Local women start new lives with Jubilee House graduation

Christina Parks' parents weren't happy when she was born; they wanted a boy.

As she grew, they told her what a

disappointment she was to them. "I tried to be the boy they wanted." she said, but no matter how hard she

tried, she couldn't please them. Feeling alone, she started smoking marijuana at age 10. That led to harder drugs, and eventually prison.

But that was another life. She's a different person today, 28year-old Parks says, thanks to Jubilee

On Thursday, Parks and two other women graduated from a 12-monthlong. Christian-based rehabilitation program at the Twin Falls facility.

Robbie Knievel, the son of daredevil Evel Knievel who has followed in his late vate meeting organized with

tentatively take place on the Fourth of July weekend in 2011, according to Knievel spokesman Lowe.

It would come about three years shy of the 40th anniversary of Evel Knievel's failed 1974 attempt to jump the canyon on what was basically a large rocket.

BURLEY - A new substance marketed as herbal incense in the Magic Vallev is being smoked by people seeking a legal marijuanalike high, an area lawenforcement official says.

Renz said the substance, commonly known by brand names such as "Spice" or

WENDELL - While the Wendell City Council acknowledged the need to install a new lift station in its sewer system, the \$50,000 it would cost is money that Wendell just doesn't have, council members said.

Public Works Director Bob Bailey recommended replacing the pump system in the Lewiston Street lift station because of breakdowns and ongoing costs to maintain and repair it.

"The money just isn't in the budget. Right now there is a new pump and check valve working but it gets fixed a lot," he said. "With the straw and other materials, rags and towels (in the sewer system), it just creates an environment where the valves can't close all the way."

When the lift station fails, a flashing red light alerts the city; Councilman Barry Brown lives across from the lift station and, being aware of the issue, keeps watch for the light.

"I do call ... several times," Brown said, adding that within an

hour an on-duty public works employee arrives to fix the problem.

Nine Months Later covers cost of crib recall

After the U.S. Consumer Protection Safety Commission announced the recall of Simplicity's fullsized cribs on April 29, Twin Falls' retailer Nine Months Later followed procedure by posting the information in the store.

The store also informed customers after CPSC reported that a 1-year-old child from Massachusetts suffocated after becoming trapped between the crib mattress and frame in

According to a release from CPSC, the agency was aware of 13 other incidents caused by the tubular metal mattress-support frame bending or detaching from the crib structure.

"Usually, when there is a recall, the manufacturer will send parts to repair the issue or handle refunds or product returns related to the recall," said store owner Conni Walker.

While recalls are common, retailers picking up the costs are a rarity.

"Our number one priority is child safety," Walker said. "Our cost is a few thousand dollars, but it is the right thing to do."

She said the store sold about nine cribs involved in the recall.

The cribs, manufactured in China, were also sold through larger retailers and priced between \$150 to \$300. Nine Months Later is allowing its customers to apply the purchase price for the cribs they bought toward the purchase of a new crib.

"It was scary," said customer Brooklyn Reese. "I was upset because my four-month-old son used the crib."

Reese didn't want to think about the possibility of her own child being harmed and although her Simplicity crib wasn't causing any trouble she



Legislature damaged schools, public services

n opinion written by Reps. Stevenson and Bell claimed that cuts in Idaho's budget were brought on by difficult economic times. The reality is, however, the meat-ax budget cuts were as much a political calculation as a result of the hard economic times.

One of the most critical decisions by the Idaho House was that there would be no attempt to find revenue sources to ease drastic cuts upon the education system and other government branches. This in spite of the fact that opportunities were evident to collect additional revenue which would have had virtually no impact on the state's economic recovery, wouldn't have imposed new taxes on the average citizen, and would have been virtually unnoticeable by the man on the street.

It's estimated Idaho could have collected over \$100 million more by collecting taxes already due, or delaying tax cuts put into the

budget during better times. Among revenues available for collection were \$60 million from an approximate \$250 million owed the state in back taxes, but not collected. An estimated \$30 million could have been collected of \$84 million owed by participating in a interstate Consortium established to collect sales tax on Internet transactions. An additional \$10 million could have been saved by delaying tax cuts targeted for the benefit of insurance compa-

If the entire \$100 million was collected, it wouldn't have eliminated budget cuts for education and state agencies. However the level of cuts would have been less severe and therefore more easily absorbed by the economy, by continuing to pro-

vide modest levels of service in every county. But the suggestions mentioned for raising legitimate, vital revenue were dismissed out of hand. with the exception of a token amount of money committed for auditors to collect a portion of unpaid taxes.

Why the House, staffed by Ms. Bell and Mr. Stevenson, would refuse to pursue funds owed to the taxpayers, is unknown. One possibility is an economic calculation to attract out-of-state companies looking for low energy costs, low taxes and yes, low wages.

Another possibility is that House members have little respect for the educational institutions and state agencies they oversee, and considered the climate an opportunity to slice budgets and subsequently spill "crocodile tears." Finally, the possibility exists that the elected Idaho House leadership decided there would be no attempt to increase revenues and members of the House meekly submitted to their demand in spite of

future consequences.

Regardless of the rationale, there's little reason to hold one's breath and believe that future legislative sessions will reverse the internal damage to our schools and other vital branches of state government. If you agree, then it's time to change the legislator allegedly representing your values. My name is Scott McClure and I'm running for Idaho House Seat 26A against incumbent Bert Stevenson. If you think the legislature made wrongheaded decisions about Idaho's educational future, I would appreciate your vote in November.














Real loser in the British election is the economy

ONDON — The stock markets are slumping. Athens is in flames. The vultures of the bond market are circling. And what does one of the most heavily indebted of the major industrial economies vote for? Stalemate, dither and indecision.

The British general election has left the country in a worse position than ever. Even without the final results, it's clear David Cameron's Conservative Party has fallen short of the majority it needs to govern effectively.

Whether Prime Minister Gordon Brown manages to hang on in a coalition with the Liberal Democrats, or whether Cameron forms a minority administration,

doesn't make much difference.

This was a phony election, fought between leaders who could only squabble over who could dig their head deepest into the sand. The real election, in which Britain faces up honestly to its problems, is still some way off.

Not until the markets force reality on the British will any clear policies emerge.

But the real loser is the British economy. The election was fought against a backdrop of a financial crisis. The markets have been thrown into turmoil by the Greek debt crisis — not because Greece is a significant part of the global economy, and not because its \$382 billion of government debt is enough to bring down the financial system even if the country does default. But because Greece is a symbol of a wider sovereign-debt crisis. Governments everywhere have borrowed too much, with little idea of how they will close their budget gaps.

At more than 11 percent of gross domestic product, the British deficit is the largest in the Group of Seven nations. If any country should have been voting for a strong government it was this one. But the government that emerges from this election isn't going

to be in a position to fix anything. A deal between the Labour Party and the Liberal Democrats would be an alliance between losers. It would be propping up an unelected prime minister. The idea that Britain should spend a year arguing about different systems for electing their politicians is absurd. They might as well spend a year discussing whether Dickens was a better writer than Shakespeare.

The alternative is for Cameron to govern alone. There is no need for him to form a coalition: The Liberal Democrats didn't do well enough to merit a share of the government; and his party won't be in the mood to make concessions when it doesn't have to.

If Cameron does govern alone, he won't be able to do anything. He ran on a timid manifesto that didn't lay out the stark choices facing Britain. Cameron's minority administration won't have the strength to make many difficult decisions. Nor will it have the mandate to stand up to the opposition those deci-

sions would provoke.
Stalemate won't work for
Britain. At some point, the
country will have to tackle its

addiction to debt. It has just postponed the day of reckoning at the cost of making it more painful when it arrives.



Many cats carry bacteria that causes cat-scratch fever

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been diagnosed with catscratch fever. Could you explain the disease and its side effects? How long will it last, and what treatment is available?

DEAR READER: Catscratch disease (CSD) is the result of a bacterial infection known as Bartonella henselae. Surprisingly, about 40 percent of all cats



carry the bacteria in their saliva at some point in their lives, with kittens being more likely to be infected than adult cats; however,

neither commonly show any signs of illness. Most people contract

CSD through bites and scratches; however, it is also possible to contract it by petting an infected feline and then rubbing your eyes.

Symptoms include fever, nausea, chills, headache, poor appetite, fatigue. vomiting and inflammation of the lymph nodes. People with a compro-

mised immune system such as HIV/AIDS, organ-transplant patients and those receiving chemotherapy are at greater risk of developing abnormal blood-vessel growths that resemble tumors after becoming infected. These masses can cause severe organ inflammation and lead to a host of

other issues. In the healthy person, however, CSD should resolve on its own without treatment. If lymph-node involvement remains, a patient might require prescription antibiotics for up to a month.

The key is to have your physician make a correct diagnosis, receive antibiotics if appropriate, and take precautions at home by preventing all cats from licking a scratch or open wound on your body; avoiding rough play that might induce the cat to scratch; and washing your hands after playing with the animal. By all means, enjoy your cat, but take precautions to ensure your good health.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 54-year-old male. I've had ED problems for about 10 years, resolved through the use of Viagra. But why? I do have low testosterone levels, for which I take injections, but for the most part I am healthy, fit, not overweight, a nonsmoker, a nonalcoholic-beverage drinker and, per my physician, do not suffer from any other cardiovascular problems. So why do I have blood-flow problems in this one department?

DEAR READER: Erectile dysfunction (ED) affects almost 30 million American men. Almost every man will experience difficulty achieving and maintaining an erection at some stage of his life. This is normal when the instances are infrequent.

Testosterone levels decline after about the age of 40. Low testosterone is identified as less than 300 nanograms per deciliter of blood. Symptoms, as I am sure you are aware, include ED, reduced libido, fatigue and mood swings, much the same as women going through menopause.

Testosterone replacement to bring deficient levels to within normal range can be accomplished through a skin gel, skin patch, oral tablets or injection.

The causes for impotence fall into three broad categories - an inadequate flow

of blood, a nervous system dysfunction and hormonal abnormalities. Medical conditions that may contribute to the condition include arteriosclerosis in the lower portion of the body, prostate cancer, stress, anxiety, depression, diabetes, hypertension, liver disease, alcoholism and kidney failure. A great number of medications also have impotence as a side effect. Our bodies change as we age, and what was taken successfully in the past might not be so successful today.

Treatment options are varied. If you suspect a medication might be to blame, speak with your physician to determine if he or she will allow a trial period without the drug. There are a number of prescription medications available to enhance sexual performance or to combat impotence, including mechanical devices, such as vacuum pumps, and penile implants. Another important consideration is counseling for both you and your partner. If all physiological possibilities have been ruled out, you might consider seeing a sex therapist, psychiatrist or psychologist. You may have a degree of stress in your life you are unaware of, and certainly the perception of failure is a possibility. Sometimes just speaking with your partner or a thirdparty therapist will help

alleviate issues and solve the problem. Make another appointment with your primarycare physician. If you haven't had complete blood work performed recently, ask about scheduling it. Get your blood pressure checked and a complete examination. Give a therapist a try. Once you identify the possible source for the impotence, the faster you can get on with your life in a way you will approve of.

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Vessel lowers vault onto ruptured well

ON THE GULF OF MEXI-CO (AP) - A BP-chartered vessel lowered a 100-ton concrete-and-steel vault onto a ruptured well in the Gulf of Mexico on Friday, an important step in a delicate and unprecedented attempt to stop most of the gushing crude fouling the sea.

Underwater robots guided the 40-foot-tall box into place. Now that the contraption is on the seafloor, workers will need at least 12 hours to let it settle and make sure it's stable before the robots can hook up a pipe and hose that will funnel the oil up to a tanker.

Churches' outreach extends to the links

RESNO, Calif. — Churches and faith groups are connecting with the public through sport.

In some areas, golf ministries are giving people a way to have fun and build fellowship while learning more about churches and faith-based organizations.

"Just about anyone can play golf," says Dennis Hammond, president of the Christian Golf Club of Central California. The club holds monthly tournaments to help raise money for faith-based organizations. This year, proceeds are going to the Evangel Home, a Christian organization helping women and

"You don't have to be a gifted athlete to play golf," Hammond says. "All ages play, youngsters to grandparents in their 90s. You don't have to be a good player to

Faith leaders say golf ministries create opportunities for people to better understand what they do. It sometimes translates into new members, volunteers and donations. But they say they are mainly interested in helping people.

In the spring and summer months, when the weather is best for golf, ministry events are presented in California's Central Valley nearly every day.

On a recent Thursday, for example, Fresno/Madera Youth for Christ held its annual golf tournament - 110 golfers played through an afternoon drizzle at Fort Washington Country Club.

After play ended, everyone gathered in the club's banquet room, where Youth for Christ's executive director, Ed Kaczmarek, gave a presentation on how the

faith-based organization helps needy kids and how donors can help.

"Golf reaches those who are business owners and community leaders - and it's a great group to reach," Kaczmarek says. "There's good camaraderie, good fellowship on the golf course.

"When you have a good day of golf, it lifts up your organization. There's a levity that brings warm fuzzies around your organization."

Clovis Hills Community Church presents a Twilight Golf League ministry. The ministry is designed for men and women - church members and nonmembers — to get to know each other outside of church.

"We know church can be intimidating for people who have never gone," says a Clovis Hills associate pastor, the Rev. Dave Love. "So many people have gone to church and had a bad experience. So we just try to lessen the stereotype that people tend to have."

The ministry's organizer, Rod Gleghorn, says he always tries to share his faith and tell others how they can get involved in church ministries.

"If you just go on Sundays, you just sit in the pews and don't get to know others," he says.

Richard Lee, who plays in the Clovis Hills league with his wife, Mickey, says he tries to listen on the course, hoping to zero in on people's needs. The Lees coordinate the church's Crown financial ministry, which trains people to apply biblical principles in money management.

"When you have a ministry, golf is another avenue for how you can meet other people," he says. "It is an outlet that is safe for everybody.

"You ask, 'What can we do to help you out?' You can't do that if you don't meet people."

"People need various avenues to come to church, and we just want to be an example to them," says Steve Melnyk, director of the recreational ministries for NorthPointe Community Church in northwest Fresno. "Whatever door they can come through, we just want to provide that opening."

Melnyk says creativity counts, but so does faith. He says, "I think God leads stuff, and we just follow."

Graham prays at Pentagon, says Islam got a pass

WASHINGTON - Evangelist Franklin Graham prayed on a sidewalk outside the Pentagon Thursday after his invitation to a prayer service inside was withdrawn because of comments that insulted Muslims.

"It looks like Islam has gotten a pass," he told reporters. "They are able to have their services, but just because I disagree ... I'm excluded."

In 2001, Graham, the son of famed evangelist Billy Graham, described Islam as evil. More recently, he said he finds Islam offensive and wants Muslims to know that Jesus Christ died for their sins. The Pentagon's chaplain office called those comments inappropriate and, at the request of the Army, withdrew Graham's invitation to attend a multidenominational "National Day of Prayer" service that was held in the Defense Department auditorium.

He came anyway, arriving in the Pentagon parking lot just before 8 a.m. - his party of a half dozen people forming a circle on the sidewalk and praying.

They stood there for about five minutes, heads bowed, as people arriving for work passed by -a man with a briefcase, one on a bike, a woman carrying breakfast pastry in a bag and another man carrying a skate-

Then the group walked to the Pentagon's Sept. 11 memorial roughly a couple of hundred feet away, where media had gathered because it's one of the few places where cameras are allowed on the Pentagon property. There, Graham held a news conference that lasted nearly twice as long as the prayer.

Asked why he had come, Graham said it was to pray for the men and women serving at the warfront, including his son, who he said had already been wounded in Iraq and now serves in Afghanistan.

He said he doesn't believe "all religions are equal" and that there is only "one way to God" - and that is through Jesus.

Asked if he still believes Islam is evil, he said: "I believe the way they treat women is evil, yes I do." And, can he understand how some of his comments would be offensive to Muslims? "Oh, I'm sure," he said. "But I find what they teach and what they preach and what's on the Internet - I find that to be offensive, too."

Another moment in the news conference, he said people shouldn't be offended because it's simply a disagreement in what people believe.

Graham said many American Christians "feel we are losing our freedoms while people of other faiths are gaining their freedom. It's a perception, whether it's right or wrong."

While Graham spoke outside, some 80 people attended a service inside the Pentagon that included Roman Catholic, Jewish, Muslim and Protestant chaplains.

Mother's Day out of control

Anna Jarvis is universally credited with coming up with the idea for an American Mother's Day in 1908. What isn't as widely remembered is that nine years after the first official Mother's Day in this country, Anna Jarvis became the nation's most publicly outspoken opponent of - what else? -Mother's Day.

This is roughly akin to Santa dissing Christmas, or Punxsutawney Phil being a conscientious objector to Groundhog Day. This is Henry Ford urging the automobubbling public to park their Model T's, or Wilbur and Orville Wright coming back from Kitty Hawk and saying, "Never mind. They'll just start charging people extra to check their luggage."

By all accounts (i.e., Wikipedia), Jarvis led a sixyear campaign that eventually led to President Woodrow Wilson making Mother's Day an official national holiday in 1914. Her concept was a day to honor mothers in general — and her own mother in particular – in quiet, intimate and

deeply personal ways. Within a few years, however, the commercialization of Mother's Day soured Jarvis on the whole idea. She hated Mother's Day greeting cards, which she felt were



the lazy person's way out of writing a personal, heartfelt letter. She protested literally — the growing influence of florists and jewelers on the holiday. In 1948, the same year that she died, records show that she was actually arrested while protesting against Mother's Day commercialization.

It was as if the Easter Bunny had been jailed for protesting the coloring of Easter eggs.

Jarvis' fight against Mother's Day lasted four times longer than her fight to make it a national holiday and consumed whatever fortune she had accumulated in life. To her dving day. she is reported to have said that she regretted the creation of Mother's Day because "it became so out of control."

I know. In an era that features "Bad Girls Club," "Desperate Housewives" and "Girls Gone Wild," it is difficult to put the words "Mother's Day celebration" and "out of control" in the same sentence. But let's just assume for a second that Jarvis was on to something. Let's assume that the estimated \$2.6 billion Americans will spend this year on Mother's Day flowers and the \$1.53 billion they will spend on other miscellaneous Mother's Day gifts and the \$68 million they will spend on greeting cards is well – you know – out of control.

Is there a better, more under-control way to honor mothers on Mother's Day?

A few months after my mother died, I spent a few evenings with my father sorting through some of Mom's things. It had taken him that long to reach the point where he felt he was ready to face the feelings and emotions that surely would come. We smiled a lot and we both shed a few tears as we made our way through a box of precious things that Mom, for one reason or another, had decided to

hang on to. Among the keepsakes and souvenirs within that box were a dozen or so Mother's Day cards from her children and grandchildren. Keep in mind that Mom had eight children and 54 grandchildren – she had received hundreds of Mother's Day cards through the years. But for some reason, she chose to save these particular

After examining them, it became clear why they were treasured. It had nothing to do with the design or intrin-

sic value of the card itself. In every case there was a hand-written message sometimes in childish scrawl, sometimes in careful adult script - that expressed profound feelings. There were no cards that just said, "Love, Kathy" or "Love ya, Mom!" or even "Happy Mother's Day!" The cards she cherished were cards that explained, in the giver's own hand and words.

why SHE was cherished. So, OK - I'm not fully on board with Anna Jarvis. I'm not saying you shouldn't buy the Mother's Day flowers and gifts. Heaven knows, the economy needs that multi-billion dollar jolt right about now. But don't let your money do your talking for you.

Don't assume the mother you honor will know how you feel by the simple fact of your gift. Tell her, in your own words, why you love her. Your message doesn't have to be long and flowery – it just has to come from your heart. Write it. Speak it. Text it. Pray it. But for heaven's sake, share it.

Those words, expressing those tender emotions, are what makes Mother's Day so sweet.

And not quite so out of control.



The proposed extensions now move to the full chamber as part of a package of relicensing bills.

At the Little Wood River Ranch site, a private hydroelectric project is in the works about six miles west of the city of Shoshone.

Both it and the American Falls Reservoir project, where several modifications to the existing dam are planned, would get a three-year extension to begin construction, once this bill becomes law.

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Martin, if dirt were trumps, what hands you would hold!" — Charles Lamb

In the duplicate game at the Cavendish Club in Manhattan, the following hand produced much discussion. The computer analysis showed that four spades can be made — but the play is especially entertaining.

After West leads two rounds of clubs, declarer can succeed by ruffing, drawing precisely one round of trumps, then crossing to dummy with a diamond and playing on hearts. But imagine declarer takes the more normal line of playing both top trumps as East discards a discouraging heart.

Now declarer plays the diamond queen and a second diamond. If West ruffs in, the defense is over. If he takes his last trump and plays a third club, declarer can ruff, run the diamonds, and take a heart finesse. If West plays back a club immediately, declarer can ruff and lead his third diamond to bring about the same

But there is a defense. West must discard, let's say a heart, on the second diamond. Declarer now takes the heart finesse and cashes the heart ace. If West ruffs in, he can only collect his trump tricks.

So West discards a second time, and South tempts him again by leading a low heart, and West must discard a third time. Declarer ruffs his heart loser in dummy, but when he exits with a top diamond, West can ruff in, cash his spade queen, and lead a club. South ruffs, but must concede trick 13 to East's heart king.

ANSWER: It is not clear that there is a right answer. Both double and an overcall of one spade are sensible, and both might work. But be aware that this hand, while close to a maximum for a one-spade overcall, is certainly not outside the range for the call. Bid one spade, expecting to be able to bid hearts or double for takeout at your next turn, thus showing extras.

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

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
