## Idaho judicial candidates in feisty race

BOISE — In the race for the Idaho Supreme Court, neither Judge John Bradbury nor Justice Roger Burdick are relying on precedent.

Historically speaking, Burdick may have an edge — only one incumbent justice has been unseated in the past six decades. But Bradbury has already come very close to the high court: In 2008, he lost by just 276 votes to incumbent Justice Joel Horton.

Both are furiously campaigning across the state, each hoping voters will rule in their favor. And neither

are pulling punches: Bradbury says Burdick has catered to politics rather than the people, while Burdick says Bradbury is more focused on activism than interpreting the law.

Bradbury, from Grangeville, has presented himself as a champion for rural Idaho, saying he ran the only rural mental health court in the state and telling voters he understands the frustrations rural residents have over the lack of services in their regions.

"The average politician and judge in this state don't understand how desperate rural counties are for

## Governor opts out of candidate debate

Otter: 'All should have been invited'

When Republican candidates for governor participate in a public debate on Tuesday, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter won't be around to tackle any questions.

Otter isn't participating in the debate for GOP governor candidates, drawing criticism from his opponents that he's unwilling to answer questions and face opponents. The debate airs at 8 p.m. Tuesday on Idaho Public Television, featuring candidates Sharon Ullman, an Ada County commissioner, and Rex Rammell, an Idaho Falls veterinarian. Otter said in a statement

that he disagrees with the "proof of an active campaign" criteria used to determine whether candidates can be invited to debates.

GOP gubernatorial candidates not invited to the debate are Tamara Wells, Ron "Pete" Peterson, and Walt Bayes.

"Six Republican candidates met the deadline set

A groundbreaking ceremony is usually more about show than work.

But gold-plated shovels and double-breasted suits were nowhere near Saturday's groundbreaking of the Twin Falls City Youth Council's BMX Park, off Blake Street South and near Rock Creek Canyon.

Council President Jonathan Bruce did begin the day with a short speech, thanking both the city for helping the idea come to fruition and area volunteers who have pledged support and help.

"This isn't just us," said Bruce, 16.

After proud parents snapped pictures of the group digging a ceremonial shovelful of dirt, the teens then got to work. A backhoe and load of dirt was brought

in and the group spent the rest of the day working on the park, which will be for non-motorized bicycle motocross enthusiasts.

The city's skate park doesn't allow bicycles, so the park will give BMX riders a place to play.

"It feels good to be at this point," said youth council member and project

## With Mikesell out, three seek his place on Republican ticket

This spring's Republican race for District 2 Twin Falls County commissioner certainly looked a lot different two months ago.

Three county residents filed in March to challenge incumbent Commissioner Tom Mikesell. But Mikesell bowed out of the race earlier this month to accept another

job offer, leaving the field open for whichever candidate can seize voters' favor before the May 25 primary.

Leon Mills, Jim Schouten and Roger Ursenbach Sr. all

seek the GOP nomination for the seat. The winner of the three-way race will face the winner of the Democratic primary and independent candidate Randy G. Carpenter in November. Though

Mikesell's not running, he will remain on the ballot, as his withdrawal came too late for the county clerk to remove his name.

## VikingMan event moves to September this year

### Skandi Dag discontinued

HEYBURN — The VikingMan Triathlon has changed the date of its annual race to September and discontinued a Scandinavian festival historically held in conjunction with the race.

The Heyburn City Council waived the fees for the use of the Heyburn Riverside Park Wednesday, and granted race organizers permission to use two spaces at the Riverside RV Park

during the race.

VikingMan Triathlon Athletic Coordinator Scott Ganoe said the triathlon will be held on Sept. 11, a Saturday, instead of in June. The Skandi Dag Festival will not be held this year.

"For many of you that date has a familiar ring to it," said Ganoe. "The date was chosen because it is the beginning of the off-peak season."

The City Council approved a request for the group to use one RV camping spot from Sept. 7-12 and one camping spot on Sept. 11 for the person who handles the time chips.

The triathlon is held as a fundraiser

for scholarships for students to attend fine-art classes at the American Heritage Academy.

A half-mile or mile Family Fun Run will be held in the evening on Sept. 10. The VikingMan Triathlon includes half-distance and Olympic-distance events.

City of Heyburn Attorney Steve Tuft said the city is in the process of developing applications for the use of the city's parks and the group would need to fulfill that requirement.

## Police searching for suspects who enticed children

Twin Falls Police are searching for two suspects who allegedly attempted to entice children into their car three different times early Saturday evening in the area of Vista Bonita Park, near Washington Street South and Orchard Drive in Twin Falls.

In one instance the individuals tried to convince a girl to get into their car. Two girls claimed they were approached by them, and a third group of children playing in the park said the men kept driving back and forth where they were playing, according to a news release.

"One girl was offered candy to get in the car," city spokeswoman Julie Pence told the *Times-News*. The

girls were about 10 to 12 years old, she said. The incident happened between 5 and 6:30 p.m.

The children said the driver was a Caucasian in his 30s or 40s. He was wearing a white baseball cap and a white shirt. The passenger was said to possibly be Hispanic. The men were in a dark gray or silver four-door car with tinted windows.

Police had not located either suspect as of Sunday evening.

Twin Falls Police want to remind parents to educate their children about being approached by strangers, Pence said.

## T.F. releases construction update

Concrete work on curbs and gutters will continue along the west side of Washington Street North and also in the median today through Friday, when two lanes will be open to traffic, according to information from the city of Twin Falls.

In other construction updates from the city:

• The completion of work on Washington Street North between Shoup and Dubois avenues has been extended about a month from mid-June to mid- to late-July. Construction in that area was halted last week between Tuesday and Friday due to wet soil conditions from heavy rain. That, along with unforeseen work on water lines and fiber optic lines, extended completion of the construc-

tion phase.

• Falls Avenue West is open only to local traffic, where wet weather recently caused some delays, but the overall timeline for the street-widening project remains on target for completion in late summer or early autumn.

• The city is asking that truckers use Blue Lakes Boulevard while construction continues instead of Washington Street North.

## Popplewell celebrates fundraiser with dunk tank event

BUHL — After Popplewell Elementary School students raised nearly \$31,000 during the school's annual Mathathon fundraiser in March, the student body was promised a soaking-good show.

That promise was fulfilled Friday. A dunk tank, donated for use by the Filer Fire Department, was brought in and filled to the brim with water.

Braving the dunk tank plank were Principal Ron Anthony, fifth-grade teachers Mike Rush and Chuck Day, fourth-grade teacher Lisa Jolliff, third-grade teacher Kayla Figgins, second-grade teacher Shannon Youngman and first-grade teacher Cindy Gonzales.

Armed with water guns, teachers got even with students after being dunked, as students cheered and waved in hope of drawing

the water their way.

"I want to get wet," said first-grader Travis Folks. "I wanted to dunk the teachers but this is fun, too."

Folks remembers raising money for Mathathon, but the fundraiser was the last thing on his mind on Friday.

"I like seeing the teachers get dunked, it's awesome," he said.

Jolliff pleaded with students to go easy, "It's cold ... how many times have I gone in?"

After surfacing from her plunge, Jolliff raised her own water squirter.

"I've got you now!" she yelled, as students squealed in delight.

Second-grader Zara Weaver was impressed with her aim — she dunked Day with each of her three throws.

"It was pretty fun," Weaver said.

While fun and games were on the minds of students, staff and members

of the school's Parent-Teacher Network still had impending budget cuts on their minds.

With the money students raised this year, the parent organization was able to upgrade technology in the school's computer labs, outfitting the lab with two 42-inch flat-screen televisions, and was able to purchase 30 whiteboards and corkboards for classroom use.

"Twenty-five percent of the money raised during each Mathathon goes directly back into the classroom," said PTN President April Jaynes. "Teachers are able to purchase supplies for art projects or special lessons."

The school's teachers received \$280 each from last year's fundraiser to use this school year, though what educators will receive next fall hasn't been budgeted.

"We'll be making those decisions in June, with new

PTN leadership, as well as discussing plans for reaching out to corporations and big businesses in hopes of getting support," Jaynes said. "You wouldn't think pencils are a big necessity, but this economy has hit everyone and we're focusing on getting back to the basics in supplying items for the education of our children."

Figgins is grateful for the extra funding, which she's used to purchase extra scissors and classroom supplies.

"It helps quite a bit," Figgins said.

While economic uncertainty loomed, the faculty just tried to enjoy the fun afternoon.

"Right now, I'm just cold," said Figgins, who was dunked several times. "This was a lot of fun for the kids"

chairman Sam Rasmussen, 17. “We’ve been at this a long time. The idea came up last year and we’ve been planning a long time. This is the first official work day and we’re ready ... We want to ride.”

Rasmussen said park features will include a starting platform, mounds, a quarter pipe and a bowl, all necessary structures for freestyle riders.

“I’ve been riding BMX for years and it’s hard to jump in parking lots, and we’re not allowed at the skate park, so this gives BMX riders a place to go and it will be open for everyone,” Rasmussen said.

The council isn’t sure how long it will take to get the park ride-ready, as its budget is next to nothing and success depends on volunteers and donations. The city has pledged to maintain the park.

“We are going to have fundraisers to help and businesses have stepped up to assist in construction as well,” Rasmussen said.

Rasmussen said the youth council is recruiting other teen volunteers and will encourage park users to help maintain the system.

Although not a BMX rider, youth council member Christina Bruce, 15, said she’ll help with construction efforts.

“I definitely support this. The community has so few things for teens and young adults to do, so this provides another recreation opportunity,” she said.

The youth council will develop about an acre of the city-owned property, situated above the Rock Creek trail system entrance, said Twin Falls City Councilman Lee Heider.

Heider, liaison between the youth and city councils, said further development would depend on park usage, popularity and the city budget.

“Ultimately, we would like to have rest-room facilities available (for both the park and trail). That’s the beauty of this park’s location – it’s right next to other park facilities the city maintains and residents use,” Heider said. “For now, we’re going to clean up the property and build a fence.”

Although the teen group has some heavy lifting ahead of it, Heider commended its efforts.

“Young people have a tremendous capacity for service and volunteerism,” Heider said. “Ultimately, these young people are training to be tomorrow’s leaders.”

business experience and mentioned budget and business issues as priorities.

Ursenbach, 51, spent two decades in the Silicon Valley computer industry, including 12 in managerial roles, before coming to the Magic Valley a few years ago. He’s since spent time in real-estate investing before returning to a career in computers. He also volunteers with Twin Falls County Search and Rescue, and said he now wants to be more involved in public service.

Having worked with budgets as large as \$49 million, he said as commissioner he’d focus on economic stability, responsibility and job creation. He wants to fight government overspending and overcharging by the private sector, and said the county should help replace Dell – a large, specialized employer – with multiple small businesses. Those businesses in large number would provide the same tax income while causing less economic harm if one closed, he said. “And (they’re) sustainable.”

The businessman had his wages garnished in 2009 for \$5,400, court records show. But he said that came from bad luck with his real-estate investing and that he’s “done the best I can.”

Schouten, 47, has a somewhat different court history, having pleaded guilty to misdemeanor battery in 2003 over an incident where he grabbed and pushed around his adult daughter.

Schouten only received a \$213 fine and six months’

probation for the guilty plea. But when asked about it, he said he couldn’t remember ever pleading guilty and thought 5th District Judge Randy Stoker had thrown the case out.

He later suggested that perhaps the conviction was his son’s and somehow fell under his name. But according to court and police records obtained by the *Times-News*, it was the elder Schouten who entered a guilty plea on July 1, 2003, the same day a jury trial was set to begin.

Schouten comes to the county race after a failed bid to replace Twin Falls City Councilman Greg Lanting in a four-way race last fall. He still sits on the city’s Planning and Zoning Commission and owns Jimbos Drywall and More, a custom drywall and stucco business.

Much of his work takes him to the western part of the county, and he said he believes he has a perspective on what county residents need. Among his goals are to make the county more business-friendly and revamp its bidding process for contractors.

“It’s time to bid apples for apples and not apples for buddies,” he said.

He also questioned some fees for things such as cremation and said he’d like to air county meetings on public-access cable, like the city does. He said he’d like to provide more of a voice to county residents who live in the city of Twin Falls’ area-of-impact zone and also face city regulations.

Born and raised in Twin Falls, Mills, 54, has spent 20 years with ConAgra Foods Lamb Weston, where he’s an assistant supervisor. He’s been a member of the county Republican Central Committee since 1998 and is also running unopposed this year for his precinct seat.

He’s tried twice before for the commission seat, losing to former Commissioner Marvin Hempleman in 1996 and to Mikesell in 2002.

“I’ve always just, deep in my heart, wanted to serve the county at that level,” he said.

Mills said he doesn’t have a huge agenda of changes he wants to make, but would look at several issues. He supports fewer taxes and fewer laws, he said, and views the commission’s role as “law enforcers, not law-makers.”

Though the board oversees the county, he said he’d remember that he’s serving the public and wouldn’t let it go to his head.

“I’ll be the Rottweiler that guards the assets,” he said. “I don’t own them.”

Mills pointed to Jerome economic officials as a group that Twin Falls should learn from when courting businesses. And, asked about other issues facing the county, he said he’d turn to experts to learn more about problems he’s unfamiliar with – though he thinks the county’s doing the best it can to handle siting new high-voltage transmission lines.

“You’re not going to make everybody happy,” he said.

services,” Bradbury said. “The Idaho Supreme Court is out of touch – for the first time in the history of Idaho there is not a justice from northern Idaho, there is not a justice from eastern Idaho. I have seen a lot of the rural counties, and I can tell you they are upset they’re not included.”

But Burdick, who practiced in Twin Falls and Jerome before joining the appellate courts, says the state court system has already taken steps to become more accessible for all Idaho residents by encouraging mediation and settlements, becoming more efficient in dealing with probation violations and speeding up the timelines for some types of cases, like those that terminate parental rights.

“Those child termination

cases interfere with finalizing adoptions and they increase foster care costs, plus they’re no good for the child. So these cases will now be appealed directly to the Idaho Supreme Court, and there will be a hearing within 120 days,” Burdick says. “We’ve done numerous things to become more efficient. We’re trying to go paperless too because that will save money and storage space and be more efficient as well.”

The two present cases that are widely divergent.

Bradbury says he’s a conservative judge who relies on legal precedent when making decisions.

“I believe the Supreme Court says what it says, and I think judges and justices should have the guts to uphold it whether it’s unpopular and even if it means los-

ing your seat. You rule not when it’s popular, but when it’s required,” he said.

He maintains the state’s highest court failed to meet that standard about five years ago when the justices wrapped up a 17-year legal battle by ruling that the state’s school funding system was unconstitutional – but they didn’t offer any sanctions or penalties if the state refused to change the funding scheme.

“It was the darkest day in the history of the Idaho Supreme Court,” Bradbury said of the ruling during a televised debate with Burdick. “It is a constitutional mandate that the Legislature adequately fund the schools ... If it’s a constitutional mandate, it’s the responsibility of the Supreme Court to see that it’s obeyed. Every child and teacher in this state has this

justice (Burdick) and the Supreme Court to thank for the lack of inadequate funding today.”

Burdick counters by calling Bradbury an “activist judge” who would have lawmakers thrown in jail rather than let them set school funding policy.

“The court acted consistently with the Idaho State Constitution as it has continued to do since I’ve been on it,” Burdick said. “The Idaho State Legislature are the people who in fact fund schools – the Idaho Supreme Court cannot. They (the schools) could start the case again.”

The two have also clashed over whether the Idaho

Judicial Council, which is charged with handling complaints about judges and making recommendations for new judicial appointments, should keep its information confidential. Bradbury says complaints about judges and the disciplinary process against them should be open to the public, while Burdick maintains that people are still free to complain publicly but it’s proper to keep the investigations of the council secret, much like investigations done by human resources departments in other agencies.

The judicial race will be decided in the primary vote on May 25. Unlike other races in Idaho, the primary vote is

the final vote for judicial positions.

forth in Idaho law and filed paperwork to run for the office of governor,” Otter said. “All should have been invited to attend, regardless of whether a group determines them not qualified to participate. I met some of my primary opponents at Lincoln Day events around the state in recent months. Each of us had ample opportunity to get voters acquainted with our issues and priorities.”

His opponents say he’s avoiding part of the process, though.

“I find it disappointing,” Ullman said. “I think that any incumbent elected official should be able to stand and face questions. ... I think it’s really shameful that the governor would choose to not participate in that process. I wonder why he wouldn’t? Was he somehow fearful?”

Ullman drew a distinction between Otter’s decline of the debate and her style as a commissioner.

“I know as a county commissioner if any-

body asks me a question, I’m certainly going to answer,” she said.

Rammell said Otter’s choice to not debate will be an issue in the campaign.

“I think he loses either way,” Rammell said. “If he debates, I show him up. If he doesn’t debate, it shows he’s scared.”

Despite Otter’s explanation, Rammell has another take on why the governor isn’t debating.

“He knows I can beat him,” Rammell said. “That’s why he won’t debate.”

Forgoing in a debate is a common tactic for incumbents who already have an advantage in an election, said James Weatherby, a political science professor emeritus at Boise State University.

“They’re not wanting to give their opponents a stage upon which they can develop greater name recognition,” he said. “Incumbent politicians often determine, especially in a one-party state like Idaho, that there is no downside to not debating.”

## Abortion foes capitalize on health law they fought

WASHINGTON — Abortion opponents fought passage of President Obama's health care overhaul to the bitter end, and now that it's the law, they're using it to limit coverage by private insurers.

An obscure part of the law allows states to restrict abortion coverage by private plans operating in new insurance markets. Capitalizing on that language, abortion foes have succeeded in passing bans that, in some cases, go beyond federal statutes.

"We don't consider elective abortion to be health care, so we don't think it's a bad thing for fewer private insurance companies to cover it," said Mary Harned, attorney for Americans United for Life, a national organization that wrote a model law for the states.

Abortion rights supporters are dismayed.

"Implementation of this reform should be about increasing access to health care and increasing choices, not taking them away," said Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., a member of the Senate leadership. "Health care reform is not an excuse to take rights away from women."

Since Obama signed the legislation law March 23, Arizona and Tennessee have enacted laws restricting abortion coverage by health plans in new insurance markets, called exchanges. About 30 million people will get their coverage through exchanges, which open in 2014 to serve individuals and small businesses.

In Florida, Mississippi and Missouri, lawmakers have passed bans and sent them to their governors. Most of the states allow exceptions in cases of rape, incest or to save the life of the mother. Insurers still could offer separate policies to specifically cover abortion.

Three other states may act this year — Louisiana, Ohio and Oklahoma. Overall, there are 29 states where lawmakers or public policy groups expressed serious interest, Harned said.

"You are going to see more actions like this," said Tom McClusky, a lobbyist for the socially conservative Family Research Council. "This is not something we are just going to let fall by the wayside."

Before the overhaul became law, five states had limits on private insurance coverage of abortion — Idaho, Kentucky, Missouri, North Dakota and Oklahoma. Abortion rights supporters are concerned that the list is growing as a result of the new federal law.

Murray had joined in voting down a federal abortion coverage ban when the Senate debated health care last year. Now she and other abortion rights supporters worry the same sorts of restrictions could spread from state to state.

"It's really going to be a patchwork of state laws by the time these exchanges are set up," said Jessica Arons, director of women's health at the Center for American Progress, a liberal public policy institute.

Most private health insurance plans cover abortion as a

legal medical procedure, but research indicates many women opt to pay directly.

The federal law allows private insurance plans in the exchanges to cover abortion as long as they collect a separate premium. That money must remain apart from public subsidies available to help pay insurance premiums for most customers in the exchanges.

That compromise split abortion foes in Congress and around the country. Anti-abortion organizations including National Right to Life and the U.S. Catholic bishops called it a fig leaf, and continued to oppose the legislation. But Catholic hospitals and many religious orders of nuns supported it.

Abortion rights supporters were cool to the compromise, but it broke a political deadlock threatening the bill.

Anti-abortion Democrats in the House cast critical votes for the legislation after Obama also agreed to an executive order affirming long-standing federal policy against the use of taxpayer funds for abortion except in cases of rape, incest or to save the life of the mother — known as the Hyde amendment.

Tennessee already has enacted a far stricter ban, with

no exceptions. Democratic Gov. Phil Bredesen, who allowed it to become law without his signature, said in a statement it "creates a prohibition much broader than that found in current law and could unintentionally negatively impact the quality of health care options for Tennesseans."

All eyes are now on Florida, where Gov. Charlie Crist will decide soon whether to sign a bill that restricts abortion coverage in that state's insurance exchange. Florida is a politically diverse state, not known as a bedrock of social conservatism. Crist is running for the U.S. Senate as an independent, after it became clear that he would lose the Republican primary to former state Rep. Marco Rubio.

# Idaho National Guard prepares for mission

BOISE (AP) — Wind whipped across sand-colored tents, diesel fuel fumes filled nostrils and camouflage-covered bodies bowed over battlefield keyboards Wednesday at Boise’s Gowen Field.

Members of the 116th Cavalry Brigade Combat Team were in the thick of a week of simulated battle training as part of massive preparations for its second deployment to Iraq.

But unlike 2004, when the 116th had only 90 days to prepare for deployment, soldiers aren’t scrambling to get ready this time. The Department of Defense gave the brigade 150 days between its September 2009 alert and April 2010 mobilization order.

That extra time means Idaho soldiers should be better prepared when they hit the ground in Iraq, Col. Guy Thomas, commander of the 116th, said.

The Army and the 116th are better organized, Thomas said, and as a result, training, medical work and certifications are well under way.

On Sept. 17, Idaho Gov. Butch Otter will hand over control of the 116th to the Army. The next day, soldiers will head to their home armories in Idaho, Oregon and Montana, and then begin leaving in waves for two months of training in Mississippi. Then they’ll spend about 10 months in Iraq.

“All of our soldiers have to meet medical criteria,” Thomas said. “Their teeth have to be in good shape and they have to be in (physically) good shape.”

Getting their bodies in shape now

will give soldiers “more time to focus on the training they have to do at the mobilization site,” Thomas said.

In 2004, many soldiers were still getting fillings and resolving medical problems while trying to train in the Texas desert. Some actually had to be pulled away from group training to take care of medical issues.

“That can take away from the unit cohesiveness,” said Idaho Guard spokesman Tim Marsano.

Soldiers will get twice the amount of annual training, Thomas said. Weapon certifications and other work will be completed according to Army standards before the brigade heads to Mississippi.

Idaho soldiers also are receiving all essential combat equipment — like body armor and thermal imaging cameras — before they leave, Thomas said.

“Last time there was not a system in place for anything that we did. ... We had to redo a lot of training at the (mobilization) site.”

That meant soldiers simultaneously completed individual and group training and got part of their equipment here and part at the mobilization site, Thomas said.

Guardsmen are busy going through a mandatory “Yellow Ribbon” family support program. It’s a collection of outside and internal resources designed to help families while soldiers are away.

“They have folks there to help you with your budget, legal questions and people explain how insurance works,” Thomas said. “If soldiers have family-care plans, they make sure ... they have someone to take care of children.”

Plans to take care of children must be in place before soldiers can deploy, Marsano said. That ensures a spouse will be able to pay the mortgage and buy groceries, he said.

The Army also is taking a more proactive approach to saving marriages by making chaplains and counselors available to couples and offers special sessions called “Strong Bonds,” Marsano said.

Additionally, the Guard is offering many training sessions on mental health and identifying the warning signs of suicide and post-traumatic stress disorder before the soldiers deploy, Marsano said.

“We hit it hard,” he said.

Federal law says employers must restore jobs to citizen soldiers after they return.

The Idaho branch of Employer Support for the Guard and Reserve is working to expand its volunteer committee and reach out to Idaho employers because soldiers face extra training and more time off before they deploy.

“The old model of Saturday/Sunday drill is out the window,” said Dick Deam, Idaho executive director for ESGR.

“They have to put in a certain amount of time training with their unit and leadership ... We’ve gotten more inquiries from employers and concerns,” Deam said.

During the last deployment, employees in the Guard simply left for 18 months, Deam said. When they returned, they got their jobs back.

# The future of Mount St. Helens 30 years later

CASTLE ROCK, Wash. — Thirty years after the eruption of Mount St. Helens leveled a forest and rained volcanic ash for miles around, the devastated mountain remains an important center for volcano research and science.

But some critics of the way Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument is managed argue that it could be much more, perhaps even a national park on par with some of the most grandeur — Yosemite, Rainier, Grand Canyon.

“It’s got unique and iconic resources and landscape that make it equal to (those parks),” said Sean Smith, northwest regional director for the National Parks Conservation Association.

Smith, who got to know the volcano’s many moods as a ranger in the 1990s, said making St. Helens a national park would raise its profile, draw more visitors and provide a steady dedicated stream of money.

Since its catastrophic eruption on May 18, 1980, the picturesque mountain with its telltale open horse-shaped crater has captivated scientists and visitors. Within minutes of a 5.1 earthquake that morning, the volcano’s north flank collapsed, triggering the largest landslide ever recorded. The blast killed 57 people, flattened 230 square miles of forests and blew 1,300 feet off the peak.

In 1982, Congress set aside 110,000 acres for the monument and put it in the hands of the U.S. Forest Service to be managed as part of the larger Gifford Pinchot National Forest in southwest Washington.

Mark Plotkin, tourism director for Cowlitz County, said the past several years haven’t been the brightest for the monument, which has seen limited resources, reduced services, the permanent closure of the Coldwater Ridge Visitors Center and the state takeover of another.

“Right now, we’re doing the minimum necessary to

keep the doors open,” said Plotkin, who favors national park status.

Advocates for park status cite a University of Washington report that found St. Helens got about \$3.26 per acre in federal dollars from the Forest Service in 2007, while other monuments within the National Park Service got three to six times more money on a per-acre basis.

A congressional committee spent over a year exploring, in part, whether St. Helens should become the state’s fourth national park.

Last month, it recommended significant improvements for the monument, including better road connections, overnight lodging and recreational access for a wide variety of visitors.

“I think there was an underlying feeling that it was somewhat neglected,” said Paul Pearce, a Skamania County Commissioner. “We want them to take action that they recognize it’s a special place.”

The committee stuck with the Forest Service to continue managing the volcano, but urged line-item funding so money couldn’t be raided for other agency needs such as fighting wildfires.

Tom Mulder, the monument’s manager, said the Forest Service is the best agency to run the monument. He said improvements are under way with a new flow of money, including over \$6 million in stimulus dollars announced last year for monument upgrades.

“We’re trying to improve the road system,” he said, as well as trails and staffing.

Though some community members expressed a desire to open up access to the monument — one-third is currently restricted for research — the committee and Mulder says scientific research should continue unimpeded.

“Mount St. Helens has been a master teacher for an entirely new generation of scientists,” said Carolyn Driedger, a hydrologist and outreach coordinator for USGS Cascades Volcano Observatory.

ORLANDO, Fla. — The hair is a little grayer. The ankles and knees no longer so sturdy. Even with a roster full of aging superstars, the Boston Celtics are still standing tall.

Too old to chase a title? Not these days.

Ray Allen scored 25 points, Paul Pierce had 22 and the Celtics used smothering defense to beat the Orlando Magic 92-88 on Sunday in the Eastern Conference finals opener.

Hampered by injuries, the Celtics literally limped their way through parts of the regular season. All that seems a distant memory now.

"I honestly say we lost ourselves," Celtics coach Doc Rivers said. "I think we've found ourselves again."

Rasheed Wallace added 13 points as the Celtics built a 20-point lead, then held on late to snap Orlando's 14-game winning streak. They held the Magic to 41 percent shooting — 22 percent from 3-point range — in displaying that rough and tough defense that was once their staple.

"There were stretches in the season, we know each other so well now, where we were becoming less patient with each other," Allen said. "We were getting on each other a little too much. We can take it,

SAN ANTONIO — Australia’s Adam Scott made the Texas Open his first PGA Tour victory in two years, shooting a combined 11-under 133 in a 36-hole finale Sunday to edge Fredrik Jacobson by a stroke.

The 2008 Byron Nelson Classic winner, Scott overcame two early bogeys with an eagle on the par-4 17th in his third-round 66, then built his lead with six birdies en route to a closing 67 on the new Oaks Course at TPC San Antonio.

Scott survived a closing bogey — his only one in the final round — when Jacobson missed a 16-footer from the fringe on No. 18 that would’ve forced a playoff.

Scott finished at 14-under 274 and earned \$1,098,000 for his seventh tour victory.

Jacobson closed with rounds of 65 and 70. Ernie Els (69-68), Aaron Baddeley (67-68) and Jimmy Walker (70-69) tied for third at 12 under.

Busch won his second race of the season — he won at Richmond International Raceway two weeks ago — and moved into second place in the standings behind seventh-place finisher Kevin Harvick.

“We’ve been working real hard at just keeping my head in the game more, and it seems to be working a little bit, too,” Busch said.

Busch overcame early radio issues in the No. 18 Toyota. He couldn’t hear his crew and told them to stand on the wall and wave if they could hear him. The crew waved back.

Busch heard nothing for about 30 laps until suddenly the voice of his crew chief talking to his spotter about how NASCAR was going to pull the No. 18 off to fix the problem came through loud and clear.

When Johnson was hit for speeding, team members high-fived and briefly celebrated in the pits.

Johnson lost the lead for good with 38 laps left and Busch led the final 35 laps.

# An exercise in mass democracy in Cassia Co.

Cassia County is the most Republican in the Magic Valley, and it seems as if every one of them is running for political office this spring.

Sixteen people will be seeking six jobs at the courthouse in the May 25 primary. Since no Democrats have filed for any of the positions, winning next week will be tantamount to being elected.

All three incumbent county commissioners are running, but only two for the positions they now hold. Paul Christensen, who has spent the past 16 years on the commission, is vying for the job being vacated by Assessor Marty Holland, who is retiring after five terms. His opponents are Dwight Davis and William “Red” Brady.

Christensen is an easy choice for this position. One of the best-regarded county commissioners in Idaho, his knowledge of property taxation and county finance is unparalleled in Cassia County.

His colleagues on the commission, Clay Handy and Dennis Crane, should keep their jobs. Handy is being challenged by Robert Kunau and Crane by James Kelley.

As a group, Handy, Crane and Christensen may be the best county commission in south-central Idaho. We were impressed with the way they handled the emotional debate over the proposed high-voltage transmission line across the county.

They appointed the Cassia County Gateway West Task Force to study the issues regarding Idaho Power and potentially other electricity companies that want to run transmission lines through the county. Acting on the task force’s recommendation, in January the commissioners approved a transmission corridor overlay zone that would restrict construction of major power lines to a route called the Stateline Route farther south than Gateway West’s original proposed plan.

So when Idaho Power and its partner come calling in earnest, Cassia County will be able to present a united front about where the route should run.

The commissioners have also done much to defuse conflicts between CAFO operators and their neighbors and managed to get ahead of the curve in setting ground rules of the county’s emerging poultry industry.

But then again, this is a group with 36 years of experience among them — the most in the Magic Valley.

If Christensen is elected assessor, Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter would name his replacement based on recommendations from the Cassia County Republican Central Committee.

In the treasurer’s race, we endorse former Burley Mayor Jon Anderson, who was defeated for a third term in City Hall in November. Anderson, who is running against Cassia County Deputy Treasurer Patty Justesen and William Jensen to succeed Gayle Erekson, is a hard-working and honest public official who would do well at the courthouse.

And it’s not as if he isn’t familiar with accounting. Anderson used to be the treasurer of the M.H. King Co.

In the clerk’s race, there’s no clear favorite to succeed Larry Mickelsen, who retired in March. Acting Clerk Dee Yeaman and Fred Darrington, who are running against Joseph Larsen, would both do the job well.

## Mile-long tube sucking oil away from Gulf well

NEW ORLEANS — Oil company engineers on Sunday finally succeeded in keeping some of the oil gushing from a blown well out of the Gulf of Mexico, hooking up a mile-long tube to funnel the crude into a tanker ship after more than three weeks of failures.

Millions of gallons of crude are already in the water, however, and researchers said the black ooze may have entered a major current that could carry it through the Florida Keys and around to the East Coast.

BP PLC engineers remotely guiding robot submersibles had worked since Friday to place the tube into a 21-inch pipe nearly a mile below the sea. After several setbacks, the contraption was hooked up successfully and funneling oil to a tanker ship. The oil giant said it will take days to figure out how much oil its contraption is sucking up.

The blown well has been leaking for more than three weeks, threatening sea life, commercial fishing and the coastal tourist industry from Louisiana to Florida. BP failed in several previous attempts

to stop the leak, trying in vain to activate emergency valves and lowering a 100-ton container that got clogged with icy crystals.

A researcher told The Associated Press on Sunday that computer models show the oil may have already seeped into a powerful water stream known as the loop current, which could propel it into the Atlantic Ocean. A boat is being sent next week to collect samples and learn more.

William Hogarth, dean of the University of South Florida’s College of Marine Science, said one model shows oil has already entered the current, while a second shows the oil is 3 miles from it — still dangerously close. The models are based on weather, ocean current and spill data from the U.S. Navy and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, among other sources.

Hogarth said it’s still too early to know what specific amounts of oil will make it to Florida, or what damage it might do to the sensitive Keys or beaches on Florida’s Atlantic coast. He said claims by BP that the oil would be less damaging to the Keys after traveling over hundreds of miles from the spill site

were not mollifying.

“This can’t be passed off as ‘it’s not going to be a problem,’” Hogarth said. “This is a very sensitive area. We are concerned with what happens in the Florida Keys.”

BP had previously said the tube, if successful, was expected to collect most of the oil gushing from the well. On Sunday, the company said it was too early to measure how much crude was being collected and acknowledged the tube was no panacea.

“It’s a positive move, but let’s keep in context,” said Kent Wells, BP’s senior vice president for exploration and production. “We’re about shutting down the flow of oil from this well.”

Crews will slowly ramp up how much oil the tube collects over the next few days. They need to move slowly because they don’t want too much frigid seawater entering the pipe, which could combine with gases to form the same ice-like crystals that doomed the previous containment effort.

Two setbacks over the weekend illustrate how delicate the effort is. Early Sunday, hours before a steady connection was made, engineers were able to suck a small amount of oil to the

tanker, but the tube was dislodged. The previous day, equipment used to insert the tube into the gushing pipe at the ocean floor had to be hauled to the surface for readjustment.

The first chance to choke off the flow for good should come in about a week. Engineers plan to shoot heavy mud into the crippled blowout preventer on top of the well, then permanently entomb the leak in concrete. If that doesn’t work, crews also can shoot golf balls and knotted rope into the nooks and crannies of the device to plug it, Wells said.

The final choice to end the leak is a relief well, but it is more than two months from completion.

Top officials in President Obama’s administration cautioned that the tube “is not a solution” to the spill and said they are closely monitoring the situation.

“We will not rest until BP permanently seals the well-head, the spill is cleaned up, and the communities and natural resources of the Gulf Coast are restored and made whole,” Secretary of Homeland Security Janet Napolitano and Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar said in a joint statement.

## RI school district agrees to rehire fired teachers

CENTRAL FALLS, R.I. — A school district that gained the support of President Barack Obama for promoting accountability after it fired all its teachers from a struggling school announced on Sunday it had reached an agreement with the union to return all the current staffers to their jobs.

The two sides said a transformation plan for Central Falls High School for the coming school year would allow the 87 teachers, guidance counselors, librarians and other staffers who were to lose their jobs at the end of this year to return without having to reapply. More than 700 people had already applied for the positions.

The agreement also imposes a longer school day, more after-school tutoring and other changes.

The board of trustees overseeing the school system in Central Falls, one of the poorest communities in the state, voted in February to fire the staff of one of the state’s worst-performing schools. The school was under a mandate from the state to make improvements, and it opted for the mass firings after a breakdown in talks with teachers about other reforms that would have required more work, some without extra pay.

Obama, during a national address on education in March, said the firings were an example of the need for accountability over student performance.

“So if a school is struggling, we have to work with the principal and the teachers to find a solution,” Obama said. “We’ve got to give them a chance to make meaningful improvements. But if a school continues to fail its students year after year after year, if it doesn’t show any sign of improvement, then there’s got to be a sense of accountability.”

He continued: “And that’s what happened in Rhode Island last week at a chronically troubled school, when just 7 percent of 11th-graders

passed state math tests — 7 percent.”

Details of the agreement were to be released following a ratification vote by Central Falls teachers at a meeting Monday. The union and district had been working with a mediator since March.

“Both the school district and the union agree that while this has been a difficult process for everyone involved, the negotiations resulted in a newfound appreciation for shared responsibility, and a solid commitment to bring lasting solutions that will improve teaching and learning at Central Falls High School,” said a joint statement from the union and the district.

Under the deal, teachers

will need to recommit to their jobs and interview with the new principal. Other changes aimed at increasing student achievement include: a new evaluation system designed to inform teaching and learning, and targeted and embedded professional development.

## AROUND THE WORLD

### LOS ANGELES Inspections of oil rig fall short of feds’ own policy, result in few violations

LOS ANGELES — The federal agency responsible for ensuring that the Deepwater Horizon was operating safely before it exploded last month fell well short of its own policy that the rig be inspected at least once per month, an Associated Press investigation shows.

In fact, the agency’s inspection frequency on the Deepwater Horizon fell dramatically over the past five years, according to federal Minerals Management Service records. The rig blew up April 20, killing 11 people before sinking and triggering a massive oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

Since January 2005, inspectors issued just one minor infraction for the rig. That strong track record led the agency last year to herald the Deepwater Horizon as an industry model for safety.

The inspection gaps are the latest in a series of questions raised about the agency’s oversight of the oil drilling industry. Members of Congress and President Barack Obama have criticized what they call the cozy relationship between regulators and oil companies and vowed to reform MMS, which both regulates the industry and collects billions in royalties from it.

Earlier AP investigations have shown that the doomed rig was allowed to operate without safety documentation required by MMS regulations for the exact disaster scenario that occurred; that the cutoff valve which failed has repeatedly broken down at other wells in the years since regulators weakened testing requirements; and that regulation is so lax that some key safety aspects on rigs are decided almost entirely by the companies doing the work.

### IRAQ Iraq recount affirms win for Sunni-backed bloc, no widespread fraud

BAGHDAD — Iraq’s electoral commission affirmed on Sunday the narrow victory of a Sunni-backed bloc in the March vote after a partial recount undercut the Shiite prime minister’s claims of fraud in the tally.

The result was a setback for Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, who came in second to former Prime Minister Ayad Allawi by a small margin. But his alliance with another Shiite bloc still gives him a strong chance of holding on to power for another four years.

“I hope that all political blocs are satisfied now that the electoral process was honest and all allegations of fraud and forgery were totally incorrect,” electoral commission spokesman Qassim al-Abboudi told reporters after the results of a recount of votes for the capital, Baghdad, were announced.

“According to the law, political blocks and candidates can appeal these results but we hope that no one will do that,” al-Abboudi said.

### VATICAN CITY Vatican details sex abuse defense in key U.S. case; bishops aren’t employees

The Vatican on Monday will make its most detailed argument yet for why it is not liable for bishops who allowed priests to molest children in the U.S., in a motion that could affect other efforts to sue the Holy See in American courts. The Associated Press has learned.

In a motion to dismiss a lawsuit on jurisdictional grounds, the Holy See is expected to argue that a key Vatican document calling for secrecy in church trials for sex abuse cases was not, as victims’ lawyers say, proof of a Vatican-orchestrated cover up. The Vatican’s U.S. attorney, Jeffrey Lena, said Sunday there was no evidence the document was even known to the archdiocese in question — much less used.

In addition, the Holy See is expected to assert that bishops aren’t Vatican employees because they aren’t paid by Rome, don’t act on Rome’s behalf and aren’t controlled day-to-day by the pope — factors courts use to determine whether employers are liable for the actions of their workers, Lena told the AP.

He said he would suggest to the court that it should avoid using the religious nature of the relationship between bishops and the pope altogether as a basis for civil liability, because it entangles the court in an analysis of complicated religious doctrine that dates back to the apostles.

The Holy See is trying to fend off the first U.S. case to reach the stage of determining whether victims actually have a claim against the Vatican itself for negligence for the failure of bishops to alert police or the public about Roman Catholic priests who molested children.

### FLORIDA Atlantis arrives at space station, astronauts may try to fix pinched cable in spacewalk

CAPE CANAVERAL — Atlantis arrived at the International Space Station on Sunday for what could be its last visit, delivering fresh batteries and other equipment to help keep the outpost running long after the shuttle program ends.

For now, Atlantis’ dance card is empty after this flight, and NASA has just two missions remaining. But there’s a push to keep the space shuttles flying until next June and to give Atlantis one last hurrah. Shuttle commander Kenneth Ham was visibly moved as he floated into the space station. He grabbed two of the station astronauts in a tight embrace.

“It’s bigger than we remember and, speaking for myself, better than I remember,” Ham said. “I love this place.”

# Thai gov't rejects talks, defends deadly crackdown

BANGKOK — Anti-government unrest boiling over in downtown Bangkok spread to other areas of the capital and Thailand Sunday as the military defended its use of force in a crackdown that has left 30 civilians dead in four days. Thai leaders flatly rejected protesters' demands that the United Nations intercede to end the chaos.

Towering plumes of black smoke hung over city streets where protesters set fire to tires, fired homemade rock-ets and threw gasoline bombs at soldiers who used rubber bullets and live ammunition to pick off rioters who approached their lines. Army sharpshooters crouched behind sandbags carefully taking aim and firing to keep attackers at bay.

Leaders of the protesters, who have dubbed themselves Red Shirts, said they wanted

talks mediated by the United Nations, provided the government agreed to an immediate cease-fire and pulled its troops back.

Government spokesman Panitan Wattanayagorn, however, said a pause was unnecessary since troops were "not using weapons to crack down on civilians." The government maintains it is targeting only armed "terrorists" among the demonstrators.

Authorities insisted they would continue the crackdown aimed at choking off the Red Shirts, who have occupied a 1-square-mile protest zone — barricaded by tires and bamboo spikes — in one of Bangkok's ritziest areas since early April. The protesters are demanding that Prime Minister Abhisit Vejjajiva resign immediately, dissolve Parliament and call new elections.

The political conflict is Thailand's deadliest and most prolonged in decades,

and each passing day of violence deepens divides in this nation of 65 million — a key U.S. ally and Southeast Asia's second-largest economy. Thailand has long been considered a democratic oasis in Southeast Asia, and the unrest has shaken faith in its ability to restore and maintain stability.

Soldiers have encircled the core protest site and cut off utilities to the area, which was largely free of violence most of Sunday. Protest leaders told women and children with them to move to a Buddhist temple compound within the zone.

The areas between the site and the military's perimeter have become a no-man's land where gunshots and blasts can regularly be heard. But some of the worst clashes Sunday were behind the military cordon — an indication the unrest was not contained within the protest area and was spreading.

# Volcanic ash to close London's Heathrow airport

LONDON — Europe's busiest airport was set to close early Monday morning as a dense crowd of volcanic ash drifts across England from Iceland, aviation authorities said.

The airspace over London's Heathrow Airport will be closed at 1 a.m. Monday (5 p.m. MDT), Britain's National Air Traffic Service said in a statement late Sunday night.

The restrictions affecting Heathrow — as well as Gatwick, Stansted, and London City airports — will be in place until at least 7 a.m. Monday, the aviation authority said.

Airports across Britain and Ireland were closed for much of Sunday because of the drifting ash. The shifting of the no-fly zone southward will allow airports in northern England — including the key cities of Manchester and Liverpool — to reopen after 1 a.m.

But all airports in Northern Ireland, as well as some Scottish facilities, will remain shut.

In Ireland, Dublin's international airport closed early Sunday evening until at

least noon Monday (5 a.m. MDT). Some airports in Ireland's west were closed and will reopen at different times Monday, but Shannon and southern Cork were open "until further notice."

The British air traffic agency said the ash cloud was changing shape and moving south, toward Oxford, England, 60 miles northwest of London. Britain's weather service says the northwest winds should shift midweek, redirecting the ash away from Britain.

German authorities sent up two test flights Sunday to measure the ash cloud, one from the German Aerospace Center (DLR) and the other from Lufthansa, the country's biggest airline.

The DLR plane flew to southern England then continued north, collecting data from between 10,000 to 23,000 feet. The Lufthansa Airbus A340-600, equipped with special scientific gear, left Frankfurt to fly over northern Germany, the United Kingdom and parts of Scandinavia.

All the data from both flights was immediately sent to aviation authorities in the U.K, the Netherlands

and Germany, said aerospace center spokesman Andreas Schuetz.

Ash can clog jet engines. The April 14 eruption at Iceland's Eyjafjallajokul volcano forced most countries in northern Europe to shut their airspace between April 15-20, grounding more than 100,000 flights and an estimated 10 million travelers worldwide. The shutdown cost airlines more than \$2 billion.

In southern Iceland, activity at the volcano fluctuated Sunday but did not get more intense, civil protection official Agust Gunnar Gylfason said. He blamed the closures on shifting winds.

"What really changes the situation is the weather pattern," he said.

The Icelandic weather service said "presently there are no indications that the eruption is about to end."

Airlines complained bitterly over the air space closures last month, calling them an overreaction. The European air safety agency last week proposed drastically narrowing the continent's no-fly zone because of volcanic ash to 120 miles like the one used in the U.S. The proposal still must be approved.

## How Idaho law changed regarding raw milk

Changes approved by the 2009-10 Idaho Legislature allow for two ways consumers can get raw milk from smaller producers. (Larger Grade A dairies have always been able to sell it, but that requires specialized barns, equipment and sanitation standards.) **First**, a farm can have up to seven cows or 15 goats or sheep that are partially owned by non-farmers; the non-farmers may consume but not sell the raw milk. These are known as herd-share or cow-share operations. **Second**, a farm can have up to three cows or seven goats or sheep producing milk to be sold for human consumption. This is the "small-herd exemption" to the regulations about raw milk that apply to larger operations. Under the new code, the herd-share or small-herd exemption operations do not have to meet Grade A dairy requirements for facilities and equipment. But both Grade A dairies and the smaller operations must meet Grade A requirements for the quality of the raw milk, which includes bacteria limits; the milk is tested frequently. Livestock owners must apply for a permit from the Idaho State Department of Agriculture to sell raw milk to the public, and the operation must meet inspection standards to receive a permit. Gena Herzinger is the only operator in south-central Idaho to receive a permit so far, but several others whom the ISDA did not identify are seeking permits.

# In the raw

## New law permits Buhl goat owner to sell unpasteurized milk

Raw goat milk. Some people wrinkle their noses and wonder why anyone would choose not to pasteurize. But others pull out their wallets and wonder how much they can get and how soon.

"I've always had people approach me about buying milk, because of lactose intolerance or wanting to get back to a more natural product," said Gena Herzinger, whose Buhl goat-raising operation is called Green Grass & Sunshine. Because of new rules approved by the Idaho Legislature during this year's session, for the past two weeks Herzinger has had a permit to sell raw goat milk to her eager patrons.

"To me it tastes better," said Karla Timmons of Twin Falls, one of

Herzinger's early customers. "We grew up on raw milk, whole milk, and what you get in the store just doesn't taste the same."

Because Timmons' husband can't digest cow milk well, the couple had been buying ultra-pasteurized goat milk at Walmart and Fred Meyer, but they prefer to get raw milk from Herzinger's goats because of the unprocessed taste, and because they know the quality of her operation.

"I would be skeptical about buying raw milk from anyone who did not have a permit; you know the safeguards are in place," Timmons said.

Herzinger milks 14 goats a day, and half of those goats produce milk to be sold. The other half she uses to feed the young goats she raises for the other part of her operation: providing breeding animals to herds across

the nation.

She spends about six hours a day with her goats, usually starting at 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.; of that, 45 minutes each morning and each evening is milking, with the rest of the time feeding, processing the milk and cleaning the facility.

"This is a full-time commitment," she said. "You can't not milk them because you don't feel like it. It kind of kills your social life."

But Herzinger enjoys spending time with her goats, praising their intelligence and individual personalities. "They're curious, and their curiosity tends to get them into interesting situations."

She said goats get a bad rap for "eating" tin cans — they're really eating the paper, she said — and for having milk with a bad flavor.

"A lot of people don't understand that goat milk isn't gross if you take care of it and know what you're doing," she said. She noted that the fat globules in goat milk are smaller than those

# On the move with Senior Olympics

## Gooding assisted living center gets residents involved

GOODING — When Willie Henderson broke her hip two months ago, the Bliss resident was sent to Helping Hands of Gooding, an assisted living and rehabilitation center, to recuperate.

The 86-year-old has no plans to call Helping Hands home, and she's doing everything possible to regain the balance, strength and dexterity required for release.

On May 10, Henderson was in the facility's exercise room, working out on a machine resembling a recumbent bike.

"I do this at least once a day. It's supposed to strengthen your muscles, and I need that so I can get out of here," Henderson said.

She didn't know it, but the exercise served as a warmup for the day's Senior Olympics activity — an egg race.

Activities director Roxey Owens said last week's Senior Olympics was a way to get residents excited; more importantly, the games boosted physical activity.

"We have today's egg race and activities throughout the week including dancing, wheelchair races and wheelchair volleyball," Owens said that Monday. "Our facility strives to get our residents up and moving because it's important to overall health."

Meanwhile, staff converted the dining room into a racetrack, marked by small, bright cones. A few residents wheeled their chairs to the starting line while many more stuck to the sidelines, including Henderson and roommate Cookie Ogden, 68.

"It sure looks like this could be great entertainment from here," Ogden said.

Before the pair could settle in to watch the show, they were cornered by staff and prodded to join in. Soon more than a dozen residents, broken into two teams, loitered behind the starting line, willing the race to begin.

Jennifer Langley, nursing staff development coordinator, explained the rules: Residents would remain seated in their wheelchairs and be pushed down the

track, crisscrossing through the cones, while hanging onto a large spoon holding a plastic Easter egg to be deposited into a crate at the end of the track, then be sprinted back to the starting line. The team with the most crated eggs would win.

With the style of a street race, Langley stood, hands above her head, in front of the teams. As her hands came down Langley yelled "Go!" and organized chaos ensued.

"Oh, this is fun!" hollered Ogden as she balanced her egg through the mad dash.

Even in competition, residents and staff rejoiced as each team's egg tally increased. They laughed when residents doubled up on eggs, aided and abetted by staff, to boost the numbers.

The cheating, by both

teams, rendered a final egg count useless. No one seemed to mind.

"This was so much fun. Getting out there helped with the stress," said Christine Dailey, 43. "I'm in here because of bad choices that I made, requiring rehabilitation and learning to walk and do everything again. I do physical therapy every day, and this race kicked my butt!"

Don't think being pushed in a wheelchair counts as exercise? At the end of the race everyone was breathing a bit heavier than before. Talking amongst themselves, residents noted their legs were a bit sore from holding their feet up off the ground during each sprint, so their feet wouldn't get caught in the chair or run over. Bellies ached from laughter.

Even Henderson enjoyed the activity.

"It wasn't as bad as I thought it was going to be," she said.

Program director Dawn Meyer was pleased to notice boosted moral after the race.

"Bodies age, but the spirit doesn't. The spirit still wants to have fun, be competitive and celebrate," Meyer said.

in cow milk, making it more palatable for people with lactose intolerances. "It more closely resembles human milk than cow milk does; it's easier to digest. People like (the probiotics in) Activia, but goat milk already has that."

Herzinger also promotes that her milk comes from just seven goats. "When you buy cow milk in the store, 100,000 animals went into that. The flavor is different from animal to animal, and it's fun to see what the differences are."

Proponents of raw milk say its probiotics are excellent at assisting digestion and the immune system, and that it contains vitamins and amino acids that are destroyed in the pasteurization process. They

say raw milk drinkers also have clearer skin, increased respiratory function and fewer allergies.

On the other hand, opponents argue that potential risks from bacterial contamination — including the potentially deadly E. coli, listeria and salmonella — are much greater with unpasteurized milk, and the safety benefits of pasteurizing outweigh the potential health benefits of drinking raw milk. They especially caution against giving raw milk to children, the elderly, pregnant women and those with compromised immune systems.

During the process to approve Idaho's new regulations, the Legislature debated the pros and cons of raw milk, said Marv

Patten, bureau chief for the Dairy and CAFO Program of the Idaho State Department of Agriculture.

"Raw milk is a controversial topic, and people have their passions one way or the other. It's up to the public to draw their own conclusions about the product," he said.

Herzinger has about 10 customers so far who have decided it is right for their families, and she said she has the capacity to serve about 20 more, depending on how much milk each customer wants per week. With just seven goats, she's producing about 100 half-gallon bottles a week.

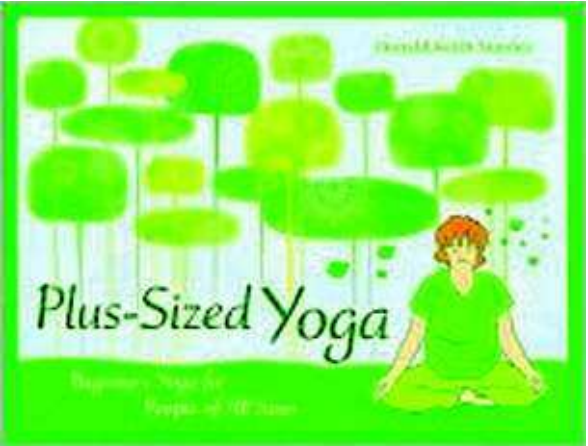
# Full-figure yoga

## Healthy, natural soaps are all in the recipe

Lindsey Mann is a waitress and Mikel Stone is a pedicab driver, but in their spare time they pursue a dream: crafting and selling healthy, chemical-free soaps that smell great and lather up well.

After two years of trial and error, the Denver couple have hit upon several reliable recipes.

"Turns out, handmade soap is a thousand times nicer than the soap that's called 'soap' in grocery stores," says Mann, co-owner with Stone of the Clean Getaway Soap Co. "They're really detergents. You wouldn't drink it, so why would you put it on your skin?"

A similar, au naturel mantra inspired Emily Voth to launch her own soap-making business out of her kitchen more than a dozen years ago. Today, she owns and operates the Kansas City, Mo.-based Indigo Wild, maker of "Zum Bar" soaps and other soaps, spritzes and scrubs, and, more recently, home cleaning supplies.

"I became obsessed about soap" early on, Voth says. "I'm still obsessed!"

Zum Bars are sold in 2,500 stores in the U.S. and a handful of other countries, she says, and Indigo Wild has 13 full-time employees and up to 40 part-time ones. Apparently, natural soap sells.

Voth advises new soap-makers and hobbyists to have fun and not to give up.

"Don't just think because a batch doesn't work out that the recipe won't work," she says.

Failed batches can be melted down to start again, Mann notes — something that soap makers call "rebatching."

"In some cases, some of

our nicest soaps have come from those mistakes," she says.

Voth warns about doubling a recipe, however: It's not like baking, where ingredients get doubled. Making soap is more like a science, she says, and ingredients need to be weighed.

"There's definitely some messing around" with a soap recipe, says Voth. "Once you get it, then don't change anything."

Mann and Stone learned about soap-making by researching it at the library. There also are Web sites that offer soap-making tutorials and beginner recipes.

Making soap can range from using uber-simple, melt-and-pour glycerins to the more advanced, cold-process method. Mann and Stone employ the latter, using several simple ingredients and one that's toxic: lye.

Used by soap-makers for eons, lye is corrosive to human skin, and can damage eyes and lungs.

Lye cannot be avoided, says Stone, because it bonds the oils and water, which usually don't mix well. Once it's mixed in properly, lye loses its toxicity and the soap is safe.

Stone recommends that soap-makers wear long-sleeved shirts and pants, protective goggles and rubber gloves. He and Mann open windows and use fans to ventilate their soap-making room at home. They have separate dishes for soap making to avoid food contamination. And during cleanup, they spray all surfaces — gloves, equipment

and countertops — with white vinegar, which neutralizes the lye.

"There's nothing fancy," says Stone. "You just have to make sure you're being careful with it."

There's nothing fancy about soap-making either. Mann guarantees a simple recipe can be finished in less than an hour.

"It's like a fun art project, all the time," she says.

She and Stone use a base that includes a blend of olive, coconut and palm oils, which they've found creates a soap that lathers and moisturizes but is hard enough to be long-lasting. Their best-selling soaps, sold at Denver-area farmer's markets and online at Etsy.com, are those with lavender, citrus or spicy scents.

Here's the recipe to one of their most popular soaps:

### ORANGE BODY BAR, BY CLEAN GETAWAY SOAP CO.

Makes six 4-ounce bars

Some tips, according to Mann:

- **Orange** essential oil is more stable and less costly than some other oils, so it's good for beginners.
- **For accuracy**, use a lye calculator, such as Majestic Mountain Sage's version at TheSage.com.
- **Never** substitute one oil for another in a recipe because different oils require different amounts of lye.
- **Invest** in an inexpensive immersion blender; stirring soap by hand takes

a long time.

- **It is** important to weigh the essential ingredients.

- **Almost** anything can be used as a soap mold. If using a wood, metal or glass mold, line it with freezer paper. For this recipe, the soap-makers use a white, plastic drawer divider (made by Rubbermaid, it's about 4-by-8 inches). Plastic doesn't need to be lined. If you place your soap in the freezer for a few minutes before removing it from the mold, it will pop out easily.

#### Ingredients:

- 7 5/8-ounce coconut oil (she uses Coconut 76, which refers to the melting point)
- 3 5/8-ounce palm oil (not palm kernel oil)
- 5 3/8-ounce olive oil
- 6 ounces tap water (if you have hard water, buy and use distilled water)
- 2 1/2 ounces lye
- 2 teaspoons orange essential oil
- 1 teaspoon annatto powder, optional, for color (a spice available at many specialty stores; if unavailable, turmeric may be used)

#### Supplies:

- Gloves
- Apron
- Protective goggles
- Clean spray bottle
- Four bowls, such as Pyrex, including one at least 8 cups large
- Scale (for weighing ingredients)
- Measuring spoons and cups
- Immersion blender (optional but recommended)
- Ventilated cake rack
- Soap mold
- White vinegar (in case of lye spills)

#### Instructions:

1. **Put** on protective gear: long-sleeved shirt and pants, apron, gloves and goggles. Fill the spray bottle with full-

strength white vinegar in case of a lye spill.

2. **Weigh** the coconut and palm oils, and combine them in a large, heatproof bowl.

3. **In** three separate bowls, weigh the olive oil, water and lye.

4. **If** using color, mix the annatto powder (or turmeric) with 1 tablespoon olive oil and set aside.

5. **Make** sure you have good ventilation (open windows, turn on fans). Slowly add lye to the water, stirring constantly until all the lye is dissolved. *Never add water to lye*; the lye solution will get very hot (above 212 degrees Fahrenheit) and will steam.

6. **Add** hot lye solution to the coconut-palm oil mixture. The heat from the solution will melt the fats. Cover to reduce heat loss, about 5 minutes.

7. **After** the fats have melted, add the olive oil and blend with an immersion blender in 10-second bursts. It will take about 2 minutes to reach "trace." (Trace is a technical term referring to the point at which a little soap dribbled onto the surface of the mixture will remain there for a few seconds. It's a little thicker than shampoo, but not as thick as pudding. It's at trace that most of the lye has been converted — the best time to add "fragile" ingredients such as essential oils, color or oils that would otherwise be damaged by the lye.)

8. **After** trace has been reached, stir in orange essential oil and color-oil mixture. Mix well.

9. **Pour** soap mixture into a prepared mold. Cover and insulate with an old towel.

10. **Allow** soap mold to sit for 24 to 48 hours. Remove the mold, cut the soap into bars, and place them on a ventilated cake rack to cure, or age, for four to six weeks.

## How to stop teeth grinding

Roughly 20 percent of adults grind or clench their teeth to the point that they're at risk for permanent tooth and jaw damage, dentists say. Here are tips for protecting your pearly whites:

**Recognize the symptoms.** Those include flattened, worn or chipped teeth; jaw pain or tightness; gum sensitivity to hot or cold temperatures; and earaches and headaches, especially right after you wake up. Bedmates also may hear clicking or squeaking noises as you sleep. Call your dentist right away.

**Work to relieve stress ...** Regular meditation, deep breathing, exercise and enjoyable hobbies will help; some people also benefit from talking to a therapist.

**... especially right before bedtime.** Take a bath, listen to soft music, read a favorite book or drink a glass of warm milk. Holding a warm washcloth against your jaw for about 10 minutes can help relax those muscles.

**Wear a mouth guard.** Protective dental devices keep teeth from rubbing together at night. Custom-made guards — available from your dentist — are more expensive than over-the-counter varieties, but they're typically less likely to dislodge during grinding.

**Cut back on alcohol and caffeine.** Both can make a grinding problem worse, especially if you eat or drink either shortly before bedtime.

**Train yourself not to clench.** During the day, notice if you are pressing your teeth together and work to hold them apart even if your lips are sealed. Putting the tip of your tongue between your front teeth may help.

**Talk to a doctor.** People with a severe grinding problem may benefit from a temporary prescription for muscle relaxants or even surgery. Just be aware that medical interventions may have unpleasant side effects; relaxants, for example, can be addictive over time.

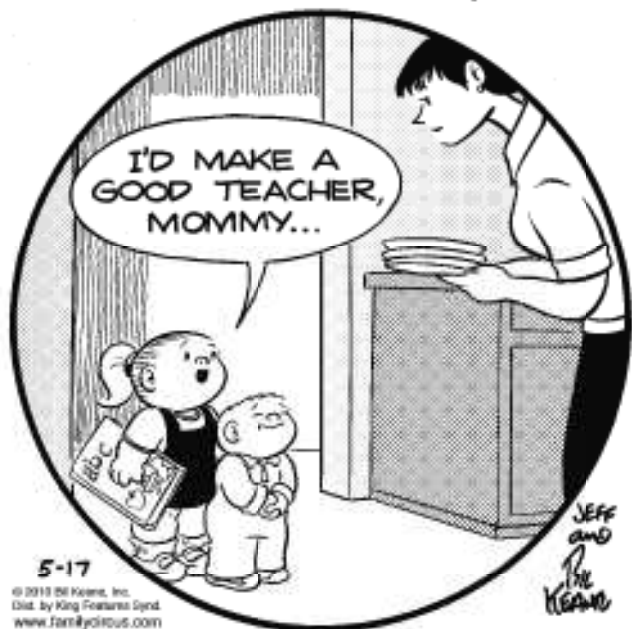

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"You're leaping over the hedge before you come to the stile."  
— Miguel de Cervantes

Today's deal is perhaps misleadingly straightforward, until you consider the implications of the auction. If you declare four hearts from the South seat, you might imagine there would be no problem in taking 10 tricks. You'd expect to be able to draw trumps and ruff a spade in dummy.

However, the auction has indicated that spades will surely split 6-0, and if trumps are 4-0, you may find that the route to 10 tricks will be a rocky one if you don't start out properly.

The key to the deal is that even if hearts do break 4-0, you will not be able to trump a spade in the dummy without your spade ace getting ruffed away. However, the hearts in dummy are robust enough to draw West's trumps.

This means that a dummy reversal is the safest line: win the diamond ace, ruff a diamond, play a heart to the king, and ruff a diamond high. Then take the heart queen, followed by a heart to dummy to draw trumps and claim.

One piece of advice that bridge columns give the improving player is to get the women and children off the streets — i.e., draw trumps as soon as possible. But the corollary is that if you want to ruff the side suits, don't draw trumps.

Try to make the contract if you play anything but a diamond from the dummy at trick two. But don't work too hard at it — it can't be done!

ANSWER: Your partner's double calls for an unusual lead, typically with a void and a trick on the side. He did not have to double to get you to lead a club (you would probably have done that without the double, since East was clearly ready for a heart lead), so with some fear and trembling, lead a low diamond. Maybe your RHO is 5-5 in spades and diamonds.

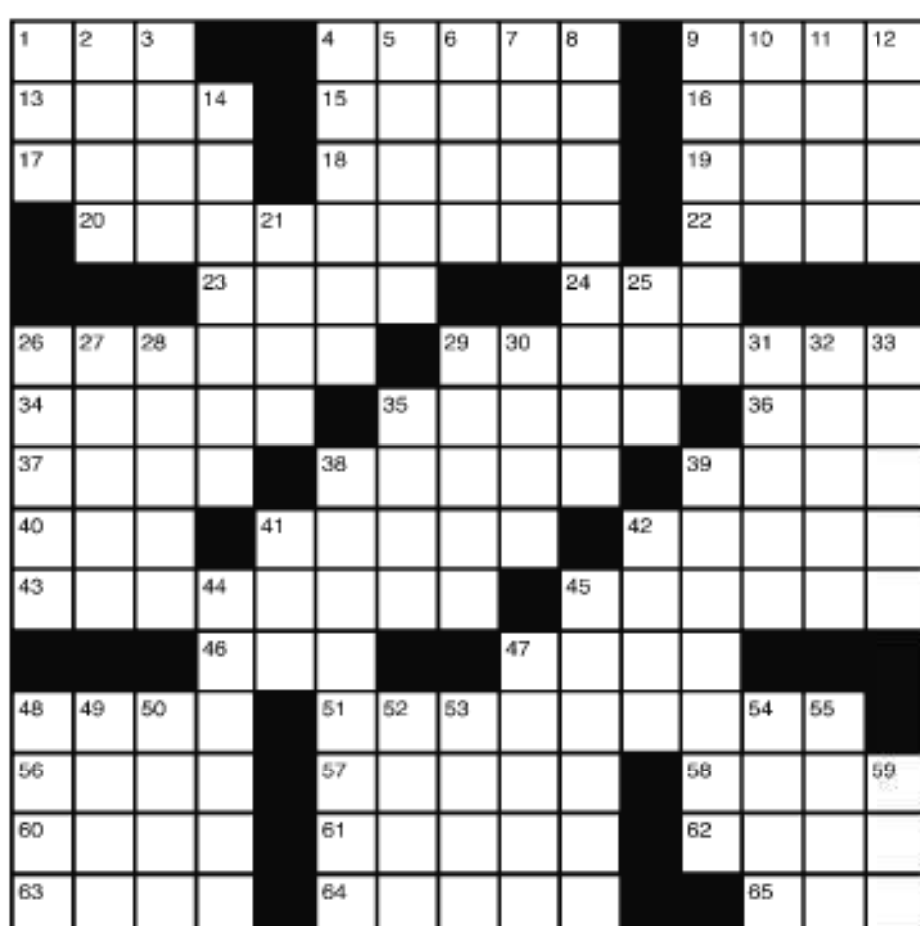

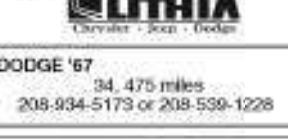

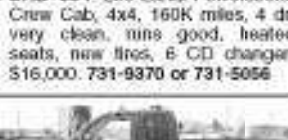
