John Pfeifer has been promoted to publisher of the *Times-News* and the *Elko Daily Free Press* in Elko, Nev., Lee Enterprises Inc. announced Wednesday.

Pfeifer, 53, recently served as

advertising director at the *Times-News* and general manager in Elko. As publisher, he succeeds Brad Hurd, who announced his retirement in September.

"We're fortunate to have such an outstanding publishing executive ready to take the

reins," said Mike Gullidge, Lee vice president. "Brad and I both are exceedingly pleased that John will lead our newspapers and digital products in Twin Falls and Elko."

Pfeifer has previous experience as a publisher for Lee Enterprises in Rhinelander,

Wis., and DeKalb, Ill. After Lee's sale of the *Daily Chronicle* in DeKalb to Shaw Newspapers in 2007, he worked for the new owners as publisher of the *Chronicle News Group*, composed of two dailies and seven weeklies. He previously was advertising

3rd time around

T.F. senior center to bring on third director this year

The Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center has seen a number of changes during the past year. The latest is a change of leadership.

Diane Stevens of Twin Falls will be the new senior center director, effective Monday. Phillip Kottraba resigned at the beginning of November after serving eight difficult months during which the center's Meals On Wheels program almost shut down due to lack of Medicaid payments.

"I was putting in 60 hours for very little pay," Kottraba said. "So I resigned and I'm going to drive a school bus."

Stevens is the executive assistant for the Danny Marona Performing Arts Scholarship Fund and sits on the board of the Twin Falls Farmers Market. She also devotes time to local theater efforts.

"The last couple years, I've done four to five farmers markets a week but I won't be able to

Mistaken identity leads to two arrests

Twin Falls police chased the wrong man Tuesday but came up with a big bust anyway.

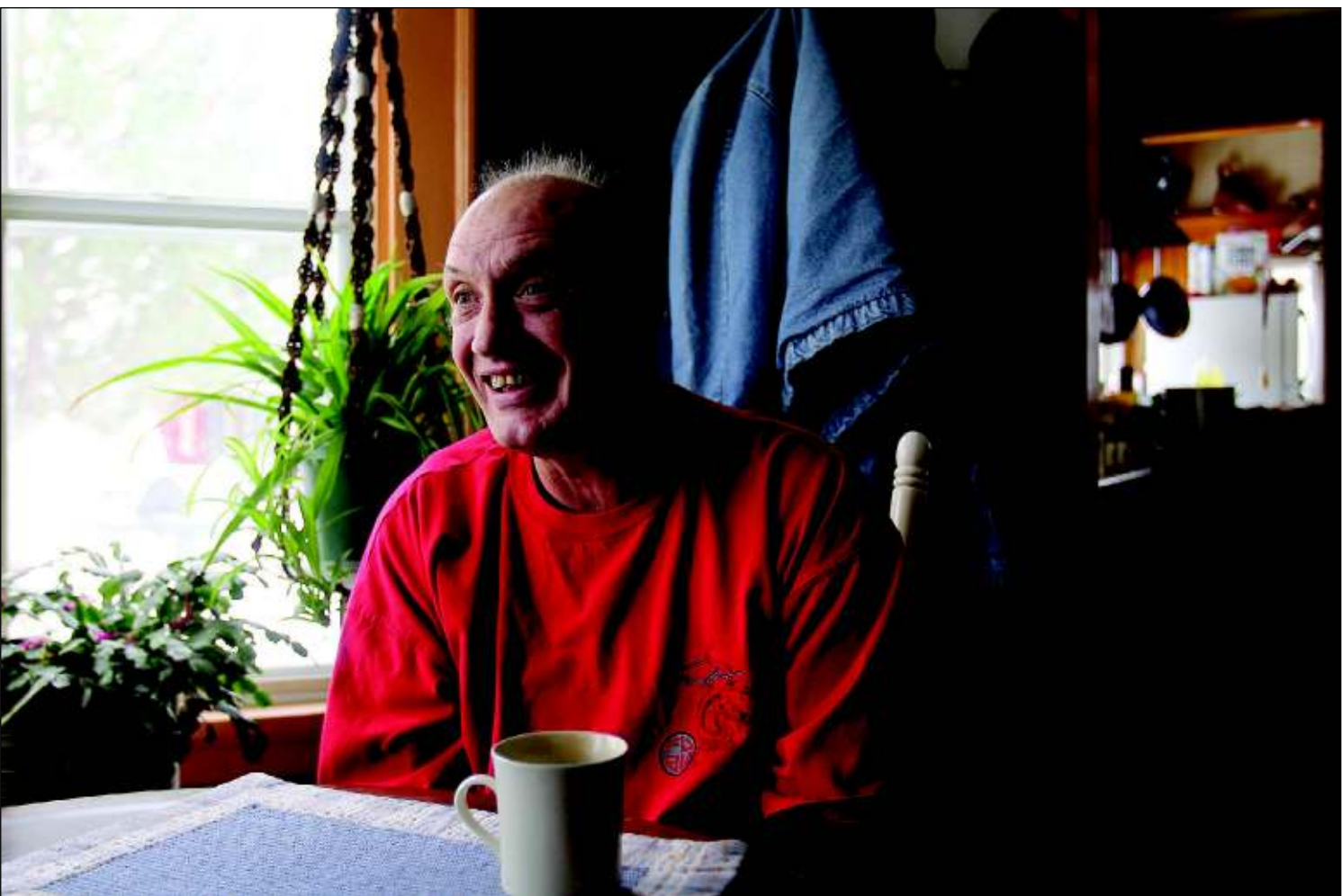
Initially looking for Russell Wageman on Tuesday night, Officer Isaiah Day wound up arresting another man, Patrick VanWert Jr., who had a warrant out for his arrest and some interesting tools in tow.

Twin Falls officers received information from Idaho State Police narcotics detectives that Wageman, 29, who was wanted on a \$20,000 warrant for violating his probation for a possession of a controlled substance conviction, was staying at the Branding Iron Motel at 450 Addison Ave. W.

Day was on surveillance at the location Tuesday night, and while on watch he saw a man matching

Laid-off center manager stays on the job

Rick Kellum sipped his coffee as he stared at the falling snow through the bay window of his home.

In the life he led just three months before, he rarely stared outside. When he did, it was through bars. So it doesn't bother him that he shares a home with 21 other men — he's that much closer to being self-sufficient.

Kellum and his housemates live at the New Hope Transition Center, which takes in men who aren't quite ready to deal with society alone.

Kellum, 48, has been in and out of prison for 27 years. He was released at the end of August and this time is determined not to go back.

"It's all about choices," Kellum said. "I have to be willing to do whatever it takes to stay out here."

"Whatever it takes" can be a tall order for men who have struggled with substance abuse or who have spent most of their lives in prison. Some haven't quite learned the coping skills necessary to negotiate society's expectations. That's where Karen Bach-Cordier, her son Ken

Cordier and other center volunteers come in.

"Ken and Karen ... they've been doing this long enough, they can sense when guys aren't doing well, when they're a little off, and they talk to them," Kellum said.

Bach-Cordier, herself a recovering alcoholic, has managed the center for 10 years. She knows what it takes to stay clean and how people can be tempted to cheat.

CSI thanks two longtime trustees

They were trustees at the College of Southern Idaho for 36 years each, longer than many of the Twin Falls college's students have been alive.

So when CSI bid farewell to LeRoy Craig and Charles Lehrman, there were plenty of accolades. Lehrman and Craig on Wednesday were given a farewell reception at the college that drew more than 200 students, staff members and well-wishers.

Lehrman and Craig have left office following contested elections won in November by new trustees Karl Kleinkopf and Bob Keegan.

"As you leave the board, your compensations will remain the same — zero," CSI President Jerry Beck said, drawing laughs from the audience because trustees are not paid.

Beck thanked Craig and Lehrman for putting student success and quality education first, but also pointed out other details, such as Craig's longstanding insistence on awarding personally signed diplomas — no electronic signatures.

"You will always be part of CSI — the CSI we know and love and the CSI family," Beck said.

The growth of CSI under their tenure, including new buildings and expanded enrollment, were also highlighted in the event, sponsored by the Twin Falls, Jerome and Buhl chambers of commerce.

Mike Mason, vice president of administration, commended Craig's approach on the occasions he has needed to call him to discuss a mistake. Craig, instead of asking how it happened, would focus on how to fix it, Mason said, adding that it's been an honor to work with both men.

Students were part of the farewell, too. The CSI dance team performed, and Craig and Lehrman also received signed balls from the athletic teams.

"It is the students that are always first for them," said Graydon Stanley, dean of students.

Stanley asked everyone who had ever taken a CSI course to stand up. Nearly everyone did, and Stanley told them that figure multiplied represents the thousands who have graduated during Craig and Lehrman's tenure.

Community rallies for Paul family that lost home

PAUL — Mini-Cassia residents are opening their hearts to a family whose Paul home was gutted by fire while it took in Rupert's Christmas lighting celebration on Friday.

Shayla Rippey, 27, and her five children were away from their home when a nighttime electrical fire destroyed it only six days ago. Now, Marcie and James "Red" Crosland — owners of Red's Sports Shop in Paul — are

gathering donations to help the family through a trying holiday season.

"She's a single mother and she's lost everything in her home," Marcie Crosland said of Rippey. "She's only been in the home since August."

Crosland said the Southern Idaho Bros. motorcycle club is spearheading an effort to collect items, while other community members are also rallying to help the family.

Rippey's grandmother, Verdene Page, said Rippey

and her children, aged 7 months to 8 years, are staying with her.

"Yesterday was harder than today," Page said. "But I think things will pull together. I try to let Shayla know it's OK and it wasn't her fault and that we're all here and

nobody got hurt. But one minute it is OK and the next minute she's crying and trying to explain it to the kids."

Page said she babysat the two youngest children on Friday while Rippey and her three oldest children went to the Rupert celebration.

"They got to eat some chili but didn't get to see the lights," Page said.

Firefighters told the family that the fire started at the electrical plug-in inside the front door, Page said, and everything inside the home was destroyed.

the description of Wageman leave the motel in a rented cargo van at around 8 p.m. Believing Wageman was the driver, he followed the van and soon made a traffic stop in the 100 block of Tyler Street.

The driver ditched the van, with the engine still running, and made a break for it, tearing through the eastern section of the president streets in his attempt to escape. Day called for assistance, and half a dozen officers created a perimeter to contain the driver.

They apprehended him in the backyard of a Quincy Street residence less than

20 minutes later.

Turns out that it wasn't Wageman.

Instead, police found VanWert, 42, of Twin Falls, who told police he ran because he was wanted on a \$10,000 warrant for violating his probation for possession of paraphernalia. Police also learned that VanWert's Washington state driver's license was suspended and that he did not possess an Idaho license.

Day returned to the rental van, and during a search of the cab found it full of burglary tools: bolt cutters, binoculars, a 24-inch pry

bar, a flat pry bar, heavy work gloves and a police scanner. The cargo area was empty.

VanWert was arrested and booked into Twin Falls County Jail on possession of paraphernalia, possession of burglary tools, obstructing officers and driving without privileges. He is held on \$1,000 bond for those charges, and he faces a Dec. 21 pretrial.

According to court records, VanWert was charged with grand theft earlier this year, but the case was dropped by the Twin Falls County Prosecutor's

Office. The motion to dismiss stated that the state did not believe it could prove the case beyond a reasonable doubt. VanWert was then accused of stealing a 1998 Pontiac Grand Prix.

By the way, police did find Wageman. He had never left the Branding Iron, where he was arrested later Tuesday night. He was also booked into Twin Falls County Jail. Wageman has prior convictions in Twin Falls County for possession of a controlled substance, burglary and domestic battery.

"Obviously, it was a great job done by all of the officers," Lt. Craig Stotts said. "A good heads-up on their part."

that," Stevens said. "But I'm going to remain on the (farmers market) board."

Stevens had obligations until after the Thanksgiving holiday, so senior center board President Michael Johnson stepped in as interim director.

Johnson said Stevens was one of five finalists for the position in March, when Kotttraba was hired to replace former director

Merideth Humphreys, who took the job in late 2008. Johnson said the board hired Kotttraba because he had nonprofit experience with Idaho Public Broadcasting and financial expertise.

"Phil set the direction for the center, creating greater financial support, because we don't want to be dependent on each paycheck," Johnson said. "When that financial piece is done,

Diane will build a link to the community."

Johnson said he wants Stevens to make the center a warmer, more welcoming place. That may be needed because the center has lost some members. George Fleetwood said he hasn't been to the center since August, when the staff removed a snooker table popular among some patrons in order to rent out a room.

"Since the last director, it's gone downhill," Fleetwood said. "They've run just about everyone out of there."

Johnson said the snooker table would return. He said the weather had caused a delay and he was trying to get an expert to volunteer to erect the table.

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Former Bellevue mayor charged with felony DUI

HAILEY — Former Bellevue Mayor Jon B. Anderson was charged Tuesday with felony driving under the influence in Blaine County.

The charge is for his

alleged third such offense in 10 years in the state.

Anderson pleaded guilty last week to a May misdemeanor DUI in Lincoln County, and had also pleaded guilty to misdemeanor DUI in October 2005. In September 2010 he was arrested for DUI in Blaine

County, but misdemeanor charges against him were dropped by county prosecutors last month as they awaited the outcome of the Lincoln County case.

At the time, Anderson's attorney, Doug Nelson, had hoped to proceed with a guilty plea in Blaine County

to avoid Anderson being charged with the felony. Idaho Code states that a person's third DUI charge within 10 years becomes a felony.

Charges of obstructing or resisting officers and driving without privileges accompanied the original misde-

meanor DUI charge in Blaine County. But those charges are not included in the felony filing.

Anderson, 54, was elected mayor of Bellevue in 2005, two months before his first DUI. He resigned the post in June of this year, citing family and health reasons.

City Council President Chris Koch served as interim mayor until the November elections, when he was elected to the seat after running unopposed.

So she runs a sympathetic-but-tight ship with rules, schedules and curfews. All residents must attend 12-step programs and participate in "government" meetings on Sunday nights.

"Everyone gets to air their grievances," Bach-Cordier said. "They're grown men; they can't run home to mommy, so they need to work it out."

The men have to pay rent, so they are expected to find work. Kellum got a job working at the Stukenholtz Laboratory processing soil samples, but there's no lab work from November to February. So he's looking for something to tide him over.

It's tough going, he said, because he has no transportation and he's competing with his 20 housemates. But he's got hope.

"We're all just struggling to make ends meet but these people are more than generous," Kellum said. "If you have to slide on a half-month's rent, they'll work with you."

Bach-Cordier said it's getting harder for her to make the center's ends meet — in fact, she was laid off in

June. But she still visits the office to try to keep the residents together and make sure the rest of the bills are paid. Volunteers do all the work now.

"I'm anxiously waiting to be hired back," Bach-Cordier said. "It'll probably be only part-time but I don't know when."

The center's only income comes from rent and donations. Bach-Cordier said she's tried to write grants, but has no experience so she gets discouraged. But she doesn't give up, she said, because she loves the center.

That love can get men like Kellum through.

"When you come from

drugs and alcohol all your life, it requires a big step, a change of mind and heart," Kellum said. "Karen and Ken are willing to take that step with you."

Slow response in school hostage crisis raises questions

MARINETTE, Wis. — For about two hours, no one at Marinette High School knew Sam Hengel was holding his social studies class hostage with two pistols and a bag stuffed with a pair of knives and more than 200 rounds of spare ammunition.

Although only Hengel was harmed in the standoff, fatally shooting himself as police stormed the room, students questioned the lag time in the response and whether security should be upgraded as they returned to class Wednesday after a day off.

"They should be aware when things go wrong or something," said sophomore Ricardo Jaimes. "Like, at least have a clue about it."

Hengel started the standoff by firing three shots in front of more than two dozen students in teacher Valerie Burd's class, blasting a hole in the wall and tearing apart a movie projector. But no one else realized anything was wrong until well after the

school day ended, when the principal unlocked the classroom door and found himself looking down the barrel of Hengel's gun.

The incident shook this city of 12,000 people bordering Michigan's Upper Peninsula, and students and parents wondered how Hengel could have gone undetected for so long, especially after he fired three shots. Marinette Police Chief

Jeff Skorik said students walked by the classroom as usual, completely unaware Burd's class was in danger.

"I was just wondering where the cops were and when we were going to get out of this," said Austin Biehl, a sophomore who was held hostage in the classroom.

Hengel's motive remains unknown. Students said he never hinted at what might have been bothering him but didn't threaten any of them and didn't appear to want to shoot anyone.

The sheer number of bullets suggests he was prepared to injure a large number of people, but Skorik declined Wednesday to draw any conclusions. He said investigators don't know whether the guns may have always been kept in the bag with the ammunition or whether Hengel put it all together specifically for the standoff.

Investigators are still piecing together a final report on the incident, but Skorik said no one identified the sounds of the first shots as gunfire.

Burd had a lot of high-

tech video equipment in her room and was playing a movie when Hengel returned to class, which may have dampened the noise, Principal Corry Lambie said. School Board President Scott VandeHei said students outside the classroom may have assumed the sound was a desk turning over.

"From what I've heard, it's not that hard to see how that could happen," VandeHei said.

Lambie acknowledged library staff missed Burd when her seventh-hour class showed up without her but that it wasn't unusual for her classes to visit the library and the students were supervised.

Skorik pointed out Burd's sixth-hour class doesn't move from period to period en masse, so seventh-hour teachers likely would not miss one or two students who fail to show up.

"A student here or there could be skipping or get sick," the police chief said. "That really wouldn't be identified as a serious matter by any particular teacher."

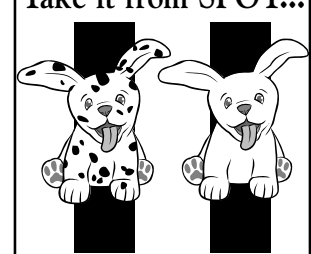
Skorik said law enforcement's response was excellent, noting police held a school shooter exercise in August at Marinette High. Burd issued a statement late Tuesday saying she thought the response was handled "appropriately under the circumstances."

District Superintendent Tim Baneck declined an interview request through his assistant Wednesday. VandeHei said it was too soon to know whether metal

detectors are needed at the school, which serves about 700 students.

"We'll look at everything," VandeHei said. "You have to be careful not to jump too quick in a situation like this. You need to step back and check emotion a little bit"

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House Republicans block child nutrition bill

WASHINGTON — House Republicans have temporarily blocked legislation to feed school meals to thousands more hungry children.

Republicans used a procedural maneuver Wednesday to try to amend the \$4.5 billion bill, which would give more needy children the opportunity to eat free lunches at school and make those lunches healthier. First lady Michelle Obama has

lobbied for the bill as part of her "Let's Move" campaign to combat childhood obesity.

House Democrats said the GOP amendment, which would have required background checks for child care workers, was an effort to kill the bill and delayed a final vote on the legislation rather than vote on the amendment.

Because the nutrition bill is identical to legislation passed by the Senate in August, passage would send it to the White House for President Barack Obama's signature. If

the bill were amended, it would be sent back to the Senate with little time left in the legislative session.

House Majority Leader Steny Hoyer, D-Md. said the House would hold separate votes on Thursday on the amendment and the bill.

Republicans say the nutrition bill is too costly and an example of government overreach.

"It's not about making our children healthy and active," said Rep. John Kline, R-Minn., the top Republican on

the House Education and Labor Committee. "We all want to see our children healthy and active. This is about spending and the role of government and the size of government — a debate about whether we're listening to our constituents or not."

The legislation would give the federal government the power to decide what kinds of foods could be sold and what ingredients may be limited in school lunch lines and vending machines.

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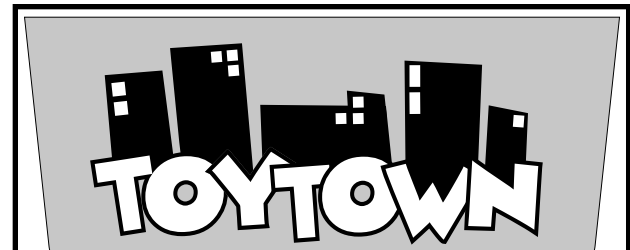

At long last, a brick through the window of cottage-site rents

Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden failed Wednesday in his attempt to persuade the Idaho Supreme Court to force the state Land Board to adjust rents on state-owned cabin sites — rents that Wasden maintains violate the Idaho Constitution by not securing the maximum long-term return for the beneficiaries of the state’s endowment lands, the largest of which is Idaho’s public schools.

But he lost on a technicality — the high court said Wasden had to take up the issue with a district court first. Yet there’s no doubt from the remarks of the justices who voted against the attorney general and from the ringing dissent by Justice Roger Burdick that the state’s venerable system of sweet-heart deals for cabin-site lease-holders is in trouble.

“The facts in this case are not in dispute,” wrote Burdick, a former Fifth District judge. “The record clearly demonstrates that the Land Board is exceeding its discretion in leasing the cottage sites for less than market value and failing to obtain the maximum long-term financial return for the beneficiaries, which is a violation of both (Idaho Code) and the Idaho Constitution.”

Our view:

The Idaho Supreme Court on Wednesday essentially invited Attorney General Lawrence Wasden to pursue his attempt to get a fair rate of return from leases on Idaho endowment lands.

At long last.

For a century, the Land Board has tiptoed around this issue, fearful of offending politically connected lease-holders at Payette Lake and Priest Lake.

In its ruling Wednesday, justices essentially agreed with Wasden that the rents are too low and illegally favor current leaseholders at the expense of public schools, higher education and State Hospital South.

The 355 cottage sites at Priest Lake are on public school endowment lands. There are 167 cottage sites at Payette Lake. Of these cottage sites, two are on public school endowment

lands, 56 on normal school endowment lands and 109 on state hospital endowment lands.

“These leases were written to favor the current renters at the expense of public schools and other endowment beneficiaries,” Wasden told the *Times-News* editorial board earlier this year. “If allowed to take effect, the new leases will deprive the beneficiaries of \$6 million to \$10 million annually.”

The Land Board — on which Wasden serves along with Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter, Secretary of State Ben Yursa, Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna and state Controller Donna Jones — has a constitutional duty to manage the lands to “secure the maximum long-term financial return to the (trust beneficiaries)” It is also required by law to “insure that each leased lot generates market rent throughout the duration of the lease,” he said.

The attorney general — who said Wednesday he’ll refile the suit in district court — wants the Land Board prohibited from entering into new leases until the board adopts rates that fulfill those requirements.

In a year in which the Legislature cut \$128 million from public school spending and \$32 million from higher education, wouldn’t that extra endowment money come in handy now?

Cottage-site rents don’t reflect market values because many of the people who hold them are rich and influential. Not even the toughest-minded Idaho governors in recent history — Phil Batt, Cecil Andrus and Robert Smylie — have been able to reform the system.

Thank goodness Wasden has the political courage to tackle this unfair system that’s cheating Idaho kids.

The rantings of an old-fashioned anarchist

Julian Assange, the founder of WikiLeaks, had moved 37 times by the time he reached his 14th birthday. His mother didn’t enroll him in the local schools because, as Raffi Khatchadourian wrote in a *New Yorker* profile, she feared “that formal education would inculcate an unhealthy respect for authority.”

She needn’t have worried. As a young computer hacker, he formed a group called International Subversives. As an adult, he wrote “Conspiracy as Governance,” a pseudo-intellectual online diatribe. He talks of vast “patronage networks” that constrain the human spirit.

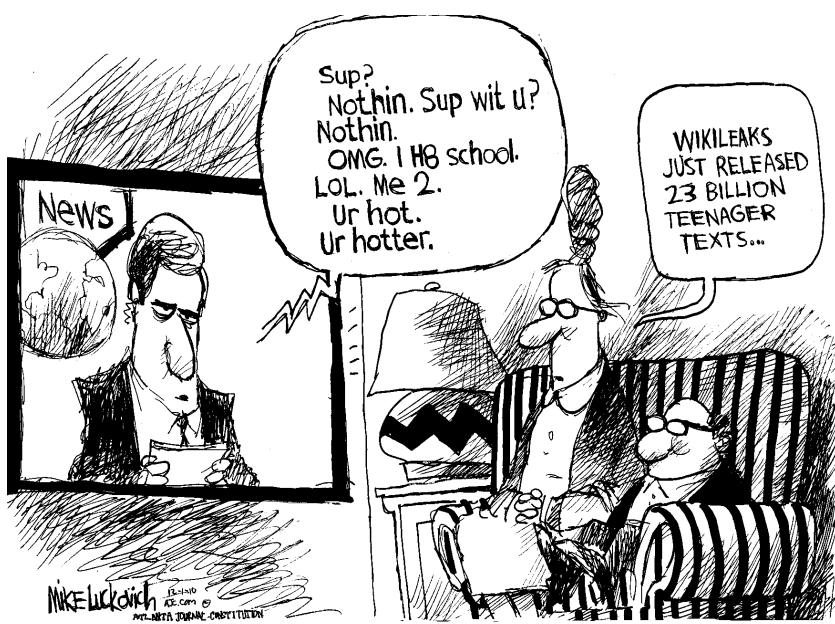
Far from respecting authority, Assange seems to be an old-fashioned anarchist who believes that all ruling institutions are corrupt and public pronouncements are lies.

For someone with his mind-set, the decision to expose secrets is easy. If the hidden world is suspect, then everything should be revealed. As *The New Yorker* reported, WikiLeaks has published technical details about an Army device designed to prevent roadside bombs from detonating. It posted soldiers’ Social Security numbers. This week, the group celebrated the release of internal State Department documents with a triumphalist statement claiming that the documents expose the corruption, hypocrisy and venality of U.S. diplomats.

For him, it’s easy. But for everyone else, it’s hard. My colleagues on the news side of this newspaper do not share Assange’s mentality.

As journalists, they have a professional obligation to share information that might help people make informed decisions. That means asking questions like: How does the U.S. government lobby allies? What is the real nature of our relationship with Pakistani intelligence? At the same time, as humans and citizens, my colleagues know they have a moral obligation not to endanger lives or national security.

The New York Times has thus erected a series of filters between the



250,000 raw documents that WikiLeaks obtained and complete public exposure. The paper has released only a tiny percentage of the cables. Information that might endanger informants has been redacted. Specific cables have been put into context with broader reporting.

Yet it might be useful to consider one more filter. Consider it the World Order filter. The fact that we live our lives amid order and not chaos is the great achievement of civilization. This order should not be taken for granted.

This order is tenuously maintained by brave soldiers but also by talkative leaders and diplomats. Every second of every day, leaders and diplomats are engaged in a never-ending conversation. The leaked cables reveal this conversation. They show diplomats seeking information, cajoling each other and engaging in faux-friendships and petty hypocrisies as they seek to avoid global disasters.

Despite the imaginings of people like Assange, the conversation revealed in the cables is not devious and nefarious. The private conversation is similar to the public conversation, except maybe more admirable. Israeli and Arab diplomats can be seen reacting sympathetically and realistically toward one another. The Americans in the cables are generally savvy and honest. Iran’s neighbors are properly alarmed and reaching out.

This conversation, like all conversations, is built on relationships. The quality of the conversation is deter-

mined by the level of trust.

The quality of the conversation is damaged by exposure, just as our relationships with our neighbors would be damaged if every private assessment were brought to the light of day. We’ve seen what happens when conversations deteriorate, and it’s ugly.

The WikiLeaks dump will probably damage the global conversation. Nations will be less likely to share with the U.S. Agencies will be tempted to return to the pre-9/11 silos. World leaders will get their backs up when they read what is said about them. Cooperation against Iran may be harder to maintain because Arab leaders feel exposed and boxed in. This fragile conversation is under threat. It’s under threat from a Gresham’s Law effect, in which the level of public exposure is determined by the biggest leaker and the biggest traitor.

It should be possible to erect a filter that protects not only lives and operations but also international relationships. It should be possible to do articles on specific revelations — Is the U.S. using diplomats to spy on the U.N.? What missile technology did North Korea give to Iran? — without unveiling in a wholesale manner the nuts and bolts of the diplomatic enterprise. We depend on those human conversations for the limited order we enjoy every day.

Society should invest in living, not dying

Which do you think is less expensive, not to mention preferable: a cure for cancer, Alzheimer’s disease and diabetes, or caring for people with these diseases? Wouldn’t it be better medical and public policy to direct more resources toward finding a cure for diseases that cost a lot to treat than to rely on a government insurance program, such as Obamacare, which seeks mainly to help pay the bills for people after they become ill?

Isn’t the answer obvious? Apparently not to many politicians trapped in an old paradigm that focuses too much on hospitals, doctors and medicines and too little on medical research and preventive care so that people will not need hospitals, doctors or medicines.

The pursuit of cures as a priority is a subject that has been taken up by my colleague James Pinkerton in his forthcoming book entitled *Serious Medicine Strategy* and on his blog at www.seriousmedicinestrategy.org.

It’s not that we are failing to fund research to cure dis-

eases that end lives too early. Rather, it is a failure of political leadership to make research a priority in their speeches and policies. Think back more than 50 years ago to when the political and medical communities united and led the public toward a cure for polio and the elimination of the need for “iron lungs.” This Herculean effort was the medical equivalent of going to the moon.

Why can’t we create a united front to find cures for diabetes, Alzheimer’s, cancer and other ailments? Pinkerton believes it’s because of “the baneful influence of the Food and Drug Administration and the trial lawyers. If the government would protect the ability of entrepreneurs and scientists to create products without getting sued into oblivion, capital would come pouring into the pharma sector, not only

from American investors, but from investors around the world.” That’s because, he notes, people in Europe and Asia now suffer from the same diseases as Americans.

Republicans, especially, should pick up on this strategy of cures before care. Instead, most Republicans are singularly focused on repealing the president’s health care “reform” law. It should be repealed, or at least experience an extreme makeover, but repealing that law doesn’t cure anyone of anything. And here’s the double benefit that Obamacare claims for itself, which can never materialize. Finding cures for diseases helps people live healthier lives, and it’s cost efficient. Look at the money saved from no longer having to treat victims of polio, smallpox and tuberculosis. Imagine the savings when a cure is eventually found for cancer. Plus, the retirement age could be easily raised as older people work longer and live more vigorous, productive (and tax-generating) lives.

What’s not to like about any of this? Republican

presidential candidates in 2012 — and a Republican president should the GOP win that election — could change the direction and content of the entire health care debate, if they fashioned a strategy for going to the “medical moon” by a certain and attainable date. We are close to a cure for some diseases, but far from a cure for others. Let’s begin with those closest to a cure.

Ask yourself: would you rather be healthy and fit and live a long life, or be taken care of in your illness by a government health system that sees you as a burden and is constantly trying to reduce care and lower costs? Ask the English, who are currently experiencing the downside to poor care.

The problem is that once a nation has made a wrong turn, it is difficult if not impossible to reverse course. America still has time to make the right choice and move in the direction of cures. Now all we need is the political leadership to point the way.

The politics of avoiding a simple question

America's budget problem boils down to a simple question: How much will we let programs for the elderly displace other government functions — national defense, education, transportation and many others — and raise taxes to levels that would, almost certainly, reduce economic growth? What's depressing is that this question has been obvious for decades but our political leaders have consistently evaded it. This includes and indicts Democrats, Republicans, conservatives, liberals and every president since Jimmy Carter, particularly Bill Clinton and George W. Bush, who clearly understood the problem.

Our political culture prefers delusion to candor. Liberals would solve the budget problem by taxing the rich and cutting defense. Think again. The richest 5 percent already pay about 45 percent of federal taxes; they may pay more but not enough to balance the budget. Defense spending constitutes a fifth of federal spending; projected deficits

over the next decade are similar. We won't shut the Pentagon. Republicans and tea partiers think that eliminating "wasteful spending" would allow more tax cuts. Dream on. The major spending programs, Social Security and Medicare, are wildly popular with roughly 50 million beneficiaries.

Now come Erskine Bowles and Alan Simpson, co-chairmen of the National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform, with a plan. It would freeze government salaries for three years, increase the gasoline tax by 15 cents a gallon, and slowly raise Social Security's eligibility ages for early retirement and full benefits. These ages are now 62 and 66; they would go to 64 and 69 around 2075. Sensibly, changes wouldn't start until 2012 to avoid threatening the economic recovery.

Unfortunately, the plan has much wishful thinking. It would cap federal spending at 22 percent of the economy (gross domestic product) and taxes at 21 percent of GDP. These targets represent modest increases over averages for 1970 to 2009: 20.7 percent of GDP for spending; 18.1 percent for taxes. But maintaining the targets assumes that health care costs — the largest factor expanding spending — slow significantly. Bowles-Simpson has few proposals to make that happen.

We need something more powerful: budget changes that redefine government to reflect today's social and economic realities. Longer life expectancies justify raising eligibility ages for Social

Security faster than Bowles-Simpson suggests. Wealthier retirees should pay more for Medicare. Somehow we need to control health spending. We should eliminate programs that are ineffective or serve narrow interests: farm subsidies, Amtrak and others.

To understand our predicament, glance at the table above (which I've used before). It shows federal taxes and spending as a share of GDP for 2006 (the last "normal" year before the slump) and projections for 2020 and 2035. The Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid forecasts — reflecting current benefits — come from the Congressional Budget Office. Other spending categories are held constant as

a share of GDP. There's no room for big emergencies or new programs. Though crude, the resulting numbers capture the mounting pressures.

It's scary. From 2006 to 2035, federal spending goes from 20 percent of GDP to almost 29 percent. Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid (including Obamacare) account for all the increase. The reasons: More elderly people and climbing health costs. In 2035, the 65-plus population will be 93 percent larger than in 2010. Paying for bigger government would require a tax increase of about 50 percent. If we want to avoid a tax increase — while honoring existing Social Security and health care benefits — we'd have to cut all other programs by about 80 percent. (And these figures are likely optimistic, because interest on government debt is assumed to remain low.)

The problem is not reducing the deficit. It is controlling spending in a way that seems socially just, economically sensible and politically tolerable. If we are

honest — neither party has been — it means asking how much we allow benefits for the old to burden the young through higher taxes, lower public services, slower economic growth and weakened national security.

Any genuine debate must be wrenching because government has promised more than it can realistically deliver, and lower benefits or higher taxes will leave many feeling (justifiably) mistreated. No one would be happy. Liberals would have to accept sizable benefit cuts; conservatives, tax increases.

Recognizing this logic, America's leaders have averted their eyes and held their tongues. President Obama continues this inglorious avoidance. His Obamacare actually made matters worse by increasing the least controllable spending. The initial reception to Bowles-Simpson has been predictably tepid. But even if it passed Congress, it would be only a first step.

... cut \$340 million? Get real

Are Idahoans hoping for the best — or are they hopelessly out of touch with reality? It's tough to tell.

Idahoans are pretty clear that they don't want further cuts to education or Medicaid. A recent survey, conducted by the Republican polling firm Moore Information, pegged the opposition at 82 percent and 76 percent, respectively.

But in that same poll of registered voters, Idahoans were nearly as dead set against sales or income tax increases — 65 percent opposition, in both cases.

Sounds great.

But here's the reality check.

- Idaho is staring at a potential 2011-12 shortfall of \$340 million.

- That shortfall represents 14 percent of the budget.

- During the 2010 legislative session, the public schools' budget took a 7.5 percent cut. The cut for higher education was 11.3 percent.

- Gov. Butch Otter and the Legislature made those unprecedented cuts after spending most of the state's budget reserves. This was a last-ditch move, not unlike depleting the savings account to keep up with the mortgage.

Now, the state's piggy banks are almost empty. So, the state needs to cut its budgets to balance the books — or find an additional, ongoing source of money.

- What kind of a tax increase? Consider this, just for the sake of context.

Idaho's current 6 percent sales tax is expected to generate \$976.5 million this year. Idaho could tack another 2 cents onto the sales tax, and still fall short

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of erasing its shortfall.

- Idahoans didn't rule out tax increases. The Moore Information survey found 71 percent support for increasing "sin" taxes on alcohol and tobacco. But these tax increases wouldn't fill much of a \$340 million hole. Especially if the money is applied to preventive programs; 83 percent of respondents favored using new tobacco taxes for Medicaid, or programs that help tobacco users or combat teenage tobacco use. Worthy programs, of course — but dollars that go into these programs are unavailable for education, which accounts for nearly two-thirds of the state's general fund budget.

Idaho's fiscal crisis is worse than many Idahoans seem to think. That's the only conclusion we can derive from the Moore Information survey conducted Oct. 17-18, barely two weeks before Election Day. Idahoans spoke loud and clear. Don't cut education and Medicaid. Don't raise sales or income taxes.

But that's unrealistic. It's quite possible, by the end of the 2011 session, that lawmakers will cobble together some combination of budget cuts and tax increases. Schools and state agencies probably can't absorb a \$340 million budget cut. The state's sluggish economy cannot sustain a \$340 million tax increase.

The way the state — and its elected officials — choose to reconcile these severe budget realities will directly affect schoolkids, businesses and taxpayers for 2011 and beyond. Every legislative session is important. This next one will be crucial. Defining. Pivotal. And no, those aren't overstatements.

If Idahoans don't get informed and involved in the discussion — starting now, in the seven weeks before the 2011 Legislature convenes — they won't have much room to second-guess the outcomes. At this point, lawmakers are left to interpret the people's mixed message as best as they can. Or, looking at it more cynically, lawmakers are free to pick and choose the talking point that fits their preconceptions.

Yes, Idahoans, it is time to engage. The first step in engagement is understanding the problem, in all its harsh detail. In that regard, there's a lot of work to do.



... taxing tobacco right off the shelves

We are going to go out on a limb here and say tobacco is bad for you no matter how it is consumed.

All studies worth their scientific salt conclude tobacco use can cause health problems, most of which can lead to a premature death.

Billions have been spent on educating users — and nonusers — about the hazards of tobacco use, yet millions become addicted each year starting a habit that, in some cases, will literally last a lifetime.

Idaho officials have the

opportunity to do something positive that could keep many of the state's youth away from tobacco — tax it off the shelves.

Currently, Idaho has one of the lowest state taxes on cigarettes at 57-cents a pack. That needs to be raised a lot higher ...

Health officials have every right to be concerned about tobacco-use rates. Some have gone so far to suggest an outright ban on tobacco products as a means to cut its use. Unfortunately that won't work as we have seen with our bout with prohibition. Alcohol never went away, it just required a little more creativity to get it.

The answer was to regulate it and tax it. More than half the price of a fifth of whiskey is tax.

Tobacco should be controlled the same way — by hitting the consumer in the pocketbook.

A 10 percent increase of Idaho's cigarette tax would cut youth smoking by 6.5 percent said Adrean Casper, a lobbyist with the American Heart Association. States that have hiked their taxes have seen similar drops in smoking rates.

However, legislation to get that 10 percent will face an uphill battle in the Legislature dominated by Republicans with a no-

new-taxes mind-set. Don't any of them have a no-new-lung-cancers mind-set?

Those we send to Boise may do well to consider the state faces a projected budget deficit of up to \$350 million for fiscal year 2012.

Idaho also faces a potential shortfall of \$171 million in its Medicaid program. It is estimated smoking costs the state about \$319 annually, with about \$83 million coming from Medicaid. Currently the state raises only \$53 million from tobacco taxes.

The math alone should be enough to get the GOP on board the tax train when the smoke clears from the back room.

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State high court throws out Wasden's suit on cabin sites

BOISE — Attorney General Lawrence Wasden plans to challenge a new rental policy for hundreds of state-owned lake shore lots in district court after the Idaho Supreme Court tossed out his case Wednesday.

Wasden filed a lawsuit in March that sought to block the state from using a new formula approved by the Idaho Land Board to raise rents paid by owners of cabins and vacation homes built on the lots.

"The approved plan is flawed because the rent is too low," Wasden said at the time. "The leases were written to favor the current renters at the expense of public schools and other endowment beneficiaries."

The land board filed a motion to dismiss the lawsuit in April, arguing that Wasden had failed to demonstrate the need for the Idaho Supreme Court to grant his request for a writ of prohibition.

The Idaho Supreme Court heard oral arguments in the case in June and nearly seven months later, has granted the motion to dismiss in a 3-2 opinion. Justices Roger

Burdick and Warren E. Jones dissented.

The high court did not dispute Wasden's argument, and found that statements from three of the five land board members indicate that the cabin site leases do not achieve the level of market rent.

But the decision, authored by Justice Joel Horton, found the high court could not grant Wasden's request to stop implementation of the new formula when there were other speedy and adequate remedies for him to pursue in the lower courts. Chief Justice Daniel Eismann and Justice Pro Tem Linda Copple Trout concurred.

The justices determined Idaho's district court system was in a much better position to decide the question at the heart of Wasden's case: Is the Idaho Land Board in violation of the state constitution?

"I plan to follow the Supreme Court's advice and proceed to district court in order to vindicate the constitutional rights of Idaho school children and the other beneficiaries of the endowment trusts," Wasden said in a statement Wednesday after justices published their opinion.

Wasden claims the policy approved by the land

board sets rents at below-market value and in violation of the state constitution, which requires the land to be managed for maximum profit over time.

The attorney general is one of two board members who voted against the new rent policy, which would raise the amounts that tenants pay by 9 percent in 2011 and by 54 percent over the next five years.

With implementation of new rents slated for January, Wasden said he went to the state high court in hopes of a quick answer to his question over the constitutionality of the land board's decision.

And two justices felt Wasden had made his case, and said the Supreme Court should have sided with him.

Justice Burdick wrote the dissenting opinion in the Idaho Supreme Court ruling and said the land board had clearly exceeded its discretion and violated the state constitution "in leasing the cottage sites for less than market value and failing to obtain the maximum long-term financial return for the beneficiaries."

Burdick and Jones argued there was no other speedy and adequate remedy available for Wasden to pursue.

Report: Idaho's emergency response system puts patients' lives at risk

BOISE (AP) — A jumble of agencies that respond to emergency medical calls in Idaho but have no system-wide structure or single authority could be jeopardizing the health of patients, a state report released Tuesday says.

The Office of Performance Evaluations, the Idaho Legislature's independent, nonpartisan evaluation office, released the report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee.

The committee in turn is recommending that lawmakers in the approaching session step in to fix the problem.

"Someone has to be in charge," said Sen. Edgar

Malepeai, D-Pocatello.

Senate Health and Welfare Chairwoman Patti Anne Lodge, R-Huston, last year put forward a bill to have the state step in, but it met resistance from some lawmakers and emergency responder groups.

Lodge then asked for the study so lawmakers in the approaching session could have a better understanding of the problems.

The report said some 200 agencies in Idaho respond to 911 calls, including counties, cities, fire and ambulance districts, and nonprofit and private companies.

The report said that has created a fragmented response with duplication and gaps, as well as a lack of

clarity about the jurisdiction of emergency responders.

"In the absence of a well-functioning and accountable system, the quality of patient care may be at risk," the report said.

Analysts also cited in the report vague and outdated state laws and disagreements among emergency responder groups as a reason for Idaho lawmakers to step in.

The report recommends that the lawmakers increase the role of the Department of Health and Welfare's EMS Bureau, create a governing authority and medical director to coordinate local systems, and establish local systems using county boundaries.

Victim of gunshot left on couch

POCATELLO — Court records say two men who were in an apartment when a Pocatello man was shot in the head covered him with a blanket and left.

The Idaho State Journal reported 33-year-old Daniel Grant Olsen is charged with second-degree murder in the shooting death of 45-year-old Gregory Parent. Olsen made an initial court appearance Monday.

Court records say two acquaintances in Parent's apartment heard the shooting and found Parent lying on the couch. One man covered Parent with a blanket and both men left.

One of the men called his employer and the employer contacted authorities. Law enforcement officers found Parent in his residence at about 3 p.m. Saturday. Parent died that evening at the hospital.

Both men identified Olsen as the shooter. He was arrested Sunday morning.

Army reserve unit to mobilize

BOISE — More than 100 members of an Army reserve unit based at Gowen Field in southwestern Idaho are preparing for a yearlong deployment to Iraq.

The 391st Engineer Company will mobilize today and travel from Boise to Fort McCoy in Wisconsin for an additional five weeks of training before they depart to Iraq next year.

About 90 percent of the soldiers who will leave Gowen Field as part of the deployment are from Idaho.

In Iraq, the unit is expected to help detect and neutralize explosive materials.

More megaloads arrive at port

LEWISTON — Another 12 Korean-manufactured modules have arrived in the Port of Lewiston, bringing the number of megaloads at the port awaiting shipment on northern Idaho's scenic U.S. Highway 12 corridor to 38.

Thirty-four belong to ExxonMobil Corp., which is seeking permits to haul some 200 megaloads through Idaho into Montana and north to the Kearsarge Oil Sands in Alberta, Canada.

Four of the megaloads belong to ConocoPhillips and are intended for a refinery in Billings, Mont.

Legal challenges are preventing ConocoPhillips from moving its four megaloads through Idaho on the scenic highway.

Last week an administrative hearing judge ruled that opponents of the oil company's plan to haul

four massive loads of refinery equipment should be allowed to intervene and challenge the state's decision to grant travel permits.

Boise-based Advocates for the West recently submitted an amended petition to intervene, adding 10 new names to the original list of three.

A hearing is planned Dec. 8 and 9 in Boise during which ConocoPhillips, the Idaho Transportation Department and opponents of the megaloads will have an opportunity to speak.

"The plan ensures the safe transport of the refinery equipment, provides enhanced access to emergency medical services, and minimizes inconvenience to the traveling public," ConocoPhillips said in a statement Wednesday.

The company says delays have already cost it \$2.5 million. But that total could reach \$40 million if the drums don't arrive in Billings by next spring, leading to a possible unplanned work stoppage at a key gasoline producer for Idaho, Montana and other Rocky Mountain states.

New case of brucellosis found

CHEYENNE — State livestock officials are investigating a second confirmed case of brucellosis in Park County and a possible new case in Sublette County.

Wyoming Assistant State Veterinarian Bob Meyer said Wednesday the new case in Park County involves a herd of 1,400 bison. The state is working with the owner to test the entire herd. Three surrounding cattle herds also are being tested, even though the bison are fenced in, Meyer said.

It's suspected that elk may have been the source of the disease in the bison, he said.

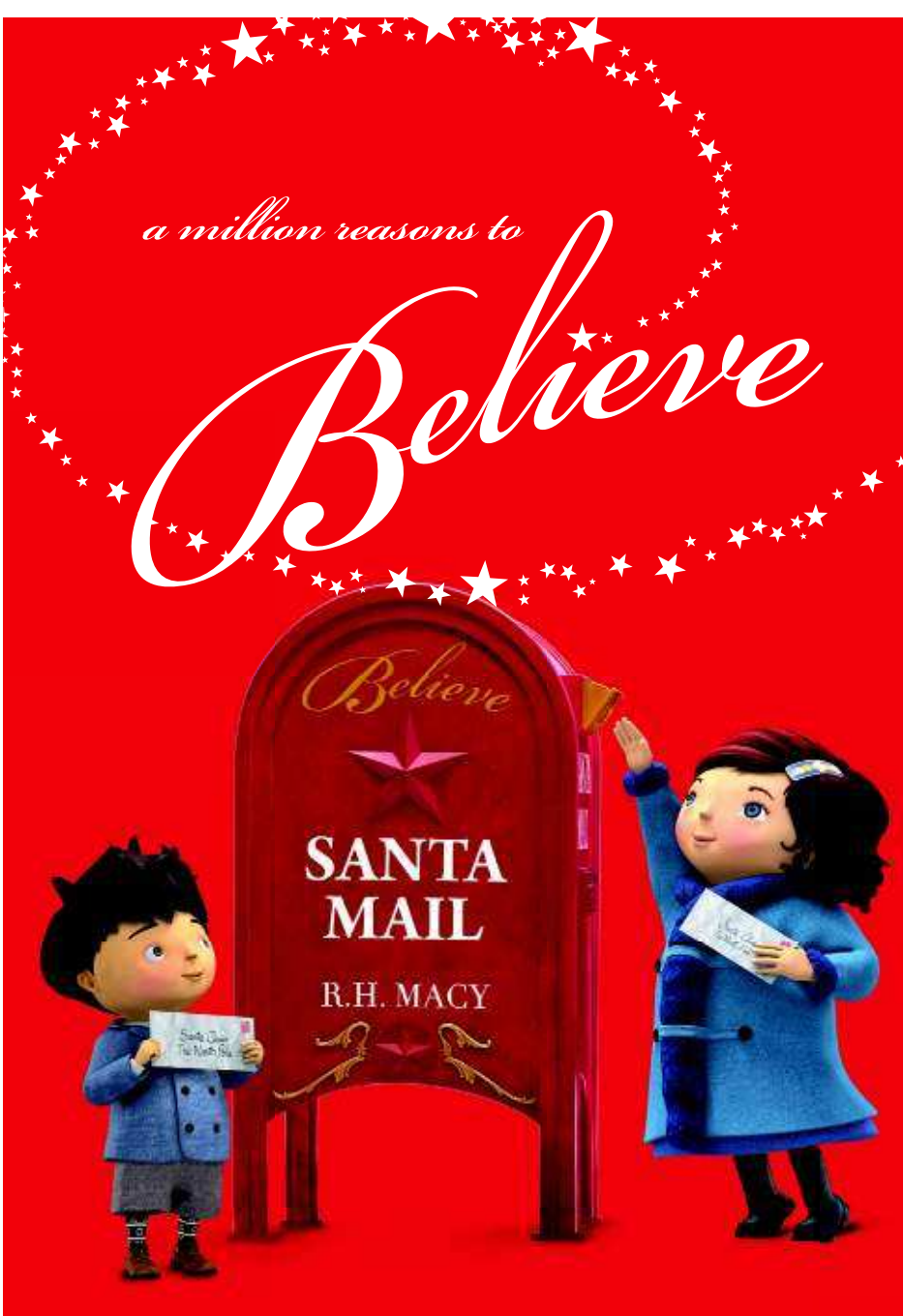
"We want to make sure that any of the surrounding herds right around there didn't get the same exposures to the elk because the elk can jump over fences both ways," Meyer said.

The new case is not related to an earlier case discovered in late October in a separate cattle herd in Park County, located in northwest Wyoming. The state tested thousands of cattle in 12 herds in the first case and found no additional infections.

However, preliminary tests indicate possible brucellosis in one cow that was being put up for sale in Sublette County, which is in west-central Wyoming, Meyer said. More tests are being done to confirm the initial findings and more will be known sometime next week, he said.

The herd in question numbers about 650 head and there are four or five other cattle herds nearby, Meyer said.

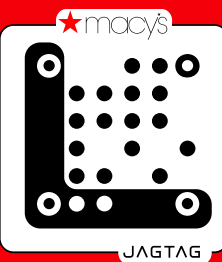


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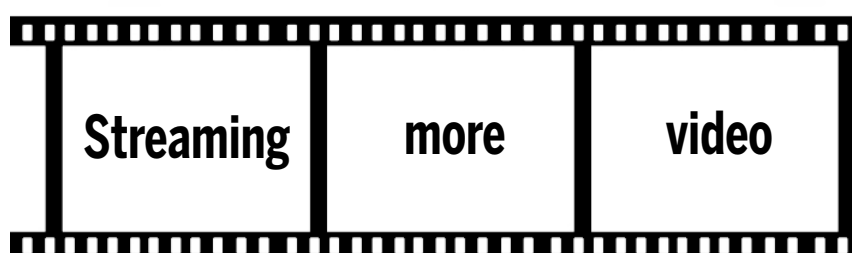

Federal judge orders stecklings destroyed

Ruling adds uncertainty to 2012 beet seed supply

A federal judge has ordered genetically modified sugar beet stecklings be destroyed.

The decision, released late Tuesday, raises questions about the 2012 seed supply and may have implications for rules the U.S.

Department of Agriculture has proposed for the 2011 growing season.

Stecklings are root stock planted in the fall, uprooted during the winter and then replanted to produce seed the following season.

USDA's Animal Plant Health Inspection Service issued permits to four seed companies to plant beet

stecklings in early September.

The plantings came three weeks after District Judge Jeffrey S. White vacated the USDA's 2005 decision that deregulated Roundup Ready sugar beet seed.

Within three days of the USDA's announcement that it had issued the permits, plaintiffs in the case had

filed a lawsuit and shut down planting again. The judge's order pertains only to the beets planted during that short window. Any stecklings bred to tolerate the popular herbicide that were planted before White's

August 13th decision that re-regulated the industry do not have to be destroyed.

Hundreds of acres of stecklings could be destroyed, according to the plaintiffs.

USDA and industry representatives told the judge they needed the emergency permits to plant the stecklings so that the root stock would be mature enough to be uprooted, transported and replanted in a timely manner.

However, White wrote in the 15-page decision that it appears that defendants were merely seeking to avoid the impact of the August 13 decision. He also did not accept their argument that the stecklings may be destroyed anyway; if the draft Environmental Impact Statement released by USDA in early November ultimately prohibits the planting of

Holidays about survival as jobless benefits end

Shawn Slonsky's children know by now not to give him Christmas lists filled with the latest gizmos. The 44-year-old union electrician is one of nearly 2 million Americans whose extended unemployment benefits will run out this month, making the holiday season less about celebration than survival.

"We'll put up decorations, but we just don't have the money for a Christmas tree," Slonsky said.

Benefits that had been extended up to 99 weeks started running out Wednesday. Unless Congress approves a longer extension, the Labor Department estimates about 2 million people will be cut off by Christmas.

Support groups for the so-called 99ers have sprung up online, offering chances to vent along with tips on resumes and job interviews. Advocacy groups such as the National Employment Law Project have turned their plight into a rallying cry for Congress to extend jobless benefits.

Things used to be different for Slonsky, who lives in Massillon, Ohio. Before work dried up, he earned about \$100,000 a year. He and his wife lived in a three-bedroom house where deer meandered through the backyard.

Then they lost their jobs. Their house went into foreclosure and they had to move in with his 73-year-old father. Now, Slonsky is dreading the holidays as his 99 weeks run out.

"It's hard to be in a jovial mood all the time when you've got this storm cloud hanging over your head," he said.

The average weekly unemployment benefit in the U.S. is \$302.90, though it varies widely depending on how states calculate the payment. Because of supplemental state programs and other factors, it's hard to know for sure who will lose their benefits at any given time.

Congressional opponents of extending the benefits beyond this month say fiscal responsibility should come first. Republicans in the House and Senate, along with a handful of conservative Democrats, say they're open to extending bene-

Economy expected to end 2010 on positive note

WASHINGTON— The U.S. economy is showing new life in the final months of the year.

Factories are busier, construction spending is up, and auto sales are rising. And on Wednesday the stock market had its best day since September after a report that the private sector hired the most workers in three years.

"The economy is starting to show better overall momentum," said Brian Bethune, an economist at IHS Global Insight. "There's a steady improvement in the overall tone."

The Dow Jones industrial average rose more than 249 points. It closed at 11,255, its best finish since Sept. 1 and about 200 points shy of its highest close since the financial meltdown in the fall of 2008.

The Institute for Supply Management said its index of manufacturing activity came in at 56.6 for November. Any reading above 50 indicates growth. The

October figure was 56.9. At the depths of the recession, it was closer to 30.

And a new survey by the Federal Reserve finds that almost all of the nation — 10 of its 12 regions — is growing economically. Only two regions, those around Philadelphia and St. Louis, report that business conditions are mixed.

Automakers are behind much of the growth in manufacturing. Ford, General Motors and Chrysler all reported double-digit sales increases for November. The news is particularly welcome for GM, which just returned as a public company.

The positive economic news comes on top of other signs that Americans are increasingly willing to spend money, raising hopes for the holiday shopping season. Measures of spending, consumer

confidence and personal incomes are all up.

Research firm comScore Inc. said people spent more than \$1 billion online on the Monday after Thanksgiving, 16 percent more than last year and the first time so-called Cyber Monday has ever hit that milestone.

Investors were mostly responding to strong manufacturing data out of China and a report showing that small U.S. companies hired the most workers in three years. ADP Employer Services said employment at private companies jumped by 93,000 in November, the largest increase since November 2007 — right before the recession began.

Small businesses, which have struggled to get credit since the recession, had the biggest gains.

While some economists cautioned against reading too much

into the ADP report because it has frequently diverged from the government's employment figures, it was enough to raise economists' hopes that the Labor Department's November jobs report, due Friday, will be strong. Bethune said his firm now forecasts that 180,000 jobs were added in November, up from a previous estimate of 150,000.

There's even improvement in the troubled construction industry. The Commerce Department said spending rose in October for the second straight month, mostly because of a jump in spending on home improvement. Spending on new home construction fell.

The manufacturing report showed that new orders and production also grew, but at a slower pace. Factory employment grew for the 12th month in a row, although slightly slower than in October.

The institute surveys purchasing managers at about 350 companies around the country to compile the index.

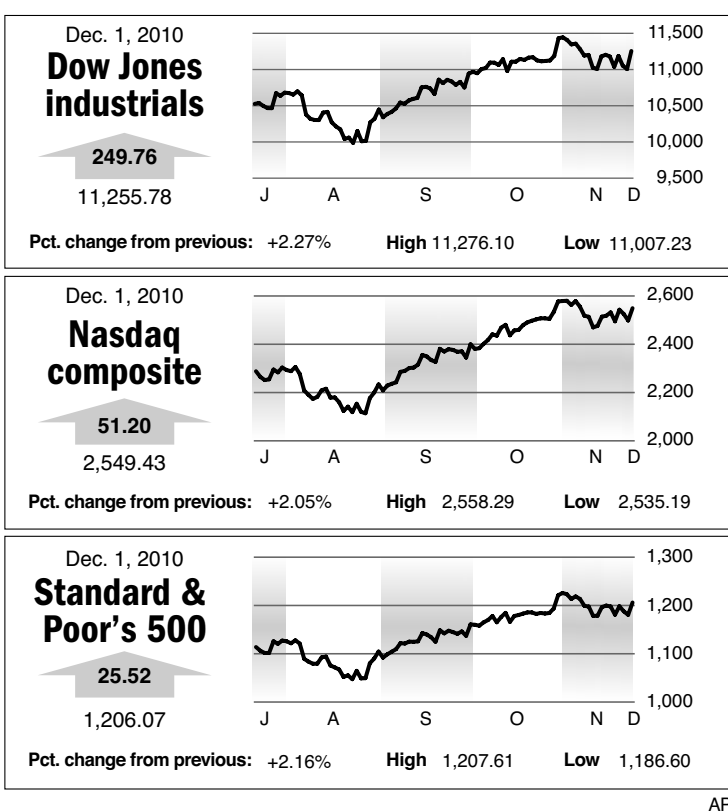

Cyber Monday sales surpass \$1 billion

DETROIT (AP) — Cyber Monday sales jumped the \$1 billion mark for the busiest online shopping day in history, according to comScore.

Sales on Monday rose 16 percent to \$1.028 billion from \$887 million on the same day in 2009, prompted by heavier promotions from retailers this year, said Gian Fulgoni, comScore chairman.

“So while we anticipate that there will be more billion-dollar spending days ahead as we get deeper into the season, only time will tell if overall consumer online spending remains at the elevated levels we’ve seen thus far,” Fulgoni said.

The average buyer spent 12 percent more on Monday while the number of Cyber Monday shoppers grew by just 4 percent to 9 million.

The Monday after Thanksgiving was dubbed Cyber Monday after retailers noticed spikes in their online sales that day after people returned to work. And nearly half, or 49 percent of dollars spend online

Monday were from work computers. That is down by 3.8 percent from last year.

Sales from Nov. 1-29 were \$13.5 billion,

Deficit panel split; painful package in doubt

WASHINGTON — A painful package of spending cuts and tax increases drew sharp challenges from both the left and right on President Obama's deficit commission Wednesday, putting approval in doubt. However, both parties' Senate budget point men embraced the plan, and even opponents called it a starting point for efforts next year to control the nation's ballooning debt.

"It's a template that gives people an opportunity to start discussing what we have to do to get our fiscal house in order," said Rep. Xavier Becerra, a California Democrat on the panel who hasn't said whether he'll support the package.

The 18-member bipartisan commission scheduled a vote on the plan for Friday. But as Wednesday's meeting demonstrated, the co-chairmen, Democrat Erskine Bowles and Republican Alan Simpson, face a difficult chore in rounding up the 14 votes needed to officially send the plan to Congress for consideration.

Winning over lawmakers who are also panel members appeared to be the biggest remaining challenge, given the politically incendiary nature of many of the proposals. The tax increases it includes are deal-breakers for some Republicans, likewise social program cuts for some Democrats.

The plan calls for sweeping tax changes that would affect millions of Americans, including trimming or doing away with many popular tax breaks such as the home mortgage deduction. It would also make deep cuts in military spending, slash the federal work force, raise the retirement age for full Social Security benefits and make cuts in Medicare. It aims to reduce federal red ink by nearly \$4 trillion within a decade.

Although prospects for the plan are unclear, the attention it has received has helped awaken the nation to the depth of the economic hole the country is in and the need for bold action to dig out, suggested Bowles, who was former President Bill Clinton's White House chief

of staff. Simpson is a former Republican senator from Wyoming.

"The American people get it now. People want this to happen," Bowles said.

While the deficit commission grappled with longer-term economic woes, congressional Democrats and Republicans worked separately to strike a deal with the White House on a more immediate financial issue: extending Bush-era tax cuts that expire Dec. 31. And despite talk of finding common ground, neither side seemed willing to yield much as negotiations began with Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner and Budget Director Jacob Lew.

Both Democrats and Republicans seem willing to extend most of the tax cuts.

But Democrats want to let cuts for the wealthiest Americans expire, citing damage to the federal deficit from lost revenue as a main argument.

Meanwhile, as the deficit commission — formally the president's National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform — began moving toward a final decision, Sens. Kent Conrad and Judd Gregg, the Democratic chairman and top Republican on the Senate Budget Committee, threw their high-voltage support behind the plan. Still, both expressed some misgivings.

Gregg, the New Hampshire Republican who is retiring from the Senate, took issue with some proposed tax hikes in the plan,

Study: Even being a bit overweight is risky

NEW YORK — Lugging around a few extra pounds? One of the largest studies to look at health and weight finds that you don't have to be obese to raise your risk of premature death. Merely being overweight carries some risk, too.

Obesity increases the risk of death from heart disease, stroke and certain cancers. But whether being merely overweight contributes to an early death as well has been uncertain and controversial. Some research has suggested being a little pudgy has little effect or can even be a good thing.

The latest research involving about 1.5 million people concluded that healthy white adults who were overweight were 13 percent more likely to die during the time they were followed in the study than those whose weight is in an ideal range.

"Having a little extra meat on your bones — if that meat happens to be fat — is harmful, not beneficial," said Dr. Michael Thun of the American Cancer Society, senior author of the study.

The study's conclusions, published in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine, are similar to three other large studies, said the lead author, Amy Berrington of the National Cancer Institute.

"Now there's really a very large body of evidence which supports the finding that being overweight is associated with a small increased risk of death," Berrington said.

funded analysis, the researchers pooled 19 long-term studies of mostly white adults. They used each person's body mass index — a measure of height and weight — and checked to see who died during the follow-up periods, which ranged from five to 28 years.

They focused on people who were healthy at the beginning of the studies, excluding smokers and those with heart disease or cancer because those affect death rates and researchers wanted to see the impact of weight alone.

The lowest death rate for healthy women who had never smoked was in the high end of the ideal body mass index range — between 22.5 and 24.9. Compared with that group, those who were overweight had an increased risk of death of 13 percent. The increased risk ranged from 44 to 88 percent for those who were obese. The morbidly obese were 2 1/2 times more likely to die prematurely. The results for men were similar.

Most of the participants in the studies were white so the research focused on them. Results may be different in other ethnic and racial groups, Berrington said. She said evidence suggests that for the same BMI level, African-Americans might have a lower risk of death and Asians a higher risk.

Two-thirds of U.S. adults are either overweight or obese. Overweight begins at a BMI measurement of 25, obese at 30 and morbidly obese at 40. A 5-foot-6 person is considered overweight at 155 pounds, obese at 186 pounds and morbidly obese at 248 pounds.

Obama rejects oil drilling in eastern Gulf, on East Coast

WASHINGTON — Pointing to the BP blowout and risks of a new environmental disaster, the Obama administration reversed itself Wednesday and promised not to pursue offshore drilling in the eastern Gulf of Mexico or anywhere else along the nation's East Coast.

The decision was generally hailed in Florida, which depends on tourists drawn by the state's white beaches, but criticized by the oil industry, which said the administration was stifling crucial U.S. energy production and costing recession-battered jobseekers golden opportunities for new work.

The administration had backed a major expansion of offshore drilling earlier this year, in part to gain support for comprehensive climate legislation in Congress, one of President Barack Obama's top legislative goals.

With that bill now off the table, the president stands much to gain politically by saying no to powerful oil interests, particularly in Florida, which is expected to be a crucial swing state in the 2012 election campaign.

Interior Secretary Ken Salazar denied politics played any role, saying the

BP spill taught officials a number of lessons, "most importantly that we need to proceed with caution and focus on creating a more stringent regulatory regime."

The new drilling focus would be on areas with leases that are currently active in the central and western Gulf of Mexico.

"In the Gulf and the Atlantic we are adjusting our strategy," Salazar said. "We believe the most appropriate course of action is to focus development on areas with existing leases and not expand to new areas at this time."

Under the revised plan, the Interior Department will not propose any new oil drilling in waters in the Atlantic Ocean and eastern Gulf for at least the next seven years. Already planned lease sales in the Gulf of Mexico, expected in March and August, will be delayed until late 2011 or early 2012, Salazar said.

The administration's previous plan — announced last March, three weeks before the April BP spill — would have authorized officials to explore the potential for drilling from Delaware to central Florida, plus the northern waters of Alaska. The new plan allows potential drilling in Alaska, but officials said they will move cautiously before approving any leases.

Idaho Senate GOP picks Hill as new president

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Senate's Republican majority has a new leader.

The chamber's 28 GOP members on Wednesday chose Sen. Brent Hill of Rexburg as their new president pro tempore following Bob Geddes' retirement from the post.

Hill faced Sen. Russ Fulcher of Meridian, who had been caucus leader until seeking the top Senate post.

Sen. Bart Davis of Idaho Falls survived a challenge to remain majority leader,

while Caldwell Sen. John McGee will replace Fulcher as caucus chairman.

Sen. Chuck Winder of Boise ousted Joe Stegner of Lewiston to become assistant majority leader.

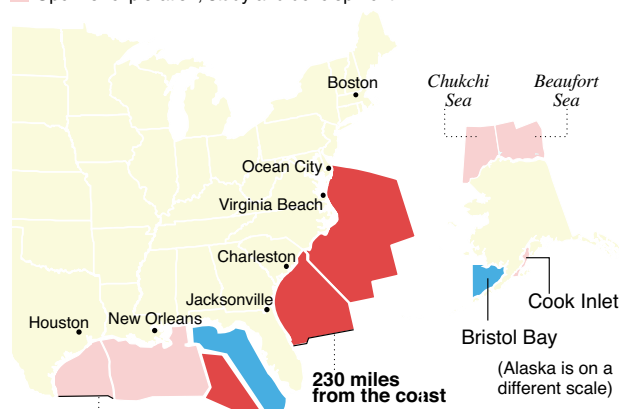

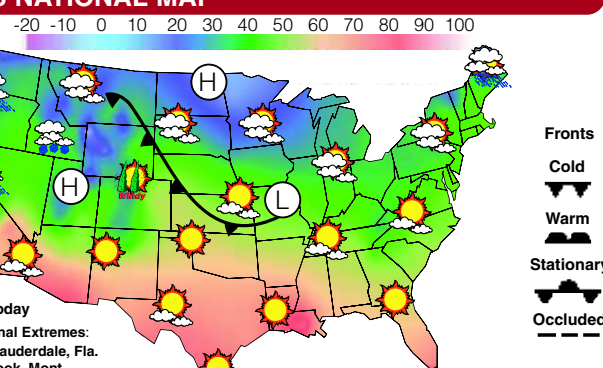

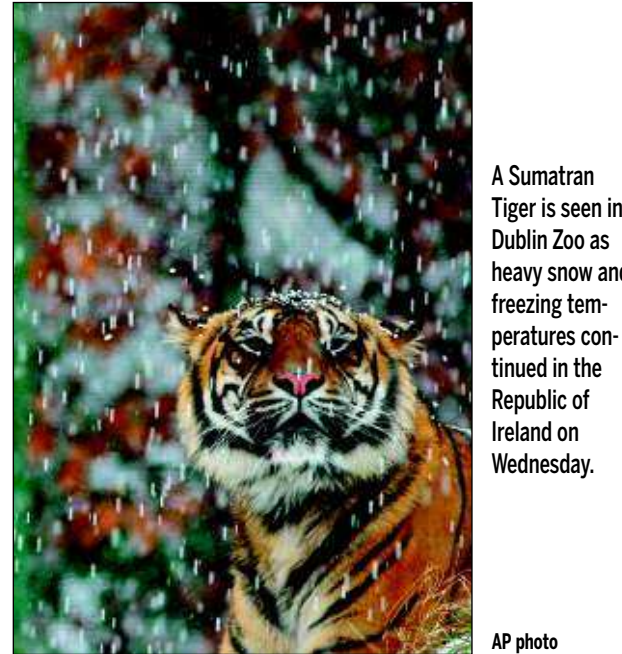
Bitter cold kills 8, slams air traffic in Europe

 GENEVA — Heavy snow and subzero temperatures swept across Europe, killing at least eight homeless people in Poland, closing major airports in Britain and Switzerland and causing hundreds of highway accidents.
 Gatwick, London's second largest airport, and Geneva, a major hub for low-cost carrier Easyjet, were forced to shut down Wednesday as staff struggled to clear runways of snow. Edinburgh airport in

Scotland, Leeds airport in northern England, and Chambery and Grenoble in southeastern France also were closed.
 Eurocontrol, the central air control agency, reported severe flight delays in Brussels, Frankfurt, Munich, Vienna, Prague and Paris Orly.
 In Poland, police said eight men died Tuesday night after a bitter cold front roared in, with temperatures falling to around -4 Fahrenheit.
 Police spokesman Mariusz Sokolowski said the men, from different parts of

the country, had been drinking. The eastern Polish city of Bialystok hit -15 Fahrenheit on Tuesday night.
 Winter weather caused some 2,000 accidents on German roads Tuesday, officials said.
 In northern Austria, police said a 69-year-old retiree froze to death overnight when he slipped on a snow-covered bridge on his way home from a funeral and lost consciousness.
 France's DGAC civil aviation authority asked airlines to cancel 25 percent of scheduled flights out of

Charles de Gaulle airport and 10 percent of flights out of Orly airport in Paris on Thursday. The authority on Wednesday urged passengers flying out of the airports to check with their airlines.
 Officials at Gatwick, south of London, said the airport would remain closed until early Thursday, stranding about 600 flights that were expected to leave Wednesday. Extra staff were working "around the clock" to clear the runways, and passengers were advised to check with their airline or Gatwick's website for updates.

Residents help F&G nab poachers near Albion

Whether the case is quirky or not, poaching is a crime.

But according to one Idaho Department of Fish and Game officer, some incidents cause him to shake his head.

George M. Kelley, 75, of Albion, and son George "Bill" Kelley, 53, pleaded guilty on Nov. 16 to charges of hunting an elk without a valid tag.

"What's interesting about this case," said conservation officer Chad Wippermann, "is that the Kelleys own a domestic elk farm."

HELP CATCH POACHERS

People can turn in poachers by calling Citizens Against Poaching at 800-632-5999. Callers may remain anonymous.

During the late morning hours of Sept. 9, Bill Kelley shot and killed a cow elk near Mount Harrison south of Albion. He placed a tag from one of the family's domestic elk on the dead cow elk, making it appear as if it were one of the family's animals, and left it in the mountains for the rest of the day, according to Wippermann's report.

The Kelleys and two other individuals returned that evening with George's pickup to load the elk and then drove away with their lights turned off.

Wippermann and conservation officer Doug Meyer caught the group shortly after they left the scene.

"There aren't too many people who have an elk ranch and then go out and poach an elk," Wippermann said. "It's an abuse of power when they own an elk farm and stick one of their tags on a wild elk that they killed."

Wippermann was notified about the Kelleys by an eyewitness. Other concerned citizens acted quickly to help with the investigation. Wippermann said this was not the first time he received complaints about the Kelleys.

The Kelleys were charged \$475 in fines and fees for hunting without a valid tag, according to court records.

"Poaching is a huge problem within this whole state," Wippermann said. "Some people just don't respect the law or the wildlife. This is a perfect case showing that."

Thank goodness for honest citizens, he said.

"People don't like poaching," Wippermann said. "Sportsmen and citizens who keep their eyes open and turn in poachers are our greatest asset."

George Kelley told the *Times-News* Wednesday afternoon that he was "OK with the fine" but didn't like how the officers handled the situation. He declined further comment about the poaching incident.

Attempts to reach Bill Kelley were unsuccessful.

Plenty to do outside

Staying active during winter might mean better health

Some people just don't like snow. They let the cold weather keep them inside, nestled with blankets and space heaters, while the more adventurous use the winter season to their advantage.

There's nothing wrong with staying indoors during winter, if that's what you prefer — except, well ... being inactive isn't healthy. Nor is staying out of natural light for long periods at a time, which, according to some therapists, can lead to Seasonal Affect Disorder, or SAD.

"The decrease in natural sunlight impacts people in multiple ways," writes clinical therapist Alexis Walters. "It can throw off your circadian rhythm (your body's natural pattern of sleeping and waking) and lead to

decreases in both serotonin (a neurotransmitter which affects mood) and melatonin (a hormone which influences sleep patterns and mood).

"From an evolutionary perspective, it is theorized that seasonal mood shifts are an adaptive response to colder weather. ... Decreased mood and activity level reduces the need for calorie intake, making these symptoms advantageous evolutionarily. ... Many, if not most, species respond to a drop in temperature by decreasing their level of activity to

some degree. ... The colder and cloudier it gets, the more people tend to be affected by seasonal mood change."

And this from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services: "Evidence of the multiple health benefits of regular physical activity continues to mount. Regular physical activity can help to prevent and manage coronary heart disease, hypertension, non-insulin-dependent diabetes mellitus, osteoporosis, obesity, and mental health problems (e.g., depression, anxiety)."

As difficult as it might be, perhaps the best thing you can do is to bundle up and get outdoors; stay active during the cold months.

If you've never considered the array of winter-time outdoor activities, read on. Here are a few suggestions:

How to prep your gun for cold weather

We had struggled for several hours through the knee-deep snow before we settled into a position above and downwind from the bedded four-point buck.

Resting his Ruger 7mm Mauser into the shooting sticks, my brother Bob removed his heavy gloves, snicked off the safety and began his trigger press. But instead of the snow-muffled blast and a solid hit, only the sickening click of a misfire reached our ears and those of the now-alerted mulie. A second round also failed to fire.

Whispering over his shoulder, Bob told me to hand over my Model 70 7x57. A quickly-aimed shot dropped the buck into its bed.

After thawing out Bob's rifle back home, we discovered that he had never disassembled his gun's bolt and removed the original factory packing grease. Exposed to the subzero temperatures of our morning hunt, it had congealed into a solid mass around and within the firing pin spring. The softened primer strike was not sufficient to ignite the rounds.

Though this incident occurred more than 30 years ago, it forever fixed in our minds the importance of preparing our firearms for the frigid conditions we all commonly experience on our late-season big game and waterfowl hunts. Now, in addition to our customary preseason regimen, each of our guns undergo a late-season lubrication tune-up as well.

When it comes to firearms lubrication, I subscribe to the minimalist philosophy: If a little is good, less might be even better. This, I believe, is especially true for cold-weather extremes.

While some knowledgeable shooters go dry and completely remove all lubricants from the firing mechanisms of their weapons, I have found several products that,

when used in moderation, work wonders all year long but are particularly effective when temperatures plummet.

I am particularly fond of Remington's DriLube aerosol, Breakfree CLP, and the relatively new Canadian product Jig-A-Loo. Here is my late-season prep procedure:

To protect wooden stocked weapons, I remove their furniture and buff in several coats of Johnson paste wax. Synthetic stocks are cleaned and protected by a good wipe down with Armor All.

Next I disassemble the firing mechanism to expose all critical operating parts and surfaces. For general use, I scrub down these parts/areas with Hoppes No. 9 or simply hose them down with a quality aerosol cleaner. I like Birchwood Casey's Cleaner-Degreaser and dote on their Synthetic-Safe Gun Scrubber. Generic brake parts cleaner often gets the nod; just be aware that it may damage some synthetic parts and stock finishes.

After the parts have been cleaned and dried, I apply very modest amounts of the above-mentioned lubricants, reassemble, test functioning, and then prop them in the gun rack till their next outing. Please don't store your guns in their zippered or latched cases. Trapped condensation is certain to rust out Ole Betsy in a hurry.

This is a great time to be afield. With a little forethought and preparation, your firearms will perform like champs no matter what Mother Nature decides to send your way. And as my wife is quick to remind me these days, "Baby, it's cold outside."

Shooting preserve a reminder of an earlier era

SANTA ANNA, Texas — Santa Anna is flanked by a long, high, curving ridge that pioneers hoped would keep the north wind at bay. Legend has it that the ridge, known to locals as Santana Mountain, once served as communication central for Indians who burned signal fires to stay in touch with distant villages, an early version of code talkers.

Gerry Stearns didn't need an interpreter to decode the actions of his lemon Brittany, Freckles. She was on point in grass so high that the dog was almost invisible. My wife, Emilie, walked in on the point and two bobwhites flushed from the under the dog's nose, one heading left, the other going right.

Emilie concentrated on the right bird and dropped him in a shower of feathers. Freckles never moved a muscle. "She's got more birds," warned Stearns, as my wife reloaded her empty barrel. That's when another quail got up and flew straight at Stearns, using the guide as a shield and

flying away unscathed.

Gerry and Eldena Stearns own Santa Anna Hunting Area (www.sahainc.com), a family-run shooting preserve. Gerry's dad, John R. Stearns, bought the section of land on the back side of Santana Mountain and opened the preserve in 1986 when he realized hunting was becoming less accessible.

Gerry Stearns eventually took over everyday operation from his father, but he's kept the original idea of fine-tuning a liberated bird hunt to closely simulate the

wild quail hunting he experienced while growing up around Abilene.

No Texas bird hunter wants to admit this, but wild quail are slipping away, overcome by a number of problems, many of them caused by an expanding human population.

It takes four elements to simulate a native quail hunt. The most important is good birds. SAHA offers pheasant and chukar hunting, but quail are its specialty. Eldena Stearns came from a family that was once the state's biggest game bird producer. She and her husband constantly fine-tune their hatchery, bird pens and feeding program.

Their quail flush wild ahead of the dogs, fly fast and far, duck around trees and brush to elude hunters and sometimes bury up in thick grass, refusing to flush at all, a tactic used by wild birds.

The second element to a successful shooting preserve is habitat that resembles native cover. Stearns has spent 20 years sculpting 600 acres of bird fields for every type of hunt. There are still wild quail coveys in

Coleman County, and SAHA hunters still flush the occasional covey.

Element three is good dogs. Both Stearnses train bird dogs. Several clients come just to work their dogs.

The fourth element is a sense of humor and fun. People travel from the city once or twice a year to hunt these birds and, while any sport involving a gun is serious business, it should also be fun.

Stearns laughs at the birds that get away and he laughs at the quirks of his dogs. He laughs about everything. One brace of dogs was dubbed the "old men," a 14-year-old Brittany named Kyle paired with an 8-year-old German shorthair. Kyle was mostly deaf and blind, but his nose worked fine.

Another brace featured an all-girls team that could have qualified as the United Nations team — Freckles, the Brittany; Lexi, the German shorthair; and Lucy, the French Brittany.

It's a lot like the quail hunts of yore with one significant difference: You never walk far between points.

Wyo. game official supports hunting grizzly bears

POWELL, Wyo. (AP) — A Wyoming wildlife manager says he supports hunting grizzly bears now that the population in the Yellowstone National Park area has reached the highest level in decades.

Researchers said last month that more than 600 grizzlies roam the Yellowstone area of Wyoming, Montana and Idaho.

That's more than three times the number in 1975, when hunting was outlawed and the species was placed on the endangered list.

Mark Bruscano, supervisor of the Wyoming Game and Fish Department bear management program, tells the *Powell Tribune* he favors hunting to manage the grizzly population.

onto the ice, not just here but at any lake. Remember:

- Don't venture onto ice less than 4 inches thick; some prefer 6 inches.
- Stay away from milky-colored ice; clear ice is strongest.
- Drill as you go, checking for thickness.
- Bring ice picks and rope.
- Be cautious of weather patterns and your surroundings.

Deer camps produce unique picture

SPIRIT FALLS, Wis. — Cedars stood black against a blush of orange on the horizon; still, frigid air blanketed the swamp.

As the curtain rose on the 2010 Wisconsin gun deer season, Jay Leggett was reminded of a natural truth.

"The silence is so incredibly loud," said Leggett, a Tomahawk, Wis., native who now lives in Los Angeles. "Just listen to that."

Leggett and I had ventured to the edge of a cedar swamp in Lincoln County before dawn Saturday. The temperature had plummeted to the low teens overnight; the swamp before us wore a new, crystal crown.

As we sat overlooking a clearing in a mixed stand of aspen, hemlock and cedar, a few tiny snowflakes floated from the sky, impelled only by gravity.

They were the only things that moved. And for the first hour of light, silence was the only sound.

Significant to our quest, the lack of noise meant an absence of deer and gun shots.

Leggett isn't accustomed to such quiet greetings.

"At least not on a good night," Leggett quipped.

Leggett, 47, left Wisconsin 25 years ago to pursue a career as an actor and comedian.

His resume includes roles on the television shows "In Living Color" and "ER," as well working with Chris Farley in the Improv Olympic comedy troupe in Chicago.

But Leggett remains grounded in Wisconsin's

culture, perhaps especially deer hunting.

He's missed two opening days since he was 12: one as a high school senior to participate in a state theater competition, the other when he was directing a play in London.

So it should come as no surprise that he's returned this year to Newwood Club, the remote hunting camp he shares with family and friends on 360 acres in western Lincoln County.

"It's my favorite place on earth," Leggett said.

The club includes eight members: Leggett, his father, Jack, and brother Josh; Graham and Curt Foster; Dan Osero Sr. and Dan Jr.; and Paul Sandry. Most live in Tomahawk.

The area was logged by the Rib Lake Logging Company and later, when the company was in bank-

ruptcy, this piece of ground was sold for 10 cents an acre, Jack Leggett said.

The club constructed a 24-by-48-foot cabin on the property. The comfortable building sleeps 18.

It has cedar paneling, a wood-burning stove for heat, a foosball table, a propane stove and enough couches and recliners to keep the members off their feet.

One refrigerator is modified to house a keg of beer.

Like many camps, Newwood's members and assorted guests typically arrive on the Thursday before deer season to settle in and check hunting stands.

Friday is then a day of rest and frivolity.

"I consider it my Christmas morning," Leggett said.

The camp is in Deer

Management Unit 32. The area is classified as a "regular unit" this year; 650 antlerless deer permits were available, but sold out in less than 2 hours.

For those of us at Newwood, that means it's a buck or nothing.

"Believe me, if all we wanted was to shoot a deer, we'd probably hunt somewhere else," said Josh Leggett. "But there are still deer here. We'll hunt hard and see what happens."

Though the thermometer read 18 degrees at dawn Saturday, the fields and forests around Tomahawk were brown.

The scant flakes Jay Leggett and I saw at sunrise covered nary a leaf.

The deer, at least this day, would be hard to spot among the thick, brown vegetation.

But we kept our ears trained for a tell-tale "crunch, crunch" of an animal moving through the frozen terrain.

A half-dozen rifle shots punctuated the air through the course of the morning, but none at Newwood.

The hours passed, with only a red squirrel, a blue jay and several black-capped chickadees making appearances.

We went back to the cabin about 11 a.m. to make our deer-less report.

But a slightly different story emerged 5 miles east at Beartooth Lodge, a backwoods hunt camp that includes a 1928 cabin, where 17-year-old Jared Hansen of Tomahawk had filled his tag just after 7 a.m.

By midmorning his fork-horn buck was hanging on the game pole.

Snowstorm, ice, cold doesn't deter hardcore hunter

Snow, ice, cold — you can't scare Montana hunters.

Well, not all of them.

Last Saturday I was one of the hardy — or is that fool-hardy? — hunters who ventured out to hunt during a snowstorm, while temperatures shivered in the low teens and ice-clad highways were sending folks crashing left, right and upside down. (Imagine geese landing on a frozen lake.)

One thing I found out braving such miserable weather is that there's little competition from other hunters. Most probably decided to stay home and watch the Cat-Griz football game in front of the fireplace, a hot toddy in hand. Some may have been snowed in, unable to uncover their vehicles from the blowing snow and ice of the driveways.

Fresh tracks

Amazingly, I saw a deer almost as soon as I stepped out of my truck. I had a whitetail doe tag to fill, in addition to my elk tag. Through the steady snowfall, though, I couldn't tell if the whitetail had antlers or not. The deer didn't hang around long enough for me to find out, quickly high-tailing it into some thick dog-hair pine.

I had a fresh set of tracks to follow, so I decided to give trailing the deer a try. If the deer was a buck, I reasoned, it would be looking for does. If it was a doe, maybe I'd see her again.

Walking through a thick forest after a heavy snowfall is a surefire way to either fall and pack your rifle with snow, or get a load of snow dumped down the back of your neck. I managed to keep from falling by grabbing on to the tightly bunched trees to brace myself. This would jar the tree, making the snow fall on top of me in a loud "whump!" I kept the snow out of my coat by putting my hood up, but it still managed to fill my rifle scope and coat my clothing, making me look like a big frosted flake.

Breaking out

Figuring that fighting my way through the forest was no way to hunt, I opted to exit the pine thicket and walk the edge of a logging clearcut. This brought up another problem: the snow was about knee-deep out in the open. Because it was so deep, the snow covered all of the downed trees, limbs, stumps and holes I'd usually avoid. So, like a child playing in the dark, I had to feel my way along using my frozen toes to carefully test each foot placement.

As if this wouldn't slow

my progress enough, I also had to fight through the 18 inches of snow. It's amazing how tiring plowing through deep snow can be.

In no time I was working up a good sweat. Sweat and cold don't mix — they make ice. So I pulled up under the nearest trees with a good overhanging branch for shelter and peeled off the vest and fleece jacket I thought I'd need to keep warm. Of course, as soon as you stop moving and peel a few layers, you're cold.

Boot dilemma

I hiked on, fighting uphill and through another dense stand of young pine before finally hitting a road that ATVers were using. Trying to walk the two-track trail, I found my footing was very unsteady. The airbob soles on my boots had become tightly packed with snow. My sole, instead of being flat, was as humped as a Bactrian camel's back.

Finding another overhanging branch to hide from the snowfall, I sat and tried to clear my boot treads. A stick wasn't sharp and stiff enough, so I dug out my game saw and tried to use that. If I'd had the time and finger dexterity, I would have sawn off some of those lugs so the boots wouldn't plug up again. As it was, they quickly filled after I started walking again.

By this time, I figured it must be getting close to noon and the start of the Cat-Griz game. My stomach was gurgling, saying "Feed me!" I'd been up since 4:30 a.m. and my dose of caffeine had worn off. Checking my watch, though, I found it was only 9:30, and already my thighs were throbbing from plowing snow.

Last round

Digging deep, almost literally, I made another looping arc through the forest, hoping to bump an animal as stupid to be up and moving in the snow as me. Another whitetail crossed my path, but again I couldn't get a good look at it.

Weary of the steady snowstorm and with my fleece jacket and mittens getting soaked, I decided to break trail back to my truck, get warm, eat and listen to a bit of the football game before striking out again for an evening hunt. Once back at the truck, the thought of actually watching the game on high-definition TV propelled me down the road to a nearby restaurant. It was closed, a worker told me, because none of the workers could make it there.

So I returned to the woods, parked, ate and listened to the game. Just when I was about ready to pack up for my evening walk, a doe trotted up next to the truck.

Buck hunting

After stalking whitetail with bow and arrow for several weeks, Todd Neville of Fleming is looking forward to deer gun season, which started Monday in Ohio.

"I've been bow hunting since September, and I'm as ready as I can be for gun season," he said. "I usually bag at least a couple of doe each year."

Neville won't be alone. More than 400,000 hunters are expected to ply the Buckeye State's fields and woodlands in search of a trophy buck during the week-long deer gun season.

"We do have a pretty limited gun season, but a couple of weeks later, on Dec. 18 and 19, we've added another weekend for gun hunters," said Susie Vance, spokeswoman for the Ohio

Department of Natural Resources Wildlife Division.

"But Ohio has one of the longest archery seasons in the country," she added.

The bow season began Sept. 25 and lasts until Feb. 6.

Vance said though brief, next week's deer gun season brings some big benefits.

"We get calls from all over about deer hunting here," she said. "Because we have such a healthy deer herd, Ohio is a real destination for hunters, and that means a real boon for the economy as they spend millions on hotels, campgrounds, restaurants and outfitters."

Ginnie Offenberger said business was good Friday at the Southeastern Ohio Trading Post she and husband, Ted, operate on Main Street in Waterford.

"We're busy today, but it will be even busier on Saturday," she said. "And we're going to stay open Sunday this week to take care of any last-minute hunting needs."

Offenberger said hunters are buying shotgun slugs and licenses.

"But we're also selling a lot of first-time shotguns and youth licenses for young people," she said.

In addition to locals, Offenberger said several out-of-state hunters come into the store.

"A few have come up from Florida," she said.

Sonya Bailey, who works at the B&J Ashland convenience store in Newport, said she's received a lot of phone calls from hunters outside of Ohio.

"One came from Canada," she said. "He wanted to know about the local deer population and hunting season."

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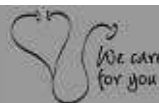

Clinic offers another option for infant care

BURLEY — Cassia Regional Medical Center has opened a respiratory outpatient clinic for children younger than 2 years old.

The clinic offers parents an alternative to admitting their children to the hospital or visiting the emergency room to treat bronchiolitis, a lung infection that is most common among infants younger than 6 months old. The illness affects about 11 of every 100 children during their first year of life, and most cases occur between November and April.

Tyrell Searle, a respiratory therapist at Cassia Regional, said he feels the program is doing what it was designed to do.

"It was very effective last year. We saw 53 patients during the year," Searle said.

Parents have told the hospital they're pleased with having the option of the clinic over inpatient or ER care.

Patient turnaround time in the clinic is usually 20 to 30 minutes, depending on the medical interventions required.

Patients average two to four visits during a seven-day prescription period and are then able to be managed at home with bulb suctioning.

"It helps decrease costs for parents," Searle said. "We monitor them here versus them having to go into the hospital and be monitored and having greater expense."

Care includes monitoring the heart rate of each child and making an evaluation, Searle said.

Other advantages of the clinic he sees are the ability for health care providers to monitor each patient for a seven-day stretch, and the personal attention each patient can be given at a clinic focused just on respiratory treatment.

"Patients can come in as often as they feel necessary during that seven days," he said. "We do scoring and detect severity."

During the height of the respiratory season — that November-to-April time frame — the clinic is available 24 hours per day, if needed.

Parents should watch their children closely during this time for signs of the illness and take them to their physician if symptoms occur.

"There is usually lots of nasal discharge, increased respiratory rate as well as retractions along the rib line and around the neck," Searle said.

The clinic's regular hours are 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. For more information, call 677-6535.

Super Glue to the rescue? Epoxy resin approved for medical use

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have heard that surgeons are using Super Glue to close wounds in the operating room. Is this true? If it is, could I use it to close painful cracks in my heels and hands?

DEAR READER: This is a common practice that has been used for a number of years; however, the product is not Super Glue. DermaBond contains a vari-

ety of components found in Super Glue and is approved for medical use. This clear epoxy resin sets in about three minutes and lasts up to 10 days. It cannot take the place of sutures or staples in

all cases and its uses are relatively restricted.

Complicated closures still require traditional stitches. DermaBond is noninvasive, painless, will not leave a scar, minimizes the risk of infection, and doesn't require a follow-up visit to a doctor for suture removal. I think sometimes we are in something resembling a time warp, because surgeons now use surgical

paste, sealants made from human blood proteins and fibrin bandages. Aren't research and necessity phenomenal?

Home-use tissue-adhesive products are available but should only be used on small lacerations once all contamination has been removed from a wound to prevent infection. I urge anyone with an open wound to consult a physician before

taking matters (or glues) into their own hands.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've had a sinus infection for the past eight years. I've had two unsuccessful sinus operations. I use a nasal steroid twice a day and a saline solution wash up my nose every day. I've had numerous antibiotics and still have the infection. I quit alcohol because my sinuses became more

inflamed and swollen after drinking.

A medical professional recently told me that the alcohol causes a rise of white blood cells into the infected sinuses, and that is what causes the uncomfortable inflammation. If white blood cells fight infection, should I drink some liquor moderately as a possible

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — A veteran FBI agent whose investigations have ranged from Mexican drug trafficking groups to gangs and violent crimes has been named the new head of the Anchorage division office, the bureau announced Wednesday.

Mary F. Rook, 51, is taking over as special agent in charge in Alaska on Jan. 1. She replaces Kevin Fryslie, who retires Dec. 31. Special Agent Eric Gonzalez, the agency's Alaska spokesman, said Fryslie's departure has nothing to do with alleged misconduct in the corruption case against the late Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska.

A lawyer familiar with the matter said in November that a draft Justice Department report has found that two federal prosecutors and FBI agent Mary Beth Kepner engaged in misconduct in Stevens' corruption trial, which was later tossed out.

Fryslie, 56, is retiring ahead of his February birthday, according to Gonzalez.

"He has to," he said. "Mandatory retirement

for FBI agents is 57." Rook began her career with the agency as a serology technician in 1984, then became a special agent assigned to the Milwaukee Division in 1986, according to the FBI. She later was assigned to the Los Angeles division, where she investigated Mexican drug trafficking organizations and money laundering cases. In 2000, she was appointed as the first Office of Professional Responsibility supervisor in the division. Continued from Outdoors 5 tool to fight this chronic infection? **DEAR READER:** Alcohol prevents nutrients from feeding the immune system. Once in the blood, it will reduce the number and impair the function of the white blood cells (WBC) in the body. The lower the white-blood-cell count, the more difficult it becomes to fight off disease. Low white blood counts can occur with acute bacterial or viral infection, in cases of pernicious anemia, acute lym-

phoblastic leukemia, hormonal imbalances and alcoholism. Given the fact that alcohol decreases WBC, it would be futile for you to ingest any amount of alcohol in an attempt to raise your count and fight the sinusitis. Because of the duration of your illness, you should be under the care of an ear-nose-and-throat (ENT) specialist who can determine whether it is caused by tooth infection, allergies, nasal polyps, a deviated septum or other medical

condition. Perhaps you are unknowingly exposed to pollutants, such as tobacco smoke, cleaning solvents or chemical fumes. If necessary, imaging studies such as CT or MRI might be appropriate. You might undergo allergy testing or nasal endoscopy. Get to the bottom of the problem. To provide related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report

Samuel Cohen, inventor of neutron bomb, dies in L.A.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Neutron bomb inventor Samuel T. Cohen, who designed the tactical nuclear weapon intended to kill people but do minimal damage to structures, has died, his son said Wednesday.

Cohen died from complications of stomach cancer on Sunday at his home in the Brentwood section of Los Angeles, his son Paul Cohen told the New York Times and the Los Angeles Times.

Cohen worked for the RAND Corporation and the Lawrence Livermore

Laboratory when he developed the small neutron bomb in 1958, which used tiny particles that could zip through tanks, walls or buildings with minimal damage but kill humans, usually by attacking their central nervous system. It also minimized long-term nuclear contamination.

Ethicists questioned a weapon designed to destroy only life, but Cohen spent much of his life advocating for its adoption, saying the bomb's limited effects were a more moral alternative to other nuclear weapons.

Father of 3 missing boys fights return to Mich.

MORENCI, Mich. — A couple whose three sons have been missing since Thanksgiving had bickered over custody as they negotiated their divorce, but they still did things together as a family.

On the Sunday before Thanksgiving, John and Tanya Skelton took their boys — Andrew, 9, Alexander, 7, and Tanner, 5 — to help decorate the United Methodist Church in Morenci and a nearby park for the Christmas season.

"Andrew said to me, 'With the park all lit up and church all lit up, we're going to light up the town,'" the Rev. Donna Galloway, who also serves as the chaplain for the Morenci Fire Department, said Wednesday.

"It was a good day, it was a family day, for all of us at the church. That light — and the season of light — is what we're holding on to," Galloway said.

That was the last time Galloway saw the whole family together.

The following Friday, Tanya Skelton reported the

boys missing when their father didn't return them to her. Police say he tried to hang himself, and that he lied to investigators when he said he first gave the boys to a female acquaintance to hand over to their mother.

The disappearance of the boys, who were last seen on Thanksgiving playing in their father's yard, has gripped those living in and around Morenci, a community of about 2,000 residents 75 miles southwest of Detroit.

A small army of volunteers fanned out for a fifth day Wednesday to search the countryside around Morenci and across the border in Ohio.

Meanwhile, the children's father was in a Toledo, Ohio, courtroom, fighting extradition back to Michigan to face three charges of parental kidnapping.

John Skelton, a 39-year-old unemployed long-haul truck driver, sat throughout the hearing in a wheelchair covered by a green blanket, answering the judge's yes-or-no questions in a whisper.

The judge set bond at \$3 million and scheduled another hearing for Dec. 14.

Oswald's original coffin going on the auction block

DALLAS (MCT) — The empty pine coffin that once held the body of Lee Harvey Oswald, and that for three decades Allen Baumgardner kept in a storage room at his funeral home, is going up for auction.

A funeral director knows his own mortality, he explained.

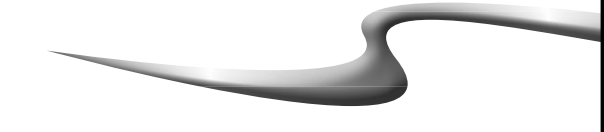

Bidding on the coffin will start at \$1,000, but Laura Yntema, auction manager, predicted final bids of \$60,000 to \$100,000.

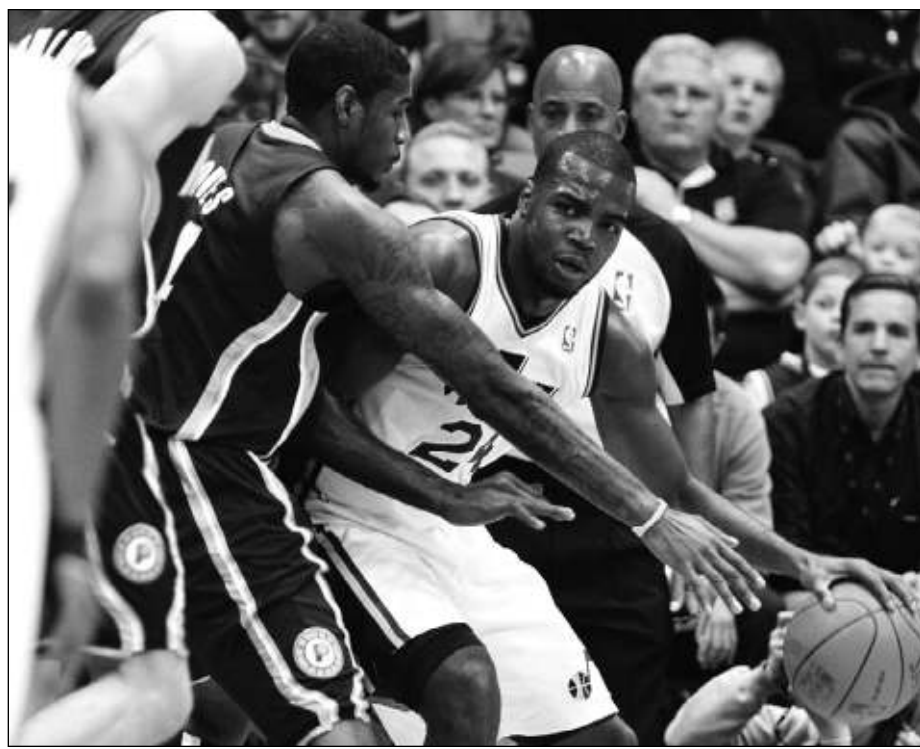

Schaub is doing just fine on his own now. And Vick, well, he's bounced back quite nicely after nearly ruining his career.

When the Houston Texans (5-6) visit the Philadelphia Eagles (7-4) tonight, it'll be a reunion for the two quarterbacks. It also will be a homecoming for Schaub, who played high school football 22 miles west of the Linc at West Chester East High.

"I'm looking forward to playing against him and playing up there in Philadelphia," Schaub said. "That's where I grew up, so it will be fun to go back home and play up there."

Schaub will have family and friends in the stands, and his old buddy on the other sideline.

"I learned a lot watching Mike and playing behind him for three years," Schaub said. "He was one of the most, at the time, visible and talented sports figures, along with the likes of Tiger Woods, in the world. Just learning and watching him go through a game plan each week, what he had to deal with being the starting quarterback, there were just a ton of things I learned and took away from that."

Schaub has developed into a Pro Bowl player himself. He passed for 4,770 yards and 29 touchdowns last year, and he has 2,752 yards passing and 15 TDs this season.

Vick was a three-time Pro Bowl selection during his six seasons with the Falcons. He's playing even better now with the NFC East-leading

Eagles, and is an MVP candidate.

"When things don't happen in rhythm, he becomes such a weapon," Texans coach Gary Kubiak said. "We got our hands full, but we played better defensively the last few weeks. This will be the biggest challenge thus far. We need to handle that challenge as a team, not just one group."

FAVRE SAYS NO WORD ON NFL INVESTIGATION

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — Brett Favre has faced demanding questions from the media for 20 years, never more than this season while he's been embroiled in a messy NFL investigation and struggled mightily on the field for the Minnesota Vikings.

When he finally does decide to hang up the pads, which he insisted Wednesday will happen for good at the end of this long and trying season, the 41-year-old quarterback said that he may look to turn the tables.

"Might be a reporter," Favre quipped. "Ask some tough questions."

He answered a few more of them on Wednesday.

After the Vikings fired coach Brad Childress, who had a well-documented history of butting heads with his QB, some figured the old man would change his mind again and decide to play in 2011. After all, Favre confidante Leslie Frazier is the interim coach.

"I'm done," Favre said, his voice hoarse from being sick for the past week. "I'm done."

Auburn's Newton eligible to play

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — Heisman Trophy favorite Cam Newton can focus on playing for the SEC championship instead of worrying about pay-for-play.

The NCAA ruled Wednesday that Auburn's quarterback won't be punished for the pay-for-play scheme concocted by his father, Cecil.

Instead, the younger Newton will lead the second-ranked Tigers into the Southeastern Conference championship game Saturday against South Carolina — with a shot at the national title on the line.

The NCAA cleared Newton to compete without conditions, saying it was Cecil Newton and "an owner of a scouting service" — former Mississippi State player Kenny Rogers — who violated amateurism rules.

The NCAA became involved over the summer in investigating the pay-for-play scheme that was discussed during Newton's recruitment.

Two Mississippi State boosters accused Cecil Newton and Rogers of trying to get up to \$180,000 for Cam Newton to

play for the Bulldogs while the quarterback was being recruited out of junior college last year.

"Based on the information available to the reinstatement staff at this time, we do not have sufficient evidence that Cam Newton or anyone from Auburn was aware of this activity, which led to his reinstatement," Kevin Lennon, NCAA vice president for academic and membership affairs, said in a news release.

"From a student-athlete reinstatement perspective,

Auburn University met its obligation under NCAA bylaw 14.11.1. Under this threshold, the student-athlete has not participated while ineligible."

The question of how much Auburn and Cam Newton knew about the pay-for-play scam has dogged the 12-0 Tigers since news of the recruiting scandal became public last month.

The NCAA and Auburn moved swiftly this week to bring at least some resolution.

The sports governing body concluded Monday that a violation had been committed by Cecil Newton and Rogers. A day later — following NCAA bylaws — Auburn declared Newton ineligible and then requested his eligibility be reinstated.

But Lennon seems to have left the door open for future discipline. The NCAA would not say Wednesday that the case is closed, referring to its statement that notes reinstatement likely occurs "prior to the close of an investigation."

Still, it was good news for Auburn.

The ruling at least temporarily allays weeks-long fears that the Tigers would lose the player who has helped propel them from a middling SEC team last year to a never-say-die powerhouse with a shot at the title.

It also temporarily eases concerns that Auburn's 12 wins — and any titles — would wind up being vacated if the NCAA had found that Newton had been ineligible because of violations committed before signing with the Tigers on New Year's Eve 2009.

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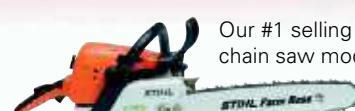

Today's Highlight:
On Dec. 2, 1970, the newly created Environmental Protection Agency opened its doors. (Its first director was William D. Ruckelshaus.)

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1804, Napoleon crowned himself Emperor of the French.

In 1823, President James Monroe outlined his doctrine opposing European expansion in the Western Hemisphere.

In 1859, militant abolitionist John Brown was hanged for his raid on Harpers Ferry the previous October. Artist Georges-Pierre Seurat was born in Paris.

In 1927, Ford Motor Co. formally unveiled its second Model A automobile, the successor to its Model T.

In 1939, New York Municipal Airport-LaGuardia Field (later LaGuardia Airport) went into operation as an airliner from Chicago landed at one minute past midnight.

In 1942, an artificially created, self-sustaining nuclear chain reaction was demonstrated for the first time, at the University of Chicago.

In 1954, the Senate voted to condemn Wisconsin Republican Joseph R. McCarthy for conduct that "tends to bring the Senate into disrepute."

In 1969, the Boeing 747 jumbo jet got its first public preview as 191 people, most of them reporters and photographers, flew from Seattle to New York City.

In 1980, four American churchwomen were raped and murdered outside San Salvador. (Five El Salvador national guardsmen were later convicted of murdering nuns Ita Ford, Maura Clarke and Dorothy Kazel, and lay worker Jean Donovan.)

In 1990, composer Aaron Copland died in North Tarrytown, New York, at age 90. Actor Bob Cummings died in Woodland Hills, California, at age 80.

Ten years ago: Al Gore sought a recount in South Florida, while George W. Bush flatly asserted, "I'm soon to be the president" and met with GOP congressional leaders. Actress Gail Fisher died in Culver City, Calif. at age 65.

Five years ago: North Carolina inmate Kenneth Lee Boyd became the 1,000th person executed since the U.S. resumed capital punishment in 1977. Singapore executed a Vietnamese-born Australian heroin trafficker (Nguyen Tuong Van) despite a warning by Australian Prime Minister John Howard that the hanging would sour relations between the two countries.

One year ago: A day after President Barack Obama announced plans to deploy 30,000 more troops in Afghanistan, leading congressional Democrats said they had serious misgivings but would not try to stop the deployments while Republicans said they supported the force increase even as they questioned Obama's July 2011 deadline to start bringing troops home. Tiger Woods issued a statement saying he'd let his family down with "transgressions" that he regretted "with all of my heart," and that he would deal with his personal life behind closed doors.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

The normal effect of a ruff and sluff is to allow declarer to succeed in an otherwise unmakeable contract. So how are you to know when the right moment has arrived? In principle, it is when declarer can be placed with all the missing side-suit honors.

In this deal, from the 2008 Warren Buffett Cup, Jill Meyers led her two top spades against three diamonds, then continued with the spade deuce, ruffed by Larry Cohen. East dutifully returned the club requested by Meyers' suit-preference signal.

Declarer, Sabine Auken, was at the crossroads. Her opponents, who numbered among the cream of the world's players, were well capable of psychic signaling. Auken reasoned that if West held the club king in addition to her spade honors, she might have made a simple overcall rather than a weak jump.

Additionally, rising with the ace, then discovering later that the club king was onside, could cost heavily in the scoring (which was closer to pairs than teams). Moreover, nobody likes to concede a psychological edge in this way. So South inserted her queen, West captured it, and believing that there were no further plain-suit defensive tricks to come, returned another spade.

This proffered ruff and discard was the killer defense. If declarer ruffed low in dummy or discarded, East would ruff in with the nine, forcing South's king and ensuring that his queen would score a trick. And if declarer ruffed with the diamond jack, East would discard, establishing a trump trick for himself.
