# Area's only homeless shelter continues to meet demands

Maria Knada of Twin Falls never thought she would be homeless.

# Sarah **Johnson** returns to court

Convicted killer seeks new criminal trial

**By Bradley Guire** Times-News writer

Convicted killer Sarah Johnson returns to court Tuesday.

The 23-year-old former Bellevue resident who was found guilty of killing her father and stepmother in 2003 takes the next step in appealing her conviction by going to trial in civil court to ask for a new criminal trial. Attorney Christopher Simms is representing Johnson.

This civil post-conviction relief trial focuses on multiple allegations, including ineffective defense counsel during the original trial and evidence tampering.

Simms claims that Johnson's trial attorneys should have requested a continuance to gather more evidence from the crime scene, should have estab-

lished the scientific basis for a blood-spatter experiment, didn't present expert testimony about bed linens that Diane Johnson was found in,



didn't adequately cross-examine 15 witnesses, and didn't inquire about the freshness of fingerprints not belonging to Johnson found on the murder weapon, scope, ammunition and doorknobs.

The sixth issue presents new evidence that, according to court documents, the alleged owner of those fingerprints is Christopher Kevin Hill, who is without an alibi for the murder

Simms declined to comment for this story. Blaine County Prosecutor Jim Thomas could not be reached for comment.

Johnson was convicted in 2005 and unsuccessfully appealed to the Idaho Supreme Court. Justices ruled to uphold the conviction in June 2008. Johnson then appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court, which declined to hear the matter.

In 2009, attorneys alleged bias by the original judge, Barry Wood. He was not replaced on

# **Wood River residents react** to 4-way stop at Timmerman

# Roundabout possible future solution

BELLEVUE -Magic Valley residents headed to Sun Valley to ski this winter the brakes as they descend Timmerman Hill.

The Idaho Transportation Department plans to install four stop signs at the intersection of Idaho Highway 75 and U.S. Highway 20 to try to stymie an increasing number of serious accidents.

The stop signs could be erected within a couple of weeks if the weather dries out, allowing the snow at the intersection to recede so workers can figure out where the signs need to be. It could take a few months if snowstorms pile up, said ITD spokesman Nathan Jerke.

Warning beacons and rumble strips will also be applied to Idaho 75.

The stop signs are a temporary fix until the department finds a better solution. Terke said a stop sign or traffic light would reduce accidents by half. A \$2 million roundabout, which would require vehicles to yield to drivers already in the circle, would reduce accidents by more than 70 percent, he said. The roundabout, which is the department's preferred option, would also cut injury accidents by 87 percent.

Installing a signal takes two to three years to design and fund since every intersection is different, said

### Small plane crashes into neighborhood in Roy, Utah

ROY, Utah (AP) - A small plane has crashed into a house in Roy, Utah, setting that home and at least two others on fire.

Roy Police Chief Greg Whinham tells *The Salt* Lake Tribune that no one died in the Sunday evening crash, but the pilot was "severely" injured.

The small plane was flying toward the Ogden-Hinckley Airport when it began hitting utility poles and trees and then crashed into a home. Roy is about 30 miles north of Salt Lake City. Whinham says all the

neighborhood's residents have been accounted for, and no one but the pilot is reported to be injured. KSL-TV reports the pilot was the only person in the plane.

Residents near the crash site have been asked to evacuate to a church. The cause of the crash has

not yet been determined. Whinham tells the Tribune the aircraft was badly damaged but appears to be a small, noncommercial plane.

# Utah lawmaker says he'll pay fine for misspending

The Salt Lake Tribune reported Sunday that legislative candidates spent \$1 of every \$5 they raised this year on themselves or friends despite restrictions in a new law.

Rep. Paul Ray, R-Clearfield, told the newsreimburse his campaign account for spending \$128 to take his family to the Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Ray – a former circus performer himself - said Ringling Brothers used to give legislators two free tickets but stopped when the Legislature adopted the limits on personal use of campaign donations.

The law's sponsor, Rep. Tim Cosgrove, D-Murray, said it put a stop to legislators' reimbursing themselves for the loss of a salary during the annual lawmaking session, or pocketing the leftover contributions at retirement. It also appears to have stopped candidates buying or fixing cars with campaign money.

The measure bans spending on clothing, rent, sporting or artistic events, cars and travel, but allows exceptions when those expenditures are made for a political or official purpose.

That means Rep. Mike Noel, R-Kanab, probably didn't violate the law by spending \$3,490 from his campaign to rent an apartment in Salt Lake City during the last session, Cosgrove told the newspa-

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) R-Orem, could make a case A Utah legislator used for spending \$234 to buy campaign donations to take freeway express lane passes, while Rep. Neal Hendrickson, D-West Valley City, can spend \$122 on dry cleaning, Cosgrove said.

"If you really want to find a loophole, you probably can." Cosgrove said. "But I think it is important that we are as conscientious with money from campaign donors as we are with money from taxpayers. It was given to help our campaigns, and it should be used for that?"

Pre-election disclosure paper he will pay a fine and reports show that legislative candidates spent a combined \$2.5 million on their campaigns.

Most of the donations legislators receive are from special interests. The Salt Lake Tribune calculated that \$19 of every \$20 candidates raised came from corporations, political action committees, parties, lobbyists, other politicians, individuals outside of lawmakers' districts or lawmakers' own pockets.



# 92-year-old Sailor remembers Pearl Harbor attack 69 years ago

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii - The morning of Dec. 7, 1941, Yeoman 2nd Class Durrell Conner was wrapping Christmas presents aboard the USS California when he heard a commotion. Peering through a porthole of the battleship, the 23-year-old saw an airplane approaching

"He dropped something, and as he banked away I saw the red emblem of the Japanese on his wings so I knew we were under attack?' Conner said. "He dropped the torpedo that struck the ship right below where I was standing?

The battleship shook like an earthquake, and the cryptographer rushed to his battle station where he coded and decoded messages for the California's commander. Since no messages were coming in, he joined a chain passing ammunition to Marines and sailors firing guns on the deck.

Another Japanese plane dropped a 500-pound bomb on the California, sinking the ship. The vessel lost nearly 100 of its 1,800 officers and

On Tuesday, Conner plans to return to Pearl Harbor along with about 120 other survivors for a ceremony in remembrance of those who died in the Japanese attack 69 years ago. About 580 family and friends are due to join them, as are several hundred

members of the public. The Navy and the National ing back for a while. Park Service are jointly hosting the event at a grassy site across the harbor from the sunken hull of the USS Arizona, where 1,177 lives were lost. In all, some 2,400 sailors, Marines and soldiers were killed in the attack.

Conner, 92, attended the annual remembrance for the first time last year with his daughter.



# Fixing Idaho's emergency medical services mess

daho's first responders come from a jumble of private companies, cities and counties, ambulance and fire districts - and 2,700 volunteers. These agencies and personalities often don't cooperate, leading to duplication and gaps in service.

Why should you care? Because minutes count if you've been injured in a car wreck or suffered a heart attack.

The Legislature's Office of Performance Evaluations released a report on the issue last week, with some concerete suggestions that lawmakers should take seriously.

Turf wars have gotten so bad that when Ada County passed an ordinance in 2007 to regulate emergency medical services in the county and set standards for those services, it also sued the Kuna Fire Distict for expanding its level of service without the county's permission. The court sided with the fire district, and told the county that under current laws, it couldn't regulate the services in cities or other governmental subdivisions within the county, just in between them.

That's crazy, and it puts lives in jeopardy.

The OPE report's recommendations call for a new framework for EMS, based around countywide EMS systems that leave no gaps in coverage. It also suggests establishing local or regional governing authorities and a medical director to coordinate the local systems; an increased role for the Idaho Emergency Medical Services Bureau, which does the licensing; and revisions in the funding structure for EMS.

That will be no easy task. There are about 200 licensed EMS agencies in Idaho with roughly 4,500 emergency medical workers.

History has shown these stakeholders are unlikely to coordinate their efforts unless the state insists upon it. As the OPE pointed out, somebody has to be in charge.

# Don't fall for the campaign to slash Social Security benefits

According to a recent CNN poll, 60 percent of Americans under 60 and 70 percent of those under 50 believe that Social Security will not be able to pay them a benefit when they retire.

In reality, the likelihood that any living American's Social Security benefits will not be paid to them when they retire is about the same as the probability that there will be no U.S. government at that time.

Is anybody banking on that? Of course if you are going to take something away from people, the first step is to convince them that it wasn't really there in the first place.


What makes the whole deception even more fascinating is that everyone is using the same assumptions about the future and the same numbers.

The common source for everyone writing and talking about Social Security is the annual Social Security Trustees Report. This shows that the program can pay all promised benefits for the next 27 years, without any changes at all. If nothing is done over the next 27 years, only about 75 percent of scheduled benefits would be payable in 2037; but that would still be more than what retirees receive today, after adjusting for inflation.

So, according to the assumptions and facts that everyone who writes or talks about Social Security is using, there is no basis for the belief that the majority of Americans under 60

What makes this subterfuge unique is that it is all based on verbal and accounting trickery.

For example, it is common to combine Social Security and Medicare spending and say that their costs will become unsustainable. The trick here is that it is Medicare, not Social Security, that leads to the explosion in public spending.

And perhaps more important: it is not the aging population or Medicare itself that is the problem, but the United States' private-sector health care costs. If these were in line with any other highincome country such as Germany or Canada, our long-term budget deficit would turn into a surplus.

ers try to weasel their way around this too by pretending that the Social Security Trust Fund - currently at more than \$2.5 trillion doesn't exist. But the Treasury obligations held by the Trust Fund are as real as the U.S. government bonds held by any private mutual or pension fund, or the tendollar bill in your wallet.

Of course all this deception would not be possible if the media did its job and reported the basic facts — as when someone says President Obama is a Muslim, the media notes that he is a Christian. Of course, some people will still believe whatever, but we wouldn't have a majority lost in the fog on this issue.

This huge scam is the most obvious reason to reject any benefit cuts to Social Security - including raising the retirement age. This is a very regressive cut that hurts lower-income workers the most, since many have jobs that are too physically demanding to work longer; and since their life expectancy has not increased along with that of higher-income employees.

We need at least a decade just to inform the public of the basic facts, before we can decide how to make the relatively small adjustments that Social Security may need to maintain long-term solvency.

This is not the time to build gyms but rather a time to be concerned with classroom size and availability of studentteacher contact. 

# Hundreds attend Wisconsin hostage taker's memorial

MARINETTE, Mich. Hundreds of people showed up Sunday for a memorial to a 15-year-old Wisconsin boy who held his social studies class hostage before shooting himself last week, setting aside the terrifying standoff to honor him as a quiet, helpful leader who loved the outdoors.

Sam Hengel's family held the gathering in a school auditorium in Menominee, Mich., because they expected so many supporters. Menominee lies just across the Menominee River from Marinette, Wis., where Hengel held 26 classmates and his teacher at gunpoint for nearly six hours.

Barb Post of Marinette, Wis., said she didn't know Hengel's family but attended anyway to show support.

"You care about the people and the family, and you understand it could happen to anybody," Post said.

Why Hengel took his class hostage remains a mystery. Other students and his teacher have said he was well-liked and had many friends.

The standoff last Monday at Marinette High School began when Hengel returned projector. Students talked to

The standoff dragged on for four more hours, with teacher Valerie Burd acting as a go-between for Hengel and police.

A SWAT team stormed the room after Hengel fired three shots about 8 p.m., destroying the classroom phone and hitting a computer. Hengel shot himself as officers reached him. He died the next morning.

CUERNAVACA, Mexico (AP) - A 14-year-old boy accused of participating in first name only - Edgar. four beheadings for a Mexican drug cartel will be tried under a Friday he was kidnapped at the state juvenile law and will age of 11 and forced to work for receive only three years in the cartel. prison if convicted, a judge said Sunday.

The judge in the state of Morelos made the ruling after a daylong hearing on whether the federal government should handle the case because of the gravity of the allegations against the boy, known as "El Ponchis."

Authorities say they arrested him Thursday at an airport south of Mexico City with a 19-year-old sister who is accused of helping him dump bodies. Mexican officials allege the boy was working for the Cartel of the South Pacific, a branch of the splintered Beltran Leyva gang.

Many youths have been used by drug cartels in their bloody battles against the government and each other, but the story of El Ponchis may be the most shocking. A YouTube video that emerged a month ago sparked talk of a child hit man - said by some to be as young as 12.

"I participated in four executions, but I did it drugged and under threat that if I didn't, they would kill me," the boy said when he was handed over to the federal prosecutor Friday morning.

TEHRAN, Iran - Iran delivered a resolute message Sunday on the eve of talks with six world powers: We're mining our own uranium now, so forget about stopping our nuclear ambi-



# OVERDOSE PANGER

Study: Instructions, measuring devices for liquid medications are often inconsistent

OS ANGELES — Many over-the-counter, liquid medications meant for children contain dosing instructions and measuring cups or droppers that rarely match each other and could confuse even the most careful parent or caretaker, according to a new study. This could easily lead to under- or over-dosing, researchers said.

The study, released online in the Journal of the American Medical Association, examined popular liquid cough, cold, allergy and stomach medications as well as painkillers and fever reducers, all for children younger than 12 years old.

More than one quarter of the 200 products examined failed to include a measuring device, such as cup, dropper or oral syringe. Of those that did, nearly all contained at least one inconsistency between the printed dosing instructions and the device. One example: a label that called for one-teaspoon doses packaged with a measuring cup marked in milliliter units.

"To see how common the mismatch was in this study was startling," said Dr. Darren A. DeWalt, an associate professor of internal medicine and pediatrics at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, who wrote an editorial accompanying the study. "It's not only confusing information, it's almost not intelligible at times."

In the study, researchers led by a team at the New York University School of Medicine and Bellevue Hospital Center reviewed the 200 topselling pediatric, oral, liquid, over-the-counter medications.

Of the 148 products that contained a measuring device, almost 99 percent contained at least one inconsistency between the directions and the device. Twenty-four percent of the devices lacked the necessary markings to pour the correct dose. Slightly more than 81 percent had superfluous markings, such as ones for doses that were beyond what would be prescribed.

Units of measurement varied from product to product: 72 percent used milliliters, 78 percent used teaspoons, 19 percent used tablespoons and 6 percent used nonstandard units of measurement such as drams or cubic centimeters. There were nonstandard abbreviations ("tsps" instead of "tsp" for teaspoon) and undefined abbreviations. Five products did not place a zero before decimal points — writing .5 instead of 0.5 — a practice that can cause a 10-fold overdose, the authors said.

"We found problems with inconsistency across all product types and manufacturers," said Dr. H. Shonna Yin, co-author of the study and an assistant professor of pediatrics at New York University School of Medicine. "This is a pervasive problem. Instructions should be patient-centered and easy to understand. They should help parents give medications."

The study did not address product quality; strict Food and Drug Administration rules govern the safety and effectiveness of medications as well as how the drugs are manufactured, packaged and shipped, and their shelf life.

"There is a tremendous amount of science that is brought to bear when it comes to the chemistry of the product;" said Laura Bix, an associate professor at Michigan State University who studies the interaction between people and product packages. "Sadly, we don't bring that level of science to understanding the interaction between the person and the package!"

Regulations also dictate the information required on product labels, said Bix, who was not involved in the study. However, little attention has been paid to how consumers use the products, she said.

Although dosing errors with these products are rarely harmful, under-dosing can mean a child is not getting relief from pain or other symptoms, DeWalt said. And dangers do exist: Several days of over-dosing with products that contain acetaminophen, for example, can result in serious liver damage.

The study took place before a November 2009 FDA release of voluntary guidelines for manufacturers aimed at reducing dosing errors. These recommendations address many of the problems identified in the study. But, said Yin: "It's unlikely voluntary guidance will be able to solve the problem ... data shows how big this problem is."

It would seem a simple thing to give a child a medication, but not in the case of an exhausted mother trying to read the product directions while the toddler is wailing from his ear infection and other children demand equal attention, Bix said.

"There are all kinds of things that make dosing in a home environment difficult," Bix said. "Parents need to take a breath, read the label and make sure you understand it."

Mismatch no surprise to Magic Valley moms

hildren's medicine dosing instructions are confusing? No kidding, say Magic Valley moms.

Researchers at the New York University School of Medicine and Bellevue Hospital Center found that the majority of over-the-counter liquid children's medications contain confusing or contradictory instructions. That's no surprise to some south-central Idaho parents, who are familiar with inconsistencies and confusing wording on children's medication dosing instructions.

Twin Falls mom Mandi Thompson recently bought a bottle of acetaminophen marketed for infants. When she read the back of the bottle, she found instructions to consult a doctor for children younger than 2 years old.

Aren't infants, by definition, younger than 2?
Thompson was lucky — she had a height and weight chart from her child's pediatrician to outline how much she should give. But other parents might not be as prepared.

"You're at home and it's the middle of the night and your child's sick and you need to know what to give them," Thompson said. "Unless you have previously gotten a dosing chart from your doctor, you have to guess."

Twin Falls mom Danielle Hardesty found a similar discrepancy on a bottle of children's medicine. The instructions gave doses in chart form for both height and weight. The problem with that, Hardesty said, is children of the same age can vary wildly in size.

"It's like, which one do you follow?"
Hardesty said. "Do you follow the weight? Do you follow the age?"

Hardesty also hates how thick the liquid medications are. That makes it hard to measure out the right dose, she said.

After hearing about the study, Ida McAlister of Jerome said she might use different spoons to measure medicine for her granddaughters.

"You've got to be sure that your kids are not

# How to know if you have sleep apnea

If you snore, sleep an inordinate amount of time during the day, or experience any number of seemingly unrelated physical and emotional signs, you may need more than a warm glass of milk at bedtime and an earplugs-wearing bedmate. You may have a sleep disorder such as sleep apnea, in which you stop breathing throughout sleep.

"Sleep apnea is implicated in cardiovascular diseases, vascular diseases, endocrinological diseases Lee, medical director of the Sleep and Breathing Disorder Center at UT Medical Southwestern Center at Dallas.

"The best way to think of it is this: When patients have sleep apnea, there's a narrowing of airways, which causes no airflow and therefore no oxygen is delivered to the lungs. We see a significant drop in oxygen levels. Sometimes the levels may be in the 95 percent range and during an obstructive event, drop to 75. It causes the patients to wake up to open their airways. I have some who stop breathing 100 times per hour. I'm flabbergasted, blown away."

Apnea and other sleep disorders can be diagnosed in a sleep lab, where patients spend one to two nights being observed. Treatment is often nightly use of a machine called the CPAP (continuous positive airway pressure).

"The beauty of my job and profession is when you put patients on CPAP, it markedly improves their oxygen level," he says. "It's literally night and day between before and after ... they feel more refreshed and clearly this has benefits, time after time. Treating improves their neuro-cognitive function. It helps support the importance of the quality of sleep overall, plus I'm sure they're more pleasant to be

Go slow. Make one small change at a time over a period of weeks. As your taste buds adapt, gradually add in more vegetables, fruit and seafood.

Stay away from plain. Don't start off with a plate of raw broccoli. Instead, mix pureed or diced vegetables into foods you already like, such as macaroni and cheese, meatloaf, chili, seasoned noodles, sauces, soups or baked goods.

Use flavoring. Vegetables can taste much better with some herbs and spices. Cajun seasoning healthy dips such as hummus — or simply grilled with a little salt, pepper and garlic. Go for a known favorite; if you like Asian cuisine, for example, cook with a teriyaki glaze.

Experiment with cooking **time ...** You may remember your childhood vegetables as a mushy heap. Texture can matter as much as taste: If the same food is firmer or cut into smaller pieces, it may be much more appeal-

... and fresh, frozen or **canned.** Frozen or canned vegetables can be just as healthy as fresh but taste better to you. Just watch the salt and sugar content.

Be adventurous. Every time you go to the grocery store, buy one fruit or vegetable you've never tried before. You're likely to stumble on a new favorite.

Give fish a chance. Different types of fish don't taste the same; some are much less "fishy" than others. Milder forms include tilapia, cod and flounder. Ask your store's seafood department for recommendations.

Be patient. Children often won't accept a new food until they've tried it eight or nine times, and the same may be true of grown-ups.

The condition often goes undiagnosed for years — it's estimated that a third of the cases of high blood sugar are untreated in the U.S. which means Type 2's can have more complications, including high blood pres-

disease and stroke. It's possible for Type 2's to reduce their insulin resistance, usually though lifestyle changes such as diet and exercise and medication. In some cases, they can reverse the onset of diabetes altogether, if it's caught early.

Those genetically predisposed to Type 2 may even be able to stave it off. "There's a lock and a key," said obesity specialist David Edelson, an assistant clinical professor of medicine at Albert College Einstein Medicine. "The key is a bad lifestyle that leads to weight into the cells where it can be gain around the gut," said





The Idaho Housing and Finance Association ("IHFA") is implementing a new installment of its Mortgage Credit Certificate Program under Section 25 of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"). A Mortgage Credit Certificate ("MCC") reduces the amount of Federal income tax a qualified home buyer pays by providing a tax credit. Consequently, the home buyer has more disposable income to make loan payments. After all other credits and deductions are taken into account, the value of the MCC is applied directly to the home buyer's remaining Federal tax liability. The amount of the credit may not exceed a taxpayer's total tax liability for a specific year, however, any excess credit may be carried forward to a subsequent tax year

for up to three years.

Additional issuance of MCCs is expected to begin in mid March, 2011 for mortgage loans made at that time. MCCs will be made available to eligible home buyers on a first-come, first-served basis and may be used to purchase newly constructed housing, existing housing, or manufactured housing on owner occupied lots. An MCC cannot be issued to a home buyer who is refinancing an existing mortgage.

refinancing an existing mortgage.

The amount of the credit under the proposed program will be twenty percent (20%) of the yearly interest paid on a qualified mortgage with an annual credit maximum of \$2,000 for the eligible borrower. At least 20% of the amount issued is reserved for MCC's for mortgage loans on single family residences located in targeted counties. A list of targeted counties is available at IdaMortgage.com.

Present IHFA and Federal regulations require borrowers to meet the certain requirements to be eligible for an MCC including the following, unless IHFA is advised that less restrictive limits can legally be authorized:

1. The borrower must be a first-time home owner, except in the 27 targeted counties. A first-time home owner is defined as a household that has not owned a principal residence for a period of three (3) years prior to the date of executing the MCC-assisted mortgage loan.

2. A borrower with a family of three or more persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 115% of the applicable area median family income, while a borrower with a family of one or two persons must have an annual gross income not exceeding 100% of the applicable area median family income, except that higher family income limits may be adopted for targeted counties. A list of the current income limits is available at IdaMortgage.com.

3. The borrower must purchase a single family residence, in

Idaho, and occupy the housing unit as a principal residence.

4. The borrower must purchase a single family residence with an acquisition cost which does not exceed 90% of the average area purchase price applicable to such residence, except that the acquisition cost may be 110% of the average area purchase price in targeted counties. A list of these purchase price limits can be found at IdaMortgage.com.

5. The borrower must acquire a new mortgage or home loan and meet the credit and underwriting criteria established by the participating lender who provides the mortgage loan. Refinancing of an existing mortgage or land contract is not

permissible.
These eligibility requirements and the then current numeric values will be printed and distributed to the public in a Program brochure on Program implementation and will be available online at IdaMortgage.com. The eligibility requirements will not exceed, but may be lower than, the most recently published figures for applicable area median family income and average area purchase price which have been published by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Department of Treasury.

MCCs may be used in conjunction with any privately insured or uninsured fixed rate or adjustable rate loan and such loans are expected to be purchased by IHFA from funds which are not derived from mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code. A home buyer may make application for an MCC, through a participating lender or a participating mortgage broker, at the time of loan application. A list of such lenders and mortgage brokers will be available online at IdaMortgage.com. MCCs cannot be used with any mortgage loans supported by mortgage revenue bonds under Section 143 of the Code.

Banks, savings and loan associations, mortgage companies, and other approved financing institutions are invited to participate as lenders. Any lender who wishes to participate will be required to sign a Lender Agreement, which outlines the lender's review and reporting responsibilities. IHFA's list of participating lenders is available at IdaMortgage.com.

Each borrower may be charged up to \$500 as a MCC processing fee.

### THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"We should never despair. Our situation before has been unpromising and has changed for the better; so I trust, it will again."

Occasionally, the world of bridge problems smacks of artificiality. Sometimes, however, you can identify the only chance of bringing home a contract or of defeating it. In that instance, when playing teams or rubber bridge. you are generally justified in going for that chance no matter how slim it may be.

Take today's deal, where you lead the spade five against three no-trump and dummy's queen wins the first trick. Partner follows with a low card, which it is sensible to play as an attitude signal, denying the jack. Had dummy won the trick with the jack or a lower card, partner would have signaled count because his attitude was already defined by his inability to beat dummy's card.

Declarer now continues with the club king (partner plays the nine), which you duck, and the club queen (partner playing the six), which you win perforce.

Your partner's high-low in clubs shows an even number, here surely a doubleton, so you can work out without too much trouble that declarer has nine tricks (four clubs, two spades and three hearts), unless you can come to five tricks immediately.

Your only chance will come from diamonds, but declarer will simply follow low from dummy if you shift to a small diamond, and the danger will be past. Therefore, you must switch to the diamond queen, hoping to make four diamond tricks. This needs a fairly specific holding in your partner's hand, but as the cards lie, your luck will be in today.

ANSWER: Does this double call for the lead of dummy's first-bid suit (not likely here), or for an unusual lead, or for the normal lead? All three interpretations are possible, but since you would have led a spade without the double, it is best to interpret the double as calling for the lead of partner's second suit — surely diamonds. So lead the diamond nine.

sives-laden French cargo ship collided with a Norwegian vessel at the harbor in Halifax, Nova Scotia, setting off a blast that devastated the city. In 1922, the Irish Free State came into being under

terms of the Anglo-Irish Treaty. In 1947, Everglades National Park in Florida was dedicated by President

Harry S. Truman. In 1957, America's first attempt at putting a satellite into orbit failed as Vanguard TV3 rose about four feet off a Cape Canaveral launch pad before crashing down and exploding.

In 1969, a free concert by The Rolling Stones at the Altamont Speedway in Alameda County, Calif., was marred by the deaths of four people, including one who was stabbed by a Hell's

Angel. **In 1989,** 14 women were shot to death at the University of Montreal's school of engineering by a man who then took his own life

Ten years ago: Florida Republican leaders announced the Legislature would convene in special session to appoint its own slate of electors in the state's contested presidential race; Democrats denounced the idea. U.S. businessman Edmond Pope was sentenced to 20 years imprisonment by a Moscow court for espionage; however, Pope was pardoned by Russian President Vladimir Putin and released eight days after his sentencing. Actor Werner Klemperer died in New York at age 80.

Five years ago: Two women detonated explosives in a classroom filled with students at Baghdad's police academy, killing 27 people. An Iranian military transport plane crashed in a Tehran suburb as it was trying to make an emergency landing, killing at least 115 people, including 21 on the ground. Sami Al-Arian, a former Florida professor accused of helping lead a terrorist group that carried out suicide bombings against Israel, was acquitted on nearly half the charges against him by a federal court jury in Tampa, Fla.; the jury deadlocked on the other charges. Philadelphia won the first NHL scoreless game that was decided by a shootout, beating Calgary

One year ago: President Barack Obama visited the U.S. Senate during a rare Sunday session to rally Democrats behind closed doors on a health care overhaul. The Kennedy Center Honors lauded jazz great Dave Brubeck, rocker Bruce Springsteen, actor Robert De Niro, comic genius Mel Brooks and opera singer Grace Bumbry. North Carolina won its second straight NCAA women's soccer championship with a 1-0 win over Stanford in the Women's College Cup final.


