

The unit takes approximately 30 calls each year from across the region, with the most recent coming over the weekend. Lewin said they responded to a false alarm inside the city, but there are times when the threat is real.

"We see a mix of homemade explosives," Lewin said, "because of the proliferation of information on the Internet of how to make these things. We try to educate people that someone with a Ph.D. or an engineering background did not provide that information."

Most of the time, Lewin said, the explosive devices found are not sinister in nature. Rather, residents may find old dynamite from when grandpa blew up tree stumps or blasting material near old silver mine shafts in the Wood River Valley.

The bomb squad's advice to anyone who comes across a suspicious package or anything that resembles a crude pipe with capped ends is simple: stay away and call police.

Officials: Too many are obese in Idaho

Idaho's adult population is heavier than ever.

More than half of Idaho adults are overweight and a quarter of them are obese, according to the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

That's a lot of people -100,000 more Idahoans than the population of Ada County.

And even with the multitude of studies produced on obesity, its hold is strengthening and predicted to include 43.2 percent of Idaho's adults in 2018, according to America's Health Rankings, an annual report of U.S. health statistics. Obesity is defined as a body mass index of 30 or higher.

If that's not enough to encourage more Idahoans to trade a handful of cookies for a short jog around the neighborhood, health experts are increasingly examining the economics of obesity.

Obesity-related diseases cost an estimated \$147 billion a year in the U.S. and around \$324 million

State's economic outlook sours

Idaho's economic forecast has been downgraded from predictions made in July, another sign that recovery from the economic doldrums will unfold slowly rather than quickly.

Among the highlights of the report, released this week:

- There are 4,200 fewer nonfarm jobs in the state this year than forecasted in July. That means that without changing the forecast, a gap would grow to 11,600 fewer jobs than projected by 2013.
- Annual personal income increases are set at a 4 percent average in the new report; the prior forecast set the growth at 4.5 percent. Because of the slower growth, Idaho personal income

Semi cuts power near T.F., Filer

Times-News

A semitrailer apparently knocked down a power pole between the cities of Twin Falls and Filer on Wednesday evening, cutting power to an initial 380 Idaho Power customers.

The incident happened around 7 p.m. and affected customers between 4100 North and 3700 North, and 2600 East and 2450 East. At 9:18 p.m., a message left on the utility's outage line said crews would need another two to three hours to finish repairs, though the outage was down to 81 customers.

More recently, Rothweiler helped institute a five-year projection tool for city budgeting. He has also served in Courtney's stead at City Council meetings when Courtney was absent, earning him an introduction as "city manager" on more than one occasion.

Rothweiler said "humbled" by his selection, but won't consider it final until the council votes him in.

Despite the City Council's search committee receiving 54 applications from its nationwide search, no other applicants were interviewed for the position.

Hall and Councilmen Will Kezele and Lance Clow, the latter a former mayor, served on the committee. Hall said all the applicants had great qualities on paper, but Rothweiler had experience in the city and working with the City Council.

"We evaluated all of (the resumes), and we looked at Mr. Rothweiler's, and we didn't see any that really stood out beyond Mr. Rothweiler's experience," Hall said. "For me, it wasn't a great surprise. We know Travis. We know his qualities and his abilities. We have been able to observe that intimately for the past couple of years."

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

Lost in the noise of Election 2010 was a Mason-Dixon poll commissioned by seven Idaho newspapers that showed taxpayer support for spending more on highways is feeble.

Almost 30 percent of respondents said there's no need to do anything now to boost highway funding. Only 16 percent thought charging trucks higher fees should be the top priority and just 9 percent supported raising Idaho's 25-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax.

For a state whose economy rolls along on 18 wheels, that's a problem.

To be sure, there's disagreement about how much of a backlog in highway maintenance and repair Idaho actually has. Otter pegs it at \$240 million; the man the governor beat in last week's election — Democrat

The prevailing sentiment among legislators is that not much is going to change in transportation funding in the near future. There's no appetite for raising taxes or fees, and the trucking industry probably has enough clout with the Legislature to block any major increase in what truckers pay.

But Otter has spent considerable political capital on higher transportation funding - a deadlock between the governor and the Legislature over raising the gas tax stretched the 2009 legislative session out to 115 days - so he's unlikely to walk away from this issue.

And let's face it: Much of Idaho's highway network does need work.

A 2008 study commissioned by the Idaho Local Highway Assistance Council found that 55 percent of the state's commercial traffic moves over local roads, and that one-third of those byways are in fair or poor condition.

That's more than just an issue of safety and congestion. About half of the money that goes to maintaining rural roads comes from property taxes, so with state and federal funding dwindling more of the burden is likely to shift to property owners.

Meanwhile, debt service on the Connecting Idaho initiative — financed by bonds to be paid off from future federal highway revenue — now consumes about one-third of the money Idaho has available for roads. Most has been spent on projects in just two of Idaho's 44 counties — Ada and Canyon.

To complicate matters further, when Congress convenes next year the federal highway bill will be rewritten - and Idaho almost certainly will receive less of the funding on which its highway maintenance absolutely depends.

So whatever the recommendations of his task force, the governor has some work to do in making the case for higher transportation funding. Clearly, Idahoans aren't yet sold on the idea.

Banana republic, American style

n my reporting, I regularly travel to banana republics notorious for their inequality. In some of these plutocracies, the richest 1 percent of the population gobbles up 20 percent of the national pie.

But guess what? You no longer need to travel to distant and dangerous countries to observe such rapacious inequality. We now have it right here at home and in the aftermath of Tuesday's election, it may get worse.


The richest 1 percent of Americans now take home almost 24 percent of income, up from almost 9 percent in 1976. As Timothy Noah of Slate noted in an excellent series on inequality, the United States now arguably has a more unequal distribution of wealth than traditional banana republics like Nicaragua, Venezuela and Guyana.

CEO's of the largest American companies earned an average of 42 times as much as the average worker in 1980, but 531 times as much in 2001. Perhaps the most astounding statistic is this: From 1980 to 2005, more than four-fifths of the total increase in American incomes went to the richest 1 percent.

That's the backdrop for one of the first big postelection fights in Washington how far to extend the Bush tax cuts to the most affluent 2 percent of Americans. Both parties agree on extending tax cuts on the first \$250,000 of incomes, even for billionaires. Republicans would also cut taxes above that.

The richest 0.1 percent of taxpayers would get a tax cut of \$61,000 from President Obama. They would get \$370,000 from Republicans, according to the nonpartisan Tax Policy Center. And that provides only a modest economic stimulus, because the rich are less likely to spend their tax savings.

At a time of 9.6 percent unemployment, wouldn't it

make more sense to finance a jobs program? For example, the money could be used to avoid laying off teachers and undermining American schools.

Likewise, an obvious priority in the worst economic downturn in 70 years should be to extend unemployment insurance benefits, some of which will be curtailed soon unless Congress renews them. Or there's the Trade Adjustment Assistance program, which helps train and support workers who have lost their jobs because of foreign trade. It will no longer apply to service workers after Jan. 1, unless Congress intervenes.

So we face a choice. Is our economic priority the jobless, or is it zillionaires?

And if Republicans are worried about long-term budget deficits, a reasonable concern, why are they insistent on two steps that nonpartisan economists say would worsen the deficits by more than \$800 billion over a decade — cutting taxes for the most opulent, and repealing health care reform? What other programs would they cut to make up the lost \$800 billion in revenue?

In weighing these issues, let's remember that backdrop of America's rising inequality.

In the past, many of us acquiesced in discomfiting levels of inequality because we perceived a tradeoff between equity and economic growth. But there's evidence that the levels of inequality we've now reached may actually suppress growth. A drop of inequality lubricates economic growth, but too much may gum it up. Robert H. Frank of Cornell

University, Adam Seth Levine of Vanderbilt University, and Oege Dijk of the European University Institute recently wrote a fascinating paper suggesting that inequality leads to more financial distress. They looked at census data for the 50 states and the 100 most populous counties in America, and found that places where inequality increased the most also endured the greatest surges in bankruptcies.

Here's their explanation: When inequality rises, the richest rake in their winnings and buy even bigger mansions and fancier cars. Those a notch below then

depleting their savings or taking on more debt, making a financial crisis more likely.

Another consequence the scholars found: Rising inequality also led to more divorces, presumably a byproduct of the strains of financial distress. Maybe I'm overly sentimental or romantic, but that pierces me. It's a reminder that inequality isn't just an economic issue but also a question of human dignity and happiness.

Mounting evidence suggests that losing a job or a home can rock our identity and savage our self-esteem. Forced moves wrench families from their schools and support networks.

In short, inequality leaves people on the lower rungs feeling like hamsters on a wheel spinning ever faster, without hope or escape. Economic polarization

also shatters our sense of national union and common purpose, fostering political polarization as well. So in this postelection

landscape, let's not aggravate income gaps that already would make a Latin American caudillo proud. To me, we've reached a banana republic point where our inequality has become both economically unhealthy and morally repugnant.

The GOP's tactical edge on tax cuts

he debate on ABC's This Week between former Reagan Office of Management and **Budget director David** Stockman and Indiana Rep. Mike Pence, R, was instructive in how Republicans view their immediate policy priorities. While Stockman was urging expiration of the Bush tax cuts to reduce the deficit, Pence insisted that they should be extended, because Republicans aren't so much interested in reducing the deficit as they are in cutting taxes for the wealthy, and they've done an excellent job of persuading the media to avoid noting the contradiction.

On "60 Minutes," President Obama indicated he'd be willing to compromise with Republicans by extending the tax cuts for the middle class permanently while possibly agreeing to a temporary extension of the cuts for the wealthy. House Republican Whip Eric Cantor, meanwhile, said Republicans would refuse the White House proposal to "decouple" the rates in such a manner.

Republicans, meanwhile, have been less accommodating, with some suggesting that they could simply hold off until January, when they will control the House and hold a stronger hand in the Senate. That would set the stage for a more powerful push to permanently extend all the cuts — the preferred GOP alternative.

"They might blame GOP obstructionism. But, you know, people are going to start missing a lot of money in their weekly paychecks in January. And there's only going to be one person in

the White House," said a Republican House aide, speaking on condition of anonymity to describe party thinking.

Republicans win if the Bush tax cuts get made permanent, and they win if the tax cuts expire. If it's the former, Republicans get their preferred policy option. If it's the latter, they get to accuse Obama of raising taxes. The White House loses politically if the tax cuts simply expire, while even if the White House capitulates to Republicans on making all the tax cuts permanent, the administration gets to claim they worked with Republicans to cut taxes.

Because Republicans win either way, they have no incentive to compromise and can simply hold out for whatever they want. The more willing to negotiate the White House appears, the more likely Republicans are to move the goal posts. As with health-care reform, Republicans are left with the stronger negotiating position because they're willing to shoot the hostage. The deficit doesn't matter, and even preserving tax cuts for the wealthy comes second to the Republicans' primary goal, which is to destroy the president.



KETCHUM (AP) - A central Idaho couple is fighting their condominium association over the American flag they've unfurled outside their unit.

Steve and Robin Perfect are flying a flag outside their Hailey condo in honor of her son, who is bound for Iraq with an Idaho Army National Guard unit.

But the flag violates Copper Ranch Homeowners' Association rules, which forbid tenants from placing items in the complex's common area.

Property manager Brian Emerick told the Idaho Mountain Express that he sent letters to the Perfects on behalf of the association board, reminding them of rules that prohibit display of anything outdoors. The ban includes other items, such as bird houses and wind chimes, Emerick said.

"The issue isn't about the flags. If, outside of his door, Mr. Perfect flew a statue of a Viking holding a saber, he would be in violation," Emerick said.

Republican U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo has written a letter backing the Perfects, citing a federal law that he says protects the couple's rights to fly the flag.

The legislation "supersedes homeowner association restrictions in favor of individual rights to display the U.S. flag on residential property," Crapo told the couple in an Oct. 26 letter.

The association board has not vet determined how to address the noncompliance, Emerick said.

Robin Perfect's son, Sgt. Edward Nalder, deployed on Sept. 21, and she traveled to Boise with her husband to send him off. On the way home, the couple purchased an American flag at a Wal-Mart with plans to hang it outside their Copper Ranch unit, she said, calling the ordeal that followed "a nightmare?"

"You know what, this is my flag," she said. "This is my son, who is in Iraq fighting for everyone in this country."

USDA partially lifts sugar beet ban

Federal agriculture officials have released a plan to let farmers plant genetically modified sugar beets while a lawsuit over them is resolved, but farmers fear a partial lifting of a court-ordered ban won't come in time for next year's

Idaho Power seeks deal with Sawtooth Wind Project

The Idaho Power Company is asking the Idaho **Public Utilities Commission** to approve a \$2.17 million agreement with Idaho Winds LLC, which would allow the Sawtooth Wind Project to interconnect with Idaho Power's transmission system.

Idaho Power said the 21megawatt wind project six miles northwest of Glenns Ferry will require substantial upgrades to its transmission network.

Idaho Power is proposing the same cost-sharing agreement as the commission approved in 2007 for the Hot Springs and Bennett Creek wind projects, also in Elmore County. Under that scenario, 25 percent of upgrade costs would be paid by Idaho Power and 25 percent by Idaho Winds. The remaining 50 percent would be advanced by Idaho Winds, but subject to refund by Idaho Power over time if the projects fully meet its

output requirements.

Oil companies increasingly eye natural gas

NEW YORK - Pretty soon, Big Oil will be more like Big Gas.

The major oil companies are increasingly betting their futures on natural gas, with older oil fields producing less crude and newer ones either hard to reach or controlled by unfriendly nations.

They are focusing more than ever on natural gas because it burns cleaner than oil and is gaining traction as a fuel for transportation. The latest move came Tuesday, when Chevron made a \$4.3 billion deal to buy up natural gas fields in the Northeast.

Earlier this year, Exxon Mobil bought XTO Energy to become America's largest producer of natural gas. And Royal Dutch Shell expects natural gas to make up half its total global production in two years.





Yesterday on Wall Street



The Dow Jones industrial average rose 10.29, or 0.1 percent, to close at 11,357.04. The Dow had been down as many as 92 points earlier in the day. The Standard & Poor's 500 index added 5.31, or 0.4 percent, to 1,218.71, and the Nasdag composite rose 15.80, or 0.6 percent, to 2,578.78.

The yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note edged down to 2.65 percent from 2.66 percent late Tuesday. Oil rose \$1.09 to \$87.81 a barrel, and gold edged down to just below \$1,400 an ounce. European indexes slid as worries grow about debt problems in Ireland. The FTSE 100 fell 1 percent, Germany's DAX index dropped 1 percent, and France's CAC-40 fell 1.5 percent. The euro briefly fell below \$1.37 for the first time in three weeks. Concerns about mounting government debt in many European countries have been pressuring global stock markets throughout the year.

Gaining shares outnumbered falling ones three to two on the New York Stock Exchange, where consolidated volume came to 4.7 billion shares.

Fed to buy \$105B worth of bonds in first phase

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve says it will buy a total of \$105 billion worth of government bonds starting later this week as it launches a new program to invigorate the economy

The bonds will be purchased through a series of 18 operations that start on Friday and end on Dec. 9. The purchases are the first since the Fed announced last week that it will buy a total of \$600 billion worth of Treasury bonds over the next eight months.

The Fed will buy \$75 billion of government debt as part of the new program. And, it will buy another \$30 billion, using the proceeds from its vast mortgage portfolio.

That totals \$105 billion for the first phase of the Fed's government bond buying. The Fed last week said it anticipates buying on average \$110 billion a month.

Budget year begins with \$140.4B deficit

WASHINGTON — The federal government began the new budget year with a deficit that fell 20 percent from a year ago but still the third highest October imbalance on record.

The Treasury Department said Wednesday that last month's deficit totaled \$140.4 billion, down by \$35.9 billion from the record holder for the month, an imbalance of \$176.4 billion in October

Even with the improvement, the red ink last month set the stage for what is expected to be a third consecutive year of \$1 trillion-plus deficits. The flood of red ink contributed to a political backlash that cost Democrats dearly in last week's elections.

Feds propose graphic **Igarette warning la** Canada introduced similar

RICHMOND. Va. Corpses, cancer patients and diseased lungs are among the images the federal government plans for larger, graphic warning labels that would take up half of each pack of cigarettes sold in the United States.

Whether smokers addicted to nicotine will see them as a reason to quit remains a question.

The images are part of a new campaign announced by Food and Drug Administration and the Department of Health and Human Services Wednesday to reduce tobacco use, which is responsible for about 443,000 deaths per year.

"Some very explicit, almost gruesome pictures may be necessary," FDA Commissioner Margaret Hamburg said in an interview with The Associated Press. "This is a very, very serious public health issue, with very, very serious medical consequences," such as cancer, heart disease, strokes and lung diseases.

The share of Americans who smoke has fallen dramatically since 1970, from nearly 40 percent to about 20 percent, but the rate has stalled since about 2004. About 46 million adults in the U.S. smoke cigarettes.

In the same period, the average cost per pack has gone from 38 cents to \$5.33. Much of those increases are from state and federal taxes.

Disabled vets memorial has DC groundbreaking

MIAMI - For South Florida philanthropist Lois Pope, the journey to create a memorial for disabled veterans began more than 40 years ago when she sang for Vietnam War vets at a rehabilitation center.

Pope made herself a promise that night, that if she could ever do something for disabled veterans, she

On Wednesday, Pope hosted the groundbreaking of the American Veterans Disabled for Life Memorial. It will be within view of the Capitol on a 2.4-acre plot, across from the U.S. Botanic Garden.

Pope, a onetime Broadway actress and singer whose late husband owned the National Enquirer, said at the groundbreaking ceremony that she got the idea for the tribute when she learned — after performing for disabled veterans - that there was no permanent memorial in their honor.

WASHINGTON - In a politically incendiary plan, the bipartisan leaders of President Obama's deficit commission proposed curbs in Social Security benefits, deep reductions in federal spending and higher taxes for millions of Americans Wednesday to stem a flood of red ink that they said threat-

ens the nation's very future. White House The responded coolly, some leading lawmakers less so to proposals that target government programs long considered all but sacred. Besides Social Security, Medicare spending would be curtailed. Tax breaks for many health care plans, too. And the Pentagon's budget, as well, in a plan designed to cut total deficits by as much as \$4 trillion over the next

decade. The plan arrived exactly one week after elections that featured strong voter for economic demands change in Washington. The Social Security proposal would change the inflation measurement used to calculate cost-of-living adjustments for benefits, reducing annual increases. It immediately drew a withering assault from advocates for seniors, who are already upset that there will be no inflation increase for 2011, the second straight year.

The plan would also raise the regular Social Security retirement age to 68 by about 2050 and to 69 in 2075. The full retirement age for those retiring now is 66. For those born in 1960 or after, the full retirement age is now 67.

Better-off beneficiaries would receive smaller Social Security payments than those in lower earning brackets under the proposal, and the amount of income subject to Social Security taxes would be increased.

Kimberly man claims 'the ancient ones' once lived on his property

By Andrew Weeks **Times-News writer**

KIMBERLY — "This is the land of the ancient ones," says Gary Stone, sitting in a cave on property he owns east of Dierkes Lake in the Snake River Canyon.

The cave is one of many canyon sites that seem to tell a little something about the people who once inhabited the area. Stone claims some of those people pre-date history.

He walks out of the cave, and says: "You can feel the spirits here."

spread overlooking the Snake River, where there is plenty of sagebrush and rock.

"Every rock is a tool -ahammer, an ax head" Stone says, picking up a small rock.

Several years ago, Stone was visited by members of the Northern Shoshone, Paiute and Shoshone-Bannock tribes, who told him the 30 acres he owns was a special place for "the ancient ones."

"Maybe a hospital of sorts," he says reverently. "This place was very special to them, a place of healing."

Stone then leads us — me and three others — to two large slabs pushed together in a triangular shape. Inside are more large rocks that form a bench. He crawls inside, and I follow. As we sit in the tight confines, Stone explains how he believes it was used by the ancients as a sauna.

large rock resembling a turtle shell. It's hollowed out with a chimney-like spout on top. Stone says it likely was used

as an oven. Stone and his wife, Beverly, are known locally as storytellers and artists who've involved themselves in a number of projects to preserve Magic Valley history. They've published a number of books, including one about the Oregon Trail. Stone also has dabbled in archeology.

He talks about the rocks, how the former inhabitants of the area might have lived, what he wants to do with the land and his belief in the supernatural. "We maintain the spirits down here. If you do anything they don't like, they'll let you know," he says, noting that some visitors claim to have seen apparitions.

He wants to make money, he says, but aims to preserve the land as well. He's thinking tours, maybe have visitors start with a boat ride up the Snake to a place of stairs, which will lead them to his

On our way back, Stone is eager to point out other interesting things on his property, such as the towering cliffs where there appear to be more small caves, some of the rock walls colored black as if once burned by fire. Stone surmises they were campfires used by the ancient ones.

He and Jim Schouten, one of the people on tour this Friday in late October, talk about how it might have been way back when. Did the ancient ones use the caves as shelters from inclement weather, as places to stalk their prey, or to hide from their enemies?

"Possibly, there could have been 150 people to live in that wall," Stone says.

Schouten mentions the Chinese, who also left their imprint here in more modern times when they came to work on the railroad and in the mines. Chinese, in the 1880s, made up about 33 percent of Idaho's population. Could this all be from them?

Jim Woods, professor of anthropology at the College of Southern Idaho, toured Stone's property several years ago and agrees there are some interesting things to behold.

"There was a lot of occupation by the Chinese," he says in a separate interview. "They were scattered all throughout the canyon. We run across their remnants all the time, there's definitely evidence of that."

As for the ancient ones, that's something Woods isn't ready to stake his reputation on.

"If someone goes in with a trained eye, an archeologist, I'm very confident they

The difference between regular deer and white tail tags

Q: "I'm confused about deer tags. What's the difference between a regular deer and a white-tailed deer

tag?" **A:** There are two major differences between these seasons and the associated deer tags: timing of the hunt and species allowed to be taken.

Regular any weapon deer tags are by far the most frequently purchased deer tag in southern Idaho. This is the tag required for all "regular" any weapon, archery, short-range weapon and muzzle loader seasons for deer.

In the big game hunting brochure all the "regular' deer hunts are grouped together and listed with their open season for specific units. Any other rules that pertain to those units are listed as notes, which hunters should review, at the end of the regular deer hunting season section.

During the regular deer season, while possessing a regular deer tag, a hunter may hunt the species, sex and dates listed under the "Regular Season" in the current big game brochure.

In many of the northern Idaho big game units, this deer season only allows white tails to be harvested. In other units white-tailed deer or mule deer may be harvested. Most of the regular any weapon deer hunts are over at the end of October or the first week of November.

As a general rule, whitetailed deer season in northern and eastern Idaho only allows for white tails to be harvested. In many units this season overlaps the reg-





ular deer season but may go into late November or December.

As a species white-tailed deer tend to be more productive than mule deer, so from a deer management perspective hunting and harvesting them can often be more liberal. This is why many regular and whitetailed-only hunts allow longer hunting opportunity.

The white-tailed deer tag evolved from the old "Clearwater deer tag" as a hunter management tool to try to reduce hunter congestion and lessen the imposition on many landowners in the Clearwater area.

In the last few years many deer hunters have taken advantage of the opportunity to travel to northern Idaho, purchase a second deer tag (white-tailed tag) at the non-resident price, and hunt in December. Coupled with a winter steelhead or turkey trip, this is a great winter opportunity.

Sportsmen are reminded, while still at the license vendor when errors can be corrected, to verify that they have purchased the proper deer tag depending on where they intend to hunt.



Are we on the threshold of the first proof of extraterrestrials?

Extrasolar planet searches stretch the limits of current technology, even when their parent stars are only 20 light years away, as in the case of Gliese 851 and its entourage of planets. That the tiny red dwarf star has planets isn't in doubt — the dispute is over how many.

Gliese 581's planets were detected via the Doppler shift of the star's spectral lines, as the star is tugged to showed that "g" did not

almost any measurement), it remains an open question whether the planet even exists, let alone whether E.T. might call it home.

On the other hand, given the difficulty of studying such a planet (assuming it exists), overwhelmed in the glare of its star (eight times closer to one another than Earth and the sun), data to refute or confirm Vogt's bold assertion may be decades away.

On entering perimenopause **DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm

48 years old and just had what appeared to be a hot flash. Does this mean I'm going through menopause? My menstrual cycle has been sort of regular, but I'm not sure that I'm ready for this next phase in my life.

DEAR READER: Menopause occurs only after a woman stops menstruating completely for 12 months. My guess is you have perimenopause, a stage that precedes menopause. This occurs because your body is not producing hormones as it did before. It generally consists of irregular cycles. They may be more frequent, shorter in length, lighter, or you may skip a month or two only to return to a normal monthly pattern. You may experience hot flashes, night sweats, mood changes or periods of poor concentration. Your hair may thin, and you may experience insomnia. Things won't be as bad as they sound. Speak with your physician or gynecologist if you have specific

questions.



The key is to take care of your body, eat well, exercise often, don't smoke, and take life a day at a

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 15-year-old daughter has been suffering from chronic abdominal pain for about a year. She has had multiple blood tests to rule out diabetes, Crohn's disease, ulcers and a host of other possibilities. She has also had a barium X-ray and an upper endoscopy.

The only result has been that she does have mild damage to her esophagus from acid reflux, along with some minor isolated areas of swelling in her stomach lining. She's otherwise healthy, physically fit and an excellent stu-

dent with many friends. Her only complaint is the nonstop abdominal pain. She's currently taking 300 milligrams of gabapentin three times a day and 20 milligrams of omeprazole twice a day. She says the only difference she notices is that when the pain is really bad, the gabapentin gets her back to base quickly, but she doesn't get any better.

I would appreciate your thoughts on her condition. You always have thoughtful and helpful advice. Thank you.

DEAR READER: It appears you have taken a

great deal of time and expended a great deal of effort in seeking relief for your daughter. I'm not

sure that I can add too much more, but I'll try. Possibilities include irritable bowel syndrome,

tose intolerance and the use of aspirin or ibuprofen taken for the pain. I'm reluctant to mention stress, peer pressure, poor diet or lack of support because your note is so supportive, and your daughter appears wellrounded; however, if she has dark or bloody stools, a change in bowel habits or constipation she hasn't mentioned, we might have a basis from which to begin. You might ask her physician whether he or she believes a CT scan or MRI might shed some light onto the problem. You also might consider a second opinion with another specialist. This is no reflection on her physician, but sometimes different views help. Keep me posted.

PHOENIX (AP) - Except for State at the bottom, the Pac-10 has played out just like its coaches predicted, a win-one, lose-one trade off by teams unable distinguish themselves from one another.

But this year of parity could hurt the conference at the box office. All this beating up on each other could leave the Pac-10 with a potentially grim bowl picture.

Certainly, Oregon playing for a national championship would give the conference its chest-thumping moment. After that, though, the Pac-10 is facing a longshot to fill its six-bowl allotment and might have just four teams playing in the post-

And, if things play out right — or is it wrong? - the conference's second-best team, Stanford, could end up playing in the lower-tier Alamo Bowl instead of the more lucrative Rose Bowl.

"The biggest thing is that it's close," Oregon State coach Mike Riley said. "I've felt that every game is like the Super Bowl and we've just beat each other up."

Stanford figures to lose the most Oregon at the top and Washington from this season of counterpunch-

The seventh-ranked Cardinal (8-1, 5-1) have clearly been the secondbest team in the Pac-10, arguably the best one-loss team in the country.

But because of their loss to Oregon in Eugene, the Cardinal would need Oregon to lose two of its final three games to win the Pac-10. The way the Ducks have steamrolled opponents, losing even once doesn't seem all that likely, and that would certainly knock Stanford out of the Rose

Any other year, Stanford would be in line to replace Oregon in the Rose Bowl if the Ducks get to the national championship game.

Problem is, the Rose Bowl is obligated to take a non-automatic qualifying conference team if one makes the BCS but not the title game. That leaves the Cardinal needing No. 3 TCU or No. 4 Boise State to lose a game and miss the BCS or play in the national title game, which would require No. 2 Auburn to lose or fall back in the BCS standings and no other one-loss team moving up.



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

In 1929, the Ambassador Bridge spanning the Detroit River between Michigan and Windsor, Ontario, Canada, was dedicated.

1960, South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem survived a coup attempt by army rebels. (However, he was overthrown and killed in 1963.)

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Sometimes the secret of when not to finesse is based on tempos, rather than endplays. In four spades today you might make 12 tricks with only a modicum of luck. However, as you might expect, you will not be receiving much in the way of good breaks today!

Declarer won the heart lead and played the trump king, discovering the 4-0 break. South was still optimistic that all would be well and that an overtrick would roll in as long as West held the diamond queen. But when declarer played a diamond to dummy's jack, East won with the queen and switched to clubs, dislodging the ace. Declarer drew two more rounds of trump, then played on diamonds, hoping that West would follow two more times. However, as so often happens when a hand has been misplayed, there was no reprieve. West ruffed the third round of diamonds, and the defenders took a heart and a club to put the contract one down.

Did you spot declarer's mistake? He needed to establish the diamond suit in such a way that he could enjoy a discard before the defenders could cash out on him. Suppose he takes the diamond king and plays a second diamond, rising with dummy's ace. He can now concede a diamond trick to East, who will no doubt clear the club suit. No problem! Declarer draws two more rounds of trump with the queen and ace, then plays a good diamond, throwing a club. West can ruff this trick, but the defenders can score only three tricks.

ANSWER: Textbooks of old would advise you to redouble here with any nine-count. But if you redouble and hear the opponents bid or jump in hearts, you will have no idea what to do next. Best is to bid one diamond, then bid spades over their hearts, describing your hand precisely.

It's a day when surviving parents, children, siblings, spouses and friends gather at locations from Nashville to Nepal and take comfort in being with others who know what it means to lose a loved one to suicide.
