## T.F. physician accepts leading role at St. Luke's

Even though Dr. Kurt Seppi has learned how to be two places at once, one of those places will no longer be Twin Falls.

Seppi helped St. Luke's Health System acquire the Twin Falls hospital in 2006 and now he has been rewarded with a promotion to Executive Medical Director for St. Luke's.

"(The acquisition) was accomplished because the physicians and the hospital administration really worked together to educate the community on what we thought was best," Seppi said. "That's the kind of thing that can happen when physicians and hospitals work together."

Seppi, 56, started on the physician side in Twin Falls in 1987 as a family practice

## Idaho couple collect mobility aids for the needy

POCATELLO — When John and Anna Dee Jensen retired, they could have simply hopped in their motor home and rolled on down the highway. Instead, they decided to help others roll.

"Retired folks, they look for ways to give back. By a combination of circumstance, we found this ... organization," John Jensen said. "My wife has been a hospital chaplain for over 20 years and has met Joni."

Joni is Joni Eareckson Tada, an evangelical Christian author and founder of Joni and Friends, a ministry that lends support to the disabled.

"She's multi-talented," Jensen said. "She's also a quadriplegic."

One project of Joni and Friends is Wheels For The World, which collects used but restorable wheelchairs to refurbish and then distribute to disabled people across the globe. The project appealed to the Jensens.

## PREPARING FOR POSTAL PROCRASTINATORS

Today, next Monday year's busiest postal days

There may be 11 more shopping days until Christmas, but if you're planning on mailing those gifts, you better cut that time in half.

The U.S. Postal Service estimates that Idahoans will mail more than 1 million cards and packages on today and Dec. 20. The two Mondays before Christmas are normally the busiest mailing days of the year.

Mike March, manager of Twin Falls' Pioneer Station Post Office, said Mondays are the busiest days during the holidays because people have had all weekend to buy and wrap presents. Add to that the fact that Mondays are busy year-round because that's when businesses usually mail the most.

March said the Pioneer Station office gets the most walk-in business, being near Blue Lakes Boulevard stores, while the downtown office is near most of the businesses.

"The next two Monday afternoons, we'll have people lined up out the door," said downtown mail clerk Andrea Price.

USPS has lost money for a number of years with the advent of the Internet. Not only do parcel delivery companies add greater competition, but many people communicate using e-mail rather than writing letters, and online stores ship gifts directly using delivery companies, so people don't mail as many gifts to friends and family.

But the holiday season is probably the best time of year for the USPS. March said it appears like holiday shipping is picking up this year, which he credits to the flat-rate boxes that allow people to ship anything, regardless of weight, as long as it fits in the box.

"We've had the boxes for years but they've really gotten popular," March said. "The promotion they've done this year has made a big difference."

Mail clerks make a difference too. On Friday, Lois Hooley was using a regular box to mail a present to her sister in Georgia. The

## Question of bike helmets back at T.F. Council

The Twin Falls City Council will take another look at bicycle safety tonight, this time looking solely at whether or not to require helmets of all children younger than 16 while riding.

Through a partnership with Magic Valley Safe Kids, the city's staff wrote in its report that helmets could cost \$7.75, and an option exists of offering a \$3-off coupon if enough money is

donated by the community. Creating a new cost for bike riders was one of the issues raised at a November council meeting when the helmet requirement was first looked at.

The City Council will meet at 5 p.m. today at the Twin Falls City Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E., Twin Falls.

The city's Bicycle Safety Subcommittee included a helmet requirement for everyone in a sweeping

update to city bicycle laws, but the council took that portion out so it could be discussed individually. The rest of the package, which included new minimum passing distance for cars and a requirement for a red rear lamp for nighttime riding, passed in a 6-0 vote.

Aside from forcing a new cost on bike riders, some councilmen also raised issues with enforceability and limiting people's freedom of choice in a state with no motorcycle helmet law.

rate box use means more decorative brass bookends she was sending were heavy, so the postage was expensive.

"He suggested that we use the flat-rate box to save money," Hooley said.

Customers can save more money and time by going online to USPS.com, creating shipping labels with postage and scheduling free package pickup. Idahoans can save between 3 percent and 11 percent over regular postal rates when shipping online.

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# Idaho Youth Ranch ornaments adorn national Christmas tree

RUPERT — Two Christmas ornaments created by children at the Idaho Youth Ranch were part of Thursday's national Christmas tree lighting ceremony on the Ellipse in Washington, D.C.

"We are excited by the accomplishments our kids make every day to build healthier lives for themselves," Jim Stockberger,

director of the ranch for troubled youth near Rupert, said in a written release. "We are pleased that their artwork is being honored at the national Christmas tree lighting. This is the icing on the Christmas cookie."

West Minico Middle School teacher Teresa Giraud guided the children through the project.

According to the IYR release, the tree lighting is one of the country's oldest tradi-

tions, started on Christmas Eve in 1923, when President Calvin Coolidge lit a Christmas tree in front of 3,000 spectators on the Ellipse. Each year since the president has carried on the tradition.

This year one artist and one youth group were selected from each state, territory and the District of Columbia to design and create 26 ornaments each.

"We are delighted to have

the Idaho Youth Ranch participating in this year's national Christmas tree display," Neil Mulholland, president and CEO of the event sponsoring National Park Foundation, said in the written release. "This event is a wonderful example of how our national parks connect us as a nation."

physician. But beginning in the late 1990s, he started making inroads to the administrative side.

He became medical director of the Home Health Care division in 1996, and a year ago became director of the Rural Training Tract, a program that offers training in a rural setting to interning doctors in the hopes that they'll stay rural.

Seppi has also sat on the boards of directors of Regence Blue Shield and Magic Health Partners. He's leaving a big hole but he said he thinks other doctors will step up.

"We have 10 physicians

on our St. Luke's Physicians Leadership Council but we've got all these other physicians," Seppi said. "We have to find a way to get the rank-and-file physicians who are working 50 or 60 hours a week, try to get them involved more as well."

As St. Luke's has taken over the clinics and hospitals of the Magic Valley, it has increased the size of the system it has to manage. More than 350 providers are now controlled by St. Luke's.

Seppi said St. Luke's administration created his position about a year ago to manage the complexities of its burgeoning population

by developing a physician-led health system.

"My job, from the physicians' side, is to drive a clinically-integrated model where we have physicians working together to improve the quality and efficiency of care by decreasing variation, improving standardization and following evidence-based medicine when possible," Seppi said.

Seppi is still in Twin Falls but is spending more time in Boise. On Friday, he was running a 6 a.m. meeting in Twin Falls but was supposed to be at an 8 a.m. meeting in Boise. So someone was sitting in for him, allowing

Seppi to be two places at once until he reached Boise later in the morning.

By Jan. 1, he plans to be a Boise resident but he will spend a fair amount of time traveling to the various hospitals, encouraging physicians to work together to build the McDonald's of health care systems, where all the treatment in southern Idaho will be the same.

"This is a real opportunity for me to be part of a bigger picture," Seppi said. "This job is going to be a five-to-10-year run to see if we can really change the system. Realistically, I don't think I'll be coming back to private practice."

"This just seemed to fit. We were looking to give back. That's the healthy thing to do when you retire," he said, noting that Jensen Jewelers, a family business begun by his parents 54 years ago, was sold about three years ago.

Beginning in July, the Jensens, former Pocatello residents who now live in Hailey, started making phone calls to see if organizations and individuals might donate items such as wheelchairs, walkers and other items to help the mobility impaired. The response was extremely positive.

"It's just amazing the doors that open and people willing to give," Jensen said.

A few weeks ago, Jensen called Safe Haven Care Center in Pocatello and spoke with Josiah Dahlstrom, the facility's administrator, inquiring whether the facility might have some older wheelchairs to donate.

"They made contact with

me and I knew we had a bunch of stuff down in our basement in storage that's just been sitting there collecting dust for as long as I've been there," said Dahlstrom.

He contacted the building owners about donating the chairs and was given the OK. He told the Jensens to swing on by.

"Interestingly enough, (Jensen) showed up to pick up the items in a small van," Dahlstrom said. "We opened up our basement door and he said, 'Holy cow. Let me go get a U-Haul. I'm not going to have enough room for all this stuff!'"

Jensen is still awed by the treasure trove he found there.

"They donated 42 wheelchairs, I think it was 25 walkers and all these other parts to us. It's the biggest single donation ever received in Idaho for this cause," Jensen said. "It's going to be dozens and dozens of people helped someplace by this very generous gifts."

Finding and collecting the

wheelchairs is only the first step, Jensen explained.

"Most of the time when relatives pass on, they don't know what to do with this stuff," Jensen said. "What we do is accumulate them and then they get shipped at no charge for example by FedEx to prisons where inmates will make them like new. With wheelchairs, it's new seats and arm rests and backs, make sure that the wheels are working right. Then they get sanitized there and are then shipped to Third World countries."

While people with disabilities here face everyday barriers to surmount, the poor people in many countries face even greater obstacles.

"It's incredible because people (in many Third World countries), I mean there's no way they can even think to afford a wheelchair even if they could find one. There are people there who's whole life has been living in the dirt, or people carry them places or they scoot around," Jensen said.

The work doesn't simply

stop at delivery, however.

"Volunteers go with the people to fit them. It's very important they be fitted," Jensen said. "If they aren't fitted, people can sometimes get bedsores."

Such an affliction can be treated here, but in remote areas in many countries, treatment not be readily available.

"In the mountains of Peru, they don't have antibiotics and a bed sore is tantamount to a death sentence," he said.

The Jensens have found the volunteer work fulfilling and are pondering the possibility of greater involvement.

"We just started with these folks the first of July, so we're relatively new," he said, but noted he and his wife are already discussing traveling abroad to the places where the chairs are donated.

"We're thinking about either Peru or Cuba," he said. "We actually have made some contact to go to the next step. It seems logical to do that."

**Idaho may fail waiver test on stimulus money**

LEWISTON — An Idaho official says a request by the state to the federal government for a waiver concerning how much Idaho spends on education in exchange for receiving federal stimulus money could be rejected because the state might end up not spending enough on education.

Paul Headlee is a legislative budget analyst for the state.

He says the state took and spent more than \$200 million in stimulus funding for public schools and universities in fiscal year 2009.

He tells the *Lewiston Tribune* that in return the state must spend at least as much on K-12 and higher education in 2009 as it did in 2006.

State officials say the state is meeting the waiver based on the revenue forecast lawmakers used in setting the 2011 budget.

However, officials say actual collections through the first four months of the fiscal year are running higher than forecast, shrinking the percent going to education, putting the state in danger of failing to meet the waiver test.

Officials won't know how it plays out until April.

**Census data shows increase in Idaho poverty rate**

BOISE — A U.S. Census Bureau report shows that the percentage of Idaho resi-

dents living in poverty in 2009 was slightly higher than the national average.

The information released Wednesday shows that nine Idaho counties had a statistically significant increase in the poverty rate from 2007 to 2009.

Those counties are Ada, Bingham, Camas, Canyon, Idaho, Kootenai, Lemhi, Lincoln and Madison.

The bureau reports that 14.4 percent of the nation's 3,141 counties saw increases in the poverty rate from 2007 to 2009.

**Former N. Idaho deputy files claim over firing**

SANDPOINT — A former Bonner County Sheriff's deputy fired after his Taser shocked his son has filed a tort claim against the county contending he was wrongfully terminated.

*The Bonner County Daily Bee* reports that Corey Cotter is seeking \$500,000 in the tort claim filed late last month. A tort claim is a precursor to a lawsuit.

Cotter in the claim says his 4-year-old son suffered a "brief shock" when he kicked the Taser while Cotter was testing it on April 26.

The claim says Cotter reported the incident to superiors and was fired following an administrative investigation.

Cotter contends Bonner county Sheriff Daryl Wheeler and Lt. Bill McAuliffe conducted a negligent internal investigation

that lacked thoroughness and objectivity.

The county declined to comment.

**Report finds Idaho living-wage jobs hard to find**

BOISE — A recent report says 88 percent of new job openings in Idaho pay less than a living wage for a family of four with one working adult, and 53 percent pay less than a living wage for a single adult.

The 2010 Northwest Job Gap Report says a single adult needs to earn \$29,642 annually to meet basic needs, while a family of four with two working adults must make \$75,372 a year.

The report also says that for every 30 job seekers there is only one job opening that pays a living wage of \$55,000 a year for a family of three.

**E. Idaho ski patroller falls from lift**

IDAHO FALLS — Authorities say a ski patroller at Kelly Canyon Ski Resort in eastern Idaho fell off a chair lift and was transported to a hospital.

The Jefferson County Sheriff's Office tells the *Post Register* that the patroller was transported to the Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center in Idaho Falls on Saturday.

His name and condition have not been released.

# Strong storm socks Midwest, cancels flights, closes roads

CHICAGO — A powerful, gusty storm dumped mounds of snow across the upper Midwest on Sunday, closing major highways in several states, canceling more than 1,600 flights in Chicago and collapsing the roof of the Minnesota Vikings' stadium.

At least four weather-related deaths were reported as the storm system dropped nearly 2 feet of snow in parts of Minnesota and marched east. A blizzard warning was in effect Sunday for parts of eastern Iowa, southeastern Wisconsin, northwestern Illinois and northern Michigan, according to the National Weather Service. Surrounding areas, including Chicago, were under winter storm warnings. Much of Iowa was under a wind-chill advisory.

In Minneapolis, the heavy snow left the Metrodome decidedly unready for some

football. Video inside the stadium aired by Fox Sports showed the inflatable Teflon roof sagging before it tore open, dumping massive amounts of snow across one end of the playing field.

No one was hurt but the Vikings' game against the New York Giants had to be moved to Detroit's Ford Field. The day of the game had already been pushed back from Sunday to today because the storm kept the Giants from reaching Minneapolis on time. Stadium officials were trying to repair the roof in time for the Vikings' next home game, Dec. 20 against Chicago.

The wintry weather, with blowing snow that severely limited visibility, wreaked havoc on air and road travel. In the Chicago area, wind gusts of up to 50 mph, temperatures in the teens and wind chills well below zero were expected, along with up to 8 inches of snow.

At least 1,375 flights were canceled at O'Hare International Airport and more than 300 were canceled at Midway International Airport, Chicago Department of Aviation spokeswoman Karen Pride said. Both airports expected more cancellations and reported significant delays.

Officials at O'Hare set up about 200 cots and will provide amenity kits containing toothpaste and toothbrushes in case travelers get stranded at the airport, Pride said.

Major highways in several states were closed due to poor driving conditions and accidents.

In Indianapolis, police said a man fatally stabbed his wife, then died four blocks from his home Sunday morning when his vehicle hit a tree after he lost control on a slippery road. Police did not immediately release the names of the couple.

Illinois State Police closed a section of Interstate 80 in

the north central part of the state after a multiple-car pileup west of Peru and part of Interstate 55 near Springfield after accidents and reports of zero visibility. No deaths were reported.

Seven vehicles crashed on Interstate 94 about 50 miles west of Milwaukee, prompting authorities to close the westbound lanes. A vehicle lost control on an ice-covered road and slammed into a tree in southeastern Wisconsin, killing 21-year-old Alejandria Abaunza of Chicago and injuring two other people inside.

Tod Pritchard of Wisconsin Emergency Management warned that Sunday afternoon would be especially difficult because temperatures were falling and at a certain point, road salt would no longer be effective. The storm had already dropped up to 18 inches of snow in parts of northern and central Wisconsin, he said, and light snow continued Sunday.

## No charges for LDS members aware of man's crimes

BOISE (AP) — As many as 15 church members who knew several months before authorities did that a Boise police officer had molested children will face no criminal charges for failing to report the crimes, Idaho authorities say.

The Ada County Sheriff's Office says members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are protected by Idaho's clergy privilege law.

Police said Stephen R. Young confessed his crimes to church officials in January, but the crimes didn't become public until March. Young attended an LDS church in Eagle.

An attorney for the church said efforts by church leaders resulted in Young's crimes coming to the attention of authorities.

"From the moment Mr. Young confessed, church leaders took every precaution they legally could to protect victims and the public," attorney Randy Austin told the *Idaho Statesman* in a story published Sunday. "And church leaders avoided violating the clergy privilege — a breach which could have

tainted the evidence against Mr. Young and jeopardized his prosecution."

Court records say Young admitted molesting four children, ages 1 month to 21 months, between 2005 and 2008. He initially was charged with four counts of lewd conduct with a minor but later pleaded guilty to one count of sexual battery of a child.

Young was sentenced in September to 25 years in prison, but he can ask for parole after 12 years.

Young, 59, was a Boise police officer from 1978 until he retired in February and was a school resource officer from 1995 to 2005.

According to court records and a journal kept by his wife, Young in August 2009 told his wife about his crimes and moved out of the family's Eagle home.

In January, Young confessed his crimes to church officials, and Austin said church officials urged Young and his wife to tell police. Austin said making that recommendation was all clergy members could legally do.

"From the outset (church leaders) strongly encouraged Mr. Young and his wife to go to

the police as quickly as possible," Austin said.

Investigators and church officials said LDS members who knew about Young's confessions initiated an internal disciplinary process against him.

Sheriff's reports say Boise police officer Kyle Christensen was a member of that process. But they say an LDS official asked him not to be involved in a hearing involving Young because, as a police officer, he was duty-bound to report crimes, but as a member of the High Council, he had to keep whatever he heard secret.

Police say the LDS official did not tell Christensen who was involved in the disciplinary hearing.

However, a week later, in early spring, Christensen learned Young had been excommunicated and called Young to offer his support. Young then admitted to Christensen that he had molested small children and said he didn't have the courage to turn himself.

Christensen reported the conversation to higher-ranking police officials, who told Christensen to tell Young to

turn himself in or a criminal investigation would be started.

Young agreed to go with Christensen to turn himself in on March 2, according to Ada County sheriff's arrest reports, two days after Young abruptly retired from the police department.

## Roof collapse moves Giants-Vikings game to Detroit

MINNEAPOLIS — Brett Favre is getting help from the Minnesota Vikings medical staff, the athletic trainers and perhaps even the weather gods as he tries to keep his incredible consecutive starts record going.

The Vikings' home game against the New York Giants was moved to Monday night in Detroit after the Metrodome's inflated roof collapsed in a snowstorm early Sunday morning.

The delay has given Favre more time to heal his sprained right shoulder, with his NFL-record streak of 297 straight regular season starts hanging in the balance.

"Joke goin round is Gods Tryin to preserve Bretts streak record," Vikings receiver Bernard Berrian wrote on Twitter. "Lol!!"

Favre barely practiced all week. He's listed as questionable for the game after getting hit hard and slammed to the turf on his first pass of last week's game against the Buffalo Bills.

Favre sent a text message to USA Today on Sunday saying he doubts he will be able to play on Monday night "but it does buy a little time."

Interim coach Leslie Frazier said the 41-year-old quarterback will still go through a pregame workout to determine if he's able to play.

"From everything I've

seen, there is still a possibility he could play, especially with an extra day," Frazier said in a conference call Sunday before the Vikings departed for Detroit.

The Vikings held a short walkthrough Sunday afternoon, but Favre did not do any throwing.

"Rest is as important as anything to him," Frazier said, "and the fact that he's actually going through the throwing motion, we'll still get a chance to test some things out (Monday)."

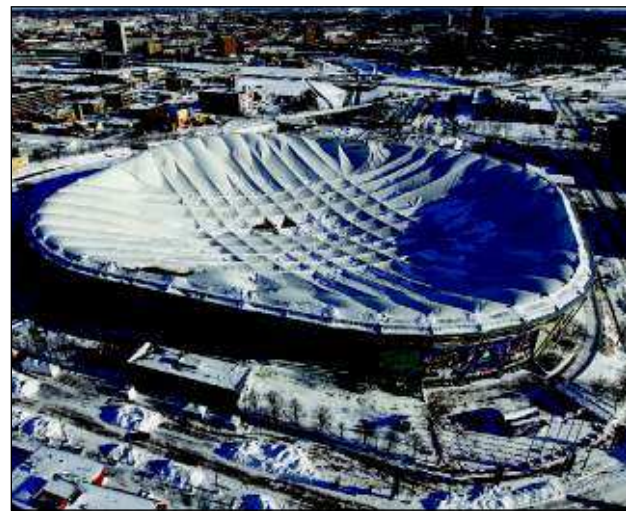
The game originally was scheduled for Sunday afternoon and already had been pushed back because of the storm that dumped 17 inches of snow on Minneapolis.

But Metrodome officials

told the league the roof wouldn't be ready in time to play Monday or Tuesday. The league also had discussions with New Orleans, St. Louis and Indianapolis and briefly considered the University of Minnesota's outdoor stadium before deciding to hold the game at Ford Field at 7:20 p.m.

The NFL said Detroit was the best logistical fit given that Fox camera crews were already in town for the Lions' game against the Green Bay Packers on Sunday.

"There are still a lot of logistics up in the air, but we will do everything we can to make this a quality NFL game for the Vikings and Giants," Lions President Tom Lewand said.

## Alex Smith triumphant in return; Niners rout Seahawks

SAN FRANCISCO — Not only is Alex Smith playing for a job next season, he might be helping coach Mike Singletary save his.

A switch of quarterbacks named Smith did wonders to keep San Francisco's hopes alive.

Alex Smith threw for 255 yards and three touchdowns in a triumphant return to the starting lineup following a five-game absence, and the 49ers improved their onceslim playoff chances with a 40-21 victory over the NFC West rival Seattle Seahawks on Sunday.

The Niners muddled up the ugly West race even more with a surprisingly lopsided win.

San Francisco (5-8) moved within a game of division leaders Seattle (6-7) and St. Louis (6-7), which lost 31-13 at New Orleans.

The 49ers looked much more like the team that was predicted to win the division after an unbeaten preseason — not the bunch that began 0-5.

"We're a young team and today was big for us," Singletary said. "But at the same time, today means nothing if we don't play well next week. We have very little room for error, and we

have to understand that."

Matt Hasselbeck went 27 for 42 for 285 yards and two TDs, but threw four interceptions and lost a fumble as Seattle had turnovers in five of six possessions during one stretch.

"They didn't have to do anything special today because we gave them so many good shots and good opportunities," Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said.

Vernon Davis caught five passes for 70 yards and a 42-yard catch-and-run TD. Josh Morgan made a 15-yard touchdown reception and Brian Westbrook hauled in a 62-yard touchdown pass for his longest career TD catch

and longest play from scrimmage since 2006. Westbrook wound up with six catches for 87 yards.

"It's playoff mode right now," Smith said. "It was a must-win game. We knew that all week — our backs against the wall."

Smith matched a career high by throwing for three touchdowns for the fifth time. The No. 1 overall draft pick in 2005 was back behind center in place of Troy Smith, who went 3-2 during his stint as San Francisco's starter.

Dashon Goldson made a 39-yard interception return

## Feely's TD, 5 field goals lead Arizona past Denver 43-13

GLENDALE, Ariz. — Jay Feely got a kick and a big run out of facing the Denver Broncos on Sunday.

Feely became the fourth kicker in 40 years to run for a touchdown and added a career-best five field goals to help the Arizona Cardinals end a seven-game losing streak with a 43-13 win.

Arizona rookie quarterback John Skelton, in his first NFL start, completed 14 of 36 for 141 yards with no interceptions and had at least four passes dropped.

The Broncos (3-10) committed six turnovers, three of them interceptions by Kyle Orton, in their eighth loss in nine games, an uninspired debut under interim coach Eric Studesville, promoted from running backs coach when Josh McDaniels was fired last Monday.

The Cardinals' Tim Hightower rushed for a career-best 148 yards, including fourth-quarter scoring runs of 8 and 35 yards.

Feely's 5-yard first-half scoring run on a fake field goal ended a nine-quarter touchdown drought for Arizona (4-9).

He kicked field goals of 36, 48, 55, 23 and 49 yards. Feely was wide left on a 49-yarder, just his second miss in 22 attempts this season.

The 55-yarder, with 2 seconds left in the first half, matched the longest of his 10-year NFL career.

According to the Cardinals, the last kicker to run for a score was Tim

Seder of Dallas against Oakland on Oct. 7, 2001.

Feely's touchdown came after Orton threw right into the arms of safety Kerry Rhodes, with no Denver receiver in the vicinity. Rhodes, who also recovered a Denver fumble, returned the pick 33 yards to the Broncos 24.

A successful challenge of what was ruled an incomplete resulted in an 11-yard pass to Early Doucet, but the drive stalled at the 5-yard line and Arizona set up for yet another field goal.

But the snap went directly to Feely, who barely outran the defenders to the right corner of the end zone.

Denver scored on its opening possession when replacement kicker Steve Hauschka's 32-yard field goal try careened off the right upright and was good. Hauschka also had a 30-yard field goal with 11:20 to play and missed a 40-yarder. Hauschka was signed Saturday, two days after regular kicker Matt Prater injured a groin in practice.

The Broncos' touchdown came on Knowshon Moreno's 1-yard run with 3:31 to play. Orton was 18 of 37 for 160 yards.

Arizona rookie Daryl Washington intercepted Orton late in the game and ran 39 yards, foolishly holding the ball high in one hand as he approached the goal line. Denver's Lance Ball stripped it from behind and Arizona's Darnell Dockett recovered in the end zone for the final score.

## Streaks alive for Stoudemire, Knicks

NEW YORK — Amare Stoudemire scored 24 of his 30 points in the second half, Wilson Chandler made the tiebreaking 3-pointer with 30 seconds left, and the New York Knicks beat the Denver Nuggets 129-125 on Sunday for their first eight-game winning streak in 16 years.

Stoudemire set a franchise record with his eighth straight 30-point game.

Winning for the 13th time in 14 games, the Knicks have won eight straight for the first time since Dec. 27, 1994-Jan. 13, 1995.

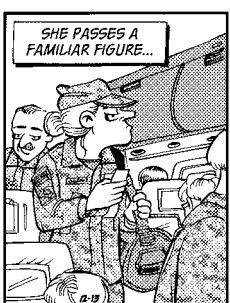
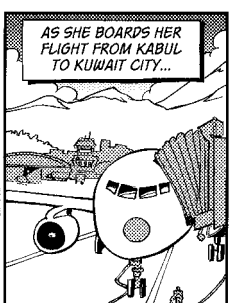

We need to leave the retirement age alone and treat our population of older Americans as if they matter — not as if they are burdensome parasites.

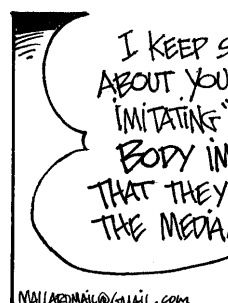

## Car bomb at gates of military base kills 6 NATO troops, 2 Afghan soldiers

KABUL — An explosives-packed minibus blew up at the entrance of a joint NATO-Afghan base in southern Afghanistan on Sunday, killing six NATO troops and two Afghan soldiers as they prepared to head out on patrol.

NATO has claimed improvements in security after months of raids, patrols and strikes on insurgents in Kandahar province, but Sunday's blast — the deadliest attack on coalition troops this month — shows the area is still far from safe.

The assault comes days ahead of a major White House review of its Afghan strategy following President Barack Obama's decision last year to send 30,000 American reinforcements in a bid to reverse gains by the Taliban since they were ousted from power in the 2001 U.S.-led invasion.

Afghan officials said Sunday's suicide attack took place in Kandahar's Zhari district, where Mullah Mohammad Omar organized the Taliban in the early 1990s. Taliban spokesman Qari Yusuf Ahmadi claimed responsibility for the blast, saying the insurgent group was retaliating for attacks on its fighters in the area in recent months.

## Flying high until his story crashed — pilot duped doctor groups with fake M.D.

MILWAUKEE — He seemed like Superman, able to guide jumbo jets through perilous skies and tiny tubes through blocked arteries. As a cardiologist and United Airlines captain, William Hamman taught doctors and pilots ways to keep hearts and planes from crashing.

He shared millions in grants, had university and hospital posts, and bragged of work for prestigious medical groups. An Associated Press story featured him leading a teamwork training session at an American College of Cardiology convention last spring.

But it turns out Hamman isn't a cardiologist or even a doctor. The AP found he had no medical residency, fellowship, doctoral degree or the 15 years of clinical experience he claimed. He attended medical school for a few years but withdrew and didn't graduate.

His pilot qualifications do not appear to be in question — he holds the highest type of license a pilot can have, a Federal Aviation Administration spokeswoman said. However, United grounded him in August after his medical and doctoral degrees evaporated like contrails of the jets he flew. He resigned in June as an educator and researcher at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, Mich., after a credentials check revealed discrepancies, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Doctors who worked with the 58-year-old pilot are stunned, not just at the ruse and how long it lasted, but also because many of them valued his work and were sad to see it end.

## New theory for origins of Saturn's rings: icy remnants from a moon before its plunge

One of the solar system's most evocative mysteries — the origin of Saturn's rings — may be a case of cosmic murder, new research suggests.

The victim: an unnamed moon of Saturn that disappeared about 4.5 billion years ago.

The suspect: a disk of hydrogen gas that once surrounded Saturn when its dozens of moons were forming, but has now fled the crime scene.

The cause of death: A forced plunge into Saturn.

And those spectacular and colorful rings are the only evidence left. As the doomed moon made its death spiral, Saturn robbed its outer layer of ice, which then formed rings, according to a new theory published online Sunday in the journal Nature.

## New California law sends moms and dads of gang kids to better parenting classes

LOS ANGELES — It's a Saturday morning and a half-dozen adults are sitting in a high school classroom, staring at grim photos of sickly drug addicts and hearing about the deadly consequences of gang crime. They'd rather not be here, but a judge made them come.

The moms and dads were ordered to attend the class under a new California law giving judges the option of sending parents for training when their kids are convicted of gang crimes for the first time.

Assemblyman Tony Mendoza, the lawmaker behind the Parent Accountability Act, said it is the first state law to give judges the power to order parents of gang members to school, though other court-mandated classes exist at the local level.

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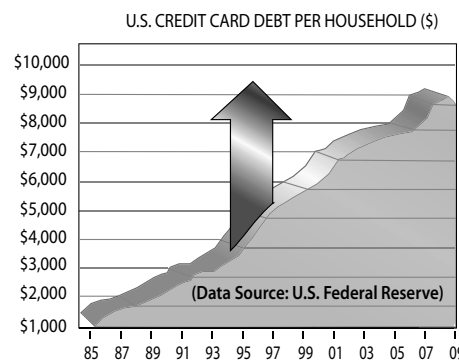

## IN THE KITCHEN

### Devices and tips to ease your pain

For additional suggestions on how to make your life easier in the kitchen despite arthritis, talk to an occupational therapist or contact the Arthritis Foundation, arthritis.org or (800) 444-4993.

It's hard to get up much interest in cooking when it hurts to carry heavy pots, stand over the stove to stir, or cut vegetables.

For arthritis sufferers, pain is often a part of preparing meals. But there are things they can do to ease that discomfort, including using specially designed tools, organizing their kitchens to reduce joint stress and thinking ahead so time can be on their side.

"Paying attention to what your body is telling you is important. ... If it's hurting a lot, it probably means you can do something a little differently," said Kat Elton, an occupational therapist in Salt Lake City who wrote a book titled "A Resilient Life: Learning to Thrive, Not Just Survive, With Rheumatoid Arthritis." Elton, who has had arthritis since she was 2, volunteers as an educator with the Arthritis Foundation in the Mountain West.

Betty Sugden of Twin Falls has taken that advice seriously, investing in gadgets to help her in the kitchen. She also has a chair near her cooking area and often rests a few minutes in it between elements of food preparation.

"My feet get to hurting and my legs get tired, so when I get things settled, like something in the oven, then I go sit down for a while, put my feet up," she said, noting that she often chooses menu items that allow her to rest, rather than those that require constant attention.

Sugden has a reacher-grabber, a tool that allows her to get items off high shelves without strain, and she uses an electric can opener and rubber pads that help her open jars. And she's not afraid to ask for help when she needs it. "If I do have company, I'll ask someone to come and take (a heavy dish) out of the oven for me."

Frances Wayment of Jerome goes a step further — for big meals, like Thanksgiving, she has guests bring dishes potluck-style, minimizing the time she has to spend on her feet in the kitchen, preparing food.

Wayment, who works in the kitchens at Jerome Senior Center, also uses a reacher-grabber. And in the commercial kitchen, she often sets heavier items on a rolling cart to move them across the large space. For big freight boxes, she gets a hand from someone else, and she tries to keep off-used items off of high and low shelves.

"Keep things really organized, so you're avoiding a lot of extra bending and a lot of extra reaching," said Elton, who keeps her frequently used pots and pans on the

stovetop instead of putting them away under a counter or hanging overhead.

Elton likes peelers that have the blades at the end of the handle — rather than the knife-shaped ones — and she suggests shopping for dishes and mugs that

are lightweight.

Those that can be gripped around their circumference are best for people with arthritis in their hands, said Mandy Lee, occupational therapist at Primary Therapy Source in Twin Falls.

"For a person with arthri-

tis, it is very important to use the joint in its most natural alignment whenever possible," she said, suggesting utensils with extra-thick handles, rocker knives, spring-loaded kitchen scissors and small countertop choppers that reduce the

need to use a knife.

All the therapists said jar openers, like those available from Good Grips or Oxo, are handy for more than just their intended use. Try drawer liners or Dycem nonslip pads to increase the friction between your bowl and the counter,

and consider slipping on some rubber gloves to get that same friction on your fingertips.

If you can get a new appliance, consider a refrigerator with a freezer drawer at the bottom, or a side-by-side, and keep items most often used just below eye level. And if you're remodeling, consider installing the oven at that level to reduce bending and lifting heavy dishes. Kitchen islands can also be handy, because they keep more items within arm's reach — Elton even had hers raised a bit above typical height to make it less of a strain to use.

Whether you have an island or not, consider bringing a bar stool into the kitchen, so you can sit during tasks like cutting, peeling and stirring, or invest in a thick mat to stand on near your work areas. Conserving energy by sitting gives you more to use for cooking, and cushioning can reduce stress on your joints.

"If you're making a more complex dish, you can break it down, do some of the steps one part of the day, then come back and finish it," Lee said. Elton said she often chops all her vegetables or breaks bulk items down into smaller containers right after she gets them home from the store, so she doesn't have to do that task later. Then, when cooking time comes, the veggies are ready to go in the pan.

No matter what action you want to do, think about how you can reduce strain on your joints in accomplishing it.

"I just pick things up differently," said Marilyn Wrobel of Twin Falls, who was just diagnosed with arthritis that is worse on one side than the other. "I just baby it more; my arm can only go up so far."

Use two hands instead of one, pick up that jug of milk by the bottom instead of the handle, and pour with your forearm, Elton said. Don't disregard the pain — what is a twinge now can become agony after you've done that same action dozens or hundreds of times over the months and years. Instead, find a method that isn't painful, and retrain yourself, and soon you'll find that cooking isn't the strain on arthritic joints that it once was.

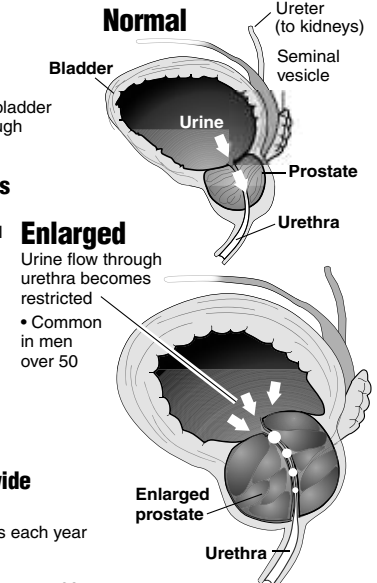

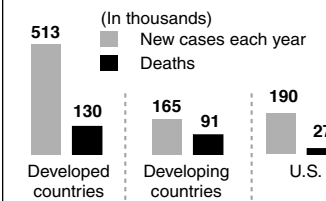

# How to be good to your gut

off good bacteria and clear the way for more harmful germs to grow.

Your digestive system doesn’t just break down food. It also protects you from germs and releases hormones related to mood, stress and more, including bone growth. Here are some ways to help keep your gut healthy, doctors say:

**Nurture friendly bacteria.** “Good” strains of bacteria – which can stimulate your immune system to fight off disease – love to feed on fiber. So load up on fiber-rich foods such as fresh fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

**Eat slowly.** Your body needs time to digest food properly, and inhaling your meal will overload your system (and make you gassy, since you’re likely swallowing lots of air). Chew each bite well so your digestive system won’t have to break down large chunks of food.

**Avoid your heartburn triggers.** Common culprits are acidic, fatty or spicy foods, carbonated drinks, chocolate, onions and products made with whole milk. Meanwhile, artificial sweeteners and big servings of beans, onions or cruciferous vegetables such as broccoli and cauliflower can cause gas.

**Exercise regularly.** Breaking a sweat reduces bloating, gas and constipation. Walk, run or bike outside to help soothe nerves at the same time.

**Manage stress.** Relaxation techniques such as meditation, deep breathing or yoga can ease indigestion and other stomach pains triggered by stress hormones.

**Don’t use colonic “cleansers.”** You will kill

**Avoid overuse of antibiotics.** Again, you will destroy good bacteria, while you may make bad strains more resistant to medications. Note: antibiotics are useless against viruses.

**Buy foods with probiotics.** Yogurt, soy-based drinks, juice and cereal are possible sources of these microorganisms, thought to help maintain a healthy balance of bacteria in the intestines.



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# Women’s aches and pains may signal serious health threats

Too many women don’t get treated for common conditions because they don’t recognize the symptoms.

Tired, forgetful, sensitive to cold? That could mean an underactive thyroid. Have a pain under the right breast along with nausea and vomiting? That could indicate gallstones.

Not only do these medical problems afflict women more frequently than men, so do heart attacks and strokes – often overlooked and left untreated by women because the symptoms are different from men’s.

Here’s a look at some of the issues doctors would like women to know more about:

## Thyroid problems

Millions of Americans have thyroid diseases, and most of them are women, according to Medline Plus, a service of the U.S. National Library of Medicine. The thyroid is a butterfly-shaped endocrine gland in the neck that helps set the metabolism – the rate at which your body gets energy from the foods you eat.

An underactive thyroid, or hypothyroidism, is the most common thyroid disease in women. The symptoms are mild weight gain, fatigue, poor memory, constipation, dry skin, abnormal menstrual cycles and sensitivity to cold.

Not only is thyroid disease more prominent in women than men, its prevalence increases with age, says Dr. Sheila Chhutani, an obstetrician-gynecologist at Texas Health Presbyterian Hospital Dallas. That’s why women should be attentive to these symptoms and not brush off mild weight gain, fatigue and poor memory as caused by

aging alone.

**What to do:** Request a blood test for thyroid disease as part of your annual physical. If you do have thyroid disease, your doctor may prescribe thyroid hormone replacement in the form of a daily pill. You often have to get tested a few times before your doctor sets the right dose. Once it is set, you can usually wait a year before testing again.

## Heart attacks and strokes

More women than men die from cardiovascular disease at age 35 and beyond, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. In addition, more than one in three women has some form of cardiovascular disease. It’s the No. 1 health threat to women, causing more deaths nationally than all types of cancer combined, according to the American Heart Association.

Experts speculate that the high mortality rate for women is in part caused by a lack of awareness of the symptoms, which are different from those of men.

Because women don’t recognize the signs, they may wait longer to seek treatment, which puts them in increased danger.

If you think you’re having a stroke or heart attack or have symptoms that last for several minutes, seek prompt medical attention. The warning signs in women are:

**For stroke:** Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body; sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding; sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes; sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination; sudden, severe headache with no known cause.

**For heart attack:** Discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back that feels like uncomfortable pres-

sure, squeezing, fullness or pain; discomfort in other areas of the upper body, including pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach; shortness of breath; nausea, lightheadedness or breaking out in a cold sweat.

The heart association suggests that up to 80 percent of cardiac events in women could be prevented if women:

- Ate a healthy diet.
- Kept weight, blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar under control.
- Didn’t smoke.
- Exercised at least 30 minutes a day.
- Got regular medical checkups.

The heart association also recommends that women over the age of 65 take a low-dosage aspirin, in consultation with a physician.

## ACL injuries

Women are more than twice as likely as men to tear the anterior cruciate ligament in their knees, according to the American Journal of Sports Medicine.

Although the reason for that has not been established, a recent study about male and female soccer players, published in the Journal of Bone and Joint Surgery, suggests that this may result from men and women using different leg and hip muscles.

Dr. Robert H. Brophy, an orthopedic surgeon, study author and assistant professor of orthopedics at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, found that male players use muscles that move the thigh away from the body at the hip more than females

do, and speculates that it contributes to the difference.

“Programs focusing on strengthening and recruiting muscles around the hip may be an important part of programs designed to reduce a female athlete’s risk of ACL injury,” Brophy says.

## Gallstones

Women between the ages of 20 and 60 are three times likelier to develop gallstones than men, according to the American College of Gastroenterology.

The gallbladder is a pear-shaped organ under your liver that stores bile, a fluid that digests fat. Gallstones form in the gallbladder when substances in bile, usually cholesterol, harden and block the flow of bile through the bile ducts.

Obesity and rapid weight loss are factors in the formation of gallstones, which may be why the risk factors include multiple pregnancies – because they entail gaining and losing a lot of weight.

The condition is also common among American Indians and Mexican-Americans, according to Medline Plus.

Symptoms include a constant pain lasting for hours under the right breast. The pain can also radiate to the abdomen, back or right shoulder and can include nausea and vomiting. In severe cases, there may also be fever, chills and jaundice.

**What to do:** Options can range from removing the gallstones to removing the gallbladder. Gallstones discovered using the ERCP (endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography) test can be removed during the procedure.

Bush claimed the presidency a day after the U.S. Supreme Court shut down further recounts of disputed ballots in Florida; Democrat Al Gore conceded, delivering a call for national unity. Seven inmates made a daring escape from a maximum security prison in Kenedy, Texas. (Six of the "Texas 7" were later recaptured; one killed himself; the others were sentenced to death for killing a Dallas-area police officer during a robbery. One of the six, Michael Rodriguez, dropped his appeals and was executed in 2008.) President Bill Clinton ended his last presidential visit to Northern Ireland.

**Five years ago:** Crips gang co-founder Stanley Tookie Williams, whose supporters argued had redeemed himself inside prison, was executed in California for killing four people in robberies. Iraqis living abroad began voting in the country's parliamentary elections. American Red Cross President Marsha Evans announced her resignation.

# THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal comes from the recent world championships in Beijing. In five diamonds, you ruff the opening spade lead. Looking only at the North and South cards, how should you continue?

Anyone could try to set up a club and ruff a club, but the defenders might foil you by getting two rounds of trump in. Matthew Granovetter crossed instead to the heart ace and led a low club from the dummy, figuring that this would work if East had a singleton trump, no matter whether he had one club honor or both.

West captured the club queen with his king and shifted to trumps, but Granovetter saw his plan through and won in hand to lead a second club. When East had no second trump to lead, declarer was home.

In the other room declarer followed the mundane line of leading a club from hand at trick two, letting the defenders play trumps twice and forcing South to rely on the heart finesse eventually.

If that was lucky for him and unlucky for Granovetter, consider the multiple world champion who won the spade lead and advanced the heart jack at trick two. When West ducked smoothly, declarer overtook in dummy and ruffed a heart, led a club to the 10 and ace, won the trump return in dummy, ruffed a heart, then led a second club. West took the trick and played a second trump, and declarer was dead. "What bad luck; the heart finesse worked!" his teammates consoled him.

**ANSWER:** One choice is to go passive by leading a trump. On this auction, if declarer has a two-way finesse to take, he won't get it wrong. Alternatively, the clubs might well produce a source of discards for declarer, so maybe an aggressive heart lead is correct. My soft cards in the minors persuade me to go passive and lead the spade eight. After all, how can we have five top winners to cash?

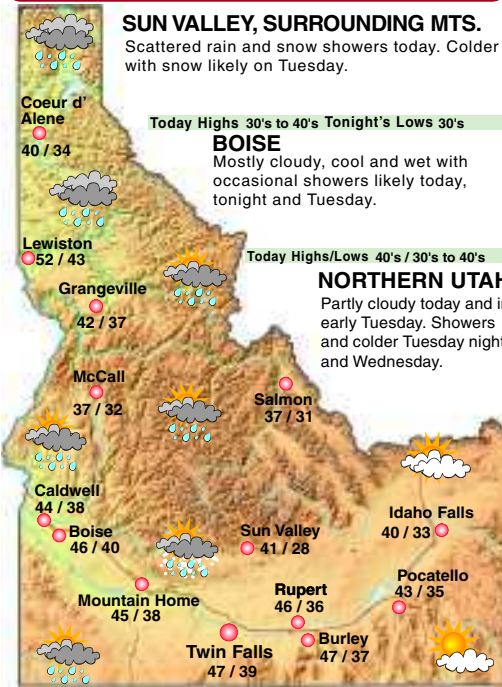

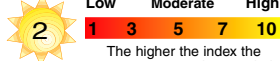

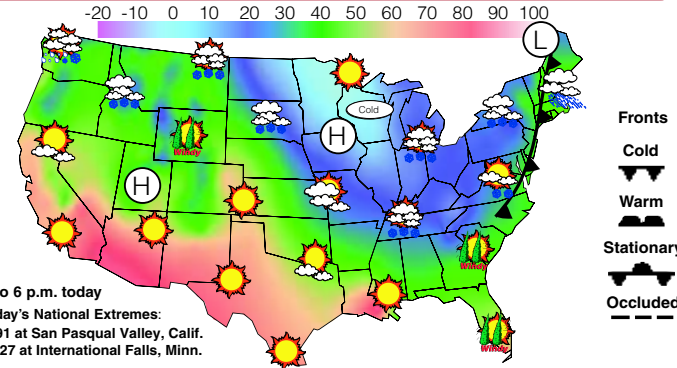
