Paul woman killed in bar shooting

A 32-year-old Paul woman was killed by a single gunshot wound in a shooting at El Paralito Saloon in Cassia County late Saturday, police said on Sunday.

The victim was wounded in her upper torso in an incident at the El Paralito Bar, 165 W. U.S. Highway 30 in Burley, according to the Cassia County Sheriff's Office. Her name was not

released pending notification of family.

A suspect, Juan Manuel Arellano, 40, also of Paul, was taken into custody, according to the sheriff's office. Arellano is being held at the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center on a charge of first degree murder.

According to jail personnel, he will be arraigned in Cassia County 5th District Magistrate Court on Tuesday. No bond has been set.

The victim was taken by ambulance to Cassia County Regional Medical Center, where she died from her

injury, according to police.

The Cassia County Sheriff's Office, Minidoka County Sheriff's Office, Rupert Police Department, and Heyburn Police Department responded to a report of shoots fired at the bar at 10:36 p.m. Saturday.

Walking beyond challenges

MVHS senior helps with library after completing graduation requirements early

Ian Nicely knows acutely what it's like to have challenges in life.

Born with spina bifida, he wears braces on his legs and cannot walk as quickly as his peers. In Twin Falls High School, it was challenging for him to get around because of the condition, which is a spinal defect that affects his leg muscles.

Now about to graduate from Magic Valley High School, he's looking to the future, with plans to attend Idaho State University and start a photography business after studying business management and photography.

Looking at his high school years, Nicely's glad he came to Magic Valley High School, where he could focus on academics without struggling to walk lengthy distances between class periods.

"I came here because it's a smaller place and it's easier," he said. "It's one class at a time, so I don't have to walk from one side of the building to the other."

While attending Twin Falls High, he had doubts about whether he would make it through high school, not only because of his disability but because he had difficulty getting along with teachers.

That's no longer a worry. "This is the best move I ever decided to make," he said of coming to Magic Valley High School.

Nicely, who met his graduation requirement several months early, decided to stick around and volunteer for the rest of the school year.

"I figure it's better to stay in school because I don't have a job," he said.

He works in the school's library and office, where he keeps track of books and created a computer database of

Minidoka Co. teachers to see raise freeze, shortened year

Minidoka County school employees will miss out on experience-based raises and work one less day next year to help offset reductions in state funding.

According to a press release issued by the

Minidoka County School District, the district's board of trustees and the Minidoka County Education Association have ratified the teacher's salary contract for fiscal year 2011, which begins in July.

The agreement included a reduction of one day from 186 days to 185 for certified

employees. The district will reduce other staff schedules by one day as well, the release stated, though student school days aren't expected to decrease.

"Much effort was taken to ensure the least possible adverse impact to student-teacher contact hours and academic achievement,"

said Scott Rogers, superintendent. "The main focus was making tough budget decisions that considered the best interest of the students and to assure the community that education remains a top priority in the district."

Battalion among hardest hit in Afghan war

FORWARD OPERATING BASE FRONTENAC, Afghanistan — It was Aug. 10, 2009 in the Arghandab River Valley, a hot and dusty day full of unknowns.

An American battalion was swapping in with a Canadian garrison. As the Stryker troop carrier rumbled toward the riverside orchards, a Canadian soldier warned 1st Lt. Vic Cortese, 24, of East Quogue, New York: "We don't go in there."

The American troops clambered out of the Stryker's cramped confines into the raw sunlight. The soldiers spread out, started walking.

Less than 20 minutes later, snap, snap, snap in the air. A Taliban ambush. Cortese's first firefight, and he went numb. "For a split second, I was like: 'Oh man!'" he recalled. Then training took command. He pushed against the earth, lifted his M-4 rifle and pulled the trigger.

Twenty-two men in the U.S. Army's 1st Battalion, 17th Infantry Regiment of 800 died in a yearlong Afghan tour ending this

summer. Most were killed last year in the Arghandab, a gateway to the southern city of Kandahar. About 70 were injured, all but two in bomb blasts.

The death toll was one of the highest in the Afghan war, and the tough fight in the Arghandab drew the attention of America's leaders. President Obama was photographed saluting the coffin of one of the soldiers on arrival in the United States. U.S. Defense Secretary Robert Gates told soldiers at their base in March that their efforts had helped push back the Taliban.

However, the battalion failed to dislodge insurgent cells entirely. A similar outcome is emerging in the southern town of Marjah after a bigger operation led by U.S. Marines in February. An even larger campaign is unfolding in Kandahar, the Taliban's spiritual capital.

The battalion's story is an extreme example of the challenges American soldiers face in Afghanistan.

The battalion is part of the 5th Stryker Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, which originally trained for urban

Blaine Co. levy would buy time for Manor

HAILEY — With an election still visible on the horizon behind them, Blaine County voters will be asked to return to the polls on Aug. 3.

This time, they'll be asked to vote on a levy to fund Blaine Manor, the county's skilled-nursing care facility, for the next three years.

Blaine County commissioners hope that the three years will give the Croy Canyon Ranch Foundation enough time to open a private, continuing-care retirement community that will offer skilled-nursing care, assisted-living and independent living facilities.

Commissioners are asking

voters to approve a \$1.99 million, two-year levy to cover operations and necessary building maintenance.

"We're only asking people to pay for two years. But we've set the levy high enough to raise enough money for three years of operation," said Blaine County Commissioner Angenie McCleary.

The valuation has not been set. But it would cost homeowners approximately \$9.40 in taxes for each \$100,000 of assessed property value, McCleary said.

Approval of the temporary levy will require a simple majority.

Those who are trying to build a new facility in Croy

The reduction of one day for all employees will reduce salary expenses by .67 percent. Steps and lane changes — raises based on experience and ongoing education credits — will not be funded in fiscal 2011. The estimated costs for those types of pay raises would have increased the school's budget by 3.74 percent for certified employees and 1.5 percent for classified employees, the release said.

According to the release, a memorandum of understanding was put in place for one year to address possible midyear holdbacks of public

school funding.

The negotiations were a mutual effort to address continued declining enrollment in the district as well as state budget reductions, the release said.

"All members of the negotiations team worked diligently to find solutions that would have the least harmful effects to our students and all employees," said Ernie Martinez, Minidoka County Education Association co-president.

Canyon just west of Hailey had urged the commissioners to delay the levy vote for fear confusion over the levy would harm their ongoing fundraising efforts.

But Croy Canyon Ranch Board President Jeanne Cassell said this week that her volunteers now plan to capitalize on the publicity surrounding the levy to make the public aware of the need for continuing care in the valley.

"We're supportive of the levy and grateful for the county's support of Blaine Manor," Cassell said.

Blaine Manor Administrator Gail Goglia said the 25-bed facility, which opened in 1982, currently has a waiting list.

The county has been making up the difference between the facility's revenue and its expenses for at least the past 10 years, McCleary said, covering \$600,000 a year over the last nine years. But it's difficult for the county to continue to do so in the current economy, given a \$558,000 budget deficit expected during the current fiscal year, she added.

"Blaine Manor's services are needed. We just don't have enough money to continue subsidizing it right now," McCleary said.

And if the levy doesn't pass? "We don't know," she said.

Buhl shooting ends with suspect in hospital

BUHL — A suspect who allegedly shot a man in Buhl on Saturday is in custody after being shot himself by law enforcement following a police pursuit that ended in Filer.

The two shootings began in Buhl at about 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

According to witness Tiras Newman, a man arrived at 925 Sprague Avenue, Buhl, to confront James Lambert, who is dating the man's ex-girlfriend Rebecca Ward, of Buhl.

Newman said the man, whose name was not released by police, got out of his white Dodge Stratus wielding a crowbar before pulling out a handgun.

"We were outside talking when he arrived," Newman said. "After getting out of his car, crowbar in hand, he starting yelling at (Lambert) and he pulled out a gun."

When the shooter was just a few yards from Lambert and Newman, he pulled the trigger but the gun misfired, according to Newman.

Newman said he saw the man fire the gun four more times. One of the bullets fired hit Lambert in the leg.

Newman said Lambert ran around to the back of his girlfriend's home and entered it. Lambert was transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

On Sunday, Ward said that Lambert had been released from the hospital but would not comment further. Lambert could not be

reached.

Wendy Ingram, who lives across the street, said she heard the gunfire and saw the man enter Ward's front door before quickly exiting and driving away.

It wasn't the first time Ingram has seen him. She said she has seen the man drive up and down the street "at least five times a day" in recent months.

The man was apprehended Saturday following a police chase that ended at 2250 East, Highway 30 Filer, where he was shot by law enforcement. Twin Falls County Prosecuting Attorney Grant Loeb said he expects a report of Buhl's investigation by Tuesday. He said Filer is conducting a separate investigation into the pursuit.

after his release from St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

Authorities would not provide any specifics about what led to the Filer shooting.

Loeb said that the officer involved in the shooting has been placed on administrative leave, as is standard procedure. The officer's name and agency has not been released.

That shooting is being investigated by the Critical Incident Task Force, a Magic Valley law enforcement association designed for looking into police-related shootings.

Loeb said he expects a report of Buhl's investigation by Tuesday. He said Filer is conducting a separate investigation into the pursuit.

Sun Valley Road night work nears

Night work will be performed on the Idaho Highway 75 spur/Sun Valley Road on Thursday and Friday, the Idaho Transportation Department recently announced.

Crews will install durable pavement markings from Ketchum to Sun Valley between 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. The markings will replace existing paint striping, which has faded due to high traffic and harsh weather, ITD stated.

Work will include a measure of noise due to milling — grinding off the top few inches of pavement — as recessed markings will be placed on Sun Valley Road from its intersection with Idaho 75 in Ketchum to a point about a mile away, east of Saddle Road in Sun Valley.

Work may be delayed due to weather or temperatures that fall below an acceptable standard for the work, ITD stated.

One lane will be closed while crews work, and drivers should watch for flaggers and be prepared for delays of as much as 10 minutes. A pilot car will operate during the lane closure.

Specialized Pavement Markings of Tualatin, Ore., is the contractor for the \$149,000 project, which is scheduled for completion by Saturday.

combat in Iraq. But the mission changed in the final months of training, and the brigade's 130 Arabic students took a crash course in Pashto, the language of Afghanistan's largest ethnic community.

The battalion's Stryker vehicles, prized for their speed and mobility, were making their debut in the Afghan war. But they could not operate in rough terrain where soldiers had to get around on foot.

The timing was bad; August is the height of Afghanistan's fighting season.

Perhaps most treacherous of all, the battalion had very little intelligence. The soldiers didn't know it, but they faced an entrenched enemy willing to stand and fight for a sliver of territory vital to the Taliban's goal of seizing Kandahar. They needed more manpower.

Before dawn on Aug. 7, the battalion rolled out of Kandahar to Forward Operating Base Frontenac, just northwest of the Arghandab. The soldiers in the hatches got sunburns. The thermometer read 130 degrees Fahrenheit.

A "perfect storm" awaited, said Lt. Col. Jonathan Neumann, the battalion commander, from the tiny town of Baker in Montana.

"You can't get from one side of the river to the other easily. You can't do anything on vehicles," Neumann said. "We didn't know it was going to be saturated with enemy. Nobody was track-

ing that it was a Taliban sanctuary."

Spc. Troy O. Tom was the first. A 21-year-old Navajo from Shiprock, New Mexico, he smiled serenely through tough camp training and told friends he turned down scholarships to serve his country. On Aug. 18, an explosive on a footbridge killed him.

Within five minutes, Pfc. Jonathan C. Yanne, 20, of Litchfield, Minn., died the same way. Soldiers say he stopped, stooped to adjust his heavy backpack, and took his last step.

Fear of more attacks delayed the search for the bodies. The next day, a bomb struck a convoy. The shock wave thumped 1st Lt. Kyle Hovatter of Tallahassee, Fla. in the face — "like a ton of bricks," he said. Soldiers spotted a dozen muzzle flashes in the undergrowth. Sixteen Strykers unloaded 50-caliber machine gunfire and other ordnance. Helicopters flew low, unleashing at least 100 rockets.

The barrage subsided, and the Americans found Tom and Yanne.

A pattern was emerging.

The Taliban had no chance in a fire-fight, but disrupted American movement with mines and improvised explosive devices, or IEDs, usually fuel-soaked fertilizer packed in cook-

ing oil jugs and wired to a power source that ignites the mix.

The IEDs got bigger as insurgents learned to pierce the Stryker hulls. At first, the Americans walked into bombs around trails and at gaps in walls. They adapted, varying movements and spotting ribbons in trees and other Taliban markers for IEDs.

Hovatter, 27, replaced a wounded platoon leader, and tried not to think of his wife on patrol so he could stay alert. He played out worst-case scenarios: What if the guy in front steps on a mine? What will I do?

"You're the American army, you're the U.S. infantry," Hovatter said. "You don't expect to come across something that's going to make you step back and say: 'How can I change?'"

Bases aim for new combat jets, some fear jet noise

BOISE — The new F-35 Lightning II joint strike fighter is tardy, billions over budget and the roar of its jet engine could eclipse the older planes it's due to replace.

Despite these concerns, U.S. Air Force officials at 11 bases in 7 states — and civilian leaders of communities that surround these military installations — are scrambling to convince Pentagon brass to choose their facility to house the latest air-combat bling.

For bases, success during a first round of selections in 2011 could mean survival in a post-Cold War era of downsizing. For military communities, it means a much-needed economic shot-in-the-arm.

In Idaho, where officials predict a \$1 billion boost from up to 3,000 personnel and 144 planes, even the state-sponsored lottery is in act: Its website urges gamers to join the effort to lure F-35s to Gowen Field Air National Guard Base in Boise and Mountain Home Air Force Base, 50 miles to the east.

"We feel strongly that it would be foolish to not support this, with the state of the economy," said Adam Park, a spokesman for Boise Mayor Dave Bieter.

Meanwhile, Tim Amalong, a general aviation business manager at the Tucson International Airport in Arizona, is talking up the local Air Guard station's attributes — and trash-talking rivals. Four-season weather above the Sonoran Desert's 1.9-million-acre Barry Goldwater Training Range makes for better flying than colder air-space in Utah or Idaho, Amalong insists.

"I've been up there sometimes during the winter and it ain't pretty," he said.

So far, Lockheed Martin Corp. has built just a few of roughly 2,400 F-35s the United States has said it wants to buy, but the plane's cost already has more than doubled to some

\$113 million apiece.

What's more, the joint strike fighter — "joint" because different versions are also being built for the U.S. Marines and Navy — isn't likely to be ready for Air Force operations until 2015, two years behind schedule.

Air Force officials responsible for the F-35 didn't return repeated phone calls.

Five sites are training-mission candidates, where American and foreign pilots from U.S. allies that buy the planes would come to learn their way around the cockpits: Gowen Field; Tucson; Luke Air Force Base, also in Arizona; Eglin Air Force Base in Florida, and Holloman Air Force Base in New Mexico.

Operational squadrons are slated for another six bases: Mountain Home; Burlington International Airport Guard Station in Vermont; Hill Air Force Base in Utah; Jacksonville Air Guard Station in Florida; and Shaw Air Force Base and McEntire Air Guard Base, both in South Carolina.

All aim to fill possible holes in their aging combat arsenals.

Arizona's Luke Air Force Base began slashing 550 military jobs and 28 aging F-16 jets last year. Eglin lost its F-16s.

In Idaho, Mountain Home Air Force Base's 20 F-15C Eagles are departing this summer, while C-130 cargo planes that exited Gowen Field last year left vacant hangars. The base's 22 A-10 "Warthog" tankbusters are 34 years old and counting.

"In order to maintain our relevancy, eventually we're going to need a new mission," said Col. Tim Marsano, of the Idaho Air National Guard.

Air Guard F-16 pilots from Vermont were among the first to be scrambled over New York City's "Ground Zero" after the Sept. 11 attacks, but Burlington's 18-plane squadron is aging.

"In a perfect world, there would be a one-for-one replacement with the F-35s, and these F-16s would retire," said Brigadier General Steve Cray, of the Vermont Air National Guard's Green Mountain Boys.

Even so, the roar of the F-35's proposed Pratt & Whitney engine — dubbed by backers as "the sound of freedom" — has some homeowners who live near bases talking about plunging property values and plummeting quality of life. The Air Force's own estimates, from a 2008 environmental analysis, show the jets may

be twice as loud at takeoff, and four times as loud on landing, as an F-15C Eagle.

Valparaiso, Fla., which borders Eglin, sued the Air Force, settling in March only after military officials agreed to consider changes. But Mayor John B. Arnold isn't sure it's over; the city may go back to court. He's not against the F-35, he said, but just raising noise concerns has won him enemies in neighboring towns.

"We still have people that won't talk to us," Arnold said.

El Mirage, Ariz., officials feel Arnold's pain. They commissioned a study that found property values could drop by a fifth, should the jets come to Luke. Now, the Phoenix suburb has come under pressure from gung-ho military communities nearby.

"On the worst day, we've been called unpatriotic," El Mirage spokeswoman Stacy Pearson said.

Monty Mericle has lived near Gowen Field in Boise for 35 years and helped start the "Save Our Valley Now" group after becoming convinced F-35 noise would surpass even the din of the F-4 Phantom, a noisy fighter-bomber retired in the mid-1990s.

If Boise wants the F-35 so bad, Mericle suggests it or the Air Force should buy his house.

"These planes are a battlefield weapon," Mericle said. "They need to put them into a remote location."

Air Force officials cite an April 2009 Lockheed Martin study showing F-35s aren't much louder than existing jets. Strategic timings of takeoffs and landings could further remedy complaints, they said.

Brigadier General William Shawver, Idaho's assistant adjutant general, said his own house is located off the tip of Gowen Field's runway. Critics should wait for a preliminary environmental impact study, due this summer, before passing judgment, he said.

"We have a long history of after-burning aircraft in the pattern," Shawver said.

Franchitti gets a break to win Indy

INDIANAPOLIS — One lap to go, running on empty and someone bearing down on his tail.

After having the dominant car and the perfect game plan, Dario Franchitti still needed more Sunday — one break to win his second Indianapolis 500.

He got it in the form of a spectacular, airborne crash that brought out a yellow flag and allowed him to cross the line with a scant 1.6 gallons of fuel left.

That 1.6 gallons left him holding a quart of milk, a winner at the Brickyard for the second time in four years.

"Still running," the winner told his crew over the radio as he crossed the finish line, while wreckers were moving out to scoop up debris from an accident that sent Mike Conway into the wall and to the hospital with a broken left leg.

The victory made Franchitti's boss, Chip Ganassi, the first owner to win Indy and NASCAR's Daytona 500 in the same year.

"All he wants to do is win," Franchitti said.

This win validated the Scottish driver's return to the IndyCar circuit two years after celebrating his 2007 Indy victory by making an unsuccessful move with Ganassi to NASCAR.

It also made Franchitti and crew look like the master tacticians they were on this day — working the gas pedal perfectly to stretch their final fill-up for the last 37 laps and edge out 2005 champion Dan Wheldon of England.

Franchitti was holding off Wheldon when Ryan Hunter-Reay ran out of gas and slowed suddenly with Conway coming up alongside him. Conway went airborne, flipped upside down and flew into the wall, nearly landing on top of Hunter-Reay. That brought out the caution flag for the final lap.

Franchitti's second victory turned out to be the story instead of Helio Castroneves' fourth.

Venus Williams loses in French Open's 4th round

PARIS — Displaying little of the spark or strokes she regularly produces on grass and hard courts, and playing little like someone with the tour's best 2010 winning percentage, Venus Williams stalled on the red clay of Roland Garros yet again Sunday, exiting in the fourth round with a 6-4, 6-3 loss to No. 19 Nadia Petrova.

"I don't think the conditions are always ideal here. ... You might not be used to

it or you might not get a good bounce," said the No. 2-seeded Williams, who began the day 29-4 this season, including 15-2 on clay. "That's just the way this tournament goes."

Petrova will face No. 5 Elena Dementieva in an all-Russian quarterfinal. Dementieva ended the surprising stay of 131st-ranked qualifier Chanelle Scheepers by winning 6-1, 6-3.

No. 3 Caroline Wozniacki of Denmark will play No. 17 Francesca Schiavone of Italy in another quarterfinal.

Wozniacki, runner-up at last year's U.S. Open, scraped together a 7-6 (5), 6-7 (4), 6-2 victory over No. 14 Flavia Pennetta of Italy, and Schiavone eliminated No. 30 Maria Kirilenko of Russia 6-4, 6-4.

Justine Henin defeated Maria Sharapova 6-2, 3-6, 6-3, her 24th consecutive victory at the French Open.

The Belgian will play against No. 7 Samantha Stosur of Australia.

In men's action Sunday, No. 15 Tomas Berdych beat No. 4 Andy Murray 6-4, 7-

5, 6-3 to reach the French Open quarterfinals for the first time. Berdych now meets No. 11 Mikhail Youzhny, who advanced when No. 8 Jo-Wilfried Tsonga quit because of a hip injury.

Roger Federer won in straight sets for the fourth consecutive round, dismissing No. 20 Stanislas Wawrinka 6-3, 7-6 (5), 6-2.

No. 5 Robin Soderling of Sweden dispatched No. 10 Marin Cilic of Croatia 6-4, 6-4, 6-2.

2010 NBA Finals is Lakers-Celtics, Part 12

Here comes Kobe Bryant's chance against the team that beat him last time.

He's far from the only Lakers great to fall short against Boston.

Get ready for Lakers-Celtics, Part 12, the league's most storied franchises renewing their rivalry in the NBA finals.

Boston beat Los Angeles in the 2008 finals, with a dominant defense that made life miserable for Bryant, that sea-son's MVP. When they meet again starting Thursday at Staples Center, the Lakers can show how much better they are since then.

"We'll see, we'll see how much we matured," Bryant said. "They challenged us extremely well in the finals a couple years ago. Now is a chance to see how much we've grown."

Los Angeles will be going for its second straight title and No. 16 overall. The Celtics still have the edge, hanging their 17th banner with their victory two years ago in six games.

"We remember more than anything losing on our home court, a situation

where we had some defensive lapses and they took advantage of it," Lakers coach Phil Jackson said. "This year we have home-court advantage, and we look forward to the rematch with great intensity."

The Celtics improved to 9-2 in the finals against the Lakers, having dominated the series for decades even against the likes of Wilt Chamberlain, Jerry West and Elgin Baylor until Los Angeles won twice in the 1980s.

While the Lakers were the best of the West all season, the Celtics stumbled in the second half of the season and were only a No. 4 seed in the Eastern Conference.

But they're rediscovered the defense that contained Bryant two years ago, and after eliminating Dwyane Wade and LeBron James, now they get another shot at the Lakers star.

The Celtics limited Bryant to 25.7 points per game in the finals — he had averaged 31.9 points through the first three rounds — and 40 percent shooting.

The defending champion Lakers are making their third straight finals appearance.

Top lines regroup after empty Cup finals opener

CHICAGO (AP) — More startling than the frenetic pace between the Chicago Blackhawks and Philadelphia Flyers that produced 11 goals in the Stanley Cup finals opener was who was left off the score sheet.

In Chicago's 6-5 win — the highest scoring championship round game since 1992 — both teams' top lines and top guns couldn't find the net. They went pointless.

So what will happen if Jonathan Toews, Patrick Kane and Dustin Byfuglien get going for the Blackhawks, and if Mike Richards, Jeff Carter and Simon Gagne find their rhythm for the Flyers? Could it be 11-10 in Game 2 on Monday night?

Most likely not. "I thought we had good looks. We just didn't score and did everything but," Richards said Sunday.

"I think all three of us know it's not as much what they did as it was what we didn't do on the ice," Toews said.

During Sunday's off day, both teams stressed tight-

ening up the defense, reducing giveaways and doing a better job of clearing pucks out of the defensive end to make it easier on their goaltenders.

Flyers coach Peter Laviolette first refused to reveal if he will stick with Michael Leighton, who was pulled after yielding five goals in Game 1, or go back to Brian Boucher. Later, Laviolette announced through the team that Leighton will start.

If nothing else, the scoring extravaganza demonstrated the depth both teams have, with the Flyers getting goals from Danny Briere, Scott Hartnell, Ville Leino, Arron Asham and fourth-liner Blair Betts.

Briere, Hartnell and Leino also were tough on defense against the Toews-Kanes-Byfuglien line. Troy Brouwer had two of Chicago's goals from the second line and Tomas Kopecky scored the winner off an effective third line that also got goals from Kris Versteeg and Dave Bolland on a short-handed breakaway. Versteeg also assisted on Kopecky's goal.

Johnson sets Colonial record

FORT WORTH, Texas — Zach Johnson now has a plaid jacket to go along with his green one, after an extended wait before slipping on his prize at the Colonial.

Johnson won at Hogan's Alley with a tournament record 21-under 259, sealing his victory with a pair of birdies in the short span of play in between two late weather delays Sunday.

When Johnson drained a 14-foot birdie putt at the 17th hole to take a two-stroke lead over Brian Davis, he had a wide smile on his face and emphatically pumped his fist. But the real celebration had to wait.

"As far as momentum and a big putt, that was a big one," said Johnson, the 2007 Masters champion. "I didn't have a number in my head, but I figure if you get to 21, you have got a pretty good chance."

Johnson's closing 6-under 64 left him three strokes ahead of Davis, who had a closing 68.

Jeff Overton and Ben Crane both shot 67 to finish tied for third at 17 under. Scott Verplank (65) and Bryce Molder (70), who led after the second and third rounds, were another shot back.

Davis was again contending for his first PGA Tour victory, six weeks after the 35-year-old Englishman called a two-stroke penalty on himself on the first hole of a playoff at Hilton Head.

It is the seventh PGA Tour victory for Johnson and first since winning in San Antonio last May. His best finish through 12 tournaments this season had been a tie for 12th at the Sony Open in Hawaii the second week of

Into thin air: an Idaho Memorial Day story

You can’t visit Army 2nd Lt. Hans Niichel’s grave on this Memorial Day, unless you’re in Belgium. The son of an immigrant Buhl farmer died on March 15, 1945, near Lodz, Poland, when his parachute failed to open. Niichel had just bailed out of a burning B-24 Liberator bomber that had been shot down by the Soviet Air Force.

The Soviets were our allies during World War II. And the fighters that killed Niichel and a crewmate were American -built P-39s, supplied to Russia through the Lend Lease program.

There are a lot of remarkable stories to be told on Memorial Day. Niichel’s is astonishing.

He was a German, born in Munich in 1923. His father, John, was a farmer who had immigrated to Indiana and couldn’t make a go of it. He returned to Bavaria and served in the German Army during World War I, but the economic collapse that followed Germany’s defeat made things even worse in his homeland.

So Niichel followed his older brother to the Twin Falls Tract.

There he raised three very American kids.

But Hans stood out. At 6-feet, 4-inches, he was handsome, personable and the manager of the basketball team at Buhl High School. He appeared in theater productions, and when he graduated in 1940 he was his class’ salutorian.

Hans wanted to become an electrical engineer, or maybe a journalist. But the family had little money, so he moved to Los Angeles, got a job and eventually a two-year degree from Woodbury College.

By then it was 1942 – with America at war – and Hans enlisted. Taking a look at Hans’ test scores and background, the Army sent him to flight navigator school. In 1944, he married an L.A. girl, Genevieve Maloy, a telephone operator.

That fall, Niichel was posted to Britain with his squadron.

His job was to guide the 26-ton, four-engine, hard-to-fly B-24 through hundreds of miles of hostile airspace to targets inside Germany.

He did it 22 times. But the last time he didn’t come home.

After bombing Zossen, Germany, Niichel’s bomber had mechanical problems and headed for an air base in Poland, which had been recently occupied by the Red Army. As the Liberator approached the airfield, four P-39s shot it down. Niichel bailed out, but the aircraft was too close to the ground.

To his family back in Idaho, it seemed he had disappeared into thin air. The Army listed Niichel as missing.

Hans’ wife, who had been living with his parents, moved back to California. John Niichel died soon thereafter. Hans’ surviving sisters lived with a heartbreaking mystery for 46 years.

Then one day in 1991 the mayor of Buhl at the time, Ted Pence, received a letter from a retired Army pilot in Florida, Wes Bartelt, asking about Hans’ family. Eventually, the letter reached Claire Theener, a classmate of Hans’, and Theener tracked down Niichel’s two sisters, Liz and Rosemary, who were living in the Treasure Valley.

They contacted Bartelt, who was the pilot of the B-24. He told them how had Hans lived – and how he died. Bartelt said the shootdown wasn’t a case of mistaken identity – it was deliberate.

“Germans didn’t fly four-engined bombers,” he told the Times-News. “(The Russians) knew exactly what they were doing.”

The residents of the village near which the B-24 crashed buried Hans and his crewmate in a vault in a Catholic church, and eventually the bodies were moved to a military cemetery in Belgium.

He lies there today, amid the rows of white crosses.

Corporate America’s seething fat cats

So here’s how it is: They’re as mad as hell, and they’re not going to take this anymore. Am I talking about the Tea Partiers? No, I’m talking about the corporations.



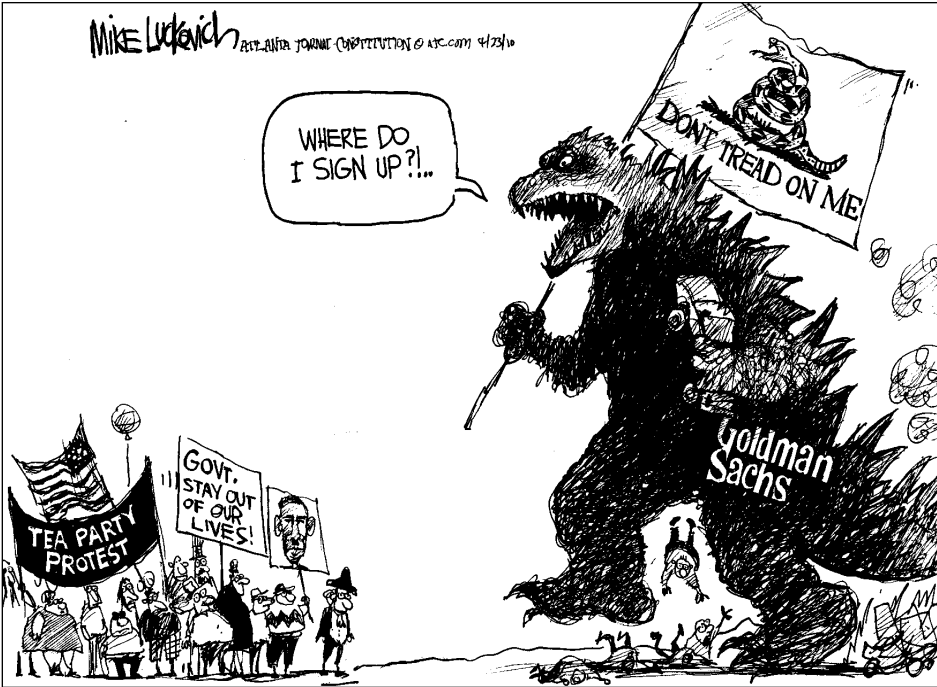

Much reporting on opposition to the Obama administration portrays it as a sort of populist uprising. Yet the antics of the socialism-and-death-panels crowd are only part of the story of anti-Obamaism, and arguably the less important part. If you really want to know what’s going on, watch the corporations.

How can you do that? Follow the money – donations by corporate political action committees.

Look, for example, at the campaign contributions of commercial banks – traditionally Republican-leaning, but only mildly so. So far this year, according to The Washington Post, 63 percent of spending by banks’ corporate PACs has gone to Republicans, up from 53 percent last year. Securities and investment firms, traditionally Democratic-leaning, are now giving more money to Republicans. And oil and gas companies, always Republican-leaning, have gone all out, bestowing 76 percent of their largess on the GOP.

These are extraordinary numbers given the normal tendency of corporate money to flow to the party in power. Corporate America, however, really, truly hates the current administration. Wall Street, for example, is in “a state of bitter, seething,



hysterical fury” toward the president, writes John Heilemann of *New York* magazine. What’s going on?

One answer is taxes – not so much on corporations themselves as on the people who run them. The Obama administration plans to raise tax rates on upper brackets back to Clinton-era levels. Furthermore, health reform will in part be paid for with surtaxes on high-income individuals. All this will amount to a significant financial hit to CEOs, investment bankers and other masters of the universe.

Many Obama supporters have been disappointed by what they see as the administration’s mildness on regulatory issues – its embrace of limited financial reform that doesn’t break up the biggest banks, its support for offshore drilling, and so on. Yet corporate interests are balking at even modest changes from the permissiveness of the Bush era.

From the outside, this rage against regulation seems

bizarre. I mean, what did they expect? The financial industry, in particular, ran wild under deregulation, eventually bringing on a crisis that has left 15 million Americans unemployed, and required large-scale taxpayer-financed bailouts to avoid an even worse outcome.

So what President Obama and his party now face isn’t just, or even mainly, an opposition grounded in right-wing populism. For grassroots anger is being channeled and exploited by corporate interests, which will be the big winners if the GOP does well in November.

If this sounds familiar, it should: it’s the same formula the right has been using for a generation. Use identity politics to whip up the base; then, when the election is over, give priority to the concerns of your corporate donors. Run as the candidate of “real Americans,” not those soft-on-terror East coast liberals; then, once you’ve won, declare that you have a mandate to privatize Social Security. It comes as

no surprise to learn that American Crossroads, a new organization whose goal is to deploy large amounts of corporate cash on behalf of Republican candidates, is the brainchild of none other than Karl Rove.

So where does that leave the president and his party? Obama wanted to transcend partisanship. Instead, however, he finds himself very much in the position Franklin Roosevelt described in a famous 1936 speech, struggling with “the old enemies of peace – business and financial monopoly, speculation, reckless banking, class antagonism, sectionalism, war profiteering.”

And that’s not necessarily a bad thing. Roosevelt turned corporate opposition into a badge of honor: “I welcome their hatred,” he declared. It’s time for President Obama to find his inner FDR, and do the same.

Drinking raw milk could present health risks

Pediatricians routinely advise families to never drink raw milk, not even to taste it. If a patient presents me with bloody diarrhea, I routinely ask if they have had any raw milk.

Here is a brief abstract from the American Academy of Pediatrics position on raw milk: “Unpasteurized milk and cheese” – The American Academy of Pediatrics strongly endorses the use of pasteurized milk and recommends that parents and public health officials be fully informed of the important risks associated with consumption of unpasteurized milk. Interstate sale of raw milk is banned by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Children should not consume unpasteurized milk or products made from unpasteurized milk, such as cheese and butter, from species including cows, sheep and goats. Serious systemic infections attributable to salmonella species, campylobacter species, mycobacterium bovis, listeria monocytogenes, brucella species, and Escherichia.”

If a person wants probiotics, then get them from a safe source. The science is not clear on which probiotics are really best for any particular age person. I occasionally have the adult family members of one of

my patients tell me “Well, I have been drinking raw milk all my life and I do fine,” and my reply is “You have been very lucky.”

Human breast milk is for humans; any other “raw” milk is for the species that produced it. Another well documented problem is that unfortified cow’s milk lacks Vitamin D and iron, and goat’s milk is deficient in Vitamin D, iron and in folate. The rare child that seems to only tolerate goat’s milk needs Vitamin D, iron and folate supplements to prevent rickets and possibly severe anemia.

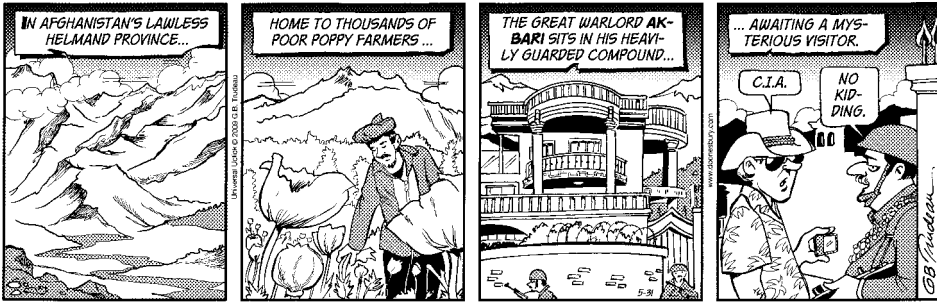
What the h— are they thinking? If our town leaders are this stupid, maybe they should all be replaced with people that have some backbone. Twin Falls leaders, you make me sick!

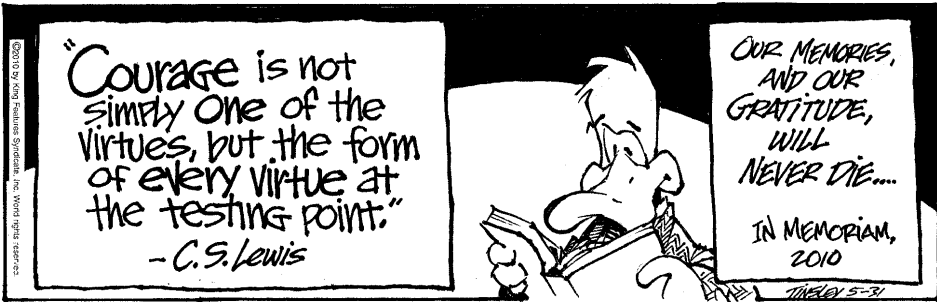

Highland games strength events gain popularity

As he practices, Eric Ettesvold is quite a sight, a kilt-clad man heaving huge rocks and long logs over his head. He explodes with the strength of a soldier in Braveheart's army, hurling the weight as far as he can.

And then he does it again, again and again, until he can throw no more. And then he grins.

Ettesvold is among the growing number of local athletes attracted to heavy events, the individual strength and agility portion of Highland Games. In the past three years, he said, the number of participants in the state games held in Boise has tripled, totaling 70 in 2010. The games often include piping, drumming and dance, as well as tug of war between large numbers of people, but the heavy events are usually the star of the show.

College of Southern Idaho hosted Twin Falls' first Scottish Highland Games in April, and Sun Valley's chamber of commerce is introducing the new Sun Valley Celtic Faire and Scottish Heavy Events in early June — an event that organizers hope will become an annual one hosting regional and national competition.

These events take some serious strength, but also impressive agility and balance, qualities that Ettesvold said attracted him to the sport.

"You've got endurance, you've got strength, you've got cardio, and it's all outdoors, that's the best," he said. "With this sport it's a great core strength workout, and if you have a strong core you have a strong body."

Ettesvold said he has lost 30 pounds since he started training about a year ago, and he said he's in better shape now, in his late 40s, than he was in high school, "and in high school I was a beast." He has run marathons and competed in long-distance swims, but he said heavy events are now his favorite.

"This is grabbing something and putting all your might into it, and little by little it taps your reserves into it until you're exhausted. You must keep training if you're going to get better, you can't do it halfway," he said. "I think it would appeal to anybody who wants to get strong in a hurry."

Blake Thompson of Heyburn, who just graduated from high school, has been training for heavy events for two months. As a school athlete, he said he was already in good shape before starting the training, but now his strength is increased, and he has seen his upper body and legs getting thicker with muscle.

Ettesvold and Thompson said the kind of strength developed through heavy events is quite different from that developed in a gym.

"My dad used to teach my brother and I that there's a difference between being able to bench press, and being able to work out on the farm. A person half my size can bench press 150 pounds, but he can't flip the caber," Thompson said, describing an event in which the competitor balances a long, heavy log, then runs and heaves it forward, hoping to bounce it off its other end and have it land pointing straight away from him.

Ettesvold said the people who compete in heavy events — and they are predominantly men, although some women compete — are less concerned with appearance than they

are with results.

"I'm going to be 47, I know that I'm not going to be ripped up like some 20-year-old kid, so if I can out-throw that 20-year-old kid, that's my victory, that's my showpiece," he said. "There is a lot of unsaid rivalry in (competition), but for the most part you're just trying to beat your own personal records."

As Ettesvold has learned and trained him-

self and others, safety has been paramount. The more experienced track the newcomers as they practice, ensuring they won't hurt themselves or others as they handle the heavy weights.

For both Ettesvold and Thompson, and for many who are attracted to heavy games, the eventing itself is only part of the appeal. They also like the history that the events represent, modern interpretations of the exercises that the Scottish army participated in to keep its strength up.

"It's a very, very old traditional event. It's old soldiering, it's historic, and it's interesting," Ettesvold said.

Thompson said he hopes to continue participating in heavy events for decades, in part because it connects him to his Scottish heritage.

And as Ettesvold said, "Who doesn't like to wear a kilt, you know?"

Sunscreen changes expected, but not before summer

WASHINGTON — A clearer, more meaningful standard for sunscreen labels is coming soon to a lotion near you, but not in time for the summer beach and camping season that kicks off this weekend.

The Food and Drug Administration is working to finish new labeling rules that have been years in the making, but not before October.

The current labeling system for sunscreen products is problematic, concedes Dr. James Spencer, spokesman for the American Academy of Dermatology. But as millions throng outside, he counsels: "Sunscreen is the best you can do for now, and we're working on better."

The idea behind the new federal regulations is to make labels less confusing, so consumers know exactly what kind of protection they're getting.

Most sunscreens on the market boast "broad spectrum UVA and UVB protection." There's a standard test to determine protection from the ultraviolet-B rays that cause sunburn — the familiar SPF rankings that tell people how long they can stay out in the sun before a burn.

But there is not a standard test to check protection from ultraviolet-A rays, the ones linked to cancer and wrinkles. That means it's not clear how much UVA protection people are getting from their sunscreens.

The rules expected this fall would change that, with a standard testing protocol and a proposed four-star UVA rating system. It would spell out the protection level as "low," "medium," "high," or "highest" — with one star representing low UVA protection, and four the highest protection available.

In the meantime, Spencer, a dermatologist in St. Petersburg, Fla., says people need to be sure to slather on plenty of sunscreen — a shot glass full of lotion for adults. Most people only put on about 25 to 50 percent of the lotion they need to protect them, he said.

He recommends a sunscreen with broad spectrum protection — UVA and UVB — and it should be at least an SPF 30.

Other tips:

- **Apply** sunscreen a half-hour before going outside. It takes that long to start working.
- **Re-apply** every few hours, especially if swimming or playing sports.
- **Limit** exposure during the peak UV hours of 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

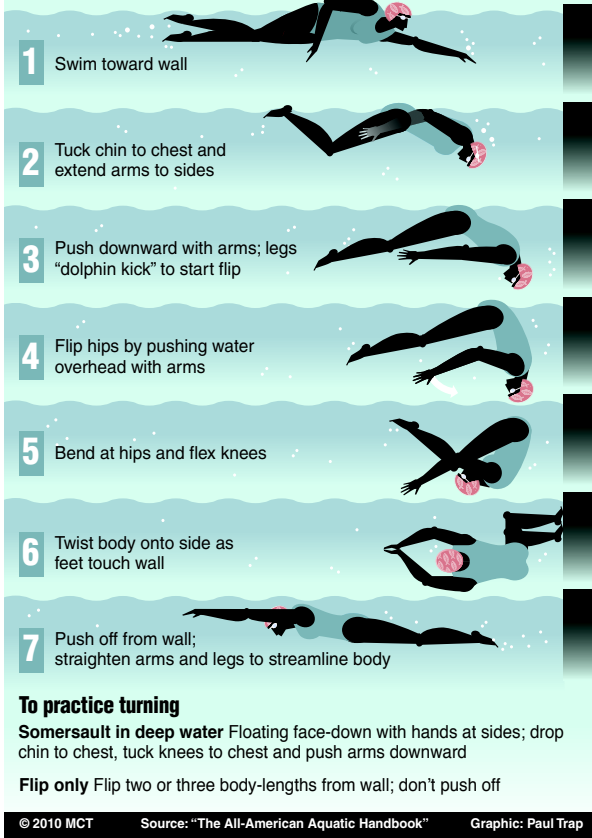

On nutrition: What am I?

Can you guess these 10 nutritional players? Find the answers at the end of this column.

1. I am one of the best sources of alpha-linolenic acid (ALA) — the plant form of omega-3 fatty acids. Along with other foods such as berries, chocolate and artichokes, I am a rich source of natural antioxidants that protect body cells from damage caused by “radical oxygen species.” My botanical name is “juglans regia” which means “royal nut.”

2. I am related to ginger and am the main ingredient in curry powder. According to an article in AARP The Magazine, I may be helpful in the prevention of Alzheimer’s disease.

3. People who eat me tend to have healthier weights than people who don’t. I help children perform better in school and score higher on tests.

4. I am a mineral found in very tiny amounts in the body as well as in computer chips. I help stimulate cells that form collagen — a protein that helps cushion cartilage in joints and gives strength and flexibility to bones. I am found in unrefined grains and was recently found to be residing in beer, according to researchers at the University of California, Davis.

5. I am a vitamin that helps the body absorb calcium. I also activate a protein in muscles that releases calcium needed for muscle

contraction. I help protect people from falls and fractures.

6. Humans are born with a natural taste for me. I make food taste sweet. A recent study in the Journal of the American Medical Association found that people who eat too much of me seem to have lower levels of “good” HDL cholesterol.

But it’s basically the same simple plan, which may appeal to anyone overwhelmed by information overload.

Training in mass casualty situations — triage — dictates that immediate care be given to those who are most likely to survive. Those who are identified as "expectant" are to be treated last. The purpose is to successfully treat the greatest number of people. Putting his energy into trying to save someone who would possibly die anyway could have resulted in even more fatalities.

DEAR KIMBERLY: Thank you for writing. I have been flooded with mail from medics from all branches of the military, from World War II, Korea, Vietnam and the current combat zones, offering support for Doc. I wish I could print them all.

Read on for a sample:

DEAR ABBY: I know his pain. I served in Iraq as a combat medic and watched friends die as I tried to help everyone I could. I still have nightmares and flashbacks. However, with treatment they are now under control.

I want Doc to understand that what he did was right. The soldier knew he was going to die no matter what was done. He gave his life for his team and his country. Doc needs to understand that this soldier's family is grieving and took it out on the person who just happened to be there.

I urge Doc to go to a mental health officer on base or to his local vet center for help. He can also call Military OneSource at (800) 342-9647. There are mental health people standing by 24/7 to help.

DEAR ABBY: The family of that wounded soldier needs to know that his last act of courage probably saved more than one life that day by allowing Doc to move on and treat others who could be saved. They should salute their family member and the actions of the medic.

Historically, military medics go into major battles, generally unarmed, with one purpose: to save the lives of wounded soldiers. They have one of the highest per capita casualty rates in the armed forces. It takes a special person to go into a live battle like that.

When this deal came up, South was the sort of player who prided himself on calling a spade a spade and who would have regarded the failure to win a trick when he had a high card available to take it as showing a lack of machismo.

Accordingly, when declaring three no-trump, he captured the spade queen with the king, took a heart finesse, and went down at once when East took his heart king and the defenders rattled off four spade tricks.

South's comment after the deal was that he had been very unlucky when two major-suit finesses had lost. That was all well and good, but declarer had failed to appreciate that he was still lay-down for his contract if he had exercised just a little care and attention.

Instead of taking the first spade trick, South must let the spade queen hold. East may clear the spades, but later, when the heart finesse loses, East has no spades left to play. If East has a third spade to lead after taking the heart king, the suit will have split 4-3, and South will lose just one heart and three spades.

Students of the game will note that if the heart king and queen are switched, declarer has another textbook play available. He must win the first spade and play West for the heart queen. If the heart finesse loses to West, no return can hurt South.

ANSWER: You should definitely lead a club, not a spade. A low club might work if partner has club length and only one top club honor. This lead might generate an extra club trick if declarer misguesses. However, leading a low club makes it much harder for partner to run the club suit facing, for example, K-J or A-J. Lead the club queen and tell partner you did "think about it" if the low club would have worked.



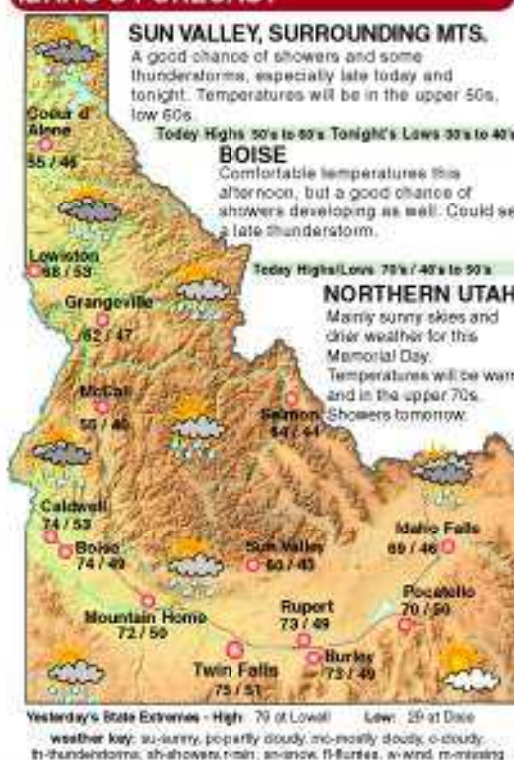

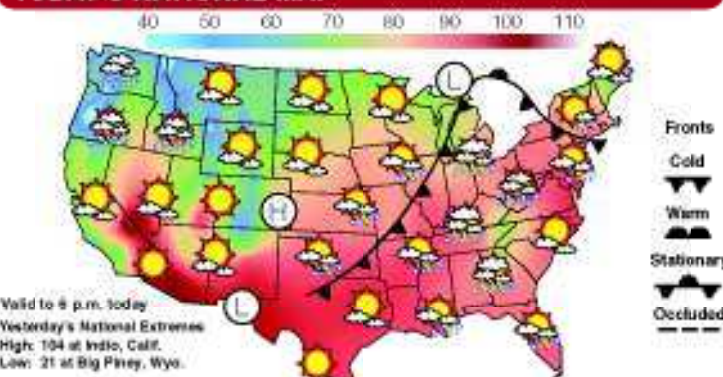
