BOISE (AP) — The head of Idaho's health year 2012. and welfare agency has painted a gloomy layoffs could be coming as early as next July.

Dick Armstrong told legislative budget writers on Tuesday that his agency faces a projected shortfall of more than \$171 million caseloads, will force some difficult choices in the state's Medicaid program for fiscal in cutting or reducing programs, the

"We would have to eliminate major categories of service," Armstrong said.

The state's Medicaid fund is also facing challenges in the current fiscal year, when, despite program cuts and other cost-saving measures, Armstrong is projecting a \$42.3 million shortfall for Medicaid.

He suggested that deficit could be fixed

with a one-time draw down on the state's tobacco settlement fund.

The majority of future cuts would be to programs serving adults. Children's programs are protected, Armstrong said, but states across the nation are facing tough and draconian-style cuts in services.

Gun crime drops across state, region, albeit unevenly

Gun-related violent crimes were on the rise in 2007.

Then they were down. Then they were up again. It's difficult to find a trend among Idaho State Police statistics that track violent crime 2009. against persons involving guns in south-central Idaho.

Between 2005 and 2009, the number of violent crimes - murder, negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault, forcible fondling,

aggravated assault and kidnapping committed with a gun declined by 8 percent in the region. But year to year, the number has seesawed. In 2005, 60 such crimes occurred here, but that number fell to 33 in 2006. It then rolled from 52 down to 33 and back up to 55 from 2007 to

Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter said the back-and-forth swing has a lot to do with prisoner releases and possible repeat offenders.

Carey pulls together for accident victims

A Monday evening benefit raised about \$27,000 to aid the families of two Carey students and a teacher involved in a fatal Oct. 26 car crash.

Meanwhile, investigators have released more information about the incident, in which a car with two Carey School students and a driver's education teacher was struck by a second vehicle. One student was killed, while the other three people were injured.

The benefit event included a raffle and an auction, with 450 plates selling at the fundraiser, said Carey Principal John Peck.

"It was an amazing night," he said. "The amount of generosity and the amount of support was absolutely amazing."

The money raised will be split three ways, leaving each family of the students and teacher with a check for about \$9,000.

Austin Hennefer, 15, a sophomore and driver of the driver's education vehicle was killed in the crash. Passengers Jennifer Mares, 15, of Picabo and instructor Jeff Mecham, 41, were injured.

The results of the Blaine County Sheriff's Office investigation into the crash have now been sent to the county prosecutor for legal review. No citations have been issued, according to Lt. Jay Davis.

Among its findings, investigators say that Hennefer was making an unsafe turn when the driver's education car was struck by the second car.

City officials hope for easier driving by winter

Construction crews are making a mad dash to knock out the biggest chunks of work related to Twin Falls' arsenic reduction project before winter — not that most drivers should know.

Twin Falls city officials said they hope the contractors' traffic control methods remain about the same as they have been for the past several weeks.

"(Drivers) won't see a different route or traffic control, just differDirector Jon Caton said.

In the next week or so, that equipment should also start getting packed away for the winter, leaving most routes open, if not complete. Some major work that will remain is getting the top layer of paving complete on Washington Street South at the bridge over Rock Creek Canyon — for now, the bumps will be graded for a smoother drive - and filling a trench on Highland Avenue near Blue Lakes Boulevard.

"We're hoping that it'll look a lot like it usually does," City Engineer Iackie Fields said of winter driving near arsenic-related construction

The arsenic reduction project is run our whole system," Caton said. a \$20 million effort to reduce arsenic levels in city drinking water to comply with federal standards by blending low-arsenic 735-3220.

"It's whether or not certain people have gotten out of prison, those with a violent past," Carter said. "People who have issues who get out still have issues."

Of the 233 violent crimes committed with a gun from 2005-09 across the region, only 13 were murders committed with a gun. Aggravated assault was the crime committed most often with a gun, accounting for 201 reports. Also, handguns were the most commonly used firearms for criminal activities – the report distinguishes between handgun, rifle/shotgun, other and unknown - accounting for 138 crimes.

With its large population base, Twin Falls County accounted for 42 percent of south-central Idaho's violent gun crimes between 2005 and 2009. Of those crimes,

What becomes of the seized weapons?

Whenever a weapon is confiscated, it's up the individual agency to squirrel it away for safekeeping. For example, the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office keeps

approximately 100 guns at any given time, according to evidence technician Irma Kulasevic. Weapons used in the commission of a crime are held as evidence for county prosecutors and must be strictly accounted for when transported to and from court.

However, not all seized weapons were used in the commission of a crime. Many are confiscated during traffic stops or other investigations. Some are just found with no way to be linked to an owner. All weapons stay in a secured lockup until the agency gets a court order to dispose of them. "We have some dating back to 2008," Kulasevic said.

Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall said his department will have confiscated weapons destroyed, adapted for the department's use or traded at gun stores for other supplies, such as ammunition.

Knives were used in 275 area crimes between 2005 and 2009, though their yearly total dropped 34 percent during that span. Carter said that knives are easier to access than guns.

"Anybody can get their hands on a knife," he said. "Just go to (a store) or grab one from a buddy's closet. It's a simple thing."

From 2005 to 2009, violent crimes involving guns decreased by 17 percent across Idaho, while statewide crimes involving knives dropped 16 percent. On the other hand, crimes involving blunt objects were on the rise, up 12 percent.

Congratulations, Mr. Councilman: That'll be \$107,000

oeur d'Alene City Council member Mike Kennedy is guilty of the high crime and misdemeanor of winning reelection by three votes in November

As punishment, he got sued by the loser, Jim Brannon. To date, his lawyers have run up \$107,000 in legal fees.

That's crazy. What kind of democratic system penalizes people for running for public office?

So far, the cash-strapped city of Coeur d'Alene a co-defendant in this case — has declined to pick up Kennedy's tab. It's already spent \$35,000 on its own for outside legal fees. Between Kennedy and the city, they've ponied up about 142,000 of the dollars neither can afford to fend off this frivolous litigation.

W. and Dick Cheney, reunited at last

alk about your misty watercolor memories. What's too painful to remember, we simply choose to forget. The bittersweet story of a preppie for whom things always came too easily and his noodging partner, pressuring with sky-high expectations

until that final clash split them apart. Has time rewritten every line? It's trying, big-time.

Yes, Robert Redford and Barbra Streisand met up on *Oprah* on Tuesday to talk about their 1973 turn in The Way We Were as the culture-crossed Hubbell and Katie.

But the more charged reunion was taking place in Dallas at the groundbreaking ceremony for the George W. Bush Presidential Center at Southern Methodist University.

After a period of estrangement and after circling each other with dueling memoirs, a happy W. and a gaunt Dick Cheney were reunited on stage.

"History is beginning to come around," Cheney said with satisfaction. After hailing W. as "classy," Vice acted unclassy. Demonstrating that Bush still cannot control Cheney, the former vice president defied W's promise not to mock President Obama.

"This may be the only shovel-ready project in America," Cheney noted sardonically, making fun of Obama's attempts to dig out from under the trillions of debt left by his predeces-

Together again were the president and vice president who invaded, deregulated, overspent, created a climate of fear and intensified the class divide with $\tan \cot s -$ all so recklessly that our resources are sapped just as we need to step up and compete with our banker, China.

"I wasn't a very good economic prognosticator," Bush told CNN's Candy Crowley. No kidding.

The pair fell out over the Scooter

Libby pardon. Up until that point, Vice had been able to lead W. off various cliffs with faux deference and a good sense of which buttons to push. (W. would do anything to avoid getting labeled a wimp.)

Bush writes in his autobiography that when he told Scooter's old boss that the jury verdict should be respected, Dick stared at him intensely.

"I can't believe you're going to leave a soldier on the battlefield," Cheney said.

"The comment stung," Bush concedes. "In eight years, I had never seen Dick like this, or even close to this. I worried that the friendship we had built was about to be severely strained, at best."

On the Today show interview with Matt Lauer, Bush was asked by an audience member to name his most insightful adviser.

The chagrined ex-president tried to avoid the question at first. It was fascinating to watch the body language of the man who said his decision to invade Iraq relied more on body language than vigorous debate.

When W. did offer a list, Cheney did not immediately pop to mind. Hank Paulson was first. Then Condi, who elbowed Cheney aside. Then Colin Powell, Cheney's nemesis. Then Rummy, Cheney's mentor and partner in dark machinations. And then, finally, when W. could avoid it no longer, he mentioned Vice, damning with faint praise: "Dick Cheney's advice was consistent and strong."

He told Lauer that he was motivated to run for president because of his father: "I wondered whether or not I had what it took to get in the arena like he did." And he writes that one of the motivating factors for sacking Saddam was that the Butcher of Baghdad tried to assassinate his dad.

Yet, despite his father being the measuring stick and prod, he did not keep the former president and foreign affairs expert in the loop on Iraq.

Asked by Bill O'Reilly why he did not like to seek advice from his father the only other American president who went to war with Saddam - W. offered a nonsensical answer that simply underscored his perpetual fear of being overshadowed by his dad.

"He knew that I had better information at the time than he would have known," W. said, adding that when "the heat" is on "you tend to seek out the advice of the people closest to you." He also talked as usual about how close he and his dad are, which makes the whole thing even weirder.

As Barbra sang on Oprah: If we had the chance to do it all again, tell me, would we? Could we?

ear Uncle Sam, My mother told me to send thankyou notes promptly. I've been remiss.

Let me remind you why I'm writing. Just over two years ago, in September 2008, our country faced an economic meltdown. Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, the pillars that supported our mortgage system, had been forced into conservatorship. Several of our largest commercial banks were teetering. One of Wall Street's giant investment banks had gone bankrupt, and the remaining three were poised to follow. AIG. the world's most famous insurer, was at death's door.

Many of our largest industrial companies, dependent on commercial paper financing that had disappeared, were weeks away from exhausting their cash resources. Indeed, all of corporate America's dominoes were lined up, ready to topple at lightning speed. My own company. Berkshire Hathaway, might have been the last to fall, but that distinction provided little solace.

Nor was it just business that was in peril: 300 million Americans were in the domino line as well. Just days before, the jobs, income, 401(k)'s and money-market funds of these citizens had seemed secure. Then, virtually

overnight, everything began to turn into pumpkins and mice. There was no hiding place. A destructive economic force unlike any seen for generations had been unleashed.

Only one counterforce was available, and that was you, Uncle Sam. Yes, you are often clumsy, even inept. But when businesses and people worldwide race to get liquid, you are the only party with the resources to take the other side of the transaction. And when our citizens are losing trust by the hour in institutions they once revered, only you can restore calm.

When the crisis struck, I felt you would understand the role you had to play. But you've never been known for speed, and in a meltdown minutes matter. I worried whether the barrage of shattering surprises would disorient you. You would have to improvise solutions on the run, stretch legal boundaries and avoid slowdowns, like Congressional hearings and studies. You would also need to get turf-conscious departments to work together in mounting your counterattack. The

Uncle Sam, you delivered. People will second-guess your specific decisions; you can always count on that. But just as there is a fog of war, there is a fog of panic — and, overall, your actions were remarkably effective.

challenge was huge, and many people thought you were not up to it.

Well, Uncle Sam, you delivered. People will second-guess your specific decisions; you can always count on that. But just as there is a fog of war, there is a fog of panic — and, overall, your actions were remarkably effective.

I don't know precisely how you orchestrated these. But I did have a pretty good seat as events unfolded, and I would like to commend a few of your troops. In the darkest of days, Ben Bernanke, Hank Paulson, Tim Geithner and Sheila Bair grasped the gravity of the situation and acted with courage and dispatch. And though I never voted for George W. Bush, I give him great credit for leading, even as Congress postured and squabbled.

You have been criticized, Uncle Sam, for some of the earlier decisions that got us in this mess — most prominently, for not battling the rot building up in the housing market. But then few of your critics saw matters clearly either. In truth, almost all of the

country became possessed by the idea that home prices could never fall significantly.

That was a mass delusion, reinforced by rapidly rising prices that discredited the few skeptics who warned of trouble.

Delusions, whether about tulips or Internet stocks, produce bubbles. And when bubbles pop, they can generate waves of trouble that hit shores far from their origin. This bubble was a doozy and its pop was felt around the world.

so, again, Uncle Sam, thanks to you and your aides. Often you are wasteful, and sometimes you are bullying. On occasion, you are downright maddening. But in this extraordinary emergency, you came through — and the world would look far different now if you had not.

My health bills are now almost \$100,000 and climbing. I can't work and might

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

Hansen iettisoned as state Democratic Party director

BOISE — Idaho Democrats' poor showing in the Nov. 2 election has led to consequences for the party's leadership: Chairman Keith Roark is jettisoning executive director Jim Hansen on Dec. 31, when his term ends.

During the debacle at the polls two weeks ago, Democrats saw U.S. Rep. Walt Minnick ousted from the 1st Congressional District, they gave up five state House of Representatives seats and lost the governor's race by the widest margin since 1998.

Roark isn't blaming Hansen, who ran the party since 2008, but said it's clear Idaho's long-suffering minority needs a new direction.

"Obviously, in the wake of this past election, the Idaho Democratic Party has to look in new directions, we're going to need new approaches, new energy," Roark said. "We're going to need new faces. Change is necessary."

There's at least one benefit to Democrats' poor performance nationally: There is plenty of newly jobless Democratic talent beyond Idaho borders who could be good candidates to replace Hansen. Roark said the party plans to conduct a nationwide search for a replacement.

Allred to amend disclosure to include in-kind help

BOISE — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Keith Allred is amending his campaign's financial disclosures to include an inkind contribution worth \$3,000 to \$4,000 for work done by the Boise-based business consulting firm he just joined as a partner.

Several employees at HB Ventures conducted an analysis last March or April that was meant to examine how far Idaho's economy had fallen behind neighboring states — and why it had slipped in the rankings.

HB Ventures is now touting this work for Allred in its web site marketing materials among its "Case Studies" pages, contending "this analysis became a foundational element of the gubernatorial candidate's proposed economic strategy for the state to realize an economic turnaround."

But Allred, who lost to Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter by 26 percentage points on Nov. 2, didn't report his new firm's contribution on campaign disclosure documents filed with the Idaho secretary of state earlier this year.

After an inquiry from The Associated Press, Allred said Wednesday he was filing new paperwork, to correctly account for the in-kind contribution.

Lobbyist registers for Conoco ahead of hearing on big loads

BOISE — A big oil company has hired one of Idaho's best-known lobbyists as it tries to convince the state to allow four massive loads of refinery equipment along U.S. Highway 12.

Skip Smyser registered as a lobbyist for ConocoPhillips on Monday with Idaho's secretary of

The Houston-based oil giant is preparing for a hearing Friday, where it will defend its plans to ship coke drums between the port of Lewiston and Billings, Mont., along the winding riverside highway through mountainous northcentral Idaho.

Environmentalists, residents and some business owners along the U.S. 12 corridor are fighting those shipments - and more than 200 additional proposed oversized loads planned by Exxon Mobil Corp.

The Idaho Transportation Department issued permits last Wednesday for ConocoPhillips' loads, but they can't move until shipment foes get a hearing.

Officials lower speed in wake of pedestrian fatality

MIDDELTON — Authorities in southwestern Idaho say they are reducing the speed limit on a stretch of Idaho Highway 44 where a student was killed after being hit



by a motorist The Idaho Transportation Department also signed off on a plan this week to install a pedestrian crossing signal at an intersection near Middelton High School.

In September, 15-year-old Colton Mackey was killed while crossing a section of the highway en route to school. Speeds along that stretch are now 25 mph, effective Tuesday.

After the accident, a group of concerned Middelton mothers worked to raise awareness, lobby for safety upgrades and help students cross safely each morning.

Concerned Moms of Middelton leader Tammy Dittenber says the reduced speeds and safety crosswalk should make a big difference at the intersection.

Idaho man found guilty of assaulting state trooper

LEWISTON — A northern Idaho man has been convicted of assaulting a state trooper during an attempted traffic stop last year that resulted in one death.

Ricardo Daniel Rodriguez faces up to six months in prison at a Dec. 6 sentencing hearing.

Authorities say 39-year-old 50-year-old Rodriguez and Randall Vernon Ellenwood got out of their car and confronted Trooper Jeffory Talbott during an attempted traffic stop for drunken driving in May 2009.

Rodriguez were "seriously physically battering" Talbott when the the scene.

The FBI investigated the shooting because the chase began on the Nez Perce Reservation and Ellenwood and Rodriguez are tribal members. Talbott was cleared to return to work.

Walmart drug plan for seniors may not be best deal

WASHINGTON — A new Medicare drug plan with the lowest upfront cost in the country may not be for everyone, experts say.

Medicare's open enrollment season just started, and the plan from insurer Humana and retail giant Walmart is getting attention. At \$14.80, the monthly premium is the lowest of any national plan, about half the average. And Humana and Walmart are advertising savings of more than \$450 a year for the typical Medicare recipient.

But experts say if you can't get to a Walmart easily and need costly medications for intractable conditions, it

could be a disappointment. You could face copayments as high as 50 percent for drugs purchased at local independ-

"It may well be a good bargain, but people have to do the research," said Jack Hoadley, a research professor at the Georgetown Health Policy Institute. "It's not just the premiums. It's the premiums plus the drugs they take, and then they have to take into account the pharmacy: Is it practical for them to use the Walmart pharmacy?"

Plan members can choose to fill their prescriptions at more than 60,000 pharmacies nationwide, but only about 4,000 - Walmart, Sam's Club or Neighborhood Market stores - are "preferred," and offer the lowest copayments.

Hoadley, who in an earlier government career helped lay the groundwork for the Medicare drug benefit, said he believes regulators should take a second look at the network. Residents of metro areas, for example, may have to drive miles to find a preferred drugstore. Consumer advocates say that's unusual.



The Dow Jones industrial average fell 15.62, or 0.1 percent, to 11,007.88. The S&P 500 rose 0.25, or less than 0.1 percent, to 1,178.59. The technology-focused Nasdaq composite index rose 6.17, or 0.3 percent, to 2,476.01

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After crash and government control, rebirth for General Motors

DETROIT — The last time General Motors threw a big party was two years ago, for its 100th birthday. Two months later, its CEO was before Congress, begging for bailout money. Now GM is getting ready for another celebration this time for its future.

The National Academy of Engineering, which issued the latest report, said BP and others involved in the disaster failed to manage risks and didn't even have a system in place to weigh safety against costs.

Several entities, including the Coast Guard, the Justice Department, Congress and BP itself, also are looking into the causes of the worst offshore oil spill in U.S.


The various inquiries have so far come up with similar core findings: That BP and its partners misread critical pressure tests, that the cement job meant to seal the well didn't work, and that the blowout preventer failed to stop the gusher as designed.

Yet the investigations vary sharply in emphasis and tone. BP's internal investigation spread the blame around, saying its partners on the doomed rig shared responsibility. The presidential panel said a cascade of failures, not any single decision, led to the disaster.

Air Force warns troops Facebook could give them away

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Air Force is warning its troops to be careful when using Facebook and other popular networking sites because some new features could show the enemy exactly where U.S. forces are located in war zones.

In a warning issued on its internal website earlier this month, the Air Force said that "careless use of these services by airmen can have devastating operations security and privacy implications." The message was also sent to senior commanders, who were asked to get the word out to their

forces. The sites are a concern for U.S military services, which have 95,000 troops in Afghanistan and roughly 50,000 in Iraq. The Army, which provides the bulk of the battlefield forces, said it intends to circulate a similar warning about location services to key personnel next week.

The applications, which are offered by a variety of services including Facebook, Foursquare, Gowalla and Loopt, can identify a person's location, even pinpoint it on a map.

A key concern is that enemy forces could use such features to track troops in the war zone who have a Blackberry or other smart phone and use those net-

New drug produces steep drop in bad cholesterol

CHICAGO (AP) - For more than a decade, millions of lives have been saved by statin drugs like Lipitor and Zocor, which lower bad cholesterol and the risk of heart attacks.

The drugs were so safe and worked so well that deaths from heart disease began falling dramatically. Doctors only partly joked about putting statins in the of the new medicine's water supply.

An experimental drug boosted good cholesterol so high and dropped bad cholesterol so low in a study that doctors were stunned and voiced renewed hopes for an entirely new way of preventing heart attack and

stroke. "We are the most excited we have been in decades;" said Dr. Christopher Cannon of Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, who led the study of the novel drug for Merck & Co. "This could really be the

The drug, anacetrapib, will not be on the market anytime soon. It needs more testing to see if its dramatic effects on cholesterol will translate into fewer heart attacks, strokes and deaths. Merck announced 30,000-patient study to answer that question, and it will take several years.

But the sheer magnitude effects so far excited lots of Now they think they may doctors at an American be on to something even Heart Association conference in Chicago, where results were presented Wednesday.

"The data look spectacular, beyond what anybody would have expected," said Dr. Robert Eckel, a University of Colorado cardiologist and past president of the heart association. "It's like a rocket to Jupiter versus one to the moon. I can think of many of my patients who could use the drug right now."

Merck's Dr. Luciano Rossetti agreed.

"We are trying not to be too giddy. The potential benefit is enormous," said Rossetti, senior vice president of global scientific strategy at the company, based in Whitehouse Station, N.J.

It was one of two studies that caused unusual optimism and buzz at the heart meeting. The other tested a new procedure to lower blood pressure in patients whose pills failed them.

The new method uses a tube through a blood vessel to zap nerves near the kidneys, which fuel high blood pressure. Its success offers hope for a possible permanent fix for people with very high blood pressure despite taking fistfuls of pills each day. Only about a third of the millions of people worldwide with high blood pressure are able to control it well with pills.

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

Saint Alphonsus teaches skills at ski and mountain trauma conference

UN VALLEY - Nate Ostis, who heads up the ing. McCall-based Wilderness Rescue International l, recently came head to head with a startling revelation as he talked with a NASA doctor at a recent medical confer-

A worker needing emergency care can be evacuated from the International Space Station in just 90 minutes, he was told.

Can you imagine such a speedy rescue in Idaho's backcountry, which sports 4.5 million acres of wilderness, including the second largest wilderness area in the Lower 48? Ostis asked.

The problem is compounded in winter when deep snow, threat of avalanche and other hazards make rescue efforts even more challeng-

That's why Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center has put on The Ski and Mountain Trauma Conference each year for the past five years.

The conference, held recently at Sun Valley Resort, brought together 400 ski patrollers and medical personnel from Idaho and its surrounding states to learn about such widely differing subjects as assessing patients in the wilderness to avoiding complacency in swiftwater rescues.

Here's a look at some of the things that might help you survive an outing gone wrong.

SURVIVAL KIT

No single first-aid kit will serve for all your outdoor activities. Portneuf Medical Center LifeFlight EMT Lance Taysom keeps several different bags ready to go —one for day hiking, another for backpacking, still others for activities like whitewater rafting and climbing.

Check your kit before you go out on each activity, he advises. You don't need to tote along a spare ski basket, for instance, for a hiking trip in July.

Organize medicines in clear plastic bags labeled with dosages and cautions. And replace them as you use them.

Know where things are stored in your bag so you • Map, compass, GPS uni. can retrieve a Band-aid or safety pin in the dark without dumping everything on the ground. And take your kit with you — it does you no good sitting in the car. Some key items to have:

- · Multifunction tool, such as a Leatherman, with a sharp knife and tweezers. • Super glue for closing wounds
- Safety pins, wire, duct tape, zip-ties
- Pencil and note pad

- · Nylon cord for splinting or making shelter · Sewing kit with heavy-duty needles and
- thread Latex gloves
- Bandages, including sterile gauze pads Water purification tablets
 - · Acetaminophen, such as Tylenol, for fever or pain
 - Aspirin for cardiac, dental and anti-inflammatory purposes Ibuprofen, such as Motrin or
 - Advil for pain · Benadryl or some other form of
 - antihistamine
- Headlamp with extra batteries
- An emergency bivy sack or, at the very least, a car tire bag
- Fire starter
- Signaling mirror and whistle
- High-calorie snacks, pot, stove with fuel · Antiseptic wipes, chemical hand warmers,
- · Sun screen, insect repellent Extra gloves and hat

SURVIVAL FACT OR FICTION

Here are some questions LifeFlight EMT Lance Taysom suggests people ponder around the campfire some night:

True or false? High ground is better than low for sleeping.

It depends. You don't want to make camp in a creek bed or place where flash flood could cause problems. Low-lying draws or valleys tend to be colder as the night air settles. But ridge tops tend to be windy and less sheltered. The ideal spot: on a south-facing slope out of the wind and protected from flooding.

True or false? Eat potato chips rather than salt tablets.

True. Using salt tablets can lead to gastritis and renal failure. Replacing lost electrolytes is easily accomplished by eating salty snacks.

True or false? In extreme survival situations, do like "Man vs. Wild" Bear Grylls and drink your urine. Never. Urine is toxic and will cut down your survival time.

True or false? Eating snow is a safe, effective way to stay hydrated.

It depends. If you're warm and have a good source of calories, eat all the snow you want as dry snow will give you some liquid. But if you're cold or out of food, eating snow can sap your energy and put you at risk of becoming hypothermic. If the sun is shining, put a plastic bag or dark tarp over a dark background and spread out a thin layer of snow to melt on your solar "hot plate." Or, fill a sock with snow and hang it near the fire, catching the water as it drips.

True or false? Boiling water for five minutes kills organisms harmful to humans.

True, but you don't need five minutes. Once water reaches a rolling boil, it's

safe to drink. True or false? Drinking alcohol will

keep you warm. False. Alcohol gives a false sense of warm. In reality it causes blood vessels in the skin to open up, radiating heat away from the body at a much

faster rate. True or false? If you are cold, put on a hat, as most body heat is lost through the head.

True, if your head is the only part that's uncovered. Only the hands and feet are good at vaso-constricting to conserve heat. If your torso or some other body part is uncovered,

it's just as important to cover it as

the head. True or false? You can warm up a hypothermic person by putting a second naked person in the hypothermic person's sleeping bag. False. Skin to skin is okay for warming cold feet and hands but not the most efficient method for transferring heat to a cold person. If you put a second person in the bag, keep at least one dry layer on. Better yet, get that extra rescuer out of the bag to do some useful work like getting firewood or improving the shelter.

True or false? Keep your head inside your sleeping bag when it's cold. Partly true. While you need to keep your head insulated, it's important not to exhale warm moist breath into

the insulation of your sleeping bag. Draw your bag over you like a mummy to keep your head in and face out.

True or false? In a survival situation, you may die from hypothermia in your sleep if you go to sleep when you're cold.

False. Unless you're severely hypothermic, uncontrollable shivering will wake you up before you get too cold. When that happens, run around or do some jumping jacks or something else to warm up before

trying to catch another nap. True or false? Dehydration and fatigue contributes to frostbite. True. Dehydration affects blood flow through capillaries. And fatigue clouds our judgment and decreases our vigilance.

WHEN YOU'RE STUCK

Mountaineer Lou Whittaker, who lives in Ketchum, has a three-word definition for bivouac: "The great screw-up." Certainly you don't want to get stuck outside, either because your car's slid off the road in the snow or because vou're lost or injured. But in a place like Idaho, it's not too farfetched to think you might have to spend an unexpected night out some time. Here are a few ideas for surviving "the big screw-up" from Portneuf Medical Center LifeFlight ENT Lance Tayson:

- Practice survival situations ahead of time by practicing constructing a snow shelter or a dry-weather shelter. And don't always practice on nice sunny days, either. Practice building a fire when it's wet and windy.
- · Keep a to-go pack for outdoor expeditions and never go without it. Carry what you can see yourself using and know how to use it. If you choose to buy a ready-made survival kit, check it before heading out. You may find that the "emergency food" in it is nothing more than a breath mint.
- If lost, blow your whistle three times at a time to indicate that something's not right.
- Carry a glass signal mirror rather than plexiglass — plexiglass tends to get scratched and therefore does reflect as well.
- Eschew waterproof matches or cigarette lighter for a magnesium fire starter. It starts every time with a cotton ball and Vaseline.
- In a pinch you can wear plastic grocery bags over a thin liner sock and under a thick wool sock to keep sweaty feet from soaking the insulation of your waterproof boots and stealing your warmth.
- Cotton is a no-no when conditions are apt to get wet. Cotton is a great insulator when dry but loses nearly all its ability to retain heat when it gets wet. And it's difficult to dry — jeans can take up to three weeks to dry out in some circum-

stances. Dollar for dollar, wool is still the

best bet to keep you warm when wet. It's safe around campfires, too.

- If you're stuck or stranded in snow, stay with your car. Keep the painted surfaces free so searchers can find you. And if your car is white, tie something bright to the antenna (if you're not one of the hundreds of Bronco fans with pennants already flying on the car). · If you're stuck outside, com-
- mit yourself early to spending the night so you can build a shelter. Line your shelter with live pine and fern boughs, rather than dry twigs and branches to provide better loft. And stuff dead grass into your clothing for added insulation. • If you hear a helicopter overhead at night, swing your headlamp or flick your fire starter. Rescuers are now equipped with night vision
- goggles that should spot those • If you're out during the day signal with a large smoky fire – blackening the smoke with things like green pine boughs. • If you're using snowmobile or ATV to get you farther than you can walk out, make sure you have what you need to survive

How to cook that wild turkey

Q: "Is a wild turkey any good to eat? What's a good way to cook it?"

A: I assume you are referring to the game bird rather than the distilled spirits by the same name.

The American wild turkey has played a significant role in American history. It was an important food source for early Americans. Its intelligence, wily nature, and challenge for hunters earned its nomination as the symbol of the United States from Benjamin Franklin. We all know how that turned out: the American bald eagle took on that distinction.

As far as the game bird is concerned, preparing a wild turkey for the table is significantly different than the "Butter Ball" turkey obtained at grocers. The meat from a wild turkey is generally much leaner with less fat and moisture throughout the skin and meat. Two primary concerns when preparing wild turkey are not overcooking and maintaining moisture in the meat.

The breast on a wild turkey is generally smaller than a domestic turkey, so it often will cook faster

Two things to remember when cooking wild turkeys: do not overcook and try to maintain moisture in the meat.

resulting in overcooking. Overcooking most wild game results in meat that is dry and tough.

Another important difference between the two birds is the skin. Due to the fat and moisture, a baked turkey from the local grocers produces delicious crispy skin. The skin from a wild turkey is drier and contains less fat. When baked so as to maintain moisture in the meat, the skin on a wild turkey often becomes a bit rubbery.

To keep the meat moist the bird can be baked in the oven using frequent basting or in oven-proof baking

bags. The turkey will be done when the temperature of the thickest part of the thigh reaches about 165 degrees. An Internet cookbook suggests this will take about 15 minutes per pound at a temperature of

350 degrees. Another alternative favored by many is immersing the bird in a deep fryer filled with hot cooking oil. The hot oil cooks the meat and seals in the moisture. There are many safety cautions when cooking anything in a deep fryer. The hot oil can easily overflow the container, burning the cooks, creating a fire and/or

a huge oily mess. With all game birds a last note of caution involves the potential for tooth damage when biting down on a shotshell pellet.

Many sportsmen enjoy the slightly gamey flavor of a wild turkey. Coupled with an embellished hunting story, a Thanksgiving dinner featuring a wild turkey is a true holiday celebration.



Proper diet can help prevent another bout of diverticulitis

DEAR DR. GOTT: In November 2006, I was diagnosed with diverticular disease. In October 2009, I had surgery, and the diseased portion of my intestines was removed. Two abscesses were drained, one ovary was removed and a fistula was repaired. I've

My question is, could this happen again? I try to consume the recommended amount of fiber, and I drink plenty of water. Your thoughts, please.

Diverticula are small sacs or pockets in one or more areas of the colon, more com-



monly in the sigmoid colon. People with diverticula present are diagnosed with diverticulosis. Should bacteria or waste get trapped in these pouches, inflammation and infection can result. When this occurs, the condition is then known as diverticulitis. Both conditions together make up diverticular disease. A diet low in fiber appears to be the main cause

of diverticular disease, which can lead to constipation and strain during evacuation. It's the straining that could cause diverticula to form in the colon.

Even though you had surgical repair, you could conceivably get diverticulitis again had you not taken positive steps. By modifying your diet to include more fiber, you have gone a long way toward eliminating the problems you had in the past. Whole grains such as found in multigrain or whole wheat breads, fresh fruits such as apples, pears and peaches and vegetables such as broccoli, Brussels

sprouts, squash, potatoes and legumes should provide adequate fiber. Between 20 and 35 grams of fiber per day are recommended for a healthful diet. Avoid constipation. Maintain good bowel habits. Drink adequate liquids. Exercise regularly. Obtain adequate sleep.

Diverticulosis is common as a person ages. By the time a person reaches the age of 60, it will occur in almost 50 percent of the population. People without symp-

toms will probably not require treatment; however, they should be on a highfiber diet to ensure they are taking all possible precau-

tions. When symptoms do present (constipation, diarrhea, fever, chills), diagnosis can be made through X-ray, CT, ultrasound, sigmoidoscopy or colonoscopy. Complications of diverti-

culitis can include intestinal blockage, abscesses and peritonitis (infection of the abdominal cavity). You appear to have presented with a classic case. Abscesses were discovered and drained. Surgery removed the damaged portion of the colon. You formed a fistula that was surgically removed. And you're pain free.



Iraqi president won't sign Aziz's death sentence

BAGHDAD - Iraq's president said Wednesday that he would not sign an execution order for the for-Hussein's government, who was sentenced to death last month.

"I will not sign Tariq Aziz's death sentence," Jalal Talabani told France 24 television during a visit to Paris for the Socialist International meeting. "I will sign no death sentence at all, because as a social democrat, I'm against the death penalty."

The statement Talabani, who was reelected to the presidency last week, followed calls by the Vatican and Russia to halt the execution on humanitarian grounds. Aziz, 74, is in poor health. He was the most senior Christian official in Hussein's predomias well as its international



errold Brooks never envisioned himself playing college basketball in Twin Falls, Idaho. In fact, Brooks never envisioned himself playing college basketball, period.

Football was his primary passion from his Pop Warner days to his starring role as a tailback in high school. For him, basketball was an afterthought — and rightly so, with schools like Syracuse recruiting him for his gridiron prowess.

Declo hosts Oakley Friday. Raft River is off until Nov. 30 when it travels to North Gem.



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

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §§9-1-6, 9-2-2, 9-11-1,9-11-2, 9-11-4, AND ENACTING NEW §§9-9-9-9-22, AND 9-9-23, PROVIDING FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF BICYCLE SAFETY RECOMMENDATIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO: Section 1: That the definition of "Bicycle" in Twin Falls City Code §9-1-6 is amended as follows:

"BICYCLE: Every vehicle having wheels, any two (2) of which are not less than twelve (12) inches in diameter, propelled exclusively by human power, upon which any person may ride, including tricycles and other multi-cycles, excluding scooters and similar devices. BICYCLÉS: Every device propelled by human power upon which any person may ride, having two (2) tandem wheels either of which is over twenty inches (20") in diameter, and including any device generally recognized as a bicycle though equipped with two (2) front and two (2) rear wheels."

Section 2: That Chapter 9 of Title 9 of the Twin Falls City Code is amended by the addition of a NEW SECTION 9-9-21 as follows: "9-9-21: OVERTAKING BICYCLISTS AND PEDESTRIANS:

The operator of a motor vehicle overtaking a bicyclist or pedestrian on a highway shall, whenever possible, leave a safe distance, but no less than three (3) feet, when passing a bicycle or pedestrian and shall maintain that distance until safely past the overtaken bicycle or pedestrian."

Section 3: That Chapter 9 of Title 9 of the Twin Falls City Code is amended by the addition of a

NEW SECTION 9-9-22 as follows: 9-9-22: HARASSMENT OF BICYCLISTS AND PEDESTRIANS PROHIBITED:

It shall be unlawful for any person, maliciously and with the specific intent to intimidate or harass or cause another person to crash, stumble, or fall because that other person is walking along the roadway or operating a bicycle along the roadway, to:

A. threaten, by word or act, to cause physical injury to the pedestrian or bicyclist, or B. throw or otherwise expel any object at or in the direction of the pedestrian or bicyclist."

Section 4: That Twin Falls City Code §9-11-4 is amended as follows:

9-11-4: RECKLESS USE OF BICYCLES:

No person shall ride a bicycle on a sidewalk, street, roadway, highway or any public or private property open to public use, carelessly and heedlessly, or without due caution and circumspection, or at such speed or in any other manner in a reckless manner so as to endanger the safety of a pedestrian, the driver of another vehicle or himself, or while under the influence of alcohol. drugs. or any other intoxicating substances. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of Reckless Bicycling and, upon conviction, may be sentenced to jail for up to six (6) months and fined up to

Section 5: That Chapter 9 of Title 9 of the Twin Falls City Code is amended by the addition of a LOST Golden Retriever, male on Fri NEW SECTION 9-9-23 as follows:

9-9-23: TURNING IN FRONT OF BICYCLISTS PROHIBITED:

(A) Traffic Laws Apply: Every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway within the city shall be subject to all the rules and regulations applicable to the driver of any vehicle, except those provisions which by their very nature can have no application. Whenever authorized signs are erected indicating that no right or left or U-turn is permitted, no person operating a bicycle shall disobey the direction of any such sign, except where such person dismounts from the bicycle to make any such turn, in which event such person shall obey the regulations applicable to pedestrians.

(B) Riding On Bicycles: A person propelling a bicycle shall not ride other than astride a permanent and regular seat attached thereto. No bicycle shall be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped. <u>An adult rider may carry a child securely attached to his person in a backpack or sling or in a child carrier attached to the bicycle.</u>
C) Riding On Roadways And Bicycle Paths: Every person operating a bicycle upon a <u>two-way</u>

roadway which does not contain a bike lane is entitles to use the lane appropriate for the intended destination, staying as close to the right side of the roadway as possible, including the right-hand lane. The bicycle rider shall proceed in the same direction of travel as other vehicles authorized to use that lane. On one-way roadways a bicycle may be operated in any existing lane. shall ride as near to the right hand side of the roadway as practicable, exercising due care when passing a standing vehicle or one proceeding in the same direction. Persons riding bicycles upon a roadway shall not ride more than two (2) abreast except on paths or parts of roadways set aside for the exclusive use of bicycles wherever a usable path for bicycles has been provided adjacent to a roadway, bicycle riders shall use such path and not the roadway.

(D) Emerging From Alley Or Driveway: The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway or building shall, upon approaching a sidewalk or the sidewalk area extending across any alleyway, yield the right of way to all pedestrians approaching on said sidewalk or sidewalk area

and upon entering a roadway shall yield the right of way to all vehicles approaching on said roadway. (E) Clinging To Vehicles: No person riding upon any bicycle shall attach the same or himself to any

(F) Carrying Articles: No person operating a bicycle shall carry any package, bundle or article which

G) Riding On Sidewalks: A bicycle may be operated upon a sidewalk and upon and within a crosswalk, except where prohibited by official traffic control devices, except when the number of pedestrians using the sidewalk renders bicycle riding on the sidewalk unsafe because of the risk of colliding with one of the pedestrians, in which case the bicyclist must dismount and walk the bicycle to an area where safe riding may resume. Any bicycles riding upon a sidewalk where permitted, or across a roadway upon and within a crosswalk, shall yield the right of way to any pedestrian and shall give an audible warning before overtaking and passing such pedestrian. The audible warning may be given by the voice or by a bell or other lawful device capable of giving an audible signal to the person or persons being overtaken and passed. No person shall ride a bicycle upon a sidewalk within a business or industrial district. The police department is authorized to erect signs on any sidewalk or roadway prohibiting the riding of bicycles thereon by any person. Whenever any person is riding a bicycle on the sidewalk in other than the business or industrial district of the city, such person shall yield the right of way to any pedestrian and shall give audible signal before overtaking and passing such pedestrian.

(H) Parking Bicycles: No person shall park a bicycle upon any sidewalk in the city. In the business and industrial section of the city bicycles shall be parked in zones marked for such parking and in such manner as to cause the least obstruction to the movement of vehicles and pedestrians.

Section 7: That Twin Falls City Code §9-2-2 is amended as follows: "9-11-2: BICYCLE EQUIPMENT:

The Principle of Restricted Choice (which, like Occam's Razor, says "Always take the simplest path") applies when an opponent plays an honor and you need to find a touching honor by either playing for the drop or finessing. It says that the missing honor is more likely to be in the other hand because with both honors a defender had a choice of

which to play. Say you are missing four cards including the queen and jack. When you play the ace, one opponent plays an honor. Do you play him for Q-J-doubleton or a singleton honor? With Q-J-doubleton, the defender might have played either honor at his first turn; with a singleton honor, the player had no choice. The odds heavily favor

finessing on the next round, play-

ing him for a singleton honor. The same theory can be applied to situations like the one in today's deal, where North-South bid to their best game — four hearts. The defenders started with three rounds of spades. Declarer won and cashed the heart king and ace. When West played the queen, declarer, using the Principle of Restricted Choice, correctly decided that an original holding of honor-doubleton was

more likely than Q-J-7. Accordingly, declarer played a club to dummy's ace, ruffed a club, took the diamond king, crossed to dummy's diamond ace, and played winning clubs through East. It did not matter when East ruffed in. Whether he ruffed high or low, declarer would lose just one trump trick.

DEAR ABBY: I've worked in newspapers on the East Coast for the past 11 years, and I can tell you that mentioning a divorced spouse's name is totally a matter of individual and family preference. It is becoming more common to see "So-andso" was the former wife and good friend of "the deceased," which is a nice development. It is the right of the surviving family to decide the contents of the obituary. Because some people even include pets among survivors, you would think an ex-spouse would receive the same consideration.

- NAME WITHHELD IN CONNECTICUT **DEAR ABBY:** Genealogy researchers often use obituaries to find the parents or children of families. Here in Iowa, it is common for the obituary to show that a couple married, had children and were divorced. I understand how some children might decide to omit a parent if the divorce wasn't a friendly one. I was left out of my first husband's obituary, but I got over it.

- TWO SIDES TO A STORY

DEAR ABBY: There is a difference between an obituary and a death notice. A death notice is a paid announcement, usually in small type and generally placed by the funeral director. It can include, or exclude, anything the family wishes.

An obituary is an objective news story written by a bylined reporter, and it contains the good, the bad and the ugly — including the names of former spouses, whether separated by death or divorce

DEAR ABBY: Here in the South, an ex-spouse is often listed this way: "Jane Doe of Memphis, Tenn., is the mother of his children." The primary reason is so the children feel their surviving parent, and the years their parents spent together, are acknowledged.

erase the years spent together as a family even though a divorce has occurred. I had been married for 30 years at the time of my divorce, and it is important for me to be listed when my ex passes away – and vice versa. My ex and I discussed this and agreed that the obituary would be written this way: "Also survived by the mother/father of his/her children ... "In my mind, divorced or not, you

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


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
