News*. "Of those four we're going to plow out the spurs at Mormon Bend and Salmon."

Mormon Bend includes 16 camp sites, Salmon has 30, Frost said.

He said main emphasis is to get anglers with RVs to stop parking on Highway 75.

"Camp trailers in turnouts along the narrow, twisty Salmon River road create considerable safety

hazards due to limited visibility, especially in the vicinity of the Yankee Fork confluence," Deputy Area Ranger Kelly Jardine said in a news release. "The trailers also consume an inordinate amount of space in the turnouts that are meant for parking, not camping."

The campgrounds will be free of charge until mid-May. Outhouses are open, but all garbage must be packed out to centrally-located Dumpsters at Sunbeam Dam, 13 miles north of Stanley, and the

Scenic Byways Rest Area located just south of Stanley on Highway 75.

Though roads and spurs will be plowed, campground tables and fire rings are still buried.

"Anglers (should) refrain from building fires outside of designated fire rings to prevent damage to paved surfaces underneath the snow and to limit the cleaning required of the campsites after the snow melts," Frost said in the release.

Lead in Wyoming's ravens drops with copper bullets

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Hunters helped reduce lead levels in ravens by replacing lead bullets with copper bullets while hunting in the Jackson region, scientists say.

Last fall, researchers with Craighead Beringia South distributed nearly 200 boxes of copper bullets to hunters with permits for the National Elk Refuge and Grand Teton National Park.

Researchers then captured 46 ravens, birds that typically scavenge the discarded gut piles, during hunting season and tested their blood for lead.

Craighead Beringia South biologist Bryan Bedrosian said an estimated 24 percent of hunters used copper bullets this year, resulting in a 28 percent drop in blood lead levels in ravens compared with what would have been expected.

Previous studies have shown that the blood lead levels in ravens rise about two weeks after the start of hunting season and drop about two weeks after the season ends. Researchers think ravens eat the lead bullet fragments and the lead persists in the bloodstream for about two weeks before it's deposited in the birds' tissues.

This year, since some hunters used copper bullets, the lead levels in the ravens are much lower than they should be if everyone had used lead bullets, Bedrosian said.

"It's the best evidence we've seen for a direct cause-and-effect relationship between hunting with lead ammunition and lead toxicity in the birds," he said.

Bedrosian said the

research is possible because the park and the refuge kept track of how many successful hunters used copper or lead ammunition.

One thing that's not clear yet is the voluntary program's effect on the eagles.

After 12 eagles were tested, researchers could not find a statistically significant drop in lead in their blood this past hunting season. Bedrosian said that while the small number of eagles tested could be one reason, eagles also seem to metabolize lead differently than ravens.

Derek Craighead, executive director and chairman of the board of Craighead Beringia South, said he hopes to hand out more copper bullets next hunting season when additional testing is planned.

Kaibab forest to limit ATV access

WILLIAMS, Ariz. (AP) — By August, riders of all-terrain vehicles could be limited in where they can go in northern Arizona's Kaibab National Forest near Williams.

The U.S. Forest Service plans to limit ATV access to only roads in the area, ending a longtime policy of letting ATV riders drive where they want.

The Forest Service also is considering closing about 25 percent of those forest roads — largely ones that parallel other roads.

Williams District Ranger Martie Schramm says the goal is a balance between people who like to ride ATVs and people who like quieter activities like hiking.

Similar measures are proposed for Arizona's Coconino National Forest, although the Coconino forest has not released specifics.

It's part of a Forest Service directive to limit travel in forests to existing roads.

“Yes,” said Trammell when asked if his group deals with trail issues. “And it’s getting worse.”

That’s part of the reason why SIORA sponsors a club clean up every spring at the canyon rim.

The clean up, which started in the late 1990s, is a way for the group to keep its feet in the door with the BLM and Forest Service.

“Hopefully they see we’re not just a bunch of rowdy people out there, but are concerned about trail maintenance,” Trammell said.

He said the club’s first year doing the clean up rid the canyon rim of roughly 92 tons of garbage.

The next clean up is scheduled for May 8.

LOCAL CLUBS

Trammell and Stutzman aren’t the only 4x4 fans in south-central Idaho.

SIORA also isn’t the only club.

There’s a number of other rock crawlers in the area, scattered in small groups or larger clubs, like the the Snake River Canyon Krawlers in Jerome. And of course, SIORA is always open to new members.

The club meets the second Thursday of each month at First Baptist Church in Twin Falls. Those interested in learning more are welcome to come out to see what the club is all about. Interested parties also may join club members on a ride before signing up to see if it fits their interests, Trammell said.

It’s always better to ride in a group than ride alone, he said, especially if you plan to climb any rocks.

Idaho lawmaker withdraws roadkill harvesting bill

BOISE (AP) — An Idaho lawmaker has withdrawn a bill that would have made it legal to snatch up roadkill, saying it faced too much opposition.

Rep. Dick Harwood told the House Resources and Conservation Committee Tuesday both constituents and the Department of Fish and Game expressed concerns with the measure.

Harwood had wanted people with hunting or trapping licenses to be allowed to harvest the pelts of animals like badgers, bobcats, red foxes, bears and mountain lions. The St. Maries Republican said letting a dead animal rot on the highway doesn’t make sense if someone can make a few hundred dollars off it.

A representative from the Department of Fish and Game said before the committee hearing the department opposed the measure because it collects information about animals killed on roads that help officials determine the length of hunting seasons.

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NATO issues directive restricting night raids on Afghan civilians

KABUL — American troops knocked on the door, and before the Afghan family could find the key to let them in, the soldiers broke it down. There was no time to take women in the home to another place, said 77-year-old Mohammad Nabi. And that’s what troubled the retired school teacher most about the intrusion in the southern town of Marjah. “If they ask us to take our women and daughters in another place and then they do the search, we have no problems,” Nabi told an Associated Press reporter. “We will cooperate with them. But they just enter the house and start searching and they don’t care who is there.” A new directive, confirmed Wednesday by Gen. Stanley McChrystal, aims to limit such nighttime raids on civilians. It was prompted by a storm of complaints from Afghans who, like Nabi, who were enraged over foreign soldiers bursting into their homes. The move is the most recent by coalition forces to woo the Afghan public away from the Taliban. “We didn’t understand what a cultural line it was,” McChrystal said during a luncheon with a group of

young Afghans involved in a leadership program, part of a series he regularly holds to hear Afghan public opinion. “We are trying to change the way we do these,” he said. Such raids emerged as the top concern by Afghans after McChrystal limited the use of airstrikes, which were responsible for the bulk of civilian deaths. He said the directive, whose details remain classified, was issued in late January. The AP had been told last month that NATO forces would limit night raids, but the change was only confirmed Wednesday. A number of groups, along with the Afghan government and civilians, had been pressuring NATO to rethink the nighttime operations. “Night raids cause tremendous trauma within Afghan communities, often alienating the very people whom international forces are supposedly trying to protect,” said a 15-page report this week by the New York-based Open Society Institute, which promotes democracy, and an Afghan

organization focusing on social development, The Liaison Group. Raids can often turn violent, with detainees being kicked or beaten while handcuffed, the report said. It cited a U.N. report that said 98 civilians were killed during night raids in 2009. Among the public, night raids by international troops raise anger because of cultural sensitivities, said Hamid Mohammad, head of the local chapter of a worldwide student leadership organization.

Italy convicts 3 Google execs in abuse video case

MILAN — It seems that when it comes to letting the Web be the Web, it could be the United States against the world. An Italian judge on Wednesday held three Google executives criminally responsible for an online video of an autistic teenager being bullied — a verdict that raises concerns that the Internet giant, and others like it, may be forced to police their content in Italy, and even beyond. The reaction to the verdict in the United States was swift and nearly unanimous in its condemnation of a dangerous precedent experts said threatens the principle of a free and open Internet. Milan Prosecutor Alfredo Robledo reflected a European concern with privacy when he expressed satisfaction with a decision he said protected a fundamental right, putting the interests of an individual before those of a business. “This is the big principal affirmed by this verdict,” Robledo said. “It is fundamental, because a person’s identity is a primary good. If we give that up, anything can happen and that is not OK.” The charges stemmed

from a complaint by Vivi Down, an advocacy group for people with Down syndrome that was named in the 2006 video posted on Google Video, a video-sharing service Google ran before acquiring YouTube later that year. The footage showed an autistic student in Turin being pushed, pummeled with objects, including a pack of tissues, and insulted by classmates, who called him a “mongoloid.” The prosecutor’s case emphasized the video had been viewed 5,500 times over the two months it was online, when it climbed to the top of Google Italy’s “most entertaining” video list and had more than 80 comments, including users urging its removal. Google argued it was unaware of the offensive material and acted swiftly to remove it after being notified by authorities, taking the video down within two hours. Those convicted of violating Italy’s privacy laws were Google’s global privacy counsel Peter Fleischer, its senior vice president and chief legal officer David Drummond and retired chief financial officer George Reyes. They were given six-month suspended sentences. All were charged in absentia and denied wrongdoing.

THIS AGREEMENT is made this ____ day of March, 2010 by and between the CITY OF HEYBURN, an Idaho municipal corporation, and PROJECT MUTUAL TELEPHONE COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION, INC. an Idaho corporation, (PMT) to provide for the terms and conditions of the continued operation of a cable system within the city limits of Heyburn.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, PMT was granted a franchise to provide cable services within the city of Heyburn on March 22, 2000 in Ordinance No. 414; and
WHEREAS, PMT has faithfully and hereto and performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of Ordinance 414; and
WHEREAS, Ordinance 529 authorizes a renewal of the cable television franchise to PMT; and
WHEREAS, PMT has indicated its acceptance to the term and conditions contained in this franchise agreement; and
WHEREAS, the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 authorizes the early renewal of a cable franchise upon a public hearing an informal negotiation process; and
WHEREAS the public hearing and informal negotiation process has occurred.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Heyburn hereby grants a renewal of the cable television franchise to PMT in the following terms and conditions:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

1.1 For the purposes of this Franchise, the following terms, phrases, and words shall
ave the meanings ascribed to them below. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future tense, words in the plural include the singular and words used in the
singular include the plural.

A. AAffiliate® means a condition of being united, being in close connection, allied, or attached as a member or branch.

B. ABasic cable® is the tier of service regularly provided to all subscribers including the retransmission of local broadcast television signals.

C. ACable Act® means Title VI of the Communications Act of 1934 as amended by the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act 1992, as amended by the Telecommunications Act of
1996, and any subsequent amendments.

D. ACable services® means

1. the one-way transmission to a subscriber of video programming, other programming service or data communication by a subscriber,

2. subscriber interaction, if any, which is required for the selection by the subscriber of such video programming, or

3. any other programming service.

E. ACable system® means a facility, consisting of a set of closed transmission paths and associated signal generation, reception, and control equipment that is designed to provide cable service and
other service to subscribers.

F. AChannel® means a single path or section of the spectrum which carries a cable service.

G. ACity® means the City of Heyburn, a municipal corporation of the State of Idaho.

H. ACouncil® means the present governing body of the City or any future board constituting the legislative body of the city.

I. ADisconnection® means the discontinuance of all cable service to a subscriber by a cable operator.

J. AFCC® means the Federal Communications Commission, a regulatory agency of the United States government.

J. AFranchising Authority® means the City of Heyburn, Idaho.

K. AFranchise® shall mean the initial authorization, or renewal thereof, issued by the city, whether such authorization is designated as a franchise, permit, license, resolution, contract, certificate or
otherwise, which authorizes construction or operation of the cable system for the purpose of offering cable service or other service to subscribers.

L. AGrantee® means Cable One, Inc.

N. AGross revenues® means any and all receipts and revenues received directly or indirectly from all sources by the operator of a cable system or attributable to a cable system within the corporate
limits of the City, excluding high-speed internet services, home shopping revenues, voice over internet protocol and advertising sales. AGross revenues® is intended to include, but is not limited to, all
income without any offsetting of expenses, costs or depreciation, derived from:

Subscribers receiving goods, equipment, equipment service, or cable service from or through the use of a cable system within the City; revenues for service, installation and repair; and, any and all
charges not specifically exempt herein such as delinquency fees, interest, or finance charges.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, AGross revenues® is not intended to include income, credits or revenues attributable to the operation of a cable system within the City arising from:

1. Real property transactions;

2. Taxes paid by a subscriber, the operator of a cable system within the City or another person, which are imposed on any subscriber;

3. Interest (other than interest charged subscribers of the cable system within the City or advertisers for services provided or delivered by the cable system within the City) or dividends on investments
received by the operator of a cable system within the City unrelated to the delivery of cable services within the City; or

4. Net uncollectible debts.

O. AHeadend® means the electronic equipment located at the start of a cable system, usually including antennas, preamplifiers, frequency converters, demodulator and related equipment.

P. AInstallation® means the connection of the cable system to subscribers' terminals.

Q. ANormal business hours® means those hours during which most similar business in the City are open to the service of customers and shall include at least four (4) consecutive hours per weekday

R. ANormal operating conditions® means those service conditions which are within the control or are reasonably anticipated by the cable operator, including special promotions, pay-per-view events,
regular peak or seasonal demand periods and maintenance or upgrade of the cable system.

S. APerson® means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, organization, association, or other legal entity.

T. PEG or EG Channel. or "Access Channel" means a channel dedicated in whole or in part for programming which is not original or controlled by a Grantee, including but not limited to educational or
governmental access programming ("PEG") or leased access programming.

U. APublic way® means the surface of, and the space above and below, any public street, highway, freeway, bridge, land path, alley, curb, boulevard, sidewalk, parkway, way, lane, drive, circle or other
public right-of-way, including, but not limited to, public utility easements, dedicated utility strips or rights-of-way dedicated for compatible uses and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements
located thereon now or hereafter held by the City in the service area which shall entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing, operating, repairing and maintaining the
cable system. APublic way® shall also mean any easement now or hereafter held by the City within the service area for the purpose of public travel, or for utility or public service use dedicated for
compatible uses, and shall include other easements or rights-of-way as shall within their proper use and meaning entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing or
transmitting franchisee's cable service or other service over poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, compliances, attachments and other property as may be
ordinarily necessary and appurtenant to the cable system.

V. AService Area® means the present municipal boundaries of the City of Heyburn, and includes any additions thereto by annexation.

W. ASubscriber® means a person or user of the cable system who lawfully receives cable services or other services there from with franchisee's permission.

X. AVideo Programming Service® means programming which is visually and audibly comparable to programming provided by a television broadcast station.

SECTION 2. GRANT OF FRANCHISE.

2.1 **Grant.** The Franchising Authority hereby grants to the Grantee a nonexclusive Franchise which authorizes the Grantee to construct and operate a cable system in, along, among, upon, across,
above, over, under, in any manner connected with Public Ways within the Service Area and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain on, over, under, upon,
across, or along any public way and all extensions thereof and additions thereto, such pole, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, pedestals, amplifiers, appliances, attachments,
and other related property or equipment as may be necessary or appurtenant to the cable system. Nothing in the franchise shall be construed to prohibit the Grantee from offering any service over it
cable system that is no prohibited by federal or state law.

The Grantee agrees to abide by any existing or new ordinance or regulation of general applicability to the operation of the cable system in the service area, adapted in the manner provided by law, so
long as they do not substantially impair the rights granted pursuant to this franchise.

2.2 **Term.** The franchise granted hereunder shall be for a term of **ten (10) years** commencing on the effective date of the franchise as set forth below, unless otherwise lawfully terminated in accordance
with the terms of this franchise agreement.

2.3 **Incorporation By Reference.** This franchise is granted pursuant to Title 50, Chapter 3 of the Idaho Code and the Cable Act.

SECTION 3 STANDARDS OF SERVICE

3.1 **Conditions of Street Occupancy and Restoration of Public Ways.** If, during the course of the Grantee's construction, operation or maintenance of the cable system, Grantee causes a
disturbance in any public way, the Grantee shall, at its expense, replace and restore such public way to a condition reasonably comparable to the condition of the public way immediately prior to such
disturbance. All transmission and distribution structures, poles, other lines, and equipment installed or erected by the Grantee pursuant to the terms hereof shall be located so as to cause a minimum of
interference with the proper use of Public Ways and with the rights and reasonable convenience of property owners who own property that adjoins any of such Public Ways. Grantee will also comply
with the City's regulations, ordinances and direction regarding excavation and tree or bush trimming. Unless otherwise agreed in advance and in writing or otherwise provided herein, such activities
shall be performed by Grantee at Grantee's effort and expense.

3.2 **Relocation at the Request of the Franchising Authority.** Upon its receipt of reasonable advance notice, not to be less than five (5) business days, the Grantee shall, at it own expense, protect,
support, temporarily disconnect, relocate in the public way, or remove from the public way, any property of the Grantee when required by the franchising authority by reason of traffic conditions, public
safety, street abandonment, street construction, change or establishment of street grade, installation of sewers, drains, utility pipes and any other structure or improvements by the franchising authority.
The Grantee shall in all cases have the right of abandonment of its property. If public funds are available to any similar facilities-based utility as the Grantee, using such street, easement, or right-of-way
for the purpose of defraying the cost of any of the foregoing, the franchising authority shall make available such funds on behalf of the Grantee.

3.3 **Relocation at the Request of a Third Party.** The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the franchising authority or other appropriate government
authorization, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of such building, provided the expense of such temporary raising or lowering of wires is paid by said person, including if required
by the Grantee, making such payment in advance and the Grantee is given not less than five (5) days advance written notice.

3.4 **System Upgrade/Channel Capacity and Adaptation to New Technology.** At the request of the franchising authority, the Grantee shall inform the franchising authority at least quarterly of planned,
proposed and actual changes in the Grantee's cable system and cable services related to subscriber in the service area regarding technological improvements, additional channel capacity and other
matter related to services available to subscribers. The Grantee will provide one channel for the franchising authority to use as a character-generated, community bulletin board as a PEG Channel, if
requested.

3.5 Aerial and Underground Construction.

A. In those areas of the service area where all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public service utilities providing telephone communications and electrical services are
underground, the Grantee shall likewise construct, operate and maintain all of its transmission and distribution facilities underground. Nothing contained in this section shall require the Grantee to
construct, operate, and maintain underground any ground-mounted appurtenances such as subscriber taps, line extenders, system passive devices (splitters, directional couplers), amplifiers, pedestals
or other related equipment. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Section, in the event that all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public utilities providing
telephone communications and electric services are placed underground after the effective date of this Franchise, the Grantee shall only be required to construct, operate, and maintain all of its
transmission and distribution facilities underground if it is given at least 10 days notice and access to the public utilities' facilities at the time that such are placed underground. Grantee shall be obligated
to place its facilities underground in a prompt and timely fashion in no event shall Grantee fail to accomplish such work in more than 24 hours from when the Franchising Authority has completed its
work. Should Grantee fail to so act, the Franchising Authority will cover the trench and Grantee will be obligated to dig its own trench at its own effort and expense.

B. New Developments. The franchising authority shall make reasonable efforts to provide the Grantee with written notice of the issuance of building or development permits for planned commercial
and/or residential developments within the service area requiring underground facilities. The franchising authority agrees to require as a condition of issuing the permit that the developer of planned
commercial and/or residential developments give the Grantee access to open trenches for deployment of cable facilities and notice of the date of availability of trenches. The developer shall be
responsible for the digging and backfilling of all trenches. The Grantee shall be responsible for engineering, deployment of labor and cable facilities located in the trenches.

C. Local Improvement District. If an ordinance is passed creating a local improvement district which involves placing underground certain utilities including that of the Grantee which are then located
overhead, the Grantee shall participate in such underground project and shall remove poles, cables and wires from the surface of public ways within such district and shall place them underground in
conformity with the requirements of the franchising authority. The Grantee may include its costs of relocating facilities associated with the underground project in said local improvement district if
allowed under applicable law.

3.6 **Required Extension of Service.** The cable system, as constructed as of the date of the passage and final adoption of the franchise, substantially complies with the material provisions hereof.
Whenever the Grantee shall receive a request for service from at least 15 residences within 1320 cable-bearing strand feet (one-quarter cable mile) of its trunk or distribution cable, it shall extend its
cable system to such subscribers at no cost to said subscriber for cable system extension, other than the usual connection fees for all subscribers, provided that such extension is technically
feasible.

3.7 **Separate Pole and Easement Use Agreement.** The parties have also entered into an separate agreement this date entitled the "Pole and Easement Use Agreement". In the event of any conflict
in interpretation between this agreement and the said agreement, regarding Grantee's usage of the Franchising Authority's poles and easements, the terms of the Pole and Easement Use
Agreement shall apply.

3.8 **Subscriber Charges for Extensions of Service.** No subscriber shall be refused service arbitrarily. However, for unusual circumstances, such as a subscriber's request to locate his cable drop
underground, existence of more than 150 feet of distance from distribution cable to connection of service to subscribers, or a density of less than 15 subscribers per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet
of trunk or distribution cable, service may be made available on the basis of a capital contribution in aid of construction, including cost of material, labor and easements. For the purpose of
determining the amount of capital contribution in aid of construction to be borne by the Grantee and subscribers in the area in which service may be expanded, the Grantee will contribute an
amount equal to the construction and other costs per mile, multiplies by a fraction whose numerator equals the number of residences per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of its trunks or distribution
cable, and whose denominator equals 15 residences. Subscribers who request service hereunder will bear the remainder of the construction and other costs on a pro rata basis. The Grantee may
require that the payment of the capital contribution in aid of construction borne by potential subscribers be paid in advance.

3.9 **Service to Public Buildings.** The Grantee shall, upon request, provide without charge, one cable service to each of the Franchising Authority's offices buildings, fire stations, police stations and to
public school buildings that are passed by its cable system as well as other public buildings that may be constructed during the term of this franchise agreement. The outlets of cable service
provide pursuant to this section shall not be used by the government entity to sell cable services in or throughout such buildings. The Grantee shall not be required to provide a cable service outlet
to buildings where the drop line from the feeder cable to said building exceeds 150 cable feet unless the governmental entity agrees to pay the incremental cost of such drop line in excess of 150
cable feet.

3.10 **Access to Internet.** If a Franchisee proposes to provide Internet access then the Franchisee shall offer all subscribers the option of Internet access for a reasonable fee, including the option of
renting or leasing cable modems or other hardware for connecting to the Internet via the cable system. The Franchisee shall not prohibit subscribers from purchasing and using cable modems or other
hardware for connecting to the Internet via cable system provided that said equipment is compatible with the Franchisee's system. For the purposes of this section, compatibility shall be determined by
the Franchisee.

3.11 Customer Service Standards.

A. The Grantee shall at all times be in compliance with FCC regulations regarding customer service obligation, as now exist or as may be amended. The franchising authority reserves the right to enact
or enforce any customer protection law, containing more stringent customer service obligations, to the extent not specifically preempted by FCC regulations.

B. Cable System office hours and telephone availability. The Grantee will maintain a local, toll-free or collect call telephone access line which will be available to Subscribers 24 hours a day, seven
days a week.

(i) Trained representatives of the Grantee will be available to respond to Subscriber telephone inquiries during Normal Business Hours, as defined herein.

(2) After Normal Business Hours, an access line will be available to be answered by a service or an automated response system, including a phone answering system. Inquiries received after Normal
Business Hours must be responded to by a trained representative of the Grantee on the next business day

3.12 **Emergency Use.** In accordance with the regulations of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) the Grantee shall maintain an Emergency Alert System (EAS) for use in transmitting
Emergency Act Notifications (EAN) and Emergency Act Terminations (EAT) in local and state-wide situations as may be designated to be an emergency by the Local Primary, the State Primary and/or
the State Emergency Operations Center, as those authorities are defined by the FCC. The franchising authority shall permit only appropriately trained and authorized person to operate the EAS
equipment. Such use will be subject to FCC interruption for emergency or other use.

SECTION 4 REGULATION BY CITY OF HEYBURN

4.1 Franchise Fee.

- A. The Grantee shall pay to the franchising authority monthly a sum equal to five percent (5%) of the gross revenues. Payment for each month's fee shall be no later than thirty (30) days after the last day of the year for which payment is made.
- B. In the event the Cable Act and/or other applicable law permits an increase in franchise fees during the term of this franchise, then the franchising authority may initiate such an increase with regards to the franchise fee amount. However, prior to implementation of any increase in franchise fees, the Grantee may request a public hearing by the franchising authority to discuss said change in franchise fee. Following such a hearing the franchising authority may require the implementation of the change in franchise
- C. Late Payment. All sums, which become delinquent, shall accumulate interest at the statutory rate provided in Idaho Code Title 28, Chapter 22, Section 104(1). The accrual of interest is not intended to waive or in any manner restrict City's ability to elect any procedure or method of collection permissible by law to enforce all the terms and conditions of franchise agreement.
- D. Additional Fee For Failing To Pay Franchise Fees: Where the City determines by audit, financial statement or other method, that franchisee has underpaid franchise fees other charges owed to City by at least three (3%) percent, and where payment was not received by City within the quarter due, franchisee may be required to pay, in addition to any other remedy sought by City, all fees and interest due, and an additional late fee of fifteen percent (15%) of the total amount owed. Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the franchising authority shall not be construed as an agreement that the fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment be construed as a release or a waiver of any claim by the franchising authority against the Grantee. If the franchising authority requests to see financial records to audit Grantee's franchise fee payments, the Grantee will provide such records.
- E. Limitation on Franchise Fee Actions. The period of limitation for recovery of any franchise fee payable hereunder shall be five (5) years from the date on which payment by the Grantee is due. Unless the franchising authority initiates a lawsuit for recovery of unpaid franchise fees in a court of competent jurisdiction within five (5) years after such payment is due, such recovery shall be barred.
- F. Taxes. Nothing herein shall limit the Grantee's obligation to pay applicable local, state or federal sale, property, ad valorem or other taxes.
- G. LIABILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION. The Company shall pay and by its acceptance of this agreement the Company specifically agrees that it will pay all damages and penalties which the City may legally be required to pay as a result of granting this agreement or company's operations, conduct, or misconduct during the term of this agreement. These damages or penalties shall include, but shall not be limited to, damages arising out of any claim of anti-trust (or similar) violation by the City, copyright, infringements and all other damages arising out of the installation, operation, or maintenance of the CATV System authorized herein, whether or not any act or omission complained of its authorized, allowed or prohibited by this agreement. Further, Company shall hold and save the City harmless from all such claims, even if such claims are without merit. The Company shall pay and by its acceptance of this agreement specifically agrees that it will pay all expenses incurred by the City in defending itself whether in a court of law or otherwise with regard to all damages and penalties mentioned in subsection (a) above. These expenses shall include all out-of-pocket expenses such as attorney fees.

4.2 Rates and Charges.

- A. Nothing in this franchise agreement shall be construed to prohibit the reduction or waiving of changes in conjunction with promotional campaigns for the purpose of acquiring and/or retaining subscribers.
- B. Grantee shall provide the franchising authority with a minimum of thirty (30) days advance written notice of changes in subscriber rates, if the change is within the control of the Grantee, including any changes in franchise fee amount and external franchise related costs.
- 4.3. Customer Billing. All billing statements and charges to subscribers shall be:
- A. Clear, concise and understandable;
- B. Itemized as to basic cable charges, premium charges, equipment charges, whether payments for purchase or rental, deposits, delinquent fees, and franchise fees.
- C Show all activity during the billing period including optional charges, rebates, and credits. Said billing period shall not exceed forty-five (45) days.

4.4 Renewal.

The franchising authority and the Grantee agree that any proceeding undertaken by the franchising authority that relate to the renewal of the Grantee's franchise shall be governed by and comply with the provisions of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be hereafter amended.

4.5 Transfer of Franchise and/or Change of Control of Grantee .

- A. The Grantee's right, title, or interest in the Franchise shall not be sold, transferred, assigned, or otherwise encumbered, other than to an entity controlling, controlled by, or under common control with the Grantee, without the prior consent of the Franchising Authority. Such consent not to be unreasonably withheld. No such consent shall be required, however, for a transfer in trust, by mortgage, by other hypothecation, or by assignment of any rights, title, or interest of the Grantee in the Franchise or Cable System in order to secure indebtedness. Within 30 days of receiving the request for transfer, the Franchising Authority shall, in accordance with FCC rules and regulations, notify the Grantee in writing of the information it requires to determine the legal, financial and technical qualifications of the transferee. If the Franchising Authority has not taken action on the Grantee's request for transfer within 120 days after receiving such request, consent by the Franchising Authority shall be deemed given.
- B. Prior approval of the City Council shall be required where ownership or control of more than 30% of the right of control of Grantee or the entity controlling the Grantee is acquired by a Person or group of Persons acting in concert, none of whom already own or control 30% or more of such right of control, singularly or collectively. By its acceptance of this Franchise, the Grantee specifically grants and agrees that any such acquisition of itself or any entity controlling the Grantee occurring without prior approval of the City Council shall constitute a violation of this Franchise by the Grantee. Transfer due to organizational restructuring shall not require approval of the Franchising Authority as long as the original Grantee remains responsible for performance of all duties hereunder.

SECTION 5 COMPLIANCE AND MONITORING

- 5.1 Communication with Regulatory Agencies. Copies of all petitions, applications, communications and reports submitted by the Grantee to the FCC or any other federal or state regulatory commission or agency having jurisdiction in respect to matter affecting construction, maintenance or operation of the Grantee's cable system or service, shall be made available to the franchising authority upon reasonable request. Copies of responses or any other communications from the regulatory agencies to the Grantee shall also be made available to the franchising authority.
- 5.2 Technical Standards. The Grantee shall be responsible for insuring that the cable system is designed, installed and operated in a manner that fully complies with FCC rule and regulations in Subpart K of Part 76 of Chapter 1 of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations as now constituted or as may be amended. As provided in these rule and regulations, the franchising authority shall have, upon request, the right to obtain a copy of tests and records required in accordance with such rules and regulations, but has no authority to enforce compliance with such standards.

SECTION 6 BONDS AND OTHER SURETY For the reason of the Grantee's past performance and investment, no performance bond or other surety is required under the terms hereof. If the franchising authority determines, in its discretion, that a bond or a surety will be required of the Grantee during the term hereof, the franchising authority agrees to give the Grantee ninety (90) days written notice stating the reason for the requirement and amount of the bond or surety. The Grantee agrees to post said bond or surety, as required by the franchising authority within said ninety (90) day period. The Grantee shall be required to provide standard performance bonds and insurance requirements for encroachment and/or right-of-way work permits.

SECTION 7 TERMINATION AND TECHNICAL VIOLATIONS

7.1 Default, Notice and Termination.

- A. If the Grantee willfully violates or fails to comply with any of the material provisions of this franchise agreement, the franchising authority shall give written notice to the Grantee of the alleged non-compliance of its franchise. The Grantee shall have thirty (30) days from the date of notice of non-compliance to cure such alleged default or, if such default cannot be cured within thirty (30) days, to present to the City a plan of action whereby such default can be promptly cured. The Grantee shall be entitled to attend the hearing, respond to questions and explain why termination would be justified.
- B. If such default continues beyond the applicable dates agreed to for such cure, the franchising authority shall give the Grantee written notice that all rights conferred under this franchise agreement may be revoked or terminated by the Council after a public hearing. The Grantee shall be entitled to not less than thirty (30) days prior notice of the date, time and place of the public hearing.

7.2 Termination for Non-compliance. Subject to State and Federal law, in the event that any franchise is terminated by the franchising authority by reason of the Grantee's non-compliance, the Grantee shall have the right for six months after the final decision by the Council to attempt to sell that part of the system under such franchise to a third party. If the Grantee is unable to find a buyer within such period, the franchising authority may elect to acquire the property of the system located in the streets and public property at a cost consistent with the provisions of Section 627(b)(1) of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be amended. If the franchising authority or a third party does not purchase the system, the Grantee shall, upon order of the franchising authority, remove the system from the public ways of the franchising authority. The Grantee agrees that in no case shall a termination for cause be considered as a Ataking®.

7.3 Technical Violations. The parties agree that it is not the franchising authority's intention to subject the Grantee to penalties or termination for technical violations of this agreement. Technical violations shall include, but are not limited to the following: (a) instances where a violation or a breach by the Grantee of this agreement was a good faith effort that resulted in no or minimal negative impact on subscribers or (b) where there existed circumstances reasonably beyond the control of the Grantee and which precipitated a violation of this agreement or which were deemed to have prevented the Grantee from strictly complying with the terms of this agreement.

SECTION 8 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 8.1 Actions of Parties. In any action by the franchising authority of the Grantee that is mandated or permitted under the terms hereof, such party shall act in good faith in a reasonable and timely manner. Furthermore, in any instance where approval or consent is required under the term hereof, such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- 8.2 Equal Protection. In the event the franchising authority grants another franchise to any person or entity for the purpose of constructing or operating a cable system within the service area, such additional franchise shall not present materially better terms or lesser obligations for the new franchisee over the terms of the franchise. Nevertheless, if such does take place, the franchising authority will immediately modify this franchise so that it is in conformity with the language of the new franchise.
- 8.3 Notices. Notice required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given to the required party upon actual receipt. 8.5 Severability. If any section, sentence, term or provision hereof is determined to be illegal, invalid or unconstitutional, by and court of competent jurisdiction or appropriate regulatory agency having jurisdiction, such determination shall have no effect on the validity of any other section, sentence, term or provision hereof, all of which shall remain in full force and effect.

8.6 Effective Date. The effective date of this franchise agreement will commence on March 23, 2010 and shall expire on April 1, 2020, unless extended by the mutual consent of the parties.

PROPOSED FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this _____ day of March, 2010 by and between the CITY OF HEYBURN, an Idaho municipal corporation, and CABLE ONE, INC. a Delaware corporation, (Cable One) to provide for the terms and conditions of the continued operation of a cable system within the city limits of Heyburn.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CABLE ONE is the successor to TCI Cablevision of Idaho, Inc. d.b.a. AT&T Cable Services (TCI), which was granted a franchise to provide cable services within the city of Heyburn on March 22, 2000 in Ordinance No. 413, which franchise was assigned to Cable One on Resolution No. 2000-7 dated September 13, 2000; and
 WHEREAS, CABLE ONE and its predecessors in interest have faithfully and hereto and performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of Ordinance 413 granting a franchise to TCI; and
 WHEREAS, Ordinance 528 authorizes a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE; and
 WHEREAS, CABLE ONE has indicated its acceptance to the term and conditions contained in this franchise agreement; and
 WHEREAS, the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 authorizes the early renewal of a cable franchise upon a public hearing an informal negotiation process; and
 WHEREAS the public hearing and informal negotiation process has occurred.
 NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Heyburn hereby grants a renewal of the cable television franchise to CABLE ONE in the following terms and conditions:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

1.1 For the purposes of this Franchise, the following terms, phrases, and words shall have the meanings ascribed to them below. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future tense, words in the plural include the singular and words used in the singular include the plural.

- A. AAffiliate@ means a condition of being united, being in close connection, allied, or attached as a member or branch.
- B. ABasic cable@ is the tier of service regularly provided to all subscribers including the retransmission of local broadcast television signals.
- C. ACable Act@ means Title VI of the Communications Act of 1934 as amended by the Cable Television Consumer Protection and Competition Act 1992, as amended by the Telecommunications Act of 1996, and any subsequent amendments.
- D. ACable services@ means
 - 1. the one-way transmission to a subscriber of video programming, other programming service or data communication by a subscriber,
 - 2. subscriber interaction, if any, which is required for the selection by the subscriber of such video programming, or
 - 3. any other programming service.
- E. ACable system@ means a facility, consisting of a set of closed transmission paths and associated signal generation, reception, and control equipment that is designed to provide cable service and other service to subscribers.
- F. AChannel@ means a single path or section of the spectrum which carries a cable service.
- G. ACity@ means the City of Heyburn, a municipal corporation of the State of Idaho.
- H. ACouncil@ means the present governing body of the City or any future board constituting the legislative body of the city.
- I.ADisconnection@ means the discontinuance of all cable service to a subscriber by a cable operator.
- J. AFCC@ means the Federal Communications Commission, a regulatory agency of the United States government.
- K. AFranchising Authority@ means the City of Heyburn, Idaho.
- J. AFranchise@ shall mean the initial authorization, or renewal thereof, issued by the city, whether such authorization is designated as a franchise, permit, license, resolution, contract, certificate or otherwise, which authorizes construction or operation of the cable system for the purpose of offering cable service or other service to subscribers.
- L. AGrantee@ means Cable One, Inc.

N. AGross revenues@ means any and all receipts and revenues received directly or indirectly from all sources by the operator of a cable system or attributable to a cable system within the corporate limits of the City, excluding high-speed internet services, home shopping revenues, voice over internet protocol and advertising sales. AGross revenues@ is intended to include, but is not limited to, all income without any offsetting of expenses, costs or depreciation, derived from:

Subscribers receiving goods, equipment, equipment service, or cable service from or through the use of a cable system within the City; revenues for service, installation and repair; and, any and all charges not specifically exempt herein such as delinquency fees, interest, or finance charges.

Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, AGross revenues@ is not intended to include income, credits or revenues attributable to the operation of a cable system within the City arising from:

- 1. Real property transactions;
- 2. Taxes paid by a subscriber, the operator of a cable system within the City or another person, which are imposed on any subscriber;
- 3. Interest (other than interest charged subscribers of the cable system within the City or advertisers for services provided or delivered by the cable system within the City) or dividends on investments received by the operator of a cable system within the City unrelated to the delivery of cable services within the City; or
- 4. Net uncollectible debts.

O. AHeadend@ means the electronic equipment located at the start of a cable system, usually including antennas, preamplifiers, frequency converts, demodulator and related equipment.

P. AInstallation@ means the connection of the cable system to subscribers' terminals.

Q. ANormal business hours@ means those hours during which most similar business in the City are open to the service of customers and shall include at least four (4) consecutive hours per weekday

R. ANormal operating conditions@ means those service conditions which are within the control or are reasonably anticipated by the cable operator, including special promotions, pay-per-view events, regular peak or seasonal demand periods and maintenance or upgrade of the cable system.

S. APerson@ means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, organization, association, or other legal entity.

T. PEG or EG Channel, or "Access Channel" means a channel dedicated in whole or in part for programming which is not original or controlled by a Grantee, including but not limited to educational or governmental access programming ("PEG") or leased access programming.

U. APublic way@ means the surface of, and the space above and below, any public street, highway, freeway, bridge, land path, alley, curb, boulevard, sidewalk, parkway, way, lane, drive, circle or other public right-of-way, including, but not limited to, public utility easements, dedicated utility strips or rights-of-way dedicated for compatible uses and any temporary or permanent fixtures or improvements located thereon now or hereafter held by the City in the service area which shall entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing, operating, repairing and maintaining the cable system. APublic way@ shall also mean any easement now or hereafter held by the City within the service area for the purpose of public travel, or for utility or public service use dedicated for compatible uses, and shall include other easements or rights-of-way as shall within their proper use and meaning entitle the City and a franchisee to the use thereof for the purpose of installing or transmitting franchisee's cable service or other service over poles, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, amplifiers, compliances, attachments and other property as may be ordinarily necessary and appurtenant to the cable system.

V. AService Area@ means the present municipal boundaries of the City of Heyburn, and includes any additions thereto by annexation.

W. ASubscriber@ means a person or user of the cable system who lawfully receives cable services or other services there from with franchisee's permission.

X. AVideo Programming Service@ means programming which is visually and audibly comparable to programming provided by a television broadcast station.

SECTION 2. GRANT OF FRANCHISE.

2.1 **Grant.** The Franchising Authority hereby grants to the Grantee a nonexclusive Franchise which authorizes the Grantee to construct and operate a cable system in, along, among, upon, across, above, over, under, in any manner connected with Public Ways within the Service Area and for that purpose to erect, install, construct, repair, replace, reconstruct, maintain on, over, under, upon, across, or along any public way and all extensions thereof and additions thereto, such pole, wires, cables, conductors, ducts, conduits, vaults, manholes, pedestals, amplifiers, appliances, attachments, and other related property or equipment as may be necessary or appurtenant to the cable system. Nothing in the franchise shall be construed to prohibit the Grantee from offering any service over it cable system that is no prohibited by federal or state law.

The Grantee agrees to abide by any existing or new ordinance or regulation of general applicability to the operation of the cable system in the service area, adapted in the manner provided by law, so long as they do not substantially impair the rights granted pursuant to this franchise.

2.2 **Term.** The franchise granted hereunder shall be for a term of ten (10) years commencing on the effective date of the franchise as set forth below, unless otherwise lawfully terminated in accordance with the terms of this franchise agreement.

2.3 **Incorporation By Reference.** This franchise is granted pursuant to Title 50, Chapter 3 of the Idaho Code and the Cable Act.

SECTION 3 STANDARDS OF SERVICE

3.1 **Conditions of Street Occupancy and Restoration of Public Ways.** If, during the course of the Grantee's construction, operation or maintenance of the cable system, Grantee causes a disturbance in any public way, the Grantee shall, at its expense, replace and restore such public way to a condition reasonably comparable to the condition of the public way immediately prior to such disturbance. All transmission and distribution structures, poles, other lines, and equipment installed or erected by the Grantee pursuant to the terms hereof shall be located so as to cause a minimum of interference with the proper use of Public Ways and with the rights and reasonable convenience of property owners who own property that adjoins any of such Public Ways. Grantee will also comply with the City's regulations, ordinances and direction regarding excavation and tree or bush trimming. Unless otherwise agreed in advance and in writing or otherwise provided herein, such activities shall be performed by Grantee at Grantee's effort and expense.

3.2 **Relocation at the Request of the Franchising Authority.** Upon its receipt of reasonable advance notice, not to be less than five (5) business days, the Grantee shall, at its own expense, protect, support, temporarily disconnect, relocate in the public way, or remove from the public way, any property of the Grantee when required by the franchising authority by reason of traffic conditions, public safety, street abandonment, street construction, change or establishment of street grade, installation of sewers, drains, utility pipes and any other structure or improvements by the franchising authority. The Grantee shall in all cases have the right of abandonment of its property. If public funds are available to any similar facilities-based utility as the Grantee, using such street, easement, or right-of-way for the purpose of defraying the cost of any of the foregoing, the franchising authority shall make available such funds on behalf of the Grantee.

3.3 **Relocation at the Request of a Third Party.** The Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the franchising authority or other appropriate government authorization, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of such building, provided the expense of such temporary raising or lowering of wires is paid by said person, including if required by the Grantee, making such payment in advance and the Grantee is given not less than five (5) days advance written notice.

3.4 **System Upgrade/Channel Capacity and Adaptation to New Technology.** At the request of the franchising authority, the Grantee shall inform the franchising authority at least quarterly of planned, proposed and actual changes in the Grantee's cable system and cable services related to subscriber in the service area regarding technological improvements, additional channel capacity and other matter related to services available to subscribers. The Grantee will provide one channel for the franchising authority to use as a character-generated, community bulletin board as a PEG Channel, if requested.

3.5 Aerial and Underground Construction.

A. In those areas of the service area where all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public service utilities providing telephone communications and electrical services are underground, the Grantee shall likewise construct, operate and maintain all of its transmission and distribution facilities underground. Nothing contained in this section shall require the Grantee to construct, operate, and maintain underground any ground-mounted appurtenances such as subscriber taps, line extenders, system passive devices (splitters, directional couplers), amplifiers, pedestals or other related equipment. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Section, in the event that all of the transmission or distribution facilities of the respective public utilities providing telephone communications and electric services are placed underground after the effective date of this Franchise, the Grantee shall only be required to construct, operate, and maintain all of its transmission and distribution facilities underground if it is given at least 10 days notice and access to the public utilities' facilities at the time that such are placed underground. Grantee shall be obligated to place its facilities underground in a prompt and timely fashion in no event shall Grantee fail to accomplish such work in more than 24 hours from when the Franchising Authority has completed its work. Should Grantee fail to so act, the Franchising Authority will cover the trench and Grantee will be obligated to dig its own trench at its own effort and expense.

B. New Developments. The franchising authority shall make reasonable efforts to provide the Grantee with written notice of the issuance of building or development permits for planned commercial and/or residential developments within the service area requiring underground facilities. The franchising authority agrees to require as a condition of issuing the permit that the developer of planned commercial and/or residential developments give the Grantee access to open trenches for deployment of cable facilities and notice of the date of availability of trenches. The developer shall be responsible for the digging and backfilling of all trenches. The Grantee shall be responsible for engineering, deployment of labor and cable facilities located in the trenches.

C. Local Improvement District. If an ordinance is passed creating a local improvement district which involves placing underground certain utilities including that of the Grantee which are then located overhead, the Grantee shall participate in such underground project and shall remove poles, cables and wires from the surface of public ways within such district and shall place them underground in conformity with the requirements of the franchising authority. The Grantee may include its costs of relocating facilities associated with the underground project in said local improvement district if allowed under applicable law.

3.6 **Required Extension of Service.** The cable system, as constructed as of the date of the passage and final adoption of the franchise, substantially complies with the material provisions hereof. Whenever the Grantee shall receive a request for service from at least 15 residences within 1320 cable-bearing strand feet (one-quarter cable mile) of its trunk or distribution cable, it shall extend its cable system to such subscribers at no cost to said subscriber for cable system extension, other than the usual connection fees for all subscribers, provided that such extension is technically feasible.

3.7 **Separate Pole and Easement Use Agreement.** The parties have also entered into an separate agreement this date entitled the "Pole and Easement Use Agreement". In the event of any conflict in interpretation between this agreement and the said agreement, regarding Grantee's usage of the Franchising Authority's poles and easements, the terms of the Pole and Easement Use Agreement shall apply

3.8 **Subscriber Charges for Extensions of Service.** No subscriber shall be refused service arbitrarily. However, for unusual circumstances, such as a subscriber's request to locate his cable drop underground, existence of more than 150 feet of distance from distribution cable to connection of service to subscribers, or a density of less than 15 subscribers per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of trunk or distribution cable, service may be made available on the basis of a capital contribution in aid of construction, including cost of material, labor and easements. For the purpose of determining the amount of capital contribution in aid of construction to be borne by the Grantee and subscribers in the area in which service may be expanded, the Grantee will contribute an amount equal to the construction and other costs per mile, multiplies by a fraction whose numerator equals the number of residences per 1320 cable-bearing strand feet of its trunks or distribution cable, and whose denominator equals 15 residences. Subscribers who request service hereunder will bear the remainder of the construction and other costs on a pro rata basis. The Grantee may require that the payment of the capital contribution in aid of construction borne by potential subscribers be paid in advance.

3.9 **Service to Public Buildings.** The Grantee shall, upon request, provide without charge, one cable service to each of the Franchising Authority's offices buildings, fire stations, police stations and to public school buildings that are passed by its cable system as well as other public buildings that may be constructed during the term of this franchise agreement. The outlets of cable service provide pursuant to this section shall not be used by the government entity to sell cable services in or throughout such buildings. The Grantee shall not be required to provide a cable service outlet to buildings where the drop line from the feeder cable to said building exceeds 150 cable feet unless the governmental entity agrees to pay the incremental cost of such drop line in excess of 150 cable feet.

3.10 **Access to Internet.** If a Franchisee proposes to provide Internet access then the Franchisee shall offer all subscribers the option of Internet access for a reasonable fee, including the option of renting or leasing cable modems or other hardware for connecting to the Internet via the cable system. The Franchisee shall not prohibit subscribers from purchasing and using cable modems or other hardware for connecting to the Internet via cable system provided that said equipment is compatible with the Franchisee's system. For the purposes of this section, compatibility shall be determined by the Franchisee.

3.11 Customer Service Standards.

A. The Grantee shall at all times be in compliance with FCC regulations regarding customer service obligation, as now exist or as may be amended. The franchising authority reserves the right to enact or enforce any customer protection law, containing more stringent customer service obligations, to the extent not specifically preempted by FCC regulations.

B. Cable System office hours and telephone availability. The Grantee will maintain a local, toll-free or collect call telephone access line which will be available to Subscribers 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

(1) Trained representatives of the Grantee will be available to respond to Subscriber telephone inquiries during Normal Business Hours, as defined herein.

(2) After Normal Business Hours, an access line will be available to be answered by a service or an automated response system, including a phone answering system. Inquiries received after Normal Business Hours must be responded to by a trained representative of the Grantee on the next business day.

3.12 **Emergency Use.** In accordance with the regulations of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) the Grantee shall maintain an Emergency Alert System (EAS) for use in transmitting Emergency Act Notifications (EAN) and Emergency Act Terminations (EAT) in local and state-wide situations as may be designated to be an emergency by the Local Primary, the State Primary and/or the State Emergency Operations Center, as those authorities are defined by the FCC. The franchising authority shall permit only appropriately trained and authorized persons to operate the EAS equipment. Such use will be subject to FCC interruption for emergency or other use.

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SECTION 4 REGULATION BY CITY OF HEYBURN

4.1 Franchise Fee.

A. The Grantee shall pay to the franchising authority monthly a sum equal to five percent (5%) of the gross revenues. Payment for each month=s fee shall be no later than thirty (30) days after the last day of the year for which payment is made.

B. In the event the Cable Act and/or other applicable law permits an increase in franchise fees during the term of this franchise, then the franchising authority may initiate such an increase with regards to the franchise fee amount. However, prior to implementation of any increase in franchise fees, the Grantee may request a public hearing by the franchising authority to discuss said change in franchise fee. Following such a hearing the franchising authority may require the implementation of the change in franchise fee.

C. Late Payment. All sums, which become delinquent, shall accumulate interest at the statutory rate provided in Idaho Code Title 28, Chapter 22, Section 104(1). The accrual of interest is not intended to waive or in any manner restrict City's ability to elect any procedure or method of collection permissible by law to enforce all the terms and conditions of franchise agreement.

D. Additional Fee For Failing To Pay Franchise Fees: Where the City determines by audit, financial statement or other method, that franchisee has underpaid franchise fees other charges owed to City by at least three (3%) percent, and where payment was not received by City within the quarter due, franchisee may be required to pay, in addition to any other remedy sought by City, all fees and interest due, and an additional late fee of fifteen percent (15%) of the total amount owed. Acceptance of any franchise fee payment by the franchising authority shall not be construed as an agreement that the fee paid is in fact the correct amount, nor shall acceptance of payment be construed as a release or a waiver of any claim by the franchising authority against the Grantee. If the franchising authority requests to see financial records to audit Grantee's franchise fee payments, the Grantee will provide such records.

E. Limitation on Franchise Fee Actions. The period of limitation for recovery of any franchise fee payable hereunder shall be five (5) years from the date on which payment by the Grantee is due. Unless the franchising authority initiates a lawsuit for recovery of unpaid franchise fees in a court of competent jurisdiction within five (5) years after such payment is due, such recovery shall be barred.

F. Taxes. Nothing herein shall limit the Grantee's obligation to pay applicable local, state or federal sale, property, ad valorem or other taxes.

G. LIABILITY AND INDEMNIFICATION. The Company shall pay and by its acceptance of this agreement the Company specifically agrees that it will pay all damages and penalties which the City may legally be required to pay as a result of granting this agreement or company's operations, conduct, or misconduct during the term of this agreement. These damages or penalties shall include, but shall not be limited to, damages arising out of any claim of anti-trust (or similar) violation by the City, copyright, infringements and all other damages arising out of the installation, operation, or maintenance of the CATV System authorized herein, whether or not any act or omission complained of its authorized, allowed or prohibited by this agreement. Further, Company shall hold and save the City harmless from all such claims, even if such claims are without merit. The Company shall pay and by its acceptance of this agreement specifically agrees that it will pay all expenses incurred by the City in defending itself whether in a court of law or otherwise with regard to all damages and penalties mentioned in subsection (a) above. These expenses shall include all out-of-pocket expenses such as attorney fees.

4.2 Rates and Charges.

A. Nothing in this franchise agreement shall be construed to prohibit the reduction or waiving of changes in conjunction with promotional campaigns for the purpose of acquiring and/or retaining subscribers.

B. Grantee shall provide the franchising authority with a minimum of thirty (30) days advance written notice of changes in subscriber rates, if the change is within the control of the Grantee, including any changes in franchise fee amount and external franchise related costs.

4.3. Customer Billing. All billing statements and charges to subscribers shall be:

A. Clear, concise and understandable;

B. Itemized as to basic cable charges, premium charges, equipment charges, whether payments for purchase or rental, deposits, delinquent fees, and franchise fees.

C Show all activity during the billing period including optional charges, rebates, and credits. Said billing period shall not exceed forty-five (45) days.

4.4 Renewal.

The franchising authority and the Grantee agree that any proceeding undertaken by the franchising authority that relate to the renewal of the Grantee's franchise shall be governed by and comply with the provisions of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be hereafter amended.

4.5 Transfer of Franchise and/or Change of Control of Grantee .

A. The Grantee's right, title, or interest in the Franchise shall not be sold, transferred, assigned, or otherwise encumbered, other than to an entity controlling, controlled by, or under common control with the Grantee, without the prior consent of the Franchising Authority. Such consent not to be unreasonably withheld. No such consent shall be required, however, for a transfer in trust, by mortgage, by other hypothecation, or by assignment of any rights, title, or interest of the Grantee in the Franchise or Cable System in order to secure indebtedness. Within 30 days of receiving the request for transfer, the Franchising Authority shall, in accordance with FCC rules and regulations, notify the Grantee in writing of the information it requires to determine the legal, financial and technical qualifications of the transferee. If the Franchising Authority has not taken action on the Grantee's request for transfer within 120 days after receiving such request, consent by the Franchising Authority shall be deemed given.

B. Prior approval of the City Council shall be required where ownership or control of more than 30% of the right of control of Grantee or the entity controlling the Grantee is acquired by a Person or group of Persons acting in concert, none of whom already own or control 30% or more of such right of control, singularly or collectively. By its acceptance of this Franchise, the Grantee specifically grants and agrees that any such acquisition of itself or any entity controlling the Grantee occurring without prior approval of the City Council shall constitute a violation of this Franchise by the Grantee. Transfer due to organizational restructuring shall not require approval of the Franchising Authority as long as the original Grantee remains responsible for performance of all duties hereunder.

SECTION 5 COMPLIANCE AND MONITORING

5.1 Communication with Regulatory Agencies. Copies of all petitions, applications, communications and reports submitted by the Grantee to the FCC or any other federal or state regulatory commission or agency having jurisdiction in respect to matter affecting construction, maintenance or operation of the Grantee's cable system or service, shall be made available to the franchising authority upon reasonable request. Copies of responses or any other communications from the regulatory agencies to the Grantee shall also be made available to the franchising authority.

5.2 Technical Standards. The Grantee shall be responsible for insuring that the cable system is designed, installed and operated in a manner that fully complies with FCC rule and regulations in Subpart K of Part 76 of Chapter 1 of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations as now constituted or as may be amended. As provided in these rule and regulations, the franchising authority shall have, upon request, the right to obtain a copy of tests and records required in accordance with such rules and regulations, but has no authority to enforce compliance with such standards.

SECTION 6 BONDS AND OTHER SURETY For the reason of the Grantee's past performance and investment, no performance bond or other surety is required under the terms hereof. If the franchising authority determines, in its discretion, that a bond or a surety will be required of the Grantee during the term hereof, the franchising authority agrees to give the Grantee ninety (90) days written notice stating the reason for the requirement and amount of the bond or surety. The Grantee agrees to post said bond or surety, as required by the franchising authority within said ninety (90) day period. The Grantee shall be required to provide standard performance bonds and insurance requirements for encroachment and/or right-of-way work permits.

SECTION 7 TERMINATION AND TECHNICAL VIOLATIONS

7.1 Default, Notice and Termination.

A. If the Grantee willfully violates or fails to comply with any of the material provisions of this franchise agreement, the franchising authority shall give written notice to the Grantee of the alleged non-compliance of its franchise. The Grantee shall have thirty (30) days from the date of notice of non-compliance to cure such alleged default or, if such default cannot be cured within thirty (30) days, to present to the City a plan of action whereby such default can be promptly cured. The Grantee shall be entitled to attend the hearing, respond to questions and explain why termination would be justified.

B. If such default continues beyond the applicable dates agreed to for such cure, the franchising authority shall give the Grantee written notice that all rights conferred under this franchise agreement may be revoked or terminated by the Council after a public hearing. The Grantee shall be entitled to not less than thirty (30) days prior notice of the date, time and place of the public hearing.

7.2 Termination for Non-compliance. Subject to State and Federal law, in the event that any franchise is terminated by the franchising authority by reason of the Grantee's non-compliance, the Grantee shall have the right for six months after the final decision by the Council to attempt to sell that part of the system under such franchise to a third party. If the Grantee is unable to find a buyer within such period, the franchising authority may elect to acquire the property of the system located in the streets and public property at a cost consistent with the provisions of Section 627(b)(1) of the Cable Act, as currently constituted or as may be amended. If the franchising authority or a third party does not purchase the system, the Grantee shall, upon order of the franchising authority, remove the system from the public ways of the franchising authority. The Grantee agrees that in no case shall a termination for cause be considered as a Ataking@.

7.3 Technical Violations. The parties agree that it is not the franchising authority=s intention to subject the Grantee to penalties or termination for technical violations of this agreement. Technical violations shall include, but are not limited to the following: (a) instances where a violation or a breach by the Grantee of this agreement was a good faith effort that resulted in no or minimal negative impact on subscribers or (b) where there existed circumstances reasonably beyond the control of the Grantee and which precipitated a violation of this agreement or which were deemed to have prevented the Grantee from strictly complying with the terms of this agreement.

SECTION 8 MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

8.1 Actions of Parties. In any action by the franchising authority of the Grantee that is mandated or permitted under the terms hereof, such party shall act in good faith in a reasonable and timely manner. Furthermore, in any instance where approval or consent is required under the term hereof, such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

8.2 Equal Protection. In the event the franchising authority grants another franchise to any person or entity for the purpose of constructing or operating a cable system within the service area, such additional franchise shall not present materially better terms or lesser obligations for the new franchisee over the terms of the franchise. Nevertheless, if such does take place, the franchising authority will immediately modify this franchise so that it is in conformity with the language of the new franchise.

8.3 Notices. Notice required hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given to the required party upon actual receipt. Acceptable methods of delivery include hand delivery, certified or registered mail and overnight express mail. Notice required hereunder shall be addressed as follows:

8.5 Severability. If any section, sentence, term or provision hereof is determined to be illegal, invalid or unconstitutional, by and court of competent jurisdiction or appropriate regulatory agency having jurisdiction, such determination shall have no effect on the validity of any other section, sentence, term or provision hereof, all of which shall remain in full force and effect.

8.6 Effective Date. The effective date of this franchise agreement will commence on March 23, 2010 and shall expire on April 1, 2020, unless extended by the mutual consent of the parties.

Short term impacts may occur during project construction that include temporary disruption of the wastewater system, increased noise, increased dust pollution, and increased potential for stormwater runoff. THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

In today's deal from the Dyspeptics Club, South was in his accustomed position as declarer in three no-trump, and West accurately led a spade.

South cunningly won in hand and crossed to dummy with the diamond queen to advance the club 10, hoping West would win the trick and continue with spades. However, it was East who flew up with the club ace and played a second spade. South ducked the trick, won the next spade, and played a second club, won by West, who cashed his long spade. On this, South pitched a heart from hand and a club from dummy. East letting go of the club eight.

If West had returned a heart, South would have rejected the finesse, for if it lost, that would be the defenders' fifth trick. By rising with the ace, he would have a double chance for nine tricks: Either the diamonds could split 3-3, or, alternatively, the hand with the diamond stopper would also have the heart king. Indeed, as the cards lie, East would be squeezed in the red suits when South cashed his clubs.

However, West found the best defense by playing a third club, not a heart, and declarer cashed his club winners. East deliberately pitched two hearts by playing high and then low. Now, after testing diamonds and finding the bad news, South took the heart finesse at trick 12, assuming that East's echo in hearts was designed to put him off the finesse. Another player fell victim to the double bluff!

ANSWER: It would be lazy simply to jump to four hearts. A better approach is to cue-bid two spades to show a good hand, then to bid hearts or raise partner to game in hearts. The point is that although you have a balanced hand, you are full value for a game bid, and if partner has extras, you might make a slam. Do not pre-empt partner unnecessarily.
