"That fish is as big as you are, kid," Hatch told Boyer, 12, and her trout, which had to be stored in a garbage sack rather than the freezer bags other Kimberly students used.

Boyer was an old pro with a rod and reel her favorite part? "Gutting the fish," she said with a grin.



"Hey, you guys want to dip your worms in Pepsi?" one boy called out.

Some of the students named their catches: "That's Billy, okay?" one girl told Aaron Bryers, the sixth-grade science teacher helping students store their bagged catches in coolers.

Bryers doesn't expect to return to the lake next year, as Kimberly has completely cut out field trips for now. It's a shame, he said, as he thinks the program makes a difference.

jailed again

Filer man fled to Nevada after guilty verdict in sex abuse case; has been held in jail after allegedly assaulting an officer

The day after David Knutsen was found guilty in Twin Falls of sexually abusing a vulnerable adult, he fled Idaho and was arrested in Ely, Nev. following a multistate manhunt, authorities said Wednesday.

Knutsen, 29, a registered sex offender from Filer, was scheduled Wednesday to be arraigned at the Ely Justice Court after he was arrested last Friday on allegations including: assault on a peace officer with

the use of a deadly weapon, resisting a public officer, felon in possession of a firearm, possession of a stolen firearm, and a fugitive warrant issued from Idaho, according to information from the White Pine County Sheriff's Office.



Knutsen

One day before, on May 6, a Twin Falls County jury unanimously convicted Knutsen on four counts of sexual abuse of a vulnerable adult, which are felonies that carry a maximum possible combined sentence of 100 years prison in Idaho.

Last week's conviction stems from allegations from a now 23-year-old woman

Blaine County teachers won't see pay cut

HAILEY - Blaine County School district teachers will again receive raises based on experience and ongoing education, and won't experience pay cuts teachers in other Idaho districts are expecting due to coming cuts to state public education funding.

Blaine County School Board President Julie Dahlgren said Wednesday morning that the district and its teachers agreed on a contract that will set the base salary for first-year teachers at \$38,000 for the second straight year.

The contract will begin in fiscal year 2011, which begins in July.

Teachers with at least one year of experience will receive an automatic raise for completing one more year of teaching, and will receive raises for educational credits they pick up this summer.

Teachers voluntarily agreed not to receive those raises this year due to the poor economy. But the district wanted to reward teachers who improve their experience and education because "that's the only way you get better," Dahlgren said.

Family Health Services plans Kimberly clinic

Wills to leave Kimberly City Council at end of month

KIMBERLY -Family Health Services Corp. plans to bring a new clinic in Kimberly.

FHS spokeswoman Patty Brown told the Kimberly City Council on Tuesday that the private nonprofit, which operates medical and dental clinics across the Magic Valley, has entered the initial stages of planning to bring its services to town.

"This is almost like we are starting a rumor about ourselves because it is not finalized yet," Brown said. "But we wanted to be open with you from the start and let you know what we are bringing to the community."

Brown said FHS, which receives federal grant funding as a federally qualified health center, provides medical, dental and behavioral health services to more than 30,000 clients throughout south-central Idaho. FHS clinics, which accept private, Medicare and Medicaid insurance,

also accept client payment on a sliding scale with discounts based on family size and income as they relate to federal poverty standards.

"It isn't free," Brown said. "We feel people need to be responsible for their health and we never turn people down, but we require responsibility."

Brown asked Kimberly Mayor Dave Overacre for a letter of support for the clinic and thanked the Kimberly community for its support thus far.

"We have had medical services come in over the year," Overacre said. "And the one thing that we have enjoyed hearing was, 'We'll stay."

Brown said FHS will know more specifics about funding and the clinic's location at the start of June. Once the money is provided the clinic has 120 days to open the doors to patients,

Judge weighs restraining order against Bliss lagoon project

JEROME - A 5th District judge will decide by Friday whether to halt work on a new wastewater lagoon system for the town of Bliss.

Judge John Butler heard arguments from attorneys for both sides on whether the lagoon site, outside of city limits, represents a grave enough threat to nearby Gooding County residents to halt its construction through a 14-day temporary restraining order.

The 13 plaintiffs who object to the site southeast of town plan to seek a longer preliminary injunction against the work, their attorney, Paul Arrington, told the judge. The group is also fighting the project on an administrative front, having appealed the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality's approval of the site to the agency's governing board in March.

At stake is a full-fledged wastetreatment system for the town of about

Bliss currently relies on two privately owned, unlined lagoons and a network

of individual septic tanks to store its seeds for human consumption, federal agencies and a hefty amount of stimulus money, would change that.

The city selected land owned by Gooding County Chairman Tom Faulkner over two pieces of federal land that would take too long to acquire, given a deadline for the use of the stimulus funds. Construction started earlier this

To secure a restraining order on the lagoon construction, the neighbors challenging the site must prove that they face immediate, irreparable injury that justifies the judge's intervention.

In the longer term, the county residents allege potential leakage from the liner, even within DEQ standards, will harm area groundwater and the springs many of them use for everything from drinking water to rearing fish. But on Wednesday, Arrington offered what he said is an immediate threat on Bernard Saul, whose home and fields sit as close as 200 feet to the future lagoons.

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Idaho teen sentenced to 7 years for killing dad

CALDWELL – An Idaho teen convicted of shooting and killing his father with a high-powered hunting rifle last year has been ordered to spend at least seven years in the state juvenile corrections system.

Zachary Neagle, 15, was sentenced in 3rd District Court on Wednesday, two months after he pleaded voluntary guilty to manslaughter in the May 2009 slaying of his 32-yearold father, Jason Neagle.

The teenager, shackled at the hands and feet, apologized for his actions.

Neagle, who was 14 at the time of the shooting, said he wished he had thought of alternatives for dealing with his father, whom the teen has accused of repeatedly sexually molesting him.

"I didn't think I was safe at the time," Neagle told 3rd District Judge Bradly Ford.

Jerome Co. can't wait longer for new jail

f we had our druthers, Jerome County would be running a bond issue proposal for a new jail in the May 25 election. But the county commissioners, concerned about raising property taxes in a soft economy, have opted instead for a lease-purchase arrangement. Private investors would supply the capital and build the facility, and Jerome County would lease the jail from the investors, with an option to buy it at the end of the lease.

There are plenty of questions about whether that's the right approach — especially since much of the revenue to meet the lease payments would depend on other counties housing their prisoners

But with the arrival of Hamid Karzai, the mendacity blossomed into absurdi-

The question for the Obama White House is not whether it can grow to appreciate the caped capo who runs Afghanistan. (President Obama can't stand him.) The question is whether Karzai will fall for all the guff they're throwing at him.

Ambassador Karl Eikenberry and Gen. Stanley McChrystal were paraded into the White House press room to pretend as though their dispute about the efficacy of the surge, given Karzai's serious flaws as a partner, has been put to rest. (It hasn't.)

The administration crooned a reassuring lullaby to the colicky Karzai: that it has a long-term commitment in Afghanistan (it doesn't) and an endgame there (it doesn't) and that it knows that the upcoming Kandahar offensive will work (it doesn't).

Asked by a reporter about the change from sticks to carrots, Richard Holbrooke, the special envoy to Afghanistan and Pakistan who has had contentious sessions with Karzai, replied: "No, I certainly don't think it's changed." (It has.)

For their part, the Afghans promise to work on stemming corruption and stopping the poppy trade. (They won't.)



The administration is trying to delay the inconvenient truth that Karzai wants reconciliation with Taliban leaders; this makes the U.S. cringe, thinking of Mullah Omar and other 9/11 killers.

Like a lover who has learned from bitter experience that his fickle mistress responds better to sweets than rants, the administration has abruptly switched from nagging the corrupt Afghan president to nuzzling him.

Today, Karzai is slated to get a special treat - a long, intimate walk in a Georgetown garden with Hillary Clinton — the one person in the administration who prides herself on getting along with him. Romantic strolls through gardens, the administration has decided, are the best way to move the corrupt coxcomb to its point of view.

Last October, when Karzai was trying to purloin the election with a million illegal votes, John Kerry persuaded him to agree to a runoff by taking a long walk through rosebushes and the presidential

mosque on the palace grounds in Kabul.

Both Kerry and Hillary bonded with Karzai by confiding how they, too, had felt very wounded by a bruising election experience. "Sometimes there are tough things," Kerry told the Afghan leader. Yeah, like if you had to steal an election twice.

The Taliban in Pakistan is training jihadis to attack New York, belying again W's chuckleheaded contention that we have to wage war against terrorists abroad so we don't have to face them at home. Our battles meant to diminish enemies replenish them. The inept Times Square bomber was infuriated by U.S. drone attacks in Pakistan.

"The insurgents' tactic of re-infiltrating the cleared areas to perform executions has played a role in dissuading locals from siding with the Afghan government, which has complicated efforts to introduce effective governance."



He assures us that having paid \$100,000 of taxpayer money to Rocky Mountain Corrections, in their review of the money issues, that "This does not mean that future costs will not require a tax increase." Future costs? What happened to 'will not raise taxes"?

The jail payments are based on what we already spend and the commissioners' "plan" (that doesn't include a business plan, fixed financing, blueprint, etc.) that relies and depends the budget will sustain the

The Times-News story on district courts revealed that Twin Falls spent only \$149,000 to hold inmates elsewhere in 2009. Hey, banker/taxpayer, I want to build a house and I need a few million bucks but I don't know where I'll put it, I don't have a blueprint for it, I'm not sure if I can make the monthly payments but trust me, if I can't hack it, I'll just get another bunch of cash from you to make good.

The only truth in Howell's letter is when he states, "Everyone agrees we need a new jail." I am more than willing to have my taxes raised to build one but I want to see blueprints, costs of the land, costs for the construction and how much it's going to cost me as is done with school bond proposals. We don't build roads without adequate funding or knowing what it will cost in total so why speculate with a \$30 million debt on Jerome taxpayers? A lease, especially the way this proposal has been done, isn't going to do that without some future, unknown and probably unaffordable tax increase. Vote no May 25 and let's do a bond in November.





mountains, according to police records released late Wednesday.

The injuries resulted from the stepfather, Nathanael Sloop, "engaging in a systematic and progressively more violent pattern of abuse toward Ethan," detectives wrote in interview summaries. The documents say Sloop was angry with the child and "tried everything" to discipline him: however, they don't say why the boy was being disciplined.

Sloop, 31, acknowledged hitting the boy, which caused his face to swell, and leaving him in a locked bedroom May 6 while the couple went to get married in Farmington, about 10 miles away, according to the probable cause statements used to support arrest warrants and detention in jail.

Sloop and the boy's mother, Stephanie Sloop, 27, feared his injuries would alert authorities if they took him along to the courthouse wedding, the documents state.

"This pattern of behavior and abuse was done in a manner that was recklessly indifferent to the child's welfare," police wrote.

Stephanie Sloop told police she did not seek medical help for Ethan because she was afraid Nathanael Sloop "would harm her," Detective Brooke Plotnick wrote.

The couple told police they found Ethan dead in his bed Sunday morning, and that Nathanael Sloop buried him later that day.

Stephanie Sloop told investigators she bought two cans of lighter fluid for Nathanael Sloop to burn the body before it was buried. The reports didn't say whether that was actually



Oklahoma braces for more storms days after twisters

SEMINOLE, Okla. -Residents in the southern deadly tornado outbreak that forecasters had warned about more storms.



Fishing fun for young anglers

Question: My daughter and I just returned from a great day of fishing with Fish and Game personnel and the "Take me Fishing" trailer. This was a fantastic opportunity for her to learn the basics of fishing and how to care for her catch. Do you know if there will be any more opportunities like that in the future?

Answer: Thank you for the compliment. The staff and volunteers also have a great time. There's nothing quite like watching the children's faces as they reel in their first fish. There will be a number of "Take me Fishing" opportunities throughout the summer.

The "Take me Fishing" program is part of the "Be Outside" campaign to connect children with nature from backyards to Idaho's mountain tops. About 1,500 Magic Valley children have participated in "Take me Fishing" clinics around the region. All fishing equipment is provided and no fishing license is required during the clinics.

Eleven more fishing days are planned for the fishing trailer between May and August. The trailer will be scattered from the Filer kid's pond to Dierkes Lake, Gaver's Lagoon and Empire Pond. For more information, go to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game website.

Several children across the valley may also have been part of a different program called "Trout in the Classroom." This program helps students learn about trout biology, fish anatomy and aquaculture.

Glacier park turns 100, but age has not been kind

GLACIER NATIONAL PARK, Mont. - Age has not been kind to Glacier National Park.

The gorgeous million-acre park in northwestern Montana celebrated its 100th birthday on Tuesday. But many of its glaciers have melted, and scientists predict the rest may not last another decade.

The forests are drier and disease-ridden, leading to bigger wildfires. Climate change is forcing animals that feed off plants to adapt.

Many experts consider Glacier Park a harbinger of Earth's future, a laboratory where changes in the environment will likely show up first. "What national parks all give

us is, in effect, a controlled landscape where we can see the natuwork," said Steve Running, a University of Montana professor and co-recipient of the Nobel Prize in 2007 for his work on climate change.

Average temperatures have risen in the park 1.8 times faster than the global average, said Dan Fagre, a U.S. Geological Survey scientist.

The change is visible to the naked eye, with the vast moraines left behind as the giant

Outdoors just for kids: Tread lightly where trout spawn

It's getting to be the time of you wade a trout stream. Keep your eyes open and take a minute to scan the gravel before you wade through mer areas. shallow riffles.

Spring-spawning trout like rainbows and cutthroats are starting to deposit their

In preparation for the spawn, female trout sort of swim on their sides and use flips of their tail to kick up the gravel on the streambed. They are dislodging weeds, rotting leaves and dirt from their spawning areas.

This action tends to clean the gravel, leaving it gleaming bright while other nearby areas are more of a dirtycolor or have algae on them. in the years to come.

out these clean gravel spots with ease. They almost glow.

The females then deposit year to step carefully when eggs in these spawning areas, called redds. Males move in and fertilize the eggs. Then the fish go back to their sum-

> Studies have shown that fishermen walking through these spawning areas will crush eggs and kill justhatched trout. Trout spawning efforts can be hurt dramatically if enough fishermen's boots wade through these redds.

> So the best advice is to pay attention as you wade a stream and steer clear of these areas of bright, shiny gravel. Leave the eggs and just-hatched trout alone and they'll provide you with a steady stream of good fishing

considered the most Earth-like planet: Its day is less than an hour longer than Earth's, and its axial tilt is within two degrees of Earth's. For this latter reason, it also sports polar ice caps.

In May 2008 the Phoenix robotic probe landed at a Martian latitude comparable to northern Alaska, where it detected ice just below the surface. The mission ended six months later when the sun got too low to power Phoenix's solar panels. The probe might subsequently have been buried by the advancing ice cap with the onset of Martian northern hemisphere winter.

Unlike Earth, Mars's poles are cold enough to contain both water ice and a veneer of carbon dioxide (dry) ice. Mars's thin atmosphere has too little pressure to allow either liquid water or liquid CO2 to exist, so the ices at its poles go directly into the vapor state from ice caps' surfaces — and back again seasonally.

Because Mars' orbit is less circular than Earth's, its the College of Southern distance from the sun plays a bigger role in its temperature variation. When it's winter at Mars's southern pole, the planet is farther

from the sun, allowing the southern ice cap to grow thicker than its northern counterpart.

The CO2 coating on the northern ice cap only gets about a yard thick, while the southern cap's dry ice layer gets about eight times thicker, and never completely disappears in summer.

Today is the first day of Mars's northern hemisphere summer, with the north polar cap at maximum tilt toward the sun (and Earth). So telescope owners might catch a glimpse of the ice cap looking like a slightly brighter spot at the red planet's northern edge. (Mars is currently high in the westsouthwest at 10 p.m.)

all the big wild animals that Lewis and Clark saw in 1804 can still be seen, Running said.

"Our landscapes are still wild and pristine and clean," he said. "When you start looking globally at how many clean, wild landscapes are still around, Glacier is doing pretty well."

Glacier, signed into law on May 11, 1910, by President Taft, draws 2 million visitors per year to see its sawtooth peaks, clear lakes and wildlife. Nearly all come in the summer, jamming the signature red buses on Going-to-the-Sun Road, the dizzying roadway that bisects the park.

"We come to Glacier as often as we can," said Shirley McLaughlin of Missoula. "I have a real sense of ownership."

The park drew 4,000 visitors in 1911, when tourists would ride the train to Glacier and travel by horseback to stay at chalets in the high country, said Amy Vanderbilt, park spokeswoman. Visitors come to see predators like grizzly bears, which are now stable at around 300, she said.

But the same cannot be said for the park's iconic glaciers, giant slabs of ancient ice that crawl slowly down the face of mountains, gouging spectacular landscapes.

Fagre said that based on geologic evidence, the park had about 150 glaciers in 1850, the end of the socalled Little Ice Age. Most would have still been around when the park was established in 1910.

Only about 25 named glaciers are left, and they could be gone by 2020, Fagre said.

Rising temperatures also mean spring is arriving about three weeks early, which causes winter snow to melt earlier and forests to become drier as the summer progresses, said Jack Potter. chief of science at the park.

That has led to bigger and more destructive fires, in part because insect infestations have weakened trees, Potter said. There are now fires at higher elevations, too, because the tree line is moving higher as temperatures rise, he said.


Less moisture means lower stream flows, which endanger fish species, he said. The vegetation is changing, providing less food and protective cover for animals.


The chance to see the glaciers that are now disappearing is what lures many visitors to the remote park.

But tourists won't necessarily notice the glaciers are gone, because there will still be snow on the peaks of many mountains, Running said. And most of the remaining glaciers are located in the back country, far from visitors who stick to the main roads and lodges.

But it's hard for people to imagine Glacier National Park without glaciers.

"The day that Glacier National Park officially announces there are no glaciers left, it will make worldwide headlines." Running said. "When people find out I am from Montana, that is the first thing they ask me: 'Is it true about Glacier National Park?""

Dutch boy found alive in Libyan jet crash

TRIPOLI, Libya — A 10year-old Dutch boy lay in a hospital bed, head bandaged, skin pale and legs shattered - the lone "miracle" survivor of a plane crash Wednesday that killed 103 people in the Libyan capital. Most victims were Dutch tourists returning from vacation in South Africa.

Little was known about the dark-haired boy, who was rushed to a hospital in Tripoli where he underwent surgery for multiple fractures in both legs.

The barely conscious child muttered "Holland! Holland!" after he was found, a Dutch official said.

Libyan TV footage showed the boy, one eye bruised and swollen closed, breathing through an oxygen mask with multiple intravenous lines connected to his body and a monitor at Islands. his bedside. Doctors later said he was out of danger.

Reader puzzled by diagnoses of high potassium levels es are related to the kidnevs

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please explain to me what causes high potassium levels. I have been diagnosed with high potassium but don't know exactly how high it is or the cause. When I watched my diet, the levels came down.

DEAR READER: The technical name for high potassium is hyperkalemia. Normal readings are



between 3.6 and 4.8 milliequivalents per liter (mEq/L) determined by

simple lab testing. The most common caus-

and include either acute kidney failure or chronic kidney failure. Less common causes are type I diabetes, the excessive use of alcohol, Addison's disease, ACE inhibitors, red-bloodcell destruction, NSAIDs and an excessive use of supplements containing potassium. Let's hit on these briefly.

Kidney failure is the inability of the kidneys to function properly. Acute failure is marked by low amounts of urine with a rapid buildup of nitrogen waste in the blood. Causes include acute infection, a blocked urinary tract, injury, burns and other causes.

Chronic failure can be the result of many diseases.

Type I (insulin-dependent) diabetes is caused either by failure of the pancreas to release adequate insulin into the body or by a defect in the portions of the cells that accept the insulin.

Excessive alcohol consumption or drug use can cause a breakdown of muscle fibers, resulting in the release of potassium into the bloodstream.

Addison's disease is caused by partial or complete failure of the adrenal gland, which is responsible for many bodily functions. Causes include infection, bleeding into the gland and tumor. Ace inhibitors are drugs

CSI commencement is Friday



Red-blood-cell destruction can occur because of a number of conditions and diseases. This autoimmune disorder can either be inherited or acquired.

NSAIDs (non-steroidal

anti-inflammatory drugs) are available over-thecounter for control of headaches, mild to moderate pain from exercise such as gardening or sports injuries, fever, menstrual cramps and more. Examples include aspirin, ibuprofen and naproxen. If you are consuming NSAIDs, speak with your physician regarding other options.

Potassium deficiency is

rare with a balanced diet, but excesses are certainly a possibility if supplements are taken. This essential mineral is readily available in many foods, including salmon, cod, chicken, broccoli, peas, tomatoes, lettuce, spinach, potatoes and potato skins, apples, avocadoes, bananas and a great deal more. Potassium regulates acidity, water balance and blood pressure. Not all vita-

min supplements contain potassium so label reading is vital. Should you be on a supplement and consume a regular healthful diet, this alone might be the cause for your hyperkalemia.





Rare 'King of Herrings' found off Swedish coast

STOCKHOLM (AP) -First he thought it was a piece of plastic floating near the shoreline. When he got closer, 73-year-old Kurt Ove Eriksson realized the 12-foot serpent-like object was a rare creature from the depths of the ocean.

Marine biologists later determined Eriksson had found a Giant Oarfish — the world's largest bony fish last seen in Swedish waters about 130 years ago.



Cushing keeps AP Defensive Rookie award after Wednesday's revote

NEW YORK — A positive drug test notwithstanding, Houston Texans linebacker Brian Cushing is still The Associated Press NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Five days after he was suspended without pay for four games, a nationwide panel of 50 sports writers and broadcasters who cover the NFL voted again to give Cushing the award. He didn't receive anywhere near the 39 votes of his previous landslide victory, but the 18 he got in Wednesday's revote were enough to reclaim the honor.

"I was just glad to hear the news, that people stuck by me. Very honored," Cushing said. "I'm very happy to have the award once again, and I'm just happy with how everything turned out."

Although Cushing said he took a non-steroid substance, the league still considers it a performanceenhancer.

In the revote, Cushing finished five votes ahead of Buffalo safety Jairus Byrd. Green Bay linebacker Clay Matthews III got 12, Washington linebacker Brian Orakpo earned three votes, and St. Louis linebacker James Laurinaitis got one.

Three voters abstained. In all, 19 voters switched from Cushing to another player, and one voted for Cushing after picking Byrd originally.

In the original balloting in January, Cushing received 39 votes to six for Byrd, three for Matthews and two for Orakpo.

Cushing did lose his spot on the All-Pro second team, for which he originally had five votes and now has just one.

Lookin At Lucky has had anything but luck this year. He got checked into the rail in the Santa Anita Derby and rallied to finish third. In his 3-year-old debut in the Rebel, he got cut up, then came his compromised post position in the Derby.



joined this government: I have nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears and sweat," On this date:

In 1607, English colonists arrived by ship at the site of what became the Jamestown settlement in Virginia (the colonists went ashore the next day).

In 1846, the United States declared that a state of war already existed with Mexico.

In 1917, three shepherd children near Fatima, Portugal, reported seeing a vision of the Virgin Mary.

In 1918, the first U.S. airmail stamps, featuring a picture of a Curtiss JN-4 biplane, were issued to the public. (On a few of the stamps, the biplane was inadvertently printed upside-down, making them collector's items.)

In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed into law the St. Lawrence Seaway Development Act. The musical play "The Pajama Game" opened Broadway.

In 1958, Vice President Richard Nixon and his wife, Pat, were spat upon and their limousine battered by rocks thrown by anti-U.S. demonstrators in Caracas, Venezuela.

In 1968, a one-day general strike took place in France in support of student protesters.

In 1981, Pope John Paul II was shot and seriously wounded in St. Peter's Square by Turkish assailant Mehmet Ali Agca.

In 1985, a confrontation between Philadelphia authorities and the radical group MOVE ended as police dropped a bomb onto the group's row house; 11 people, including founder John Africa, died in the resulting fire that destroyed 61 homes.

In 1994, President Bill Clinton nominated federal appeals Judge Stephen G. Breyer to the U.S. Supreme Court to replace retiring Justice Harry A. Blackmun.

Ten years ago: Explosions at a fireworks warehouse in the Netherlands killed 22 people and injured nearly 1,000 others. (A suspect was found guilty of causing the blasts, but his conviction was overturned.)

Five years ago: The Pentagon proposed the most sweeping changes to its network of military bases in modern history. The president of Mexico, Vicente Fox, praised the dedication of Mexicans working in the United States, saying they were willing to take jobs that "even blacks" wouldn't do, a statement that prompted criticism in the United States. Government troops in Uzbekistan put down an uprising they blamed on Islamic militants; opponents said the troops fired into crowds and killed hundreds of people.

One year ago: A judge in West Palm Beach sentenced two men to death for the drug-debt slaying of a family of four on the side of a Florida highway, including two young boys who died in their mother's arms. Atlantis' astronauts captured the orbiting Hubble Space Telescope for five days of repair work. Pittsburgh' Adam LaRoche and Florida's Ross Gload became the first baseball players to have home runs taken away following a video replay review.
