# Falling flakes in May

Forest Service hopes pheromones will drive off beetles

SUN VALLEY — Flakes fell on Bald Mountain Thursday. But they weren't from Sun Valley's arsenal of snow guns, nor flakes from the heavens.

They were packets of pheromones dispersed by a helicopter that U.S. Forest Service officials hope will keep an army of Douglas-fir bark beetles from ravaging the trees lining Sun Valley's famed ski runs.

ished by many people. We'd have a lot of unhappy people - not just residents, but also people who come visit if we lost those trees," said Ketchum District Ranger Kurt Nelson.

Douglas-fir bark beetles are naturally found in most Douglas-fir stands, but usually kill only a few trees a year in a 25-acre area. The beetle population exploded, however, following the 2007 Castle Rock Fire,

"The Bald Mountain view is cher- as the fire and ongoing drought weakened hundreds of thousands of trees in a 48,000-acre area and left them as perfect hosts for the beetle.

The danger now is that the beetles emerging from those now-dying trees will kill otherwise healthy Douglas firs that weren't burnt in the fire, Nelson said, including hundreds in the ski area.

# Knutsen guilty of patient sex abuse

**By Andrea Jackson Times-News writer** 

David Knutsen was unanimously convicted Thursday by a Twin Falls jury on four counts of sexual abuse of a vulnerable adult, stemming from incidents last year at St. Luke's Canyon Behavioral Health Services.

Knutsen, 29, was accused of the four felonies after a now 23-year-old woman who has been described as developmentally delayed claimed that Knutsen touched her at Canyon View in a sexually inappropriate way on Jan. 30,

After Knutsen was charged, St. Luke's officials announced that 31 security cameras were installed inside the facility and also implemented new patient contact rules. Police testified at Knutsen's trial that video recordings from inside the facility weren't available during their investigation of the incident.

# Giant box lowered in Gulf to battle oil spill

# Thumper's mom was a Fairfield girl

ots of starry-eyed south-central Idaho kids have migrated to Hollywood seeking fame and fortune over the years.

But none found a stranger gig than Margaret Lightfoot of Fairfield.

Lightfoot, under the screen name Margaret Lee, voiced Thumper's mother - Mrs. Rabbit - in the 1942 Disney animated megahit "Bambi." Here's the sum total of her dialogue:

Thumper: (watching Bambi) "He doesn't walk very good, does he?"

Mrs. Rabbit: "Thumper!" Thumper: "Yes, mama?" Mrs. Rabbit: "What did your father tell you this morning?"

Thumper: (clearing throat) "If you can't say something nice ... don't say nothing at

Those were her last words Lee ever uttered on screen. At age 33, she retired from the movies and moved to Alaska. where she died in 1989 at the

So how do you get to be a rabbit's mother in Tinseltown?

It started out more promisingly for Lee, who fetched up in Hollywood in 1927 and quickly landed an uncredited role in a John Gilbert picture, "Man, Woman and Sin."

Gilbert was a superstar of the silent film era, and at the time was carrying on a torrid love affair with the leading actress of the day, Greta Garbo. Lee appeared the same year as "a blonde flirt" with Gilbert and Garbo in "Love."

It wasn't a bad way for an 18-year-old kid to start a movie career.



Lee made seven films in 1928 and 1929, including "Rose-Marie" with Joan Crawford. Her first talkie, "The 20th Amendment" with Jack Haley, was released in 1930.

"The Smart Set-Up" — by far Lee's biggest Hollywood role, co-starring with Walter O'Keefe — was released in 1931. In 1932, she appeared in a short called "Keep Laughing," directed by disgraced movie comedian Fatty Arbuckle (After three trials, Arbuckle had been acquitted of raping a woman in a San Francisco hotel room; she died two days after the inci-

"Keep Laughing" was Lee's last movie for 10 years. Like many other Hollywood starlets, she didn't make a successful transition from silent to sound films.

Ironically, audiences never saw the 5-foot-1 blonde in her most successful movie: they only heard her voice.

And when "Bambi" was released, her work didn't even get a screen credit.

In Tuesday's column about Twin Falls County Democrats, I neglected to mention that then-Democrat Dennis Maughan was elected to the Twin Falls County Commission in 1994, beating Republican Pam Dowd by 2,000 votes. In 1998, he switched parties and won re-

beetles out there now," said Forest Service entomologist Laura Lazarus. "One tree alone could have a thousand beetles."

This is only the third time dispersion pheromones has been attempted nationally. The Forest Service has fought beetles the past four years by manually affixing pheromone pouches to 30 acres of trees in Bald Mountain's Central Park area, between Upper College and Upper River Run. But that's a slow, labor-intensive process for the hundreds of acres that Nelson said.

would have likewise been too slow and would have likely prompted public opposition, he said.

Aerial dispersion was 95 percent successful in a smaller operation near Lake Chelan, Wash. And there have been no reports of adverse effects to humans, animals or the environment. Even so, Forest Service workers established a buffer zone of 300 feet to ensure no flakes would fall in Warm Springs Creek or the Big Wood River.

On Thursday morning, two workers fended off 27degree temperatures to load

two flakes, each about half the width of a man's pinkie finger.

Guided by GPS, the helicopter took off on half-hour jaunts, hovering between 60 and 100 feet above the trees as it blew the flakes on select areas of the mountain and above the old Warm Springs Golf Course. The operation was designed to spread 43,000 flakes per acre or about one flake per square

barrier islands. But the lowering of the box was delayed because of dangerous fumes rising from the oily water in the windless night, the captain of the supply boat hauling the box told The Associated Press. A spark caused by

metal could cause a fire,

Capt. Demi Shaffer said. Deckhands wore respirators while workers on surrounding vessels took airquality readings. Crews later were able to start the work. Black oil coated the white shell of the box as it was being lowered.

The technology has been used a few times in shallow waters, but never at such extreme depths - 5,000 feet down, where the water pressure is enough to crush a submarine.

The box — which looks a lot like a peaked, 40-foothigh outhouse, especially on the inside, with its rough timber framing – must be accurately positioned over the well, or it could damage the leaking pipe and make the problem worse.

BP spokesman Doug Suttles said he is not concerned about that happening. Underwater robots have been clearing pieces of pipe and other debris near where the box will be placed to avoid complications.

"We do not believe it could make things worse," he said.

Other risks include ice clogs in the pipes — a problem that crews will try to prevent by continuously pumping in warm water and methanol - and the danger of explosion when separating the mix of oil, gas and water that is brought to the surface.

"I'm worried about every part, as you can imagine." said David Clarkson, BP vice president of engineering projects.

#### Missing woman's husband arrested on gun violation

LEWISTON — The husband of a missing Clarkston, Wash., woman was arrested Thursday at his business in Idaho.

The Lewiston Tribune reports Charles Capone was arrested in Moscow, Idaho, on a Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives warrant accusing him of violating federal firearms laws.

The 40-year-old Rachael Anderson is a mother of four who was in the process of divorcing Capone. She was reported missing April 16 after she failed to show up for work at her job in Lewiston.

#### **Schools in Riggins** going to 4-day week

RIGGINS — The school board in Riggins has voted to adopt a four-day school week beginning next fall. Superintendent Marc Scheibe says the board voted 3-0 last week in favor of the change, which is

expected to save the Salmon River Joint School District a minimum of \$42,000 a year. The district serves 151 students.

Moving to a four-day school week involves adding 50 minutes to the class periods on the remaining days, the Lewiston Tribune reports.

Scheibe says the district expects to lose about \$150,000 in funding because of statewide revenue declines, and the district is seeking approval of a \$545,000 supplemental levy on May 18.

### Forest mulls car camp ban along N. Idaho rivers

LEWISTON - The U.S. Forest Service is considering a ban on car camping along the banks of the North Fork of the Clearwater River and its popular tributary, Kelly Creek.

Forest Service Ranger Doug Gober says the agency is likely to place large boulders and other barricades to block vehicle access to beaches and riparian areas adjacent to the river and creek.

Gober tells the Lewiston Tribune some people take their vehicles close to river edges, causing damage to banks and beaches. The barricades will also deter campers from driving out on to gravel bars.

There are more than 40 undeveloped camping sites along the North Fork and Kelly Creek. The two streams are popular in the summer for their sandy beaches and swimming.

Road work through Sylvan Pass is set to begin between May 15 and June 1.

There's still plenty of snow on the ground in Yellowstone. Park officials say visitors can still expect snowfall to cause temporary road closures.

BILLINGS — A state official says two bull bison from Yellowstone National Park were shot and killed after an animal disease study apparently went awry.

Steve Merritt with the Montana Department of Livestock says the bison were shot about 10 miles north of the park on Tuesday. The bison had been tranquilized just outside the

park by U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers who were collecting bison semen to see if the animals pose a disease transmission risk. Merritt said Thursday the two bison woke up

A National Park Service official and a Department of Livestock official decided to shoot the bison after efforts to turn them back failed.

We think he deserves renomination in the May 25 GOP primary over Weiser Realtor Skip Davis.

Crapo has embraced the cause of Idaho wilderness - an issue that Craig wouldn't touch. He's a dogged protector of Idaho water, a forceful advocate for cleaning up radioactive waste at the Idaho National Laboratory and a knowledgeable voice for Idaho agriculture.

The senator heads into the primary election with a massive war chest -\$2.8 million as of March 31, according to the Federal Election Commission. That's about par for the course for veteran U.S. senators (Crapo ranks 49th among the 100 senators in seniority and 21st among the 41 Senate Republicans).

But in truth, that's far more campaign money than he needs: Crapo is a prohibitive favorite over any other Idaho Senate candidate this year.

What disturbs us is not the size of his reelection bank account but where some of the money came from.

According to the Center for Responsive Politics, as of Dec. 31 Crapo had received \$500,000 from the securities and investment industry, \$387,950 from insurance, \$169,428 from the real estate lobby, \$159,256 from commercial banks, \$151,320 from accountants, \$66,617 from business services and \$54,100 from financial credit

Among the top donors to his campaign and political , according to the Lewiston were The Securities Industry and Financial Market Association (\$49,000), Credit Suisse Group (\$47,500), JPMorgan Chase and Co. (\$42,732), Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu (\$34,500), Ernst and Young (\$33,400), Independent Insurance Agents and Brokers/America (\$32,500), FMR Corp. (\$32,300) and Goldman Sachs (\$32,000).

That matters because Crapo is the ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Subcommittee on Financial Institutions, meaning he has a lot of say about financial reform and how banks are regulated. We believe he should return the bankers' contributions to his cam-

That said, Crapo has the potential to become what McClure was in his 18 years in the Senate — a fiscal conservative who's a powerful voice on environmental and public lands issues. The senators is a major asset for Idaho in Washington, D.C.

On the Democratic side, only one of the candidates – Tetonia small business owner Tom Sullivan — actually lives in the state. His opponent William Bryk is a Brookyn lawyer.

Sullivan merits the nomination, and although unlikely to prevail in November he's an intriguing figure in some ways. Only 42, Sullivan is a small-business owner has lived in eastern Idaho for 14 years.

He told the Idaho Statesman that he would make a priority of getting private equity back into the econo-

"Let small business create jobs ..." Sullivan said.

"Positive momentum creates positive momentum." That's not what you hear from a lot of Democrats, so Idahoans may hear from Sullivan in the future.

# Who killed immigration reform?

ASHINGTON -Many in the media have written powerful and appropriate columns decrying the action of the Arizona Legislature and Gov. Jan Brewer in passing and signing a punitive law aimed at illegal immigrants.

If the law goes into effect despite promised constitutional challenges, local police in Arizona will be able to stop people they suspect may not belong here and require them to produce papers attesting that they are legal citizens. Jail terms for trespassing await anyone without the documentation.

The law is every bit as bad as others have said — but it is hardly a surprise. What has been missing from the current discussion is any apparent recognition of those responsible for killing the last effort at comprehensive federal immigration reform that would have headed off the need for this kind of punitive state action.

It was only three years ago that the action was stymied by a Senate filibuster and the impatience of Majority Leader Harry Reid to move on to other topics. At the time, Sen. Edward Kennedy, then as always trying to fix the broken system, asked what opponents of the comprehensive legislation that died in June three years ago, were in favor of.

"What are they going to do with the 12 million who are undocumented here?" Kennedy demanded to

know. "Send them back to countries around the world? Develop a type of Gestapo here to seek out these people that are in the shadows?

-What's their alternative?" Now we know. If it's not exactly "Gestapo" tactics, the Arizona legislation certainly smacks of policestate methods that inevitably will involve racial profiling of Hispanics, no matter what preventive measures the governor says she will take.

The bill that died in Congress had been hammered out over many months by a bipartisan group of senators, including both the Hispanic members of the Senate and both the Republican senators from Arizona.

But once the bill hit the floor, it was attacked from both flanks. The most conservative Republicans - Jim DeMint of South Carolina, David Vitter of Louisiana and Jeff Sessions of Alabama - led the assault. They were joined by some civil libertarians and allies of organized labor who were dissatisfied with its protec-

tions for guest workers. Democrat Byron Dorgan of North Dakota repeatedly tried to gut the guest worker program before finally succeeding by one vote on his third effort.

With Reid showing increasing impatience over a debate that began on May 21, the Senate conducted three cloture votes on June 7 and each time came up short. Carrying out his threat, Reid pulled the bill off the floor, while Minority Leader Mitch McConnell protested.

"I think we're giving up on this bill too soon," McConnell said. "There are a number of Republicans who are prepared to vote for cloture as soon as they believe their colleagues on this side of the aisle have had a reasonable opportunity to have offered and voted upon amendments they think would improve the bill."

The next week, President George W. Bush journeyed to Capitol Hill and made a personal plea to Senate Republicans to renew the effort. More bipartisan talks washpost.com

ensued and the result was a second bill, this one adding a mandatory \$4 billion border security section to the previous provisions centered on tougher enforcement, plus a path to citizenship for the illegal immigrants already living here.

But when it came to the floor, cloture again failed, this time by 46-53-14votes short of the 60 it needed. Democrats split 33-15 in favor of ending the debate while Republicans voted 37-12 to continue talking and amending, and the two independent members split.

That ended the last effort by Congress to meet the federal responsibility for managing immigration. The states -not just Arizona but all of them — are illequipped to solve the prob-

The blame for this mess rests with those who killed that bill.

The commissioners are asking for your permission to enter into a lease/purchase jail proposal not to exceed an annual payment of \$985,000 over 30 years with a private firm who will finance and build a jail of approximately 165 beds. with sheriff's offices and an emergency operations center included if funds allow.

The design, cost and preferred location have always been stated previously and are available at the Jerome Sheriff's Office in the courthouse. There are two main reasons the commissioners are pursuing a lease/purchase:




I love my returns but I believe that the only reason I am doing so well with this stock is because the referee (government) isn't doing its job.

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



### YESTERDAY ON WALL STREET



The Dow Jones Industrial recovered two-thirds of its loss Thursday. It closed down 347.80, or 3.2 percent, at 10,520. That was its biggest point loss since February 2009.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index, the index most closely watched by market pros, fell 37.75, or 3.2 percent, to 1,128.15. The Nasdaq composite index lost 82.65, or 3.4 percent, and closed at 2,319.64.

At the market's lows, all three indexes were showing losses for the year. The Dow now shows a gain of 0.9 percent for 2010, while the S&P is up 1.2 percent and the Nasdaq is up 2.2 percent.

At the close, losses were so widespread that just 173 stocks rose on the NYSE, compared to 3,008 that fell. The major indexes were all down more than 3 percent.

# Medication caused potentially deadly reaction

**DEAR DR. GOTT: My** daughter, who lives alone, took the first pill of a new prescription while at work. She went into anaphylactic shock. Her coworkers immediately called an ambulance, and she got to the hospital with only minutes to spare. If she had waited and taken the pill at home, there would have been no one to help her. Please caution your readers to not take any new medication when they are alone just in case they have an allergic reaction.

DEAR READER:

Allergies to medications are fairly common, but to be severe enough to cause anaphylactic shock is rare. Also known as anaphy-



laxis, this type of allergic reaction is severe and potentially life-threatening, typically occurring within minutes of exposure to the offending substance. In some instances, a reaction can occur within seconds or can take as long as 30 minutes. Unless treated immediately with epinephrine, the sufferer can become unconsciousness or die.

Everyone, particularly those people with known allergies, is at risk of ana-

phylaxis, but certain medications, foods, food additives and insect stings are the most common triggers. In some instances, exercise, eating certain foods prior to the activity, or exercising in a vast variety of weather conditions can cause a reaction. Those who have had anaphylaxis in the past are at increased risk.

Symptoms include a weak, rapid pulse; dizziness or fainting; nausea; vomiting; diarrhea; skin reactions such as hives; itching or flushing; swelling of the tongue or throat; and constriction of the airways, leading to wheezing and difficulty

breathing. Treatment is by injecsteroid pills and/or beta agonists may be used to reduce throat constriction, ease or improve breathing and more. People with a history of anaphylaxis are often prescribed singledose Epi-Pens by their primary-care physician or allergist for self-injection at the first sign of a reaction, decreasing the risk of worsening symptoms. Depending on the aller-

gen, immunotherapy with allergy shots may be beneficial. This treatment involves receiving multiple injections of slowly increasing "doses" of the

allergen. In this way, the body may develop immunity to the substance and stop overreacting. This is not appropriate for everyone. Even in those who choose to undergo this treatment, taking steps to prevent a reaction — and being prepared should one happen — is still vital.

Your advice about start ing a new medication only when others are around in case of an emergency is very good. Had your daughter been alone when she developed the reaction, she probably would not have fared as well as she did. The good news is that this type of reaction is rare, and most people do not need to be overly concerned. But, as always, it is better to play it safe, because there is no way of knowing what could happen. Thank you for writing and sharing this important







#### **NEW HAMPSHIRE** Passenger surrenders after **Greyhound bus bomb scare**

PORTSMOUTH — A nine-hour bomb scare aboard a Maine-to-New York Greyhound bus ended peacefully Thursday night when the lone remaining passenger walked off it with his hands over his head. The other 16 passengers and the driver had left the bus safely hours earlier.

Portsmouth Police Chief David Ferland said the man was being questioned and the incident was not terrorism-related.

'We do not believe this to be a terrorist event," Ferland said at a late-night news conference during which he refused to answer questions. "We are considering this to be a localized event only."

No details about the passenger were immediately released, and the bus remained parked in downtown Portsmouth being examined by the FBI and a bomb squad. The man could be a foreign national, as agents from the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement were on the scene and there were reports an interpreter was needed to speak to him.

The chief said more information would be released today.

The ordeal began around 11:30 a.m. Thursday when a passenger called 911 to report an explosive device on board, leading police to evacuate buildings watch of a sharpshooter in an armored vehicle. One man remained on board and did not walk out until just before 9 p.m.

#### **NEW YORK Pakistani Taliban: Times Square** bomb attempt a 'brave' act

The Pakistani Taliban on Thursday denied any role in the botched car bombing in Times Square but praised the suspect for a "brave job," as New York authorities pressed him on his claims of terrorist training.

U.S. law enforcement officials traveled to Pakistan to question four alleged members of another militant group, Jaish-e-Mohammad, about possible connections to Faisal Shahzad, who is charged with terrorism and weapons offenses in the failed bombing, which shut down Times Square and unnerved tourists and theatergoers on a busy Saturday night.

Scary headlines kept New York on edge Thursday and law enforcement agencies pounced on anything suspicious. The bomb squad was called out to look at a truck with a strong odor of gasoline that was abandoned on the Robert F. Kennedy Bridge, but nothing dangerous was found inside, and a flight to the Mideast on the same airline that Shahzad boarded before his arrest Monday was called back when a passenger's name was similar to that of someone on

the government's no-fly list.

The 30-year-old Shahzad — an ex-budget analyst who had been living in a low-rent Bridgeport, Conn., apartment since returning from a five-month trip to Pakistan — is in custody and talking to investiga-

a little. The most detailed look yet at the Neanderthal

genome helps answer one of the most debated questions in anthropology: Did Neanderthals and modern humans mate?

The answer is yes, there is at least some cave man biology in most of us. Between 1 percent and 4 percent of genes in people from Europe and Asia trace back to Neanderthals.

'They live on, a little bit," says Svante Paabo of the Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology

in Leipzig, Germany.

Researchers led by Paabo, Richard E. Green of the University of California, Santa Cruz, and David Reich of Harvard Medical School compared the genetic material collected from the bones of three Neanderthals with that from five modern humans.

Their findings, reported in today's edition of the journal Science, show a relationship between Neanderthals and modern people outside Africa, Paabo said.

That suggests that interbreeding occurred in the Middle East, where both modern humans and Neanderthals lived thousands of years ago, he said.

"People are interested in the question: 'By what route did I get here?' And the idea that there is a faint echo of Neanderthals" is interesting, reflected Richard Potts, director of the Human Origins Program at the Smithsonian's National Museum of Natural History.

"I'm really impressed by the nuance they've been able to pick up," said Potts, who was not part of the research group.

Unlike some cities, Gooding's history can be followed just by walking down Main Street.

"Gooding is kind of a timeline; it starts at one end by the railroad tracks with an 1880 building, and goes clear out to the corner of the highways with some of our newest buildings," said Betty McLin Hare, director of the Gooding County Historical Society Museum & Research Center.

One of the buildings on the tour is the current Wilson Bates store.

"On the third floor it used to be a furniture store and a funeral parlor, and upstairs it's still a funeral parlor. I haven't been up there, but I hear it's really cool," Hare said. "The furniture makers, I guess, made the caskets."

And today's Get Inn, a bed and breakfast, used to be where nurses lived in a dormitory setting while they trained for a tuberculosis hospital.

"I hope (attendees) get a fine understanding of what a lot of history Gooding actually has," Hare said. The historical society's new research center, which has not yet opened to the public, will be another venue for this kind of understanding. Hare said the society hopes to make the history walk an annual event, each year focusing on different parts of town.

"This is an excellent opportunity for some of the people in the community to go and look at their historic buildings," Davis said.

For one month a year, the Idaho State Historical Society pulls scientists out of labs and historians away from their archived documents to talk to the public across the state.

This year, the month is focused on celebrating the state Capitol, on which 12 years of renovations were completed this January. Taking the eopening of this "historic gem" as inspiration, the Historical Society is asking cities across the state to find their own gems of history in the cities and in the wilds, and show them off for their

residents. "The biggest thing for all of these events is that we just want people to be excited about their past, and excited about preserving it," said Mary Anne

Davis, associate state archaeologist for the society.

# Twin Falls electronica band gets audience moving

Classify its music how vou will, but Twin Falls band Alpenflow doesn't need labels to impress its audi-

ences. Alpenflow has Jeffrey Devey on keys, Pierre Tusow on guitar and vocals, Brady Devey on bass, and David Hanchey and Scott Kirkdorffer on drums and percussion. The band depends heavily on synthesizer set-ups, controlled by Hanchey, Brady Devey and Jeffrey Devey, which set their music apart from that of other Twin Falls jam bands. 

If you've never seen an Idaho pictograph, now's your chance.

As the last stop on a onehour hiking tour of Castle Rocks State Park, chief of cultural resources Kristen Bastis will take hikers to a site in the park where faded pictographs painted by indigenous people are still visible on rocks.

"There's a series of zigzag lines, a set of what I think looks like antlers, and then what I think of as a rayed summer sun, like when a kid draws a sun and there are rays coming out of it," Bastis said. Archaeologists don't know when the drawings were made, she said. "Dating is a destructive process and we haven't wanted to scrape any of the paint off to get a date."

The hike will be on level but uneven ground, so good footwear is recommended. Another feature will be tours of Buried Beach and the Shock and Awe cave.

Buried Beach used to be wetter than it is today, and native peoples about 6,000 vears ago used it as a resting place. "We'll talk about the environment that may have been present 6,000 years ago," Bastis said.

The cave sits below a climbing route named Shock and Awe when it was first descended around the time of the Persian Gulf War. Used by native people around 400 A.D. - not the same people who used Buried Beach — it is a rocky space that wasn't used as a permanent encampment, Bastis said. "We can go into the rock shelter, and think about how many people could have fit inside there and why that spot was

Bastis is fairly new to Castle Rocks park, Davis said, and the park is a perfect place for her because of all the human history that archaeologists know happened there. "She is really interested in reaching out to the community and sharing information that locked up in books," Davis

In the 1960s and '70s, excavations were conducted in Owl Cave, west of Idaho Falls, that linked the site to Pleistocene-era humans hunting nowextinct animals like mammoths. But the data were never published, and the cave fell away from scientists' attention.

"Owl Cave is one of our older sites in Idaho, and they're starting to re-evaluate and look at the collections from excavations that went on there in the late '60s," Davis said.

Recently, according to a colleague of the presenter, Suzann Henrikson has been able to show that seven fluted points — like arrowheads – found at the lower level of the cave were used to hunt.

They show evidence of "catastrophic impact," and two of the fragments tested positive for a reaction to horse and elephant antiserum. Scientists don't know precisely when mammoths became extinct, but prove that humans overlapped them in time in the region. Idaho is the only


n case you missed the Hallmark commercials, Sunday is Mother's Day. And the perfect gift to go with that perfect card is a book - which entitles her to take the day and delve right in. What could be better than that?

I have had the pleasure of reading some amazing stories this winter; here are two of my favorites:

"The Postmistress" (Putnam, \$25.95) by Sarah

Blake. "What happens to a story around its edges? Will had asked. What hap-



pens next? What happens?" What happens to those stories is the story that protagonist Frankie Bard tells in this insightful, compelling and masterful novel set in Europe and the U.S. during the early days of World War

Blake's deft writing vividly brings alive three compelling women. There is Frankie, a radio journalist, broadcasting during the London Blitz with Edward R. Murrow; Iris James, a nononsense 40-year-old postmistress, softly trying to find her place among the entrenched locals of Cape Cod; and Emma Fitch, the fragile new wife of the town's young doctor. Their lives intertwine as the war in Europe ominously spreads.

But it is Frankie's stories that pull the reader in. The summer of 1941 finds her on a life-changing assignment, revealing to her the true faces of war. She rides the trains south through Europe, capturing the voices and stories of Jewish refugees trying to escape. Toting a new-fangled recording device, she gathers dozens of 'snapshots': a young mother accompanying her son as far as the border, then sending him off on his own; an Austrian engineer, unable to come to grips with what is happening; families traveling with no food, no water, no belongings. Periodically, she transmits the stories to America, but always wonders if anyone is listening, if anyone understands, if anyone at home cares.

Then decades later at a dinner party, she asks another question: "What would you think of a postmistress who chose not to deliver the mail?"

The answer forms a beautifully wrought and totally unforgettable book.

"The Earth Hums in B Flat" (Canongate, \$14.00) by

Mari Strachan. I was intrigued from the moment I read the

title. This debut novel from Strachan, a life-long librarian from Ceredigion, Wales, is magical, lyrical and deeply human. Twelve-year-old Gwenni Morgan, described by some in her village as an incorrigible and curious free spirit, is struggling to make sense of the world and her place in it. That she flies in her dreams each night only makes her story more com-



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



# **Hall of Fame pitcher** Robin Roberts dies at 83

PHILADELPHIA — Long before pitch counts, setup men and closers, Robin Roberts usually finished what he started.

Roberts, the tireless Hall of Fame pitcher who led the Philadelphia Phillies to the 1950 National League pennant as part of the famed "Whiz Kids," died Thursday. He was 83.

Roberts died at his Temple Terrace, Fla., home of natural causes, the Phillies said, citing son Jim. "He was a boyhood hero of mine," team president

David Montgomery said. "Then I had a chance to meet him personally. I remember pinching myself knowing I was talking to Robin Roberts. His career and stats speak for themselves. But first and foremost he was a friend and we'll miss him badly.

The right-hander was the most productive pitcher in the National League in the first half of the 1950s, topping the league in wins from 1952 to 1955, innings pitched from '51 to '55 and complete games

He won 286 games and put together six consecutive 20-win seasons. Roberts had 45 career shutouts, 2,357 strikeouts and a lifetime ERA of 3.41. He pitched 305 complete games, but also gave up more home runs than any other major league pitcher. Phillies pitcher Jamie Moyer is on the verge of breaking that mark. The 47-year-old Moyer has given up 498 homers, seven fewer than Roberts.

# Raiders release former No. 1 pick Russell

ALAMEDA, Calif. – Three years, more than \$39 million and only seven wins as the starting quarterback for the Oakland Raiders.

The verdict is in on JaMarcus Russell's career in Oakland and he just might be the NFL's biggest draft bust.

The Raiders released Russell on Thursday, just three years after making him the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft.

The decision came less than two weeks after Oakland acquired Jason Campbell from Washington to take over at quarterback. It signifies that owner Al Davis finally lost patience with the immensely talented but unproductive player he drafted in 2007 against the wishes of former coach Lane Kiffin.


"We wish him well," senior executive John Herrera told The Associated Press.

Russell will now be considered one of the biggest busts in NFL draft history, joining the likes of Ryan Leaf, Ki-Jana Carter, Akili Smith, Tony Mandarich, Charles Rogers, Heath Shuler and Blair Thomas on that list.

# **UK exit polls: Tories win** most seats, not majority

**By Paisley Dodds and Danica Kirka** Associated Press writers

LONDON David Cameron's rejuvenated Conservatives captured far more seats than Prime Minister Gordon Brown's battered Labour Party but failed to win an absolute majority Thursday in Britain's national election, according to television projections.

The exit polls did not bode well for Brown, Britain's prime minister since 2007. and triggered uncertainty over who will form the next government. The country's top three parties - the Conservatives, Labour and the Liberal Democrats immediately began jockeying to form alliances.

An analysis by Britain's main television stations suggested the Conservatives will win 305 of the 650 House of Commons seats, short of the 326 seats needed for a majority. Labour was seen winning 255 seats and the Liberal Democrats 61, far less than had been expected after their support surged during the campaign.

Sometimes imagination is called for when your contract seem hopeless. Some positions are difficult unless you have seen them before, so maybe reading about this one will help you make an apparently impossible hand in the future.

Cover up the East and West hands before reading on.

You, South, reach four spades after electing to open one spade. (A strong no-trump is a viable alternative despite the small doubleton heart.) You don't expect to have any problems making your game, since your partner responded two no-trump to your opening spade bid, showing a game-forcing hand with primary spade support.

West leads a club, which you win in hand. However, when you play a spade toward dummy, West shows out, discarding the club two. It now looks as if you are going to lose one trick in each suit. Can you think of any way to avoid

Would you be surprised if I told you that, assuming clubs to be 5-2 (which West's discard has strongly suggested), all you need is for East to hold the heart ace?

Win the spade ace and duck a diamond, the idea being to cut the defenders' communications. Say East wins and plays another club, which is as good a defense as any. You win and play a heart. East wins and continues with, say, another heart. You win, cash your red-suit winners, and play king and another spade. East must win and give you a ruff and discard.



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

# TODAY IN HISTORY

#### On this date:

In 1789, the first inaugural ball was held in New York in honor of President George Washington and his wife, Martha.

In 1833, composer Johannes Brahms was born in Hamburg, Germany.

In 1840, composer Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky was born in Votkinsk, Russia.

In 1915, nearly 1,200 people died when a German torpedo sank the British liner RMS Lusitania off the Irish coast.

In 1954, the 55-day Battle of Dien Bien Phu in Vietnam ended with Vietnamese insurgents overrunning French forces.

In 1960, Soviet leader Khrushchev Nikita announced that the pilot of an American U-2 plane shot down over Sverdlovsk had been captured alive along with proof the aircraft had been on a spying mission. Leonid Brezhnev replaced Marshal Kliment Voroshilov president of the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet.

In 1963, the United States launched the Telstar 2 communications satellite.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford formally declared an end to the "Vietnam era." In Ho Chi Minh City - formerly Saigon - the Viet Cong celebrated its takeover.

In 1977, Seattle Slew won the Kentucky Derby, the first of his Triple Crown victories. (On this date in 2002, Seattle Slew died.)

In 1984, a \$180 million out-of-court settlement was announced in the Agent Orange class-action suit brought by Vietnam veterans who charged they'd suffered injury from exposure to the defoliant.

Ten years ago: A second fire was set to contain an earlier blaze that was begun to clear brush on the Bandelier National Monument in New Mexico; the second fire blew out of control, destroying more than 200 homes and damaging part of the Los Alamos National Laboratory before it was controlled. President Vladimir Putin took the oath of office in Russia's first democratic transfer of power. Actor-producerauthor Douglas Fairbanks Ir.

died in New York at age 90. Five years ago: During a visit to Riga, Latvia, President George W. Bush said the United States had played a role in Europe's painful division after World War II — a decision that Bush said helped cause "one of the greatest wrongs of history" when the Soviet Union imposed its harsh rule across Central and Eastern Europe. Giacomo, a 50-1 long shot, won the Kentucky Derby. Former congressman Peter W. Rodino Jr., who'd led the House impeachment investigation of President Richard Nixon, died in West Orange, N.J. at age 95.

One year ago: A federal jury in Paducah, Ky. convicted a former soldier, Steven Dale Green, of raping and fatally shooting a 14-year-old girl after killing her parents and younger sister while he was serving in Iraq. (Green was sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole.) Former Illinois police Sgt. Drew Peterson was indicted for murder in the death of his third wife, Kathleen Savio. Mickey Carroll, one of the last surviving Munchkins from the 1939 film "The Wizard of Oz," died in Crestwood, Mo. at age 89.
