### Gift from Twin Falls raised spirits of Vietnam vet while serving tour

It was Christmas 1970, and U.S. Army Maj. Joel Nelson was fighting through his second tour of duty in Vietnam.

Then, he said, “in the middle of all that chaos,” a town he’d never heard of sent him a pick-me-up.

Nelson still has the worn green cloth bag that arrived packed with a razor, pencils, M&M’s and other goodies. And on Tuesday, he visited for the first time the city inscribed on its stitched label: “American Red Cross, Twin Falls Chapter, Twin Falls, Idaho.”

“It’s funny how you’ve never visited a place, but you have a warm feeling for it,” Nelson, now 72 and of Augusta, Ga., said during a brief stop at the *Times-News*.

Now retired, Nelson and his wife, Shirley, this week are traveling through the only U.S. states they haven’t seen yet — Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana. Tuesday’s leg of the trip, from Ontario, Ore., to Jackson Hole, Wyo., gave them the opportunity for a quick peek at Twin Falls.

They brought with them Joel Nelson’s goodie bag, now stained from shoe-shining

supplies but otherwise in decent shape. It doesn’t even have a hole in it, Nelson noted, even after he carried it throughout the war-torn Asian nation.

The Red Cross’ gesture left an impression on the Army officer. He said he feels a kinship with Twin Falls, an opinion bolstered by his brief visit Tuesday.

“It was very meaningful,” he said of the gift. Both of Nelson’s tours in Vietnam were with the 1st Cavalry Division,

and he got a good look around, traveling almost everywhere but the very southern part of the country.

The mail was “spotty at best,” he recalled, fairly reliable but slow. To keep in touch, he and his wife used 3-inch reel-to-reel tape recorders — state of the art at the time, he said.

His tour included the Battle of Khe Sanh, an experience that gave him nightmares for decades until he returned to the site and made his peace in 1994.

“I didn’t go for that reason,” he said of the

trip for veterans, sponsored by a group out of Seattle. But the trip helped, he said.

After Nelson’s Army stint, from which he retired as a lieutenant colonel, he returned to the U.S. to spend 30 years as the assistant to a psychiatrist at a Georgia state mental hospital — a job that consistently shocked him even after witnessing the horrors of war.

He never tried to track down anyone from the Twin Falls Red Cross, he said. But this week’s trip gave him an excuse to at least see what the area looks like, as well as visit the grave of an old Army buddy in Augusta, Mont.

He’s never met any of the kind souls who packed his gift bag, he said. But he knows what he’d do if he saw them.

“I’d give them a big hug and tell them I really appreciated it.”

### Aston accused of stealing money from Minidoka Co., other organizations

RUPERT — A Minidoka County official has been charged with grand theft after allegedly stealing \$4,590 from the county, a state organization for building officials and the organization’s regional chapter. Minidoka County Community Development

Director Paul K. Aston, 57, was charged Monday with one count of felony grand theft after Minidoka County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson requested an Idaho State Police investigation into the alleged theft.

Aston is scheduled to be arraigned in Minidoka County 5th District Magistrate Court at 8:30 a.m. May 27.

According to the criminal complaint, between Feb. 24, 2005, and Sept. 30, 2008, Aston is suspected of taking money from Minidoka County, The Idaho Association of Building Officials and the IABO’s regional Idaho High Desert Chapter.

Jack D. Soloaga Jr. was sentenced Tuesday to two years of supervised probation and ordered to pay fines and restitution, after admitting to battering a judge and the College of Southern Idaho Foundation director on Jan. 1.

Soloaga, 27, filed a guilty plea in March to two counts of misdemeanor battery, and lodged with the court letters of apology to CSI Foundation Director Curtis Eaton and

proposed project mirrors how the community came together to build the original rodeo arena in 1947.

In its 63rd year, however, the rodeo grounds are showing their age, and some Hailey residents have questioned the value of downtown property in a prominent location along Idaho Highway 75 that is used only a handful of days each year.

Approval of the levy would change that, Keefer said, allowing the construction of a 38,153-square-foot indoor ice rink that would operate from November through April, and open to other events in the summer. The new rodeo arena could host car shows and concerts, she said, and an expanded skateboard park would provide skateboarders a variety of street skating obstacles the current park doesn't feature.

"The new plan honors the rodeo and its heritage, while meeting the needs of the 21st century," she said. "Who would've thought when they built the rodeo arena that skateboarding would be so popular today?"

The multi-use facility would also include an interpretive center with museum-quality displays, she said.

Some Hailey residents oppose the bond, however, saying it's wrong to ask voters to pay more taxes when people are losing their homes and jobs.

"Also, they have no business plan," said Hailey alternative medicine practitioner Mark Cook. "They don't know how many people have to skate there or how many concerts you have to hold there for the facility to pay for itself."

Keefer countered that construction, planned to begin after the city's annual July 4 rodeo, would put people to work.

Reynolds, who plays women's hockey, acknowledged that the timing for a levy isn't great, but said the facility is needed.

"We've spent a lot of time looking for places for an indoor ice rink, none of which worked out, and we're running out of possible sites," she said, adding that scheduling ice time has been difficult for the Wood River Valley's various hockey teams.

Bobbitt said the new arena will accommodate a rodeo that has been voted the year's best by cowboys competing in eastern Idaho, northern Utah and western Wyoming for the past five years.

And Fairbrother said the expanded skate park would help ease crowding and give beginning skaters something different than the current park's steep runs and bowls.

"And less than 25 percent of skateboarders like that style," he said. "Most prefer street skating."

# Let's run Jerome up the flagpole

Well, now you've done it Jerome County. You've got yourself listed on badflags, a website (<http://www.badflags.files.wordpress.com>) that's also available on Facebook. These folks, who clearly need to move out of their mothers' basements real soon, get together and make sport of the wonderful world of vexillology, which is the arcane study of flags.

Here's what they have to say about Jerome's banner:

"Aside from being home to a Japanese internment camp during World War II, Jerome County, Idaho, has a awful flag. Even for a county in the state that elected a U.S. senator with the last name of Crapo ...

"A factory, a cow and a tractor. Hmm. I think of the tractor and the cow at least one is redundant. And what does it take to get a potato up in here? Give the people what they want, Jerome County, Idaho!"

The county's standard is its seal superimposed on a blue field. The seal was a

project of the Idaho Centennial Commission, which a quarter century ago encouraged each of Idaho's 44 counties to draw up an official logo.

Jerome's county logo is moderately silly, but not as much as Gooding County's, which is inscribed "Agriculture Recreation Prehistoric Horse." Or Lincoln's County seal, updated just a few years ago, which is a silhouette of a tractor with President Lincoln's top hat above it.

Of course, the Great Seal of the State of Idaho is more than a little laughable.

Emma Edwards Green's 120-year-old design includes an obviously unwashed miner packing a pick-ax and a woman in a floor-length white dress, with an elk standing between them and holding a badge-shaped shield



bearing a paint-by-numbers portrait of a river — or is it the Low-Line Canal? — at sunrise.

The seal has forestry in it — a single tree — and agriculture, which consists of a couple of cornucopias brimming with what looks to be Hubbard squash, plus a sheaf of wheat and a nosegay of syringas, our state flower.

And it's all topped by a scroll bearing the state motto, "Esto perpetua," which translates as "a Saturday night in Rexburg only seems like forever."

It has none of the elements of the authentic Idaho: Kochia, Spudnuts, fry sauce, beet dumps, jacked-up pickup trucks,

Kuna, green Jell-O, Californians and the fact that folks who live north of the Salmon River and those who live south of it are still waiting to be introduced.

Our state flag is merely our seal surrounded by blue. The North American Vexillological Association ranked it 64th-best of the 72 flags of the states, the territories, the District of Columbia and the Canadian provinces.

Voters assailed Idaho's flag as a "seal on a bed-sheet" and pointed out that it is essentially indistinguishable from most of the other flags of Western states, except possibly for our neighbor's, whose banner is helpfully labeled "M-O-N-T-A-N-A" in big block letters and ranks 70th.

That's pretty feeble. But it makes Jerome County's flag look good.

to a tea party favorite who said voters don't want "the same old, same old politicians."

Fingers planted firmly in the wind, Washington incumbents will be dialing up their consultants and asking how to survive this angry-as-heck headwind.

Some early answers:

**RECONNECT WITH VOTERS:** Too many incumbents take their seats for granted, comfortable in the thought that their monied connections, tailor-made districts and name recognition will carry them to victory. Not so much this year.

"My advice to candidates would be, roll up your sleeves. You've got some connecting to do," said Democratic consultant Chris Kofinis.

"Pay attention to your knitting," said Republican consultant Ron Kaufman. "Get out of Washington and

back to your district."

Consultants in both parties point to Sen. Bob Bennett of Utah as the classic example of an incumbent who lost touch with his constituents. He was denied a spot on the ballot at a Utah Republican convention earlier this month.

"You could say he lost because of the political environment and the tea party," said Kaufman. "You could also say he was tone deaf."

**DON'T FLIP-FLOP:** Specter's Democratic opponent cast him as a political opportunist who switched from the Republican Party just to get elected, a charge that stuck with voters because, well, Specter confessed to it. "My change in party will enable me to be re-elected ...," Specter said at one point, handing his rival fodder for a devastating TV ad.

Voting against Specter on

Tuesday, college professor Tom Cragin said, "He must think we're idiots."

Lincoln changed positions on legislation important to labor unions, undercutting her credibility.

**STAND APART:** Republican consultant Ben Ginsberg said politicians of all stripes might start distancing themselves from their party leadership. "I expect candidates will start telling voters how they fought against Harry Reid and Mitch McConnell," the Democratic and Republican leaders in the Senate.

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich said Bennett lost in part because he was "too reasonable," meaning he was a get-along guy when voters are looking for somebody who will buck authority. "People want folks who have an edge," he said, "and will fight."

**DON'T GET IN TROUBLE:** The first House

incumbent to lose his seat this year, Democratic Rep. Alan Mollohan of West Virginia, fell in a primary to an opponent who highlighted ethics issues.

As if incumbents didn't have enough trouble in the primaries, both parties had other issues.

Rep. Mark Souder, a conservative Republican from Indiana, abruptly announced he would resign on Friday, admitting he had had an affair with a woman on his congressional payroll. Democrats said his resignation would make the seat competitive in the fall.

And Democrat Richard Blumenthal, the Connecticut attorney general running for the Senate, disputed a newspaper report that he once lied about his Vietnam record. Republicans focused on the report, hoping it would increase their chances of winning the seat.

# Air Force gives F-35 update in Twin Falls

Idaho's Mountain Home Air Force Base is still in the running to be an operating base for the F-35A Lightning II Joint Strike Fighter.

Attendees at the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce luncheon on Tuesday heard from Col. Peter Lee, the 366th Fighter Wing vice wing commander at the base.

It's expected that a list of preferred bases for the F-35 operation will be announced in July or August, Lee said.

Separately, Boise's Gowen Field is one of the possibilities for F-35 training aircraft and facilities. The two locations are being pitched by the state as an ideal path for the F-35 operation because of their close proximity.

There would still be much work ahead after the summer if Idaho remains in the running for the operation. For example, there would still need to be an environmental impact study of the area, which likely would be finished sometime in 2011, Lee said.

In talking with an Air Force general about the F-35 push, Lee said his superior was impressed with the amount of support the state has shown for the effort.

The base's qualities that make it ideal include: its room for growth, good fly-

### Sawtooth Forest to conduct user surveys

# Shoshone, Bliss and Castleford voters support school districts' request for help

Three Magic Valley school districts opened the polls to voters Tuesday, relying on parents and patrons to pass supplemental levies amid the deepest budget cuts in decades.

Shoshone School District Superintendent Mel Wiseman said voters approved his district's request for a two-year, \$300,000 per year supplemental levy.

He said there were 201 ballots cast with 69.3 percent voting in favor of the levy.

"The school board and district would really like to thank the community for showing up to support us at this time," Wiseman said.

The district's current \$299,870 levy will expire at the end of July, so the levy approved Tuesday will stave off further cuts.

Bliss residents approved their school district's request for a 10-year, \$40,000-per-year plant facilities levy Tuesday, said Bliss School District Clerk Michele Elliot.

She said 104 ballots were cast with more than 67 percent voting in favor of the levy, which will help maintain the Bliss School

District's school house, elementary building and student transportation.

The approved levy is not new, but rather an extension of funding support that started in 1980.


Castleford voters also approved their school district's request for a two-year continuance of its \$300,000 supplemental levy. District Superintendent Andy Wiseman said

177 ballots were cast with 153 voting in favor of the levy.

The money from the levy will help maintain existing programs, staff positions and provide programs that aid in student achievement.

District administrators said the proposed levy extension would not increase taxes.

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# Coiner calls flyers inaccurate

Sen. Chuck Coiner isn't sure how a pro-life organization reached its conclusions about his supposed support of Planned Parenthood.

Regardless of the reason, the Twin Falls Republican faces this: with the May 25 primaries against challenger Lee Heider looming, voters in his district have received flyers from Idaho Chooses Life that blast Coiner's views on abortion and families as "radical."

The flier, for example, takes Coiner to task for a number of votes, including a 2005 vote on a bill that the organization describes as "a move to give some \$15 million in additional state funding for Planned Parenthood to provide more 'family planning'."

That one has Coiner wondering where the information is coming from.

"I have no clue what this means about \$15 million in additional state funding for Planned Parenthood," Coiner said.

The bill's text and proposed financial details on the Legislature's website make no mention of Planned Parenthood or anything close to \$15 million.

The bill, which died in the House, was intended to expand family planning health care services to low-income women and eventually save the state money because of fewer unplanned pregnancies.

"My stance is I don't believe in abortion as a measure of birth control and I do think in cases of rape and incest ... it's a viable option in those cases," said Coiner, pointing out that the bill did not cover abortion services.

Even if every penny of the state's estimated cost for the bill went to Planned Parenthood, the funding would have been far less than \$15 million, records show.

The proposal's cost for the first year was \$212,500, and \$300,694 for the second year, according to the bill's fiscal note.

So where did the \$15 million figure for Planned Parenthood come from?

David Ripley, executive director of Idaho Chooses Life, said the statement was justified because Planned Parenthood backed the bill and the estimate used on the bill was low-balled.

When asked how the \$15 million figure was calculated, Ripley pointed to a letter to the editor signed by Rep. Bill Sali, R-Kuna, and five other legislators that ran in the *Times-News*.

"You'll just have to read the letter and make up your mind," he said.

The letter makes no mention of Planned Parenthood, but does say the bill "would have provided \$15 million over five years for 'family planning.'"

No explanation of how the figure was reached is in the letter, either.

"I think our \$15 million figure is pretty low, to tell you the truth," Ripley said.

# SIRCOMM board proposes raises, otherwise tight budget

JEROME — Employees at the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center may see merit raises this fall, assuming the four counties that pay their salaries decide such a move is worthwhile.

But overall payroll expenses would decline somewhat in the dispatch center's 2010-11 fiscal year, according to a preliminary budget passed on to the counties Monday by SIRCOMM's governing Joint Powers Board.

Officials said a change to the way revenues are measured makes up almost all of the difference between the current year's \$2.19 million budget and the \$2.78 million proposed for the next fiscal year, which starts in October.

SIRCOMM provides emergency dispatch services for about 40 agencies in Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Twin Falls counties. Its board consists of one county commissioner from each of the four counties.

Board members unanimously voted Monday afternoon to pass on the draft budget to their counties for consideration. But first, they debated pushing for the raises at a time when at least two counties are considering flat budgets for next year.

The raises, averaging 3 percent for those who receive them, would be the first in two years and paid for through 3 percent increases in county contributions. Benefits will also increase, partly due to a 9.4 percent increase in health-insurance rates through Blue Cross of Idaho that will actually start in June.

Proponents, including board Chairman Tom Mikesell, a Twin Falls County commissioner, said the raises will help keep qualified, trained employees at SIRCOMM — one has already recently left for a better-paying job elsewhere. But Tom Faulkner, a commissioner from Gooding County, said he's not sure his county will be able to increase its contribution and questioned paying government workers more at a time when county resi-

dents are seeing less.

Mikesell argued that the increased county share is very little per taxpayer compared with the value SIRCOMM will get out of it.

"It's not a lot of money out of your budget ... to ensure that when someone dials 911, the appropriate response is sent," he told Faulkner.

While the \$1.94 million budget portion not covered by the counties looks like an increase on paper, SIRCOMM Director John Moore said, the increase is actually due to better accounting of telephone fees collected and passed on to both the unaffiliated city of Twin Falls' dispatch center and a state emergency communications fund.

Paying off a long-term debt will free money up for technological improvements, including meeting a federal mandate about broadcast frequencies.

Moore's wages also come out of the phone fees and would be cut on paper, while rising in reality to a possible \$70,000 — the \$75,000 listed as his salary last year is inaccurate and had been left on there during a search for a director, Mikesell said.

The budget proposal is a tight one, officials said, and may have to shrink further if one or more counties reject it — though it wasn't clear what the board might be able to further cut.

"I think there's a good chance that it will decrease," Mikesell said.

# Incumbents have edge in Minidoka commission race

The nearly 13 years of experience that incumbents Dan Stapelman and Lynn Hunsaker bring to Minidoka County Commission are valuable.

That’s why we’re endorsing Stapelman in his rematch with Kent McClellan and Hunsaker over Sheryl Koyle in Tuesday’s Republican primary.

Minidoka County’s evolving economy is expanding at 2.1 percent a year — the second-highest growth rate in Magic Valley behind Jerome County. That transition from an overwhelmingly agricultural county to one with a more mixed economy brings with it challenges, ranging from changing property values to managing suburban sprawl. So far, Hunsaker and Stapelman have shown they’re up to the job.

The biggest change at the Minidoka County Courthouse is the impending retirement of Duane Smith, the county clerk for the past 27 years.

Few county elected officials in south-central Idaho know the nuts-and-bolts business of government as well as Smith or possess his institutional knowledge.

Three candidates have emerged to succeed him, and they’ll be on the Republican ballot on May 25: Rob Neiwert, Patty Temple and Donna Hayden-Bush.

Either Neiwert or Temple, in our judgment, would be worthy successors to Smith — Neiwert because of his 15 years’ experience at the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center (the last 18 months as director) and Temple because of her 23 years on the county payroll, working in the clerk’s and assessor’s offices.



# Safe food would save lives, money

At age 2, Kyle Allgood of Chubbuck, Idaho, became sickened by a deadly strain of *E. coli* O157:H7, from contaminated spinach. When Kyle’s abdominal pains would not subside, he was flown to a Salt Lake City hospital, where his downward spiral ended in kidney failure, a heart attack and, ultimately, death.



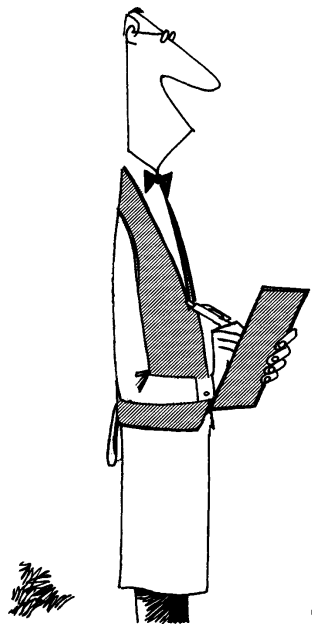

The tragedy the Allgood family endured is far from rare. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that each year, food-borne illness strikes tens of millions of Americans, hospitalizes hundreds of thousands and kills several thousand — mostly young children like Kyle, the elderly or others who are especially vulnerable. Despite these shocking numbers, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration — which regulates about 80 percent of the nation’s food supply — does not require food companies, or the agency’s own inspectors, to test products for bacteria. The FDA also has no authority to mandate that food companies recall products, or directly penalize those that violate the law.

A strong federal food-oversight bill was passed last summer by a bipartisan majority in the U.S. House of Representatives. Yet since then, there have been more than 60 separate recalls of FDA-regulated products that were known or sus-

pected to be contaminated. Meanwhile, the U.S. Senate food-safety bill was unanimously approved by its key committee before last Thanksgiving.

It is time for a final vote. The need for Congress to pass this legislation is highlighted by the fact that the vast number of food-borne disease outbreaks in recent years were linked to FDA-regulated products such as spinach, peppers, peanut butter products and cookie dough. Any significant update to FDA food-safety law would be the first in more than 70 years.

When that outdated law was enacted, Americans ate less processed food, and meals often came from local producers. In the 21st century, any given meal can contain ingredients from across the nation and many countries around the globe. Yet the FDA annually inspects only about 1 per-

cent of shipments of imported foods before they come into the United States.

FDA oversight of domestic food facilities is also in need of significant improvement. A recent Department of Health and Human Services inspector general report found that inspections of food companies’ plants have decreased over the last several years, and that 56 percent of facilities did not receive an FDA inspection over a recent five-year period. The report recommended that FDA seek more effective enforcement tools and get better access to food facility records — both of which the agency supported in its response.

Furthermore, a recent study authored by a former FDA economist and published by the Produce Safety Project — an initiative of The Pew Charitable Trusts at Georgetown University —

estimates the health-related impact of food-borne illness across the nation to be a combined \$152 billion annually. This cost, coupled with the public health impacts of pathogens in the food supply, make a vote on the Senate bill even more important.

The longer it takes Congress to pass food-safety legislation, the greater the likelihood that more Americans will unnecessarily suffer or die as a result of the nation’s outdated food-protection authorities.

As Kyle’s mother, Robyn Allgood, has said, it might be too late for her son, but “no family should have to go through this — we can save other children.”

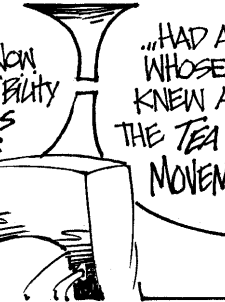
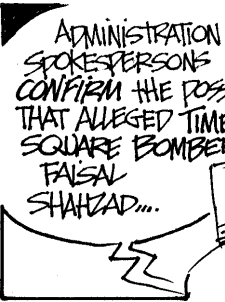


I also find it interesting

## Exchanges to impose new trading rules

NEW YORK — U.S. stock exchanges would briefly halt trading of some stocks that have big prices swings under new trading rules aimed at avoiding market plunges, according to two people familiar with the plan.

The rules are expected to begin in mid-June under a six-month pilot program agreed to by exchanges and regulators, the people said. They spoke on condition of anonymity because the plan has not been made public.

An announcement is expected this week.

Under the plan, trading of any Standard & Poor's 500 stock that

rises or falls 10 percent or more would be halted for five minutes. These rules, known as “circuit breakers,” would be applied if the price swing occurs between 7:45 a.m. and 1:35 p.m. Mountain time. That’s almost the entire trading day.

The rules are intended to prevent a repeat of the May 6 market plunge in which the Dow Jones industrials fell to a loss of almost 1,000 points in less than 30 minutes. The pilot program is scheduled to end Dec. 10. Regulators and the exchanges would then decide whether to widen the program to include other stocks, according to the people.

Federal investigators on Tuesday will submit preliminary

findings into the plunge, Securities and Exchange Commission Chairman Mary Schapiro told a gathering of financial analysts. She said the exchanges were also expected to propose new trading rules.

Schapiro appeared from Washington by video link rather than traveling to speak in Boston to the Chartered Financial Analysts Institute’s convention, citing the demands of an investigation she said is “keeping me up at all hours of the morning.”

She said her agency is “looking at a number of issues we think can be remediated quickly even before we understand necessarily what the exact cause of the crash was.”

The May 6 plunge briefly wiped out more than \$1 trillion in the market value of stocks. The Dow later recovered somewhat to finish the day down 347 points.

The plunge stunned Wall Street and Washington, and prompted calls for changes in securities market rules and procedures. Most of the 50 or so U.S. exchanges regulate themselves and design their own tools for slowing or halting trading.

During the plunge, the New York Stock Exchange slowed trading according to its rules, but the orders that couldn’t be executed automatically migrated in a torrent to electronic exchanges, industry officials said.

## HP net income surges amid mending computer market

SAN FRANCISCO — Hewlett-Packard Co.’s latest numbers show how deeply dependent the company is on personal computers even as it aggressively expands into more lucrative areas.

HP reported after the stock market closed Tuesday that its net income jumped 28 percent and revenue rose 13 percent in

the February-April period, both signs that increased demand for computers is helping heal a battered technology industry.

The numbers beat Wall Street’s forecasts and HP raised its 2010 revenue and adjusted profit forecasts, sending its shares higher.

HP earned \$2.2 billion, or 91 cents per share, in its fiscal second quarter, which ended April 30. It earned \$1.7 billion,

or 71 cents per share, in the same period last year.

Excluding special items, it earned \$1.09 per share. Analysts expected \$1.05 per share on that basis.

The results mark a continued growth in profit at HP, the world’s No. 1 maker of PCs and printers. Although HP had been making money even during the height of the recession, its net income had been getting smaller each quarter. But

for three straight quarters now, net income has been growing.

Revenue rose to \$30.8 billion, better than the \$29.8 billion that analysts polled by Thomson Reuters expected. In the same quarter a year earlier, revenue was \$27.4 billion.

For 2010, HP is now predicting revenue of \$123.7 billion to \$124.9 billion, which topped

## New home construction rises in April

Construction of homes in the United States surged in April to the highest level in 18 months, fueled by buyers capitalizing on an expiring tax credit. The average number of permits issued nationwide for new construction sank, signaling the rebound could fade.

Regionally, at least two cities in south-central Idaho reported continued growth in new home permits — an indication of home construction in coming months.

Home construction in Twin Falls and Jerome surged in April to the highest level in nearly three years, according to permits filed with both cities. The number of permits issued year-to-date is at its highest level since 2008.

Low mortgage rates and two tax credits — up to \$8,000 for new buyers and \$6,500 for current owners who buy and move into another home — have boosted home sales this year. To receive a tax credit, borrowers had to have a signed offer by April 30 and must close the deal by the end of June.

## Workers to government: Keep your hands off my 401k

DES MOINES, Iowa — What happens when the government considers tinkering with retirement accounts and asks for citizen input? It gets plenty.

Government officials began seeking comments in February on a proposal to add an annuity option to retirement plans. Such an option would potentially turn a portion of a retiree’s savings over to an insurance company in exchange for a monthly check.

Annuities reduce the chance retirees will outlive their savings. In addition, the risk of losing money if the stock market drops is minimized.

However, retirees lose the upside potential of the stock market, and the flexibility to spread out their investment portfolio, in exchange for a monthly check.

The departments of Labor and Treasury requested input on the annuity issue as they pondered solutions to a serious problem that plagues current savings plans — retirees running out of money.

The government expected the usual responses from insurance and investment industry groups, but not hundreds of letters and e-mail from workers and retirees.

“KEEP YOUR SLIMEY HANDS OFF MY MONEY,” says one letter.

By the May 3 deadline, 700 responses were received, far more than usual.

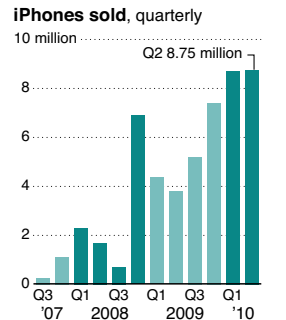

## Apple’s iPhone does well without being the best

SEATTLE — It’s been three years, an eternity for gadgets, since Apple Inc. unveiled the iPhone, and by now other phones do some things better. Yet Apple is selling more iPhones than ever.

What is it about the iPhone? Its success shows how Apple has triumphed at two crucial qualities: status and simplicity. And it’s a reminder that while intense Apple fans will obsess over the upgrades the iPhone is expected to get this summer,

such details won’t matter as much to everyday buyers.

Other phones have higher-resolution cameras and can shoot high-definition video. The processor seems faster in new phones such as the Droid Incredible. A more energy-efficient touch-screen technology is eclipsing the one used in the iPhone screen.

“This thing is not state of the art,” says ABI Research analyst Michael Morgan.

But whether the iPhone has the best technology doesn’t seem to be the question most people ask.

Instead, many people crave the aura of cool that iPhones seem to convey.

The allure extends to China, where Apple started selling iPhones in October. “I’m quite amazed about what the iPhone has achieved,” says Deng Jinchun, a manager at Jing Lang, a large iPhone retailer in China’s Hunan province. With slight changes, “Apple has been selling the same phone for about three years and the sales are still increasing. I can’t imagine a Nokia phone or any other brand could achieve something similar.”

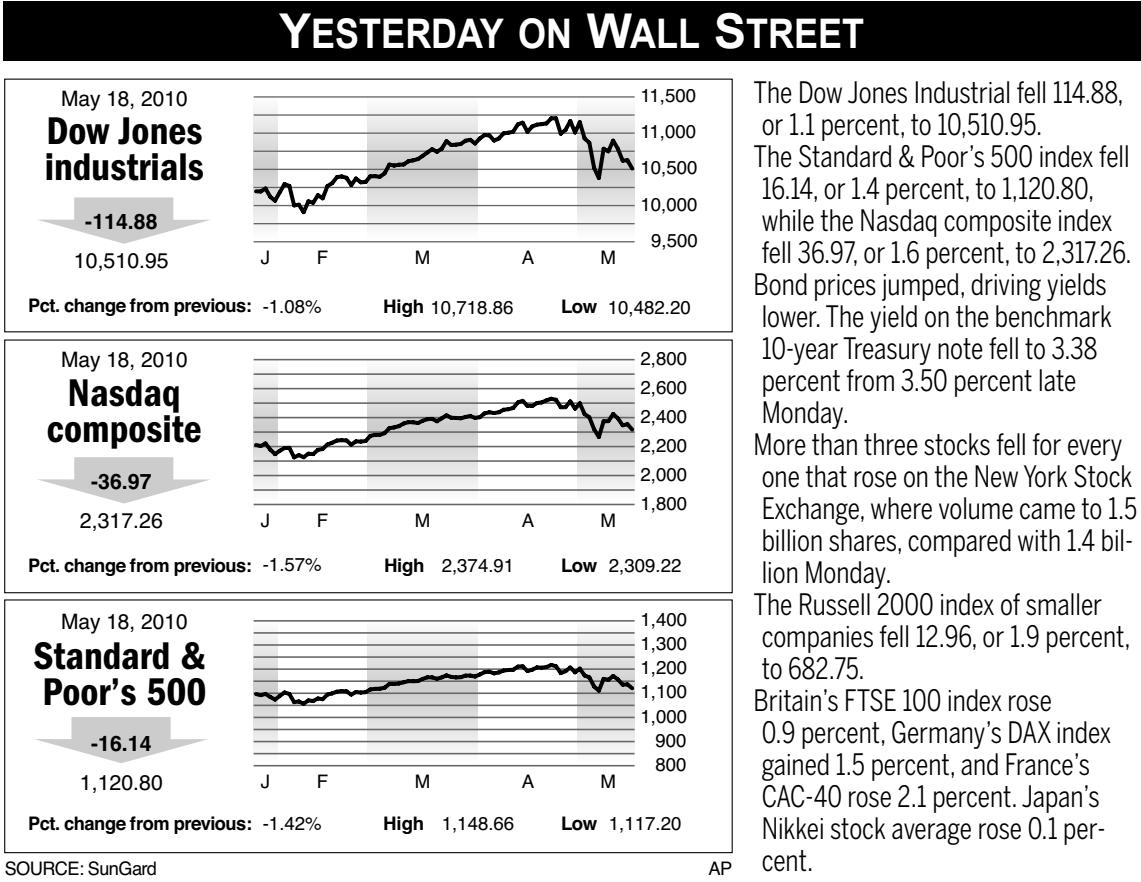

# Report: U.S. repeated 9/11 failures in Christmas plot

WASHINGTON — Despite a top-to-bottom overhaul of the intelligence community after the 2001 terrorist attacks, the nation's security system showed some of the same failures when it allowed a would-be bomber to slip aboard an airliner, congressional investigators said Tuesday.

The Senate Intelligence Committee report at times contradicted the Obama

administration's assertion that the nearly catastrophic Christmas Day bombing attempt was unlike 9/11 because it represented a failure to understand intelligence, not a failure to collect and understand it.

The congressional review is more stark than the Obama administration's report. It lays much of the blame at the feet of the National Counterterrorism Center, which Congress created to be the primary agency in charge of analyz-

ing terrorism intelligence.

"NCTC personnel had the responsibility and the capability to connect the key reporting with the other relevant reporting," the congressional summary said. "The NCTC was not adequately organized and did not have resources appropriately allocated to fulfill its missions."

The NCTC is the government's clearinghouse for terrorism information and is the only government agency that can access all intelli-

gence and law enforcement information.

Lawmakers found that the NCTC was not organized to be the sole agency in charge or piecing together terrorism threats.

"Some of the systemic errors this review identified also were cited as failures prior to 9/11," Republican Sens. Richard Burr and Saxby Chambliss wrote in an addendum to the report.

The Christmas Day plot failed when a bomb failed to detonate aboard a Detroit-

bound airliner and FBI agents quickly arrested Nigerian Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab and charged him with the attack. Abdulmutallab has been linked to an al-Qaida spin-off group in Yemen.

The attack caught U.S. intelligence analysts by surprise because al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula had been seen as a threat in Yemen, not within the U.S.

The office of the Director of National Intelligence, which oversees the NCTC's

work, said Tuesday night that its own internal review had pinpointed many of the same "shortcomings" cited by the Senate committee.

The DNI said it has already taken "corrective actions," including staffing a team of analysts at the NCTC "to thoroughly and exhaustively pursue terrorist threat threads, including identifying appropriate follow-up actions by other intelligence and law enforcement organizations."

## Rep. Souder says he'll resign over affair

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Indiana Rep. Mark Souder, an eight-term Republican who promoted abstinence education, said Tuesday he'll resign from Congress after admitting an extra-marital affair with a part-time staff member.

Souder won a bruising primary just two weeks ago, and the resignation effective Friday could hurt the GOP's chances of holding onto the Republican-leaning district in November in a year that many expect will favor the party.

Souder, an evangelical Christian who has championed family values and traditional marriage, apologized for his actions but

provided no details during an emotional news conference at his Fort Wayne office.

"I am so ashamed to have hurt the ones I love," he said as he battled tears. "I am sorry to have let so many friends down, people who have worked so hard for me."

The announcement stunned many in political circles.

"Most people in this part of the state are as dumb-founded as they could be," said Bob Schmuhl, a political analyst and University of Notre Dame professor.

Republican Gov. Mitch

Daniels said he was surprised and disappointed by Souder's announcement.

"He did a wrong thing but now he's done the right thing," Daniels said.

A spokeswoman from Daniels' office said a special election will be held to fill the vacancy. The winner would complete the remainder of Souder's term that ends in January.

Republican and Democratic precinct committeemen in the district will choose nominees for the special election, and GOP precinct officials would choose a candidate for the

November ballot. The special election cannot be held until at least 60 days after the vacancy occurs.

Throughout his time in Congress, Souder made his evangelical Christianity a centerpiece of his public persona. He was known for his outspoken views on religion and his uncompromising conservative positions on social issues such as abortion.

He said after a 2008 hearing on abstinence-only education that the only fully reliable way young people can protect themselves from pregnancy and STDs is by "abstaining from sex until in a committed, faithful relationship."

## Blumenthal denies trying to mislead on military service

Connecticut Attorney General Richard Blumenthal was alternately apologetic and defiant Tuesday as he battled to deflect a potentially devastating blow to his Senate campaign: an accusation that he had exaggerated his military service record.

Blumenthal, the presumptive Democratic nominee in the contest to succeed retiring Sen. Christopher Dodd, D, held a news conference in West Hartford to respond to a New York Times report Monday night that he has lied about serving in Vietnam.

"On a few occasions I have misspoken about my service, and I regret that and I take full responsibility," Blumenthal said, flanked by veterans. "But I will not allow anyone to take a few misplaced words and impugn my record of service to our country."

Blumenthal joined the Marine Corps Reserves in 1970 and served six years,

all in the United States. He has accurately described his service many times in his career, but in 2008, he told an audience at an event in Norwalk: "We have learned something important since the days that I served in Vietnam. And you exemplify it. Whatever we think about the war, whatever we call it — Afghanistan or Iraq — we owe our military men and women unconditional support."

Blumenthal explained Tuesday that he meant to say he served "during" Vietnam, not "in" Vietnam. And he stressed that "there were no special favors, no privileges involved" in his securing a slot in the Marine Reserves.

The Times article about Blumenthal's military record noted that he received five draft deferments before his enlistment, including one during which he served as an assistant to then-Washington Post Publisher Katharine Graham.

#### Times Square car bomb suspect appears in N.Y. court

NEW YORK — The suspect in a botched car bombing in Times Square appeared in court Tuesday on terrorism and weapons charges for the first time since his arrest two weeks ago and was quickly led away in handcuffs after being held without bail.

Faisal Shahzad, a Pakistan-born U.S. citizen, muttered one word at the 10-minute hearing — "yes" — when asked to confirm an affidavit about his financial status, which allowed him to have a public defender appointed.

Shahzad, wearing a gray sweatsuit and with his hair a bit longer than in photos splashed around the world, was handcuffed behind his back and led out of court after a magistrate read him his rights.

His attorney, Julia Gatto, asked during the hearing if Shahzad could be provided with halal meals, according to Muslim dietary laws that govern how food is prepared. She didn't comment afterward and didn't immediately return an e-mail message.

The federal courtroom had extra officers on hand and was emptied for a security sweep immediately before the hearing.

#### Kagan papers emerge amid questions on abortion

WASHINGTON — A senior House Democrat said Tuesday that senators should fully question Supreme Court nominee Elena Kagan to make sure she supports abortion rights, in light of her previous backing for limiting late-term abortions.

In a letter to the Senate Judiciary Committee, Rep. Louise Slaughter of New York said she views as "troubling" a 1997 memo Kagan wrote urging then-President Bill Clinton to back a ban on all abortions of viable fetuses except when the physical health of the mother was at risk.

Slaughter, the co-chair of the House Pro-Choice Caucus, wrote that the lack of a judicial record for Kagan, who has never been a judge, makes it imperative that the committee scrutinize her abortion views.

Kagan, President Obama's choice to succeed retiring Justice John

Paul Stevens, was a domestic policy adviser to Clinton when she wrote the memo Slaughter cited. That memo is part of a trove of documents, most of them unreleased, at the Clinton presidential library in Little Rock, Ark.

In the 1997 memo, Kagan urged Clinton to support a ban on late-term abortions, a political compromise that put the administration at odds with abortion rights groups. Kagan and her boss, Bruce Reed, told the president that he should support the ban because it might help him avoid even stricter language from a Republican-led Congress. Clinton supported it, but the proposal ultimately failed and Clinton vetoed a stricter Republican ban.

#### Source: CBS canceling seven series

LOS ANGELES — CBS is moving aggressively to shake up its 2010-11 season, canceling "Cold Case," "Ghost Whisperer" and five other series.

According to a person familiar with the changes, other canceled shows include "Numb3rs," "The New Adventures of Old Christine," "Gary Unmarried," "Miami Medical" and "Accidentally on Purpose." The person, who wasn't authorized to discuss the changes publicly, spoke on condition of anonymity.

The wholesale axings came as a surprise, given the respectable ratings earned by some of the shows and CBS' standing as the most-watched network.

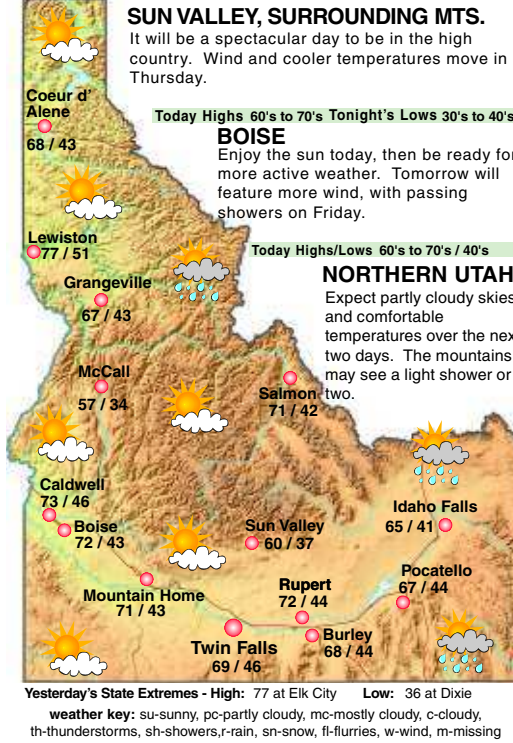

Interior secretary acknowledges lax oil regulation, promises house cleaning

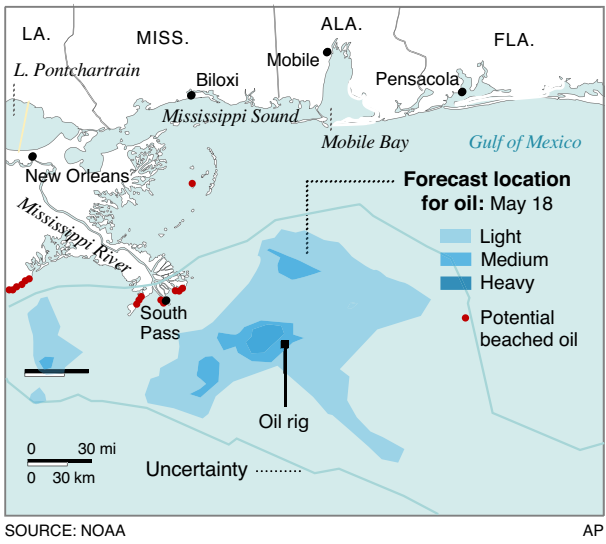
WASHINGTON — Grilled by skeptical lawmakers, Interior Secretary Ken Salazar on Tuesday acknowledged his agency had been lax in overseeing offshore drilling activities and that may have contributed to the disastrous oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

“There will be tremendous lessons to be learned here,” Salazar told a Senate panel in his first appearance before Congress since the April 20 blowout and explosion on the Deepwater Horizon rig.

His appearances before two of the three Senate panels holding hearings Tuesday on the giant oil spill came as federal officials kept a wary eye on the expanding dimensions of the problem. The government increased the area of the Gulf where fishing is shut down to 46,000 square miles, or about 19 percent of federal waters. That’s up from about 7 percent before.

Government scientists were anxiously surveying the Gulf to determine if the oil had entered a powerful current that could take it to Florida and eventually up the East Coast. Tar balls that washed up on Florida’s Key West were shipped to a Coast Guard laboratory in Connecticut to determine if they came from the Gulf spill.

Coast Guard Admiral Thad Allen told the Senate Commerce Committee the growing size and scattershot nature of the oil spill was cre-



ating “severe challenges” in containing it and cleaning it up. He called it more complicated than any spill he’s ever seen.

“What we’re basically trying to do is protect the whole coast at one time,” Allen said.

New underwater video released by BP PLC, the oil giant that owns a majority interest in the blown well, showed oil and gas erupting under pressure in large, dark clouds from its crippled blowout preventer safety device on the ocean floor. The leaks resembled a geyser on land. The five-minute clip apparently was recorded late Saturday and Sunday afternoon from aboard a remotely operated submarine.

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agency’s Minerals Management Service.

“We need to clean up that house,” Salazar said of the service. While most of the agency’s 1,700 employees are reliable and trustworthy, he said, there were “a few bad apples.”

President Obama, who has decried the “cozy relationship” between government regulators and the energy industry, has proposed splitting the agency into two parts to separate regulatory duties from those who collect royalty fees from oil and gas companies.

Sen. Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., the committee chairman, said the panel’s mission was to decipher “the cascade of failures that caused the catastrophic blowout.” In addition, he said, Congress needs to figure what must be done to make sure it never happens again.

Scientists scramble to help Cuba amid oil spill scare

WASHINGTON — The sprawling oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico is prompting fears in Cuba, which boasts one of the most pristine coral reefs in the Caribbean, miles of mangroves and nesting areas for green sea turtles.

Cuban government officials called U.S. oceanographers looking for assistance last week, the scientists said, and the State Department confirmed Tuesday that

“low, technical level” talks are under way to help Cuba respond if the sheen should move close to its shores.

Environmentalists note a lack of formal ties with the country could hamper efforts to get assistance to Cuba, and renewed a call to the Obama administration to engage in talks with Cuba.

“We simply can’t afford to not communicate on the environment,” said Daniel Whittle, Cuba program director for the Environmental Defense Fund.

## A REAL ACE OF CAKES SHARES HER SECRETS

### FAIRFIELD BAKER WINS TIMES-NEWS CAKE CONTEST

FAIRFIELD — From a field of 21 bakers and more than 50 cakes, a winner has been chosen. The Batter Master of south-central Idaho is Sue Robbins of Fairfield, whose pool table cake was an overwhelming favorite in the *Times-News'* online poll at Magicvalley.com.

Robbins, who has been making cakes for about 30 years, is frequently asked for the decadent desserts by her co-workers at the Camas County School District, friends and acquaintances and — of course — her family.

"I do all my grandkids' (birthday) cakes, kids' wedding cakes," Robbins said. "That's my creative side. I like trying to please everyone and make an awesome cake for them."

Robbins has been fascinated by cake decoration since the fourth grade, when she admired the frosted creations of a friend's mom. She also credits much of her knowledge to two Idaho teachers, Beverly Glodowski and Ina Krahn, whose way of making frosting roses was hard to learn but is one of Robbins' most prized skills.

Many of Robbins' cakes show a sense of humor — like the series of cakes she made for competing county departments after a friendly feud over a beaver dam, on which the dam wood was represented by pretzel sticks. Another, for a boy's camping-themed birthday party, looked like a giant s'more, complete with dripping "marshmallow."

No matter what the cake looks like, if it isn't going to be delicious, Robbins isn't interested. "My philosophy is, if it doesn't taste good, I won't make it," she said.

For the cake itself, Robbins usually modifies a boxed mix by adding applesauce and decreasing the oil. She prefers buttercream or cream

# Tiny seeds, BIG TASTE

I love shopping and studying ingredients from all over the world. But I find that there is a whole group of ingredients which often go completely overlooked, probably because they are tiny.

Consider seeds — small ingredients that really exhibit big taste. Poppy seeds, sesame seeds, coriander seeds and mustard seeds all have intense flavor, but most of us have no idea of what to do with these overlooked flavor firecrackers.

Here are a few chefs' tips to get intense flavor. First of all, all seeds taste a hundred times more pronounced when they are first toasted in a dry saute pan for 1-2 minutes, moving them around constantly until a strong fragrance is noticed.

**Poppy seeds:** After toasting, mix into cooked pasta, rice, orzo, couscous or other grains. They are also incredible in cookies, pound cake and even cheesecake. Try mixing fresh berries with a drizzle of balsamic vinegar, sugar and poppy seeds. This makes an incredible topping for vanilla ice cream. Sometimes I mix toasted poppy seeds into some olive oil and raspberry vinegar for a dressing for arugula, spinach or field greens, then toss the salad with blue cheese and walnuts.

**Coriander seeds:** Cilantro is grown from little coriander seeds, so

imagine how much concentrated flavor is held within coriander. Make pickled vegetables with coriander seeds by combining equal parts of cider vinegar, about a cup with water and half as much sugar. Add a few spoonfuls of coriander seeds, a pinch of red chili flakes and bring to a boil. Pour this mixture hot over any sliced vegetables, like cucumbers, zucchini slices, radishes, carrots or a combination. Allow them to marinate overnight in the refrigerator and next day you have coriander pickles.

**Mustard seeds:** Typically used in Indian cuisine. I like dredging tofu steaks in mustard seeds and a bit of panko before browning in a non-stick pan with a bit of oil. They are also wonderful sauteed with broccoli and cauliflower with either olive oil or butter.

**Sesame seeds:** The cornerstone of Asian cuisine. First off, try black sesame seeds for a varied look and flavor. You can also buy sesame seeds which are flavored with wasabi, chili and cayenne. I use sesame seeds as a breading, stir-fried with vegetables and in my favorite dipping sauce, ponzu. I combine a tablespoon of lime juice, with a quarter cup of soy sauce, pinch of sugar and drizzle of sesame oil. I spice it up with a bit of hot sauce or chili paste. This makes a great dip for crudites or grilled vegetables. I also dip chunks of tofu and tempeh in ponzu.

# S'MORES PIE: Taste of camping in comfort of home

If your idea of camping is pitching a blanket "tent" in the living room, this s'mores pie is your perfect campfire food.

We drew our inspiration from the real deal — graham crackers topped with chocolate and toasted marshmallow — and turned the ingredients into a pie. A graham cracker crust is filled with a rich chocolate filling and topped with a heap of marshmallow.

For the toasted effect, you can either use a kitchen torch to lightly brown the peaks of the marshmallow, or pop the whole thing under the broiler for a few seconds. If you opt for the broiler, you'll want to watch it carefully and rotate the pie as needed for even browning.

## S'MORES PIE

*Start to finish: 2 hours  
(20 minutes active).  
Servings: 8.*

**For the crust:**  
2 cups graham cracker crumbs  
2 tablespoons honey  
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
6 tablespoons butter, melted

**For the chocolate filling:**  
8 ounces dark chocolate, chopped  
Two 14-ounce cans sweetened condensed milk  
6 egg yolks  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

**For the marshmallow topping:**  
2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup water  
3 tablespoons corn syrup  
6 egg whites  
2 1/4 teaspoon (1/4-ounce packet) powdered gelatin  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

**Heat the oven** to 350 degrees. Coat a deep 10-inch pie plate with cooking spray.

In a medium bowl, combine the graham cracker crumbs, honey, cinnamon and melted butter. Mix

with a fork until well combined. Using the back of a spoon or lightly oiled fingers, press the crust mixture into the bottom and up the sides of the prepared pie plate. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, or until slightly darker golden around the edges.

Meanwhile, mix the filling. In a medium microwave-safe bowl, melt the chocolate in 30-second intervals, stirring between. Once completely melted, stir in the sweetened condensed milk, egg yolks and vanilla. Pour into the baked crust.

Return the pie to the oven and bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until the filling is set and just jiggles slightly at the center. Set aside to cool.

When the pie has cooled to room temperature, make the marshmallow topping.

In a small saucepan over medium-high, combine the sugar, water and corn syrup. Heat until the sugar has dissolved and the syrup reaches 240 degrees on a candy or instant thermometer.

While the sugar heats, in the bowl of a stand mixer, use

the whisk attachment to beat the egg whites on medium until they hold soft peaks.

In a small bowl, combine the gelatin and 3 tablespoons of water.

When the sugar syrup reaches 240 degrees, with the mixer running, pour the sugar down the inside edge of the mixer bowl into the egg whites. Add the gelatin mixture and beat to combine. The mixture should be thick and glossy. Scrape down the bowl with a rubber spatula to ensure all of the gelatin is incorporated. Beat for another 5 minutes on medium-high, then add the vanilla.

Use a large spoon to top the pie with the marshmallow, making large dollops and peaks with the spoon and completely covering the surface of the pie. Using a kitchen torch, lightly brown the marshmallow, being careful not to burn it. Alternatively, place the pie under the oven's broiler until just browned, rotating the pie as needed for even browning.

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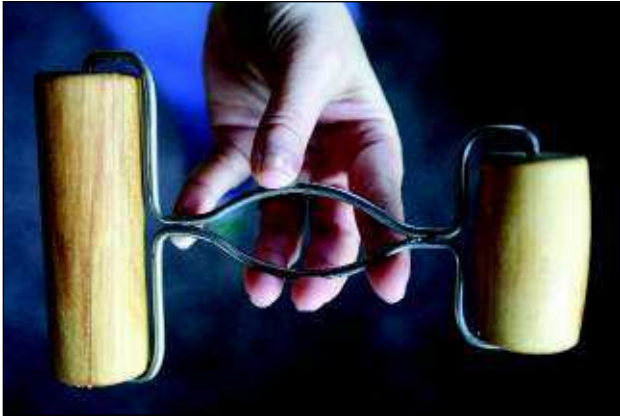
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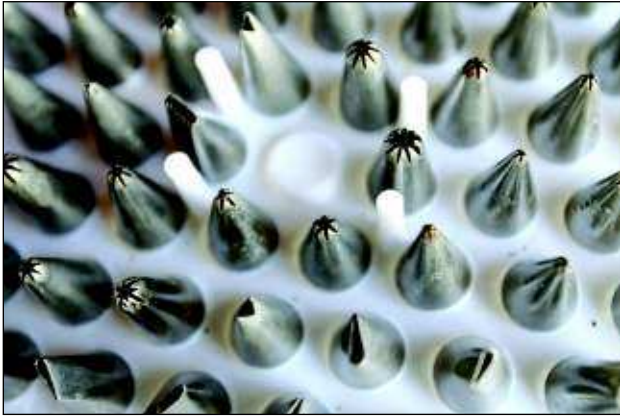

cheese as her frosting base, usually with almond flavoring mixed in, and has never been interested in using fondant — a rolled, gelatin-based type of frosting commonly used on wedding cakes — even if it is fun to work with.”

Of course, if the right person asks, she’ll make an exception. For the medieval-themed wedding of a friend’s daughter, Robbins and her husband created a castle-shaped “shell” out of construction materials like PVC pipe, which she then coated with gum paste (it’s edible, but tastes awful). The gum paste was molded into “stones” on the walls of the castle, which could be lifted away from the cake inside for access to the dessert. The couple still has the shell as a home decoration to remind them of their wedding, she said.

Robbins is more likely, though, to turn to her cases of frosting tips to make shells, lines, stars and Cornelli lace designs, choosing just the right size tip to match the vision in her mind’s eye. The Number 17 star tip, for example, was the one she chose for the winning pool table cake.

“Our county clerk had a 50th birthday, and he plays pool all the time,” Robbins said, so it was a no-brainer to match the

cake to his hobby. She purchased a miniature set of billiard balls and cues at a toy store, and then got to work trying to replicate the felt on the 18-inch by 36-inch cake with a star-shaped frosting tip. “It was a lot of measuring and starring,” she said.

Although she usually makes cakes in her rural ranch house, she has had some adventures getting them to their recipients. Once, setting up a wedding cake, the top layer fell off — but Robbins’ husband caught it before it hit the ground, and she was able to fix the frosting in time for the event. And with no room in her son’s house as they prepared for his wedding, she ended up decorating his cake in a shed.

Fundamentally, Robbins likes pleasing people, and cake is an easy way to do that.

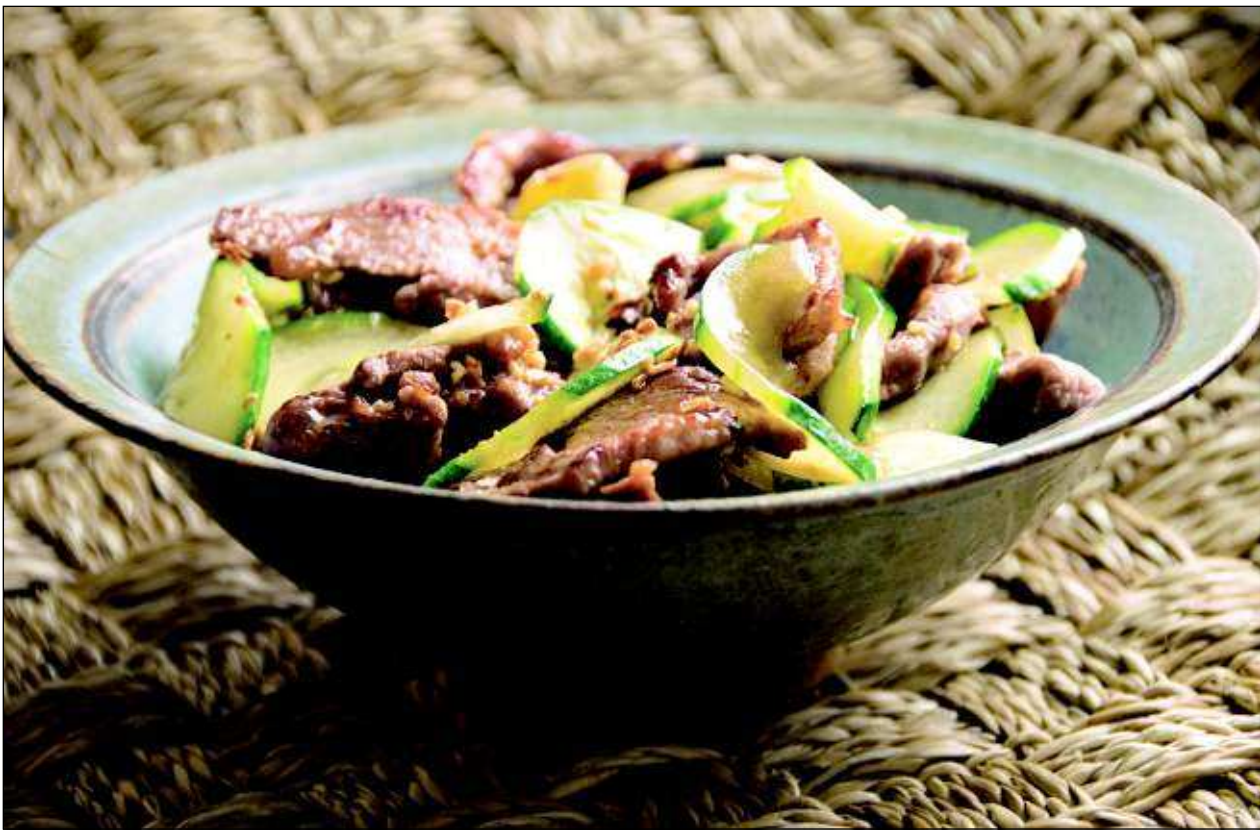
“I’m just old-fashioned. Make a cake with a frosting that tastes good, and eat it,” she said. And if you’re talented, what tastes good can win contests, as well as winning your way into your friends’ stomachs.

# DINNER IN 20 MINUTES: Stir-fried cucumber-pork dish

This is characteristic of a yin-yang stir-fry, so called because it combines cooling ingredients (such as cucumber) with the heat of others (in this case, garlic and ginger). Garlic mellowed by frying is the main seasoning here; some of the oil used for the garlic is then incorporated in the dish. It’s best to use an instant-read thermometer to gauge the temperature of the oil.

Pork shoulder or butt doesn’t usually come in small amounts. Ask your butcher to cut down a larger roast; freeze what you don’t use for this recipe.

Serve with steamed rice. Adapted from Grace Young’s “Stir-Frying to the Sky’s Edge” (Simon & Schuster, 2010).

### STIR-FRIED CUCUMBER AND PORK WITH GOLDEN GARLIC

2 to 3 servings

- 1/2 cup peanut or vegetable oil
- 3 to 5 large cloves garlic
- 12 ounces boneless lean pork shoulder or butt
- 2- to 3-inch piece ginger root

- 1 large (seedless) English cucumber
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon low-sodium soy sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon cold water

**Line a plate** with paper towels. Heat the oil in a 14-inch flat-bottomed wok or small saucepan over medium heat, or as needed, so the oil reaches a temperature of 280 degrees. (Make sure the tip of the thermometer does not touch the wok or saucepan.)

Coarsely chop the garlic as needed to yield 3 tablespoons. Trim off and discard any fat from the pork, then cut the meat into 1/4-inch or bite-size slices (to yield about 2 1/2 cups). Peel the ginger and cut it crosswise into 8 coin-size slices, then use the broad, flat side of a knife to smash each one. Trim off the ends of the cucumber, then use a vegetable peeler to cut away

long strips of peel, creating a striped effect. Cut the cucumber on the diagonal into 1/4-inch slices (to yield about 3 cups).

Add the garlic to the hot oil and cook, stirring, for 30 seconds to 1 minute or until the garlic is just golden. Use a metal skimmer to transfer the garlic to the paper-towel-lined plate. Strain the oil into a heatproof container.

Combine the pork, cornstarch, half of the soy sauce (1 1/2 teaspoons), the sugar and 1/4 teaspoon of the salt in a medium bowl; toss to coat evenly. Combine the remaining soy sauce and the water in a separate small bowl.

If you used the wok to heat the oil, wash and dry it thoroughly before placing it over high heat. Or heat a 12-inch skillet (not nonstick) over high heat. When the wok or skillet is hot, add a drop of water; the heat is sufficient when the water vaporizes within 2 seconds.

Swirl in 2 tablespoons of the reserved garlic oil, then add the ginger. Stir-fry for 30 seconds or until the ginger becomes fragrant. Push it to the sides of the wok or skillet, then add the pork in a single layer. Cook undisturbed for 1 minute so the pork sears, then stir-fry for 1 minute, until the meat is seared but not fully cooked through.

Add the cucumber and stir-fry for 30 seconds, making sure it is well incorporated, then sprinkle on the remaining 1/2 teaspoon of salt and the soy sauce-water mixture. Stir-fry for 1 minute or until the pork is cooked through and the cucumber has begun to wilt.

Stir in the reserved garlic and remove from the heat. Divide among individual bowls; serve immediately.

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# Date-nut bars for dessert on the go – or the trail

Whether it's a picnic, backyard barbecue or camping trip, summer means plenty of al fresco dining. And that means desserts need to be outdoorsy as well.

The best sweets for going au natural are ones that require the fewest plates or utensils and involve little or no cleanup. Think cookies, brownies and bars.

These date and nut squares can be made ahead and packed in a lightweight plastic container for portability.

Instant espresso is used to flavor both the squares and the drizzle. Look for it with other instant coffees or consider using one of the new higher-quality instant coffees being sold in individual serving packets.

**DATE AND NUT SQUARES WITH ESPRESSO DRIZZLE**

*Start to finish: 50 minutes (15 minutes active).  
Servings: 15.*

**For the squares:**  
2 teaspoons instant espresso or coffee  
2 teaspoons vanilla extract  
3/4 cup granulated sugar  
2 large eggs  
1 egg white

1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups fine graham cracker crumbs  
2/3 cup chopped dates  
1/2 cup chopped pecans

**For the glaze:**  
1/2 teaspoon instant espresso or coffee  
1 tablespoon hot water  
1/2 cup powdered sugar, more if needed

**Heat the oven** to 300 degrees. Coat a 7-by-11-inch baking dish with cooking spray. Set aside.

In a large mixing bowl, stir together the espresso (or coffee) powder and vanilla until the powder dissolves. Add the sugar, eggs, egg white and salt, then use an electric mixer on high to beat until thick and pale, about 2 minutes. With a rubber spatula, fold in the graham cracker crumbs, dates and pecans until just combined.

Scrape the batter into the prepared baking pan and smooth the top. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes, or until the top feels dry and the bars feel set when pressed at the center.

Transfer the dish to a rack to cool completely.

To make the glaze, in a small bowl dissolve the espresso (or coffee) powder in the hot water. Whisk in enough powdered sugar to make a thick but pourable glaze. With a spoon, drizzle the glaze over the bars. Let stand until set, then cut into 15 squares.

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# The long, hot simmer: COOKING WITH A TAGINE

Move over, Dutch oven. Put a lid on it, Crock-Pot. There's a new slow-cooker making heat waves in the kitchen, and it has everything you'd want from a take-your-time technique: simple one-pot deliciousness in a conical vessel that looks as at home on a sleek display shelf as inside the oven.

The tagine, a clay pot for cooking North African stews (also called tagines) may not be familiar to the average American cook, but it's been used for centuries in Morocco. The dishes it produces, originally concocted by native Berber tribes, often consist of tender chicken, lamb, fish and vegetables in rich sauces and spices. Stewing food in a tagine helps it cook evenly for a long period — up to several hours — without drying out. The conical lid allows steam to rise and slowly fall as the stuff inside bakes.

"From the point of view of a modern-day cook, (using a tagine) is a succulent way of cooking meat or vegetables," says Ghillie Basan, the Scotland-based author of "Tagines and Couscous" (\$25, Ryland Peters & Small). "In the old days, tribal people used very tough cuts of meat, and it was a way of assuring that it was tender enough to eat."

Though tagine pots are eye-catching, you don't need one to prepare a tagine stew. In fact, decorative tagines with colorful patterns are often not properly "seasoned" for direct heat over a stovetop or in an oven, so do your research before shopping for one. Fortunately, there's flexibility. Basan says tagine stews can be made in any hard-bottomed casserole dish or pot with a lid.

Even the chef at the Moroccan Embassy, Nazha Kasraoui, says she's used pots instead of tagines. "If you follow the traditional steps (in a recipe) — you can't put everything in at once — you'll get very good results," Kasraoui says. Plus, the stew can always be transferred to an artful tagine for an impressive presentation at the table.

Traditional Moroccan stews often have a sweet or spicy kick, evident in chicken with preserved lemon and olives, or lamb with dried fruit. Garlic, cumin, honey, preserved lemon and aged butter called smen are common ingredients, and give tagines the key flavors of "fiery, sweet and salty," Basan says.

Fish can also star in the stews. Samir Labriny, the executive chef of Casablanca in Alexandria, Va., recommends baking a tagine of fish with chermoula sauce, which is a marinade of garlic, cumin, chile, lemon, olive oil and cilantro or parsley. Casablanca offers the dish with salmon, though Moroccans use a variety of whole fish and seafood in tagines. "It combines all the flavors of Moroccan cuisine," Labriny says. "It has all the basic ingredients of spices, plus it has fresh

## A POT TO STEW IN

Scored a gorgeous tagine as a souvenir from Marrakesh? It might be better off on display than in your oven. That's because many ornamental vessels aren't prepped for cooking, says "Tagines and Couscous" author Ghillie Basan. The untreated earthenware bottoms of factory-made tagines often form hairline cracks when they are placed over flames, which can ruin your food, and, eventually, the tagine itself. Some experts recommend home chefs treat the base of a clay tagine before cooking with it by soaking it in water for days, heating it in the oven or boiling milk in it. But Basan says she recommends cooks buy tagines made by trusted brands such as Le Creuset and Emile Henry. Those lines sell tagines with cast-iron bases — not exactly authentic, but they "work brilliantly" on stovetops and in ovens. "I've found them just superb," Basan says. Samir Labriny, the executive chef of Casablanca in Alexandria, Va., says "definitely look for one that says 'glazed for cooking purposes,'" he says. You also can find cooking-ready versions at Sur La Table stores.

tomatoes, which I love in my food."

To deepen the flavor in your tagine, stock up on North African spice mixes such as fiery, chile-filled harissa paste; and ras-el-hanout, a pungent blend of herbs. If you don't want to make your own mix, find an array of zesty spices at Zamourispices.com.

While some American restaurants serve couscous with tagines — topping a plateful of the grains with a few scoops of stew — Moroccans rarely eat these dishes in the same course. "You wouldn't expect those two together," Labriny explains, "because they each have a distinctive taste. You would eat the tagine with bread, typically," whereas couscous is often served on its own, after the tagine.

Take tradition with a grain of salt, however. "The secret is always to taste and to have a little bit of creativity" when prepping a Moroccan feast, Basan says. "There are no strict rules on what should go into your dish; that's the beauty of cooking in parts of the world where (available ingredients) range from area to area."

After all, simmering a tagine can take hours — plenty of time to stew over how to add your own special touch.

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- 1-2 cinnamon sticks
- 8 chicken thighs
- 6 ounces ready-to-eat dried apricots
- 2 tablespoons clear, runny honey
- 14-ounce can plum tomatoes with juice
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Leaves from a small bunch of fresh green or purple basil

Heat the oil and butter in a tagine or heavy-based casserole dish. Add the onion, chopped rosemary, ginger and chiles and saute until the onion begins to soften.

Stir in the halved rosemary sprigs and the cinnamon sticks. Add the chicken thighs and brown them on both sides. Toss in the apricots with the honey, then stir in the plum tomatoes with their juice. (Add a little water if necessary, to ensure there is enough liquid to cover the base of the tagine and submerge the apricots.) Bring the liquid to a boil, then reduce the heat. Cover and simmer gently for 35-40 minutes, until the chicken is cooked through.

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Shred the larger basil leaves and leave the small ones intact. Sprinkle them over the chicken and serve with plain, buttered couscous and leafy salad greens if you like.

## SPICY CHICKEN TAGINE WITH APRICOTS, ROSEMARY AND GINGER

Recipe courtesy "Tagines and Couscous" by Ghillie Basan (\$25, Ryland Peters & Small). Serves 4.

- 2 tablespoons olive oil, plus a pat of butter
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 3 fresh rosemary sprigs, 1 finely chopped, the other 2 cut in half
- 1 1/2 inch piece of fresh ginger, peeled and finely chopped
- 2 fresh red chiles, seeded and finely chopped

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

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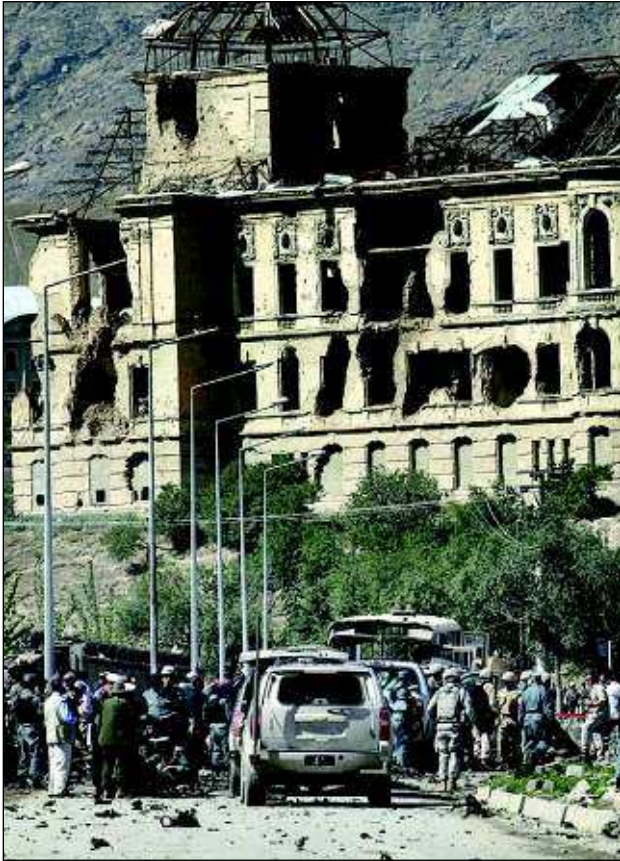

# Suicide bomber kills 18 in attack on U.S. convoy in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan — A suicide bomber detonated his vehicle near a U.S. convoy Tuesday, killing 18 people, including six troops — five Americans and a Canadian — in the deadliest attack on NATO in the Afghan capital in eight months.

Two other American service members were killed in separate attacks in the south, making Tuesday the deadliest day of the year for U.S. forces in Afghanistan.

The Canadian, Col. Geoff Parker, 42, was the highest-ranking member of the Canadian Forces to die in Afghanistan since the

Canadian mission began in 2002, the country's military said.

Twelve Afghan civilians also died — many of them on a public bus in rush-hour traffic along a major thoroughfare that runs by the ruins of a one-time royal palace and government ministries. At least 47 people were wounded, the Interior Ministry said.

The blast was the first major attack in the Afghan capital since February and followed a Taliban announcement of a spring offensive even as the U.S. gears up for a major push to restore order in the turbulent south.

Taliban spokesman Zabiullah Mujahid claimed responsibility for the

blast, telling The Associated Press in a telephone call that the bomber was a man from Kabul and that the vehicle was packed with 1,650 pounds

of explosives. Afghan President Hamid Karzai joined the U.S. and NATO in condemning the attack, which he said killed women and children.

## Immigrant crossings on the rise in Arizona

NOGALES, Mexico — The migrants walk for days through miles of mesquite scrub, running low on food and sometimes water, paying armed drug thug “guides” and dodging U.S. law enforcement officers along the way. And still they keep coming.

The latest figures show that Arizona, which is about to put into effect the nation's toughest immigration law, also is the only border state where illegal crossings are on the rise.

While tightened security and daunting fences in Texas and California have made Arizona a busy crossing corridor for years, migrant smugglers now are finding new ways through the state's treacherous deserts.

Carmen Gonzalez, 27, recalled seven days and six nights of walking with her husband in the desert and being accosted by Mexican thugs with AK-47s, who demanded \$100 bribes. They were later arrested at a safe house in Arizona.

“It was so hard and so ugly,” Gonzalez said at a shelter in this Mexican border town, where she, her husband and her brother were staying after being deported. “I won't try again because we went through too much suffering in the desert.”

New U.S. Border Patrol statistics show arrests on the Arizona border were up 6 percent — by about 10,000 — from October to April, even as apprehension of illegals dropped 9 percent overall. The agency uses arrests to gauge the flow of migrants; there are no precise figures on the number of illegal crossings.

Statistics from the Mexican side also show a rise in illegal crossings through Arizona.

Grupo Beta, a Mexican government-sponsored group that aids migrants, helped 5,279 people from January to April in the area across the border from Douglas, Ariz., compared to 3,767 in the same period last year, said agent Carlos Oasaya.

That's the same area where Arizona rancher Robert Krentz was fatally shot in March as he surveyed his property in an all-terrain vehicle. Authorities suspect an illegal immigrant who was headed back to Mexico and worked as a scout for drug smugglers.

The killing helped fuel the emotion around the Arizona law, which will empower police to question and arrest anyone they suspect is in the country illegally. It takes effect in July.

Immigration is likely to be at the top of the agenda Wednesday when Mexican President Felipe Calderon visits Washington and attends a state dinner at the White House.

## U.S. gets China, Russia on board for Iran sanctions

UNITED NATIONS — The United States introduced a United Nations resolution aimed at Iran's suspected nuclear weapons program on Tuesday, having won long-sought and pivotal support from China and Russia for new sanctions against its powerful Revolutionary Guard and new measures to try to curtail Iran's military, financial and shipping activities.

The agreement appeared to be a significant victory for the Obama administration, which has doggedly pursued sanctions since Iran rebuffed U.S. overtures last year.

The draft resolution, obtained by The Associated Press, would ban Iran from pursuing “any activity related to ballistic missiles capable of delivering nuclear weapons,” freeze assets of nuclear-related companies linked to the Revolutionary

Guard, bar Iranian investment in activities such as uranium mining and prohibit Iran from buying several categories of heavy weapons.

U.S. Ambassador Susan Rice said the resolution, backed by all five veto-wielding members of the U.N. Security Council, would give “greater teeth” to existing sanctions and add “strong” new measures to intensify pressure on the Iranian government to resolve concerns that its nuclear program is peaceful and not aimed at producing nuclear weapons.

Russia and China, which have close ties to Iran, joined fellow permanent council members Britain, France and the United States as well as non-member Germany in supporting the sanctions proposal, ignoring a deal that Tehran struck with Turkey and Brazil a day earlier in an effort to stave off the penalties.

## Piracy suspect pleads guilty in New York court to hijack

NEW YORK — A Somali suspect who became the boyish face of 21st-century piracy by staging a brazen high-seas attack on a U.S.-flagged ship off the coast of Africa pleaded guilty on Tuesday to charges he hijacked the ship and kidnapped its captain.

Abdiwali Abdiqadir Muse has been jailed in Manhattan since he was captured last year and faced what was called the first U.S. piracy prosecution in decades.

“What we did was wrong,” a subdued Muse said through an interpreter. “I am very, very sorry about what we did. All of this was about the problems in Somalia.”

He also pleaded guilty to hostage-taking and conspiracy. He faces a minimum 27 years in prison. Sentencing was set for Oct. 19.

Prosecutors branded Muse the ringleader of a band of four pirates who provoked a deadly drama by targeting the Maersk Alabama on April 8, 2009, as it transported humanitarian supplies about 280 miles off the coast of Somalia.

The case could be the first of several piracy prosecutions in U.S. courts. It's part of a larger U.S. policy debate over how best to deal with the insurgents and criminal activities that contribute to the persistent instability in Somalia, a poor and chaotic country that's become a haven for al-Qaida-linked terrorists.

Jane was a member of St. Edward the Confessor Catholic Church for 42 years. Jane was a loving, special person, always upbeat and

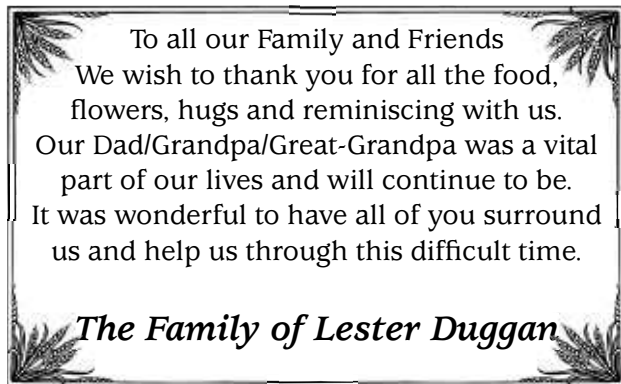
thinking of others. Her family and friends were very important to her. She will be greatly missed.

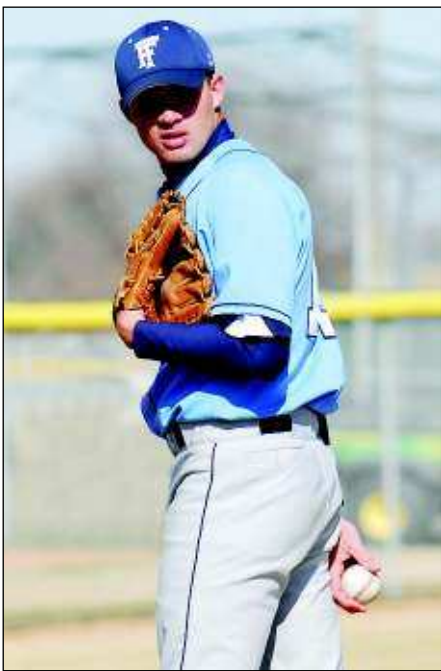

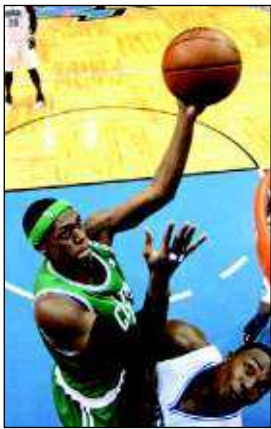

Paul Pierce scored 28 points, Rajon Rondo had 25 and the Boston Celtics again avoided a late collapse to take a commanding lead in the Eastern Conference finals with a 95-92 victory over the Orlando Magic in Game 2 on Tuesday night. Boston bullied and bruised its way to a 2-0 series lead on the road against a Magic team that had won 14 straight until this series. The Celtics held the Magic to 39 percent shooting. Dwight Howard had 30 points, and Vince Carter and J.J. Redick scored 16 apiece for the Magic, who overcame an 11-point deficit to take a brief lead in the fourth quarter. But

# Wizards win NBA's draft lottery, earn No. 1 pick

## Jazz stay put at No. 9

SECAUCUS, N.J. (AP) — With his championship ring on her hand and her late husband's dreams of another on her mind, Irene Pollin stood in shock as the Washington Wizards won the draft lottery Tuesday night, moving up from the No. 5 spot to

earn the top pick in next month's draft, when it will likely choose between Kentucky freshman John Wall and national player of the year Evan Turner of Ohio State. Washington was represented by Irene Pollin, who wore the 1978 Bullets championship ring of her late husband, longtime owner Abe Pollin. When the Wizards pulled off the surprising win, her jaw dropped and

appeared to mouth 'Oh my God!!' with wide eyes. Abe Pollin died at age 85 in November. "This is very, very special. I have been in this my entire adult life and to be here, representing my husband, this is very special to me tonight," Irene Pollin said. "I think it's the culmination of my husband's dream because he wanted another ring and maybe this will get us another ring." The Philadelphia 76ers, another disappointment this season, moved up from the sixth spot to grab the No. 2

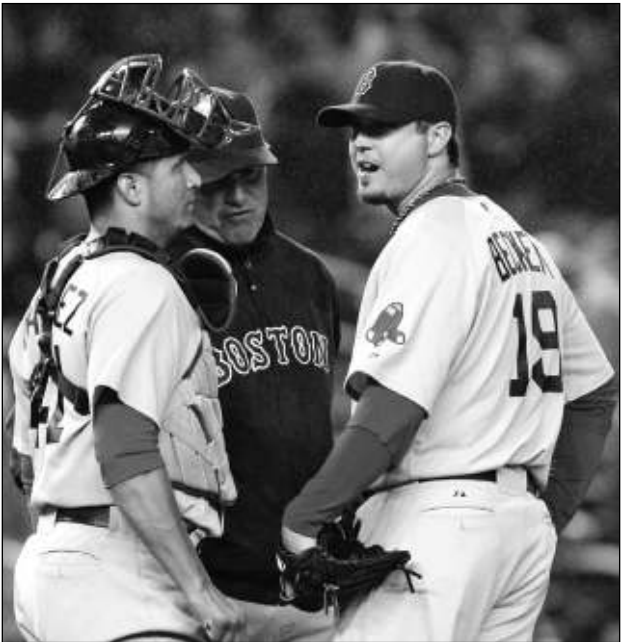
pick. The Nets continued the run of failure by teams with the best chance of winning, falling to the third. Prokhorov, the 6-foot-6 Russian billionaire who was approved as Nets owner last week and had a front row seat for the loss, shrugged off the disappointment. "Sometimes luck makes all the difference, but it never comes down to one player," Prokhorov said. "I'm sure we're going to get a great player. For our team, the only way is up." The Utah Jazz stayed put in

the NBA draft order and will pick ninth. Although the Jazz advanced to the second round of the playoffs, they hold the New York Knicks' first-round pick because of a trade Utah made with Phoenix in 2004. The pick had been protected up until this year. "Any time you can get something basically for nothing, I think it's worth the wait," Jazz general manager Kevin O'Connor said during a conference call from Secaucus, N.J., where he attended the lottery.

night in Boston. "Our fans won't let us relax," Pierce said. "We're going to try and close it out in four games."

The Celtics buckled down just enough to hold on late in this one.

Ahead 11 points to start the fourth quarter, that almost wasn't enough. The Magic, just as they did in Game 1, found their rhythm late.

Only another footnote for Boston's remarkable history.

Two years removed from their 17th NBA championship, the Celtics, once thought too old to contend for another title, have found their footing again. After ousting LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers, the team with the league's best record, Boston is showing no signs of stopping.

"Just think our mindset was to be ready for the type of intensity they would bring after losing at home," Pierce said. "We know the Magic are a talented team and we won't take these two wins for granted."

Boston again started fast.

The Celtics, who took a 20-point lead in Game 1, went ahead by 11 in the first quarter. It wasn't until backup center Marcin Gortat and Howard — a rare combination this season — teamed together that Orlando showed any fight.

With the the Magic big-time feeling postseason pressure for the first time this year, Orlando went on a 16-2 run behind the two centers. The powerful rebounding combo helped Orlando grab three straight on one possession, and Redick then hit a 3-pointer to put the Magic ahead 28-25.

All the pushing and pulling would finally spill over.

Pierce was knocked in the head hard by Howard on a layup attempt in the second quarter, a punishing display of anger that the Magic center rarely shows. Pierce got up after a minute, clearly upset, his headband twisted to the side. Howard was called for a flagrant foul.

The Celtics would go ahead by five after Howard picked up his third foul moments later. Before they could deliver another big blow, Matt Barnes hit a 3-pointer as the shot-clock buzzer sounded in the final seconds for Orlando to trim Boston's lead to 53-51 at the half.

# Quinn a quick study of Broncos’ intricate offense

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. (AP) — Long after his teammates headed inside for lunch, the Denver Broncos’ new quarterback stayed on the field, taking extra snaps, practicing his footwork, working on his reads.

Not Tim Tebow.  
Brady Quinn.

He’s the other new quarter-back in town, the one whose jersey doesn’t top the NFL sales charts, whose every move isn’t chronicled by a phalanx of photographers, a regiment of reporters.

Yet, Quinn could very well be the one under center for Denver in 2010, provided he beats out incumbent Kyle Orton, who has been running coach Josh McDaniels’ system for a year now.

“He knows the offense pretty well,” Quinn said during the Broncos’ passing camp this week. “This is an offense that I’m familiar with. I feel pretty comfortable being in there as well.”

The Broncos acquired Quinn from the Cleveland Browns in the offseason, sup- plying Orton with some better competition.

Quinn is no stranger to quarterback competitions, having gone through that in Cleveland with Derek Anderson since being selected in the first round of the 2007 draft out of Notre Dame.

But this competition is a little different. This one has turned into a three-ring cir-

cus. Tebowmania has set in. Since the Broncos drafted Florida’s former Heisman Trophy winner, two-time national champion and work-in-progress quarterback in the first round last month, Tebow has been the talk of the town, the star of the show.

That’s before even seeing his first snap, no less.

Not that Quinn minds. It simply allows him to fly under the radar, as much as he can at least, playing the position he does.

“Quarterback is one of those positions everyone wants to talk about all the time. Selfishly, rightfully so,” Quinn said. “We’re a bunch of good guys.”

And that extends to helping each other out.

Despite being new, Quinn feels like he has a pretty good grasp of McDaniels’ intricate offense. Quinn’s familiarity stems from playing for Charlie Weis at Notre Dame, and Weis having once worked with McDaniels in New England.

So, ask away, Tim. Don’t be bashful.

Quinn will be more than willing to help, even if it costs him either the starting job or the backup spot.

“I’m not some vindictive jerk like that. I try to bring guys along,” Quinn said. “I’m going to do what’s best for our team, and help whoever is on the team.”

In 1962, during a Democratic fundraiser at New York's Madison Square Garden, actress Marilyn Monroe sang "Happy Birthday to You" to guest-of-honor President John F. Kennedy.

In 1964, the State Department disclosed that 40 hidden microphones had been found in the U.S. embassy in Moscow.

In 1967, the Soviet Union ratified a treaty with the United States and Britain banning nuclear weapons from outer space.

In 1992, the 27th Amendment to the Constitution, which prohibits Congress from giving itself pay raises until the next congressional term, went into effect. Mary Jo Buttafuoco of Massapequa, N.Y., was shot and seriously wounded by her husband Joey's teenage lover, Amy Fisher.

In 1994, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis died in New York at age 64.

Ten years ago: China and the European Union reached a market-opening trade deal, clearing Beijing's largest remaining hurdle to joining the World Trade Organization. Masked gunmen launched a coup in Fiji that toppled Prime Minister Mahendra Chaudhry, the country's first ethnic Indian premier.

Five years ago: Republicans and Democrats tangled over President George W. Bush's judicial nominees and the Senate's filibuster rules, with Democrats accusing Bush of trying to "rewrite the Constitution" and Republicans accusing Democrats of "unprecedented obstruction." "Revenge of the Sith," the final chapter of the "Star Wars" epic, opened in the U.S.

One year ago: President Barack Obama asked consumers to back his plan for higher efficiency standards for cars and trucks, saying drivers would make up the higher cost of cleaner vehicles at the gas pump.

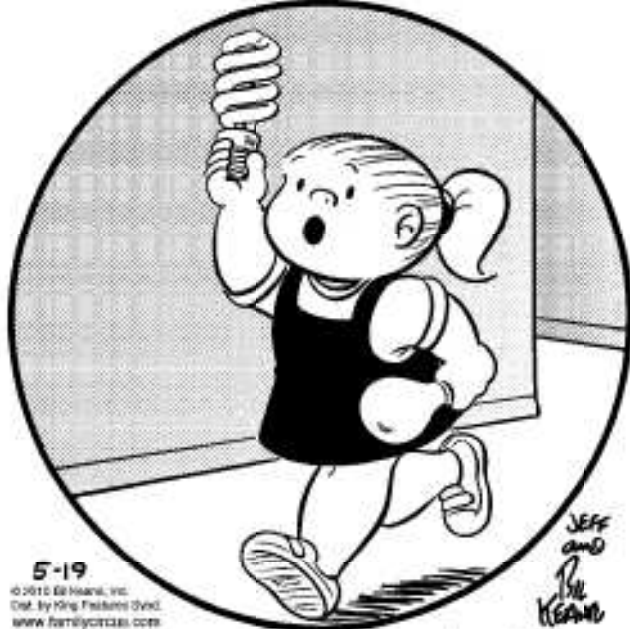

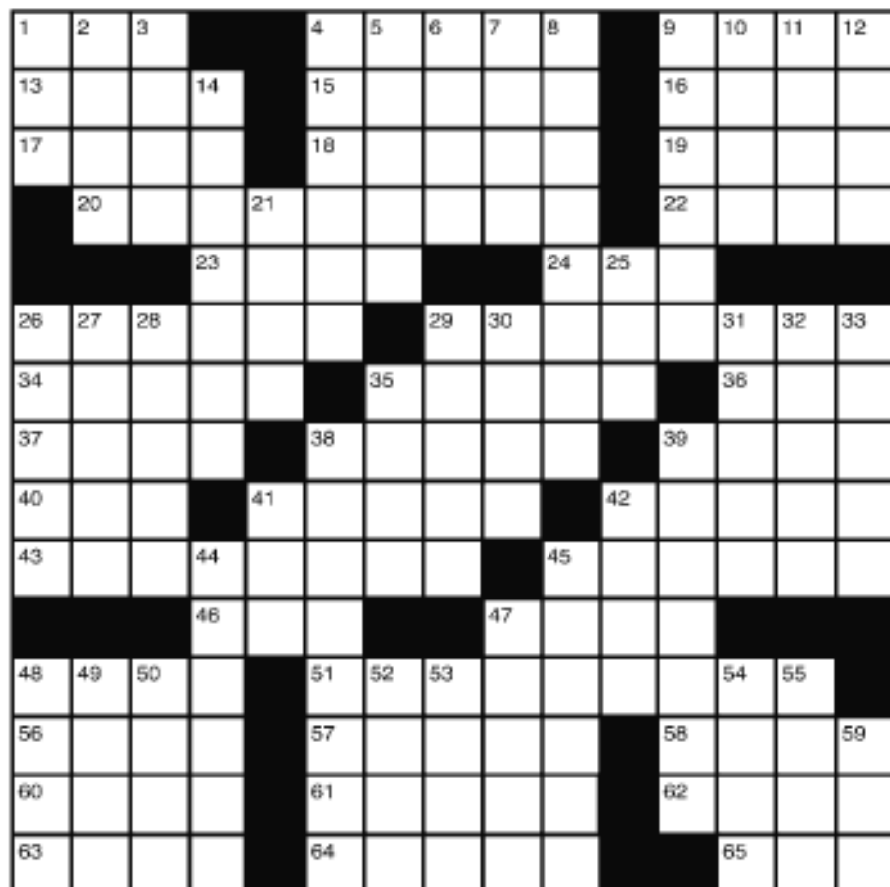

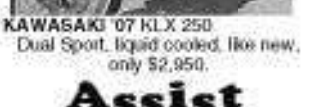

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal comes from the Carrousel Cup, a European junior event which was contested between eight national teams.

Playing in three no-trump, Maria Dam Mortensen as South won the club lead in her hand and could count eight tricks. Sensibly enough, she went after diamonds, leading the king out of her hand to try to establish her ninth trick. West took the king with the ace and returned a heart.

Declarer won in hand and tested the diamonds. When they failed to break 3-3, Mortensen's only realistic hope was spades. The most likely division of the top spade honors was one for each defender, but declarer realized that this would not help her cause. East would win the first spade, cash the winning diamond, then return a club. The other spade honor would then be the entry for the set-up clubs.

So South had to assume that both the ace and king of spades sat with one defender. But which? If West, then a spade toward dummy would suffice. However, West was already marked with the diamond ace and club king and would not have passed if holding the top spades.

Deciding to play East for both spade honors, Mortensen cashed the hearts and the club ace, stripping East of exit cards, then led a spade to dummy's jack. East won and could cash the diamond nine and spade ace, but then had to give dummy the game-going trick with the spade queen.

**ANSWER:** You would not have committed your hand beyond two hearts without the opponents' pre-emption, but as it is, you cannot afford to sell out. It is a good general rule with a fit to allow yourself to be pushed up one level but not two. So bid three hearts and tip your hat to the opponents if they have jockeyed you into trouble.
