

# Judicial candidates judged State Bar rates lawyers

before primary election

Some judicial candidates running in the coming primary election take issue with a survey rating them that was released Tuesday by the Idaho State Bar.

The bar dispensed 4,374 surveys to its members regarding three elections on May 25. Up for grabs is a seat on the Supreme Court along with one 5th District judge position in Blaine County and another in the 2nd Judicial District of north-central Idaho.

In the bar's survey, the candidates were assessed on factors including their integrity, independence, knowledge and understanding of the law, judicial temperament and demeanor, and legal ability and experience. A total of 614 responses streamed in for the Supreme

# Urie faces first challenger for commission seat

BLISS - Tuesday's ribboncutting ceremonies for the information kiosks at each end of the Thousand Springs Scenic Byway celebrated much more than signage designed to lure Interstate 84 travelers into the Magic Valley.







# Hansen voters reject school levy a second time

Hansen voters on Tuesday rejected a proposed \$300,000, two-year supplemental levy for their school district even more firmly than when it was first voted on last month.

Out of 497 voters from the town of about 1,000, 199 supported the measure while 298 were against it, Myra Miller, the district's clerk, said late Tuesday. It was twice the 245 voters who turned out April 6 for a vote on the same proposed levy; that time, voters rejected it by just little more than 10 votes. Passage only required a simple majority.

The levy, if passed, would have paid to maintain and operate district facilities. The district is one of several in the Magic Valley that are pursuing levies after the Legislature slashed the state's public education budget for fiscal year 2011 to \$1.58 billion, a \$128.5 million decrease from the current year.

The results of Tuesday's second round were "a huge statement," Miller said. School officials weren't sure yet what they'll do to handle the cuts, she said. But they won't push for the levy a third time.

Burdick scored better than Bradbury in each across all of Idaho's judicial districts, including the 2nd Judicial District where Bradbury presides as a judge.

To that, Bradbury said that he accepts the survey results from lawyers practicing in his own district.

'Candidates have equal opportunity to impress their colleagues," said Dan Black, the bar's communications director.

# **Buhl School District** superintendent calls for levy amid budget cuts

BUHL – Buhl School District Superintendent Byron Stutzman told residents Monday he's recommended that the school board consider a two-year, \$500,000 supplemental levy election.

The levy would help backfill a cut in state funding to the district. as the appropriation for public schools will decrease by 7.5 percent in fiscal year 2011, which begins in July.

If state tax revenue doesn't increase, a potential 5.5 percent holdback could also cost the district another \$400,000.

The levy would help the district keep up with operating expenses but will likely not keep teacher pay from being cut, as the district joined in the statewide declaration of financial emergency among public schools. The measure allows districts to renegotiate teacher contracts.

"Eighty-three percent of the (district's) budget is salaries and benefits, so it makes sense that 83 percent of cuts come from salaries and benefits." Stutzman said.

Stutzman said district teachers are paid above the state-set reimbursement schedule for staff. Moving the district pay schedule to match the state reimbursement schedule will help cut tax. costs.

"It would be fiscally irresponsible to spend more money than we have," Stutzman said.

Stutzman lamented his position, saying cutting pay, including his own, isn't something he wants to do.

The depth of the cuts remains unknown, as the district negotiates contract details with the Buhl Education Association.

ered to cut costs include moving to a four-day school week, shortening the school year, reducing pay across the board and creating a pay-to-play system for student athletes of about \$300 per sport to transportation, cover equipment and other costs. The pay-to-play idea doesn't have support, as many families aren't likely

to afford the fees. "It's not even for discussion at this point," Barker said.

When the meeting opened up for public comment. some in the audience questioned attending Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin and Sen. Bert Falls, R-Rogerson, Brackett, about the possibility of the state increasing the sales tax to increase revenue.

While the comment was met with hearty applause, the legislators said that change isn't likely to happen.

"I rate the chances, politically, as quite low," Brackett said, citing continued high unemployment as a deterrent to raising the

With bond equalization funding through the state, a \$500,000 yearly levy would cost district property owners \$350,000 per year. The approximate cost would be \$76 per \$100,000 of assessed, taxable property value.

The board will continue to discuss the possible levy at its next meeting at 7 p.m. May 17 in the Buhl High School library.

# **Buhl School District** superintendent calls for levy amid budget cuts

BUHL – Buhl School District Superintendent Byron Stutzman told residents Monday he's recommended that the school board consider a two-year, \$500,000 supplemental levy election.

The levy would help backfill a cut in state funding to the district. as the appropriation for public schools will decrease by 7.5 percent in fiscal year 2011, which begins in July.

If state tax revenue doesn't increase, a potential 5.5 percent holdback could also cost the district another \$400,000.

The levy would help the district keep up with operating expenses but will likely not keep teacher pay from being cut, as the district joined in the statewide declaration of financial emergency among public schools. The measure allows districts to renegotiate teacher contracts.

"Eighty-three percent of the (district's) budget is salaries and benefits, so it makes sense that 83 percent of cuts come from salaries and benefits." Stutzman said.

Stutzman said district teachers are paid above the state-set reimbursement schedule for staff. Moving the district pay schedule to match the state reimbursement schedule will help cut tax. costs.

"It would be fiscally irresponsible to spend more money than we have," Stutzman said.

Stutzman lamented his position, saying cutting pay, including his own, isn't something he wants to do.

The depth of the cuts remains unknown, as the district negotiates contract details with the Buhl Education Association.

### OREGON **EPA presses pesticide makers** to protect salmon

GRANTS PASS – The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is pressing pesticides manufacturers to adopt new restrictions on applying three farm pesticides that pose a threat to Pacific salmon.

A letter from the EPA gives manufacturers of diazinon, malathion and chlorpyrifos until May 13 to say whether they will comply with the restrictions. If not, EPA says it will take action itself.

The action comes 18 months after NOAA Fisheries Service found that the pesticides threaten the survival of 27 species of salmon and steelhead in the West.

The agency suggests buffer strips up to 1,000 feet along salmon streams where the pesticides should not be sprayed.

Anti-pesticide groups had sued EPA to get the agency to take action.

## NW utilities, agencies plan to save 200 megawatts

PORTLAND – Public utilities and government agencies say they plan to increase energy efficiency over the next five years to save the Northwest about 200 average megawatts by 2014, enough to power 138,000 homes.

The Northwest Energy Efficiency Alliance on Tuesday pledged to renew its conservation program with \$192 million in funding for the next five years.

The alliance is funded by the Bonneville Power Administration and represents about 130 public utilities in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. It also receives funding from 13 major utilities and receives support from state governments and public interest groups.

Some alliance initiatives include increasing market share for efficient heating and cooling technologies, and promoting efficient new homes and commercial buildings.

### IDAHO Pilots in Idaho to get access to backcountry strip

MCCALL - Backcountry pilots in Idaho's central mountains will have another public landing strip where they can touch down.

The Idaho Transportation Department got a 20-year special permit from the U.S. Forest Service, to operate the Reed Ranch Airstrip in the Payette National Forest. It's located 18 miles east of McCall

Reed Ranch had been private, but the Forest Service got it as part of a land exchange with the Brundage Mountain ski area in 2006.

Since then, there's been an effort to open the landing strip to the public, involving a couple of years of paperwork, public comment and now agreements to mitigate potential impacts on big game and nesting eagles.

The landing strip, to be open in about a month, could be restricted to just emergency use during wildfires.

Idaho has more than 60 backcountry airstrips.

Two seats had been up for grabs on the sevenperson council in the contest: Charlotte Nilson won a second three-year term, while Alfred Nomee was elected to council for the open seat.

Nomee, who has worked for the tribe for 32 years, replaces Dave Matheson, who did not seek re-election.

Allan says he loves his tribe and is excited about the next year leading the reservation's roughly 1.400 tribal members.

In addition to Allan's reappointment as chairman, Ernie Stensgar was reappointed vice chairman and Norma Jean "Jeanie" Louie remains secretary/treasurer.

### Man sentenced for failed bank robbery

POCATELLO - An Oklahoma man who attempted to rob a credit union in Chubbuck in January has been sentenced to a 180-day boot camp program for felony burglary and being a felon in possession of a firearm.



# Environmentalists, land users finding better way in Idaho

n an America more bitterly polarized than at any time since the Vietnam War, a remarkable collaboration is taking place in the West between environmentalists, ranchers and private property advocates."This may be the best opportunity for conserva-

tion since (Theodore Roosevelt's) time," U.S. Forest

Service Chief Tom Tidwell told a gathering of stakeholders in Boise last weekend.

The occasion was a conference on public land management, convened by the Andrus Center for Public Policy at Boise State University. From last year's Owyhee Wilderness bill to collaborative preservation efforts on the Henrys Fork, in the Payette and

Clearwater national forests

and in Lemhi County, Idaho is in the vanguard of change.

Property rights advocate Fred Grant told the Idaho Statesman that he lost longtime friends over his willingness to sit down with environmentalists and forge a bill to protect the Owyhee Canyonlands and the ranching culture. But the law that established a science-review process, money for ranchers, more than 517,000 acres of wilderness and 315 miles of wild rivers was worth the effort, he said.

"I don't think there is anybody I trust more than the conservationists on the Owyhee Initiative Board," Grant said.

Given past history, that's a remarkable statement.

There's talk now of a state incentive program to help ranchers and other large landowners protect habitat, more funding sources for wildlife management beyond hunters and anglers, and turning federal lands over to the state to manage.

Two Idaho congressman – Rep. Mike Simpson and Sen. Mike Crapo – deserve some of the credit for the change in tone.

Simpson's decade-long effort to get the Central Idaho Economic and Redevelopment Act - critical wilderness protection legislation - through Congress demonstrates the tangible value of taking the other side's point of view seriously.

Although CIEDRA has its detractors, the legislation's finely balanced give and take has attracted the support of a wide spectrum of stakeholders. The bill actually has a fighting change of passing the Senate this year.

# Financial reform: Don't anyone panic

he one thing we know about the financial "reform" now moving toward what looks like eventual congressional approval is that it will be oversold, says economist Robert Litan of the Kauffman Foundation.



We will be told that it will forever prevent a repetition of the recent financial crisis; that it will root out corruption on Wall Street; that it will eliminate "bailouts"; that it will protect con-sumers against greedy lenders. President Obama, Democrats and Republicans will engage in much rhetorical overkill.

What can we really expect?

History counsels caution. Every financial reform, even if mostly successful, ultimately gives way to another because there are unintended consequences or unforeseen problems. Sheila Bair, the head of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., has noted that the reforms of the early 1990s, which curbed risk-taking within the banking system, perversely shifted lending to the largely unregulated "shadow banking system" - mortgage brokers, specialized lenders and "securitization."

The central aim of today's reform is to avert another financial panic.

A panic is not a bubble or just big losses. These are inevitable and, in part, desirable: without losses, investors would become reckless. A panic is a stampede of selling and hoarding, driven by fear, that threatens the financial system and, through it, production and jobs. A panic occurred in September 2008 when Lehman Brothers failed. Distrusting most financial institutions. investors and money man-



next financial crisis originates in runaway federal debt, which undermines confidence in the vast market for Treasury securities. Interest rates and currency values would react violently; the ripple effects would spread globally. The irony would be clear: While preaching financial reform, the White House and Congress fomented the next crisis by sanctioning long-term budget deficits.

The legislation also omits the strongest safeguards against financial meltdowns: tougher capital requirements. Capital mainly represents the stake of shareholders in financial institutions; it provides a cushion against losses. Pre-Lehman, banks' capital represented about 10 percent of their assets. Some experts would raise that as high as 15 percent. But the legislation leaves capital requirements to regulators, led by the Fed and Treasury. They are negotiating with other countries to set global standards. The outcome is unclear, and there's a dilemma: Overly tough capital rules will discourage lending.

Still, the legislation seems on balance a plus. Though not eliminating the threat of future crises, "it makes them less likely." says Litan. The "too-big-

financial institutions fail threatened a chain reaction by inflicting losses on their trading partners. When Lehman went bankrupt, chaos followed. But rescuing large, ailing institutions could be highly costly for taxpayers, as the AIG bailout showed.

Under the congressional proposals, the government could shut down crucial financial institutions gradually and recoup the costs through taxes on other financial institutions. Broadly speaking, this extends the FDIC's existing authority over banks to include large non-banks such as AIG and Lehman or, possibly, hedge funds. There are critics. Peter Wallison of the American **Enterprise Institute thinks** the close regulation of toobig-to-fail financial organizations will give them a privileged status and make them "tools of the U.S. government." Nevertheless, something seems better than nothing.

Financial stability should also benefit from bringing many transactions out of the shadows, says Robert Pozen, chairman of MFS Investment Management and author of "Too Big to Save? How to Fix the U.S. Financial System." Chief among these are "derivatives," most prominently

Derivatives can serve legitimate economic purposes - hedging against credit risk or swings in interest rates, for instance. But the reliance on OTC markets created massive exposures in almost complete secrecy. AIG's exposure to credit default swaps exceeded \$400 billion. The Obama proposals would force much derivative trading onto clearinghouses and exchanges. This would limit risks, notes Pozen. Clearinghouses would require that derivatives be priced daily and that traders whose positions lose value post extra collateral. That would ensure they could deliver on their obligations.

All this sounds encouraging, but we can't know the full consequences of financial reform. It's not just that many issues remain unsettled, including the "Volcker rule" (named after former Fed Chairman Paul Volcker, it would restrict banks' ability to do trading for their own accounts) and the powers of the proposed consumer finance agency. There's a deeper reason for humility. The financial system's size, complexity and global nature defy attempts to chart its future. No

environmentalists to agree on the Owyhee Wilderness bill, but some of the impetus came from the stakeholders themselves. A conversation among divergent interests was underway by the time the senator got involved.

What's going on here? Mostly a realization that the endless rounds of lawsuits and appeals of bureaucratic decisions solves nothing in public lands management. Call it enlightened self-interest, and the notion that nobody wins when everybody loses.

And what's the bottom line with public lands management, anyway? Is it a zero-sum game, or a means to an end that benefits both the land and the folks who work and play on it?

A century of name-calling over public lands issues has made a lot of lawyers rich and left the stakeholders feeling shut out.

There's got to be a better way. Maybe Idahoans have stumbled upon it.

# America has way too many criminal laws

merica is in the throes of "overcriminalization."

We are making and enforcing far too many criminal laws that create traps for the innocent but unwary – and threaten to turn otherwise respectable, law-abiding citizens into criminals. Consider a few examples from the new book "One Nation Under Arrest":

• A 12-year old girl arrested and handcuffed for eating a single french fry on the Washington subway system.

• A cancer-ridden grandmother arrested and criminally charged for refusing to trim her hedges the way officials in Palo Alto, Calif., were trying to force her to.

• A former high-school science whiz kid sent to prison after initially being



arrested by FBI agents clad in SWAT gear for failing to affix a federally mandated sticker to his otherwise legal UPS package.

• A 67-year-old retired husband and grandfather imprisoned because some of the paperwork for his home-based orchid business did not satisfy an international treaty.

All these stories have one thing in common – they are about typical Americans. Most involve a man or woman who works hard and pays taxes, cares for family members and is a good

neighbor. Perhaps above all, this person strives to stay on the right side of the law.

This typical American holds deep and often intuitive beliefs in basic principles about American government, including a belief that, if you do what's right, you have nothing to fear from your own government, and certainly not from the criminal justice system. But the typical

American's deeply held beliefs about the freedoms he cherishes and the fundamental principles of his government are no longer as well-founded as they once were. Today, he is far more vulnerable than ever before to being caught up in a criminal investigation and prosecution - and to actually being convicted and punished as a criminal – for having done something he did not even suspect was illegal.

Criminal law has changed in the last 50 years. Once criminal law was about criminal acts that everyone knew were inherently unlawful (like murder, rape and robbery). Limiting criminal punishment to conduct that is inherently wrongful restricted governmental power in two important ways.

First, and most important, it kept the range of governmental power small. Having few criminal laws and a short list of things not to be done limited the scope within which government can exercise its authority.

Second, a limited criminal law served a teaching function. It reflected the beliefs and understandings com-

mon to the vast majority of our citizens - the very citizens who were subject to the criminal law.

Today, the criminal law has grown as broad as the regulatory state in its sheer size and scope. In 1998, an American Bar Association task force estimated that there were more than 3,000 federal criminal offenses scattered throughout the 50 titles of the United States Code.

Just six years later, a leading expert on the overcriminalization problem, Professor John S. Baker Jr., published a study estimating that the number exceeded 4,000. As the ABA task force reported, the body of federal criminal law is "so large ... that there is no conveniently accessible, complete list of federal crimes."

If "ignorance of the law is no excuse," then every American citizen - literally. every single one - is ignorant and in peril, for nobody can know all the laws that govern their behavior.

A just criminal justice system has a twofold goal. One is to see that criminals are prosecuted, convicted and appropriately punished. The other is to ensure that those who are innocent are either not prosecuted in the first instance or, if mistakenly prosecuted, are not convicted. Today, our system fails the second of those goals.

# New scientific data show climate change accelerating around the world

t is about time to panic. According to the NASA data, we have just experienced the hottest 12-month period in more than 100 years, which means that the last 12 months have been the hottest in at least the past 1,000 years.

What does this mean? Well, if global temperatures continue to rise at the rate that they have risen for the past generation, then the world of 2100 will see a world 4.1 degrees Fahrenheit hotter than the world of the 1970s. New York will get the climate of Washington. Los Angeles will get the climate of Tijuana.

But global warming might accelerate, especially if China, India and other industrializing powers continue to increase the amount of carbon dioxide they pour out. Perhaps the world by 2100 will be 9 degrees hotter than the world of the 1970s. That would give Washington the climate of Miami and Los Angeles the climate of Cabo San Lucas.

And we might get lucky.



We might learn that the climate is in fact immensely stable on the upside. Even though past ice ages have ended quickly with very rapid warming, perhaps there are factors in the Earth's biosphere that allow it to soak up excess carbon dioxide quickly, like a sponge, and perhaps the world of 2100 will not be much warmer than the world of today. Or perhaps we will discover magical new energy technologies that are actually cheaper than our current technologies and will be rapidly adopted without the governments of the world lifting a finger to take action.

But that is not the prudent way to bet. The prudent thing to do is to plan, and to hedge: to plan for the most likely case, and to hedge by taking precautions - insurance against the worst case. The

world was supposed to plan Indus, the Ganges, the how to deal with our global warming future at Kyoto. And then the world was supposed to plan for how to deal with our global warming future at Copenhagen. It did not do so.

So what do we do now? Let us start with our global institutions. It is a fact that global warming is not likely to be a total human catastrophe in California during the next 100 years. We will mourn the losses of our glaciers and our snowpack. We will lament the extinction of the polar bear, the coral reefs and the giant sequoias. We will turn down our heaters and turn up our air conditioners. We will live our lives. It will be expensive for us to simply adapt, and it would be cheaper over the next century to deal with the problem.

China, India and their neighbors will soon have 3 billion peasants farming in the great river valleys of Asia. They depend on regular monsoon rains in the valleys and water flows down the channels of the

Mekong, the Yangtze and the Yellow rivers. Global climate change means that there will either be more precipitation in the valleys and feeding the rivers - or much less.

The peasant farming populations are not rich enough to simply adapt. So the first thing we need to do is to beg the rulers of China and India to understand their nations' longterm interest.

The second thing we need to do is change the forum. We need a climate council made up of the seven governments that have the biggest power to influence the climate and the most at stake: the treaty, it should be enforced by using aggressive and substantial trade sanctions against outsider

countries that do not want to come up to the mark.

NEW YORK - Stocks plunged around the world Tuesday as fears spread that Europe's attempt to contain Greece's debt crisis would fail. The euro fell to its lowest point against the dollar in a year.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 225 points, its biggest drop in three months. The slide erased a 143-point gain from Monday. The Dow and broader indexes each fell more than 2 percent. Treasury prices rose on increased demand for safe investments.

Stocks have seesawed in the past week as Europe's efforts to agree on a bailout package for Greece proceeded in fits and starts. An agreement finally came together over the weekend, but its ballooning size of \$144 billion has investors worried that Europe would have an even tougher time assembling an aid package if a larger country such as Spain or Portugal were to get in trouble. Traders are concerned that weakening economies in Europe could jeopardize the recovery in this country.

The market's plunge wasn't a surprise to some analysts who have warned for weeks that stocks were due for a retreat. After Monday's rally, the Standard & Poor's 500 index was up almost much to rattle investors who the climb Monday was remi-14 percent from its 2010 low of 1,056.74, reached Feb. 8.

Ormat Technologies, Inc. has requested two leases for geothermal projects at the north end of the Magic Reservoir, according to the Bureau of Land Management Shoshone Field Office.

The requested leases are located near Highway 20 at Director Peter Ditton. the north end of Magic Reservoir in Blaine and area under consideration is 2,840 acres.

Ormat Technologies, based in Reno, Nev., operates more than 15 geothermal projects on nearly 431,000 acres around the world. If the leases north of Magic Reservoir are approved, it would be the company's first project in Idaho.

PARMA - Spring work is gaining momentum at the University of Idaho's Parma Research and Extension Center as field hands wrap up planting potatoes and sugarbeets and preparing fields for later plantings of corn and other crops.





The Dow Jones Industrial fell 225.06, or 2 percent, to 10.926.77, its lowest close since April 7. The Dow had been down as much as 283 points at its low of the day. The S&P 500 index fell 28.66, or 2.4 percent, to 1,173.60. The Nasdaq composite index fell 74.49, or 3 percent, to 2,424.25. The dollar rose against other major currencies, especially the euro. The euro sank as low as \$1.2994 in New York, its weakest point since April 2009. It was worth \$1.3212 late Monday and had traded as high as \$1.51 last November, before the extent of Greece's debt crunch had become apparent.

# **Pakistan native admits to Times Square bomb plot**



NEW YORK - Seized from a plane about to fly to the Middle East, a Pakistan-born man admitted training to make bombs at a terrorism camp in his native land before he rigged an SUV with a homemade device to explode in Times Square, authorities said Tuesday.

Faisal Shahzad, a naturalized U.S. citizen who recently spent five months in Pakistan, was arrested on terrorism and weapons of mass destruction charges for trying to blow up the crude gasoline-and-propane bomb amid tourists and theatergoers Saturday evening.

He was in custody after being hauled off a Dubaibound plane at Kennedy Airport that he had been able to board Monday night despite being placed on the "no-fly" federal list. Authorities had planned to arrest Shahzad, who had been under constant watch from mid-afternoon, at his Connecticut home, but lost track of him, two people familiar with the probe told The Associated Press. The people spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to talk publicly about the breach in surveillance.

Because Customs and Border Protection agents were on the lookout for Shahzad, they recognized his name on a passenger manifest and ordered the flight stopped so they could arrest him. Authorities shed little light on what might have motivated Shahzad - who since moving from Pakistan to Connecticut had acquired a master's degree in business administration and a house in the suburbs that subsequent ly was lost to foreclosure. He reportedly came from a background of privilege and wealth - the son of a retired air vice marshal.

### INDIANA **Coats wins Indiana** primary; N.C., Ohio back incumbents

INDIANAPOLIS - Voters in Indiana, North Carolina and Ohio kept their incumbents and voted for an old Capitol Hill hand - Republican Dan Coats - in Tuesday's primaries despite the nation's bottombarrel support for Congress and frustration with the Washington establishment.

In Indiana this fall, Coats - who was recruited by the National Republican Senatorial Committee - will face Democrat Brad Ellsworth, whose nomination is assured. The candidates are seeking the seat held by retiring Democratic Sen. Evan Bayh.

Coats, 66, retired from the Senate in 1998, has worked as a lobbyist and was U.S. ambassador to Germany under President George W. Bush. He overcame spirited challenges from four, including state Sen. Marlin Stutzman, a tea party favorite who was endorsed by South Carolina Sen. Jim DeMint, and former Rep.

### ILLINOIS Study: Stomach cancer up in young, white adults

CHICAGO – Scientists are puzzling over a surprising increase in stomach cancer in young white adults. Rates in all other American adults have declined.

Chances for developing stomach cancer are still very low in young adults ages 25 to 39. But a study found the incidence has climbed in the past three decades for whites in this age group.

National Cancer Institute researchers and colleagues studied new cases of cancer in the lower stomach. Their findings appear in Wednesday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Lower stomach cancer has been linked with diets high in salt and salt-preserved foods, and low in fresh fruits and vegetables. Rates have been declining in many countries because of improved food preservation and better hygiene.

# TENNESSEE crews search for bodies

NASHVILLE - The Cumberland River finally began receding Tuesday, exposing mud-caked homes and submerged cars as officials searched door to door for more victims of a record-busting flash flood and weekend storm already blamed for nearly 30 deaths.

No new fatalities were reported Tuesday and it was unclear whether anyone remained missing.

The weekend deluge swept many motorists to their deaths even after forecasters and Nashville's mayor warned people not to drive. But staying put carried frightening consequences for others as the swollen Cumberland and its tributaries started pouring into thousands of homes.

"I kept watching TV that was my source, and (Mavor) Karl Dean was saying stay put, don't drive," Nashville resident Cheri Newlin said. Police eventually told Newlin to evacuate on Monday, but by then, the water was so close that she had to flee by boat, leaving her three cats behind. She is

now at a shelter and hasn't been able to get back to her house to check on her pets and assess damage.



Shiite electoral blocs announced Tuesday they have formed an alliance that gives them a strong chance of setting up the next government, though they have yet to work out the contentious question of who would become prime minister.

The coalition deal between Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's State of Law coalition and the conservative Shiite Iraqi National Alliance leaves them just four parliamentary seats shy of a ruling majority.

The union could cement Shiite domination of Iraq's government and further alienate minority Sunnis who lost their positions of privilege with the fall of their patron Saddam Hussein in the 2003 U.S.-led invasion.

Such an outcome threatens to stir further violence at an especially fragile moment in Iraq as American troops prepare to withdraw. It could also ensure that neighboring Shiite power Iran maintains influence in Iraqi affairs.

The coalition deal was announced at a news conference, but the question of who would be prime minister could threaten to derail their plans to form a government.

### **NEW YORK** New sanctions on Iran would hurt U.S., Ahmadinejad says

NEW YORK - Iran's president predicted Tuesday that a proposed new round of sanctions aimed at his country would "backfire" and hurt the United States, while having little effect on the Persian Gulf nation.

In a world of free trade, economic sanctions are a "broken deal" that will only harm the economies of those who break off ties with a nation, Mahmoud target Ahmadinejad said.

"While we don't welcome sanctions, we do not fear them, either," Ahmadinejad said, speaking to reporters at a United Nations conference.

Ahmadinejad is visiting New York this week to enlist support **Coup investigation** against the threatened U.N. Security Council sanctions as he attends a conference on the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty of 1970, the international agreement governing the spread of nuclear weapons.

### THAILAND **Protesters welcome** PM's offer. want details

BANGKOK - Protest leaders said they agreed in principle Tuesday with a government-proposed compromise to end Thailand's deadly political crisis, but refused to leave their camp in Bangkok's streets until details can be worked out.

Pressure on both sides to end the 8-week-old stalemate has grown in recent days, with the government fending off calls for a crackdown on the paralyzing protest and the anti-government "Red Shirts" attempting to recover from a public relations debacle caused by their raid of a hospital.

Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva had previously demanded that the protesters leave the streets before a compromise could be reached. But with damage to the economy and political stability growing, Abhisit went on nationwide television Monday night to present his plan for rescuing Thailand from the political morass in which it has been trapped since a 2006 military coup deposed Prime Minister Thaksin Shinawatra on corruption allegations.

The plan includes an offer of new elections on Nov. 14 – about a year before Abhisit's term would end - if the Red Shirts stop their protests

Veera Musikapong, a Red Shirt leader, said after meeting with colleagues Tuesday that they "unanimously welcomed the reconciliation process" but did not commit themselves to abandoning their street demonstration.

TEGUCIGALPA – A Truth Commission with strong international support started investigating the Honduran coup Tuesday, helping the country regain the recognition it lost when soldiers ousted President Manuel Zelaya last year.

Zelaya backers call the commission a farce that cements Central America's first successful coup in nearly two decades, and vow not to provide information to its investigators. But the U.S. supports it and the chief of the Organization of American States attended the inauguration.

"We will seek the truth in a disciplined, relentless way," said commission coordinator Eduardo Stein, former vice president of Guatemala, at a ceremony launching the initiative.

Soldiers ousted Zelaya on June 28 at gunpoint after he ignored court orders to stop trying to modify the constitution. The United States and most other countries suspended diplomatic ties with impoverished Central the American country.

But the universal repudiation started wavering after November's presidential elections, which had been scheduled before the coup. Porfirio Lobo, a conservative rancher, took office in January, replacing an interim government.

### BRITAIN **British election** campaign in homestretch

LONDON - Campaigning in Britain's most unpredictable election in years entered the homestretch Tuesday even as the nation began girding itself for a period of political uncertainty stemming from a potential stalemate in Parliament.

The opposition Conservatives remain in the lead in the polls as they try to smash the Labor Party's 13-year grip on power. But there are increasing signs that no party is likely to emerge from Thursday's vote with a majority in the House of Commons, which would throw this country into murky political waters not seen here in more than 30 years.

Such a "hung Parliament" would probably set off a furious round of negotiations over who would get to serve as prime minister at the head of either a minority or coalition government. But the last time this happened, in 1974, the result was so unstable that the government fell within months and a new election had to be called.

None of the three men who hope to come out on top ceded any ground to their rivals as they barnstormed the country Tuesday, trying to shore up core voters and win over undecided ones.





Knife in hand, Brock O'Dell sliced through the freshly baked and frosted cake before him with the focus and precision of a surgeon, wiping the blade with a damp cloth after every cut.

Soon, a grid of chocolate goodness lay ready for the special lunch O'Dell and his fellow Magic Valley High School culinary arts classmates shared Friday.

The culinary arts program is new to the alternative high school this year, with students rotating through the program on a block schedule; they're in the commercial kitchen for about five hours each school day for about three weeks.

"There are a lot more rules to cooking than I thought, but it's a good class," O'Dell said. "If I wanted to get a job cooking, I could."


The school offered textbook kitchen lessons in a regular classroom for years. But the commercial kitchen, operating since November in a building adjacent to the main campus, offers a realworld example, said family consumer science teacher Bob Withrow. Now, students measure, chop, saute, roast.



# Suspect tells police details of Virginia lacrosse death

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Describing a scene of vio- Ernie Harwell, beloved by generations of fans who lent rage, the Virginia lacrosse player accused of killing a member of the women's team told police he kicked in her bedroom door, shook her, and her head repeatedly hit the wall, according to a court document.

The suspect, 22-year-old George Huguely, of Chevy Chase, Md., has been arrested and charged with firstdegree murder in the death of Yeardly Love, also 22.

Huguely was not present at a court hearing Tuesday, but he appeared via videoconference from Albemarle-Charlottesville Regional Jail, wearing a gray-striped uniform. Afterward, his lawyer, Francis Lawrence, told the voice of summer," Michigan Gov. Jennifer reporters that Love's "death was not intended, but an accident with a tragic outcome."

Lawrence said Huguely withdrew from the university. Huguely and Love were both seniors.

### Longtime Tigers broadcaster Harwell dead at 92

DETROIT - Longtime Detroit Tigers broadcaster

grew up listening to his rich voice, Southern cadence and guirky phrases on the radio, has died after a months-long battle with cancer. He was 92.

Harwell died about 5:30 p.m., MDT Tuesday in his apartment at Fox Run Village and Retirement Center in the Detroit suburb of Novi, said his attorney and longtime friend, S. Gary Spicer.

His wife of 68 years, Lulu, and his two sons and two daughters were at his side, Spicer said.

'We'll miss you, Ernie Harwell. You'll forever be Granholm tweeted.

A Hall of Fame announcer who called Tigers games for four-plus decades and was acquired by the Brooklyn Dodgers for a catcher in 1948, Harwell revealed in September that he had been diagnosed with inoperable cancer of the bile duct. He took the news with characteristic poise, saying he planned to continue working on a book and other projects.

'Whatever happens, I'm ready to face it," Harwell told The Associated Press on Sept. 4, 2009. "I have a great faith in God and Jesus."

Harwell's body will lie in repose at Comerica Park on Thursday beginning at 7 a.m. and "until the last person who wishes to pay their respects" has done so, Spicer said

"It might be an all-night vigil," he said.

There will be no public memorial service, and the family will hold a private funeral service at a location Spicer declined to disclose.

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - Tiger Woods says the Titleist irons offered online for a minimum bid of \$250,000 were not the ones he used to win four consecutive majors.

eBay believed him enough to take the item off its website Tuesday.

Steve Mata, a former Titleist representative who worked with Woods when he swept the majors, said Woods gave him the irons during the 2001 Buick Classic in New York when it was time to change out the grooves.

"He may have my set of irons, but they're not from those tournaments," Woods said Tuesday at The Players Championship. "They're in my garage."

Woods said he used two sets of irons for his "Tiger Slam," which began with his 15-shot victory in the 2000 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach and ended 294 days later with his victory in the 2001 Masters. Players often change irons when the grooves get worn. Woods said both sets are in his garage.

Mata, whom Titleist dismissed after the 2008 season, used a friend to put the irons up for bid on Monday. He said after Woods' press conference, the item was removed. An eBay representative said only that the irons were taken down because of an apparent violation.

Mata stands by his claim.

"I did all his work for him on tour when he was at Titleist," Mata said in a telephone interview. "We made up two sets of irons because no two sets are ever identical. I wanted to give him an option. He was in the proam at Westchester and I gave him the irons."

The overcall made by Jovanka Smederevac of Austria might not have been strictly textbook, but it did guide her side to a very playable spade game. Once there, she needed to find an elegant play for at least two reasons. First, she had to justify her rather sporting bidding; second, she was seated opposite Maria Erhart, not the most tolerant partner of less than perfect play.

Put yourself in the South seat and decide what your secret weapon is going to be.

(Incidentally, her opponents did not look to sacrifice in five diamonds because East's opening bid guaranteed only two diamonds, but West's final pause before passing did not escape declarer.)

On the lead of the diamond seven to East's ace for a spade return. Smederevac took two trump finesses. The 3-1 trump split meant that she had only six trump tricks, and thus needed both the heart ace onside and something nice from the clubs. But her gut reaction was that West had five diamonds, and thus only two clubs. Accordingly, she led a low club to the eight, nine and jack. She then won the heart return in dummy with the king, cashed the club king, and led to the club seven. When that held the trick, she had her 10th winner.

This maneuver, known as an intrafinesse, combines taking a finesse with a subsequent pin of the card against which you originally finessed - one of the most elegant trick-generating plays in the book.

ANSWER: An out-of-the-blue cuebid in a sequence like this (where your partner could not bid over one spade) suggests four-card diamond support and a maximum hand — perhaps a 4-1-4-4 pattern, or one with three spades and five clubs. Your high cards look to be well placed and you have too much extra shape to be happy bidding only three diamonds. So bid four diamonds to show your extras.

#### On this date:

In 1821, Napoleon Bonaparte, 51, died in exile on the island of St. Helena.

In 1862, Mexican forces loyal to Benito Juarez defeated French troops sent by Napoleon III in the Battle of Puebla.

In 1891, Carnegie Hall (then named "Music Hall") had its official opening night in New York City.

In 1920, Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were arrested in the shooting deaths of a paymaster and security guard during a robbery at a shoe factory in Braintree, Mass. (Sacco and Vanzetti were later convicted and executed amid an international outcry.)

In 1925, schoolteacher John T. Scopes was charged in Tennessee with violating a state law that prohibited teaching the theory of evolution. (Scopes was found guilty, but his conviction was later set aside.)

In 1942, during World War II, Japanese forces landed on the Philippine island of Corregidor.

In 1955, West Germany became a fully sovereign state. The baseball musical "Damn Yankees" opened on Broadway.

In 1960, Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev announced his country had shot down an American U-2 plane which the U.S. claimed was conducting weather studies over Turkey. (The U.S. cover story fell apart two days later when Khrushchev announced that the U-2 pilot, Francis Gary Powers, had survived.)

In 1980, a siege at the Iranian embassy in London by armed men demanding the release of political prisoners in Iran ended as British forces stormed the building, killing four of the five hostage-takers. Nineteen hostages were rescued; two had already been killed by their captors.

In 1985, President Ronald Reagan kept a controversial promise to West German





Chancellor Helmut Kohl by leading a wreath-laying ceremony at the military cemetery in Bitburg.

Ten years ago: President Bill Clinton met at the White House with Japan's new prime minister, Yoshiro Mori. The Labor Department reported the nation's unemployment rate had hit a 30-year low of 3.9 percent in April 2000. Reformers swept Iran's runoff elections, winning control of the legislature from conservatives. The tightest alignment of Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, the sun and the moon since 1962 took place.

Five years ago: Tony Blair won a historic third term as Britain's prime minister, but his Labour Party suffered a sharply reduced parliamentary majority. "Precious Doe," a slain girl in Kansas City, Mo., was identified after four years as 3-year-old Erica Michelle Marie Green. (Harrell Johnson was later convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to life in prison without parole; Erica's mother, Michelle Green, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder and received a 25-year term.) Michael Jackson's lawyers opened their successful defense in his molestation and conspiracy trial.

One year ago: America's first face transplant recipient appeared before reporters at the Cleveland Clinic. (Connie Culp underwent the procedure after being shot by her husband in a failed murdersuicide attempt.) Texas health officials confirmed the first death of a U.S. resident with swine flu.

- 3. Commercial Overlay, Commercial General and Light and Heavy Industrial Zones: residential dwellings not allowed unless part of a planned unit development (PUD).
