Lawmaker wants openness for tax settlements

An Ada County lawmaker wants to shine the spotlight of transparency into what's traditionally a concealed corner of the state's affairs.

Rep. Grant Burgoyne, D-Boise, says he wants to make more public the compromise settlements that

the State Tax Commission makes with individuals and businesses that end up paying less than what they owe.

His interest in proposing legislation on the issue comes after Rep. Shirley Ringo, D-Moscow, sued the tax commission. Ringo's lawsuit, with sworn affidavits from eight current or former state tax auditors, alleges a pattern of favor-

able deals for well-collected individuals and businesses that cost state taxpayers millions.

The lawsuit, dismissed in November, still continues as a separate case with new plaintiffs that include the Idaho Education Association, University of Idaho professors and other individuals.

"I think we could shine more sunshine on the settlements," said

Burgoyne, a member of the House Revenue and Taxation committee.

For example, making the names of businesses or individuals receiving the settlements a matter of public record would go a long way to improve transparency and ensure that the system is fair for all, he said. Currently, the names are not a public record.

"I think we need to make sure

that the settlements are accessible to the public in a meaningful way so a taxpayer who's got a tax issue can look at the record of tax settlements and know whether the tax commission is treating them fairly," he said. "The other thing is we need to be very sure that the tax commission is not doing anything

Chamber cuts ribbon days before alternate route's opening

The handful of cars and SUVs that streamed across the almost-completed Rock Creek Bridge on Wednesday were among the first in 15 months, and likely the last for at least the next couple of days.

The Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce hosted a ribbon-cutting on the bridge Wednesday, a slightly premature celebration for the completion of the U.S. Highway 93 Alternate Route. Idaho Transportation Department officials said, weather permitting, the road should be open to the public by early next week at

the latest, months ahead of its spring deadline.

"This is incredible to finally have done," said ITD District Engineer Devin Rigby. "You look at it now and you kind of forget all the challenges that we faced."

Striping the bridge and putting up about 70 signs for the alternate route are about all the work that's left, said ITD spokesman Nathan Jerke.

Chamber CEO and President Shawn Barigar heralded the project as something that helped stimulate the local economy — the project's \$26.6 million came from the federal

Johnson wasn't sole suspect

Sheriff, detective deny claims that other leads weren't pursued

Blaine County Sheriff Walt Femling testified Wednesday that he didn't immediately single out Sarah Johnson as the sole suspect in her parents' 2003 murder. One of his former detectives took the stand and backed him up.

Femling and Ketchum Police Chief Steve Harkins said investigators followed many leads at the scene of the Bellevue double homicide, many of which were provided by Johnson.

"On that particular day, I didn't know who did it," Femling said in Twin Falls County 5th District Court. "I was far from being able to say who did this crime."

Femling provided the bulk of testimony on the second day of Johnson's bid for post-conviction relief. Johnson, 23, alleges that ineffective defense led to her 2005 conviction and seeks to be retried for the murders.

Christopher Simms, Johnson's state-appointed appellate lawyer, stated during opening arguments on Tuesday that police identified Johnson, then 16, as the suspect within 90 minutes of arriving at the crime scene and that she was "relentlessly prosecuted to the exclusion of other suspects."

Femling said his initial focus

Small-power debate could again shut down development

With more groups developing sources of renewable energy, Idaho utilities are arguing that you can have too much of a good thing.

Idaho Power Co. has joined with Avista Utilities and PacifiCorp in asking the Idaho Public Utilities Commission to review their requirement to buy power from qualified small producers, specifically wind farms. In the meantime, the utility companies want to reduce the amount of energy that they must buy at rates guaranteed under the Public Utility Regulatory

Policies Act.

The PUC requires utility companies to pay PURPA rates on up to a cap of 10 megawatts per month from any qualified energy producer. The utilities want to reduce the cap to a hundredth of what it is now. The rate is based on the price of natural gas, so it's usually more than the cost to produce renewable energy. That means utilities pay a bit more and small producers turn a profit.

There is a precedent for such a reduction. The PUC approved the same drop to 100 kilowatts in 2005, when the utilities disputed the cost of integrating projects such as wind that cannot provide a constant supply of

power. The reduction remained in place for close to three years.

"(The 2005 case) addressed a lot of issues that set the groundwork on how to handle small-wind development," said PUC spokesman Gene Fadness. "Since much of that ground has already been plowed, I don't anticipate that this case will take as long."

The reduced power cap will become effective Tuesday, if approved, though the PUC won't decide that until at least late January. Public comment will be accepted on both the proposal and whether the cap should apply only to wind projects. Mark Stokes,

power supply planning manager for Idaho Power, said there are other issues being addressed that apply to all PURPA producers, so the utilities want the cap to apply to all.

Bob Joblin doesn't favor that. Joblin heads AgPower, the company that's developing an anaerobic digester at Double A Dairy near Jerome that will produce 4.5 MW. Since the PURPA process has already begun between AgPower and Idaho Power, the Double A facility won't be affected. But Joblin was considering building more in the area.

Driver hits sheep west of Gooding

Idaho State Police are investigating a Monday incident in which a semi-trailer hit nearly 160 sheep near the city of Gooding.

At about 2:20 p.m., Ralph Ward, 63, of Dietrich, was westbound on U.S. Highway 26 in foggy weather when he came upon vehicles stopped in the road near milepost 146, about four miles west of Gooding.

Driving a 1993 White-GMC commercial tractor and pulling two trailers, he

wasn't able to stop in time and swerved into the east-bound lane to avoid the vehicles, according to ISP.

As a result, Ward collided with 159 sheep owned by Faulkner Land and Livestock that were being herded east in that lane of travel on the highway. Ward himself was not injured, and flaggers who were providing traffic control for the herders also escaped injury.

Ward was cited for inattentive driving. ISP is continuing to investigate the crash.

was on determining what happened at the scene — that Alan and Diane Johnson were victims of murder, not murder-suicide — and that someone familiar with the residence likely committed the crime. Investigators' initial interest in Sarah Johnson was as a witness, Femling said.

Femling said a former housekeeper was located and interviewed as a suspect. He also said investigators, including Harkins, looked

into Bruno Santos, Johnson's then-boyfriend, after learning of a previous confrontation between Santos and Johnson's father.

"He was investigated," Harkins said. "Santos was a suspect."

During cross-examination by Idaho Deputy Attorney General Jessica Lorell, Femling testified that investigators also questioned a man renting a guest house from the Johnson family.

Santos, currently in Blaine County's custody as he awaits two trials on drug trafficking charges, is expected to

take the stand today, although it's unlikely he will do anything other than cite his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination.

Simms also played audio of officers responding to the

scene from an Idaho State Police dashboard camera. The audio had not been admitted as evidence by Johnson's defense attorneys in 2005.

Today, Simms will play an audio recording from an interview with Christopher Kevin Hill, whose fingerprints were allegedly discovered on the scope of the murder weapon. Authorities had cleared Hill of suspicion, accepting his explanation that he had handled the weapon long before Johnson's parents were killed. Hill is scheduled to testify in court today.

stimulus program — and will provide another route for local manufacturers to get their wares.

W.W. Clyde & Co. of Springville, Utah, is the project's contractor.

"It's going to be a great new addition to Twin Falls," Barigar told the crowd, dot-

is a decade old — but it would probably be a safe assumption that the 9,000 cars that drove the route before its construction will start doing so again. It should also pull some trucks from Blue Lakes Boulevard after word about it re-opening gets out, Jerke said.

imprudent in settling tax cases. We have tremendous budget problems?"

Burgoyne stressed that while he doesn't know if the allegations in the lawsuit are true, the current system has room for improvement regardless.

"I'm just saying it means that there's a very strong potential for two taxpayers in the same situation to be treated differently," he said. "That undermines the integrity of the tax system we have."

Besides potentially harming taxpayers, the system also could make business competition unequal if one business gets a tax break that others do not, Burgoyne said. He added that any change would still need to protect proprietary trade secrets and personal information like Social Security numbers.

Privacy will likely be a big part of the debate.

House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, said that tax matters need to be arbitrated fairly, but also stressed that the privacy of individuals is important.

Senate President Pro Tempore Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, said legislation passed two years ago brought improvements to the tax commission system. Those changes included requiring the commission to file annual reports with the House and Senate committees that disclose amounts of compromises exceeding \$50,000, and clearer circumstances under which tax commissioners could approve compromise agreements.

Hill, who formerly chaired the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee, said he's open to proposals that would

improve the system. But he's also wary of making names of taxpayers a public record.

For example, a business owner contesting an unfair audit wouldn't want that information known, he said.

"Do you really want your customers, your relatives and your friends to have that as a matter of public record?" Hill asked.

"We like working up in Idaho," Joblin said. "But building costs money and if we couldn't get the rates, we'd have to go someplace else."

The utilities want this review to go forward because they're swamped by PURPA proposals. By law, they're required to buy power from all qualifying projects, but they argue some wind farms are really

too big to qualify.

PURPA was developed to support small renewable-power producers. But now, the utilities claim that PURPA is abused by large companies such as General Electric and BP, which are building 100- to 200-MW wind farms and then breaking them into 10-MW chunks to qualify.

Stokes said established PURPA wind farms can provide all the power needed by Idaho Power customers on low-demand days. While

that may sound good, Stokes said Idaho Power still produces power using dams and coal power, so it either has to sell the excess power at a loss or shut something down.

Stokes said Idaho Power can't easily sell power because its transmission system is ill-equipped for such power movement. Also, because the excess power occurs at low-demand times, no company needs to buy it.

"In my mind, that's the

bigger issue," Stokes said. "Continuing to bring on PURPA projects could potentially cost customers quite a bit more."

Nuclear summit begins dialogue

The U.S. push for nuclear power stalled 30 years ago. Now, some industry leaders are trying to get it back up to speed.

The Idaho National Laboratory and Third Way, a moderate think tank focused on energy and the economy, cosponsored the New Millennium Nuclear Energy Summit in Washington, D.C., on Tuesday. Hosted by U.S. Sens. George Voinovich, R-Ohio, and Tom Carper, D-Del., the bipartisan group of congressmen and industry representatives spent the morning discussing broad ideas for increasing nuclear power in the U.S.

"We play a role in supporting nuclear energy," said INL spokeswoman Nicole Stricker. "But the reason we got involved is because, as a research institution, we're seen as objective so we have some credibility."

U.S. Energy Secretary Steven Chu arrived from Cancun, Mexico, after having addressed the United Nations Climate Summit on the human contribution to carbon dioxide levels. Nuclear energy contributes no carbon emissions and would have been helped by this year's carbon-cap legislation, which Republicans rejected. So, many summit comments focused on incentives to help nuclear power overcome cheap power produced from emissions-filled natural gas.

U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, said nuclear power is necessary in order to slow climate change, so the nation needs direction on its nuclear policy.

U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, said wind and solar power have grabbed most national headlines. But it's nuclear power that will provide the baseload for the country, he said, and Idaho is well-positioned to lead the way.

Chu said the rest of the world is experiencing "a nuclear renaissance," while the U.S. lags behind with nuclear facilities built in the 1960s and 1970s. Chu added that any national power plan needs to be long-term.

"It's a 70-year decision," Chu said, according to a transcript of the event. "And so the question is, how do you make the right decisions on that appropriate time scale?"

Those right decisions involve education, financing, policy and manufacturing; the question is which comes first. Summit organizers split attendees into four working groups during the afternoon to tackle more specific aspects and find an answer.

"Tuesday wasn't meant to be the be-all and end-all," Stricker said. "It was meant to get the issue in front of people."

INL Director John Grossenbacher moderated the afternoon session on new nuclear technologies. Other sessions included financing, rebuilding infra-

structure and public-private partnerships. The report on the working groups' findings and any recommendations is due out in February.

"The point of the sessions was to identify the issues in each area that might be roadblocks," Stricker said. "We didn't know what they'd be so we told the working groups to figure out their own focus."

Risch representative Kyle Heintz said Risch will look for ways to support the nuclear industry in the next Congress. But because Democrats will still be in charge of the Senate, he won't propose any legislation in support of nuclear power.

"Nuclear power is clean energy that can support baseload needs, so the senator will continue to be actively involved in these meetings," Heintz said.

Audit good news for Filer

FILER — The city of Filer is in better financial condition than many small communities around the Magic Valley.

That was the annual audit opinion Filer City Council members heard Tuesday from Raymond Ware of Twin Falls-based accountants Ware and Associates.

"You want an unqualified opinion and that's what you received. We also evaluated

your internal controls, relating to the financial flow of information, and everything's in good shape," Ware said. "That qualified you for the \$1,961,000 in federal subsidies that flowed through here."

Ware also commended the city for maintaining a strong eight-month operating cash fund balance of \$462,000 over the past year.

"This is probably the best indicator of how the city is doing and your cash has

been steadily accumulating from \$700,000 up to \$1.2 million," he said "In reality, your costs are going up at about the same rate but things have been holding even since about 2005. As far as governmental funds, you're doing extremely well."

The city's percentage of uncollected or delinquent property taxes has increased as well, from 4 percent to 7.5 percent over the past three years, but the \$52,000 figure is still less than many other communi-

ties. Property taxes have represented between 23 percent and 25 percent of city revenue since 2008.

"This is nowhere near the 12 percent in some surrounding counties and Twin Falls is around 6 to 7 percent," Ware said. "When things get better you can probably expect things to drop down to the \$15,000 to \$20,000 range."

However, members voted to table any decisions until the Dec. 20 meeting.

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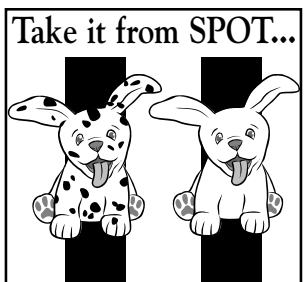

Curtailing speed best way to make Timmerman Junction safer

In all of Idaho, is there a more troublesome rural intersection than U.S. Highway 20 and Idaho Highway 75 in Blaine County?

Heavy traffic, poor visibility, excessive speed and lousy weather combine to make Timmerman Junction an accident waiting to happen.

The intersection, the site of at least two fatal collisions, saw 26 traffic accidents from 2000 through 2009. There have been at least three serious wrecks since June of this year.

To limit the risk, the Idaho Transportation Department plans to make Timmerman Junction — where traffic on Highway 20 must now stop — a four-way stop.

That’s a mistake, Blaine County Sheriff Walt Femling told the *Idaho Mountain Express* this week.

A four-way stop is likely to cause even more accidents, the sheriff said. Fog during the winter combined with traffic backups will cause collisions as drivers don’t expect to stop there, and that

exhaust from cars idling at the stop sign will make the road “unbearably slick,” according to Femling.

“There are going to be rear-end accidents,” he said.

ITD plans to keep the four-way stop in effect for two to five years while a design is developed and funding is found for a roundabout.

Roundabouts are rare in Idaho but common in much of the developed world. Built around a central circle, they’re designed to slow traffic and diffuse right-of-way conflicts. ITD reckons that a roundabout, which would require

vehicles to yield to drivers already in the circle, would cut accidents by more than 70 percent and injury accidents by 87 percent

In theory, roundabouts are safer than stop signs or traffic lights because rear-end collisions are less likely, although ITD believes either would curb accidents by half. By roundabouts are costly — \$2 million in the case of Timmerman Junction — and major construction projects are never simple in such an environmentally sensitive area. Any major work at Timmerman would require an environmental impact statement since the two highways sits on top of wetlands.

An advisory committee commissioned by ITD identified four major problems at the intersection: a skewed angle where the roads meet, a lack of warning signs on Highway 75, sign clutter and distractions on Highway 20 and worn rumble strips that have become ineffective. Most of those problems can be fixed, but ITD should consider another solution:

Further reduce the speed limit on Highway 20 and Highway 75 within a mile or two of the junction.

It’s no secret that too many drivers zipping through the Bellevue Triangle don’t slow down, which is why collisions at Timmerman Junction are often so serious. Forcing motorists to curtail their speed at a greater distance from the intersection might save some lives.

But some things no traffic controls can change. Femling is right: In wintertime, the southern edge of the Wood River Valley is a treacherous place to drive, with dense fog and black ice common. The only remedy for that is caution.

Our view:

Traffic controls can go only so far in reducing the risk at Timmerman Junction.

Obama needs a Big Idea — soon

Grow a spine. Flex some muscle. Man up!

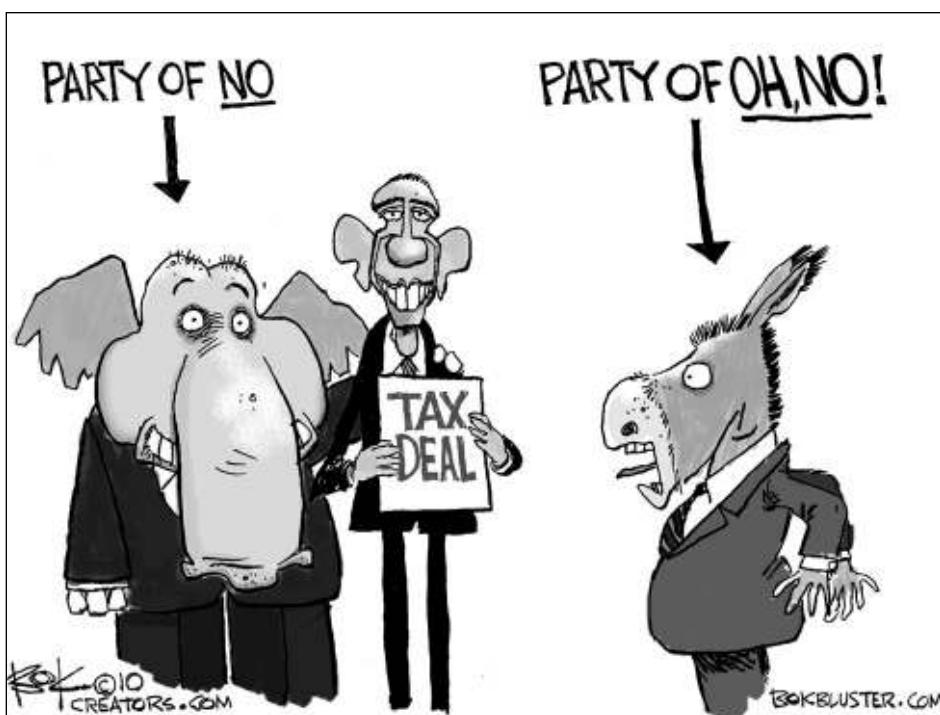
In Twitter-speak, the advice to President Obama from his disheartened liberal base is to bulk up on the political equivalent of steroids, something to make this most cerebral of presidents more ripped and less reserved. They want “Bring It On, the Sequel”: Let Republicans deny unemployment benefits for two million people at Christmastime while giving Mr. Potter and his ilk another tax break.

Then the president can get rid of “don’t ask, don’t tell” by executive order, just as Harry Truman integrated the armed forces. He can dare Republicans to dismantle a new health care law that prevents insurance companies from dropping people when they get sick. He can insist that the fledgling consumer protection bureau, the only bulwark in the federal government against predatory lenders and credit card carnivores, be fully funded and staffed.

Not. Gonna. Happen. One of the most revealing film clips from Obama’s past shows him at school when he became the first black president of a fractious Harvard Law Review. Young Obama, the college-age compromiser, looks eerily like middle-age Obama trying to be bipartisan at midterm. And there he was on Monday, giving in to tax cuts for all in return for a few favors for the middle class.

But if he can’t change his personal nature, he can change the master narrative of his presidency. To do that, he needs a Big Idea. One of the mystifying paradoxes of Obama is how this gifted writer, this eloquent communicator, has not been able to come up with a simple, overarching governing frame.

For Teddy Roosevelt, fighting monopoly capitalists at a time when the gap

between the rich and everyone else was almost as great as it is today, it was the Square Deal — leverage for the little guy. Franklin Roosevelt expanded his cousin’s social contract with the New Deal, which carried enough populist punch to help a New York politician with a moneyed accent win the heartland four times.

John F. Kennedy had his New Frontier — pitch-perfect for the strutting Jet Age. And Ronald Reagan countered middle-class anxiety with Morning in America. Bill Clinton found his footing after the Oklahoma City bombings, rallying the country to oppose the forces of hate.

Loser presidents, the single-termers, stand for nothing, but have opinions on everything. Think of Jimmy Carter or George H. W. Bush and only mush comes to mind.

The verdict on Obama is still out. His approval rating is in the mid-40s, not bad

for a man who took control during the worst economy since the Depression. Most polls have him higher than Clinton and Reagan at a similar time in office, and higher since the election revealed the heartless, corporate-owned face of his opposition. Truman’s party lost 55 seats in the House at midterm. Clinton gave up 54. They were dead men. One-termers. Until they weren’t.

Obama’s achievements — saving the auto industry, fixing much of the runaway financial sector, passing a health care law that, once fully understood, will be seen as historic — are not insignificant. They are monumental, even.

But presidents do not win their way into voters’ hearts with legislative triumphs. Most Americans don’t know that they got a one-time tax cut from Obama, or that the bailouts may end up making money for the Treasury. The near-term goals — a free-trade agreement with South Korea, a nuclear arms treaty with Russia — will do nothing to change views. Weekly up and down score sheets are for the political-industrial complex.

A Big Idea, understood by all, would provide a narra-

tive framework for the upcoming skirmishes with Republicans, whose only idea is to keep rich people from paying their fair share of taxes. That, and denying Obama a second term.

What may have lulled Obama into his thoughtful stupor was the historic magnitude of his election. Yet being the first black president is not an idea. Hope is not a theme. Change We Can Believe In is not a governing principle.

He hit a few good notes on Monday in his speech to college students in North Carolina. Evoking American motivation to greatness after the Soviet Union launched the Sputnik in 1957, Obama said, “Our generation’s Sputnik moment is next.” What’s needed, he said, is “to do what Americans have always been known for: building, innovating, making things.”

The words, the sentiment, the right impulses are all there in the White House. It’s up to the writer-president to put them together.

I have never liked the owner because of his prickly attitude. He has a better chance at winning *Time* magazine’s abrasive personality of the year before get-

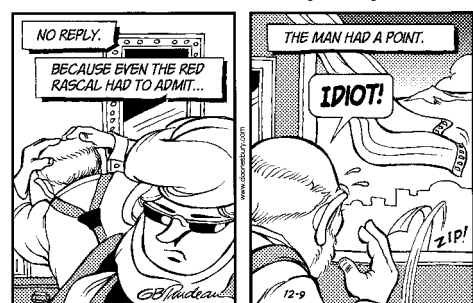
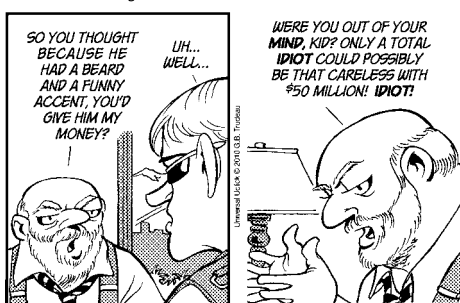

... they oughta know better

Idaho's Legislature whacks away at funding for higher education because the people serving in it are a bunch of hicks.

So goes the image. The truth is anything but. Which makes the latest round of cuts in higher education ... not to mention what's likely to come down the road ... all the more disconcerting.

The stereotype of Idaho lawmakers is tied to the natural resource economy of the past. Farmers, loggers and miners didn't get college degrees. They had time in the winter to commute to Boise for a little politicking.

There's also the fact that as a group, Idaho's collection of legislators is the second oldest in the nation. It doesn't mirror the current work force ... and even if it did, you wouldn't expect Idaho's legislators to be all that well educated. One in four Idaho workers has a four-year degree. The state has a tough time funneling its high school graduates into college and keeping them there.

Here's the surprise: The Legislature has more schooling than the people it serves. A lot more.

Relying on official biographies as well as information provided to Project Vote Smart, it turns out at least three-quarters of Idaho's 35 state senators have a four-year degree or better. Of the 70 House members, at least two-thirds have a four-year degree or more ... and Project Vote Smart lacks biographical information about a half dozen members of the freshman class.

So how can people who have witnessed how higher education has enriched their own lives be so willing to decimate this institution?

Nowhere else in Idaho's budget has the Great Recession inflicted more pain. Since 2008, lawmakers have cut nearly \$50 million ... almost 20 percent ... from state support for the four-year schools of higher learning.

They have their reasons.

Lawmakers know the institutions can backfill with private and government grants ... as well as the students' checkbooks. To

make up the difference, students have picked up double-digit tuition and fee increases.

Don't discount public opinion. Cut the public school budgets ... as lawmakers did this year ... and parents will growl about it. Slash higher education? They won't hear so much. Earlier this year, Idaho newspapers conducted a poll on the question and found that 42 percent thought higher ed spending was "about right." Another 14 percent thought the state was spending too much. No surprise there. This general population has comparatively fewer college graduates.

But you'd expect people in the Legislature to know better.



... sweetheart deals

Idaho's secret tax deals may not be illegal. But this practice still favors the well-connected and leaves dollars on the table.

So the job before the 2011 Legislature is clear and unchanged. Lawmakers need to close off any unfair loopholes in Idaho's tax collection policies — and then hold the State Tax Commission accountable for making these rules stick.

Facing a projected \$340 million shortfall for 2011-12, legislators should have no trouble finding the impetus to tighten up Idaho tax laws. But this transcends short-term motivations, powerful as they are.

Fairness should be a hallmark of tax policy, in good times and lean. The tax commission negotiates secret agreements with companies or taxpayers who contest their bills, which undermines the fundamental fairness of the system. When some taxpayers can exert undue influence and get a personal tax break, the tax burden falls on working stiff who lack political juice.

Meanwhile, the entire system has lost credibility. A procession of current and former tax commission veterans have gone public with whistleblower complaints of cronyism and intimidation, leaving taxpayers to rightly question whether they're getting taken.

Those concerns were beyond Ada County Prosecutor Greg Bower's purview. Looking strictly at the law, Bower said (last) week that the tax agreements are not illegal. The issue, he said, is better

addressed by the Legislature.

And it should be.

These deals may be legal, but that certainly doesn't make them good policy.



... dropout factories

ShareAmerica's Promise, a group of nonprofits, corporations, faith-based organizations and advocacy groups, says the dropout rate in Idaho is unacceptably high. The group said there are five "dropout factories" in Idaho (up from two in 2002) and that there are 4,018 students attending them.

The group did not identify the five schools it has tagged as "dropout factories," so they could be anywhere in the state. Those schools received their dubious distinction because the freshman class shrinks by 40 percent or more by the time students become seniors.

Does this mean the dropout rate in Idaho is on the rise? ... Quite the opposite. The graduation rate from 2002 to 2008 increased slightly, from 79.3 percent to 80.1 percent.

But there's a larger issue here that goes beyond numbers and statistics. It goes beyond standardized testing scores, graduation rates and grade-point averages ...

We seem to be placing more and more responsibility on schools for the raising of our children. Perhaps its time for a lesson in what schools are ... supposed to be ...

There are a lot of reasons kids may drop out of school, and many of them are things schools have no control over. Some examples:

- A kid's father has been laid off. In order to pay the mortgage and heating bill, the kid has to drop out of school and work full-time at McDonald's.

- The kid has a proud father who doesn't want his children to be better educated than he ... so he denigrates education and discourages the kid from graduating.

- The kid has no responsible parents, gets enticed ... to join a gang and drop out of school.

These are just a few examples. Should we hang the responsibility of these dropouts around the necks of their schools? Nope ...

The bottom line is this: there are many social factors to consider when talking about the dropout rate. Putting it all on the schools just isn't fair.

The perils of cutting Medicaid

You may remember the historic day in 2009 when Sen. Chuck Grassley brought the issue to the fore at a town meeting in Iowa. "We should not have a government plan that will pull the plug on grandma," he said to loud cheers.

This was when Grassley, a Republican, was negotiating with the Democrats on a bipartisan health care reform bill. Optimistic spirits felt his plug-pulling metaphor was simply an attempt to reassure his constituents, while he continued working in good faith with the Finance Committee chairman, Sen. Max (I Am Always Wrong) Baucus.

Later, President Obama asked Grassley whether he would vote for the bill if all his suggestions for change were included. Grassley said probably not. This was taken to be a bad sign.

Then all hell broke loose, and the Republicans kept ranting about how "Obamacare" would put the federal government between you and your doctor and try to save money by prohibiting said doctor from using the best treatments and procedures.

All this came to mind when I was talking to Flor Felix, whose husband, Francisco, a 32-year-old truck driver with four kids, was denied a liver transplant because the Arizona Legislature had yanked funds for it out of a state Medicaid program.

Francisco had been prepped for surgery after a friend whose wife was dying asked that he be given her liver.

"It was good news when we heard the liver matched," Flor said. "The doctor said: 'Everything's going well. We're going to proceed with the surgery.'"

But Francisco, who has hepatitis C, had lost his health insurance when he had to stop working and had gotten coverage under the state Medicaid program. And Gov. Jan Brewer had signed a law eliminating Medicaid coverage of certain kinds of transplants as a

cost-cutting measure. Flor said the next words she got from the doctor were: "You need to bring \$200,000 as a deposit for the hospital."

Francisco was summarily discharged. The Arizona state government, which is totally controlled by Republicans, got between him and his doctor.

"The state only has so much money and we can only provide so many optional kinds of care. Those were one of the options that we had taken liberty to discard," said Gov. Brewer.

It's hard to give Arizona the benefit of the doubt on anything these days, what with the state's dubious performances in matters like illegal immigrant hysteria, the selling of the state Capitol to help balance the budget, and the electing of Jan Brewer. However, let's accept that given their economic problems, it would be natural for the Legislature to want to try to cut the Medicaid budget. Although preferably in some saner, less brutal manner.

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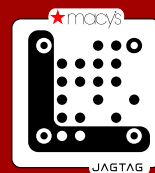

Bergdahl shown in new Taliban video

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Spc. Bowe Bergdahl, the only known U.S. soldier held captive in Afghanistan, appears briefly in a newly released Taliban video standing next to a smiling insurgent commander who once threatened to kill him.

The 24-year-old from Hailey has bags under his eyes and what appears to be an abrasion on his left cheek in the footage. The video was the fourth to appear since he was captured nearly 18 months ago and was provided to reporters Wednesday by IntelCenter, a private, U.S.-based organization that tracks Islamic extremist activities and communications.

His parents, Bob and Jani Bergdahl, have declined to speak with reporters throughout the ordeal, but Idaho National Guard spokesman Col. Tim Marsano said Wednesday that they had confirmed that the man in the video was their son.

"They responded that it was him, based on the screen shots," Marsano said. "It's been an extremely difficult year and a half. Without any concrete news, every day brings more challenges. They do continue to take some comfort in the support they've gotten, from the community, their family and friends."

NATO spokesman Brig. Gen. Josef Blotz said the coalition was not sure whether the footage was old or new. Bergdahl is seen wearing an Afghan-style, lightweight tan shirt, suggesting that the video was shot during warmer weather.

"We are still investigating this case and hope Bowe Bergdahl is still fine," he said.

Bergdahl has been held by the Taliban since June 30, 2009, when he disappeared in Paktika province in eastern Afghanistan.

According to the SITE Intelligence Group, which also tracks Islamic extremist activities, Bergdahl is standing next to Sangin Zadrán, a senior official in the al-Qaida linked Haqqani network in Paktika. In July 2009, Sangin's spokesman told The Associated Press in a telephone interview that Bergdahl would be killed unless the U.S. stops strikes in Ghazni province's Giro district and Paktika

province's Khoshamand district.

Bergdahl, who is seen in just a few seconds of footage that includes a montage of past militant attacks and news events, nods occasionally as if acknowledging another speaker and often looks down at the ground.

The 69-minute video, produced by Manba al-Jihad, a video production group of the Haqqani network, was released on the

website of the Afghan Taliban on Dec. 2 but appeared on jihadist forums last month, according to SITE.

Bergdahl, a member of 1st Battalion, 501st Parachute Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division, Fort Richardson, Alaska, has appeared in three other videos that the Taliban released July 18, 2009, Dec. 25, 2009 and April 7.

State says big loads can move safely

BOISE (AP) — Idaho highway officials say they have no doubt that four oversize loads of refinery equipment can move across northern Idaho along a scenic river byway safely and with only a minor inconvenience to the public.

At a hearing Wednesday in Boise, officials from the Idaho Transportation Department defended their agency's review and decision to sign off on permits allowing ConocoPhillips to truck the massive loads from Lewiston to its refinery in Billings, Mont., along U.S. Highway 12.

Alan Frew, administrator of ITD's Motor Vehicle Division, said the agency made public safety and convenience a top priority at every step in its review of the travel plan, from making the trucks roll only at night to reduce interaction with other motorists, to making sure police and emergency medical escorts would accompany the convoys.

"Are these loads 100 percent safe? No, there is nothing 100 percent safe on the highway," Frew said. "But in determining and providing for the issuance of permits, we did everything ... to make sure we were reasonably sure these loads could move safely and with as little inconvenience to the public."

Idaho Department of Finance receives accreditation

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Idaho Department of Finance has been recertified by the Conference of State Bank Supervisors.

The Department regulates banks, bank holding companies, credit unions, trust companies, savings banks, collection agencies, finance companies, money transmitters, mortgage brokers, lenders and individual loan originators, business and industrial development corporations, escrow companies, and securities issuers, broker

dealers, salesmen and investment advisors, and endowed care cemeteries. All total, the Department regulates and licenses over 156,470 individuals and businesses operating in Idaho.

Director Gavin Gee said the accreditation certification means those entities can continue having confidence in the department.

“This is a benefit, not only to those entities we regulate, but to consumers as well because this recertification gives them the confidence in our ability to do our jobs.”

The department must be recertified every five years.

The Idaho Department of Finance was first accredited by CSBS in January of 1990 and has maintained its accreditation for over 20 years.

The department, created by the Idaho State

Legislature in 1905, is defined by its mission to promote “access to vigorous, healthy and comprehensive financial services for Idaho citizens,” a press release from CSBS said.

The CSBS was founded in 1902 as an industry organization to share ideas and

solve common problems of state bank regulators

CSBS accreditation seeks to strengthen state banking departments and to demonstrate the high quality of state banking departments to the general public, the federal banking agencies, Congress, and other state banking departments.

“The accreditation is patterned after education accreditation and similar to health care. Having it enables us to work with other states and agencies and that the department meets national standards,” Gee said.

The accreditation process begins with completion of an extensive self-evaluation questionnaire on all department operations: administration and finance, personnel, training, examination, supervision, and legislative powers.

Next, an external review team comprised of veteran state and federal regulators performs an on-site review and presents its findings to an audit team and to the Performance Standards Committee, the members of which vote on the reports of the review team and the audit team.

Hackers strike at MasterCard to support WikiLeaks

LONDON— Hackers rushed to the defense of WikiLeaks on Wednesday, launching attacks on MasterCard, Swedish prosecutors, a Swiss bank and others who have acted against the site and its jailed founder Julian Assange.

So-called “hacktivists” operating under the label “Operation Payback” claimed responsibility in a Twitter message for causing severe technological problems at the website for MasterCard, which pulled the plug on its relationship with WikiLeaks a day ago.

MasterCard acknowledged “a service disruption” involving its Secure Code system for verifying online payments. It was not clear how widespread the problem was. Earlier, MasterCard spokesman James Issokson said consumers could still use their credit cards for secure transactions.

MasterCard is the latest in a string of U.S.-based Internet companies; including Visa, Amazon.com, PayPal Inc. and EveryDNS, to cut ties to WikiLeaks in recent days amid intense U.S. government pressure.

Visa said it was having no problems Wednesday. PayPal said it faced “a dedicated denial-of-service attack” for about half an hour Monday but had no problems with its website Wednesday.

The online attacks are part of a wave of support for WikiLeaks that is sweeping the Internet. Twitter was choked with messages of solidarity for the group, while the site’s Facebook page hit 1 million fans.

Offline, the organization is under pressure on many fronts. Assange is in a British prison fighting extradition to Sweden over a sex crimes case. Moves by Swiss Postfinance, MasterCard, PayPal and others that cut ways to send donations to the group have impaired its ability to raise money.

Undeterred, WikiLeaks released more confidential

U.S. cables Wednesday. The latest batch showed that the British government feared a furious Libyan reaction if the convicted Lockerbie bomber wasn’t set free and expressed relief when they learned he would be released in 2009 on compassionate grounds.

Another cable revealed that American officials lobbied the Russian government to amend a financial bill the U.S. felt would “disadvantage U.S. payment card market leaders Visa and MasterCard.”

The pro-WikiLeaks vengeance campaign appeared to be taking the form of denial-of-service attacks in which computers are harnessed, sometimes surreptitiously, to jam target sites with mountains of requests for data, knocking them out of commission.

PayPal Vice President Osama Bedier said the company froze WikiLeaks’ account after seeing a letter from the U.S. State Department to WikiLeaks saying that its activities “were deemed illegal in the United States.”

“It’s honestly just pretty straightforward from our perspective,” he said at a web conference in Paris.

Neither WikiLeaks nor Assange has been charged

Bill would exempt physicians from identity-theft regulation

Private-practice physicians are breathing a sigh of relief that legislation exempting them from new federal financial regulations now awaits President Barack Obama’s signature to become law.

The Federal Trade Commission’s Red Flags Rule requires financial institutions and creditors to take steps to spot clients who commit identity theft. It requires a written plan of action and, depending on the business in question, various other steps.

Health care providers fall under the broad definition of “creditors” due to their billing practices — billing insurance companies first, then sending each patient the rest of the bill. The regulation went into effect in 2008, but physicians have fought it and secured a delay in putting it into practice.

Dr. Richard Henry, owner of Asthma and Allergy of Idaho, which has six offices in Idaho and one in Elko, Nev., said the rules would have placed undue burden on doctors.

“It’s been a hard-fought battle,” Henry said. “It would have put doctors in a position to have to run credit checks and report financial transactions. It was just another government requirement that

would have added a plethora of reporting and paperwork.”

Instead of that paperwork, Henry said he wants to spend his time focusing on patients.

“I couldn’t see how the rules would have protected us — or patients,” Henry said.

On Tuesday, the House of Representatives unanimously passed the Red Flag Program Clarification Act of 2010, legislation similar to that introduced in October 2009 by U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, and other co-sponsors. The Senate had approved the

bill Nov. 30.

The bill defines a creditor as only those entities that regularly use consumer reports or furnish information to consumer reporting agencies.

“It is obvious that physicians and dentists are not financial institutions and therefore do not present the same level of risk as financial institutions in cases of identity theft,” Simpson, a retired dentist, stated in a press release. “... This system should not be treated the same as a loan with a bank. Health care is expensive enough; we don’t need to create needless regula-

tions that will only increase costs even more.”

Idaho Medical Association CEO Susie Pouliot applauded the move to get health care providers out from under the rules.

“This is certainly welcome news,” Pouliot told the *Times-News* during a phone interview Wednesday. “We’ve long been voicing our opposition.”

“Clearly physicians, as small business owners, are not on the same par as financial institutions and should not be treated as such.”

Caught by mistake in foreclosure web

Christopher Marconi was in the shower when he heard a loud banging on his door. By the time he grabbed a towel and hustled to his front step, a U.S. marshal’s sedan was peeling out of his driveway.

Nailed to Marconi’s front door was a foreclosure summons from Wells Fargo, naming him as a defendant. But the notice was for a house Marconi had never seen, on a mortgage he never had.

Tom Williams was in his kitchen thumbing through the mail when he opened a letter from GMAC. It informed him that the bank would confiscate his house unless he immediately paid off his mortgage balance of \$276,000. But Williams had

never missed a mortgage payment. And his loan wasn’t due to mature until 2032.

Warren Nyerger opened his front door to find a scraggly haired summons server standing on his stoop. He plopped a fore-

closure notice from Bank of America in Nyerger’s hands. But Nyerger had paid for his house in cash. And he’d never had a checking account, much less a mortgage, with Bank of America.

By now, you may have heard the stories of bank robo-signers powering through hundreds of foreclosure affidavits a day without verifying a single fact.

Most of those involved homeowners who had stopped paying their mortgage; they were genuine defaulters.

Now a new species of homeowner is getting pushed into foreclosure hell.

These homeowners paid their mortgages, or loan modifications, on time.

Some even paid off their loans. Worse, those on the receiving end of a bad foreclosure claim tell similar stories of getting bounced from one bank official to the

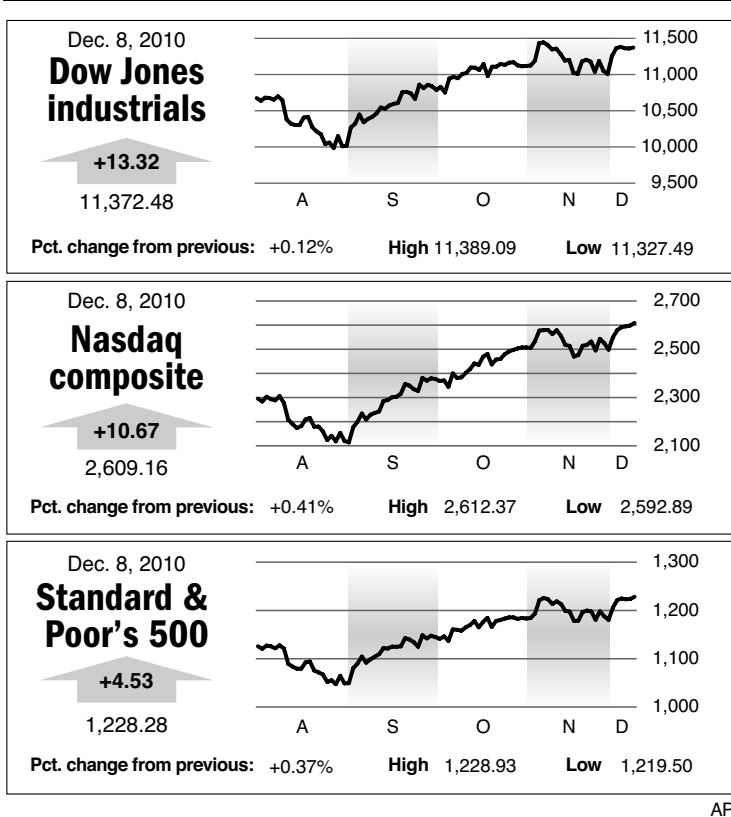

The Dow Jones industrial average edged up 13.32 points, or 0.1 percent, to 11,372.48. The broader Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 4.53 or 0.4 percent, to a new yearly high of 1,228.28. The index last traded at this level in late September 2008. It is now up 10.1 percent for the year. Four of the 10 company groups in the S&P index rose. Financials rose the most with a 1.8 percent gain. Bank of America Corp. rose 3.7 percent to lead the 30 stocks that make up the Dow. The Nasdaq composite index rose 10.67, or 0.4, to 2,609.16. Two stocks fell for every one that rose on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated trading volume came to 7.6 billion shares.

Southwest loses on-time 'bragging rights'

Southwest Airlines, the U.S. industry leader in on-time arrivals since record-keeping began in 1987, finds itself in an unprecedented spot this year: eighth place. Second a year ago, Southwest is slipping as it expands at congested airports such as New York's LaGuardia while US Airways Group, Alaska Air Group and other rivals

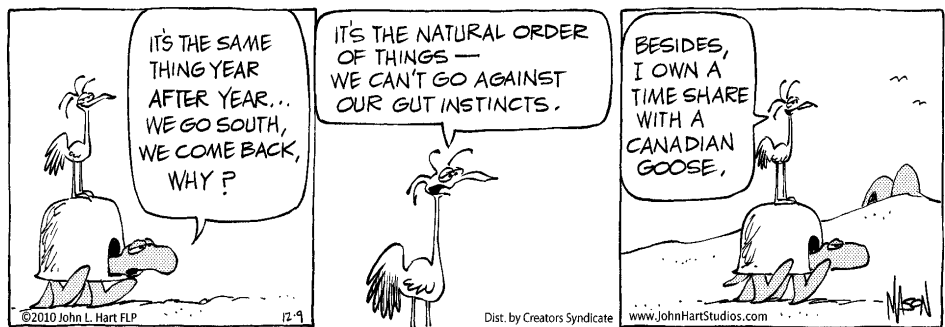
improve their performance, according to federal data released Tuesday for the 12 months ended in October.

The 2010 slide marks a blow for the carrier with the best cumulative rating since the U.S. started tracking results 23 years ago. With the drop, Southwest loses the "corporate prestige" from being at or near the top of its peers, said Steve Martin, senior vice president at InterVistas Consulting in Bethesda, Md.

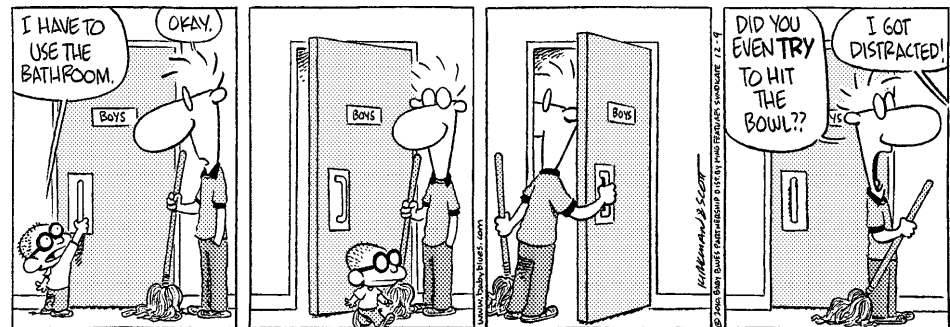
"They would like to be able to deliver good news to their passengers that 'the rest of the industry is still on the rocks, but we're getting you there on time,'" Martin said. "There's a certain amount of bragging rights that are involved."

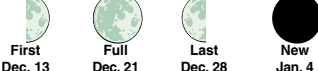

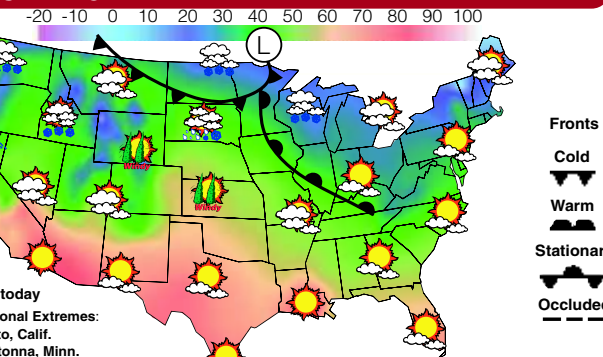

White House: Tax impasse could trigger recession

WASHINGTON (AP) — Raising the direst alarm yet, the Obama administration warned fellow Democrats on Wednesday that if they defeat the big tax-cut compromise detested by many liberals they could jolt the entire nation back into recession.

Making a difference

SUN VALLEY — Mario Patlan was a shy little boy three years ago, who was ill at ease around his classmates at Woodside Elementary School.

His report card displayed a string of Ds and Fs.

That changed with the flick of a fly rod and a turn of a ski.

And one man.

That man is Bob Knoebel, who moved to Sun Valley several years ago after retiring at age 50 from running an aquatics program at a Connecticut YMCA.

Knoebel, who has worked for the past few years as a fly-fishing guide for Silver Creek Outfitters and an ambassador and lift ticket checker for Sun Valley Resort, is adamant about making a difference in young people's lives. And his way is through the outdoors.

"The Y taught me about making a difference and getting

involved in your community. You don't even think about it. You just do it," said Knoebel.

Knoebel won countless awards in Connecticut, including a Mentor Achievement Award, Big Brother of the Year and YMCA Employee of the Year. When he retired to move to his dream home in Sun Valley, the Connecticut Y established a Knoebel Prize in his name to assist young swimmers with college.

In Sun Valley he picked up where he left off, volunteering with the then-new Wood River Community YMCA. And he added more plaques on his wall, including YMCA Volunteer of the Year and an Unsung Hero Award nomination from the Community Drug Coalition.

Even as he did, he noticed that Hispanic children were not involved in many of the valley's cherished traditions, such as skiing and fly-fishing. And, so, he took it on as a personal challenge to broaden those chil-

dren's horizons.

"These were kids who didn't know how to swim or fish. And they didn't know how to ski or snowboard in a community where the mountain is a big thing," he said.

"I never intended to sit home in front of the TV all day. I saw retirement as a step towards something else. At first I found it helping out with the new Y. But then I realized it was these kids."

Knoebel sought out struggling youth who could use some attention. And those kids in turn taught him enough Spanish that he could tell their parents where they were going and when they would be back.

Then he took them climbing at the Y, flushing with pride as they rang the bell at the top of the wall. He taught them to tie flies.

And he talked Sun Valley into giving the kids free ski and

Even with one arm, Oregon man can hunt high and low

ALBANY, Ore. — Thousands of Oregon hunters will bag a deer this fall.

But former Linn County resident Leland Ford is probably the only one to do so one-handed — with a bow and arrow.

It's an amazing feat by anyone's standards, but it's just a way of life for Ford, 58, who now lives in Salem.

It's certainly not a lifestyle Ford dreamed about as a young man.

Ford was a captain in the Air Force ROTC program at Oregon State University with only one term left before graduation. He had completed flight school and was set on a career flying jets.

But on Dec. 8, 1974, fate intervened and his life changed forever.

"We were hunting on the Santiam River north of Lebanon when my dad's cousin's shotgun discharged and pellets struck the

right side of my brain," Ford said.

Months of rehabilitation and healing followed. He has enough mobility in his left leg to walk slowly with the use of a brace, but he never regained use of his left arm. That hasn't stopped him from leading a full life.

"I have always loved being outdoors," Ford said. "I want to see what God has created and appreciate its beauty."

Ten years ago, Ford starting yearning to get back into the outdoors he loved to explore as a child with his best friend, Dan Powell. He missed hunting and fishing.

"We've been friends since 1958," Ford said with a smile.

Ford has learned to adapt and created a method of holding the bow string with his mouth while extending the 70-pound pull bow in front of his body. The process makes his dentist cringe.

Ford's wife, Susan, makes nylon patches that are attached to the bow string. Ford bites the patch, and quickly thrusts the bow forward, holding it rock-steady with his powerful right arm.

"When I want to release the string, I make a puff of air with my mouth," Ford said. "I have tried saying certain words, but eventually found that just puffing works the best in terms of accuracy."

And like any good bow hunter, Ford faithfully practices his craft.

"I will shoot up to 100 arrows per night. At 20 yards, I will hit the bull's eye. At 30 yards, I hit an area the size of a paper plate. At 40 yards, I can place them in an 18-inch pattern," Ford said. "I've gotten a deer each of the last three years."

Ford said one key to his success is that "I'm a patient man. I will sit for hours waiting for a deer to get into range. I waited for this year's deer for days off and on."

Ford said life can be hard, but "nothing's impossible."

"I figure you just have to be smarter than the problem," Ford said. "I also like to go fishing. I use my thumb to reel up the line."

He also figured out a way to tie his own fish hooks by attaching a cork to a necklace to hold the hook, while he loops the line into a knot.

The rigors of elk hunting, which is usually in rugged terrain, at first posed a problem, but as always, Ford's friend Powell came through for him.

"We went to a hardware store and tried out wheelbarrows," Ford said. "Dan hauls me up and down the trail in the wheelbarrow."

Because he has limited vision, Ford's wife, Susan, will often act as his spotter.

"She's excellent," Ford said. "Other guys have asked if she could help them out."

Ford's first wife was a school teacher and worked in Burns, where the family lived for 13 years. He says his disability was a factor in their divorce.

They reared four children of their own, including Rachael Cantrell of Albany, John Ford of Jefferson, Joe Ford of Creswell, Elizabeth Taylor of Burns and adopted daughter Sharon Gardner, who lives in Utah. They also took in 31 foster children.

"She didn't want me to work, so I was a stay-at-home dad and raised the kids," Ford said. "At one time, we had 13 kids under one roof. I loved it."

After they divorced, Ford was single for several years until he met Susan at church. She had been widowed and had no intentions of remarrying.

"When he asked me what kind of food I like to eat, I ran out of the room to my car,"

she said.

But as in all things, Ford was persistent and four years ago, they wed.

"He has so much enthusiasm I forget he has only one arm," Susan said. "He does things so easily, people forget."

Among his accomplishments is playing concert piano.

"I play the melody with my thumb and the harmony with the rest of my fingers," Ford said.

It took Ford three years to complete his last term at Oregon State.

"It was difficult to learn and it was difficult to get around on crutches," Ford said. "I had classes where I had to climb three flights of stairs to get to them."

Ford graduated in 1978 with a degree in industrial arts/secondary education from Oregon State University.

"But no one wanted to hire a one-handed shop teacher," Ford said.

He later earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education at Oregon State in 1987 and recently earned a master's degree in education from Corban University in Salem. He has been a substitute teacher in Albany schools and is now looking for a full-time teaching position in the mid-valley.

A deep faith in God has been Ford's foundation since 1966, and he considers leading hundreds of children to Christ as his greatest accomplishment.

In 2000, Ford founded One Hand For Christ Ministries, Inc., whose goal is evangelism. Ford has also authored "Bible Memorization: A Seminar in Gospel Preparedness and Sharing."

Ford's only concession to his disability is being extra careful when he walks.

"I have to watch so that I don't get myself into dangerous situations," Ford said. "I'm pretty conservative about that."

Hunting deer often takes cunning and deception

DALLAS — John Cox was guiding an archery deer hunt in the Oklahoma Panhandle in mid-November. He was driving along a ranch road, when he drove up on a huge buck with seven does feeding on black-eyed peas that he'd dropped in the road.

The deer scattered and Cox, who runs Game Management Services, Inc., from his home near Nocona, drove as quickly as possible to retrieve a pop-up ground blind from another location. He also got two five-gallon buckets of peas, which he uses in lieu of corn as wildlife feed.

"We set up the blind and poured the peas in the road," Cox said. "This all took about 45 minutes. Once we were in the blind, a doe came out behind us and snorted for about 10 minutes. She finally left and, just when it seemed the hunt was over, the buck walked out in the road and started eating peas 25 yards from the pop-up."

"My hunter made a perfect shot. In spite of a broken tine, the buck gross scored 1795/8 Boone and Crockett points and was a very old buck."

from the previous day captured the buck's image at a feeder four miles from where he was shot. As Cox knows, even the smartest buck can act stupid during the rut, and an oddball hunting tactic could pay big dividends. It also pays to stay mobile.

Ground blinds are lightweight and easily relocated when the wind shifts. Wary bucks learn to study a tower blind for movement before they walk into the open. Most of them have yet to figure out the ground blind, which is best set up in the shade of overhanging limbs. Where deer are extremely wary, you can even cut brush and stack it around the blind to help the illusion. Sometimes, you don't

need much cover. Last year, I tested a portable blind called a Ghost Blind. On the surface, it seemed like a silly idea. The Ghost Blind is essentially a mirrored surface that's set up so the mirrors are slanted slightly outward at the top, reflecting whatever cover is there.

I had the perfect spot for my test run, a big wheat field where the only cover in decent shooting range was knee-high grass. I set up the blind, which is really a screen, and placed my chair behind it. The wind was perfect, and it wasn't long before a mature doe showed up in the wheat field. She glanced toward the Ghost Blind, but it looked just like the grass, so she began feeding on the wheat.

I shot the doe, then stayed put to see if any other deer showed up. A 2-year-old buck was next. He was spooked by the dead doe, but he paid no attention to the blind. Here are six tips for setting up and hunting from a ground blind:

Use a comfortable, swivel seat that doesn't make noise if you swivel to look in a different direction. Clear noisy leaves or twigs out of the spot where the blind will be placed.

If you hunt with a rifle, use shooting sticks or some other form of solid rifle rest.

Set up your blind downwind of where you expect to see game. If the wind shifts, move the blind.

Wear dark-colored clothing and a face mask inside the blind and keep windows closed behind you to avoid being silhouetted by game.

When possible, set up your ground blinds in late summer and leave them the entire deer season. Ground blinds cost a fraction as much as tower stands, making it easier to afford several.

If you're strapped for cash, make your own ground blinds by placing brush or dead logs in a strategic spot. You must sit still and wear good camouflage, but the deer won't see you unless you move.

snowboard rentals and discounted lift tickets.

"I think all kids should have equal opportunity and here you've got all this great stuff to do," Knoebel said. "The Y has an open door policy that makes it possible for everyone to come no matter what their income level. And that's what I'm trying to achieve with fishing and skiing."

On the mountain the boys take pride in showing they can navigate the few bumps. And they make sure they're seen by their classmates, proud to show that they, too, are part of the scene.

Knoebel is patient but firm, stressing safety while encouraging them to try more than they think they can do.

The first time Mario skied College, one of Baldy's easier runs, he sidestepped the entire way down. By the end of the season, he was skiing Chicken Lips, Au Jus and the old Seattle Ridge lift line — all

bump runs.

Mario showed his classmates how to use a flywheel during show and tell at school. And as Christmas approached, he told Knoebel: "My Christmas present to you is to do well in school."

The boys call Knoebel nearly every day, asking when they can go skiing or fishing, as the season may be.

But Knoebel takes them beyond the fun and games. He's introduced them to such volunteer activities as stream restoration and walking dogs at the Animal Shelter. And he's gotten them library cards, showing them how to research things that spark their curiosity.

"We never talk about winning. I just teach them the skills they need to be successful. I tell them, 'Try your best. Show up on time,'" he said.

"I'm trying to teach them to make good choices — to use words, for instance,

instead of fists when they get mad. Do they change overnight? No. But I hope in 10 or 15 years, they'll look back and say, 'I remember what Bob taught me.'"

The parents of the boys have adopted Knoebel as one of their own, sharing their homemade tamales with him over Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners and teaching him how to eat pig feet. Mario's family even invited him to accompany them to Mexico to visit family and to serve as a padrino at a family wedding.

"Ohmigosh, I could spend almost a whole year talking about that great man," said Gabby Patlan, Mario's older sister. "We just got Mario's grades — As and Bs. Mario would never have learned to ski or fish or hunt without

Bob. But those kinds of activities gave Mario something to look forward to on the weekends so he learned to get his work done right away. And he's become much more active in class as he's gained confidence."

"For as long as we've lived in the United States, Bob has epitomized the best that humankind has to offer — gentle, self-effacing service to his fellow man," added Linda Abel.

Knoebel says he's humbled by the families' gratitude.

"I've never had kids of my own," he said. "But, really, I've had a thousand of them."

One of their functions is to find non-exempt assets you might own and sell those assets and distribute the money to your creditors. They can also generate money by reversing certain payments & transfers you may have made before filing your bankruptcy. Trustees are not paid a salary, but a commission. They get a percentage of the money generated by the selling of your things. This arrangement is intended to give the Trustee an incentive to be thorough and to return the maximum to your creditors. Unfortunately, this arrangement sometimes lends itself to the same sorts of problems associated with others who are paid on commission — used car sales people for instance. Although in a well-prepared case, most debtors lose little or nothing to the Trustee, a poorly prepared case can result in unpleasant consequences. An experienced bankruptcy attorney can identify in advance whether any of your assets or transactions will interest the Trustee. While legal costs are a consideration, it is critical that you choose your Trustee based on experience and competence, not just the cost.

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Brave the cold for the year's best meteor shower

If you've ever seen a meteor shower, chances are it was the annual August Perseids, as Earth plowed through the debris of Comet Swift-Tuttle. Although less well-known, this month's Geminids typically put on an even better show.

At best, the Perseids might produce about 90 meteors per hour. Ideally, the Geminids can reach 120 per hour. And this year, conditions are nearly ideal.

First, there's the moon. It can wash out all but the brightest meteors, but this year it will have set hours before the peak.

Next, there's the atmosphere. Obviously, a cloudless sky is best, but even the clearest air absorbs some light. So the meteors' apparent point of origin (the radiant) should be as close as possible to the zenith (the point directly overhead), where the light's path through the atmosphere is shortest. At this year's Geminids' peak, the radiant (in northern Gemini) will be just 20 degrees from the zenith.

Finally, there's timing. The most meteors will be seen when Earth's axial rotation and orbital motion are near-parallel, into the oncoming meteors. If the peak arrives too early in the night, the Earth itself blocks many of the meteors from reaching our skies. Fortunately, this year's peak falls about four hours after we've turned headlong into the stream.

This year's good set of circumstance is, unfortunately, also the bad news. The Geminids will peak

next Tuesday morning, around 4 a.m. The fact that they occur in the pre-dawn hours of a frigid December morning goes a long way toward explaining why the Geminids get second billing to the more famous Perseids. But if you'd like to see a memorable meteor shower, bundle up, take a lounge chair out to a dark site, and enjoy!

More tips for when you go afield

If you've read the Outdoors section the past several weeks, you'll remember we've ran a couple pieces about how to survive an outing gone wrong. Here are some more tips:

STUDY THE MOUNTAINS

As director of the Snowbird Ski Patrol, Dean Cardinale is charged with keeping skiers and snowboarders safe on some of the most avalanche-prone slopes in America. Cottonwood Canyon in the Wasatch Range in Utah often gets up to five feet of snow at a time.

And, when the big storms hit, slides are a given.

Cardinale has some big guns to deal with all this snow — howitzers. But he also relies heavily on data he keeps measuring the amount of snow, the wind impact and other things.

Studying avalanche cycles shows outdoors people how snow runs and fractures, helping them to predict what might happen just by looking at a slope, he says.

Cardinale says his experience has taught him respect for mountains and helped him make good decisions in the mountain even when leading expeditions into the Himalaya.

"Mountain climbing and backcountry skiing come down to good decisions made quickly," he said. "You do what's going to help you live another day."

Cardinale has pinpointed

several hazardous attitudes: Invulnerability or the idea it can't happen to us. Anti-authoritarian. Impulsivity. A resignation that things will happen no matter what we do. A macho attitude.

TRIPPING TREES

If you ski off the groomers into the trees, you could be setting yourself up for an upside down encounter with a tree well.

Skiers and boarders can fall in very quickly and it's extremely difficult getting out, even with releasable bindings.

Tree well accidents typically happen during and shortly after storms, most often in December and January, said Cardinale. To avoid tragedy:

- Don't ski deep powder around trees without a partner.
- Keep your partner in sight.
- Ski places with widely spaced trees.
- Remove your pole straps — it's more difficult to use your hands trying to get out when you have poles on.
- Have a transceiver, shovel, probe and whistle.
- If you fall in, resist the urge to struggle violently.
- Make a breathing space around your face, which will also give you an opportunity to yell.
- Stay calm while awaiting rescue.

HORSING AROUND

Riding horses for recreation or work is a \$1.6 billion activity each year in Idaho. And chances are some of those rides are going to end up in the ER.

Horses, which weigh an average of 800 pounds, have reflexes up to 10 times faster than man. There are 74,000 ER visits each year in the United States due to horse-related accidents — 14,000 of those involving children.

One in five equestrians will be seriously injured during their riding career — the average rider suffers 24 injuries during their career, the most common causes being bucking or horse falling down, says Dr. John Mayberry, professor of Surgery at Oregon Health Sciences University in Portland.

The most frequent area of injury is the head and face. Yet many studies show as few as 14 percent of patients were wearing helmets.

Here are some suggestions for minimizing risk:

- Wear a helmet, even if it's a helmet in the shape of a cowboy hat. And wear it whenever you're around a horse, even if you're not on the horse.
- Use a sun deflector.
- Wear long pants and gloves.
- Use stirrups with release mechanisms.
- Don't ride too fast or try to show off.

• Don't ride in muddy or otherwise poor conditions.

• Match your skill level to the horse's skill level.

• Don't get on a horse you don't know.

• Don't put a little girl on a big horse or other match the wrong size horse to the rider.

• Receive instruction through an organized horse club or experienced rider.

WHATCHA GONNA DO WITH WHAT YOU'VE GOT?

Chances are you're not going to have a ready-made splint if your buddy breaks his arm or leg while back-packing skiing in the back-country. Use what you have to make what you need to get him out as comfortably as possible.

Wrap a Thermo-rest sleeping pad around the leg, for instance. Tie it at the bottom with a strap and then tie it all the way up the leg while stuffing it with wool hats and T-shirts to make it more comfortable.

"It helps maintain the position of normal alignment, immobilizes him just above and below the injury, is comfortably padded and warm.

And the cool thing about the pads, is that you can blow them up at the end to make them into a rigid splint," says Portneuf Medical Center LifeFlight EMT Lance Taysom.

Add a ski pole, snow stake or the leg from roll-up rafting table along the side for increased rigidity.

86-year-old Pa. man hunts from recliner, bags buck

ALLENTOWN, Pa. — Lester Warner left the hospital in a weakened state last month, his frail body wracked by late-stage cancer. At 86 years old, he and his family had decided to stop treatment. But that didn't mean he planned to stop hunting.

Pennsylvania's highly anticipated two-week rifle deer season was fast approaching, and the life-long hunter from Dover Township, about 30 miles south of Harrisburg, wanted to take to the woods one last time.

"He just assumed he would be going. We decided we were going to play along with it: 'Yeah, we can't wait for hunting season, Dad,'" recalled Warner's son, Brian.

Brian and his brother Scott were skeptical. But when their father started to rally — gaining strength with the help of a physical therapist — they decided they had better accommodate him, said Brian, 51.

So Brian lugged an old recliner up the side of Broadtop Mountain, near his Huntingdon County dairy farm, to the small hut the family had built for Les Warner years ago. His father would hunt in comfort.

It was 19 degrees as the sun rose on opening day last week, the valley floor white with frost. Warner eased his old man's frame into the recliner, sipped his coffee, and waited, armed with the .243 Winchester that Brian had selected for its mild recoil.

It wasn't long before a huge 8-point buck emerged from the woods, the biggest that Warner or his son had ever had the opportunity to take. They marveled at their good fortune. A hunter can

go days without seeing a buck.

"Well, shoot it," Warner told Brian.

"No, you're gonna shoot it," his son replied.

Warner stood up from the recliner and took aim. The buck bolted. He followed it for 80 or 90 yards. Then, as it slowed down, he pulled the trigger.

A perfect shot. Lowering the gun, Warner turned to his son and said: "Never give up!"

"That's right, Dad," Brian called his mother. Shirley Warner could scarcely believe it.

"Knowing what he's been through in the last six months, in and out of the hospital, radiation and chemo and physical therapy and really sick at times, I was shocked. In my wildest dreams I didn't think he would get a buck this year," said Shirley, who's been married to Les for 53 years. "My son and I cried because it was a miracle ... there's no other explanation."

A week later, the retired pretzel baker remains thankful.

"I know I've had many blessings through this situation," said Les Warner, whose story was first reported by the York Daily Record. "Everything seems to be turning out well for me, and I know the Lord's been with us."

Medication may be cause of cramps

DEAR DR. GOTT: On an almost daily basis, I have muscle cramps in my hands, fingers, legs, feet and toes. They occur during the day and night.

I take 25 milligrams of HydroDiuril and two 595-milligram doses of over-the-counter potassium gluconate. I drink several glasses of water a day plus water with my meals. Is there anything else that I can do to relieve these cramps?

DEAR READER: HydroDiuril is simply hydrochlorothiazide (HCTZ), a common medication used to treat hypertension (high blood pressure). It can cause muscle and joint pain and a reduction of potassium, which can cause cramping, but you are on supplements to avoid the common side effects. HCTZ can also cause a reduction in the amount of magnesium in your body. While studies suggest that most people may be deficient already, symptoms are not common. If your low levels are further reduced by your medication, this can lead to symptoms of deficiency, which include cramping.

Try adding a magnesium supplement to determine whether the cramping lessens. Speak to your doctor to determine how much you should take. If this doesn't help, perhaps a change in medication is in order.

Other possible options include calcium supplements, eating pickles or drinking the juice, consuming electrolyte or sports drinks (pickles, pickle juice and sports drinks can be high in sodium, so be sure to read labels), or rubbing marjoram oil (one part marjoram to one part castor or olive oil to prevent skin irritation) over the affected areas.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 4-1/2-year-old son is developmentally delayed and was diagnosed as having low muscle tone. With the help of therapy, he sat up at 1 year and walked at 2 1/2. He is also in speech therapy and isn't completely potty trained. Emotionally and mentally, he is behind his pre-K peers and will be going into special education in kindergarten. He is extremely hyperactive and ADD, which contributes to his problems. My concern now is that he often has "oniony" breath and body odor, even when he hasn't eaten any onions. Could this be a symptom of something that his doctors missed? Your feedback would be greatly welcomed. Thank you.

DEAR READER: The simple answer is yes, it could be a symptom of an underlying condition; however, I don't know whether it is likely. Certain medications can cause changes in the smell of body odor, breath, urine and even stool. Most often other, more definitive symptoms are present, too.

There are several forums online of parents discussing the various odors their children emit. Most seem to say the children outgrow it, or that their pediatricians say the malady is caused by early glandular development and is otherwise harmless. Some have determined it is caused by diet. Rarely, some were told it is the result of thyroid malfunctioning.

Your son's onion-smelling breath and body odor are probably not a sign of illness; however, to be on the safe side, take your son to his pediatrician for a complete exam and blood work. Perhaps a referral to an endocrinologist will be helpful. In the interim, try to manage the situation as best you can.

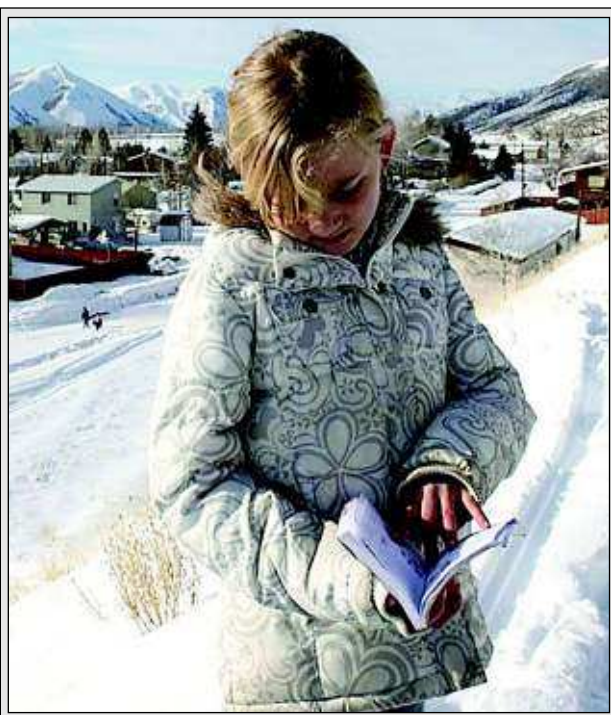

Feds criticize Idaho parks for roiling OHV users

BOISE (AP) — An e-mail exchange between state and federal officials that emerged publicly Wednesday highlights how motorized recreation and wildlife advocates are jockeying for influence in the debate over how best to manage northcentral Idaho's backcountry trails.

Nez Perce National Forest managers are updating rules governing off-highway travel on their 2.2 million acre territory. Their policy is changing from "open unless posted closed" to "closed unless posted open."

In e-mails from November, Forest Supervisor Rick Brazell accused state park officials of trying whip up opposition with a letter to registered off-highway vehicle riders, urging them to weigh in on the potential for losing 24 percent to 78 percent of the forest's 657 miles of trails.

Brazell complained the letter provokes OHV enthusiasts by leaving out details of why trails may be shuttered — to protect wildlife habitat.

"I question your using a

state database to get folks upset without giving them the whole story," he wrote. "It doesn't ask the reader to understand the 'why,' which is predominantly due to loss of wildlife habitat or habitat effectiveness."

The e-mails were obtained by the environmental group Idaho Conservation League and provided to The Associated Press.

The correspondence also showed that the dustup over the proposal has pitted state agency heads against one another.

For instance, Idaho Department of Fish and Game director Cal Groen, the state's top wildlife manager, told state parks director Nancy Merrill that her agency's letter sought to "direct specific user group response and anger."

"I would suggest that the directors have a sit-down before this becomes more of an ATV versus wildlife issue," Groen wrote.

Merrill countered the letter was meant to inform trail riders of changes, not steer them toward specific conclusions.

Rammell charged with poaching

IDAHO FALLS — Former Idaho gubernatorial candidate Rex Rammell has been charged with poaching an elk in eastern Idaho.

Bonneville County Prosecutor Bruce Pickett says the Idaho Falls man was charged Tuesday with misdemeanor possession of game that was unlawfully taken.

Idaho Fish and Game said Rammell was in illegal possession of an elk on Wednesday. When an officer asked Rammell for his hunting permit, he produced one for a different zone that expired in October. Rammell said previously he thought the tag enabled him to hunt in any area he chose to.

Rammell ran in the Republican primary for governor this year and two years ago as an Independent for the U.S. Senate.

He is scheduled to be arraigned on Dec. 23.

Tax protesting lawmaker loses appeal

COEUR d'ALENE — An Idaho state lawmaker who is protesting his income taxes lost his bid to appeal a State Tax Commission order that he pay \$53,000 in back taxes, penalties and interest.

First District Court Judge John Mitchell wrote that Rep. Phil Hart of Athol's claim "lacks any cogent legal argument."

The Idaho State Tax Commission rejected Hart's attempts to appeal earlier this year, saying he missed a key deadline.

Hart has sought have his appeal heard, arguing his status as a legislator should make him exempt from time limits.

But the Spokesman-Review newspaper reports Judge Mitchell agreed with the Tax Commission — that Hart filed his appeal too late, even if he had been entitled to legislative privilege.

The Republican is also waging a fight over his federal tax bill, contending income taxes are unconstitutional.

Bannock County sheriff shoots self in hand

POCATELLO — Bannock County Sheriff Lorin Nielsen can still joke around, even after shooting himself in the hand earlier this week.

"I can say I shot the sheriff," he told KIFI-TV.

Nielsen says he shot himself Monday while admiring a gun he received as an early Christmas present from his cousin.

He says he had his hand on top of the barrel and was trying to put the hammer back down when his thumb slipped. The bullet went through the fleshy part of his hand near his little finger. He says his pride is fractured, but his hand is fine.

Needing a stop, Jerome elected not to foul down by six. Twin Falls drained the clock down under two minutes, and Thibault responded with a steal.

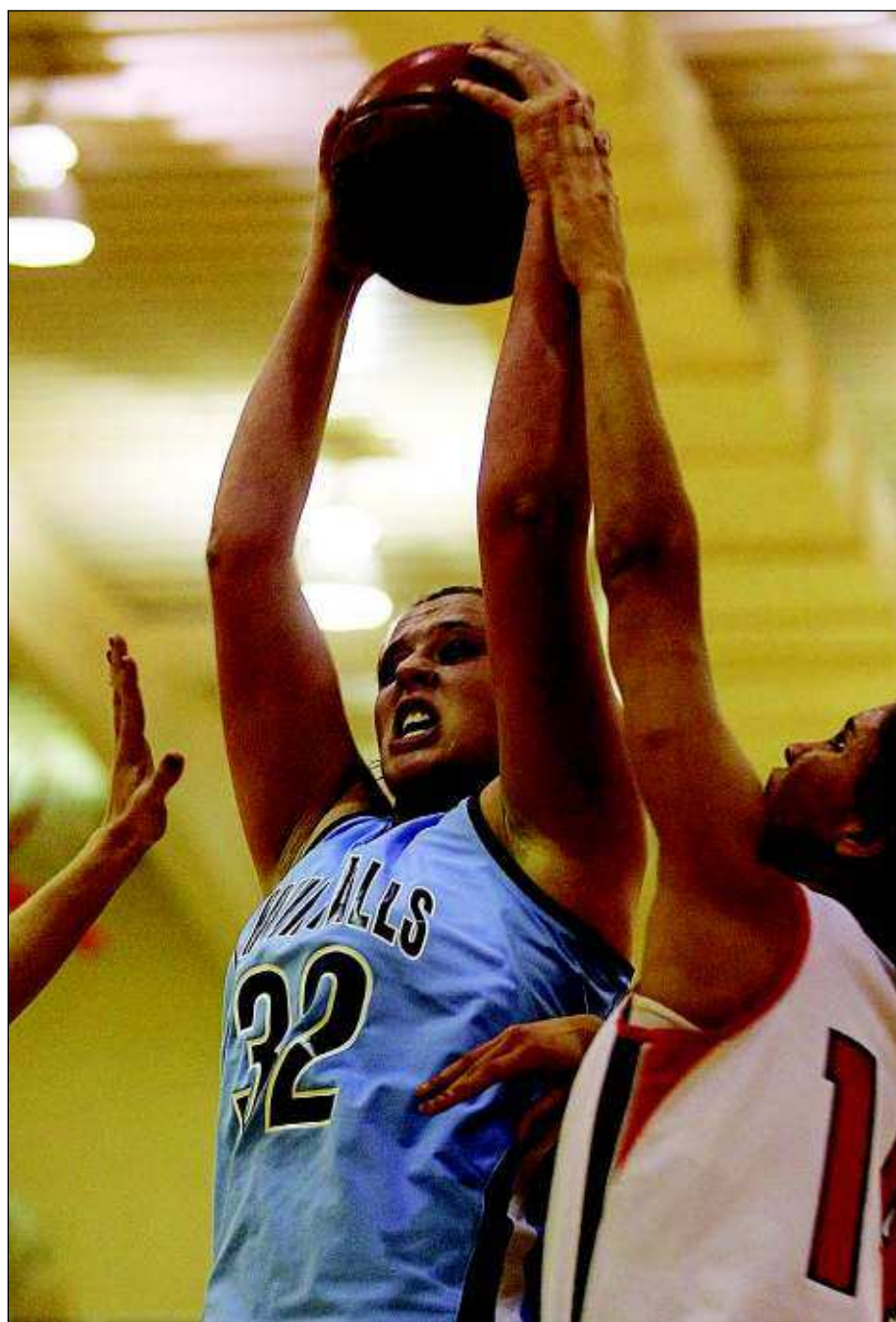

Florida coach Meyer resigns for 2nd time

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — With his wife and two of his three children sitting a few feet away, Urban Meyer didn't have to look very far to be reminded why he's leaving one of the premier jobs in college football.

It's all about family.

Meyer resigned from Florida on Wednesday, stepping down for the second time in less than a year. His first attempt, which lasted just a day, was for health reasons. This time it's to be a better husband and father.

"At the end of the day, I'm very convinced that you're going to be judged on how you are as a husband and as a father and not on how many bowl games we won," Meyer said at a campus news conference.

"I've not seen my two girls play high school sports. They're both very talented Division I-A volleyball players, so I missed those four years. I missed two already with one away at college. I can't get that time back."

The 46-year-old coach led Florida to two national titles but briefly resigned last December, citing health concerns. He had been hospitalized with chest pains after the Gators lost to

Alabama in last season's Southeastern Conference championship game.

"Last year was a knee-jerk reaction," Meyer said. "This year was just completely different."

Meyer signed a six-year,

It'll be a Top 25 matchup when the College of Southern Idaho women's basketball team opens conference play at Salt Lake Community College on Friday night.

That fact has the Golden Eagles eager to play.

"We're ready for some competition," said guard Mechela Barnes.

You can't blame the Eagles there. CSI won its three games in last week's Rocket Classic by an average of 50 points and has outscored foes by an average of 83-55 in its 10-1 start.

CSI, which remained No. 12 in the latest NJCAA Division rankings, expects tougher sledding against the 25th-ranked Bruins (7-2) in Friday's 5:30 p.m. affair. The game is the first of 15 Scenic West Athletic Conference games, including Saturday's date at Snow College in Ephraim, Utah.

SWAC squad North Idaho is

ranked No. 3 in this week's NJCAA poll as the top nine teams remained the same, led by No. 1 Pensacola (Fla.) State College.

CSI head coach Randy Rogers said North Idaho is the clear favorite for the SWAC title. "They've got size, they've got speed out front, they've got shooters and they've got depth," he said.

Rogers said his team's record is about where he expected entering league play and added that the nonconference slate served its purpose.

"We've had some games where we were pushed and we had to play well to win and we've had other games where we've been able to get a lot of kids in, which we do need to play the kind of ball we want to play at the end of the year," he said.

After Saturday's 3 p.m. game at Snow, the Eagles will take off 18 days before tripping to Arizona for three games Dec. 29-31.

SALT LAKE CITY — LeBron James scored 33 points, Dwyane Wade added 28 and the surging Miami Heat outscored the Utah Jazz by 14 in the fourth quarter for a 111-98 victory Wednesday night.

The victory extended Miami's winning streak to six, and avenged a 116-114 overtime loss to Utah at home on Nov. 9. The Heat improved to 15-8, while Utah fell to 16-7.

Al Jefferson scored 25 points and all five Jazz starters were in double figures by the start of the fourth. But it wasn't enough as the Heat pulled away with a 12-3 run to start the quarter.

Miami led by as many as 12, but the Heat found themselves trailing 78-77 entering the fourth after the Jazz mounted yet another rally. Last month, they came back from a 22-point deficit to beat the Heat.

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Manning, Colts try to snap skid vs. woeful Titans

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Trying to snap out of the funk he's been in for three games, Peyton Manning is heading to a town to play a team that could help him do just that.

Tennessee is struggling even more than the four-time MVP, going 10 quarters without an interception and 13 without scoring an offensive touchdown. The Titans (5-7) have lost five straight, and now here comes Manning, who routinely puts up some of his best performances against them.

The banged-up Colts (6-6) have lost three straight themselves, and Manning

says there's a sense of urgency for both teams going into Thursday night's game. The AFC South has only been won by these two teams, yet Jacksonville leads Indianapolis by a game and Tennessee by two.

"I think it's about how you respond to it," Manning said. "I know both teams are coming off of disappointing losses. I think that sometimes a short week might be the best

medicine for that. I know both teams are looking forward to playing."

Manning isn't happy with his career-worst 11 interceptions over the past three games, four returned for touchdowns. But he's still a top passer, and his next TD pass will make him the first in NFL history to throw 25 touchdown passes in 13 straight seasons.

The Titans struggled to slow Manning's brother Eli, Kyle Orton of Denver and Tony Romo in Dallas, and that was when they were winning. Now they're struggling to even run the ball, with Chris Johnson having

only 20 carries for 58 yards over the past two games, including last week's 17-6 loss to Jacksonville.

They expect Manning at his sharpest despite the four interceptions in each of the past two losses, including Indianapolis' 38-35 overtime defeat to Dallas on Sunday.

"The concern is that eventually that stops," Titans coach Jeff Fisher said. "That's the concern. With tipped balls and things like that he's got somebody in his face, he doesn't see the underneath drop defender and the guy picks the ball off. Those are things that happen to all quarterbacks."

Still, the Titans agree it's very strange to see so many of Manning's passes wind up in defenders' hands. The Colts have won three straight against Tennessee, and Manning is 11-5 against the Titans with just 13 interceptions in those games.

"He may be pressing, trying," Titans cornerback Cortland Finnegan said. "He loves throwing touchdowns. He's got a lot of guys in his face, too. That's why he has some errant throws."

Manning will be getting someone he knows well in a backfield missing Joseph Addai after the Colts signed Dominic Rhodes. That

should help considering the defense lost starting cornerback Jerraud Powers to injured reserve Tuesday.

Finnegan is the guy who aggravated Texans receiver Andre Johnson so much while defending him throughout their game that Johnson punched him three times in the head in the fourth quarter. The Titans are likely to put Finnegan on Colts receiver Reggie Wayne throughout this game, especially because Wayne had 14 catches for 200 yards last week.

"It's going to be a chance for me to make some plays, and it's going to be a good thing," Finnegan said.

Vick leads NFL's Pro Bowl voting

PHILADELPHIA — Michael Vick leads Pro Bowl voting 1½ years after he was released from prison.

The Philadelphia Eagles quarterback had 729,838 fan votes, nearly 39,000 more than second-place Peyton Manning, the NFL said Wednesday. Manning topped the balloting two weeks ago.

It's the latest evidence many fans seem willing to forgive Vick for the vicious dogfighting operation that sent him to prison for 18 months — and embrace his stunning return to NFL stardom. A backup to start the season, Vick has led the Eagles to first place in the NFC East, accounting for 21 touchdowns and throwing just two interceptions.

Manning had 691,146 votes, which led the AFC, followed by New England Patriots quarterback Tom Brady (623,074), Minnesota Vikings running back Adrian Peterson (591,598) and Green Bay Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers (547,340).

Online Pro Bowl voting ends Dec. 20. The teams are picked by a vote combination from fans, players and coaches.

STERGER LAWYER SAYS FAVRE INVESTIGATION COMPLETE

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — The NFL has wrapped up its investigation into allegations that Brett Favre sent inappropriate phone messages and photos to a Jets game hostess two years ago, the woman's attorney said Wednesday.

Attorney Joseph Conway said Joe Hummel, the director of investigative services for the NFL's security department, told him the case has been sent to Commissioner Roger Goodell and the league's lawyers for review.

"He told me it's upstairs in the commissioner's office and the lawyers are going over it," said Conway, the lawyer for Jenn Sterger. "I have not been told a timetable as when to expect something and I have not been told what the findings will be."

OWNERS TO SEE VIDEO OF CLEAN HITS

NEW YORK — When NFL owners meet in Dallas next week, they will see

a video of clean hits in games played since the league's crackdown on flagrant fouls.

NFL executive vice president of football operations Ray Anderson told The Associated Press on Wednesday that the video "clearly shows players making adjustments" and that some former rule-breakers when it came to hitting defenseless players "have gotten the message."

"Frankly some players who previously have been fined or disciplined have made the adjustments we are looking for to play within the rules," Anderson said. "It is hard to declare any trends this soon; it's premature to do that. But certainly what we are seeing, not just us in this office but officials and coaches have reported they see players making appropriate adjustments."

CONCUSSION COMMITTEE HEARS FROM HELMET MAKERS

NEW YORK — Commissioner Roger Goodell was planning to briefly stop by the hotel where the NFL's head, neck and spine medical committee met Wednesday to hear from equipment makers, researchers, the

military and NASCAR about how to improve helmet safety and cut down on concussions.

Goodell wound up listening in for a few hours.

"There was a general view that the helmets have improved, but we all have to work harder to find how we're going to take it to the next evolution of those helmets — gathering all the data, gathering all the technology that's being developed," Goodell said. "There are some very positive developments, but there are different approaches, and that was clear."

CHARGERS SAY THEY'LL PLAY IN SAN DIEGO IN 2011

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Chargers have notified the city that they won't exercise their 2011 escape clause on Feb. 1.

Wednesday's announcement comes amid recent speculation that the Chargers could be headed to Los Angeles.

Between Feb. 1 and April 30 of each year through 2020, the Chargers can announce their intentions to leave if they pay off the bonds used to expand Qualcomm in 1997. That figure is currently around \$26 million.

CHIEFS QB CASSEL HAS APPENDECTOMY, RETURN UNCLEAR

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Quarterback Matt Cassel, a key reason the Kansas City Chiefs have emerged as contenders and lead the AFC West late in the season, underwent an appendectomy on Wednesday.

How long the Chiefs might be without Cassel, the AFC offensive player of the month, was uncertain.

They said the procedure was a success and they expected Cassel to "return to work this week." They did not say whether he would be ready to play on Sunday when the Chiefs (8-4) travel to San Diego for a showdown with the Chargers, who trail Kansas City by two games in the division.

Taking most of the practice snaps on Wednesday was Brodie Croyle, who is 0-9 as an NFL starter and has not appeared in a game all year.

Pena goes to Cubs, Konerko back to White Sox

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — A few hours apart, both Chicago teams filled their needs at first base — Carlos Pena joined the Cubs, Paul Konerko returned to the White Sox.

Another first, too, at the winter meetings on Wednesday: The New York Yankees made their initial offer to free agent Cliff Lee.

The Yankees will try to lure Lee with a six-year proposal worth nearly \$140 million. Easy to tell how eager they are to sign the prize pitcher.

"Hannibal Lecter in a straitjacket right now, waiting on this Cliff Lee thing," general manager Brian Cashman said.

Outfielders Jeff Francoeur (Kansas City) and Matt Diaz (Pittsburgh) found new teams while designated hitter Jack Cust and former All-

Star reliever George Sherrill appeared to be on their way to Seattle and Atlanta, respectively.

Hard to tell about Tampa Bay shortstop Jason Bartlett, however. After a trade with Baltimore fell through, the Rays were working on a swap that would send him to San Diego.

The last full day of this week's session was active, with many teams in the mix. Still in play are big-name free agents Carl Crawford, Adrian Beltre, Magglio Ordonez and Manny Ramirez, along with Lee.

"The winter meetings have usually been a lot about first meetings, and we're into second and third meetings," top agent Scott Boras said. "I've gotten two deals done here. I'm trying to think back to when that's

happened. It's been a while."

Boras put Pena and the Cubs together for what he called a "pillow contract" — \$10 million for one year.

"There's a lot of comforts," Boras said.

The 32-year-old Pena hit a career-low .196 this season with 28 home runs and 84 RBIs for Tampa Bay.

"I'm extremely confident. I don't tend to look back on my failures and dwell upon them," he said.

The Cubs, who traded star first baseman Derrek Lee to Atlanta last August, didn't seem daunted by Pena's drop-off.

"It's not a gamble. It's a real good fit," GM Jim Hendry asserted. "We have filled all of the essentials that we were looking for with Carlos."

Konerko got a \$37.5 million, three-year deal to stay with the White Sox. The 34-year-old team captain hit

.312 with 39 home runs and 111 RBIs last season.

The four-time All-Star was in Mexico, on vacation and overlooking the ocean, when he got a text message that the White Sox had acquired free-agent slugger Adam Dunn. At first, Konerko figured that meant his days in Chicago were done.

\$24 million extension in 2009, meaning he's walking away from about \$20 million in guaranteed salary. But Foley did agree to pay Meyer a \$1 million retention bonus the coach would have received had he been employed on Jan. 31, 2011.

This time, Foley doesn't anticipate another change of heart.

"He's worked his tail off," Foley said. "You think of what he's rebuilt. He built one at Bowling Green, he built one at Utah, he built one here.

It's not just sacrifices here the last six years.

"That's 10 years of their lives, not to mention what he did before that as an assistant coach. It's his time to step back and spend time with his family. You're not getting it back. I admire him for that."

Foley said the coaching search will begin immediately and hopes to have a new coach before Christmas. Although Foley declined to offer names, Utah's Kyle Whittingham, Mississippi State's Dan Mullen and

Arkansas' Bobby Petrino are likely on the list.

Meyer said he planned to be involved in the search, which could make Whittingham and Mullen front-runners. Whittingham was Meyer's defensive coordinator in Utah, and Mullen held the same position under Meyer for four years at Florida. Petrino was Foley's second choice behind Meyer in 2004.

"I don't see why it should take that long," Foley said, adding that he has not contacted anyone.

Big Ten commish: League has made sacrifices for BCS

NEW YORK — The Big Ten commissioner insists his conference has already sacrificed much for the good of college sports by giving up some access to the Rose Bowl, and he sees no reason why it should give even more to create a football playoff.

Jim Delany was joined by several other commissioners Wednesday in Manhattan at the IMG Intercollegiate Athletic Forum. The topics ranged from conference alignment to the NCAA to the Bowl Championship Series.

The BCS debate led to a lively defense of the system and the Big Ten's place in it. Delany, a hard-line opponent of a major college football playoff, said many conferences made concessions to form a system that could benefit all the leagues.

"Now some of the people who've received the most have put in the least," he said after the panel discussion. He was referring to the five nonautomatic qualifying conferences.

The BCS was born in 1998 after the Big Ten, Pac-10 and Rose Bowl agreed to join the Southeastern Conference, Big 12, Atlantic Coast Conference and Big East and the Sugar, Fiesta and Orange bowls in a venture to have a No. 1 vs. No. 2 matchup for the national title every season.

In the 13 years since, the BCS has expanded access to the big games for teams in the five other major college conferences and increased the amount of money those leagues receive.

"Others were included, but they never had access to any of this before," Delany said. "You have to understand who brought what to the table, who is continuing to give and who's continuing to get."

The BCS in general — and Delany in particular because of his stance against a possible playoff — also has drawn dissent from fans, media and some in the business of college athletics.

Boise State President Bob Kustra is among the group because his school has been unable to play for a national championship despite its recent success. Boise State has been competing in the Western Athletic Conference, which does not have an automatic bid.

WAC Commissioner Karl Benson, who was part of the panel, said he supports the BCS, but would like to see better access for teams from outside the automatic qualifiers and more revenue sent their way.

Last season the five nonautomatic qualifying conferences divided \$24 million, with most going to the WAC (\$7.8 million) and Mountain West (\$9.8 million). The Big Ten and SEC each received \$22.2 million and the other leagues with automatic bids received \$17.7 million.

"I think the system does provide access and opportunity for a team like Boise State or TCU to play in the championship game," he

said. "But we've also proven that it's a lot easier to get to No. 4 than it is to get to No. 2."

Oregon and Auburn, both unbeaten, will play for the BCS championship this season. TCU from the Mountain West was also unbeaten but finished third in the final standings. Boise State was in the top five and in contention for the national championship for most of the season until the Broncos lost their next-to-last game.

Benson concedes the BCS has opened doors to his conference that would have otherwise remained closed.

"But I don't think you can argue that Boise State has not added to the value of the BCS and has not generated fan support, has not turned on televisions," Benson said in an interview.

The BCS also has become a target for politicians with constituents who feel the system has slighted their team.

That was the case with Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, after Utah went undefeated in 2008 and did not get a chance to play for the national title. Utah's attorney general is considering an antitrust suit against the BCS and last month met with Justice Department officials to discuss a possible federal investigation.

Meanwhile, the University of Utah is leaving the Mountain West after this school year to join the Pac-10.

"All I'm saying is if you think you can continue to pressure the system and it will just naturally provide more and more and more, I don't think that's an assumption our presidents, our ADs, our football coaches and our commissioners are necessarily going to agree with," Delany said during the discussion. "I'm just saying we've got fatigue of defending a system that's under a lot of pressure."

AUBURN'S FAIRLEY WINS LOMBARDI

HOUSTON — Auburn defensive tackle Nick Fairley has won the Lombardi Award as the nation's top collegiate lineman.

Fairley led top-ranked Auburn's defense this season with a school-record 21 tackles for losses and was second in the Southeastern Conference with 10½ sacks. He has 55 tackles, two fumble recoveries, one forced fumble and an interception entering the BCS title game against No. 2 Oregon.

He beat out defensive ends Da'Quan Bowers of Clemson and Adrian Clayborn of Iowa, and TCU center Jake Kirkpatrick for the Lombardi honor.

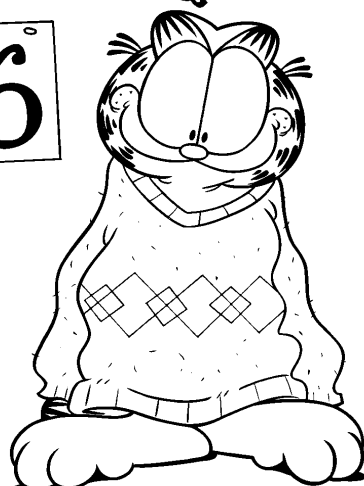

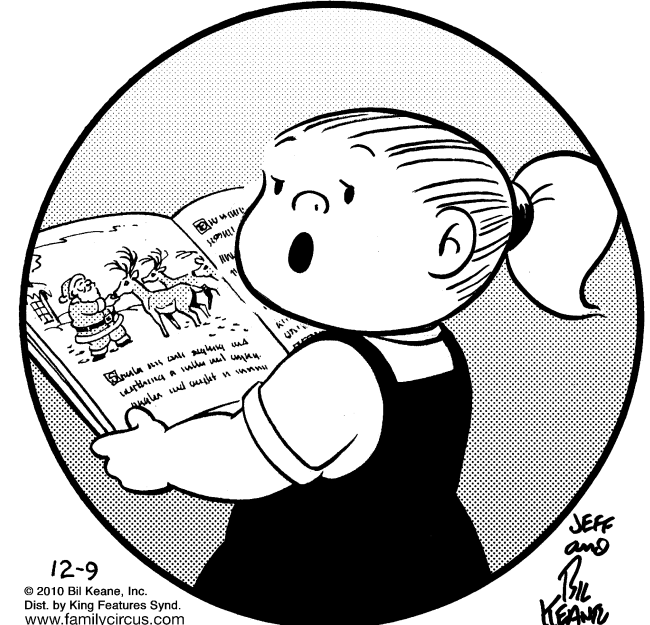

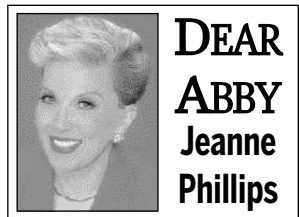
DEAR ABBY: My son "Dennis" is divorcing for the third time. He has primary custody of his oldest two children and shared custody of the younger two. He is an excellent father.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE Bobby Wolff

*"Imagination is that sacred power,
Imagination lofty and refined."
— William Wordsworth*

At first glance, today's six-club contract at the Dyspeptics Club looked hopeless. An ace was missing and there was seemingly no way to avoid a spade loser. But if South had assumed that the diamond king needed to be onside, he could have turned disaster into triumph.

At the table declarer drew trumps and ran three diamond winners, pitching a heart from hand, then cunningly led a heart toward his bare queen. Alas for him, East worked out to rise with the ace, and there was still a spade to lose at the death.

Declarer would have had a much better chance of success as long as he had guessed correctly which opponent held the heart ace. Assume that it seems only fair to play East for that card since you intend to play West for the diamond king, and you are in business!

Take the trump lead in dummy, then lead a low heart at once. If East rises with the ace, there would be two discards for declarer's losing spades — one on the heart king and one on the diamonds. So let's say East ducks his ace, and South's queen holds the trick. Trumps can be drawn and the diamond finesse taken. South's losing heart now goes away on the third diamond, and after conceding one spade, declarer can ruff the fourth spade in dummy.

For the technically minded, South has performed a Morton's Fork Coup, whereby East was forced either to lose his heart ace or present declarer with a vital discard by taking it prematurely.

ANSWER: When the opponents open with a pre-empt, it often acts like a red rag to a bull. And when you hold a 13-count, it seems wrong to pass and perhaps let the opponents steal from you. But remember that the auction is not over yet, and that since your hand would barely have been worth a two-level overcall, how can it be worth a three-level overcall facing a passed partner? You must pass, like it or not.
