C3 ribbon-cutting draws state, local officials to celebrate new jobs

With the snip of the scissors in front of the C3 call center, the expected applause erupted. People lined up for photos with Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter. Other officials stood in front of TV news cameras while the crowd of ties and business skirts milled about in the background. Inside, part of the 900-person workforce fielded phone calls in the building that was once home to a call center for Dell Computers Inc. A hundred miles away, Allstate Insurance Co. worked toward opening its own call center in Pocatello. “This is a call center state,” said Roger B. Madsen, director of the Idaho Department of Labor, at the celebration. He cited the time zone, Idaho work ethic and non-regional dialect as what made the state so appealing. “I think C3

likes Idaho and we are very hopeful they will expand.” Besides the 900 new jobs, the Department of Labor estimates the call center indirectly created an additional 690 jobs in Twin Falls. More than \$22 million will flow into the local economy directly from C3 and \$20.7 million indirectly, according to figures cited at the ribbon-cutting. Otter said C3 coming to Twin Falls sets an example for economic growth throughout the state because of the teamwork and public/private partnership used to make it happen. “They made it work,” Otter said. He said it sets an example in “making sure all the team is put together, state, local, city, for the economic development region, urban renewal, making sure all of them are in the room together and making sure they know who is leading so that

experienced workforce and the vacant, call center-ready building was a large draw for the company. The event also served as a sort of launching point for an information campaign from the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency, said Melinda Anderson, economic development director for the city of Twin Falls. On Sept. 1, the URA board held a special meeting to approve spending \$9,000 for a campaign meant to highlight the URA’s role in C3 and market its services to businesses, both local and otherwise — services such as matching some redevelopment or expansion costs for some businesses. Visible campaigning emerges in CSI trustee elections

The 2010 election is one marked with a Magic Valley rarity: active, visible signs of campaigning by candidates running for seats on the College of Southern Idaho Board of Trustees. Historically, elections for the positions are low profile, often with little opposition. CSI trustees are known for their longevity on the board. The positions are unpaid, but the reach of CSI in the Magic Valley and beyond makes the role of trustees in approving college policies and contracts a crucial one. This year, two seats on the five-member board are up for election in races that will be decided by voters in Twin Falls and Jerome counties. The winners will be elected to four-year terms. “I don’t ever remember this much interest,” said LeRoy Craig, a trustee since 1974 facing three opponents, Bob Keegan, Catherine Holston and Joshua Jackson. “I’ve never put signs up before and the only reason I put them up is that other people did.” Craig said he’s put up about 40

signs, but he’s also using another tool to get the word out: mass mailings of postcards to registered voters seeking their support. The postcards encourage voters to back Craig, the board’s chairman, and Vice-Chairman Charles Lehrman, an incumbent trustee since 1974 who’s facing Karl Kleinkopf, a CSI retiree. While Craig’s got signs out this election, Lehrman said that doesn’t fit his personal philosophy. He doesn’t have any signs out. “To me, it has a tendency to make it look like a political thing,” he said. “I believe in other types of publicity, which we’re doing, but

Disgruntled parents of Xavier Charter School students could come one step closer to booting out school board members today. A special board of trustees meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. today at the Twin Falls school, 1218 N. College Road. According to Andrea Dayley, the co-chairwoman of the school’s Parent-Faculty Association, a group of concerned parents has started a petition to remove three of the five board members — Chairman Jeff Bulkley, Teresa Berry and Shawn Wilsey. Dayley said that petition was not started by the Xavier PFA. “A group of concerned parents don’t feel like the board has the children’s best interests at heart,” Dayley said. The reason for the petition, according to Dayley, is that a hostile work environment between the board and teachers has created an atmosphere of mistrust. The school is currently entangled in a conflict between the board and principal Cindy Fulcher, who was placed on leave in August. Fulcher is suing all five board members in an attempt to prevent them from firing her. *See TRUSTEE, Main 2* *See XAVIER, Main 2*

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Poverty rates rise, IDLA a success in T.F. schools

Twin Falls School Board members on Wednesday heard a mix of good and bad news.

On the upside, pass results for students who took Idaho Digital Learning Academy classes in the summer of 2010 were at a high rate: 87.18 percent overall, officials said. Individual schools had dif-

ferent rates, with Magic Valley Alternative High School and Vera C. O’Leary Middle School posting 100 percent rates. About 350 students at five schools took the courses.

On the downside, poverty rates at schools are at 60 percent district-wide, as measured by the percentage of students in the free and reduced lunch program. That’s up from 40 percent eight years ago, said

Superintendent Wiley Dobbs.

Only two schools, Sawtooth Elementary and Twin Falls High School, have rates that are below 50 percent, with TFHS having the lowest at 36 percent. The highest rates are at Bridge Academy, which is at 82.4 percent, and Harrison Elementary, which has a rate of 81.31 percent.

In other business, the school board approved hir-

ing Dale Thornsberry as a part-time activities director at Canyon Ridge High School.

Thornsberry retired in 2009 as facilities manager, a job that included overseeing the construction of Canyon Ridge High School.

The position’s salary was unavailable on Wednesday.

Cassia Co. schools OK video surveillance policy

BURLEY — Even if Big Brother isn’t really watching, Cassia County School District officials might soon start.

District board officials on Tuesday unanimously approved a new policy that would allow the use of video surveillance in district schools. The move allows school officials to place closed-circuit cameras in common areas that are determined appropriate by the district superintendent.

District administrators

will determine how much videotape will be used and stored, and for how long tapes will be stored. Video surveillance won’t be used for teacher evaluation purposes without prior teacher consent, but video evidence could become part of student or staff records.

“Obviously this will be tweaked. I think it will be reviewed periodically,” said district attorney Doug Whipple.

Whipple said the district has to balance its students’ and faculty’s right to privacy against the need for surveil-

lance. If tapes are kept, he said, they could be requested by the public, and the district would then have to receive a student’s signed parental consent to release them.

“It could become challenging,” Whipple said.

Responding to a question from Trustee Mike Matthews, Whipple said cameras are currently in use on district buses.

Matthews said that trustees should consider posting signs in videotaped areas so people can determine whether they want their actions recorded.

“The kids will know that they (the cameras) are going,” Matthews said.

In other business, the board requested additional changes to a second draft of a policy governing employee use of electronic communication and entertainment devices. The policy will be reviewed at the board’s November meeting.

The board also approved the formation of a dedicated fund for school activities. It also approved giving noncertified employees two personal days per year and approved a policy regarding the use of district credit cards.

Gooding man pleads not guilty in abuse case

Richard L. Steen, 51, of Gooding, pleaded not guilty to two counts of sexual abuse of a child and one count of lewd conduct with a child on Tuesday in Gooding County 5th District Court.

Steen is accused of having inappropriate physical conduct with a 10-year-old child and photographing and videotaping that child, along with a 7-year-old child, in the nude. A jury trial is set for Jan. 19 in Gooding County, with Judge John K. Butler presiding.

ITD, ISP partner to stop unbelted, aggressive drivers

The Idaho Transportation Department, Idaho State Police and other law enforcement agencies across Idaho will implement high-visibility seat belt and aggressive driving patrols Friday through Nov. 14.

During the campaign, ISP Region 4 troopers will increase enforcement of speed limits and traffic laws, and cite unbelted drivers.

“Drivers must recognize what aggressive driving is, understand the risk, and know they will be ticketed if they choose to drive aggressively,” Lt. Kevin Haight said

in a written statement.

Tailgating, changing lanes without warning, speeding, running red lights, following too closely, or failing to yield are all indicators that you are an aggressive driver, according to ITD’s Office of Highway Operations and Safety.

In 2009, almost 60 percent of people killed in Idaho in aggressive driving crashes were not wearing seat belts.

According to ISP and ITD, 51 percent of the 2,645 crashes reported in Region 4 in 2009 involved aggressive driving; 19 of 31 passengers killed in Region 4 in 2009 were unrestrained and 55 of 162 passengers injured in Region 4 in 2009 were unrestrained.

Drug trafficking suspect pleads not guilty

Juan F. Monejano Barraza, 40, of Gooding, faces a January jury trial after pleading not guilty to multiple crimes.

Barraza is accused of trafficking in methamphetamine, violating the drug stamp tax, driving under the influence, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possessing an invalid driver’s license. Jury trial is slated for Jan. 19 in Gooding County, with Judge John K. Butler presiding.

Kleinkopf estimated that he’s put out about 100 signs and has spoken with various groups.

“I’m getting 100 percent acceptance and people in the community really being behind my campaign, and being really in acceptance of my experience and what I want to give back to the college,” he said, adding that volunteers have helped put up signs.

Keegan’s put out the most signs, including in rural communities like Eden and Murtaugh. He said he’s put out about 150.

He noted that it’s not a presidential election year, but that the governor’s race might pull extra votes to the polls.

“I like my chances,” he said.

Holston said she has about 14 signs out, but also uses

other means, including word-of-mouth and a Facebook page.

Jackson said he has focused more on door-to-door campaigning instead of signs, though that’s difficult with time constraints. He said that interest among voters he interacts with is strong.

“They know a lot about the CSI position and the things I’m running on,” he said. “They’ve got opinions on this. They care about this.”

Heyburn couple face charges in crime spree

BURLEY — A Heyburn couple faces 25 combined criminal charges stemming from an alleged Oct. 13 crime spree through Burley.

Cody Gene Morgan, 20, and his wife, Jenifer Carol Morgan, 19, allegedly took a male juvenile in the foster care of Cody Morgan’s father on a late-night rampage through Burley on Oct. 13, during which police say they stole from vehicles and homes.

In court records, police state that Jenifer Morgan told them that the couple left their home with the juvenile at 11 p.m., after the juvenile, who was also charged for the alleged incident, told them he wanted to steal items from

cars in Burley. Morgan told police that she drove the car and listened to music while her husband and the juvenile stole items and gas from Burley vehicles.

Cody Morgan is charged with six counts of burglary, destruction, alteration or concealment of property — all felonies — and six misdemeanor petit theft counts. He’s scheduled for a preliminary hearing in 5th District Magistrate Court in Burley at 9 a.m. Friday.

Jenifer Morgan is scheduled to appear in court at 9 a.m. Nov. 9 on five counts of burglary, one count of criminal conspiracy — all felonies — and five misdemeanor counts of petit theft.

Both are being held in the Mini-Cassia Criminal Justice Center in Burley on \$75,000 bond each.

Some parents, like Mike Stahlecker, have signed the petition as a way of sticking up for Fulcher.

“I don’t know her personally, but I like the way she handles the school,” said Stahlecker, who has two children enrolled at Xavier. “I think she’s a very good principal. I want to see her stay there.”

A website called Savexavier.org, which purports to represent concerned Xavier parents and expresses support for Fulcher, has also been started.

According to Dayley, parents presented the petition at the regularly scheduled Oct. 14 board meeting, noting that the board had 10 working days to release the number of signatures needed to recall each board member. That number is based on the number of votes received

when each board member first won his or her seat.

Petition organizers would then have up to 60 days to gather the necessary signatures. If board members are recalled, new elections would take place to fill any vacancies created.

Board members Berry and Emily Huber both declined comment. Bulkley, reached late Wednesday, said he could not comment at the time due to personnel and confidentiality issues.

Rupert backs constitutional amendment

RUPERT — The Rupert City Council voted unanimously Tuesday to support a proposed amendment to the Idaho Constitution.

The amendment, on the Nov. 2 ballot, would remove a

requirement for city-owned electric utilities — such as Rupert’s — to get voter approval for long-term debt, as long as such debt doesn’t involve taxpayer dollars.

Councilman James Bowers made the motion to approve the resolution. That followed a statement from city attor-

ney Kelly Anthon that the city hasn’t spent any money to support the measure, as it is prohibited from doing so.

Also Tuesday, police Officers Mike Phillips and Jeff McEwen received Police Officer Standards and Training instructor certifications. The department has

filled all of its instructor posts but two.

“They have saved the city of Rupert money by doing so,” said Mayor Paul Fries. “Now instead of sending our officers away to get their training, they can be trained in-house. Congratulations to the officers and Chief

(Randall) White. Thank you.”

Fries also appointed Roger Davis as the city’s new fire chief. Davis was a volunteer for 20 years before taking the position.

Also discussed was a Nov. 23 public hearing on proposed changes in city building codes. Officials said the

city will adopt standards that best apply to residents, who are invited to the hearing to express their ideas and learn how the changes would affect them.

Kimberly debates water rates

KIMBERLY — The 15 or so members of the public who attended Tuesday’s Kimberly City Council meeting were focused on one issue and one only.

Mayor Dave Overacre opened the meeting by adding a second public-comment time to the agenda for input on suggested tiered water rates.

“Everybody’s going to hold it until later, aren’t they?” he asked when no one spoke at a time for general public comment.

The proposed fees were developed by a Utility Advisory Committee chaired by George Plew, a former councilman. They’re meant to pay for a \$6.6 million water project that among other things installed meters at businesses and homes.

The committee suggested water cost:

- \$1.75 per thousand gallons for residential units using up to 12,000 gallons.
- \$2.08 for every thousand residential gallons past 12,000.
- \$1.10 per thousand gallons for commercial users.
- Each commercial and residential unit will have a \$23.42 bond payment.

Changes would also be made to the cost of pressurized irrigation.

Plew and four members of the committee answered questions from both the council and the public. Council members sought to clarify how the committee made the recommendation and how the information it worked with was gathered.

Ruth Stimpson voiced the first concern from the public.

“I believe that we should get some water free — 8,000, 10,000, and then start charging us,” she said.

Committee member Jim Eisenhower said other communities such as Filer do wait to start their tiers until after a certain point, but that’s because they charge a base rate up to that

point.

“It is not free,” Eisenhower said. “We felt that tiering it the way we did, those people who only use 5,000 gallons actually make out much better.”

City resident Bob Behrens asked the council to consider sending out a flier summarizing the changes and dates they will take effect.

City Administrator Polly Hulsey said that the council has discussed a similar idea, but decided to wait until the dates the fee changes will start are chosen.

More than one committee member expressed a desire to reassess the tiered rate in six months or a year, when more data is available to look at. And the committee and council said the rates aren’t set in stone yet.

“This is just a recommendation,” committee member Kathy Woodruff said. “This doesn’t mean it’s what your bill will be.”

Councilwoman Mitzi Chedelin said using about 6,000 gallons under the proposal would keep water bills at the same price, based on rough calculations she made at the meeting.

Committee member Troy Winward said that he found his family of four, including two infants, used about 4,000 gallons over the past month.

Which country do we want back?

As battle cries go, the Tea Party's "Take our country back" is a pretty good one. It's short and punchy, and it addresses a very widespread sense that the nation that Americans once lived in has changed, and not for the better.

When the Tea Partyers get around to identifying how America has changed and to whose benefit, however, they get it almost all wrong. In the worldview of the American right — and the polling shows conclusively that that's who the Tea Party is — the nation, misled by President Obama, has gone down the path to socialism. In fact, far from venturing down that road, we've been stuck on the road to hyper-capitalism for three decades now. The Tea Partyers are right to be wary of income redistribution, but if they had even the slightest openness to empiricism, they'd see that the redistribution of the past 30 years has all been upward — radically upward. From 1950 through 1980, the share of all income in America going to the bottom 90 percent of Americans — effectively, all but the rich — increased from 64 percent to 65 percent, according to an analysis of tax data by economists Thomas Piketty and Emmanuel Saez. Because the nation's economy was growing handsomely, that means that the average income of Americans in the bottom 90 percent was growing, too — from \$17,719 in 1950 to \$30,941 in 1980 — a 75 percent increase in income in constant 2008 dollars.

Since 1980, it's been a very different story. The economy has continued to grow handsomely, but for the bottom 90 percent of Americans, it's been a time of stagnation and loss. Since 1980, the share of all income in America going to the bot-

tom 90 percent has declined from 65 percent to 52 percent. In actual dollars, the average income of Americans in the bottom 90 percent flat-lined — going from the \$30,941 of 1980 to \$31,244 in 2008.

In short, the economic life and prospects for Americans since the Reagan Revolution have grown dim, while the lives of the rich — the super-rich in particular — have never been brighter. The share of income accruing to America's wealthiest 1 percent rose from 9 percent in 1974 to a tidy 23.5 percent in 2007.

Looking at these numbers, it would be reasonable to infer that when the Tea Partyers say that they want to take the country back, they mean back to the period between 1950 and 1980, when the vast majority of Americans encountered more opportunity and security in their economic lives than they had before or since. Reasonable, but wrong. As the right sees it,

America's woes are traceable to the New Deal order that Franklin Roosevelt, working in the shadow of the even more sinister Woodrow Wilson, imposed on an unsuspecting people.

In fact, the New Deal order produced the only three decades in American history — the '50s, '60s and '70s — when economic security and opportunity were widely shared. It was the only period in the American chronicle when unions were big and powerful enough to ensure that corporate revenue actually trickled down to workers. It marked the only time in American history when, courtesy originally of the GI Bill, the number of Americans going to college surged. It was the only time when taxes on the rich were really significantly higher than taxes on the rest of us. It was the only time that the minimum wage kept pace (almost) with the cost of living. And it was the only time when most Americans felt

confident enough about their economic prospects, and those of their nation, to support the taxes that built the postwar American infrastructure.

Since the ascent of Ronald Reagan, though, America's claim to being a land of opportunity has become a sick joke. Unions have dwindled; colleges have become unaffordable; manufacturing has gone abroad; taxes on the rich have plummeted; our infrastructure has decayed.

But the country the right wants to return to isn't the America that the Greatest Generation built. Judging by the statements of many of the Republican and Tea Party-backed candidates on next Tuesday's ballots, it's the America that antedates the New Deal — a land without Social Security, unions or the minimum wage. It's the land that the Greatest Generation gladly left behind when they voted for and built the New Deal order. All of us should want our country back, but that country should be the more prosperous and economically egalitarian nation that flourished at the time when America was not only the world's greatest power, but also a beacon to the world.

Politicians trying to shut public out of poultry-siting process

Secretive efforts by state and local politicians to bring up to 20 million chickens to the Magic Valley would have the same impact as adding another 200,000 dairy cows. Recent closed-door efforts to attract the new industry across three counties is purposely excluding public involvement regarding regulations intended to protect local land, water and air.

The public is unaware of what has transpired in meetings between Magic Valley legislators and county commissioners. Discussion between the governing bodies over a giant chicken business appears an exercise in non-accountability, even though the number of birds proposed would produce between one-half and three-quarters of a million tons of manure annually. This manure is very high in nitrogen, and contains significant amounts of arsenic, copper and zinc. Thus it can endanger our land and our water if not applied properly.

ly. At this point the Departments of Environmental Quality and Agriculture would act only as advisors to county commissioners. This is an inadequate approach for addressing such a serious problem.

Cassia County has already enacted regulations allowing 4.2 million birds at one location, while additional property has allegedly been optioned in Jerome County. And land has been purchased near Burley's interstate exit for a huge processing plant. All this after the House of Representatives killed a Senate-passed bill regulating poultry and swine CAFOs. Rep. Bert Stevenson has caved in to the demands of no state regulation for a proposed chicken mega-business. Addressing makeshift con-

trols on a county-by-county basis is a totally inadequate response.

If the chickens come, residents need to help establish the conditions, including the guarantee of no destruction to our quality of life. Missouri requires 320 acres of farm ground dedicated to handling chicken litter for each 100,000 birds. If Idaho used the same criteria, approximately 100 square miles of Magic Valley farm land must be dedicated to disposal of the litter.

At present, more than 250,000 dairy cattle reside in the same areas proposed for the bird farms, and dairy waste is largely disposed of by land application. If the same disposal methods were adopted for the two-footers, immediate conflicts would rise between the environmentally high-impact businesses. Chicken litter is known to be rich in nitrogen, thus creating a serious danger to our invaluable underground aquifer. Parts of Minidoka and Cassia counties already

are dangerously high in nitrate groundwater levels.

Disposal methods must be discussed in detail. Options for handling chicken litter can include pelletizing and exporting of the litter, disposal in anaerobic digesters, and composting before exporting. I have professional experience with anaerobic digesters and know they can provide an attractive reward-vs.-cost alternative to land dumping.

If the chicken industry is allowed into the MV, residents need to be a fundamental part of the governing process, not gagged by autocratic politicians. We need in on the ground floor deciding regulatory conditions aimed at guarantees of no destruction to our quality of life. If they're good neighbors, I welcome them, but the sudden emergence of such a large enterprise requires disclosure of what legislation is being crafted to provide reasonable regulation. In this case, it appears to be the near lack of control.

Jerome P & Z approves design-review guidelines

Smoke shop raises questions among residents

JEROME— Jerome is on a beautification mission, at least on Main Street and Lincoln Ave.

The city’s planning and zoning committee met on Tuesday night to discuss a

design review ordinance and guidelines for businesses.

The ordinance has been in the works for a year now according to Micah Austin, assistant to the city administrator. The vote passed unanimously at the P & Z meeting and will go before the city council on Nov. 16 for approval.

“There was a business in town that had a pretty noticeable paint job a year ago and over the last 12 months we have been putting together the ordinance and guidelines,” Austin said.

The ordinance requires that business owners apply for and obtain a design review permit before acquiring a building permit. The guidelines suggest exterior color schemes and facades stay consistent with Jerome’s architectural char-

acter. While the guidelines encourage individuality and creativity they also require a more demure approach to businesses located on the well-trafficked streets.

“I hope this will address aesthetic flaws to make Jerome more of an inviting place for businesses to come to town and for families to stay here and raise their chil-

dren,” Austin said.

Four members from the community attended the meeting and voiced their concern over the newest paint job on the former Jolly Bean building which boats neon green, yellow and orange colors. The new business, Hayze Days, is affiliated with Allen Nagel, owner of the Hayze Spice Co. and other businesses in Twin Falls.

He said the rush to pass the ordinance now that the business is awaiting an occupancy permit is

“absolutely ridiculous.”

“I think it looks nice. As soon as I paint it Rasta colors everyone cries about it,” Nagel said. “It’s not a hindrance. Just because it is going to be a smoke shop, everybody has an opinion now.”

Sharon Avent moved to Jerome three years ago and described Main Street as a “ghetto area,” a much different place than it was years before when she visited Jerome with her husband.

Even in e-tailing age, consumers feel urge to touch goods

CHICAGO — Want to buy a sweater or shoes at 3 a.m.? No problem, thanks to the convenience of online shopping.

But is that really the most rewarding experience for consumers and merchants?

A recent California Institute of Technology study suggests not. In it, consumers found more value in — and would pay on average 50 percent more for — goods they could touch. And that ranges from food to trinkets.

CalTech’s findings seem to score one for brick-and-mortar stores. “You can extrapolate the implications of online versus in-store, and I think it’s a very reasonable implication,” said Antonio Rangel, senior author of the

CalTech study.

But hold on, say consumers and experts. It’s apparently more complicated than that.

Andrea Morales, an associate professor at Arizona State University who researches consumer behavior and social psychology, agrees that shoppers do feel more connected with products after touching them, but usually dig deep into the sweater pile to avoid buying one that’s been touched by strangers.

“Even though they want to touch them, they really don’t want other

people to touch them,” Morales said. “This is one application of disgust at work.”

Scott Krugman, vice president of industry public relations for the National Retail Federation, took issue with the CalTech study, saying shoppers often research products online, such as electronics, before buying them at a store.

“What I think that study is failing to see is how much of that in-store purchase is influenced by online research,” Krugman said.

CalTech’s Rangel said he didn’t have

concrete data to respond to whether consumers are using the Internet to research certain products prior to buying them in person.

Lars Perner, assistant professor of clinical marketing at the University of Southern California’s Marshall School of Business, agrees that consumers go online to research items, especially expensive products.

“If you were to buy an iPod and you’ve seen your friend having the same one, you wouldn’t hesitate to buy online,” Perner said, adding there is the more detailed information on electronics online than in a store.

A drawback to buying at a store, Perner said, is that you may be able to touch a digital camera, but “it won’t be

Labor grant can help finance on-the-job training

Idaho businesses thinking about hiring new employees could benefit from an on-the-job training program the Idaho Department of Labor is coordinating with a \$625,000 federal grant.

“This money will help put quality employees back

to work with skills that will increase their value to employers across the state,” Department Director Roger B. Madsen said.

Eligible employers are reimbursed for at least 50 percent of the wages they pay to qualified new employees during the on-the-job training period —

up to six months depending on the occupation and the trainee’s skill level. The job must pay at least \$10 an hour and include employer-subsidized benefits.

The Idaho Department of Labor has stepped up its emphasis on business services, and the push to introduce businesses to on-the-job training pro-

gram is its newest effort to give employers a lift into the next economic expansion.

Employers can call any of the 25 local Labor offices to learn if the jobs they are planning to fill or the employees they want to hire are eligible.

“If a business calls us with a potential employee

we can determine eligibility over the phone,” Madsen said. “If the potential worker is eligible, a Labor consultant will complete the paperwork for the employee’s enrollment.”

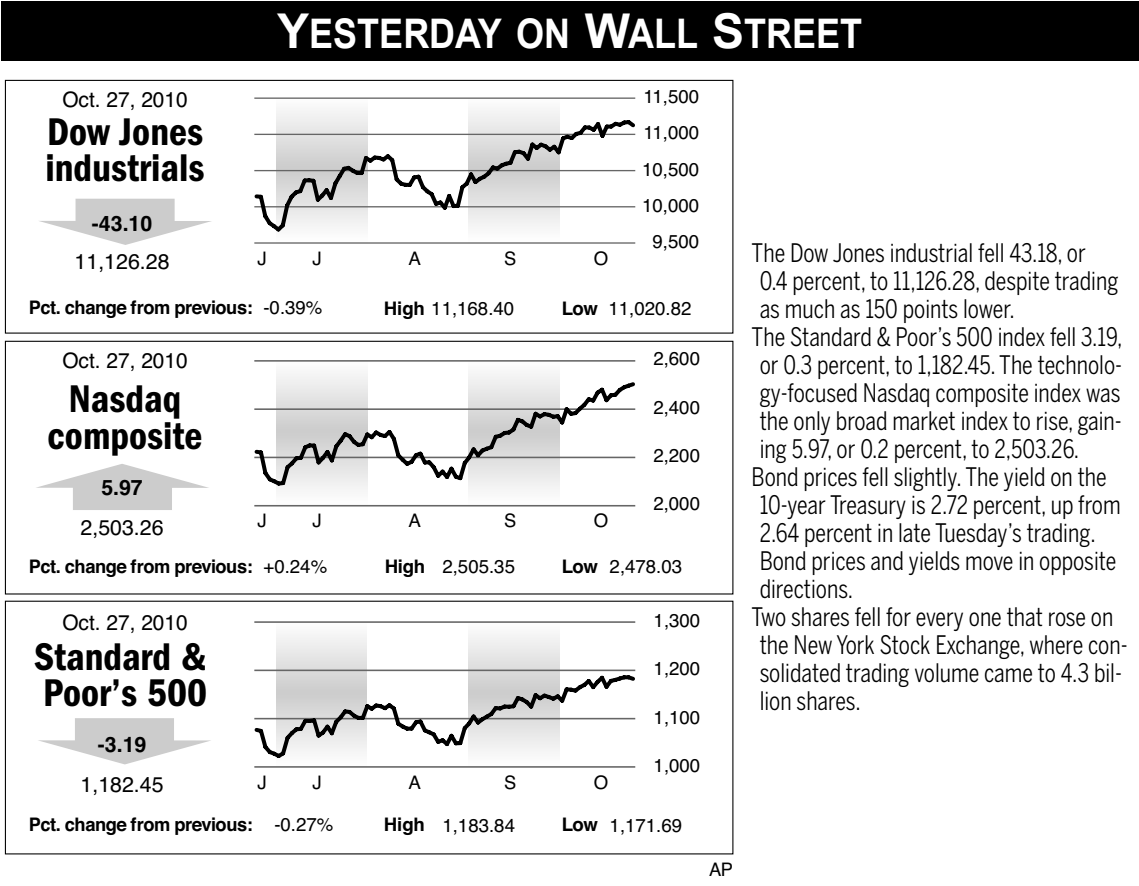

The Dow Jones industrial fell 43.18, or 0.4 percent, to 11,126.28, despite trading as much as 150 points lower. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 3.19, or 0.3 percent, to 1,182.45. The technology-focused Nasdaq composite index was the only broad market index to rise, gaining 5.97, or 0.2 percent, to 2,503.26. Bond prices fell slightly. The yield on the 10-year Treasury is 2.72 percent, up from 2.64 percent in late Tuesday's trading. Bond prices and yields move in opposite directions. Two shares fell for every one that rose on the New York Stock Exchange, where consolidated trading volume came to 4.3 billion shares.

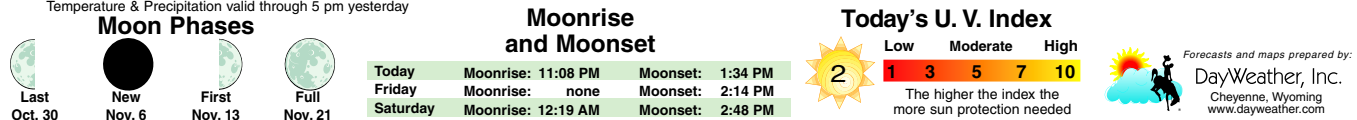

T.F. man houses trophy room, revives motorcycle club

There are different ways to decorate a home office. Some people use wallpaper, others use paint.

Jason Smoot uses awards. He has many awards that he’s garnered over the past 30 years as a desert racer and dirt bike aficionado. They’re housed in one room of his Twin Falls home, a room he calls “Finish Line Bar.” The room has hardwood floors, a leather sofa, countertops and refrigerator, and, like any other bar, a few beer memorabilia. But it’s the awards that stand out.

“When I get done riding with my buddies and family, we come back here for a cold beer and talk about the race,” he said. “Talking about it sometimes is just as much fun as riding.”

The place serves as a memory room where Smoot points to an award, saying, “I won this one when ...” Smoot, 40, has been riding dirt bikes since he was a kid in grade school. He was influenced by his dad, who always had motorcycles around the house.

“He was my hero,” Smoot said affectionately, pointing out his dad, Dan Smoot, in a photograph pinned to a wall in his garage.

The garage, its cement floor bare of any oil stains,

sits just off Smoot’s trophy room and is where he keeps his dirt bikes — two Kawasaki’s and a 1982 Husqvarna. On the walls are his sponsor’s flags, Kawasaki.

It all adds to the character that is Smoot. After meeting him you realize that he and dirt bikes go together like tires on a rim.

“It’s exciting, it’s fun, and it’s just you and the bike,” he said about riding. “You prepare your body all week, you prepare your bike all week, then you go out and race against your buddies to see how you pull it off.”

His awards attest that he’s pulled it off many times.

...

Smoot moved to Twin Falls from Pocatello in 2008. Three years before, in 2005, he, along with brother Ryan Smoot and friend Jason Weeks, restarted the Coyotes Motorcycle Club. The club has origins from the 1970s but membership had dwindled over the years. His dad was a member, and Smoot remembers the many activities the club used to sponsor. It was a different time, when trail access wasn’t as much of an issue as it is today.

Smoot, who now serves as club president, says he wants to make sure the Coyotes continue for a new generation of riders. The club, which crosses geographic boundaries, now has

about 25 members from Twin Falls, Boise, Hailey and Pocatello. Members participate in races in Idaho, Montana, Nevada and Utah, as well as special trail-clearing and clean-up days throughout the year.

Smoot says he also likes to support other off-road organizations, often joining race associations with nominal fees, usually \$15 to \$20.

“It’s nothing that’s going to make or break a guy,” he said. “I like to help out.”

...

In the Finish Line Bar, Smoot looks at the wall of trophies and notices the

many different bikes he’s raced over the years — he’s on a different bike in almost every picture.

“I must have gone through at least 20 bikes in 30 years,” he said. Replacing them isn’t because they wear out, necessarily, as much as keeping up with new technology and enhanced components from manufacturers.

Riding is a strenuous activity that wears not only on bike components, but on the human body. Smoot must maintain proper hydration in a race and physical fitness all year.

In his office is a trophy that has nothing to do with dirt bike racing, but about

physical endurance: Habitat for Humanity’s Rim 2 Rim race he and other Coyote club members participated in on Sept. 17.

...

“This one means a lot to me,” Smoot said about one award — the largest — on his office wall.

The award, shaped like a sword, is from a race hosted by the Desert Raiders in 2007 in Oreana. About 180 riders participated, but only one — Smoot — placed first overall.

Another award, this one in the shape of a sprocket, tells

that Smoot placed 34th overall out of 400 riders at a race in May at Cherry Creek, Utah. The race was important to him not only because of his standing, but because it was his dad's last race. At 63, and diagnosed with leukemia, Dan Smoot accomplished his goal, which was to finish the race.

"That's all he wanted to do," Smoot said of his dad. "That's how important dirt biking is to him."

As for Smoot, he couldn't compete without the people behind him, such as wife Starla.

"She's a hell of a support," he said. "She's my pit crew."

Starla used to ride all-terrain vehicles but caught dirt bike fever because of her husband. One of the Kawasaki's in their garage belongs to her — "They're way more fun," she said, admitting, however, that she falls down a lot more than she did on a four-wheeler.

She doesn't worry too much about her husband.

"He's a safe rider," she said.

She'd like to see him more when he's desert racing, but the long-distance tracks make seeing him infrequent. She's able to watch him more when he races at smaller venues like Rock Creek Race Track in Kimberly, where he performed Oct. 16 in an endurance race. He came in first in the 40 Expert class, and second overall.

The Smoots have two children — Kody, 9, and 13-year-old Lindsey. They think it's cool their dad races, but their interests are off the track, in basketball and soccer.

That's just fine with Smoot, who supports his children in their interests just as his family supports him in his.

Starla pits for other team members besides her husband, refreshing them with candy bars and drinks. It helps motivate Smoot.

"I have to make sure I get there first to get all the good treats," he said.

Boy, 11, killed in NW Minn. ATV crash

SALOL, Minn. — An 11-year-old boy has died after an all-terrain vehicle flipped and rolled on him in northwestern Minnesota. Roseau County sheriff's authorities say Dylan Muirhead of Roseau was driving the four-wheeler at his grandfather's home near Salol when the accident happened Saturday. Dylan's brother told authorities he had watched Dylan jump over the driveway on the ATV, and when it

landed, the machine flipped and rolled on him. Dylan was taken to a Roseau hospital but was pronounced dead before he could be airlifted to a hospital in Grand Forks, N.D.

2 men die in 2-dirt-bike crash in NE Minn.

DULUTH, Minn. — Two men have died in a collision between two dirt bikes about 40 miles west of Duluth in northeastern Minnesota. The St. Louis County sheriff's office says deputies were called to the scene

around 11:30 p.m. Saturday in Prairie Lake Township in the southwestern corner of the county. The sheriff's office says 28-year-old Kevin Allen McElwee, of Cedar, was traveling west on Graff Road when he collided with 20-year-old Jonathan Nickolas Clough, of Mora, who was eastbound.

1 dead in ATV fatality at Okla. state park

WAYNOKA, Okla. — A spokeswoman for the Oklahoma Tourism and

Recreation Department says a 61-year-old man from Maysville has died in an all-terrain vehicle accident at Little Sahara State Park. Spokeswoman Leslie Blair says the accident that killed William John Zurline occurred Friday afternoon at the park near Waynoka in northwestern Oklahoma that is known for its rideable sand dunes.

ATV wreck kills Maine man

AMITY, Maine — The Maine Warden Service says a 47-year-old Amity man has

died in an all-terrain vehicle accident. Officials say Mark Howell's ATV crashed into trees off Estabrook Road in Amity. Wardens were contacted at 2 a.m. Saturday. Wardens searched during the night, and Howell was located at about 8 a.m. Saturday. He was not wearing a helmet, and was dead at the scene.

19-year-old killed in Maine ATV accident

CUMBERLAND, Maine — Officials in the Maine town

of Cumberland are investigating an all-terrain vehicle crash that killed a young man. Police say 19-year-old Jesse Zacks was riding on a road at 5 p.m. on Oct. 11 when he vaulted over the front of his machine, which then landed on top of him. The *Portland Press Herald* said Zacks died while being flown to Maine Medical Center on a LifeFlight helicopter. Police Chief Joseph Charon says Zacks was not wearing a helmet.

HADLEY, New York — Jim Coughlin coaxed the Yamaha Rhino all-terrain vehicle over a boulder and between a stand of trees, and the mountain summit loomed ahead. There, off to the northeast on a clear Wednesday afternoon, were the Green Mountains. To the southeast was Great Sacandaga Lake and the village of Corinth. "What a view," the Queensbury resident said, pointing out that four

mountain ranges were evident. Coughlin, from Queensbury, and South Glens Falls resident Jim Sears showed off the summit of 1,800-foot Indian Cobble Mountain after a trip in their ATVs along trails maintained by the North Country All-Terrain Vehicles Association (NCATVA). The mountain top is only accessible by members of the club.

The club is one of a growing number of private associations and clubs that have popped up across the state as riders grow dissatisfied with the lack of public riding opportunities. With ATVs banned from state land and from property owned by many municipalities, riders have banded together to purchase or lease land to create private trail networks. "We all have to go to pri-

vate land because the state won't allow us to ride on state land," said Fay "Moak" Detraglia, president of NCATVA. It's an issue around New York, said South Glens Falls resident Louie Thayer, the regional representative to the New York State Off-Highway Recreational Vehicle Association. "We are forced by the state to register and insure (ATVs) but the state doesn't give us anywhere to ride them," Thayer said. "A lot of people are turning to private clubs."

Oregon 4-wheel club repairs meadow hit by vandals

LA GRANDE, Ore. (AP) — A four-wheel drive club aiming to set an example for protecting the environment has repaired national forest land in eastern Oregon damaged by vandals. Members of the Northeast Oregon Four Wheelers showed up in force on Three Cabin Ridge last Friday, spreading seed and mulch over U.S. Forest Service land on Mount Emily that was extensively damaged last spring by vandals in four-wheel drives.

Observer last Friday that public reaction was swift and overwhelmingly positive. The Forest Service and local law enforcement received numerous tips. In one case, a juvenile on a four-wheeler was caught in the act of tearing up the land, prosecuted and fined. At least one of the calls was about undoing damage. In La Grande, club member Leslie Garoutte contacted Wiedenmann with an offer to help with the rehabilitation. The Northeast Oregon Four Wheelers, made up of people who use Class II all-terrain vehicles and four-wheel drive trucks, was formed last November and now has about 15 members in cities from Hermiston to Ontario. Garoutte said the idea was to show that most four-wheel enthusiasts are good land stewards. "We knew about the damage and doing this for community service was something we were all into," she said. The restoration work last Friday was supervised by Penny Hall, a botanist for the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest, was outraged. In a newspaper article, he detailed the damage and warned the Forest Service would institute an emergency closure of the area if the vandalism didn't stop. Wiedenmann told *The*

Beware of cold water dangers

Water doesn't have to be near freezing to kill, it only has to be colder than a person to cause potentially fatal hypothermia. Waters are cold now while waterfowl hunters enjoy the last few weeks of the seasons, and many anglers are still fishing. Overloaded boats and failure to wear life jackets are leading reasons Idaho typically loses a couple of waterfowl hunters every year, according to the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation. Cold water wicks body heat 25 times faster than air at that same temperature. Anyone who falls in has only a few minutes before the

cold renders them numb and unable to swim. Most boats float even when capsized or swamped, so get in or on the boat to get as far out of the water as possible. Wearing a life vest is a must. It will help preserve body heat and keeps even an unconscious person afloat. Get to shelter, change into dry clothing and warm up slowly. Here are some tips to remember when using open boats during cold weather: • Life jackets only work if they are worn. Most drowning victims could have survived if they had worn theirs. Idaho law requires a life jacket on board for every passenger, and a throwable

personal floatation device is required in boats more than 16 feet long. • Stay within the load limits shown on the boat's capacity plate. All vessels under 20 feet in length and built after Nov. 1, 1972, must have a capacity plate permanently attached and clearly visible. For boats that don't have a capacity plate, use this formula: boat length times width divided by 15 gives the number of passengers of about 150 pounds each. Distribute the load evenly and keep it low. • In a canoe, each person should paddle on the opposite side at all times to maintain balance.

- Stay seated. Standing to shoot is not worth the risk of parting company with the boat. Sitting on the sides can also capsize the boat.
- If the boat capsizes on a large lake, it is better to sit on top of the boat than to swim more than 100 feet with a life jacket, or 50 feet without a life jacket. By swimming or treading water, a person will cool 35 percent faster than if remaining still.
- Do not swim unless there is absolutely no chance of rescue.
- Leave the booze at home. Alcohol makes a person more susceptible to hypothermia, interferes with their ability to swim and to make quick decisions in an accident.
- Do not be afraid to cancel the trip if the weather turns bad.

Idaho agents want help in moose, elk poaching

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Department of Fish and Game is investigating a pair of poaching incidents, one involving a bull elk illegally killed on the Montana-Idaho border and the other a moose that was left to rot south of Lewiston.

In the elk killing, somebody killed the big bull on Oct. 16 and left it to waste on the East Fork of Indian Creek in eastern Idaho. A field dressed carcass was found partially concealed. And agents want help in finding out who shot and

wasted a cow moose discovered Oct. 19 in the Craig Mountain Wildlife Management Area south of Lewiston. People with information are urged to call the state's poaching hotline at 1-800-632-5999.

Rick Cooper, Fish and Game conservation officer based in Lewiston, says "hunters should be outraged" by these illegal killings — doubly so because the moose population in the Craig Mountain area is already low.

Rotation is universal among celestial bodies

Planets spin on their axes, as do stars, moons, comets, asteroids and galaxies. This seemingly trivial fact actually speaks to a deep and widespread property of the universe. At the heart of rotation's ubiquity is a universal principle of physics: conservation of angular momentum. Simply put, if something's rotating, it will tend to keep doing so. And if the object shrinks, it will rotate faster. Most celestial bodies, from planets to galaxies, form in the collapse of larger clouds of debris. Even though the constituents of such clouds might move in randomly oriented orbits about their mutual center of mass, the slightest excess of rotation in one direction

becomes magnified as the cloud begins to collapse under its own gravity, just as an ice skater's spin accelerates when she pulls in her arms. The fact that the sun and most of the planets and their moons spin in nearly identical directions is one of the most important clues to their common origin in a protoplanetary nebula. Thus, despite the fact that humans have existed for far too short a time to have witnessed the imperceptibly slow collapse of a swarm of protogalaxies into a disk of billions of stars orbiting a common center, the very

fact that spiral galaxies exhibit a global pattern of rotation is a smoking gun of how they came to be. If you're protesting that the moon doesn't rotate, since it always keeps the same face turned toward us, recall that it must turn exactly once on its axis each orbit or we'd actually see its entire surface. That's no coincidence: Earth's gravity distorts the moon into an egg shape, which keeps the moon locked into one rotation per orbit. **Next column:** Is the Goldilocks Planet a fairy tale? Steelhead harvest open on the Clearwater

Steelhead anglers, grab your poles! Fishing season is open on the Clearwater River near Lewiston, and on the Salmon, Little Salmon and lower Snake rivers. Beware of possession limits, however. The steelhead limit on the Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon is three per day and nine in possession. The limit on the Clearwater is two fish per day and six in possession. Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the season. Once limits are reached, the angler must stop fishing, even catch-and-release.

Anglers may use only barbless hooks, and may keep only hatchery steelhead marked with a clipped adipose fin. All other steelhead must be released unharmed immediately. Anglers in the Snake River and the lower Clearwater River down stream of the Memorial Bridge near Lewiston, who have a valid salmon permit, may also harvest two fall chinook salmon per day until Sunday, only one of which may be an adult. Anglers should check the 2010 Fall Chinook Seasons and Rules pamphlet for details.

Depression linked to medication

DEAR DR. GOTT: I’m 20 years old and have been on birth control from the time I was 13. I’ve been depressed all my life. I think the medication causes my depression to worsen. I also have polycystic ovary syndrome. I tried metformin instead of birth control. It made me sick but less depressed. Can you tell me of a birth-control medication that will not cause depression?

DEAR READER: Medications can definitely cause feelings of sadness, despair and discouragement. All are feelings commonly associated with depression.

The metformin you were prescribed is commonly used to treat type 2 diabetes or pre-

diabetes. It helps control the amount of sugar in the blood and decreases the amount of glucose absorbed from food and the glucose made by the liver. It can also be prescribed to regulate menstrual cycles but does not prevent pregnancy. Common side effects include nausea, vomiting and diarrhea, but not depression.

Your polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS) can cause erratic or prolonged menstrual cycles, obesity, acne and excessive hair growth. Women with the diagnosis may have difficulties becoming pregnant because of the infrequency of ovulation.

My guess is that you were prescribed birth control to

help regulate your cycles, because low-dose birth control with a combination of synthetic estrogen and progesterone can decrease androgen production, correct any abnormal bleeding, and decrease your risk of endometrial cancer. An alternative to this would be to take progesterone for up to 14 days every month, which will reduce your risk of endometrial cancer and regulate your menstrual cycle but will not improve your androgen levels. Treatment for PCOS is geared toward management of obesity, acne, hair growth and infertility.

I don’t know if you have a weight problem as a result of

your PCOS, but exercise will go a long way toward lowering your blood-sugar levels. Speak with your physician before beginning any exercise regimen. Request a referral to a gynecologist familiar with PCOS who can direct you in terms of treatment and your depression. Perhaps counseling is in line. A nutritionist can get you on the right track regarding your diet.

It appears you have a lot going on at 20 years of age. You deserve a better outlook, and the help is out there.

Glen Little (Frosty the Clown)

BURLEY — Glen Little “Frosty the Clown,” 84, of Burley, Idaho, died Tuesday, Oct. 26, 2010, in Kimberly, Idaho.

Frosty was born Dec. 5, 1925, in Genoa, Neb., the son of Glen and Elsie Little. Frosty saw his first circus at the age of 7, which instilled a lifelong love of the circus in him. His nickname, “Frosty,” was given to him as a boy by his grandfather, who compared him to Jack Frost due to his love of playing in the snow. Frosty served in the U.S. Navy during World War II and was wounded. He learned juggling from a fellow patient while convalescing, a skill that would later help him land his first clowning jobs. In 1950, he married his wife with whom he had one daughter; they were later divorced. On Oct. 12, 1971, he married Patricia Cosgrove in Chicago, Ill. They have shared 41 wonderful years together.

Frosty worked as a postal employee and land surveyor in Colorado. From 1954 to 1956, he performed as a clown at a local amusement park on weekends wearing a rented costume. In 1956, he went into clowning full-time after he was hired by the Joe King Circus, with which he toured the Rocky Mountain states for half of the year. The rest of the year, he freelanced as a clown at birthday parties and special events. He continued working for the Joe King circus for seven years until its closure in 1962.

Frosty also worked for other small outfits like the Tom Mix Show and Sells Floto Circus, but he had long had his eye on the “The Greatest Show on Earth,” Ringling Bros.

In 1968, he finally got his chance when Ringling Bros. created the Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Clown College; Frosty was in its first graduating class and, at the age of 44, he landed a job with Ringling’s newly split-off second touring unit.

In 1970, Frosty was promoted to “Boss Clown” of his unit, and from 1980 until his retirement in 1991, he was the circus’ “Executive Clown Director,” overseeing clowns in both units and writing new gags for the clowns to perform. In his lifetime, he has written more than 300 gag routines. In his later career, Frosty also served as an advance man for the circus. From 1980 until its closure in 1997, he also taught at his alma mater, the Ringling Brothers Clown College. In 1988, Frosty also helped establish the Ringling Circus’ first overseas touring unit (based in Japan), choreographing gags and training members of their clown staff.

Among the dignitaries he entertained were U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O’Connor and U.S. President Richard Nixon. He also appeared on 12 Ringling Bros. TV specials. Also, Frosty was close



friends with Red Skelton.

In 1983, Frosty was named “Master Clown” by the Ringling organization, only the fourth clown ever to be so named, after Otto Griebling, Bobby Kaye and Lou Jacobs (Frosty’s mentor). Frosty remains the last person ever to have been awarded the title. Frosty was inducted into the Clown Hall of Fame in 1991.

After his retirement, he moved to Burley, Idaho. He ran his own circus museum and, in 1991, he wrote a book on his experiences as a clown, titled Circus Stories: Boss Clown on the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus for More than 20 Years.

Frosty also enjoyed his garden and loved feeding the birds. He also loved reading westerns, history and anything he could learn from. His mind was always going.

Frosty is survived by his wife, Patricia; and three daughters, Tawnya Little, Roxanne Webster and Debbie Wagner; granddaughter, Shannon; and a brother, Dixon Little. He was preceded in death by his parents; and a sister, Darlene.

What pitchers duel? Giants rough up Lee, Rangers 11-7

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Giants turned the World Series opener into an extra long round of batting practice — against Cliff Lee and the Texas Rangers.

Freddy Sanchez sprayed balls down the lines. Cody Ross and Aubrey Huff hit line drives up the middle. Juan Uribe launched a shot far, far over the wall.

So much for the unbeatable Mr. Lee.

The Giants battered him and the bullpen, with Sanchez hitting three doubles and keying a six-run burst in an 11-7 romp Wednesday night that looked even more lopsided.

What shaped up as a pitchers' duel between Tim Lincecum and Lee quickly deteriorated into a rout. By the end, the Rangers played like the World Series rookies they are — they made four errors, Ian Kinsler took a mistaken turn around first base and manager Ron Washington may have waited too late to pull his ace.

Former Giants slugger Barry Bonds had plenty to cheer for from

his seat next to the San Francisco dugout, especially when a tie game suddenly became an 8-2 thumping in the fifth inning. Rangers president and part-owner Nolan Ryan sat there glumly in a suit and tie, his prized pitcher a wreck.

Added up, the Giants improved to 10-0 against Texas at AT&T Park. Showers are in the forecast for Game 2 on Thursday night when Matt Cain and his 0.00 ERA in two playoff start takes on C.J. Wilson and the Rangers.

The Rangers did late damage, scoring three times in the ninth. Nelson Cruz hit a two-out, two-run double off Brian Wilson before the Fear the Beard closer finished it off.

Sanchez finished with four of the Giants' 14 hits, which included six doubles. Right after Lee walked off the mound in the fifth, Uribe greeted sidearming reliever Darren O'Day with a three-run jolt that broke it open.

San Francisco had gotten through the NL playoffs because of their dominant pitching, plus an ability to win one-run decisions. None of that came into play on this beautiful night for baseball.

Lincecum struggled at the beginning, making a strange mental error, but settled down as the game progressed. The shaggy-haired ace walked off to a standing ovation in the sixth, his glove in his right hand and his head down.

The Rangers tagged him for eight hits, two of them shots off his left leg.

What happened to Lee was sim-

ply remarkable.

He came into the game with a 7-0 record in postseason play, one win shy of matching the record set by Orlando "El Duque" Hernandez for the best start in these big games.

But the lefty who loves to stick to his routine — and his messy hat — was all over the place on eight days' rest. He couldn't control his curve and when he did throw it over the plate, it was flat.

With the score 2-all, Andres Torres hit a one-out double in the Giants fifth. Sanchez, a former NL batting champion, followed with a sharp double and Texas pitching coach Mike Maddux was already on the way to the mound as the Rangers got the ball back to Lee.

There was no break for Lee, however. NL championship series MVP Ross, who hit his first major league homer off Lee back in 2003, lined an RBI single up the middle on the lefty's 100th pitch. That hit prompted Lee to slam his pitching hand into his glove, and Huff's RBI single to center finished him.

shot of avoiding the Bruins in the region semifinals.

Playing hard hasn't been an issue since the team pushed the reset button and went into boot-camp mode after an abject performance in a four-set loss to North Idaho at home five weeks ago. Playing well has been another issue altogether.

Every time the Golden Eagles think they're on a roll, some other part of the wagon breaks down. Production from the right side. Lazy defense. Untimely errors. Passing problems. A shocking inability to consistently get serves in play.

While a lot of that is a case of progress via the "two steps forward, one step back" path, predictability in

attack and service efficiency are two areas that have plagued CSI since the opening day of the season.

Combine that with an impassive viewpoint to matches — expecting to hit the switch on command and find that sorely-needed extra gear — and you've got trouble.

There's not enough time to retool everything and have it in place for the regional (and national) tournament, however. Now it's just a matter of faith in the system, a change of attitude, and the hope that this team's best volleyball is still on the horizon and not in the rear-view mirror.

"This team is good enough (to repeat). They just need to start believing it," said CSI coach Heidi Cartisser. "The pieces are in place, but the girls need to step up. We haven't had all the pieces firing once this season, except at (Eastern Utah)."

There's no questioning that if the Golden Eagles return to the national tournament, they'll be a force to be reckoned with. But this weekend is the time CSI needs to step up and start firing if it's going to happen.

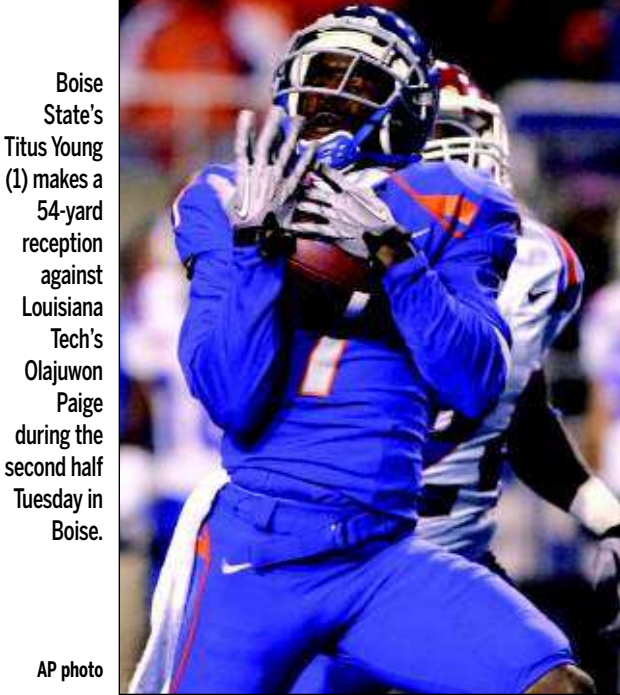

Broncos frustrated by miscues against La. Tech



BOISE (AP) — Even with another blowout in the books, Boise State coach Chris Petersen knows a flawed performance when he sees one.

There were plenty of positives to take away from No. 2 Boise State's 49-20 victory over Louisiana Tech on Tuesday night. The offense rolled up 468 total yards, Kellen Moore had his hand in three touchdowns and the defense made big plays at critical moments.

But there were too many flaws, fumbles and uncharacteristic miscues for a perfectionist such as Petersen to ignore — not with the Broncos pursuing another undefeated season and trying to hold onto their spots in the AP poll and BCS standings.

The Western Athletic Conference powerhouse was caught off-guard on an onside kick, fumbled another and the kicking game cost the team points and field position.

“That’s why I’m anxious to come in ... and see how many things we can do better,” Petersen said after the Broncos won their 21st consecutive game, the longest active streak in major college football.

“Sometimes you have to tip your hat to the offense and say, ‘That’s a good play.’ We won’t worry about those. The ones we can do something about are the ones we’ll pay attention to.”

The Broncos (7-0, 3-0 WAC) managed to overcome

their miscues thanks to a high-scoring offense led by Moore and a defense that forced two fumbles, had four sacks and stopped Louisiana Tech on fourth down three times.

Despite allowing 394 total yards, much more than its 210-yard average coming in, the Bronco defense stiffened in the red zone to squelch three Bulldog scoring drives and forced two fumbles in the second half that enabled the offense to put the game out of reach.

“All I know is we got the win,” said senior safety Winston Venable. “We can’t play perfect all the time ... those types of things are going to happen. There were definitely big plays by our defense and that’s what we’re supposed to do.”

Boise State has little room for error when stellar performances over mediocre teams matter to voters in the polls and the BCS rankings. The Broncos are No. 3 in the BCS behind Auburn and Oregon and feeling pressure from surging teams such as Missouri and Michigan State.

“It was a good win, but it wasn’t great in terms of our side of things and playing as clean as we wanted to,” Petersen said.

Yet the Broncos proved Tuesday they are good enough to overcome those flaws. The game film should also provide enough feel-good moments to keep the Broncos in good spirits until they meet Hawaii Nov. 6.

Injured Favre won't rule himself out vs. Patriots

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — Brett Favre sure doesn't look like a guy ready to play a game in four days, not with an oversized walking boot covering most of his left leg.

But who would bet against Minnesota's 41-year-old quarterback? Whether it's reckless pride, simple determination or an exceptional tolerance of pain, he's played through all kinds of pain — including a broken thumb in 2003 and a badly sprained foot in 2000 — and never sat out.

His NFL-record streak is at 291 consecutive games started, 315 including the playoffs. Naturally, Favre is not ruling himself out of Sunday's game at New England despite two fractures in his left ankle.

“I would love to play, for no other reason but I’m in this, committed to this team,” Favre said. “I’d love to get this back on track and be a part of it, and more than anything function at a level that gives us a chance to win. That’s basically it.”

Favre said he won't consider participating in any part of practice until Friday. He spent Wednesday in the training room, joining his teammates for their post-practice huddle and walking off the field wearing the boot, shorts, a sweatshirt and a Twins cap.

He's always had a knack for healing quickly, which gives him hope he'll be back when the Vikings (2-4) play the Patriots (5-1). If he can't go, Tarvaris Jackson will take over.

Coach Brad Childress kept the option open, too.

“I wouldn't put it past him. He's going to make the push, like a lot of these guys do,” Childress said.

Favre insisted he'd put aside the streak for the sake of the team. “It probably should have ended a long time ago,” Favre said.

The No. 1 pick showed he was a good sport Wednesday, donning a Missouri jersey with his name and college number 14 on the back to his weekly media session.

That helped lighten the mood for at least a while, and Bradford returning volley on questions relating to the Big 12 North leaders, and whether Missouri's academic standards were too high for him to consider that school out of college.

“Absolutely not,” Bradford said. “I wanted to win Big 12 championships.”

Also, whether this was one of his worst moments.

“This,” he joked, “is definitely down there.”

Bradford wore the jersey to pay off a friendly wager with wide receiver Danario Alexander, a fellow rookie who played for Missouri. The Tigers beat the Sooners for only the second time in 21 games on Saturday, knocking Oklahoma from No. 1 in the BCS.

ALEX SMITH OUT FOR 49ERS, TROY SMITH IN AGAINST BRONCOS

LONDON — With quarterback Alex Smith ruled out because of a separated shoulder, San Francisco

49ers head coach Mike Singletary is gambling on Troy Smith being able to turn his struggling team around.

Singletary said Wednesday the former Heisman Trophy winner will get his first NFL start in three years after Alex Smith was ruled out for 2 to 3 weeks with a separated left shoulder. The Niners play the Denver Broncos at London's Wembley Stadium on Sunday.

Singletary picked the former Ohio State standout ahead of David Carr, who came on against Carolina after Alex Smith was injured on Sunday but threw a costly late interception that led to the winning field goal for the Panthers.

“Troy Smith gives us a good opportunity to win this game,” Singletary said. “I talked to David Carr about it. He understands. We had a couple of conversations about it. That's a personal thing between he and I, and I'm going to leave it there. Troy Smith is our starting quarterback.”

SELF-CRITICAL QB HALL PRACTICES, EXPECTS TO PLAY

TEMPE, Ariz. — Three days after what he said was the first concussion of his football career, Max Hall practiced on Wednesday

and said he was anxious to prove he is a far better quarterback than he showed on a dismal wet afternoon in Seattle.

Hall said he's “good to roll” for Sunday's home game against Tampa Bay, but coach Ken Whisenhunt was more cautious, saying he would have to see how the rookie does through the week before being more definitive. Meanwhile, Whisenhunt said backup Derek Anderson would get some extra reps with the first unit in case Hall can't go against the Buccaneers.

Hall, who was not drafted after three years as the starter at BYU, completed 4 of 16 passes for 36 yards against the Seahawks last Sunday. He was intercepted once and fumbled the ball away on the blindside third-quarter sack that knocked him out of the game.

“It was everything from having the ball slip out of my hands to making bad reads to not seeing a blitz or whatever,” Hall said. “There's just a lot of things that I need to get better at, but even the great ones get knocked down once in a while. It's how you respond. Hopefully I'll respond good and play well this Sunday.”

NCAA athletes improve overall graduation rates

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — New NCAA president Mark Emmert has seen the academic culture changing in college sports, and now he has the numbers to prove it.

Student-athletes are earning degrees at record rates, graduate at higher rates than other students and football players and black men's basketball players are making big gains in the classroom, the NCAA said Wednesday in releasing its annual Graduation Success Rate figures.

The report shows 79 percent of all Division I athletes entering school between 2000-01 and 2003-04 earned a degree within six years. That matches last year's record number.

The latest freshman class, from 2003-04, also hit 79 percent, tying the record mark set each of the past two years.

“The reality is that student-athletes are doing at least as well as other students at universities,” Emmert said during a conference call. “The dumb jock myth is just that, a myth.”

Traditionally, student-athletes have graduated at higher rates than the overall student body and this year was no different. According to federal numbers, student-athletes had a 64 percent graduation rate compared with 63 percent of all students.

The numbers differ because the NCAA includes transfer students in its calculation. The federal rate does not, and NCAA officials maintain their numbers are more accurate.

Bidding for next 2 World Cups turns into a circus

LONDON (AP) — When it comes to the world's biggest game and the world's biggest tournament, allegations of corruption are never far behind — and often don't appear to be too far from the truth.

The bidding process to host the 2018 and 2022 World Cups has turned into a circus — with allegations that some FIFA executives offered to sell their votes, trash-talking between bidding nations and arguments over which continent should get to host the 2018 event.

FIFA, the governing body of world football, is under the spotlight, and there's billions at stake and plenty of reputations on the line. Eleven countries are vying for the right to host the next two premier single-sport competitions in the world — and 24 FIFA officials get to decide who wins on Dec. 2 in Zurich.

England, Russia, Belgium-Netherlands and Spain-Portugal are in the running for the 2018 World Cup, while the United States, Australia, Japan, South Korea and Qatar want to host the tournament in 2022. This is the first time two World Cups have been decided at the same time.

I think is irreplaceable in terms of his playmaking ability and his intangibles,” tight end Daniel Hardy said of Dickson. “The good thing about that is we have guys like Tre'Shawn and Paul who have been in the system. And I think they are going to be ready to show their stuff.”

Robinson's emergence as a true freshman was a source of optimism for the Vandals during their two-win 2008 season. But he was derailed that first year by a major knee injury five games into the season.

After recovering much quicker than expected, Robinson returned in 2009 with the same aggression that he had shown before.

“He's got great explosion,” Akey said. “I'm expecting (to see) a guy that's got game experience, that has the physical capabilities. Just make sure he's paying attention to the mental capabilities of being right where he belongs at all points in time.”

Robinson doesn't have Dickson's coverage skills or 23 games of starting experience. Yet Akey and Hardy both insist that Robinson, alongside Dickson, is perhaps the strongest player pound-for-pound on the Idaho roster.

That's a claim fellow linebacker Robert Siavii won't dispute.

“He's just a powerful dude,” Siavii said. “If he meets you in a hole, expect

not to break his tackle because he will wrap you up and take you down.”

Sure tackling, actually, will be a key for the Idaho defense on Saturday night when the Vandals play at Hawaii. The Warriors, on a five-game winning streak and in first place in the WAC, have the No. 1 passing offense in the nation and a 230-pound running back, Alex Green, who rumbled for 172 yards last week in a rout of Utah State.

The Vandals have yet to see such a high-powered offense, and they'll face Hawaii (6-2, 4-0) having lost two senior starters on defense in two weeks — Dickson and cornerback Isaac Butts, who was dismissed from the team.

But in both the secondary and linebacker corps, UI has improved its depth and skill level from last year. The extra bodies are coming in handy now.

“I felt like going into the season that we were pretty fortunate that we had more depth than we've had at linebacker,” Akey said “I really felt like we had four guys, maybe five guys that were capable of starting for us at linebacker.”

Robinson is the fourth starter in the three-man crew, and the Vandals expect good things from true sophomore Conrad Scheidt. The weakside linebacker sustained a concussion at Louisiana Tech, but Akey is hopeful he'll play this week.

WHEREAS, the Burley City Council desires to adopt a quality construction standard for public works within the jurisdiction of the City of Burley; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of such a standard would aid in providing consistency and efficiency in the construction of public works improvements in our community; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction (ISPWC) is a recognized standard for public works construction in the State of Idaho and is used by many entities as their public works construction standard; and

WHEREAS, the ISPWC is a recognized standard by many of the reviewing agencies that may assist in the timeliness of agency reviews on subject projects; and

WHEREAS, the ISPWC is regularly updated in an attempt to stay current with changing construction technologies,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That Burley City Code Title 6, Chapter 9, Section 1 be added as "Standards for Public Works" as follows:

1. The Idaho Standards for Public Works Construction (ISPWC), along with all current and future published updates, shall be the standard for public works infrastructure construction within the jurisdiction of the City of Burley; provided however, that to the extent the City has previously adopted more stringent standards or variances from the ISPWC, said policies, regulations, and or codes shall remain in effect as set forth in said City Code Section above.

2. The scope of the projects for which the ISPWC is the standard shall be limited to the scope of the subject matter contained in the ISPWC.

3. All contractors who bid on projects within the scope of the ISPWC and in the jurisdiction of the City of Burley shall possess a current version of the ISPWC together with any other relevant City policies, regulations and/or codes at the time they submit bids for such projects.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 1, ADDING SECTION 6 TO CHAPTER 5 OF THE BURLEY CITY CODE, ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF BURLEY COUNCIL COMMITTEES INCLUDING THE ADMINISTRATIVE, LAW ENFORCEMENT, FIRE, ELECTRIC, & RECREATION COMMITTEES, ESTABLISHING MEMBERSHIP OF THE COMMITTEES FROM AMONG COUNCIL MEMBERS OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, PROVIDING FOR THE DUTIES AND SCOPE OF AUTHORITY OF THE SAID COMMITTEES, AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO the following:

Section 1: There is hereby established at TITLE 1, CHAPTER 5, BURLEY CITY CODE a new section entitled "Council Committees" that shall be designated as "Section 6" and shall read as follows:

1-5-6: COUNCIL COMMITTEES:

A. There shall be five (5) permanent standing city council committees: 1.) the Administrative Committee; 2.) the Law Enforcement Committee; 3.) the Fire Committee; 4.) the Electric Committee; and, 5.) the Recreation Committee. Each committee shall be comprised of three (3) council members. No council member may serve on more than three (3) of the said standing committees other than the Administrative Committee. The committees shall be advisory unless specific powers are delegated by ordinance, with the right of appeal of decisions made by such delegated powers to the full council. The membership of each committee shall be at the discretion of the mayor with appointments being made by the mayor at the January meeting of each calendar year. The chair of each committee shall be by election of the committee members. Such election of the chair shall occur in February of each calendar year. The committee may also elect a chair pro tem at any time. Reconfiguration of the makeup of the committees may take place at any time upon a vote of the council; said reconfigurations or any filling of vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the Mayor and approval of the Council.

B. The council committees shall be subject to compliance with Idaho open meeting law requirements set forth in Idaho Code and the scope of each committee's responsibility shall consist of the following:

Administrative Committee: The administrative committee shall generally consider matters relating to administrative matters of the city and may advise the mayor in providing personnel evaluations that are required to be completed of the City Administrator.

Law Enforcement Committee: The Law Enforcement Committee shall generally consider matters relating to law enforcement services provided to the city including said service's cost, efficiency, and effectiveness. The Law Enforcement Committee shall also advise the mayor on matters of public safety connected to the city's law enforcement activities and the mayor's exercise of police powers.

Fire Committee: The Fire Committee shall generally consider matters relating to the city's fire department and related fire safety issues. The Fire Committee may advise on matters relating to negotiations with unions established among fire department personnel.

Electric Committee: The Electric Committee shall generally consider matters relating to the purchase and transmission of electrical power for customers of the city's electric department and may advise the mayor and council on matters connected to the construction and maintenance of the city's electrical power infrastructure.

Recreation Committee: The Recreation Committee shall generally consider matters related to City recreation facilities and activities and may advise the mayor and council regarding the same.

C. Committee Meetings: The council committees shall meet as deemed necessary by the committee at a day, time and place convenient to the members of the committee and to the general public. Agendas shall be posted pursuant to Idaho Code, no less than forty eight (48) hours prior to the commencement of the meeting. Special meetings may be called by the chair or by a written request of a quorum of the committee. Minutes shall be kept in accordance with Idaho law by members of the Committee or their designate.

D. Setting Of Committee Agendas: The mayor, a council member, or any department head may have an item placed on the agenda automatically. The chair may add items to the agenda up to twenty-four (24) hours before the meeting, provided proper public notice of the amended agenda is provided. The chair shall determine the order in which agenda items are addressed.

Section 2: Upon passage of this Ordinance, the Mayor shall, by or at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Burley City Council, make committee assignments for the present calendar year.

Section 3: This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication as provided by law.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® **Bobby Wolff**

When declarer knows that his shortages lie over the defenders' so that he cannot be overruffed, it is often better to play on crossruff lines rather than drawing trumps. Today's deal provides a good example.

West led the spade jack against four hearts, overtaken by East's king, and a diamond came back to West's ace, followed by the diamond queen. Declarer quite naturally covered with dummy's king, and East scored his heart eight, but then mistakenly tried to cash his spade ace, thinking the diamond queen was suit preference. A heart return would have been the killer here.

In practice, though, declarer ruffed the spade ace high, played a club to the king and followed with the heart queen, a heart to his ace and a club ruff. Now he ruffed a diamond back to hand and drew trumps, hoping that his long clubs would be good. When the 5-2 break came to light, he had to go one down.

Declarer should have considered a 5-2 club break likely as soon as he discovered that East had only five spades and a singleton diamond. But there was no need for declarer to draw trumps. Suppose that after ruffing the spade ace, he had played a club to the king and ruffed a diamond. Now he can safely play the top clubs. If clubs break 4-3, South ruffs a club and draws trump. When West ruffs the third club, declarer overruffs, ruffs a diamond in hand with the heart 10, and ruffs a club in dummy with the heart nine. Then the last three tricks can be made on a high crossruff.

ANSWER: It is by no means guaranteed that you have a safe way into your opponents' auction, but if you feel like bidding, you can risk a double safely enough. Normally, one tends to bid a five-card major rather than make a takeout double here, but your spades are so weak that showing your two suits looks like the most flexible action.
