Obscenity letter sent after city stymied on 'Adult XXX' sign

City e-mails target Smokin' Head, not Karnation and Enchantress

No public record exists of complaints about adult stores Karnation and Enchantress, despite letters from Twin Falls Police stating that complaints spurred investigations into their possible sale of obscene materials.

The letters threatened action "up to and including arrest" if the stores did not comply with state law regarding the sale of obscene material, but didn't specify which of the stores' wares were obscene.

Instead, a cache of e-mails from city officials reveal a focus on the "Adult XXX" sign formerly

on the front of Allen Nagel's Smokin' Head Smoke Shop and a variety of efforts to have it removed.

"It is my understanding that the sign complies with our sign ordinance and does not violate any state laws," City Manager

Sweet deal

Tax legislation includes \$55 billion in benefits for a host of industries

WASHINGTON — A host of industries, from Caribbean distilleries to Hollywood producers, would gain billions in tax breaks and other subsidies under compromise tax-cut legislation now moving its way through Congress.

The \$858 billion package approved by the Senate on Wednesday is focused primarily on continuing the Bush administration tax cuts for two years, extending unemployment benefits and other large-scale expenditures. But buried inside the legislation are more than \$55 billion in other giveaways and tax reductions for some of Washington's most influential industry groups.

The energy and agricultural industries, for example, would continue to receive a generous ethanol tax credit at a cost to taxpayers of about \$6 billion in 2011. The 45-cents-per-gallon credit goes to fuel blenders — including large oil and gas companies such as Shell — who count it against income tax owed to the United States.

T.F. district looks to join pursuit of levies

Idaho's school district budgets resemble pothole-riddled roads.

Plenty of ruts lie ahead and if dollars were blacktop, there wouldn't be enough to spread across them all.

At Twin Falls School District, for example, officials say they'd need another \$14.8 million over the next two years to provide what the district had in the 2008-09 school year. Back then, it was different: classes were taught in a block schedule and school and work calendars were intact.

Now, school districts are on the edge of a budget cliff. Federal stimulus and state rainy day accounts, which have shielded public education from worse cuts, are nearly gone. State revenues, while better than projected in recent months, are still unpredictable, and legislators face a 10 percent, \$340 million gap in the overall state budget.

It's against this backdrop that the Twin Falls district is joining the ranks of others across the state in seeking a supplemental levy.

If approved by voters on March 8, the supplemental levy would provide up to \$7.5 million during the next two school years

— \$3.75 million each year.

Bob Seaman, director of fiscal affairs, said an advisory budget committee's levy recommendation was done with the goal of preserving quality education and keeping good teachers in classrooms. The school board approved it Monday.

The money would go toward adding six contract days back, four of them classroom days and two teacher work days; math and health textbooks; and software licensing.

There's another factor: jobs. The expected loss in funding for the next school year equates to 50 to 70 positions in the district,

if all of the cuts came as layoffs.

District officials stress that all avenues will be explored before layoffs if the levy fails, but add that the federal stimulus funding has kept employees working.

"We didn't hire one person with the dollars," Seaman said. "All we did is maintain positions."

While the supplemental levy's passage would help, it wouldn't patch the entire hole.

Five furlough days would still remain in the next school year's calendar if the levy passes. The district put 15 furlough days in place initially for this school year. Then federal jobs bill

money came in, with enough funds to restore four days.

But that funding source will only be available this year and the 2011-12 school year. The latter would be the first year of the two-year levy if it passes.

Other items the levy still wouldn't fund include \$404,000 for technology, \$54,000 for classroom supplies and \$530,000 for utilities, transportation and various purchases services.

TFSD is the only of Idaho's 10 largest districts without a supplemental levy in place.

Conservation project aims to protect river water

The Little Wood River may flow a little clearer if a local conservation group can find the money to finish working with streamside farmers on irrigation improvements.

The Wood River Soil and Conservation District has begun a final push to reduce the amount of irrigation water flowing off nearby fields into the Little Wood River. This year, the district contacted farmers who own riverside property and offered them financial and technical support if they would transition from flood or furrow irrigation to sprinklers. Work was finished on the first contract a few weeks ago.

Carl Pendleton, chairman of the district board, said the district applied for funding two years ago from a special pot of money associated with the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service Environmental Quality Incentives Program. It appealed to the district because NRCS allowed the water quality enhancement fund to pay a higher percentage — up to 50 percent — of a project's cost-share than is allowed with other programs.

Elsewhere in the Magic Valley, smaller districts are already reaping the benefits.

"We wouldn't have been able to function without it," said Andy Wiseman, superintendent of Castleford School District.

In May, the district passed a two-year levy that generates \$300,000 each year. That's gradually increased from \$58,000 six years ago and covers a variety of needs: dual-credit online

courses, carpeting, textbooks, repairs and field trips are all on the list.

Jerome School District has a \$650,000 supplemental levy, and the school board will discuss this month whether to seek its renewal next year for the same dollar amount or more, said Superintendent Dale Layne.

It's helped with building projects, supplies and textbooks, he said, adding that the decision will be tough.

"With the same dollar amount, because that's in place people are used to that," he said. "The difficult decision is if you start increasing that, that's going to have an impact on property taxes."

Buhl School District failed

earlier this year to pass a supplemental levy, but the school board this month will talk about whether to propose another next year, said Superintendent Byron Stutzman.

This year, the district avoided cutting programs by dipping into its reserves, a cushion that won't exist next year, Stutzman said.

"That was important for these projects because they are the last of the lands to be treated because they are the most difficult," Pendleton said. "The narrow lands along the river don't lend themselves to conventional circular or square sprinkler systems."

To provide additional support, the district joined with NRCS and the Idaho Soil and Water Conservation Commission to create the Pilger Project, the first of three phases that incrementally focus on three sections of the river. Sprinkler systems use less water than flood or fur-

row irrigation so less soil, herbicides and pesticides are washed into rivers.

The Pilger Project area includes eight landowners along the river from Richfield to Shoshone. But only two pieces of property have traits that currently allow for upgrades. Kevin Davidson, NRCS soil conservationist, said the biggest problem was a lack of power to run pumps.

"One farm has no power at all and it's about a half-mile from a power line," Davidson said. "If we could get power there, we could bring in two other farms. But power lines cost about \$8,000 per quarter-mile."

"Unfortunately, the fund doesn't cost-share on

power line extension," Pendleton said. "The only other option is diesel generators, which are just as cost-prohibitive."

Even with funding, upgrades are expensive. Landowner Rod Hubschmidt agreed to switch to sprinklers even though he knew it would be a challenge. The biggest expense was his own version of the Big Dig — a 1,000-foot trench cut as deep as 10 feet through the bedrock. The depth was needed to maintain enough slope to keep the water flowing under gravity. His cost for that alone: \$20,000.

"I've been thinking about this for 20 years," Hubschmidt said. "Even though two-thirds of the expense came

out of my pocket, I just felt it was a project that needed to be done. The Little Wood's a beautiful river."

Pendleton said no money was slated for the next two phases: the section from Shoshone to the Gooding County line and from the county line to where the Little Wood joins the Big Wood River.

"With budgets being cut, conservation initiatives may be one of the things that fall," Pendleton said. "Many EQIP funds came out of the stimulus bill so they're going away."

Proposed ruling favors ex-ITD head

BOISE (AP) — A federal judge has sided with former Idaho Transportation Department Director Pamela Lowe in a proposed ruling, setting the stage for her wrongful firing lawsuit against the state to proceed.

U.S. District Judge Ronald Bush indicated in a proposed decision late Wednesday that the Idaho Transportation Board was limited to firing Lowe for "inefficiency, neglect of duty, malfeasance or non-feasance."

The department's law-

yers had argued Lowe could be fired for any reason.

Lowe contends she was dismissed in July 2009 for political reasons, not for the four reasons outlined in Idaho law.

Bush concluded the Idaho Legislature provided guidelines for board members to fire a Transportation Department director in a bid to protect the agency's leader from political pressure.

Bush gave both sides until Jan. 14 to submit new arguments, before he issues a final decision.

Tom Courtney wrote Nov. 16. "If that is not correct, we need to discuss. I don't think this is the kind of thing we want at the entrance to the city. The question is what can we do about it?"

More than a month before that e-mail, on Oct. 8, Mayor Don Hall received an e-mail complaint about the building's signage and color. According to city communications, it would be about a month before further action was taken.

Officer Luke Allen wrote on Nov. 8 that he advised Nagel "that it was probably a good idea, from a community standpoint, if he didn't draw any unwanted attention to his business." Allen wrote that Nagel said he understood and "probably" would remove the sign.

Allen also made first note of Nagel's adult videos and that "they are not visible from the outside or by anyone who

shouldn't be seeing them?"

Allen wrote a week later, after the city received another complaint about the "Adult XXX" sign, that it is not an actual violation of state code on profanity.

"Fritz (Wonderlich, the city attorney) basically said we can ask him to take it down, but we really can't force him to remove it based on the profanity code," Allen wrote Nov. 16, in response to the same e-mail as Courtney. He also made the first mention of Enchantress and Karnation. "If we get more complaints let me know and I'll call Allen (Nagel) back and tell him we have gotten more complaints. The problem is that The Enchantress has XXX adds on the TV and Karnation sells stuff as well. This is gonna be a mess."

Two days later, the Twin Falls Police Department drafted the letter to be sent to the three adult stores. Chief Jim Munn asked for it "to be more assertive," leading to the addition of the

threat of arrest.

When Munn asked to make the letter more assertive, Allen responded that he had some concerns to discuss with Wonderlich.

"This is not just going to be us against Allen Nagel, but could turn out to be us against the Porn industry," Allen wrote on Nov. 19, adding that he wanted to see how other Idaho cities handle adult stores. "I think we need to not go in half cocked on this one or we may get bit in the ass."

On Nov. 22, a city building inspector noted that the XXX portion of the sign had been removed, but only after Nagel had spoken with multiple police officers and four days after he asked the city for permission to keep his business open an hour later.

That was the same date listed at the top of the letter from Twin Falls Police, though Nagel says he didn't see it for days afterward.

In an interview Wednesday, Lt. Craig Stotts, speaking on behalf of the Twin Falls Police Department, said he didn't know the origin of the complaints that instigated letters to Enchantress and Karnation or who they were directed to. He also said he hadn't seen the e-mails sent by Allen.

"I don't know where the complaints came from," Stotts said. "I know that years past we had sent the businesses a letter because we had heard they were selling illegal material, adult material, pornographic material."

He said the letter is all that has been sent to the three businesses and that he felt it was a very reasonable response.

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taxpayers: \$40 million.

These and numerous other deals are part of a so-called "extenders" package added to the tax-cut legislation in hopes of attracting broader bipartisan support. Many of the provisions, such as the rum excise tax, are temporary fixes regularly approved by Congress every couple of years, usually by adding them to major legis-

lation. Steve Ellis, vice president of Taxpayers for Common Sense, a watchdog group, said many of the breaks had stalled under House rules aimed at ensuring that new spending is paid for with cuts or revenues. But the push for tax-cut legislation, he said, has "opened up the floodgates."

"Most of these are sweeteners that don't get vetted or reevaluated," Ellis said. "They're just sort of

on autopilot."

The group is particularly critical of the ethanol provision, which has cost taxpayers more than \$21 billion since 2006. The Government Accountability Office recently concluded that the credit has had little impact in encouraging ethanol use or production, especially since the government already mandates rising levels of ethanol use in gasoline and protects the corn ethanol industry through tariffs.

"This tax credit is really just lining people's pockets," Ellis said. "We're not getting any kind of bang for our buck."

But ethanol boosters say the credit is needed to ensure continued growth and encourage other kinds of biofuels.

"While this extension is not as long as we had hoped,

it is a common-sense approach that will ensure American ethanol production continues to evolve," said Bob Dinneen, president and CEO of the Renewable Fuels Association.

Some of the goodies benefit regions rather than industries. For example, companies in American Samoa would enjoy two more years of tax credits worth an estimated \$15 million.

In addition, residents of Florida, Texas, Washington and other states that don't pay state income taxes would continue to be able to deduct itemized state and local sales taxes from their federal taxes, at a cost of nearly \$3 billion to the U.S. treasury. (This deduction was eliminated as part of landmark tax reform legislation in 1986, only to be resurrected years later.)

Kimberly nears end of first water-project phase

KIMBERLY — The Kimberly City Council is looking at a potential end to the first phase of its \$6.6 million water project.

The council plans to round up the project's last loose ends and make decisions on them at its next meeting, Dec. 28. Remaining issues include whether to adopt a billing fee proposal drafted by a Utility Advisory Committee, and how to bill organizations such as schools and churches.

"It was a year ago now in

December that we were scrambling for a design plan. We've come a long way since then," said City Engineer Tracy Ahrens at the council's Tuesday meeting.

Ahrens said the about \$670,000 left in the project fund will pay for continuing to replace old, rusty water pipes with new, more efficient ones. He said the money comes close to covering the remaining 1.2 miles of pipes that need to be re-worked.

Also related to the water project and projected rising bills, the council heard presentations from two landscaping companies on water

conservation strategies for summer lawns.

Dave Wright, president of Kimberly Nurseries, shared tips on keeping a traditional bluegrass lawn alive come summertime. Wright said deeper, more infrequent

watering might shock a lawn at first, but will ultimately create a more drought-resistant turf. He said Kimberly's current lawn watering restrictions — only three days a week and not during the hours of 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. — are perfectly adequate for an established lawn.

"I think you've got a good program," Wright said.

Steven Paulsen, manager of Conservation Seeding and Restoration, went a different route. He outlined the benefits of seeding lawns with grasses native to the area. Paulsen, whose own lawn has been native grasses for three years, said this can cut

watering and mowing down to once every three weeks.

"A lot of the concepts of native (landscaping) — fuzzy, fussy mess — are certainly not true," Paulsen said.

Both Paulsen and Wright said automatic sprinklers on a timer are a good way to avoid overwatering.

In other news, the council agreed to put up \$6,000 in matching funds for a grant of the same value. The money, which comes from a general fund, will help support the Safe Routes to School Grant. If this portion of the grant is fulfilled successfully, it could qualify the city for another

grant to continue the project.

"The return to the city in infrastructure money is just going to be phenomenal," Councilwoman Mitzi Chedelin said.

The council also approved changing the business license ordinance so that renewals are no longer due on a rolling basis, but instead each year on Feb. 1. Recently updated business licenses will be prorated.

And accountant Mike Burr said, aside from potential problems with the city's lack of its own sewage treatment plant, Kimberly did well on its annual audit.

Idaho judge agrees to block new cabin rents

BOISE (AP) — A judge granted a motion Wednesday to temporarily block a new rental policy for hundreds of homes on state-owned land on the shores of Priest and Payette lakes in northern Idaho.

Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden filed a motion for a preliminary injunction in 4th District Court after his appeal to stymie the new rental policy was thrown out by the Idaho Supreme Court.

Wasden sits on the state Board of Land Commissioners with Idaho's four other top elected officials and voted against the new rental policy that was approved in March.

The new plan, according to land board commissioners who voted in favor of it, would raise the cabin rents by 9 percent in 2011 and by 54 percent over the next five years.

Wasden argues the rents are too low and fail to meet the land board's constitutional duty to manage the endowment lands for the maximum long-term financial return.

Idaho's public schools are among beneficiaries of the endowment lands.

"I certainly look forward to working with my colleagues on the land board to try to resolve this issue," Wasden said after 4th District Judge Deborah Bail granted his motion.

The state Supreme Court did not dispute Wasden's argument, but found the case should have gone before the lower court. Now that Bail has granted a motion to block to new rents and will allow time for attorneys to argue their case, what happens next is unclear.

The current leases expire at the end of the year.

"We need to find out what impact this will have on the authority of the land board to manage the state's endowment lands," said the board's attorney, Merlyn Clark, after the hearing.

The land board meets on Dec. 21.

State to reap \$425K from Dannon suit

BOISE (AP) — State Attorney General Lawrence Wasden says the Dannon Co. will pay Idaho \$425,000 to settle a lawsuit over Activia and DanActive yogurt.

In a statement Wednesday, Wasden said Idaho joined 38 other states in a lawsuit alleging Dannon overstated the yogurt's health benefits. The company announced in September that it would reimburse consumers and change its marketing and labeling to settle the class-action lawsuit.

Dannon denies any wrongdoing and said it settled the suit to avoid any further litigation and expense.

Union Pacific sues food company

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Union Pacific is suing an Idaho food company, claiming the company's workers caused a 2009 derailment at a Union Pacific rail yard by neglecting to clean dehydrated mashed potato product off of the wheels of some freight cars.

Union Pacific, which is based in Omaha, filed its lawsuit against Idahoan Foods in Nebraska state court in October, but the case was transferred to federal court on Tuesday.

Union Pacific is seeking nearly \$242,000 in damages from the February 2009 derailment at its

North Platte rail yard.

Idahoan makes dehydrated potato flakes.

The Omaha-based railroad says potato flakes stuck on the wheels of railcars that Idahoan Foods loaded rendered the North Platte rail yard's braking system ineffective before the derailment.

At Union Pacific's North Platte rail yard, workers use two hills to break apart some of the more than 150 trains that pass through the yard every day. After the cars are pushed up the hills, workers break apart the train and allow gravity to send railcars rolling onto a new track to join a train

headed to their destination.

The railroad said in its lawsuit that Idahoan knew before the derailment that it needed to clean the wheels of its railcars before handing them over to Union Pacific.

A lawyer for the Lewistown, Idaho-based food company said Wednesday that he couldn't comment on the case without first consulting his client.

Union Pacific spokesman Mark Davis said the railroad filed the lawsuit to recover payment for damage to other customers' cargo and to tracks in the rail yard.

T.F. City Council majority wrong on bike helmets

Ever met a child with a traumatic brain injury? The first thing you may notice is the confusion, or the darting eyes, the “thousand-mile stare,” or the blinding headaches.

Or you might encounter what neurologists called disinhibition — a 12-year-old, for example, with the vocabulary of an adult serving a life sentence in prison. That makes it hard for a kid to make friends or function normally in the world. And youngsters with disinhibition find it more difficult to say no to drugs and alcohol.

A child’s skull is about one-eighth as strong as an adult’s, so a kid riding a bicycle without a helmet is — literally — a 70-year-long tragedy waiting to happen.

That’s why we can’t support the Twin Falls City Council’s action Monday night in refusing to include a helmet requirement for kids in the city’s new bike ordinance.

The council voted 4-3 against even bringing an ordinance requiring children younger than 16 to wear bike helmets forward for final consideration — a procedure often treated as a formality — with the majority arguing that parents shouldn’t be forced to buy helmets or face a city penalty. Councilmen Lee Heider, Will Kezele, Trip Craig and Mayor Don Hall were in the majority.

The ordinance was written with a blank where a fine for violation would be. City staff wrote in their report that helmets could be bought for \$7.75, and staff brought up the option of raising cash for \$3-off coupons to further minimize the cost.

Heider and Kezele both pitched ideas for educating kids and pressing the issue further. Heider suggested a proclamation from the council about the importance of helmets. Kezele pledged \$1,000 of his own money and his time to urge more kids to wear their bike helmets.

Kezele’s offer is generous, but moral suasion isn’t enough on this issue.

After the vote, Kevin Dane, one of three members of the proposal-originating bicycle safety subcommittee that appeared at the meeting, was visibly frustrated with this end of a year-long process.

“How many people basically are just flat set against (the helmet requirement) because they feel the government is intruding in their lives and how many people are using cost as just a cop-out ... so they don’t have to step up?” Dane asked. “You have to have a life preserver for your boat; you need to wear your seat belt in your car. You might say ‘it’s not the same, it’s not the same,’ and hell, it might not be the same, but it’s a parallel, that’s for darn sure.”

“... We can get around the money issue, but are we just playing with a conservative family value issue, a combination of both, or what?”

Excellent questions, but we really don’t care who wins the philosophical argument here. It doesn’t mean a thing when a child loses his or her future in a bike accident.

Clow and Councilmen David Johnson and Greg Lanting, who voted for the helmet requirement, got it right. Every parent, parent-teacher organization, youth group, scout troop or church organization that deals with kids in this community should contact the mayor and Councilmen Heider, Kezele and Craig and ask them to reconsider.

Obamacare in critical condition

The ruling by U.S. District Court Judge Henry E. Hudson that the Affordable Care Act, also known as “Obamacare,” unconstitutional imposes a requirement that everyone carry health insurance or be taxed for not doing so, has placed the law on legal life support. Ultimately it will be up to the U.S. Supreme Court to either pull the plug on this unaffordable monstrosity, or uphold it and put taxpayers in the equivalent of a persistent vegetative economic state.

Virginia Attorney General Ken Cuccinelli filed the lawsuit challenging the law’s “individual mandate” provision that requires all citizens to buy health insurance or, beginning in 2014, pay a penalty. More than 20 states have similar lawsuits pending. Cuccinelli said in a news conference in Richmond, Va., that the individual mandate is the “common thread” running through all of the legal challenges. He is asking that the Supreme Court take the case immediately under its “Rule 11,” which states that a case must be “of such imperative public importance as to justify deviation from normal appellate practice and to require immediate determination in this Court.”

Cuccinelli believes the case meets that test. So does Rep. Eric Cantor, R-Va., who quickly asked the Department of Justice for an expedited appeal to the Supreme Court. Given Attorney General Eric Holder’s glacial approach to trying terrorists and opposition to the ruling by the White House, don’t expect Holder to move with any great alacrity on ACA.

Judge Hudson is the first judge to strike down the law. Other judges in Virginia

and Michigan have upheld it. Cuccinelli says the next state challenge to be ruled on is Florida, which may come soon.

Even if the Supreme Court agrees with Judge Hudson and strikes down the law, few will notice any effect, as its major provisions, including the individual mandate, won’t take effect for three years. That leaves plenty of time for newly-empowered Republicans to draft legislation that reflects the type of health care reform they have proposed; one based more on the free market and individual choice, not top-down government mandates. President Obama is likely to veto such a Republican plan, but congressional and presidential candidates in 2012 could make the issue central to their campaigns. Public

opinion has swung against Obamacare, as more people come to understand what’s in the law and its negative consequences.

In a statement shortly after the ruling, Rep. Steve King, R-Iowa, got to the heart of what bothers most opponents of ACA: “Obamacare’s ‘individual mandate’ always rested on the absurd premise that the Commerce Clause empowered the federal government to regulate Americans’ decisions not to engage in commercial activity. Adoption of such an argument would have vested the federal government with the power to regulate virtually every aspect of Americans’ lives...”

King is correct. If the federal government can get away with ordering individuals to buy health insurance based on interstate commerce laws, it could order us to submit to any other practice it deems for our good based on similar misinterpretations of the Constitution. Such a course would further erode our liberties and move us closer

to dictatorship and away from principles the Constitution was written to protect.

Should Judge Hudson’s ruling be upheld on appeal, a significant corner will have been turned in the Left’s march toward a socialist state. Polls, as reflected in last month’s election, show that a majority of the public has grown tired of ceding too much power to government, no matter which party runs it. Growing numbers of us have awakened to the misappropriation of funds we taxpayers have given Washington. It is time not only to stop them, but to begin reversing the process with legislative sunset laws, periodic reauthorization of all government programs and agencies, a reform of the tax code and lower tax rates that will return power to the people where it belongs and where the Founders intended it to remain.

One nation, buried under too many laws

America is choking on laws of our own making.

Once a law is in place in the United States, it’s almost impossible to dislodge. Our political class assumes that, after a law is forged in the crucible of democracy, it should be honored as if it’s one of the Ten Commandments — except it’s more like one of 10 million.

We even have a hard time modifying laws that were explicitly designed to be temporary. Just look at the current battle over the Bush-era tax cuts.

Having that debate at all is unusual. Once enacted, most laws are ignored for generations. Decade after decade, they pile up like sediment in a harbor, bogging the country down — in dense regulation, unaffordable health care, and higher taxes and public debt.

A healthy democracy must make fresh choices. This requires not mindless deregulation but continual adjustment of laws. Congress should follow this simple proposal: Every law should automatically expire after 10 or 15 years. Such a universal sunset provision would force Congress and the president to justify the status quo and give political reformers an opening to reexamine trade-offs and

public priorities.

Unless forced to make tough choices, Congress will keep kicking the can down the road. The looming crisis of the national deficit, for example, is impossible to address without changing entitlement programs. But when the co-chairs of the National Commission on Fiscal Responsibility and Reform announced their proposals last month, including modifications to Medicare, condemnation from Congress was swift.

“It’s not true that bipartisanship is dead in Washington,” Will Marshall at the Progressive Policy Institute recently observed. “There’s a perfect bipartisan conspiracy to bankrupt the country.”

There is a flaw in our constitutional system. The founders made it hard to pass legislation, dividing power among branches of government, but once a measure is passed, an army of interests immediately builds a fortress of relationships around it. Not one word of law can be changed without a majority of

Congress running a gantlet of special interest influence. That’s why fixing old laws is unthinkable difficult.

An omnibus sunset law would require that every statute expire at some point, unless it is reenacted. Laws with budgetary mandates, such as subsidies, should probably have shorter fuses than broader regulatory laws, such as antitrust statutes.

The practical challenge of systematically reviewing the huge body of existing law is enormous. Most lawmakers can’t read all the way through laws they pass, such as the 2,700-page health care bill. How could they make sense of hundreds of thousands of pages of old ones?

One technique used in successful legal overhauls is radical simplification.

Simplification of law allows legislatures to pass measures of a general nature, setting goals and operating principles without trying to anticipate every regulatory situation. It offers the only practical way for Congress to start mucking out the statutory stables. Laws that run several thousand pages should be rewritten in 50 pages or less. Only then will lawmakers actually understand what they’re voting on, and the rest of us understand

what’s expected of us.

There have been a few recent efforts along these lines, most notably Al Gore’s Reinventing Government initiative in the 1990s, with which I was involved. But none proposed the one measure that would force legislatures to confront tough trade-offs: giving every law an expiration date.

According to a recent Clarus Research Group poll, 80 percent of Americans agree that the government is broken, that it “needs a basic overhaul” and should undertake “an annual ‘spring cleaning’ to eliminate unnecessary regulations and red tape.”

Our founders never intended democracy to be a one-way ratchet, making laws but almost never unmaking them. Thomas Jefferson famously advocated small revolutions from time to time, believing that they are “as necessary in the political world as storms in the physical. ... It is a medicine necessary for the sound health of government.” This is the medicine that America very much needs today.

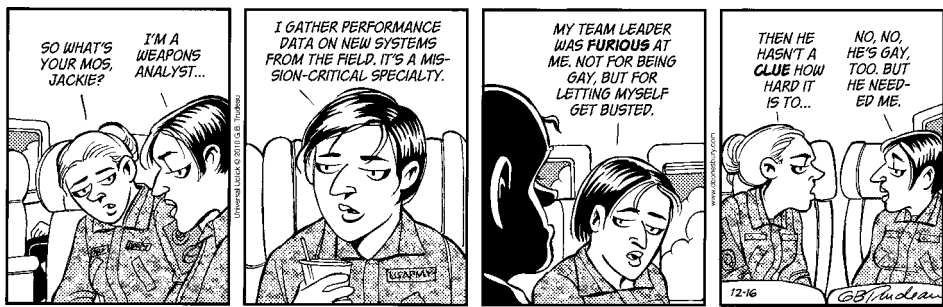

... Idaho's bad business model

It's bad enough that Idaho is creating few new jobs — an all-too-familiar reality for the 70,900 Idahoans who were out of work in November.

Making matters worse, Idaho is creating the wrong kind of jobs: low-paying jobs that do not pay enough to support families.

Idaho doesn't have a mere "job gap," according to a recent study from the Northwest Federation of Community Organizations. It's more like a job chasm:

- Fifty-three percent of the state's job openings pay less than \$14.25 an hour, the living wage for a single adult.

- Eighty-eight percent of job openings pay less than \$26.44 an hour, the living wage for a single adult with two children.

- Predictably enough, competition is intense for those few jobs that do pay a living wage. For every job that pays \$26.44 an hour, there are 30 job seekers.

Creating jobs isn't enough ... The trick is creating jobs that will support households and sustain local economies

Instead of trying to lure away living-wage jobs, from states where these jobs are in short supply, Idaho is better off growing its own. That brings us to the challenges awaiting the 2011 Legislature.

Facing a projected \$340 million shortfall for 2011-12, do lawmakers compound the state's unprecedented cuts to K-12 and higher education? If politicians cut budgets by 14 percent across the board, they will continue a destructive dismantling of the school system that is the linchpin to job creation.

Do lawmakers look at reducing personal and income tax rates, which indeed are higher than Idaho's neighboring states? Do they also look at bolstering the education budget, and creating a more equitable business environment, by repealing narrow and outdated sales tax exemptions, more aggressively pursuing taxes on Internet sales, and hiring more state tax auditors?

... Idaho's business model isn't working. Its budget decisions and tax policies aren't creating the living-wage jobs that a state desperately needs. It's time,

even in trying times, to take a different approach.



... downsize the Legislature

When they complete this latest round of budget cuts, Idaho lawmakers will have contracted state government by almost a third. What started out as a \$3 billion enterprise on the eve of the Great Recession looks to level out at about \$2 billion next spring.

Idaho will have fewer teachers, smaller universities and a reduced public work force.

Certainly, managing it all doesn't require the same number of legislators.

Idaho now has 105 of them — one senator and two representatives from 35 districts.

Each is paid about \$21,250 when you include health insurance and other benefits.

Throw in the \$120 lawmakers get for expenses every day the Legislature meets ...

Add it up and it comes to \$2.2 million a year for a 90-day session.

Reduce the Legislature to 90 members — one senator and two representatives from 30 districts. It comes

to a 14 percent cut — roughly the same scope of downsizing that the 2011 group of lawmakers may impose on everything from schools and higher education to health care and prisons.

A smaller House and Senate would save you about \$500,000 — presumably enough to keep 10 teachers in the classroom — every year ...

Next year, the leaders of the House and Senate as well as the Republican and Democratic parties will name their representatives to a six-member citizen commission. That panel has the job of rewriting legislative district boundaries to conform with Idaho's growing and shifting population.

Idaho's constitution gives that body the discretion to create as many as 35 districts and as few as 30. As long as the courts agree, the principle of one man, one vote is respected, legislators are on the sidelines ...

A smaller Legislature means fewer people to specialize in policy and details, making lobbyists and legislative staff more influential ... Of course doing this means sending 15 politicians back to private life.

Here's betting the people of Idaho will be willing to make the sacrifice.

What is the core feature of the converging world? It is the rise of a gigantic global middle class.

To do this, we'd have to do a better job of celebrating and defining middle-class values. We'd have to have the American business class doing what it does best: catering to every nook and cranny of the middle-class lifestyle. And we'd have to emphasize that capitalism didn't create the American bourgeoisie. It was the social context undergirding capitalism — the community clubs, the professional societies, the religious charities and Little Leagues.

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Casino's choice: Let bandit flee or start shootout

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Waving a gun, a motorcycle-helmet-wearing bandit ordered wide-eyed gamblers and dealers back from a Bellagio craps table, and quickly stashed at least \$1.5 million in casino chips into a bag.

As he fled, casino security had a choice: Let the armed robber escape, or get into a dangerous shootout.

In the end, the bandit casually jogged out of the posh resort — every step captured by surveillance cameras, and broadcast later

around the world. He disappeared into the neon light of the Las Vegas Strip.

“He had a gun. You just don’t want that guy to fire that gun,” said David Schwartz, director of the Center for Gaming Research at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, and a former casino security guard.

“Which is a worse headline? ‘\$1.5 Million Stolen from Casino?’ or ‘Patrons Killed in Casino Firefight?’”

A day after the brazen heist,

police were trying to locate the mysterious bandit while they kept watch for anyone trying to cash big-denomination chips, from \$100 to \$25,000, like the ones stolen.

Experts and police say, for all the risk, the robber may be staring at colorful, but worthless chips.

Police Lt. Clinton Nichols said the chips aren’t cash, with no monetary value unless they’re taken back to the Bellagio.

Chips are unique to casino properties and are generally not inter-

changeable, although state regulations let casino companies redeem sister properties’ chips with some restrictions.

Gordon Absber, spokesman for Bellagio owner MGM Resorts International, wouldn’t say whether MGM Resorts properties are among Las Vegas casinos that embed radio frequency devices inside the tokens.

Schwartz said the stolen chips could also be hard to redeem in an era of anti-terrorism currency exchange laws.

“If you even transact one \$25,000 chip, you’re over a \$10,000 federal currency reporting limit, and you have to provide identification,” he said. “And if you try to structure a transaction to avoid reporting, that’ll alert the feds anyway.”

Las Vegas police say detectives are following promising leads and hope someone may be able to recognize the robber’s helmet and jumpsuit from video and photos broadcast on television and the Internet.

Police say girl was allowed near drugs

BOISE — A Boise woman has been arrested after police say they found methamphetamine and marijuana within reach of a 1-year-old girl in her house.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports Jennifer C. Scott is being held in the Ada County Jail on felony charges of delivery of a controlled substance and injury to a child.

Scott gave officers permission to search her residence Tuesday afternoon as police investigated citizen tips that drugs were being sold at the house.

Officers say they found three grams of meth, a small amount of marijuana and drug paraphernalia, all within reach of the toddler. The girl was declared in imminent danger and placed in the custody of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Scott was scheduled to make an initial court appearance Wednesday.

Board signs off on Simplot project

BOISE — Boise city officials are finally on board with a \$70 million project designed to honor Idaho business icon J.R. Simplot.

The Boise Planning and Zoning Commission unanimously signed off on plans for the Simplot family to build a complex with office space, art studios, meeting spaces and a public park on a collection of vacant lots in the city’s downtown.

The complex is called JUMP — or Jack’s Urban Meeting Place.

Construction will begin next year, create more than 700 construction jobs and take two years to complete.

Project Spokesman David Cuoio says JUMP is designed to serve as a memorial to Simplot, founder of the Simplot Co. and longtime business leader in the state.

JUMP will also feature an outdoor theater, parking spaces and a museum of agricultural relics from Simplot’s own collection.

Police: Idaho patient fled in ambulance

SANDPOINT — Police say a northern Idaho man being loaded into an ambulance threw punches at emergency workers and was stunned by an officer’s Taser before he managed to flee in the vehicle.

Authorities say 25-year-old Cody Wayne Mills commandeered the ambulance late Monday and drove about 35 feet while crashing into trees before he fled into the nearby woods on foot.

Mills, of Sagle, was arrested less than an hour later and treated for hypothermia.

He faces charges of driving a motor vehicle without the owner’s consent, a misdemeanor, and has pleaded not guilty to felony resisting an officer.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* reports EMS workers responded to reports of a seizure at about 10:30 p.m. and found Mills, who became combative.

"Ninety percent of our front desk personnel have been with us since the beginning," Nebeker said. "Even in housekeeping, we have a much lower turnover compared to industry averages."

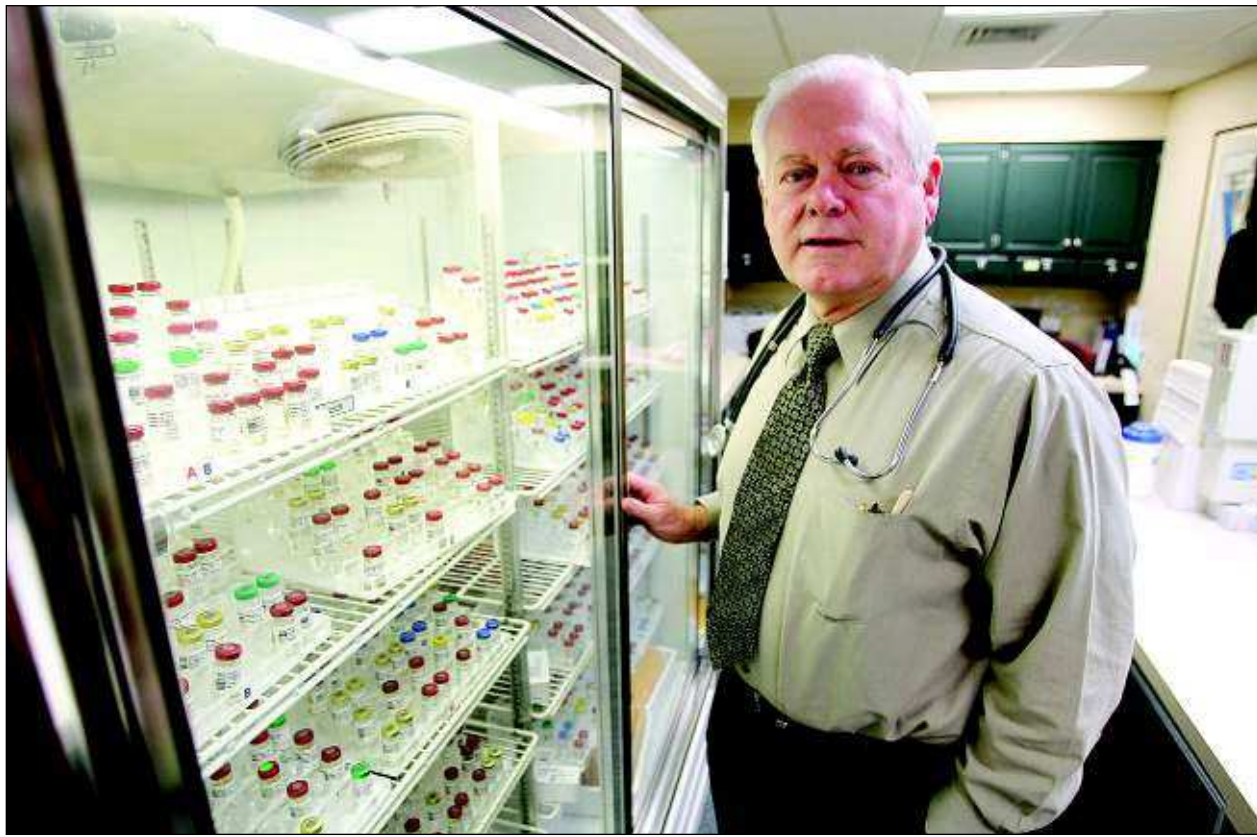
As the Mini-Cassia Chamber of Commerce's president, Nebeker said the department's relationships with business, industry, city government and organiza-

Doctors wait for permanent fix for Medicare funding

Like private-practice physicians across the country, Dr. Richard Henry, co-owner of Asthma and Allergy of Idaho, is feeling relieved that Congress passed a law delaying a 25 percent cut in physician Medicare payments that was set for January.

The relief, however, is short-lived. Just like Congress, Henry has seen this movie before.

"We received an extension from the cuts a year ago, and year before that," Henry said. "What Congress hasn't done is fixed the real problem. They just continue passing delays."

The "real problem" he's talking about is that each year Medicare reimbursement rates — how much doctors are paid for providing care to Medicare patients — are subject to adjustment, as calculated by the "sustainable growth rate" formula adopted as law in 1997.

The formula has called for cuts since

2002. Since then, Congress has simply delayed the cuts, said Ellen Griffith, spokeswoman for the Office of External Affairs and Beneficiary Services with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

If Congress doesn't change the rates, physicians' pay cuts will be even larger in 2012.

"Only Congress can prevent these cuts from taking effect and Congress has done so for every year," Griffith said.

Doctors have faced Medicare cuts five times this year alone, and five times lawmakers have voted to delay the cut to a later date.

For doctors like Henry, the uncertainty makes it hard to do business.

Unlike some of his peers who are refusing to see Medicare patients, Henry continues to do so.

"I lose money each time I see a Medicare patient but I can't refuse them care; it weighs on my conscience. We're talking about our elderly here," Henry said.

According to the American Medical Association, Medicare reimbursements have stagnated over the last decade while the cost of running a practice has increased by more than 20 percent.

If the program doesn't change, Medicare patients could have a hard time finding care.

"We're at a breaking point," Henry said. "In Elko (Nev.), where we have a practice, we're one of the few that see Medicare patients. More and more doctors simply can't afford to."

Susie Pouliot, CEO of the Idaho Medical Association, said the organization is lobbying for a long-term fix.

Slow candy sales mean goodbye Hawaii, aloha Fargo!

FARGO, N.D. — There is an old saying in the sales business: Always be closing. Here is a new one: Always be freezing, if you do not sell enough.

The company that makes Hot Tamales candy offered its sales team an all-expenses-paid trip to Hawaii if it met its annual goals, and a trip to the nation's arctic tundra if it didn't.

The Just Born team did not meet its target and, on Tuesday, about two dozen salespeople gathered inside the 19-story Radisson hotel — the tallest building in frozen Fargo.

Outside, the temperature was 7 degrees. The ground had 2 feet of snow.

Not exactly Hawaii: Honolulu was sunny, and a comfortable 82 degrees.

"Fargo is not what you would think is one of the greatest locales in the United States and technically we didn't make our year," said Dave Bayha, a Just Born manager. "It was

somewhat of a punishment."

Would Bayha rather be in Hawaii?

"Um, sure," the Phoenix resident said, laughing again.

The team had a good year, increasing sales from the previous year by 2 percent, said Josh Halpern, the company's director of U.S. sales. The goal was a 4-percent bump.

That earned them the trip to Fargo. Some had to go shopping for real winter clothes, such as furry bomber hats, long underwear and parkas.

They are trying to make the best of it, with a little humor.

They planned tours of two North Dakota wineries and a winter extravaganza with a sleigh ride, tobogganing and hot toddies around a fireplace inside a chalet.

On their first night in town, they went to the VFW in West Fargo for a spaghetti dinner. Five

After dozens of deaths, drop-side cribs outlawed

WASHINGTON — It's the end of the traditional crib that has cradled millions of babies for generations.

The government outlawed drop-side cribs on Wednesday after the deaths of more than 30 infants and toddlers in the past decade and millions of recalls.

It was a unanimous vote by the Consumer Product Safety Commission to ban the manufacture, sale and resale of the cribs, which have a side rail that moves up and down, allowing parents to more easily lift their child from the crib.

The new standard requiring cribs to have fixed sides would take effect in June. The move by CPSC would also prohibit hotels and childcare centers from using drop-sides, though those facilities would have two years to purchase new cribs.

CPSC Chairman Inez Tenenbaum hailed the new standard for cribs as one of the strongest in the world.

"I believe these new standards will markedly reduce crib-related hazards and help to ensure that young children sleep more safely in their cribs," Tenenbaum said after the vote.

Drop-side cribs have come

under scrutiny in recent years because of malfunctioning hardware, sometimes cheaper plastics, or assembly problems that can lead to the drop-side rail partially detaching from the crib. When that happens, it can create a dangerous "V"-like gap between the mattress and side rail where a baby can get caught and suffocate or strangle.

In all, drop-side cribs have been blamed in the deaths of at least 32 infants and toddlers since 2000 and are suspected in another 14 infant fatalities. In the past five years, more than 9 million drop-side cribs have been recalled, including cribs from big-name companies such as

Evenflo, Delta Enterprise Corp., and Pottery Barn Kids.

Parents who lost their children in drop-side cribs say Wednesday's ban couldn't come soon enough.

Michele Witte of Merrick, N.Y., lost her 10-month-old son, Tyler, in 1997 when the drop-side rail on his crib came loose, partially detached and then trapped his neck between the rail and the headboard.

"It's been a long 13 years," said Witte. "I feel like it's a celebratory time because things are finally being done about the issue."

Witte appeared at a news conference on Capitol Hill with Democratic Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand

of New York, Rep. Jan Schakowsky, D-Ill., and Rep. Joe Crowley, D-N.Y., all of whom have pushed for stronger crib safety rules.

The new standard mandates tougher safety testing for cribs, tests that more closely mimic a child in a crib.

Better labeling on crib will also be required.

Crib makers were already phasing out drop-side cribs over the last couple years, amid increasing problems with them. And last year, the organization that sets voluntary industry standards, ASTM International, approved a drop-side ban.

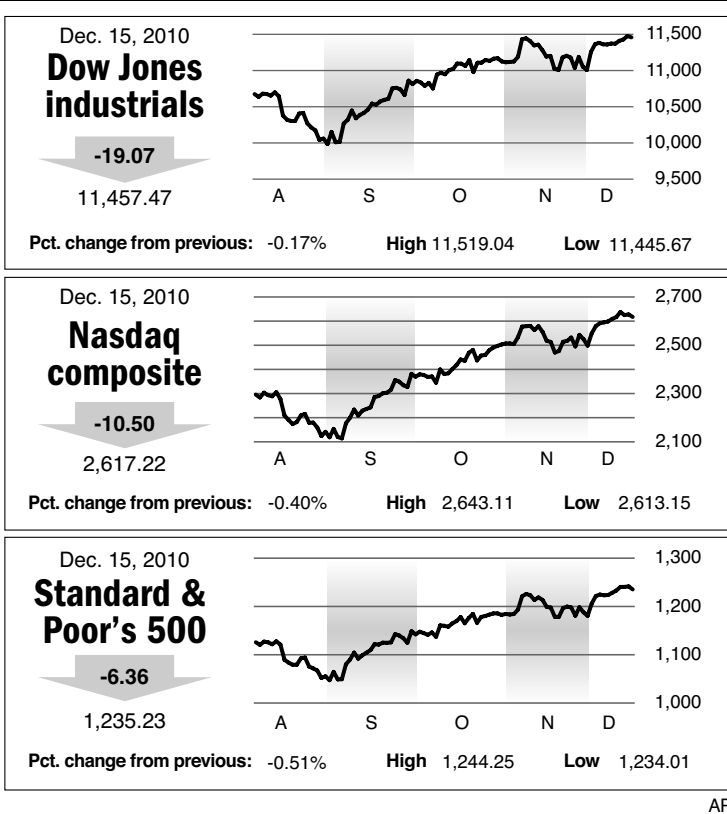

Early gains in the stock market evaporated Wednesday after worries about Europe's debt crisis overshadowed signs of growth in the U.S. Bond prices fell, sending long-term interest rates higher again.

Stock prices started the day higher after reports showed that U.S. manufacturing industry is growing and inflation remains under control. The Federal Reserve said U.S. factory output rose for the fifth straight month in November. A separate report showed that consumer prices stayed flat last month.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 19.07 or 0.2 percent, to 11,457.47. The broader Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 6.36, or 0.5 percent, to 1,235.23. The Nasdaq composite index fell 10.5, or 0.4 percent, to 2,617.22. Treasury prices fell, pushing their yields higher. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note rose to 3.53 percent from 3.45 percent the day before. That's the highest the yield has been since May 13. The yield helps set interest rates on mortgages and other kinds of loans.

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Congress acts to stop phone scams using false caller IDs

WASHINGTON - Congress moved Wednesday to stop scammers who use fake caller IDs to trick people into revealing Social Security and credit card numbers and other vital information.

House lawmakers trying to wrap up work for the year also passed a second consumer protection bill that would crack down on third-party sellers who prey on people during online purchasing transactions.

The Senate previously passed both bills and the House votes send them to President Barack Obama for his signature.

The caller ID bill, sponsored by Reps. Eliot Engel, D-N.Y., and Joe Barton,

R-Tex., addresses the issue of "spoofing," where scammers use the caller ID of, for example, a bank or a government office to deceive people into giving them private information.

Engel cited one case last year where New York City police uncovered an identity theft ring that used caller ID spoofing to steal more than \$15 million from 6,000 victims. In another case, a SWAT team shut down a neighborhood in New Brunswick, N.J., after having received a distress call from a person using a fake caller ID.

Rep. Tim Murphy, R-Pa., said he was the victim of a phone spoofer that bombarded constituents with

calls that made it appear as though they came from his office.

The bill applies to those who use caller ID, the number appearing on the phone of the person receiving the call, to defraud, cause harm or wrongfully obtain anything of value.

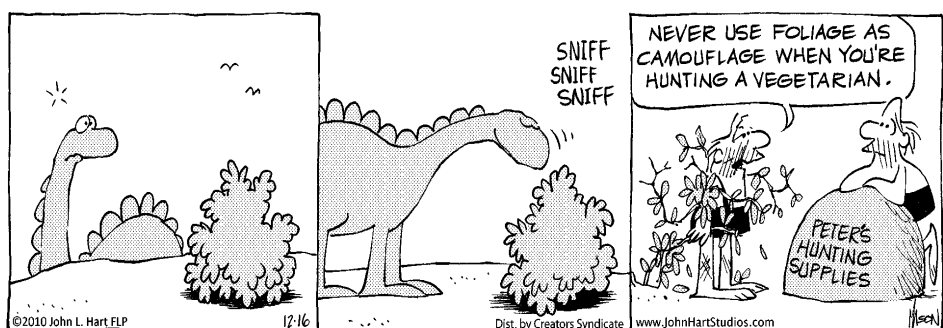
Exemptions are made for law enforcement or intelligence activities needing to conceal or change IDs, or for organizations such as domestic violence centers which change numbers to protect an occupant of a shelter.

The bill authorizes civil penalties of up to \$10,000 for each violation, up to a total of \$1 million for any single act.

"This ought to give law enforcement another tool

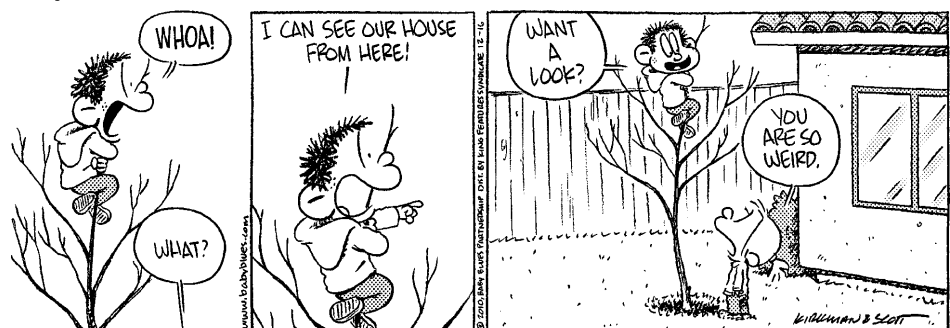

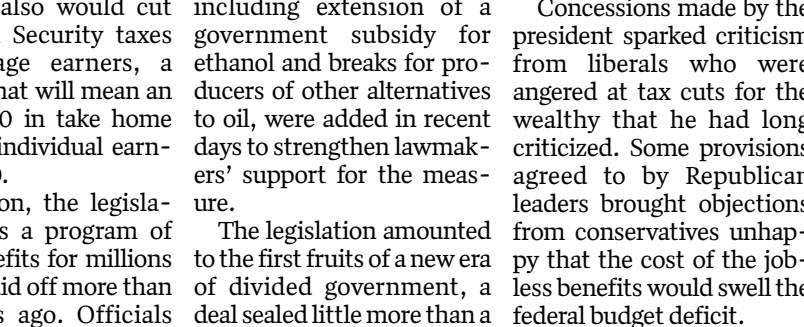

WASHINGTON (AP) - In a reach across party lines, the Senate overwhelmingly passed sweeping legislation Wednesday to prevent a Jan. 1 income tax increase for millions and renew jobless benefits for the long-term unemployed.

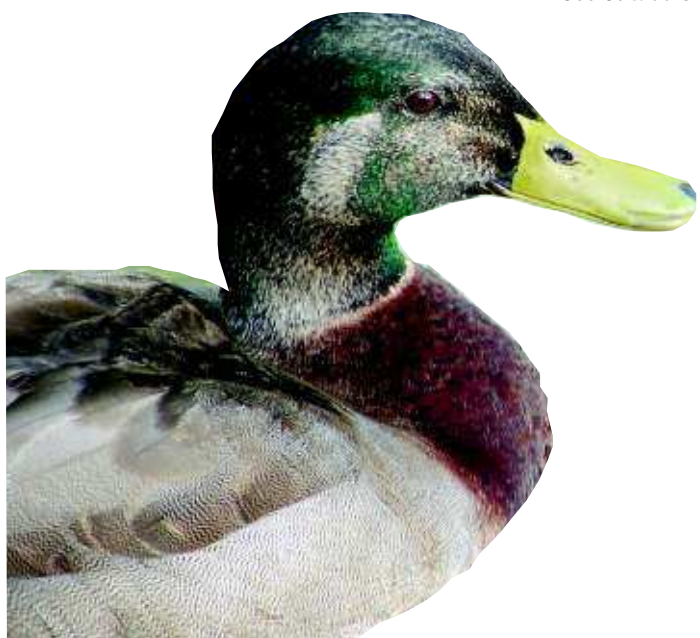

Meet world-famous duck caller Buck Gardner at 3 p.m. Saturday at Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls. The duck calling seminar is for all ages, but the first 50 youth will receive a free duck call. Information: 737-9900 or buckgardner.com.

Like duck calling, visiting Idaho isn't just a job for Buck Gardner. It's something he sincerely enjoys doing.

Gardner, a world-famous duck caller from Memphis, Tenn., is in town this week, and on Saturday will once again visit Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls where he'll demonstrate waterfowl calling techniques and visit with area hunters.

Meeting the people of the area is one of the things that make his trips exciting and worthwhile ones, he said. He especially enjoys visiting with youth hunters.

"I like the people and haven't run into anybody I didn't care for," he said in a phone interview last week.

Gardner plans to duck hunt with friends today near Hagerman, where he also will capture video for his popular DVD series.

The 61-year-old started calling ducks when he was 5, and the passion grew into

more than five decades of hunting and business ventures.

He's hunted in a number of states and Canada. He's won duck-calling championships, filmed hunts across the country, and conducts outdoors seminars. He also manages his own shop, Memphis-based Buck Gardner Calls, where he makes a variety of calls and ships them across the country and overseas. Gardner's polycarbonate calls are manufactured in Little Rock, Ark.; the acrylic ones in Rockwood, Tenn.

"I love him to death," said John Howard, manager of Sportsman's Warehouse.

The friends have known each other for about 10 years, first meeting at a seminar in Colorado. Gardner has visited the Twin Falls store for the past five or more years, Howard said, and he always draws a good crowd. Last year between 80 and 100 people turned out to the event, and Howard expects at least that many this year. The first 50 youth will receive a free duck call.

Gardner shared his philosophy about hunting.

"Hunting is a privilege," he said. "We think it's a right, but if we treat it as a right there's a real good chance that it could somehow be taken away from us. But if we treat it as a privilege, if we're good sportsmen and ambassadors and tell our stories the right way, about how we give back more than we take and leave the world a little better place, it's

really hard to convince somebody to take that away."

He said it's important to teach the rising generation these principles.

"That's what I'm all about," Gardner said.

There's still time to enjoy hunting, fishing this holiday season

There's still time to bag that Christmas goose, or maybe a nice solstice-season steelhead.

For hunters and anglers itching to get out in the field or to wet a line during the holiday season, several opportunities are available.

For upland game hunters, the cottontail season is open through Feb. 28, and snowshoe hare season through March 31. There is no

season on pygmy rabbits.

The pheasant season in Areas 1 and 3 is open through Dec. 31. The forest grouse season also is open through Jan. 31 in north Idaho's Area 1 and through Dec. 31 in the rest of the state. Seasons for bobwhite and California quail in Area 2 are open through Jan. 31. Chukar and gray partridge seasons also are open statewide through Jan. 31.

Waterfowl seasons are open to Jan. 14 in Area 1, northern and eastern Idaho; and to Jan. 21 in Area 2, southwestern Idaho and Magic Valley.

Waterfowl hunters 16 and older must have a federal Migratory Waterfowl Stamp, available at Idaho Department of Fish and Game offices, local post offices and some vendors and are good through the end of the season.

Consult the rules brochure for details and bag limits or log onto fishandgame.idaho.gov.

Fall steelhead season remains open through Dec. 31. The spring steelhead season starts Jan. 1.

Many rivers and streams are closed to other fishing, though some are open under winter fishing rules for certain species, such as whitefish and brook trout. Most lakes and reservoirs as well

as ditches and canals are open year round. Some lakes and reservoirs already have enough ice for ice fishing. Consult rules brochures for exceptions and details.

Remember, hunters and anglers must have 2010 licenses and permits through Dec. 31; anyone planning to go hunting or fishing on or after New Year's Day must have 2011 licenses and permits.

Layout boats give access to big-water ducks

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The water stretched to the horizon like a sheet of rolled steel. Its polished surface reflected a living diorama: a background of gray, sodden clouds peppered with fleet-ing specks of black.

"Bluebills," said Mike Thun of Sheboygan, Wis. "Just look at 'em all!"

Thun and I hunkered in layout boats, about 50 feet apart, and looked up at the world from inches above the waterline.

About 30 bluebills, also known as scaup, flashed overhead, black and white against a dingy sky, and eyed our decoys.

Wings ripped through air as the birds flared.

In the middle distance, several larger flocks wheeled over the bay. By sheer number, they appeared as starlings.

And farther away, small dots danced over the water like clouds of mosquitoes on a summer evening.

In each direction, in every air space, the bay was alive with ducks.

At 186 square miles, Green Bay is the largest such water body on Lake Michigan.

You'd never think it could be this crowded.

Over the course of several hours on a November afternoon in the lower bay, flocks

of ducks — bluebills, mostly, but also redheads, ringnecks, buffleheads and scoters — defied an accurate count.

Thun estimated it was more than 150,000 ducks.

It's an increasingly common spectacle on the big waters of Lake Michigan as migrating waterfowl adjust to changing ecological conditions.

In the case of diving ducks such as the bluebills, the abundance of zebra and quagga mussels, exotic species introduced to the lake in the last two decades, has provided a large, new food source and is considered by many as the chief attraction.

"We never used to see this many," said Thun, 30, a native of Sheboygan. "It takes a lot of people by surprise."

A group of bluebills worked our decoys every five minutes. The fifth group drew closer, closer, and several birds set their wings.

One fell to each of our guns.

Divers such as bluebills and canvasbacks travel down the Mississippi River each fall, rafting by the tens of thousands on the big pools.

But they can't be hunted on the open water.

Layout boats provide an option on Green Bay and Lake Michigan.

Thun and partner Dean Crom run Big Water Outdoors, a waterfowl guide service that specializes in

layout hunting.

Thun said he and Crom started dabbling with duck hunting on Lake Michigan in the mid-1990s.

"We started hunting around piers and stuff, but we saw birds flying in the big water and wanted to pursue 'em," Thun said.

The pair bought bigger and better equipment and finally decided to do it as a business. They each have U.S. Coast Guard captain's licenses. Safety, experience and skills on the big water are paramount to success.

Over the course of two days, I joined Thun and a group of other hunters, including Roy and Patrick Kalmerton of Howards Grove and Paul Wait of Washington, Ill., for a big-water layout experience. Wait is former editor of *Wisconsin Outdoor Journal* who now edits *Wildfowl* magazine.

Big water waterfowling is a different breed of hunting. Thun uses a "mother ship," a 24-foot, center-console craft that looks like something in a U.S. Navy expeditionary force, to transport hunters, decoys and two layout boats offshore.

We hunted 1 to 2 miles from shore in a zebra mussel-rich area Thun knows draws feeding ducks.

After dropping out six lines of 24 decoys, a hunter was left in each layout boat and the

big boat retreated a half-mile away. Each hunter was given a walkie-talkie to signal the tender when he was ready to be picked up or if he needed a duck retrieved.

The first day featured calm seas and relatively easy shooting. The wind picked up the second day and dished up a 1- to 2-foot chop, better for concealing the layout boats but tougher for shooting.

Thun said the layout isn't for everyone.

"Some people just don't like being isolated in that little boat," he said. "And in the colder weather, it can be tough."

"But there is nothing like it to bring in ducks. It's really a unique experience."

We thought we had seen a lot of birds when a freighter came into the Green Bay shipping channel. Plume after plume of bluebills rose from the water and circled the sky.

In addition to bluebills, our bag included redheads, ringnecks and scoters.

A week later, the bay was frequented by goldeneyes and long-tailed ducks.

"You can spend days in a blind waiting for a handful of ducks," Wait said, as we stowed decoys on the last afternoon. "And then you see tens of thousands out here on a single afternoon. Amazing!"

It's the kind of memory that warms duck hunters on cold winter nights.

Make cutting your own tree a family tradition

Most of my neighbors have set up their outdoor Christmas decorations. It seems that everyone goes overboard for Christmas.

Well, nearly everyone goes overboard in preparing for a secular Christmas. Somehow or another I have never been into stringing a bunch of lights about the yard and over the house.

I don't do illuminated scenes of Santa Claus, a sleigh, and a herd of reindeer. I don't care to have a giant inflatable Frosty the Snowman in my front yard nor do I want one of Snoopy, either.

I must add that I would like to have a tastefully small, subtly illuminated crèche with the baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph, some shepherds, sheep, goats and a donkey. It would look nice in the front yard and set the tone for what I believe Christmas is all about.

Since I don't have the crèche, I will stick to finding a Christmas tree that will bring a little joy into our house. Mind you, finding the correct Christmas tree for our house has been a shifting target over the years.

In years past, a big, bushy tree was in order so that I could put up lots of ornaments and lights. The big tree would offer shelter for the presents I would put under it for my sons and friends.

As the boys grew up and went on their own, the big tree seemed to not fit my needs anymore. When I was feeling very chintzy I decorated my 2-foot tall Norfolk Island pine with a half dozen ornaments and a few icicles.

As the years went by, I began to look for a Christmas tree that was about six feet tall. For the past 15 years the tree was a sub-alpine fir. I chose the fir for several reasons: it holds its needles well, it has a great fragrance, and it usually isn't very bushy.

I have found that searching for the right fir tree is part of my Christmas preparation. I look forward to buying my permit. After

I have the permit, I have to coordinate with my wife, Carol, on an agreed upon day for our Christmas tree-cutting expedition. Sometimes we coordinate with my son, Clint, daughter-in-law, Stephanie, and grandchildren, Lily and Brooke.

While finding an acceptable tree is the supposed purpose of the trip, watching the granddaughters frolic in the snow and run about as they try to find the right tree is the real purpose. To feel the excitement of youngsters proclaiming, "This one is perfect. No, wait, how about this one?"

Of course the first half dozen trees have no branches on one side, are crooked, are too tall, or are broken in the tops.

Finally, after trudging in knee-deep snow for a couple of hundred yards, the girls calm down and tire out a bit. Mom and Dad can point out some trees that are fairly symmetrical and are about 8-feet in height. Maybe there is a bit of bald spot, but that can be tucked against the wall.

The final decision is reached that the 9-foot tall fir tree will fill the bill. The few spindly branches at the bottom of the tree will be used to make a wreath, so the overall height of the tree will be about seven feet.

The bow saw makes short work of the four-inch wide base and the tree comes tumbling down with a shower of snow.

As for our tree, that 3 1/2-foot tall fir with a handful of branches and a symmetrical shape will do for us. It will fit perfectly on our end table and support a dozen or so ornaments and a string of lights.

Snacks of Christmas cookies and cups of hot chocolate make for a tasty trip home. Before we are out of the mountains both girls are sound asleep.

If you haven't made a family tradition of cutting your own Christmas tree, why not consider it? It's a great family outing and a lot less taxing than putting up a gazillion outdoor lights.

shouldn't cut trees near roadways. Head farther into the hills, where you'll likely find better trees anyway. Also, don't only bring the equipment you need to cut and securely tie down your tree, but make sure you're prepared to deal with winter weather.

"My suggestion would be to prepare for winter driving ... because we do have snow (in the moun-

tains)," she said. "If you don't have four-wheel drive, use chains."

Despite winter driving conditions, people have been buying permits and heading to the hills.

"We've sold a lot of Christmas tree permits, so they're getting up there somehow," Thomas said.

Men arrested in bull elk poaching

BOISE (AP) — State wildlife officials say two Caldwell men have been arrested in connection with the poaching of two six-point bull elk in Owyhee County in early November.

An eyewitness tip led to the arrests of 53-year-old Vance Nelson and his son, 26-year-old Roy Nelson.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game says Vance Nelson had a tag to hunt bull elk in a closed draw area of Owyhee County, but his son did not.

Roy Nelson is charged with one felony count of taking two elk in a closed special draw area, one felony count of conspiracy and felony destruction of evidence.

Vance Nelson is charged with one count of felony conspiracy and felony destruction of evidence. He also faces misdemeanor charges of unlawful transfer of a tag, possession of unlawfully taken game and waste of a game animal.

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Question: I'm in deep trouble with my bills and I need to speak to an attorney about bankruptcy, but I'm embarrassed. How should I approach an attorney? Marty.

Answer: Dear Marty, There is nothing immoral or underhanded about bankruptcy. In fact, there are biblical origins to our modern concept of debt relief through bankruptcy. In Deuteronomy and elsewhere in both the Old & New Testaments, it is clear that debts are to be cancelled every 7 years, based on the Sabbatical and Jubilee years. Old English laws embraced the biblical concept of bankruptcy, and our founders borrowed heavily from the English legal system in creating our own. Our Constitution includes specific instructions to Congress to enact uniform laws respecting bankruptcy. When you speak to an attorney, try to make the consultation productive by being prepared to answer questions about your income and expenses as well as about your debts. The attorney will want to know about any prior bankruptcies, whether you are a homeowner, if you have wage garnishments and whether you have filed all required tax returns. Fight the urge to explain the "why" of your money troubles or to try to justify your need to file a bankruptcy. There will be ample time to discuss these things, but initially the attorney needs facts in order to identify any potential problems and to give you the appropriate guidance.

How many fishing poles can I use?

Q: "A buddy and I have a bet about how many fishing rods I'm allowed to use. Can you help clarify the rules?"

A: The law allows the use of one line or pole with a maximum of five hooks, if you are fishing in open water (the number of hooks allowed may be restricted to less than five on some waters).

This can either be a hand-line or a traditional fishing pole or rod-and-reel set up.

After purchasing a two-pole permit, an angler is allowed one additional line or pole. The two-pole permit must be purchased at a license vendor and will be printed on the angler's fishing license.

When fishing through a hole broken or cut in ice an angler may use up to five lines, each with a maximum of five hooks.

For public safety, holes can be no larger than 10 inches in diameter unless specifically allowed by regional exception.

The daily bag limit of fish that can be harvested stays the same as listed in the current fishing brochure for the area and does not change if a person has a two-pole permit or is using five lines fishing through the ice.

Minidoka Co. employees help provide a little Christmas

Minidoka County employees know what it's like to play Santa Claus. They have been doing it since 2001.

The Minidoka County Employees Goodwill Fund was started by Patty Temple, who currently works in the auditor's office but will be sworn in as the new county clerk in January.

Employees give money from each paycheck throughout the year and the funds are used to help those in need — especially during Christmas.

"I had been in a sorority and we had done things for families and given to families at Christmas time, and I saw the need," Temple said. "I thought it would take so

little if everyone gave a little each month out of our paycheck, then we would donate it at the end of the year to some charity in the community."

Temple's suggestion got good response from her fellow employees, and the fund has been going strong since its inception. Donations range from \$1 to \$11 every paycheck — contributed twice a month.

"It is strictly voluntary and people can give whatever they want," she said. "We have a committee and anyone who donates can be on the committee. And anyone can put in names for someone to receive help."

Many people participate from the sheriff's office, assessor's office, courts and other county offices. Temple serves as bookkeeper

for the fund. It has shown steady growth since its beginning, bringing in \$3,000 to \$4,000 annually.

The funds are doled out mainly at Christmas, although there have been other times when the committee felt help was warranted.

"In the past we have had a few instances where we have helped with gas and expenses for people who had a child with cancer and were traveling for treatment," Temple said. "Once we paid property taxes for someone who was losing their home. One year we purchased furniture. They didn't have any beds, and we've helped out with electric bills. We've done all kinds of things.

"... Every name we have been given we have helped.

But mainly, it's for Christmas."

Temple said the first year the committee purchased gifts, wrapped them and took them to families. But after that, they opted to give money to the parents and let them purchase the gifts.

"We purchase script cards from St. Nicholas, then give the gift cards to families. It depends on the situation," she said.

The committee also considered giving one lump sum, but members decided against that as they hate to leave anyone out from their gift list.

"We get all these names and we want to help as many as we can," Temple said. "We can't change their lives. We just want them to have a little brighter Christmas."

Arthritic fingers can be painful

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor X-rayed my hands and said I have osteo in them. They get stiff and ache. What should I take for it and what should I not eat? Thank you for your help.

DEAR READER: I assume you are referring to osteoarthritis, not osteoporosis because of your claim that your hands are stiff.

Osteoarthritis is a chronic disease of the joints that results from a breakdown of cartilage. Symptoms include pain and stiffness of the affected joints. The condition is commonly associated with aging. As such, it is seen more in older people than in younger ones.

Healthy cartilage is smooth, elastic and flexible, allowing for easy movement. When osteoarthritis occurs, surface of the cartilage softens, becomes pitted, frayed and/or cracked. As the condition progresses, some areas of the cartilage may wear away completely, exposing the

underlying bone. The bone becomes damaged, and movement of the affected joint(s) becomes very painful. If further cartilage breakdown occurs, the ends of the bone may thicken and form spurs. Particles of bone and cartilage may then float in joint spaces, contributing to pain with movement. The X-rays you had must have revealed diminished joint space. The bones may be roughened and condensed.

Pain commonly occurs when the affected joints have either been overused or when they remain motionless, as with being bedridden. While in many instances the pain may be limited to the specific joint such as the hands, it may also spread to surrounding areas. The pain may dimin-

ish somewhat with rest but will exacerbate when the joint is moved.

Treatment is aimed at controlling pain, preventing joint deformity and maintaining movement. The most common over-the-counter medications are acetaminophen and ibuprofen for control of the pain and inflammation. When these medications fail to work, you may require prescription NSAIDs (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs). You and your doctor will know when that time occurs.

Alternatives to medication include castor oil rubbed onto the affected joints, adding grape juice and pectin to one's diet, an OTC combination of glucosamine and chondroitin, Castiva with capsaicin (warming) or menthol (cooling) and omega-3 fish oil taken either through the ingestion of fish or in capsule form.

Stay as active as possible, flex those fingers often, add

salmon or other fish to your diet and follow your doctor's instructions.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've noticed several over-the-counter medicines for ringing in the ears. Do any really work?

DEAR READER: I recommend you see a physician or otolaryngologist first to make sure there is no discharge, pain, underlying cause or other undiagnosed reason for your condition.

Perhaps you are on a medication with tinnitus as a side effect. Should this be the case, a simple modification of the drug strength or brand might be in order. If nothing

is found, there are a number of OTCs you might consider, including Lipo-Flavonoid, lignocaine, melatonin, setraline, botulinum toxin and others. Herbs include ginkgo biloba, vincamine extracted from periwinkle, or sesame

seeds. The herbs mentioned are purported to increase the flow of blood to the head and neck. Beyond that, I cannot guarantee you will find relief from OTCs, herbs or prescription drugs. When you speak with your physician,

who knows your medical history, ask for a recommendation. Your pharmacist will also be an excellent resource in this regard.

Woman pleads guilty in toddler's death

Rice aims for football-like success at BSU

BOISE — Leon Rice slips around the floor at Taco Bell Arena with barely a second glance. Not so surprisingly, the coach of the second most high profile sports program at Boise State is hardly recognizable. But don't expect it to stay that way for long — especially with a high profile marketing campaign with football head coach Chris Petersen.

That and the fact the Broncos are winning more.

A New Era

When Rice replaced Greg Graham after last season, his hire was met with considerable buzz for a couple of reasons.

First, it meant Boise State could lure away the sure-fire next head coach of the most consistent basketball program in the Northwest over the past 15 years in Gonzaga.

It also meant that sustained success is the new

benchmark for success for the Broncos.

Graham was just two years removed from winning the WAC and taking the Broncos to the NCAA Tournament. But two mediocre seasons that followed were his undoing. The team lacked passion. Fans stopped attending.

Until now.

"Around this time last year, we wouldn't have as many fans here as we're already having now," said senior La'Shard Anderson. "Before, nobody would say

much to you. Now when we're around campus or downtown, people are coming up to you and saying encouraging things. It's great."

Through the first nine games of the season, Rice has quickly reversed some negative trends and made one thing clear: mediocrity will not be tolerated, per the boss's orders.

"Leon has been intimately involved in building one of the most successful programs in the country," Boise State Athletic Director Gene

Bleymaier said. "Our goal is to do the same here."

The Broncos matched the fastest start in school history, winning their first six games. However, the team has dropped three straight to three good teams — falling by three points in each loss.

It serves as a stark reminder that becoming another mid-major darling in the Northwest won't be easy — or quick.

"I took this job with 'the sky's the limit' mentality,"

DECLO — The Gooding boys basketball team was put in a difficult spot.

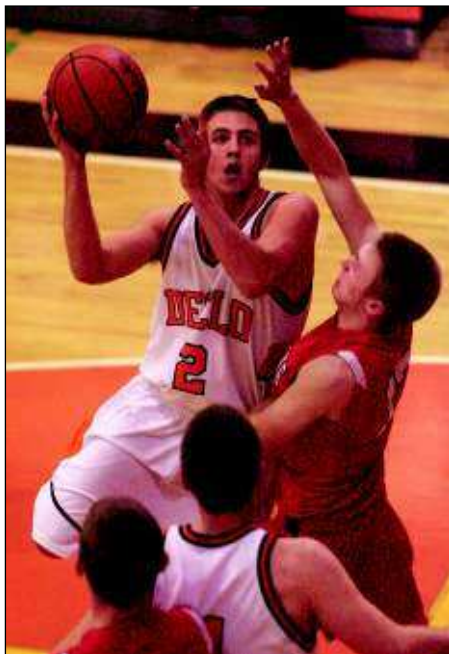

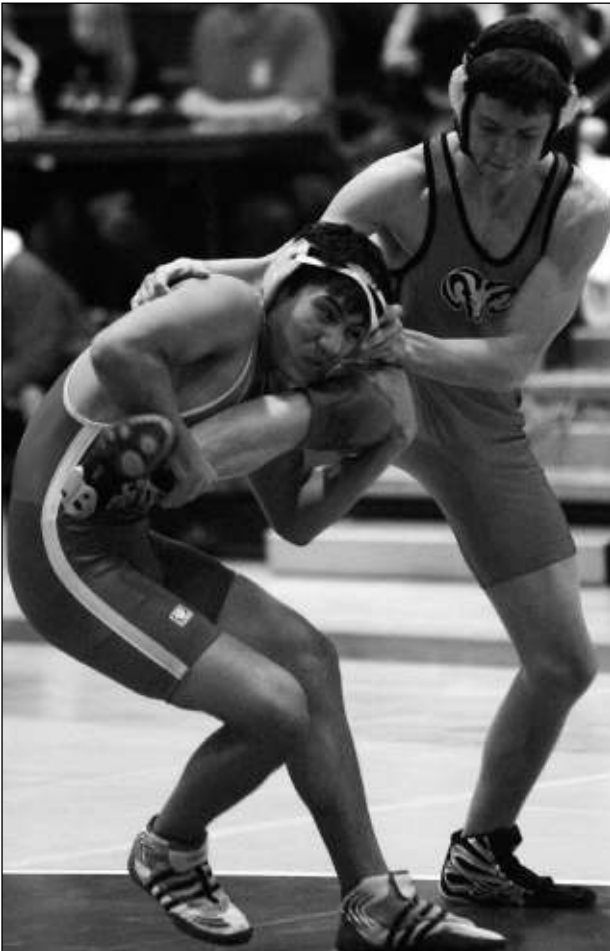

COLLEGE FOOTBALL BOWL GUIDE

Sifting through 28 days of bowls

The college football bowl season kicks off Saturday afternoon with a showdown between 6-6 teams in the New Mexico Bowl.

Forgot about that one already? That's OK, with 35 bowls in 28 days, it's hard to keep track of them all.

This guide to the bowl-arama, filled with the clunkers, the handful of must-watchers and a few tidbits sprinkled in, should (hopefully) make it a little easier.

HEISMAN, NATIONAL CHAMP

Auburn's Cam Newton has one big trophy in his hand and is now trying to join an elite list.

This year's Heisman Trophy winner gets a shot at becoming the 14th player to win college football's most prestigious individual award and a national championship in the same season against Oregon on Jan. 10.

It's happened five times since 1993, including Alabama's Mark Ingram last season, but just once — Pitt's Tony Dorsett in 1976 — in the previous 54 years.

DISTANCES

San Diego State earned a berth in the Poinsettia Bowl and Hawaii is in the Hawaii Bowl, giving those teams a nice home-field advantage.

SMU got an unexpected one; the Mustangs will face Army in the Armed Forces Bowl in their own stadium because TCU's is being renovated.

For long distances, Tulsa gets the nod for playing in Hawaii, close to 4,000 miles away.

The longest road trip actually on the road? Boston College in the San Francisco

Bowl and Stanford in the Orange Bowl in Miami, both close to 3,100 miles. That's about 46 hours in the car for anyone who's up for it.

NAME CHANGES

In the ever-changing tilt-a-whirl of bowl sponsorships, four bowls have switched names this season: GoDaddy.com (formerly GMAC), uDrove (Roady's) Humanitarian, Kraft Fight Hunger (Emerald) and Bridgepoint (Pacific Life) Holiday.

The Holiday Bowl is making its sixth title sponsor change, but is still short of the name-switching champ, the Champs Sports Bowl in Orlando. Since 1990, it's been the Blockbuster Bowl, Carquest Bowl, MicronPC Bowl, MicronPC.com Bowl, Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl, Mazda Tangerine Bowl and became the Champs Sports Bowl in 2004.

The Meineke Bowl will switch names in 2011, becoming the Belk Bowl after the department store chain, and the Gator Bowl has hooked up with Progressive insurance for next year.

ODD JUXTAPOSITION

The New Year's Day Outback Bowl will feature a 46-year-old coach on his way out, an 84-year-old who's coming back for another season.

Florida's Urban Meyer will be coaching his last game, walking away from the Gators to spend more time with his family and because of health concerns.

Across the field will be Penn State's Joe Paterno, who's decided to come back after making a record 37th postseason appearance in his 45th season of coaching, another major-college record.

CLUNKERS

New Mexico Bowl, Dec. 18, UTEP vs. BYU. two 6-6 teams in the first game of the first day of bowls doesn't exactly inspire gatherings around the TV, at least outside of West Texas and Utah.

Little Caesars Pizza Bowl, Dec. 26, Toledo vs. Florida International. Two middling mid-majors in Detroit in the middle of winter? What's not to like?

Military Bowl, Dec. 29, East Carolina vs. Maryland.

A bowl sponsored by the military without a military academy featuring a 6-6 team (East Carolina) and one (Maryland) that's having a hard time persuading fans to drive to a game just down the road.

BEST NON-BCS

Goodell hopes labor agreement can be reach by Super Bowl

FORT WORTH, Texas — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell said a new labor agreement could be in place by the Super Bowl "if we all commit to it and work hard at it."

Goodell made it clear Wednesday that NFL negotiators are willing to do so.

"There's no higher priority than getting a collective bargaining agreement," he said following a day of meetings with NFL team owners. "So we will work night and day to get that done."

Asked whether he expects the same from the NFL Players' Association, Goodell said, "I hope so."

NFLPA spokesman Carl Francis said, "We have no comment at this time."

The major sticking point is the owners demanding to restructure the players' share of designated revenues. Another point of contention is the owners wanting to turn two preseason games into regular-season games; the union fears more injuries and has countered with a request for additional roster spots and cutting offseason workouts by about one-third from the current 14 weeks.

Goodell said the league has no deadline, but noted the collective bargaining agreement expires March 4.

JETS SUSPEND ALOSI INDEFINITELY FOR ORDERING WALL

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — Sal Alosi tripped up when he told the New York Jets his side of the story.

Now, the embattled assistant coach could be looking to save his job.

Alosi, New York's strength and conditioning coach, was suspended indefinitely by the team Wednesday after he acknowledged that he told five inactive players to stand next to each other for a punt return, during which he tripped a Miami Dolphins player.

"As we continued our

investigation, we discovered some new information," general manager Mike Tannenbaum said in a conference call from the NFL owners meetings in Dallas, "and the players at the Miami game were instructed by Sal to stand where they were to force the gunner in the game to run around them."

That was information Alosi did not initially volunteer Monday, according to Tannenbaum.

NFL CLOSER TO A RULING ON FAVRE INVESTIGATION

FORT WORTH, Texas — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell is close to announcing whether the league will punish Brett Favre for sending inappropriate photos and phone messages to a former New York Jets game hostess.

Goodell said Wednesday he received the league's report about the case "last week and I expect that some time in the near future I will make a decision."

Asked if that would come by the end of the season, he said, "I expect that, yes."

The NFL is examining whether Favre sent Jenn Sterger messages and photos in 2008, while he was playing for the Jets and she also worked for the team.

UMINN PUSHES TO BE READY TO HOST VIKES-BEARS

MINNEAPOLIS — Work began in earnest Wednesday to get snow removed and soften the frozen field at the University of Minnesota's stadium, which will replace the snow-damaged Metrodome for Monday night's game between the Vikings and Bears.

A fourth panel in the Metrodome's inflatable roof tore open at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, dumping snow and ice on the field. No one was hurt, and all the workers were pulled from the stadium floor. Crews will inspect the damage today.

Lee, Phillies finalize \$120M, 5-year deal

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Cliff Lee chose comfort and familiarity over more money.

Welcome back to the City of Brotherly Love, Cliff. They already love you here.

Lee and the Phillies finalized a \$120 million, five-year contract Wednesday that brings the star pitcher back to Philadelphia.

"It's plenty of money," Lee said. "When you hit a certain point, enough's enough. It's just a matter of where you're comfortable, where you're happy, where your family's the most comfortable, what

team gives you the best chance to win. At this point, it's about trying to win championships. That's really the No. 1 thing for me. I think this team gives me the best chance to do that. That's really it."

Lee spurned more lucrative offers from the New York Yankees and Texas Rangers to return to the Phillies, who traded him away a year ago after he helped them reach the 2009 World Series.

He could have had \$150 million and a spot on the

biggest stage in baseball playing for the most successful team — the Yankees, winners of 27 World Series.

Instead, Lee chose the red pinstripes over the famous dark blue ones and left \$30 million behind.

"It feels great to land back here in Philadelphia," Lee said at a news conference at Citizens Bank Park. "I never wanted to leave this place in the first place."

The deal was reached late Monday night, and Lee arrived in Philadelphia late Tuesday. He had to flip-flop

name plates with general manager Ruben Amaro Jr. when he sat down in the wrong seat at his news conference, and soon thereafter took off his dark blue suit jacket and put on his No. 33 jersey.

The two-time All-Star and 2008 AL Cy Young Award winner helped the Rangers reach their first World Series this year. He chose to rejoin the Phillies and combine with Roy Halladay, Roy Oswalt and Cole Hamels to form a dynamic starting rotation.

Rice said. "We all know it's going to be easier said than done. And we all want to be good now. But that's not going to happen.

"It's hard for me, but it just takes time. There are no shortcuts to it."

The Master Plan

There may not be any shortcuts, but there is definitely a master plan — one that looks strangely familiar to Bronco fans.

Rice wants the Boise State basketball program to break onto the national scene, just like the football team has. It's why he views the school's overpowering football presence as a positive for the basketball program.

"I look at what Boise State has done

in football as a positive for us," Rice said. "You get to show recruits the enthusiasm and the excitement around this football program. When (ESPN's) GameDay was here, we brought recruits in for that game with Oregon State and they were blown away by it.

"They understand that people want to get behind our basketball program that way too if we can keep growing it. I feel like that's an advantage, and we're using it as an advantage when we recruit."

However, recruiting to Idaho is no small task, especially in a place that's a far cry from Hoops Town USA. But it's a must. Not a single player on the current roster or among the team's five new signees are from Idaho.

"Spokane wasn't a basketball town either," Rice observed. "You would probably say it was a hockey town. It was pretty far north and isolated, too. But in this day and age, kids will go places. You just have to find the right ones who are willing to go places.

"A lot of kids want to stay close to home, but there are others who don't

mind going away — and they're used to traveling more than the generation before them."

So far, Rice — who has a formidable reputation for being an expert recruiter — is already finding success in luring solid talent to Boise. He found players in Australia, North Dakota, Illinois, Las Vegas and San Antonio — all who fit what he termed as "character kids."

"You've got to get good character athletes, guys with great character," Rice said. "That's what we want to build it on. We feel that way about the five that we signed. They're good kids. They're going to work hard. And they're going to get better and better during their time here."

It's the same message preached fervently by Petersen and the football program.

If it works, Boise State fans might begin to view basketball as something much more than the passing of time until football season. And Rice won't be able to go anywhere without being recognized.

ORDINANCE NO. 2996

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, AMENDING TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §10-11-1.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TWIN FALLS, IDAHO, THAT TWIN FALLS CITY CODE §10-11-1 IS AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

"10-11-1: IMPROVEMENTS REQUIRED:

The improvements required herein shall be provided whenever a building or structure is constructed, placed, erected or enlarged or when there is a change of use of a building, structure or parcel of land. Unless otherwise provided, all required improvements shall be a condition of any building permit and they shall be completed prior to final inspection and occupancy of the building. If cost of improvements required by sections 10-11-2 through 10-11-5 of this chapter exceeds twenty five percent (25%) of the cost of the proposed private improvements, an agreement may be negotiated to allow the required improvements to be staged over a period of time not to exceed three (3) years. Whenever a building is constructed, placed, erected or enlarged and that building is in an isolated or undeveloped area, or in cases of exceptional hardship, public improvements may be deferred by the council in cases where a deferral would otherwise be unavailable. Any improvements required by sections 10-11-2 through 10-11-5 of this chapter are not required for minor modifications or additions to existing buildings or structures when the modifications and improvements do not constitute more than a twenty five percent (25%) increase over the square footage of the existing buildings or a total increase in square footage over ten thousand (10,000) square feet, whichever is less, within any three (3) year period from date of completion of other expansion.

If a single building of a premises containing multiple buildings is expanded over twenty five percent (25%) of that building's square footage but less than a total of twenty five percent (25%) of the combined square footage of all buildings, the improvements required by sections 10-11-2 through 10-11-5 of this chapter shall be provided for the building being expanded only. If the expansion is greater than ten thousand (10,000) square feet or greater than twenty five percent (25%) of the combined footage of all buildings, the improvements required by sections 10-11-2 through 10-11-5 of this chapter shall be provided for the entire premises."

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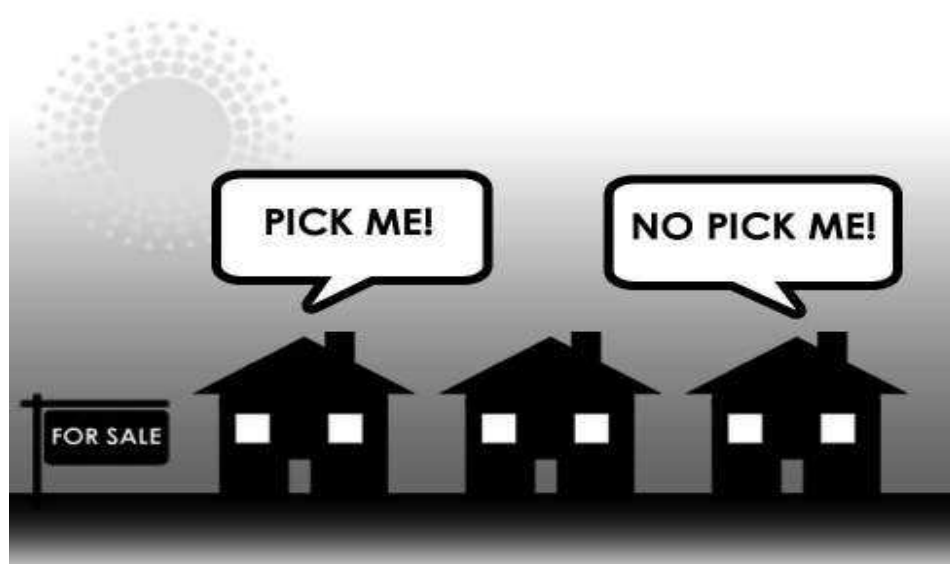

It is rare to see a player endplayed at trick one, but that was West's fate in this match between England and Denmark at the 2006 European Championships, after Peter Schaltz had opened with a frisky weak no-trump.

John Armstrong did well to stay silent in the auction and to lead the diamond ace. (Any other suit lets the contract succeed.) His diamond continuation was won by South's queen, and two rounds of trumps revealed a loser. A club to dummy's queen held, then declarer erred by throwing a club on the diamond king. Schaltz ruffed a diamond and exited with a trump, but now Armstrong could cash his club ace and exit with his last club, leaving declarer with a spade loser.

Armstrong's silence over the opening bid reaped its reward, for had he doubled, Schaltz would surely have found the correct discard of a spade from his hand on the diamond winner. Then his trump exit would have seen West endplayed into conceding the contract. Either a spade or a club play would allow dummy's spade loser to go away.

At the second table Colin Simpson reached four hearts as South, but here Gregers Bjarnarson as West had shown strong no-trump values. When West selected the club ace as the opening lead, Simpson quickly wrapped up 10 tricks because dummy's spade loser could be discarded on the clubs. But even on a diamond lead, declarer would have known how to play the hand.

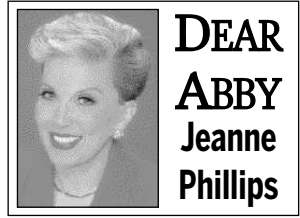

Continuing the journal on his journey through life as a parent, and memorializing her feelings watching him and her grandchild would be a better gift for the son to "find" once the mother is no longer here. A journal should never replace telling people in person how you feel. If Blocked at any time is unable to continue the writing, the last of the journal could be dictated and transcribed by a friend for her.

I agree she should start a companion journal about her life as well. But I encourage her to continue writing her son's journal. It would be the gift of a lifetime.
